AN IS SHOT CENSUS PLANS BY SINK FEIN ARE COMPLETE

April 18.—Kitty, a forty year old peasant, was dragged from her home by Sinn Fein rebels with a certificate of sentence.

Following the conference on Saturday with A. J. Peltier, census commissioner, John Flewin in Port Simpson told the Daily News there would be 27 subdivisions in this constituency for the purposes of the census. Each of these would be covered separately so that there will be no confusion in making the decennial count and securing the other information required by the department.

The Prince Rupert subdivision includes Digby Island and Tucks Inlet and the whole of Kain Island. To cover it six men will be required and these will be practically all returned soldiers. Already Mr. Flewin has practically enough men to cover the district.

It is estimated that all the returns will be completed in one month, commencing on June 1.

RECORD RUN BIG EMPRESS

Asia Crossed Pacific in Little Less than 9 Days

VICTORIA, April 18.—A record run across the Pacific has been made by the C.P.R. liner Empress of Asia, sister ship to the Empress of Russia and fastest passenger vessel on the Pacific Ocean. She made the run from Yokohama to Victoria in eight days, twenty minutes.

LAST FORCE GERMANY TO CARRY OUT TREATY TERMS

MON, April 18.—The German Government is still in debt in regard to reparations payments and also in regard to the persons offending against the laws of war and she has complied with the peace terms fully in connection with the same. Premier Lloyd George told the House of Commons, because of these failures of Germany, it is imperative that they confer in regard to steps to be taken to enforce compliance with the Treaty of Versailles.

EXCURSION IS PLANNED TO THIS CITY

Boards of Trade of Vancouver and Victoria to Charter Rupert.

VANCOUVER, April 18.—The Boards of Trade of the cities of Vancouver and Victoria are planning for a joint excursion to take place early in June. The steamer "Prince Rupert" will be chartered for a special trip around Vancouver Island, thence to Prince Rupert, Anyox and Stewart. The party will be made up of three hundred and fifty persons.

KELLY DOUGLAS TO BUILD AT EDMONTON

Sites has been Purchased at That City for Warehouse

EDMONTON, April 18.—Another big wholesale firm is making preparation to erect a warehouse in Edmonton. The firm of Kelly, Douglas Co., wholesale grocers, tea, etc., with headquarters at Vancouver has just completed the purchase of two lots at the northwest corner of Fourth Street and Peace in the centre of the wholesale district. The deal was put through by H. Milton Martin.

It is the intention of the firm to erect a large warehouse, but plans for the building are not yet complete.

WALTON RETURNED TO RUPERT TODAY

Visited Edmonton and Vancouver in Course of Ten-day Trip; Inspected Line.

Superintendent N. B. Walton returned this morning by the time freight shortly before noon from a ten-day trip, in the course of which he was in Vancouver, where he conferred with traffic officials in regard to the alterations in the service which were announced on Saturday.

Mr. Walton also was east as far as Edmonton and came over the line to Prince Rupert inspecting the road bed. He reports that there are a few minor slides giving trouble but indications are that there will be little trouble on the road this spring.

PRINCE RUPERT WAS HAULED OUT FOR HER ANNUAL PAINTING

VICTORIA, April 18.—The steamer Prince Rupert took the water last week after being hauled out for annual painting and cleaning. While out of the water the tall shafts were fitted and the general repairs following her trouble at Swanson Bay are well on toward completion. She will be ready to take the place of the Prince George in about two weeks or less.

Minister of Lands Reviews Situation Regarding Cow Bay

The following letter from the minister of lands in regard to Cow Bay was received this morning:

Considerable discussion has taken place in connection with Cow Bay and it seems to me that some very considerable misapprehension exists in regard thereto, for which reason I would like, through the medium of your paper, to review the situation in the benefit of the citizens of Rupert generally.

In the spring of 1918, the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company made representations to the Department of Lands that they

would like to acquire some of the property inside of Cow Bay, which is owned by the Provincial government, for railway purposes, to develop warehouse sites, in return for which they said they would be willing to transfer to the province an area of waterfront. An agreement was finally arrived at, the fulfillment of which agreement is contingent upon the filling in of Cow Bay.

City Makes Claim.

Shortly afterwards the city authorities took the position that while they had no objection to the filling of Cow Bay per se, they would not consent to the filling thereof unless they were granted a piece of waterfront.

Ever since that the question

has been bandied back and forth,

and in certain quarters an endeavor has been made to make

official capital out of the situ-

ation. Let me make it very clear

that the only reason the Provin-

cial Government made the agree-

ment which it did with the Grand Trunk Pacific was that it

believed the arrangement to be

one both for the advantage of

the province and of the railway

company, and also for the wel-

fare of the city of Prince Rupert.

Objects to Hold Up.

I have repeatedly indicated to the city authorities that a re-

quest from them for waterfront

on the basis of actual use would

receive favorable consideration,

but that I did not propose to

allow the Cow Bay matter to be

used as a club to "hold up" the

province for waterfront. I still

stand exactly where I stood from

the beginning.

The Railway Commission have

recently advised that they will

not authorize the filling of Cow

Bay until all parties have op-

portunity to be heard.

Whether Cow Bay is or is not

closed is a matter of entire in-

difference to me except insofar

as the development of the city

is concerned, and if any of my

political opponents imagine that

they are hurting my feelings in

opposing the closing of the bay,

they are laboring under a foolish

delusion.

Present Position.

The present position, I believe,

to be this: If the city council

withdraws objection to the filling

in of Cow Bay the Railway Com-

mmission will, I believe, order the

closing of the bay. If the council

does not withdraw objection, the

matter will have to be heard by

the Commission and I do not

know what their decision might

finally be after the representa-

tions made.

If the city thinks that the

greater public interest lies in

having the bay open, the logical

course to pursue, of course, is

obvious, namely, to fight to keep

it open. My own opinion is that

the greater public interest lies in

the closing of the bay, after

which, if an order can be secured

from the Railway Commission,

which I believe it can be, for a

CAR SHORTAGE IS ON AGAIN

Over Four Carloads Halibut Offers Today with but Three Cars

Two carloads of halibut had sold by noon at the Fish Exchange today for shipment east in the two refrigerator cars that arrived on last night's train. Nearly three carloads were then waiting as against one car reported for ar-

ival on the time freight which was due yesterday afternoon, but which did not arrive until nearly noon today. Thus the fish car shortage is again on and there are not sufficient freezers for the halibut offering.

Forward, 15,000 pounds, and Unimak, 8,000 pounds, to the Royal Fish Co. at 15c and 5c.

Ingrid II, 15,000 pounds; Nuba, 5,000 pounds, and White Lily, 3,000 pounds, to the Booth Fisheries Canadian Co. at 15.2c and 5c.

Hill Gill, 14,500 pounds; Hanneo, 3,500 pounds; Petrel, 1,000, and St. Eloi, 4,000 pounds, lined up for the car reported arriving.

Laura, 6,000 pounds; Bringgold, 13,500 pounds; Maud, 14,000 pounds; Bethune, 7,000 pounds, and Satura, 8,000 pounds, holding over with no cars against them.

Glad to Recognize
An Improvement.

Last year when the railway cancelled our through service to Edmonton and put us practically on a branch line, we protested as strongly as possible. Now that it has been decided to return to us our former privileges in this regard, we take great pleasure in commanding the department for its business judgment. The next step, following the provision of fish cars will be, we hope, the running of a daily passenger train to which the fish will be attached. There must, of course, be enough passengers to make this business profitable, or nearly so, else it cannot be put in operation.

The valleys of the interior are filling up fast and Prince Rupert housing accommodation is all filled to the limit. People are going into the mining districts of the north and there is a demand here for Alberta coal if proper bunkering facilities can be supplied. All these things mean business for the port and the railway. The north is steadily coming into its own. Many changes have been seen in the last ten years. The next ten will see much greater change. Given a reasonable chance, and the north will forge ahead to such an extent that the southern part of the province will appear small and insignificant.

There had been rumors that we were to lose part of our steamer service with the big boats. The latest announcement through the Daily News on Saturday is reassuring. We are to have just as good a service as last year and the fitting of the staterooms on the vessels to carry 26 extra passengers will enable the company to do more business than last year.

Building Not
Fast as Needed.

The Provincial Government has anticipated another loan through the Dominion Government, the proceeds to be used for housing purposes. If this money comes, Prince Rupert may be able to get another allotment. All of this, however, would be taken up by returned soldiers.

Building is not going ahead as fast as it might in this city. There is a demand for houses and apartments but comparatively few new buildings are being erected. Preparations are being made by some, but there is no indication of speeding up in this direction. With lumber at a reasonable price and plenty of labor offering, there should be a tendency toward improvement.

Business Never
Was Much Better.

Business never was much better than it is today. That is the opinion expressed by one Prince Rupert man. This man is not ordinarily an optimist, neither is he a man who sees things through colored glasses. He says he thinks Prince Rupert is coming well through the trying time of lowering prices and there is every indication that she will continue to do so without any of the financial difficulties that have been experienced in other places.

We are missing the big mill a good deal and the shut down of the logging camps on the Islands is being felt here. This condition is not permanent, however, and it is to be hoped things will be moving again soon in this line. In the meantime we can congratulate ourselves on the small amount of dislocation of business here and on the sound condition of affairs generally.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

G.T.P. SHOWED
PROFIT IN 1916

Auditors Tell of Financial Condition of Railway and Development Company

OTTAWA, April 16.—That the Grand Trunk Pacific system has shown an operating loss of \$29,000,000 since 1916, but during the previous period had earned \$87,000,000 was a statement of Geoffrey G. Rowbotham, of Price, Waterhouse & Co., accountants, who again occupied the witness stand at the hearing of the Grand Trunk Arbitration Board.

Mr. Rowbotham revealed these figures in the course of cross-examination by Pierce Butler, Government counsel, into the affairs of the G.T.P. and subsidiary companies. The only subsidiary that produced a net surplus was the G.T.P. Elevator Co., which showed a surplus of \$169,000, he said.

\$11,000,000

The G.T.P. British Lines Co., continued witness, owed the Grand Trunk about \$11,000,000 on unsecured demand notes carrying interest at 5 per cent and the company has been losing money ever since it started operation. The interest, amounting to \$590,000 a year, had not been paid and both interest and principal were accumulating. The total funded debt of the company in 1916 was \$16,786,000, and the Grand Trunk, which had acted as banker to the company and advanced money when needed, now owned about \$3,000,000 of this sum in bonds, the rest being in the hands of the public.

Development Company

Proceeding, Mr. Rowbotham came to the affairs of the G.T.P. British Lines Co., which, he said, had shown a surplus in 1915, but had since a total deficit of \$913,554, which was unsecured, owing to the Grand Trunk.

At this point Sir Walter Cassels wished to know if the indebtedness of the G.T.P. and subsidiaries to the Grand Trunk was a legal debt, a question which was answered by Mr. Atwater in the affirmative, although admitting to Sir Thomas White that the claim that the debt was collectible was subject to opinion from the other side.



RECEPTION FOR CROWN PRINCE

Japan's Heir to be Suitably Entertained During His Forthcoming Visit to England

LONDON, April 18--The Crown Prince of Japan is expected to arrive at Portsmouth on the morning of May 2 and will be met on behalf of the King by the Prince of Wales, who will accompany him to London. For three days the Crown Prince will be the guest of King George at Buckingham Palace and for a week subsequently he will be the guest of the government.

The place of residence for the royal visitor has not yet been decided. There will be three banquets given in his honor, one by the King at Buckingham Palace on the night of his arrival, one by the Prince of Wales and one by the British Government. There will also be a banquet and reception at the Guildhall.

Japanese Colony

On the part of the Japanese there will be a banquet and reception by the embassy and entertainments by the Japan Society and the Japanese Colony. Afterwards the Prince will make a tour of the provinces. He is expected to be in this country about three weeks, and, it is thought, will then visit France and other countries on the continent.

The Prince's official party will number 18, in addition to servants and valets. With the Crown Prince will come Prince Kan In, a member of the Imperial family who was selected by the Emperor to accompany his son, Count Chinda, member of the Privy Council and former ambassador in London; General Nara, in charge of the Prince's military education; Viscount Iriye, Grand Chamberlain; Viscount Tsuchiya, Chamberlain; Mr. Saionji, Master of Ceremonies; the Secretary of the Tokio Foreign Office, naval and military aide-de-camps and two doctors.

OVER TWO AND HALF MILLION AT FUR SALE

Nutria and Squirrel Sold Well
But Bear Dropped
30 per cent.

SATURDAY'S BUSINESS
CLEARED \$480,000

NEW YORK, April 18.—Nutria with squirrel for first honors at the fur sale here Saturday. The total sales for the day were \$480,000, bringing the grand total for the week to \$2,610,000. Bidding for nutria was so active that prices averaged 35 per cent above the January sales figures, squirrel similarly averaged 7½ per cent. German and Russian fitch were unchanged. Wolf prices ran 10 to 20 per cent below the winter sale although quite a little buying for foreign consumption was said to have been done.

Northern wolf showed the same decline. Brown and black bear dropped 20 per cent from winter levels and more than 50,000 mink skins brought practically January prices. Raccoon was slightly weaker at the close of the auction.

President's Statement.

This statement was issued by Norman H. Bacon, president of the New York Fur Auction Sales Corporation: "Generally speaking, the sale was great success. Prices were satisfactory for almost all articles. Only one or two important collections were neglected. There was a marked absence of speculative buying and an agreeable feature of the sale was the manner in which staple furs were absorbed. Payments and clearances have been made in good volume and it is evident that the trade looks forward to a good season."

The annual fall sale will begin here on September 19.

PROTEST AT LIGHT RATE

Trades and Labor Council Objects to Methods of Civic Financing.

The following is a copy of a letter sent by the Trades and Labor Council to the city council:

"With a profit of \$30,000 on the municipal light and phone department, the city council decided not to reduce the present charges to the users of these utilities, on account of probable extraordinary calls on the city's finances during the present year.

"The Trades and Labor Council unanimously passed the following resolution in regard to the above:

"That this body strongly protest against this example of poor municipal business as being a direct tax on the small consumer of \$30,000 instead of an increase, if needed, of city taxes on property owners. We should suggest that some reconsideration be given to the benefit of the householders."

"During the discussion the small consumers' rate for light and phone, and the everlasting 25¢ per month meter rent, were compared with other cities to the disadvantage of Prince Rupert. A private company attempting to sell at this rate would be a target for public protest."

"This council appreciates the good intentions and capabilities of the present city fathers, but is of the opinion that this must have gone through near the conclusion of a trying session."

PASSYFOOT POURS OUT SIZZLERS

Tells Bootleggers and Liquor Dealers What He Thinks of Them

Indicting liquor as a traffic that only exists for the propagation of woe, misery and heartache, "Pussyfoot" Johnson, celebrated temperance reformer, told two large audiences that the world would soon be "bone-dry," as sure as there was a God in Heaven, says a special despatch from Hamilton to the Toronto Globe. The world had begun to think rationally on the liquor problem; it had begun to think with its head instead of with its stomach, with the result that liquor was being worsted.

The bootlegger was being worsted to such an extent that in the United States there were some jails so filled with bootleggers their arms and legs were sticking out of the windows; and the former sol was a free man—he was keeping his own family instead of the family of the saloonkeeper, said the American speaker.

Nickname a Misnomer

This sobriquet of "Pussyfoot" is decidedly a misnomer, for there is nothing feline or cushion-like in the way he treads on the toes of John Barleycorn and all who are allied with the booze king. He lands with both feet. Depend on it, he hurts, too, for his words are bullets.

"Pussyfoot" is a corpulent man and speaks with a pronounced Yankee drawl. He is not a rapid speaker, employs few, if any, gestures, but has a most effective way of marshalling his facts. He can also be bitingly satirical when driving home a point against the liquor traffic.
