

McCAFFERY SAYS NO DELAY IN GETTING COURT HOUSE WORK STARTED

Commence at Once with Court House; Architect Coming

Following the announcement that the contract for the erection of a new court house here being let to the local firm of Albert McCaffery, an interview was sought with Mr. McCaffery in regard to when the work would be commenced and how it would

Have Permission from Republic of War Time Penalties Imposed

BLIN, April 21.—The Irish in reviews the operations last week showing that eight hundred men were killed and 34 wounded in 39 conflicts. Nine barracks attacked and one destroyed. The Irish Republican Parliament forbids citizens of the republic to leave Ireland without permission and threatens time penalties on any person infringing the rule.

ORILLIA, Ont., April 21.—Every foot of the Canadian National is capable of successful operation, said President D. B. Hanna, of Toronto, in an address to the Canadian Club here. He said those who claimed Canada had too many railways did not know what they were talking about. If the people would only have patience the G.N.R. would become a great asset. Politics, however, must be shunned. His order prohibiting employees from participation in elections stood and ninety per cent of the employees "are with me on that question."

LONDON, April 21.—Premier Brigand and Lloyd George plan to hold a strictly private conference at Hythe, England, "only one secretary of each to attend."

TO GO OVER POWER LINE

Will Take Superintendent Duncan's Party Six Weeks Sound- ing Dam and Traversing Line

Superintendent T. C. Duncan, of the municipal utilities department, will leave about the middle of next week to commence an exploration trip of the Thaline River, Wark Channel, power project. The party will comprise four men, including Mr. Duncan and Bert Moore, an experienced woodsman, who is employed on the present Woodworth Lake transmission line. The trip will take about six weeks and a camp will be established in the cabin at Wark Channel.

About a month will be required in taking soundings for the dam foundation at the proposed power site. This will be done by the digging of pits and use of the sounding rod. A survey of the bedrock in the vicinity will practically be made. To traverse the transmission line will take about nine days. Mr. Duncan will not remain out with the party for the whole six weeks, but will make periodical visits into town to attend to his other duties.

FLAVELLE MAY HEAD RAILWAY

Correspondent of Vancouver lays Special Stress on His Presence in Ottawa.

The correspondent of the Vancouver World in Ottawa lays special stress upon the presence of Sir Joseph Flavelle in the capital in conference with the counsel who are advising the government in respect to the Grand Trunk situation. Color is lent to the report that in the projected reconstruction of the management of the National Railway that Sir Joseph may become head of the system especially in regard to the financial end. It is understood that he refused the first time. However, he has been attending many conferences.

These so far include 43 Unionists, 14 Nationalists and 19 Sinn Feiners. There are 52 seats to fill so it is clear that to date there is no great rush for office such as characterizes the Parliaments in other countries.

John Alder Left Victoria for Edmonton Bound for Mackenzie River

Sufficient for Three Months Will Be in British Columbia Soon.

John Alder, after spending a few days in Victoria, left last night for Vancouver. He will journey East as far as Ed蒙don and probably strike north into the Fort Norman country, the scene of recent oil activity. Mr. Alder, whose home is on Hampshire Road, has been away for several months in connection with his Eastern business interests.

"I have no definite plans regarding my trip into the oil country," said Mr. Alder last night. "I intend to look over the prospects and, if considered feasible, may consider a proposition for transporting supplies there from Edmonton. There is no doubt that a tremendous movement will commence to the MacKenzie River basin as soon as the rivers are open for transport."

Mr. Alder was for years connected prominently with athletics in Victoria.—Victoria Colonist.

HUGHES GOVERNMENT IS SUSTAINED ON CONFIDENCE VOTE

MELBOURNE, April 21.—The Hughes Government has been sustained on a vote of confidence by the Commonwealth Parliament following an adverse snap vote which gave the opposition an opportunity to demand an appeal to the country. This vote indicates that there will be no appeal at present.

WILL REBUILD PLANT BURNED AT VICTORIA

VICTORIA, April 20.—The Sidney Roofing & Paper Company plant at Sidney will be rebuilt immediately, the machinery installed, and the plant again put into operation at the earliest possible moment.

While the ruins were still smouldering, insurance appraisers were busy on the estimate of the loss entailed as a result of the fire which amounted to about \$50,000, which was almost covered by insurance.

FOND DU LAC, Wis., April 21.—Sydney Windecker, aged seventy-seven, one of the "Windecker Triplets," who for seventy-five years celebrated their joint birthday, died recently. The only survivor of the trio is Mrs. Sedate Pier, of Wausau, Wis.

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, April 21.—Bubonic plague has broken out here and is causing a large number of deaths. An average of 35 deaths a day is being reported.

LONDON, April 21.—It is practically certain there will be no settlement of the coal strike until next week. The members of the Miners' Federation are dissatisfied with the new proposals of the mine owners but will endeavor to find ground for negotiations when the miners meet on Friday.

MEMORIAL SERVICE OF SECOND BATTLE OF YPRES ON SUNDAY

Father Leray, French Chaplain and Prisoner of War, Will Give Address.

The Great War Veterans' Association, at the regular meeting held last night, made arrangements for the holding of a memorial service on Sunday night in the Westholme Theatre to commemorate the anniversary of the Second Battle of Ypres.

Father Leray, of Terrace, a French priest, who went through the war and was wounded several times besides having been taken prisoner, will deliver the main address of the evening. All the other clergymen of the city will also take part in the affair and a good musical program will be rendered, including numbers by the newly-formed band of the association.

A parade led by the band will march from the rooms on Third Avenue. The boys of the Naval Brigade will form part of the parade.

MANY TOURISTS AS EVER THIS SUMMER

C.P.R. Vessels are Already Booked Far Ahead Into June and July.

If the advance bookings can be accepted as a criterion, travel on the G.P.R. boats to Alaska calling at Prince Rupert this year will establish a new record.

Practically all the accommodation for June and July has been booked in the south already for the Skagway boats.

The summer service of the G.P.R. will be inaugurated with the arrival of the Princess Royal here on June 13, followed by the Princess Alice on June 20. The Princess Alice will be withdrawn from the triangle run some time next month preparatory to going into the Alaska service where she is a very popular vessel.

GOVERNMENT LIFTS BAN ON NEWMARKET

Regular Events will be Staged as in Past Hundred Years

LONDON, April 21.—The government has withdrawn the ban upon racing as far as the Two Thousand Guineas and One Thousand Guineas are concerned. The ban was placed on account of the coal strike. Both races will be run at Newmarket on April 29. These races at Newmarket have been run annually for over one hundred years.

GREEKS ARE PREPARING ONSLAUGHT

Will Launch Offensive Against Turkish Nationalist Army Soon.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 21.—The Greeks are preparing a formidable offensive against the Turkish army. They have been strengthening their forces and reorganizing, following their recent reverse, and expect to benefit from the experience.

The Turkish Nationalist army is said to number 400,000 men and they are all good fighters. They look on the war as largely religious in character, and against their ancient enemies from whom they once took much territory, they become keen soldiers and a most formidable enemy.

FISH TRAIN OUT TODAY

Eight Car Loads Went Out on Special Leaving at 9:30 This Morning.

A fish special left this morning for eastern Canadian and United States points with eight car loads of fresh halibut which was sold at yesterday's auction.

Three empties are expected tonight and there is so far one boat here with fish, the Tokrentsjoeld with 18,000 pounds which will be sold at the regular auction tomorrow.

ECLIPSE OF MOON VISIBLE HERE MAY BE SEEN TONIGHT

If Sky is Clear Between 11 and 12 the Phenomenon may be Noticed.

A total eclipse of the moon visible generally in North America on both the Pacific and Atlantic Coasts takes place tonight at 11:24, Prince Rupert time. The middle of the eclipse will be at 11:34 and the end at 12:05. If the sky is clear tonight the phenomenon should be visible, for the moon is full tomorrow.



GOLD SEEKERS IN FAR NORTH

Leave Edmonton May 1 and will
Winter East of Great Slave

EDMONTON, April 21.—A party of gold seekers consisting of Harold Anderson, Louis Woodward, Lowell Smith and W. H. Haywood are now completing arrangements for a year's trek to the far north and will prospect and trap in the country east of the east arm of the Great Slave Lake. This territory is practically unexplored, but the adventurers feel assured that it possesses valuable minerals, as it is on the same formation which carries the gold for which the Aurous Gold Mining Company has erected a crushing plant on Carlton Island, on the north shore of the Great Slave.

A year's supply of food is being taken in, as well as two 22 foot canoes, and the party is going north prepared to winter trapping during the cold season and prospecting during the summer. The explorers will leave about May 1, travelling to Resolution by the H.B.C. transport from the lake port heading for their destination by canoe along the east shore of the Great Slave.

PROPOSAL TO CHANGE POLICE

Victoria Would Use Vancouver Constables to Help Enforce the Law.

TERMINAL CITY IS OUT FOR TOURISTS

Cabarets and Beer Parlors are Being Planned to Pay Off Debt.

Exchange of detectives between Victoria and Vancouver as a means of detecting liquor law violations without arousing the suspicions of bartenders, bootleggers and others, was suggested by Police Commissioner Ernest A. Hall last night and was made the basis of a resolution subsequently adopted, says the Victoria Colonist.

Chief of Police John Fry will write to the chief of the Vancouver police relative to the feasibility of the proposition and will later report to the commission.

According to the custom he has adopted, Dr. Hall led up to his suggestion with a series of questions addressed to Chief Fry.

"Is the present Prohibition Act being satisfactorily enforced?" he asked.

"To the best of our ability," said the chief.

"Then I suppose your ability isn't very great," continued Dr. Hall. "I can go into bars and see the laws being openly violated. I realize that members of the police and detective force cannot do that without arousing suspicion, but there should be some other means of detecting these violations."

Dr. Hall then put forward his motion that Chief Fry communicate with Vancouver as regard-

ing exchange of detectives for a month at a time.

Vancouver Expects Boom.

"I don't think Vancouver would do it," said Chief Fry. "Vancouver is spending a lot of money preparing for the new law. They expect to get a lot of money back. They expect a big boom there, and they might not like to spare their detectives."

"If they got two better detectives from Victoria to replace the ones they sent here, they should not mind so much," said Dr. Hall.

Chief Fry went on to tell about Vancouver's preparation for the new regime of Government control. He said that the Vancouver chief had written him about Vancouver's plans for cabarets with beer parlors. Vancouver was going to spend a lot of money to get tourists and it expected to pay off a large part of its debts through income in that way.

"I thought there was something in this new act that banned beer," said Commissioner Joe North.

"They may not call it beer," said the chief. "They will probably call it something else."

Doesn't Object to Beer.

"Well, I haven't got anything against beer at all," observed Mr. North. "But if Vancouver is opening up cabarets with beer parlors, and the Government passes a law forbidding the sale of beer, I don't just understand. I don't know much about the act yet. I've been waiting patiently to find out, and I'm willing to sit quiet until the information comes along."

Chief Fry said that detectives might object to being placed on what virtually amounted to stool pigeon duty. They had more valuable work to perform, although junior policemen might do it.

Valuable Work.

"I don't see any more valuable work than the enforcement of the Prohibition Act," declared Commissioner Hall. "If the detectives won't do that sort of work I think it is our business to find detectives who will."

Mayor Porter said he was opposed to the principle of employing stool pigeons.

The Hall motion was adopted and Chief Fry will write to Vancouver at once.
