The firm of Kelly, Douglas Co., wholesale grocers, tea, etc., with headquarters at Vancouver has just completed the purchase of two lots at the northwest corner of Fourth Street and Peace in the centre of the wholesale district. The deal was put through by H. Milton Martin.

WALTON RETURNED TO RUPERT TODAY

Visited Edmonton and Vancouver in Course of Ten-day Trip; Inspected Line.

PRINCE RUPERT WAS HAULED OUT FOR HER ANNUAL PAINTING

VICTORIA, April 18.—The steamer Prince Rupert took the water last week after being hauled out for annual painting and cleaning. While out of the water the tail shafts were fitted and the general repairs following her trouble at Swanson Bay are well on toward completion. She will be ready to take the place of the Prince George in about two weeks or less.

Coal Bunker Site Here Has Been Leased from Canadian National Ry.

EDMONTON, April 17.—Final arrangements have now been completed between Trade Commissioner Howard Stutchbury, and A. E. Warren, general manager of the Canadian National railway, for the leasing of the necessary wharfage and trackage for the building of coal bunkers and coal conveyor plant at Prince Rupert.

This follows representation made by Mr. Stutchbury for facilities at Prince Rupert for the handling of Alberta coal along the coast served by Prince Rupert. It is understood that immediate steps will be taken to apply for a charter for a company to build the bunkers, and to commence operations.

The following wire has been received by Mr. Stutchbury from General Manager Warren: "We are prepared to lease a site for coal handling plant at Prince Rupert between 11th and 12th street, block D, at nominal rental. As you are aware water lots in front of block E, belong to the Dominion Government for lease, but we will of course, support your application to the Dominion Government in this respect."

LIQUOR SOON FOR THIRSTY

Operations of Newly-Formed Board to be Speeded up.

VICTORIA, April 18.—It was decided at Saturday's meeting of the Liquor Board to speed up everything in connection with the board. It is expected that it will be in full operation sooner than most people believe.

VIOLENTLY INSANE AT CHARLOTTE CITY

Chief Minty, of the provincial police, was this morning in receipt of a message from J. L. Barge, justice of the peace at Queen Charlotte City, stating that a violently insane man had been taken in custody there and that a boat had started out with him to bring him across to Prince Rupert, but this boat had returned to Queen Charlotte City. The man is evidently a bad case, for the message stated that he was under guard of six men and a request was made that a strong guard be sent over to bring him here.

Minister of Lands Reviews Situation Regarding Cow Bay

The following letter from the minister of lands in regard to Cow Bay was received this morning:

Considerable discussion has taken place in connection with Cow Bay and it seems to me that some very considerable misapprehension exists in regard thereto, for which reason I would like, through the medium of your paper, to review the situation to the benefit of the citizens of Rupert generally.

In the spring of 1918, the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company made representations to the Department of Lands that they would like to acquire some of the property inside of Cow Bay, which is owned by the Provincial Government, for railway purposes, to develop warehouse sites, in return for which they would be willing to transfer to the province an area of waterfront. An agreement was duly arrived at, the fulfillment of which agreement is contemplated upon the filling in of Cow Bay.

CAR SHORTAGE IS ON AGAIN

Over Four Carloads Haulbut Offers Today with but Three Cars

Two carloads of halibut had sold by noon at the Fish Exchange today for shipment east in the two refrigerator cars that arrived on last night's train. Nearly three carloads were then waiting against one car reported for arrival on the time freight which was due yesterday afternoon, but which did not arrive until nearly noon today. Thus the fish car shortage is again on and there are not sufficient freezers for the halibut offering.

Forward, 15,000 pounds, and Unimak, 8,000 pounds, to the Royal Fish Co. at 15c and 5c.

Ingrid H., 15,000 pounds; Nuba 5,000 pounds, and White Lily, 3,000 pounds, to the Booth Fisheries Canadian Co. at 15.2c and 5c.

Hi Gill, 14,500 pounds; Hanteco, 3,500 pounds; Petrol, 1,000, and St. Elol, 4,000 pounds, lined up for the car reported arriving.

Laura, 6,000 pounds; Bringgold, 13,500 pounds; Maud, 14,000 pounds; Bethune, 7,000 pounds, and Saturna, 8,900 pounds, holding over with no cars against them.

RECEPTION FOR CROWN PRINCE

Japan's Heir to be Suitably Entertained During His Forthcoming Visit to England

LONDON, April 18.—The Crown Prince of Japan is expected to arrive at Portsmouth on the morning of May 2 and will be met on behalf of the King by the Prince of Wales, who will accompany him to London. For three days the Crown Prince will be the guest of King George at Buckingham Palace and for a week subsequently he will be the guest of the government.

The place of residence for the royal visitor has not yet been decided. There will be three banquets given in his honor, one by the King at Buckingham Palace on the night of his arrival, one by the Prince of Wales and one by the British Government. There will also be a banquet and reception at the Guildhall.

Japanese Colony On the part of the Japanese there will be a banquet and reception by the embassy and entertainments by the Japan Society and the Japanese Colony. Afterwards the Prince will make a tour of the provinces. He is expected to be in this country about three weeks, and it is thought, will then visit France and other countries on the continent.

The Prince's official party will number 18, in addition to servants and valets. With the Crown Prince will come Prince Kan In, a member of the Imperial family who was selected by the Emperor to accompany his son, Count Chin'ya, member of the Privy Council and former ambassador in London; General Nara, in charge of the Prince's military education; Viscount Iriye, Grand Chamberlain; Viscount Tsuchiya, Chamberlain; Mr. Saionji, Master of Ceremonies; the Secretary of the Tokio Foreign Office, naval and military aide-de-camps and two doctors.

Sport Chat

When the Wallace Dry Dock Athletic Club committee started last week to recruit players for a proposed baseball club to join the City League they found that most of the players of talent at the shipyard had already been signed on in the other teams of the league. The same was the case when an attempt was made to raise a football aggregation. It therefore seems unlikely that the dry dock will be able to enter teams in either the football or baseball leagues this season. Baseball, rather than football, seems to be the sport which the shipbuilders are most enthusiastic about.

If both Carpentier and Dempsey are on their feet at the termination of the twelve round decision contest that is to take place in New Jersey on July 2, no decision can officially be rendered. The boxing laws of New Jersey forbid it. The only decision that could then be accepted would be if one kayoes the other and then the decision would, no doubt, be refused by the loser on a point of legality. Thus the punch is taken out of the big fight that fans have been so interested in for months. No doubt, Tex will make arrangements to have the pair match again later in some locality where the world's championship can be decided.

Although the attractiveness is largely taken out of the match by this ruling, stiff prices will be charged for seats at the New Jersey contest. Prices will range from \$50 for a ringside seat to \$5 for a bleacher coupon. Intermediate sections will sell from \$10 to \$10 a seat according to location. The arena will be built of lumber in an octagonal shape and will cost approximately \$100,000. The eight sides will rise to a height of about fifty feet. Dempsey, as heavyweight champion of the world, and Carpentier, as challenger, will compete for sixty per cent of the gate receipts, which will be divided on a basis of sixty per cent to Dempsey and forty per cent to Carpentier.

The defeat of the Glasgow Rangers by the Partick Thistles in the Scottish Cup final on Saturday came as a big surprise to nearly everyone who takes an interest in Old Country football. They had been expected to pull off the double victory of winning both the league contest and the Scottish Cup, for they have gone right through the season sustaining only two defeats of any note in the previous games, once when they were defeated by the Celtic in the league race on New Years and again when they fell to the Celtic in the Glasgow Cup semi-final. The Glasgow Rangers, as known, are the champions of the Scottish League, while the Particks, playing an up and down game all season, are in third place and 25 points behind the Rangers.

On Wednesday evening the first junior football game ever played in the city will take place. The teams will be the Wallace Ath-

letic, under the supervision of Eddie Craggs, and Malcolm Lamb's Prince Rupert Athletics. A good game should be witnessed as each team has some promising youngsters who will be keenly watched by senior club spotters.

PRINCE RUPERT CLUB WINS MOORE SHIELD

Final Bridge Game Was Won by Wanderers With Lead That Was Too Small.

The final bridge tournament for the Moore Shield was played on Saturday night in the Wanderers Club but, in spite of the victory of the Wanderers by 70 points, the trophy goes to the Prince Rupert Club by 1789, the Wanderers having been unable to reduce the big lead that they were facing at the beginning of the last tournament. PASSYFOOT POURS OUT SIZZLERS

Tells Bootleggers and Liquor Dealers What He Thinks of Them

Indicting liquor as a traffic that only exists for the propagation of woe, misery and heartache, "Pussyfoot" Johnson, celebrated temperance reformer, told two large audiences that the world would soon be "bone-dry," as sure as there was a God in Heaven, says a special despatch from Hamilton to the Toronto Globe. The world had begun to think rationally on the liquor problem; it had begun to think with its head instead of with its stomach, with the result that liquor was being ousted. The bootlegger was being worsted to such an extent that in the United States there were some jails so filled with bootleggers their arms and legs were sticking out of the windows; and the former sot was a free man—he was keeping his own family instead of the family of the saloonkeeper, said the American speaker.

Nickname a Misnomer

This sobriquet of "Pussyfoot" is decidedly a misnomer, for there is nothing feline or cushiony like in the way he trends on the toes of John Barleycorn and all who are allied with the booze king. He lands with both feet. Depend on it, he hurts, too, for his words are bullets. "Pussyfoot" is a corpulent man and speaks with a pronounced Yankee drawl. He is not a rapid speaker, employs few, if any, gestures, but has a most effective way of marshalling his facts. He can also be bitingly satirical when driving home a point against the liquor traffic.

The launch portage was detained here on Saturday afternoon by customs officials charged with not complying with customs regulations in regard to her cargo manifest, it being alleged that the vessel was carrying liquor which was manifested as stores. The vessel, whose master is Nels Barstrom, had cleared for Ketchikan and was preparing to leave port when her cargo was examined.

DIET OF WORMS ANNIVERSARY

Celebration Throughout World Yesterday and Today of Great Event

NEW YORK, April 18.—Protestants throughout the world recognize the debt of gratitude they owe to Martin Luther, for their civil and religious liberty. Four hundred years ago, on April 17, 1521, the fearless monk and reformer was first hailed before the German Diet at Worms and requested to recant his assertions of the right of the individual to act according to the dictates of his own conscience. Millions of Protestants celebrated yesterday the anniversary of Luther's trial which continued for two days. Thousands of speakers attested that Luther's refusal to recant marked the beginning of a mighty intellectual and religious revolution.

Harding's Tribute.

President Harding has added his tribute to the memory of the great reformer in a statement he has sent to the Rev. Howard B. Gold, of the National Lutheran Council, in which he wrote: "On the occasion of the 400th anniversary of Luther's stand before the Diet of Worms, I think there will be general agreement that Luther's firm advocacy of unfettered opinion deserves commemoration as one of the noblest contributions towards mankind's intellectual emancipation. His fitting celebration will be a testimony to the fact that the world has, since his time, traveled far on the way to realizing his ideal of full individual liberty."
