McCAFFERY SAYS NO DELAY IN GETTING COURT HOUSE WORK STARTED

Commence at Once with Court House; Architect Coming

Following the announcement that the contract for the erection of a new court house here being let to the local firm of Albert McCaffery, an interview was sought with Mr. McCaffery in which he was asked when the work would be commenced and how it would be carried out.

Mr. McCaffery said he expected the provincial architect would be here next Wednesday and then arrangements would be made to commence work at once. Also the assembling of material would begin so that there would be no delay in getting the building up and making the best use of the summer weather.

The local firm, Mr. McCaffery, had been the lowest bidder for that reason had been selected for the contract. They had not thought wise to proceed with the work.

Mr. McCaffery said the building to be a very fine one, and would be built of brick with a first floor which would be fireproof. Everything would be thoroughly fireproof and the setting at the market would have a very fine appearance and be an ornament to the city.

Mr. McCaffery said no definite date in regard to when work was to be commenced had been made, but there would be no delay in getting the architect here.

TO GO OVER POWER LINE

Will Take Superintendent Duncan's Party Six Weeks Sounding Dam and Traversing Line

Politics, however, must be shunned. His order prohibiting employees from participation in elections stood and ninety per cent of the employees "are with me on that question."

These so far include 43 Unionists, 14 Nationalists and 19 Sinn Feiners. There are 52 seats to fill so it is clear that to date there is no great rush for office such as characterizes the Parliaments in other countries.

HUGHES GOVERNMENT IS SUSTAINED ON CONFIDENCE VOTE

MELBOURNE, April 21.—The Hughes Government has been sustained on a vote of confidence by the Commonwealth Parliament following an adverse snap vote which gave the opposition an opportunity to demand an appeal to the country. This vote indicates that there will be no appeal at present.

FLAVELLE MAY HEAD RAILWAY

Color is lent to the report that in the projected reconstruction of the National Railway that Sir Joseph may become head of the system especially in regard to the financial end. It is understood that he refused the first time. However, he has been attending many conferences.

A total eclipse of the moon visible generally in North America on both the Pacific and Atlantic Coasts takes place tonight at 11:24, Prince Rupert time. The middle of the eclipse will be at 11:34 and the end at 12:05. If the sky is clear tonight the phenomenon should be visible, for the moon is full tomorrow.

Fisheries School For the Coast.

According to Dr. L. W. Gill, director of technical education in the department of labor, it is proposed to establish a floating fisheries school on the east coast to operate largely during the winter months.

Dr. Gill says he has been urging the establishment of such a school on this coast and he expects that in time he will be able to secure it.

The fisheries on this coast have been sadly neglected by all the governments both past and present. The department, coming as it does under Dominion supervision and not under provincial, has been somewhat of an outcast.

Miners Strike Still Continues.

Without knowing anything about the right or wrong of the strike of miners in the Old Country, it seems a pity that the whole of the industries of the country should be held up and the people suffer not only inconvenience but great hardship because the two factions, the owners and the employees, cannot settle their differences.

Moral Right of General Strike.

The moral right of the general strike is one that is being questioned these days. After many years of experiment, the labor unions have discovered that if they stand together they can control the whole life of a nation, especially of a commercial nation like Britain.

When used for the purpose of righting wrongs, this power is all right. It is legitimate. But when it goes beyond that it becomes tyranny.

In the past minorities have always been able to dictate to majorities but it was not the same minority nor the same majority. Now the shoe is on the other foot and the former minority having joined the oppressed majority does not like the new condition.

ALICE ARM IS RATHER QUIET

People are Waiting Anxiously for Word of Resumption Dolly Varden Work.

ALICE ARM, April 21.—The people of Alice Arm are waiting anxiously for news as to whether the Dolly Varden Railway and mine is to resume active work this season under the Taylor Mining Co. Since the sudden closing down last Christmas the reopening of the mine has been a matter of a good deal of concern in which the business and development of the town and most of the properties in the Kilsnuff River section are concerned.

Unless the Dolly Varden Railway is in operation the development of the district will be seriously impeded. With a glut in the copper market and silver prices down a good deal of doubt is expressed as to the extent of the work that will be carried on here this season either on active production or development.

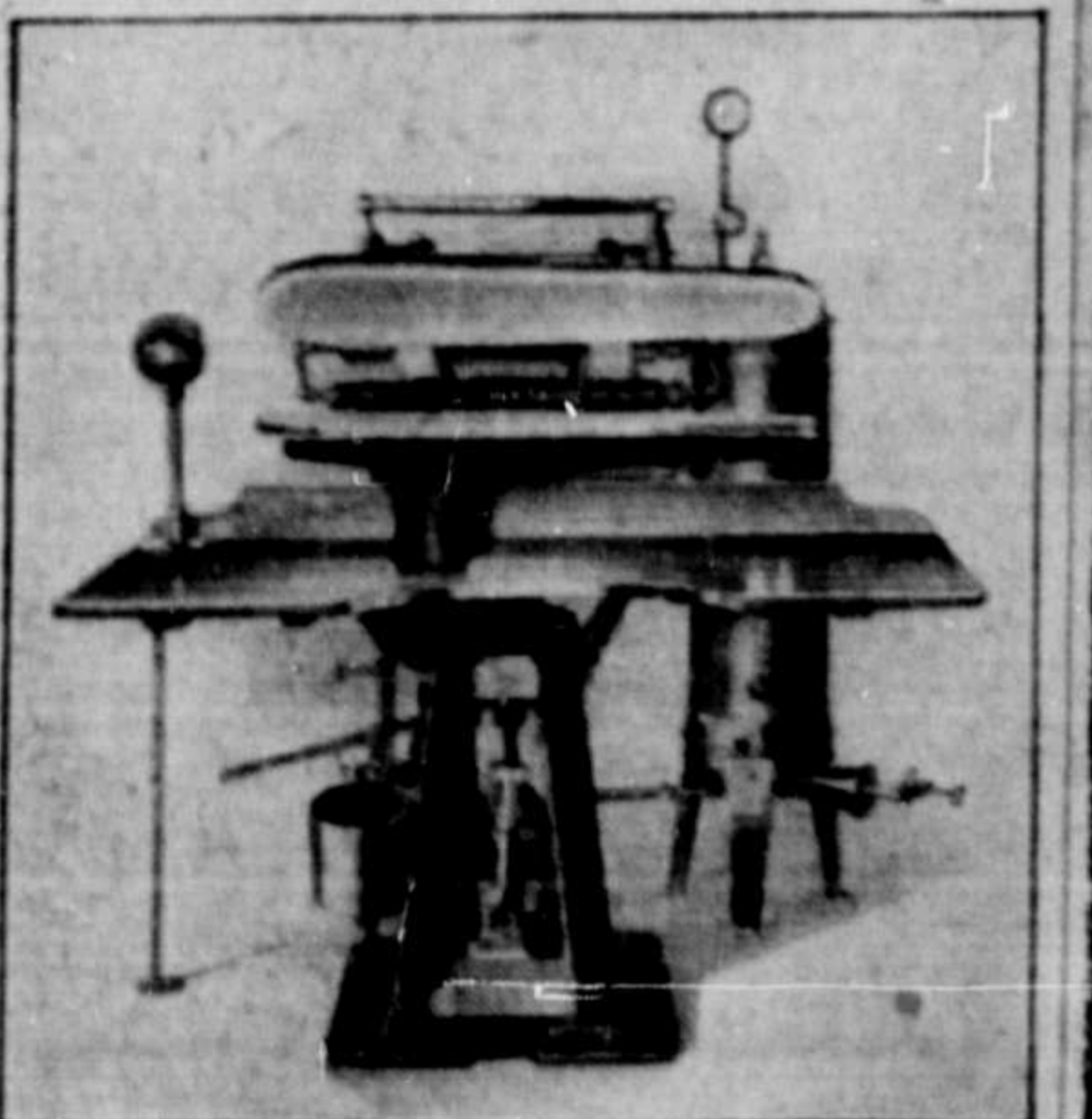

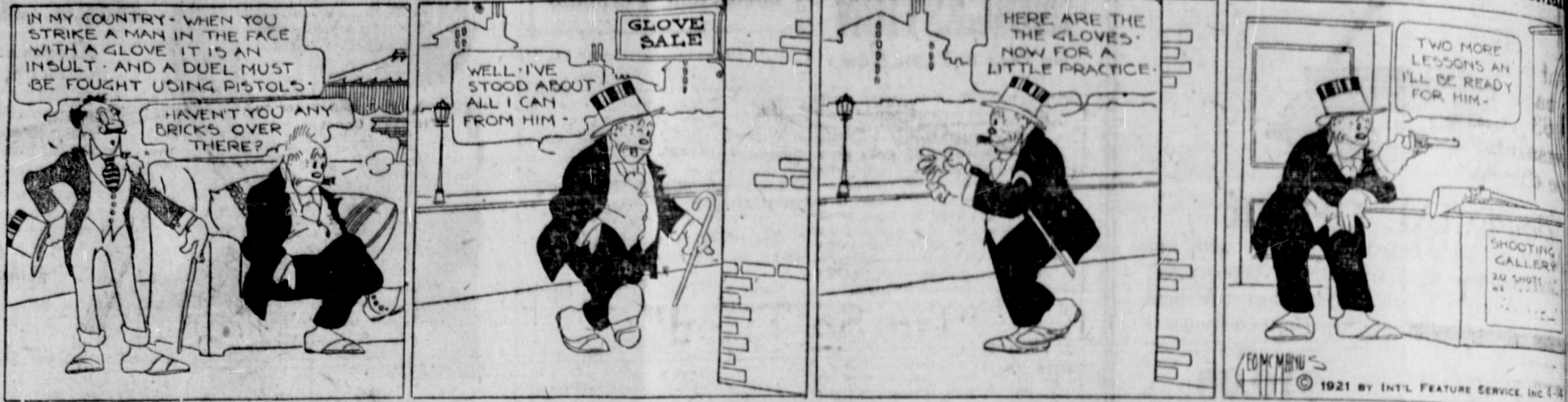

GOLD SEEKERS IN FAR NORTH

Leave Edmonton May 1 and will Winter East of Great Slave

EDMONTON, April 21.—A party of gold seekers consisting of Harold Anderson, Louis Woodman, Lovell Smith and W. H. Haywood are now completing arrangements for a year's trek to the far north and will prospect and trap in the country east of the east arm of the Great Slave Lake. PROPOSAL TO CHANGE POLICE

Victoria Would Use Vancouver Constables to Help Enforce the Law.

TERMINAL CITY IS OUT FOR TOURISTS

Cabarets and Beer Parlors are Being Planned to Pay Off Debt.

Exchange of detectives between Victoria and Vancouver as a means of detecting liquor law violations without arousing the suspicions of bartenders, bootleggers and others, was suggested by Police Commissioner Ernest A. Hall last night and was made the basis of a resolution, subsequently adopted, says the Victoria Colonist.

Chief of Police John Fry will write to the chief of the Vancouver police relative to the feasibility of the proposition and will later report to the commission.

According to the custom he has adopted, Dr. Hall led up to his suggestion with a series of questions addressed to Chief Fry: "Is the present Prohibition Act being satisfactorily enforced?" he asked.

"To the best of our ability," said the chief.

"Then I suppose your ability isn't very great," continued Dr. Hall. "I can go into bars and see the law being openly violated. I realize that members of the police and detective force cannot do that without arousing suspicion, but there should be some other means of detecting these violations."

Dr. Hall then put forward his motion that Chief Fry communicate with Vancouver as regards an exchange of detectives for a month at a time.

Vancouver Expects Boom.

"I don't think Vancouver would do it," said Chief Fry. "Vancouver is spending a lot of money preparing for the new law. They expect to get a lot of money back. They expect a big boom there, and they might not like to spare their detectives."

"If they got two better detectives from Victoria to replace the ones they sent here, they should not mind so much," said Dr. Hall.

Chief Fry went on to tell about Vancouver's preparation for the new regime of Government control. He said that the Vancouver chief had written him about Vancouver's plans for cabarets with beer parlors. Vancouver was going to spend a lot of money to get tourists and it expected to pay off a large part of its debts through income in that way.

"I thought there was something in this new act that banned beer," said Commissioner Joe North.

"They may not call it beer," said the chief. "They will probably call it something else."

Doesn't Object to Beer.

"Well, I haven't got anything against beer at all," observed Mr. North. "But if Vancouver is opening up cabarets with beer parlors, and the Government passes a law forbidding the sale of beer, I don't just understand. I don't know much about the act yet. I've been waiting patiently to find out, and I'm willing to sit quiet until the information comes along."

Chief Fry said that detectives might object to being placed on what virtually amounted to stool pigeon duty. They had more valuable work to perform, although junior policemen might do it.

Valuable Work.

"I don't see any more valuable work than the enforcement of the Prohibition Act," declared Commissioner Hall. "If the detectives won't do that sort of work I think it is our business to find detectives who will."

Mayor Porter said he was opposed to the principle of employing stool pigeons.

The Hall motion was adopted and Chief Fry will write to Vancouver at once.
