## Progress At Armament Conference LIBERAL COMMITTEE EXPECTS MAJORITY OF OVER THOUSAND

### EDITORIAL

#### ELECTORS BEWARE.

Efforts are often made at the moment to bring up some issue that is sprung for the purpose of stampeding the electors. Colonel Peck would not do anything of this sort but some of his supporters may do so. Do not be swayed by any last minute efforts to turn you from your purpose of electing a government that will be sympathetic to the aims and aspirations of the people of this province. There is only one way that can be done, and that is by electing Fred Stork. Prince Rupert needs a Liberal government and a Liberal representative in that government. The Liberals in convention unanimously chose Fred Stork to represent them. There was a consensus of opinion in the convention as to when the nomination should take place but not as to who should be nominated. Fred Stork was chosen without opposing voice. No other name was even mentioned in the convention.

Being in this democratic way with such an immense majority as will make it clear to the new government of Mackenzie King that we are with you as long as he is with us. The way to do this is to elect Fred Stork tomorrow. Every effort is needed in rolling up the majority that is expected.

### ARBITRATION

#### GOES AGAINST 44-HOUR WEEK

Australian Trades Unions Lose Out in Attempt to Secure Shorter Hours.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The Australian Commonwealth court of arbitration rejected the demand of the organized trades unions for a reduction of the standard working hours from 48 hours to 44 hours on the ground that it would have a serious effect on industry.

### Advice to Skeena District Electors.

### Estimate of Vote at Larger Centres This Constituency

There has been some question in the minds of electors as to how the Liberal committee figured that they would get a majority of a thousand at the election which takes place tomorrow. The Daily News took the trouble to go into this matter on behalf of enquiring readers, and a representative of the paper interviewed the Liberal committee in regard to it.

The committee has been in close touch with all the leading centres in the constituency, and reports received from 25 centres, including 32 polling stations out of a total of about 80, give a majority for Stork so near the thousand that it is fair to estimate that the remaining small polling stations will not only make up the balance but exceed it. That is the way it has been out. The report from the Lakes includes North and

### JURY DISAGREES IN ARBUCKLE CASE

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 5.—The jury in the trial of "Fats" Arbuckle disagreed, 12 to 2, and were dismissed at noon on Sunday. A new panel will be sworn and the second trial will take place in January.

### GOVERNMENT VOTES VARIOUS AMOUNTS

Bill Passed to Allow the Borrowing of Five Millions.

VICTORIA, B. C., December 5.—On Friday the Legislature in committee voted \$25,000 for a continuance of the investigation into the mill industry; \$25,000 for unemployment relief; \$25,000 for compensation for tubercular cattle destroyed under order of the Government; \$40,000 to fight against discrimination in the railway freight rates.

A bill was passed to authorize the Government to borrow \$5,000,000. A division was taken on the second reading of this measure and the House lined up 23 for the bill and 19 against it.

### IRISH PEACE THIS ALL OFF

Negotiations Break Down Between Sinn Fein and British Government.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The Irish peace negotiations have broken down. Statements from responsible quarters say that the Sinn Fein delegates expect to return to Ireland on Tuesday or Wednesday. The truce still remains in effect and there will be no immediate resumption of hostilities.

The exclusive attention of official circles was this morning directed towards audiences with the British premier and King George after which the British delegates are to confer in a meeting with the entire cabinet. The Sinn Fein, it is understood, have even refused a conditional promise of allegiance contingent upon a settlement. The most it offered was recognition of the King as the head of a commonwealth or free nation.

The Sinn Fein delegates are conferring with Premier Lloyd George this afternoon regarding the truce.

### STEAMER CARRYING IRISH DELEGATES SANK A SCHOONER

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The channel steamer Cambria with the Irish Peace delegates aboard en route to Dublin collided with and sank the schooner Early Morning. Three members of the schooner were drowned.

### Britain, United States and Japan Get Together Reduce Size of Navies

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—At the armament conference this morning Britain, Japan and France agreed to retire from much of the leased territory of China contingent upon the fulfilment of conditions, which China is expected to meet.

It is said that the delegates are having important success at the conference. It is believed that an agreement has been reached today at a conference of representatives of Britain, America and Japan on the question of naval ratio. The nature of the decision is held up pending replies from Tokio.

TORONTO, Dec. 5.—The Toronto Argonauts defeated the Edmonton Eskimos in the Canadian Rugby championship game on Saturday afternoon. The score was 35 to nil.

### BAD WRECK ON RAILWAY EAST

Between 9 and 12 Persons were Killed in Collision Reading Railway.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 5.—Between 9 and 12 persons were killed in a head-on collision between two passenger trains on the Reading Railway. There was a fire in the wreckage.

Alex Ross of Calgary, who is being opposed by Major Arthur Lincoln representing the War Veterans. Those elected are Premier Greenfield, Vernon Smith, J. E. Brownlee, George Hoadley, Perrin Baker and R. G. Reid.

### TOLMIE BACK TO VICTORIA

Disabled Schooner Found to Be Undamaged Except for Steering Gear.

VICTORIA, Dec. 5.—After drifting about for 24 hours with steering gear disabled in the straits of Juan de Fuca and the Gulf of Georgia the C. G. M. M. schooner Simon F. Tolmie was towed into port undamaged except for the gear which was injured.

### LIMPED INTO PORT AFTER BEING ASHORE

Union Steamer Cheakamus Gone into Drydock at Vancouver With Stem Damaged.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 5.—With her stem badly damaged as a result of drifting ashore near Gorges Island, the steamer Cheakamus of the Union Steamship Company limped into port at the week-end and is gone into drydock for repairs.

Proposes to Hit Back At Daily News.

One of the three organs of political independence which are supporting what La Presse names "the Government candidate" in this constituency reports Colonel Peck as threatening The Daily News. The exact quotation is: "We are taught in the Scripture that if a man smite you on the one cheek to turn also the other cheek toward him. I must say I have not advanced sufficiently to do so. I am not prepared to go that far. I have not reached such a state of human perfection. In fact, I propose to hit back just as hard as I can."

No amount of threatening from anyone is going to deter The Daily News from doing its best to secure the defeat of Colonel Peck at the present election. Such a petty thing as threatening the editor of this paper is not in keeping with the high standard which should be required of a candidate.

We are told that another thing to which he took exception in The Daily News was that on his return from overseas when he came by way of Prince Rupert and was given a magnificent reception here, The News said he was returning to his home in Vancouver, or something to that effect. If we were wrong in that we stand corrected, but as the Colonel has brought the matter up, we do not mind saying that even yet we consider he has his home in Vancouver and is not a resident of Skeena electoral district in the strict sense of the word. We see no reason why he should not live in Vancouver if he wishes to do so. At one time it was reported that he expected to live in Victoria and command the Sixteenth Battalion there, but he has apparently given up that idea, for he has been placed on the reserve, according to press reports.

These are all petty matters and we do not like dealing with them, but in his addresses, if the reports are to be believed, the candidate spends much of his time dealing with petty matters which have no particular interest to the people of this city. What we want to know is how the Colonel proposes to vote should the constituency be so foolish as to choose him for its member. He "does not like those fellows in the opposition," so of course will have to support those fellows who are at present in the Government.

How Will Colonel Vote on Pensions?

One of the questions likely to come before the next Parliament is the equalization of pensions. As Mr. Segouin said at the recent Liberal rally, there are widows of soldiers scrubbing floors for a living, while the widows and wives of officers are well paid. The Liberal policy is to change this. If it comes before Parliament, will Colonel Peck support the change?

It is difficult to ask all the questions which occur. Colonel Peck has not declared himself on any of these matters of policy which are of vital interest to the electors. He has spent most of his time, when addressing audiences, in telling the people what a wicked newspaper is The Daily News and what a bad man is its editor.

There are dozens of other questions in which the people are interested. The Colonel might be asked what he proposes to do with that hole of stagnant water on Third Avenue which is generally known as the new postoffice site. Of course that is much too petty a question to be answered. It is much more important to talk about getting the scalp of the editor of The Daily News.

What is the policy of Colonel Peck in regard to securing a place for the fishermen to tie up their boats? That surely is of importance. The electors have a right to know these things before they cast their ballots. Stork has declared himself. He has outlined his policy and is ready to stand behind it. Colonel Peck has given no idea of what he will do except that he will support any party or policy that suits him. That is his idea of independence.

Tried to Place Issues Before the People.

The Daily News has tried to place the issues before the people as we see them. This may be the last time we shall have a chance to say anything before the vote is cast. We suggest to the people here that they weigh well the merits of the Liberal and Independent causes. Consider whether Prince Rupert will be most benefited from the election of a man pledged to a certain line of policy or sending to Ottawa a freeloader who stands for nothing in particular, but who has in the past faithfully followed and voted for the Meighen Government.

The Liberal leader has promised to help Prince Rupert. Mr. Meighen has never seen Prince Rupert and has no sympathy with our aims and aspirations. That has been clearly shown in the last year or two. In that, as in other policies, Colonel Peck has supported him by voting for him in the House of Commons.

Stork will go to Ottawa to back up Mr. King in his Liberal policy. Should Prince Rupert not get good treatment, he is independent enough to leave the party and vote against it. That is the true independence. As long as the Liberals do the right thing Mr. Stork will support them, and we take it that as long as Mr. Stork does the right thing the people of Skeena constituency will support him. Had Colonel Peck broken with the Government when he found we were not getting a square deal he would have been returned in this constituency by acclamation. The people here have nothing against the Colonel personally, but they are opposed to his lack of policy. On that ground we ask Liberal and Conservative voters who wish to see Prince Rupert prosper to vote for Fred Stork, the Liberal candidate.

ALL PREPARED FOR ELECTION

Polls Will be Held Tomorrow in Black Building, Seventh St. and Second Avenue.

All is in readiness for the holding of the polls for the Federal election here tomorrow, reports R. W. Cameron, returning officer. The voting will take place on the first floor of the Black Building at the corner of Seventh Street and Second Avenue from 8 o'clock in the morning until 6 in the evening. Counting of the ballots will commence possibly within an hour. The day will be a holiday for many but the banks will not be closed.

On the eve of the election both candidates and their supporters seem confident of majorities. At the Liberal committee rooms a majority of 1000 for Fred Stork is predicted while 600 is the figure that Col. Peck's management predict for him.

A noticeable feature of the situation today is that much money is being offered to wager on Fred Stork and there are very few, if any, takers who are willing to bet on Col. Peck. Odds on the former have even been refused. There is a sudden boom in Stork stock on the last day before the election.

H. F. Kergin, M.L.A. for Atlin, passed through the city last night on the Venture on his way to Anxox. He will address a meeting there tonight on behalf of Fred Stork, the Liberal candidate for the Federal election, before returning tomorrow to his home in Alice Arm.

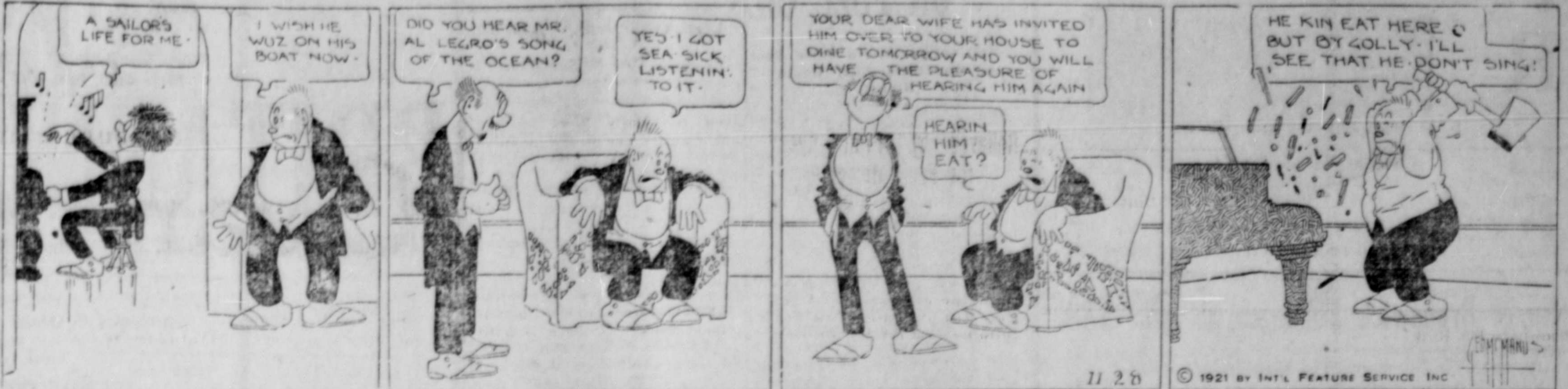

## BRINGING UP FATHER



## Member for Atlin Tells of Interesting Phases of The Legislative Session

In order that he might be able to cast his vote for Fred Stark, H. F. Kergin, member of the Legislature for Atlin, came north on the Union steamer and proceeded to his home at Alice Arm last night. He said the Legislature was expected to prorogue on Saturday. The leader of the opposition had promised him a pair of work or two ago, but on the day he was about to leave the privilege was cancelled and he had to stay over two days longer. The Government was really strong enough to carry on without him, however, or he would not have left before the end. There was nothing of great importance to come up.

Speaking of the legislative work, Mr. Kergin said Mr. Speaker Manson had given the Vancouver Sun a severe reprimand for abusing the privileges of the press in the Legislature by misquoting members on many occasions.

### Election Tactics.

The Bowser obstruction tactics had been carried on for Federal election purposes. He had made a number of charges but there had been nothing to any of them. The Campbell warehouse at Vancouver, over which a fuss had been made could be sold today for more than the price paid for it.

In regard to the fur buying question, Attorney General Harris had been making investigations before the opening of the Legislature with a view to taking action if necessary and in a conference with H. S. Perry had shown him everything. This information was used by Perry on the floor of the House with which to attack the Government. The whole matter was being dealt with by the Government in the regular way.

### Municipal Agitation.

Another source of adverse publicity had been carried on by the municipalities in an endeavor to secure money from the Government. Some of the municipalities had gone into debt and had wanted the Government to pay the bills for them. In other cases the agitators had in view the coming municipal elections and a stiff fight against the Legislature they thought would give them prestige with the municipal electors. The municipalities were getting better treatment than they ever got before, but they could not expect the Government to pay all their bills for them.

Referring to the work of the Liquor Control measure, Mr. said the Federal Government was getting about \$1.70 a bottle tax which was more than the Provincial Government got for handling it. This was a most unfair thing. If the Federal Government had not been so greedy there would have been more money for the municipalities.

### Government Strong.

The Liberal Government at Victoria was as strong today as ever it was, the member for Atlin said. In spite of some difficulties, which had been overcome, they were a unit in the matter of carrying on good government for the province. There was no discussion in their ranks.

## FISHERIES ARE TALKED ABOUT

Consul Wakefield Discusses Matter of Conservation with Gov. Bone, of Alaska.

Both Governor Bone of Alaska and Collector of Customs Garfield look on Prince Rupert as the logical port for the shipment of fresh halibut, according to Consul Wakefield, who returned on Saturday from a visit to Alaskan points. He accompanied Collector of Customs Garfield on this port and Governor Bone joined them at Ketchikan and went as far as Juneau.

Among matters discussed with the governor and collector was the protection of the halibut banks by an arrangement in regard to a closed season. The governor is also keen to have salmon protected by not only preventing fishing in the rivers, which is already done in Alaska, but also by protecting the mouths of the rivers.

The governor was keenly interested in Prince Rupert. While on a tour some years ago through this port with newspapermen bound to Alaska, they bought musical instruments here which were used throughout their tour.

### Is Newspaperman.

Governor Bone is a newspaperman, having been for a number of years editor of the Washington Post and for six years editor of the Seattle P. I.

Consul Wakefield and his son Lawrence were entertained at dinner by the Governor at Juneau and they spent an enjoyable evening with a number of the young people of Juneau.

## FAMINE COMMITTEE MET LAST EVENING

Financial Reports Submitted and Nominations for Auditing Committee Made.

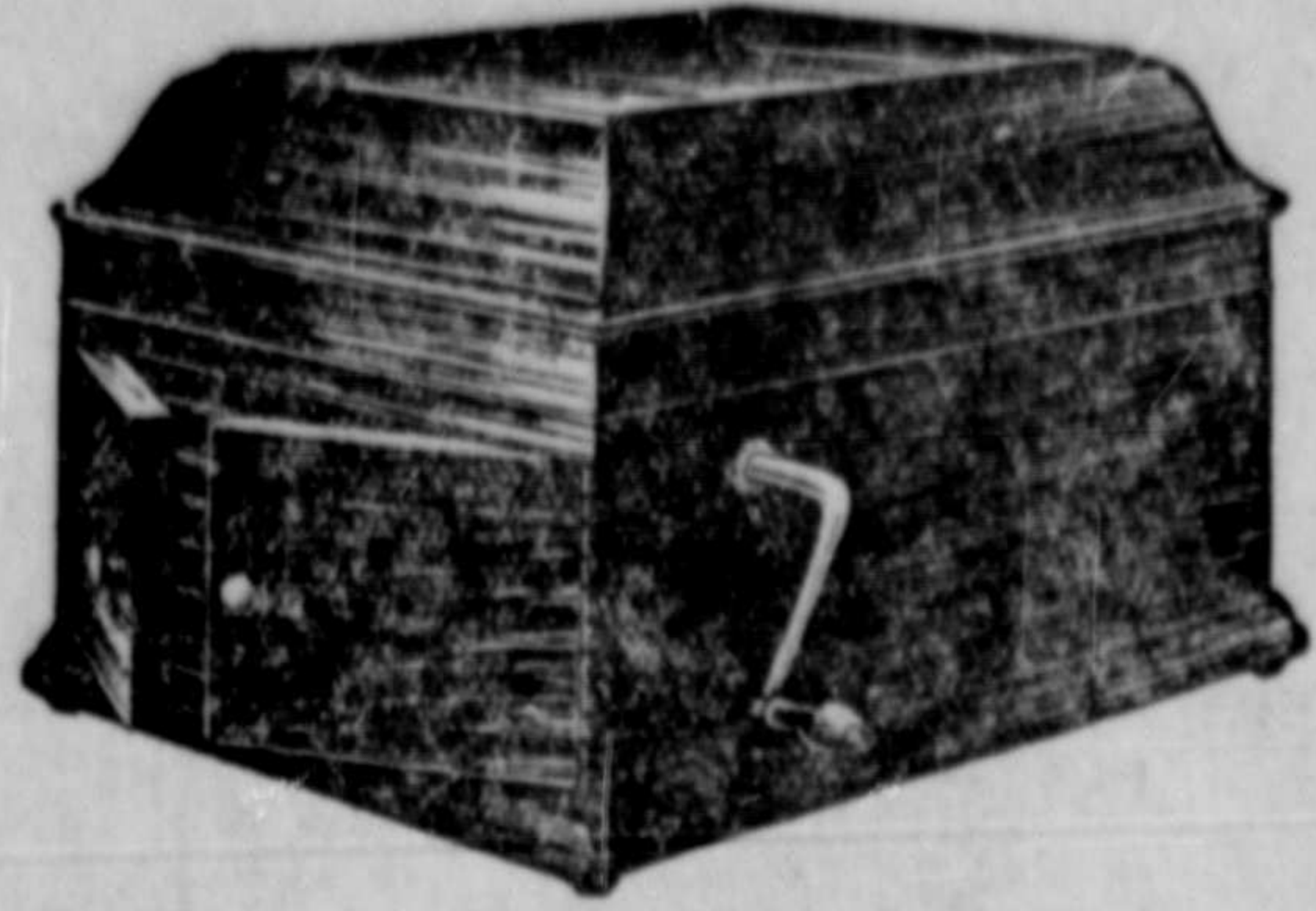

ASK FOR DUTY ON FUEL OIL

Protectionists Would Make Cost of Operating Fish Boats Higher.

One of the largest and most aring indications of the length to which Tory advocates will go, is set forth in a special despatch from Victoria, B. C., to the financial Post at Toronto. The correspondent of that paper writes that the owners of the Vancouver Island coal mines want protection against the invasion of the province by oil. They tell of the number of gallons of oil imported from California and suggest that if a duty was imposed on this, coal would be used more extensively and the mines on Vancouver Island would be kept busy. Investigate First.

The local comment on the despatch is that any increase in the duty on fuel oil would increase the price of fuel oil to the fishermen of Prince Rupert and would practically put them out of business. Also it would tend to put up the price of coal which is at the limit already.

Local people who are interested in this business and who are supporting the Tory candidate are asked to investigate this matter before voting tomorrow.

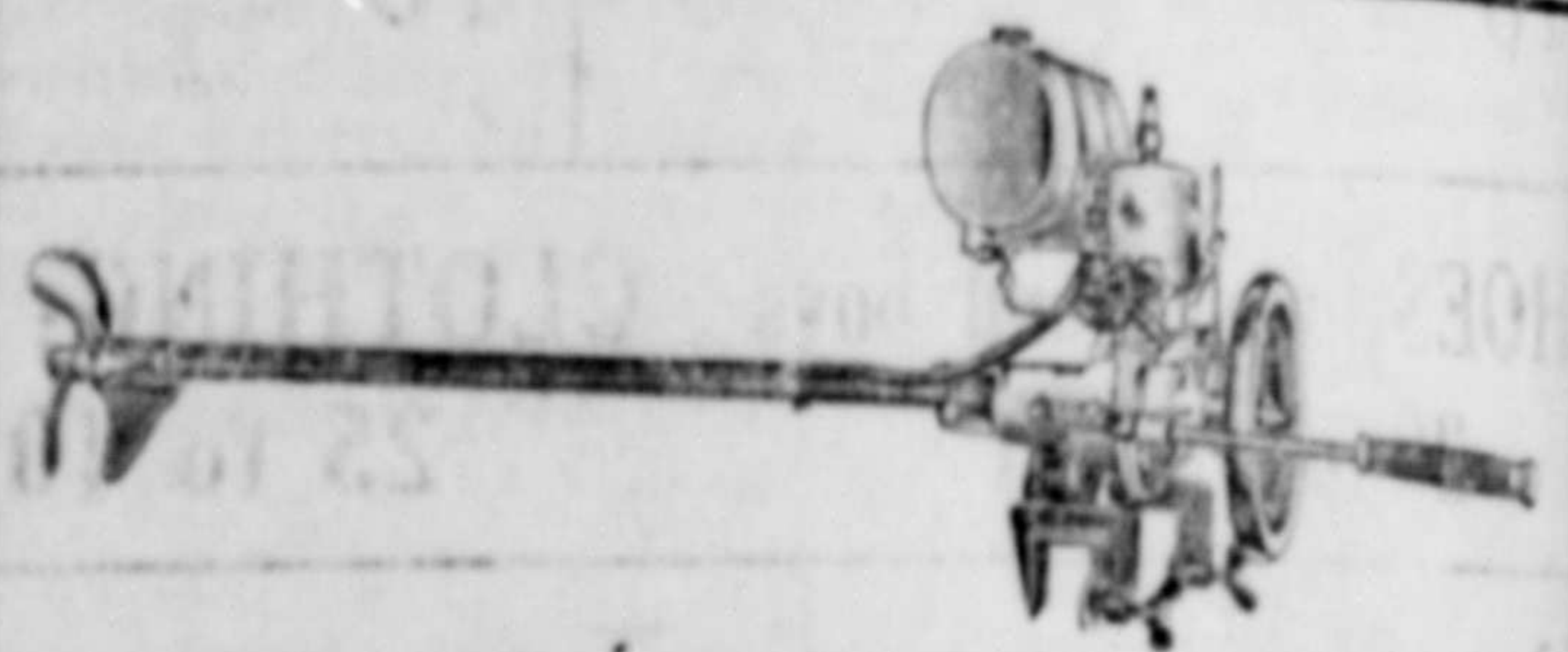

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## SATURDAY'S CONFERENCE ON IRISH QUESTION

### Oath of Allegiance and Other Matters Before Delegates in London.

DEUBLIN, Dec. 2.—Members of the Dail Eireann today are considering the British Government's latest proposal for an Irish peace settlement. There is little optimism as to the decision.

The new terms offered by Lloyd George are not known but it is believed they are based on an all-Ireland Parliament, the Government of Ulster being given the option of withdrawing after six months.

To overcome the Sinn Fein objection to taking the oath of allegiance to the Crown, the oath of allegiance proposed to be sworn is to an Irish free state in the commonwealth of nations known as the British Empire and to the King as head of that commonwealth of nations.

## PRESAGE OF BIG VICTORY

NEWMARKET, Ont., Dec. 5.—Speaking here to a large gathering of electors, Hon. Mackenzie King, Liberal candidate in North York, expressing thanks for his nomination and referring to conditions in North York, said Liberalism had never shone so splendidly as in this riding today. All signs pointed to victory for the Liberals in the present fight. Mr. King repeated his charges of usurpation and declared the people were entitled to full discussion on public affairs. The question of autocratic or democratic government was Canada's big issue today. Mr. Meighen, he said, had carried on after his mandate expired.

Mr. King dealt with railway matters and stated that the member for North York had voted with the Premier to deny information to Parliament and the people.

The shipment to Canada of high explosive shells to the value of six million dollars was again dealt with by Mr. King. Parliament had not been consulted as to the purchase of such munitions. Mr. King declared:

**Up to People.**  
In this campaign, said the Liberal leader, the people must choose between economy and extravagance.

There were savings which could be made, Mr. King declared. The country's debt to the returned men, must be met though everything else was defaulted. There must be an attempt to bring down the cost of government in order to reduce the cost of living.

The Liberal leader declared the tariff to be only one of the issues. The Prime Minister talked of tariff revision, but Sir. H. Drayton who headed the tariff commission through the Dominion maintained a discreet silence as to any tariff changes.

No legitimate industry, said Mr. King, would suffer because of the Liberal tariff revision though that revision would be downward.

**Why Unemployment?**  
"The Government speaks of preaching ruin if the high protective tariff is changed," said Mr. King. "Why then does the high protective tariff not provide work for the unemployed and keep the factories busy?"

The Liberals believed in revising the tariff in a manner to increase production by lightening the burden on implements of production in the basic industries and on the necessities of life.

**Help Other Classes.**  
The Laurier administration had secured 33 1-3 per cent. British preference, Mr. King said. He did not think the farmers' interests had been looked after as they should have been during recent years. Farmers and all other classes must prosper before Canada could prosper.

But if the farmers are to secure what they want they need the help of all other classes," Mr. King said.

He did not believe because common-farmers were in it that the farmer movement was other than a class move. The Liberal party was wide enough, Mr. King declared, to take in representatives of all classes.

The Liberal leader dealt with the nomination as Progressives. He did not think their choice of a doctor to oppose a Liberal. Farmer showed any thing more than a desire for group control regardless of principles.

"If I knew it meant defeat I would take that defeat a thousand times rather than run elsewhere," Mr. King declared, "but I know there is nothing ahead of us but victory."

There was yet time, Mr. King reminded his audience, for Mr. Burnaby to throw his weight in behind the Liberal cause and cease striving to divide the forces opposing the Meighen government.

The Liberal leader closed with a confident prediction of victory in the coming fight.

## PURE PROTECTION.

Sir:—Enclosed you will find a cutting from the Province of Nov. 28, reporting a discussion which took place at the latest custom regulations at the last meeting of the Foreign Trade Bureau of the Board of Trade, Vancouver. Now as considerable stress has been laid locally on the "moderate protection" policy by which Mr. Meighen proposes to lead Canada from the "aftermath of war" to the glorious heights of "National Prosperity" the publication of this cutting may serve to enlighten some of your readers as to whether "moderate protection" of Mr. Meighen is tariff for revenue or a protection wall built round the profiteering princes of the Big Interests. It will also be interesting to note its effect on the Meighenite group whether Conservative or "Independent."

The clipping follows:  
Mr. Robert McKee, chairman of the bureau, said that the new proposals put the importer in the position of never knowing what his goods were to cost him, in order to arrive at the value of the goods to the importer the government proposed to have their inspectors investigate the books of the foreign exporter in order to find out what his usual prices were. In the case of an exporter who found himself stocked with a surplus of goods which he could not dispose of at his usual price, the Canadian importer would not be allowed the privilege of having those goods at a reduced price.

Giving a concrete example, Mr. McKee described a firm making some specialty on which it would ordinarily make a profit of say 100 per cent. If, for some reason the demand for this article fell off to where it was forced to sell to all its customers at 25 per cent profit, the Canadian minister of customs and excise would have it in his power to add round about 75 per cent necessary to bring it back to the firm's usual profit. In other words the Canadian importer could not buy goods in a falling market for shipment and sale in

## FINE CHURCH BELLS

BELFAST, Dec. 3.—(By Canadian Press.)—Ireland now possesses two of the finest modern carillons in the world. Two years ago a fine set of forty-two bells was placed in Queenstown Cathedral, and on Sunday, November 6, 1921, another set of bells was inaugurated in St. Patrick's (Roman Catholic) Cathedral at Armagh. The latter consists of thirty-nine bells with clavier—three octaves chromatic E to E, with two extra lower tones ditonic D and C. The total weight of the bells is eleven tons. The smallest bell weighs only twenty pounds.

The carillon in the cathedral at Armagh is placed in the north-west tower which, with its spire, rises to a height of 240 feet. Thus the bells are placed in a satisfactory position acoustically.  
Another fine carillon of bells is to be set up at Loughborough, where a war memorial campanile is being built at a cost of £10,000. It will contain a set of forty-five bells with clavier, with a great bell weighing four tons.

**Arbitrary Power.**  
The main objection to the new regulations, said Mr. McKee, was that it gave the minister of customs arbitrary power. If there was some law that prescribed the limits within which the minister might adjust the price, the new regulations might be workable, but as it stands the sky is the limit, and the importer is absolutely in the air.

There was a general discussion by members in the course of which the regulations as they affected the sugar industry in Canada was emphasized, and it was contended that under the new regulations it would be impossible to undersell Canadian refineries. One member pointed out as an example of the confusion wrought by the new regulations that only recently a consignment of goods had been sold and actually consumed in Canada, when the department at Ottawa came along and demanded another \$6000 on this shipment.

**Ottawa Views.**  
One of the points brought out by the Ottawa board in its letter was that where the minister decides that the exporter of goods into Canada is not making enough profit, the Canadian purchaser must pay the Canadian Government the full amount of any additional profits which the minister may ask for, plus the full amount of American exchange on this increase, and also the regular duty and excise tax, figured in the usual way on the total of the amount set by the minister, and exchange.

Another point emphasized was that the government, under the importation of the goods into Canada actually occurs, following which they send their inspector to the manufacturers to examine his books, and find what profit he is making. The inspector takes this information back to Ottawa and the Canadian importer is afterwards notified as to what he shall have to pay.

Under the new regulations it was stated the importer did not know how long any rate set by the government would be in effect, since revision of the amount charged the importer was possible under an appeal to the minister, when such rate could be changed, unknown to other importers.

## ELKS MEMORIAL HELD YESTERDAY

Home Was Crowded by Those Paying Respect to Memory of Deceased Brethren.

The Elks' Home was crowded yesterday afternoon by members of the order and Ladies of the Royal Purple who assembled to take part in the memorial service for deceased brethren. The day was observed by all lodges of the order in Canada and in every city where there is an Elks Lodge there was a similar gathering. The members of the local lodge who have died in the past year were Lieut. Wilfrid Macdonald and Charles W. Embleton.  
Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant, chaplain, delivered the memorial address and pronounced the benediction. W. J. Cash, exalted ruler, presided and read the invocation as well as conducting the closing ceremony. The officers of the lodge took part in the reading of the memorial ritual. Ralph Leppine read Longfellow's "Thanatopsis."

GIBRALTAR OF THE NORTH

Neutralization of Aland Islands is Arranged by World Powers.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The text of the convention for the neutralization of the Aland Islands, received here, shows that the signatory countries to it are Denmark, Estonia, Poland, Finland, France, Germany, Great Britain, Italy, Lithuania and and Sweden. Besides prohibiting the establishment in the islands of any military, naval or air bases, it also forbids, with certain exceptions, the entrance of war vessels of any power into the waters of the archipelago, except for peaceful passage through them. Finland, as, however, permitted to send, as a temporary measure, any forces required for the maintenance of order.

In time of war, the archipelago is strictly neutralized, but in the event of warfare affecting the Baltic, Finland is permitted to lay mines in the waters of the group, provided she immediately informs the Council of the League of Nations.

The Agreement. For the purpose of giving effect to the convention or meeting any violations of it, the contracting powers agree to have resort to the Council of the League of Nations which shall, in case of need, summon a conference of the contracting powers, whether members of the League or not. Failing unanimity, each and any of the contracting powers are authorized to take such measures as may be recommended by the Council by a two-thirds majority, the vote of any power accused of the violation of the convention not being reckoned.

In the event of the neutrality of the islands being threatened by a sudden coup de main, Finland is authorized to take the necessary measures in the neutral zone for repelling the aggressor until such time as the contracting powers are ready to intervene for the purpose of securing respect for the neutrality of the Islands.

**FAULTY LINKS WIRELESS CHAIN**

**British Government Criticized For Apathy in Regard to It.**

LONDON, Dec. 5.—"The Imperial Wireless Chain," which, it was predicted when the scheme was first broached, would bind together the different parts of the empire, has not yet fulfilled the sanguine expectations of British newspaper men. At the annual meeting of the Empire Press Union in London, the government was much criticized for alleged apathy and procrastination in the matter.

Robert Donald, well known journalist, said if things remained as they were there would be no Imperial Wireless Chain. There might be two or more disjointed systems but no one co-ordinated scheme under one control, linking together all parts of the empire, and adding to the means of distributing news.

The Imperial Conference he added came to no decision on wireless. Mr. Churchill, secretary of State for the colonies and chairman of Imperial Communications Committee, took up the subject and hoped to put through a scheme on a big scale but now had abandoned the child of his adoption and wireless had drifted back to the post office.

Premier Hughes had declared for free action by Australia, said Mr. Donald.

**Canada Out of It.**  
 The South African government found itself unable to devote money to wireless for several years. Canada would have its own system working in co-operation with England. **MANSON SCORES SUN REPORT**

**Declares He Knows No Party As Speaker of the House and Is Applauded.**

VICTORIA, Dec. 5.—Declaring that he had not for a moment let partisan considerations enter into his decision, which threw out the beer motion Wednesday night, Mr. Speaker Manson Thursday stated that when the Legislature did him the honor of electing him speaker he resolved that he would endeavor to put party affiliations aside and adhere to a principle of fair play at all times.

He referred to a headline appearing in the Vancouver Sun, which had inferred that the Speaker had ruled out of order the government's beer motion and had approved the stand of the opposition.

"When any portion of the press suggests that the Speaker has not followed a proper course, as befits his position, some comment should be made," said Hon. Mr. Manson.

"The public is entitled, above all else, to a truthful report of the proceedings. The headlines of the article in question, are neither fair, nor do they convey truthful impression of the proceedings of last evening," said the Speaker. "Your Speaker did not rule against a government motion, but against the report of a committee constituted on the motion of a private member."

"The ruling was given on the facts as presented to me on a point of order taken by the junior member for Victoria, a recognized supporter, I believe of the administration. I know nothing of a so-called Conservative 'stand,' and my information and observation were that the Conservative opposition members of the House took no part in the committee which made the report in question to the House, and I may add that the first objection privately made to me with regard to my ruling was by a Conservative member of the House, I endeavor to divorce myself from consideration of the party origin of points of order."  
 "The headlines referred to are a distinct breach and contempt of the privileges of this House. I trust that a similar contempt will not occur again."

**ORIENTAL QUESTION IS BEFORE COURTS**

OTTAWA, Dec. 5.—Argument is to be had before the Supreme Court of Canada on December 9 on the question of whether it is legal to insert a clause in a government contract discriminating against Orientals.  
 The reference referred to is for the purpose of obtaining the opinion of the judges of the Supreme Court with respect to the validity of a statute of British Columbia. The resolution provided that: "In all contracts, leases and concessions of whatsoever kind entered into, issued, or made by the Government, or on behalf of the Government, provision be made that no Chinese or Japanese shall be employed in connection therewith."

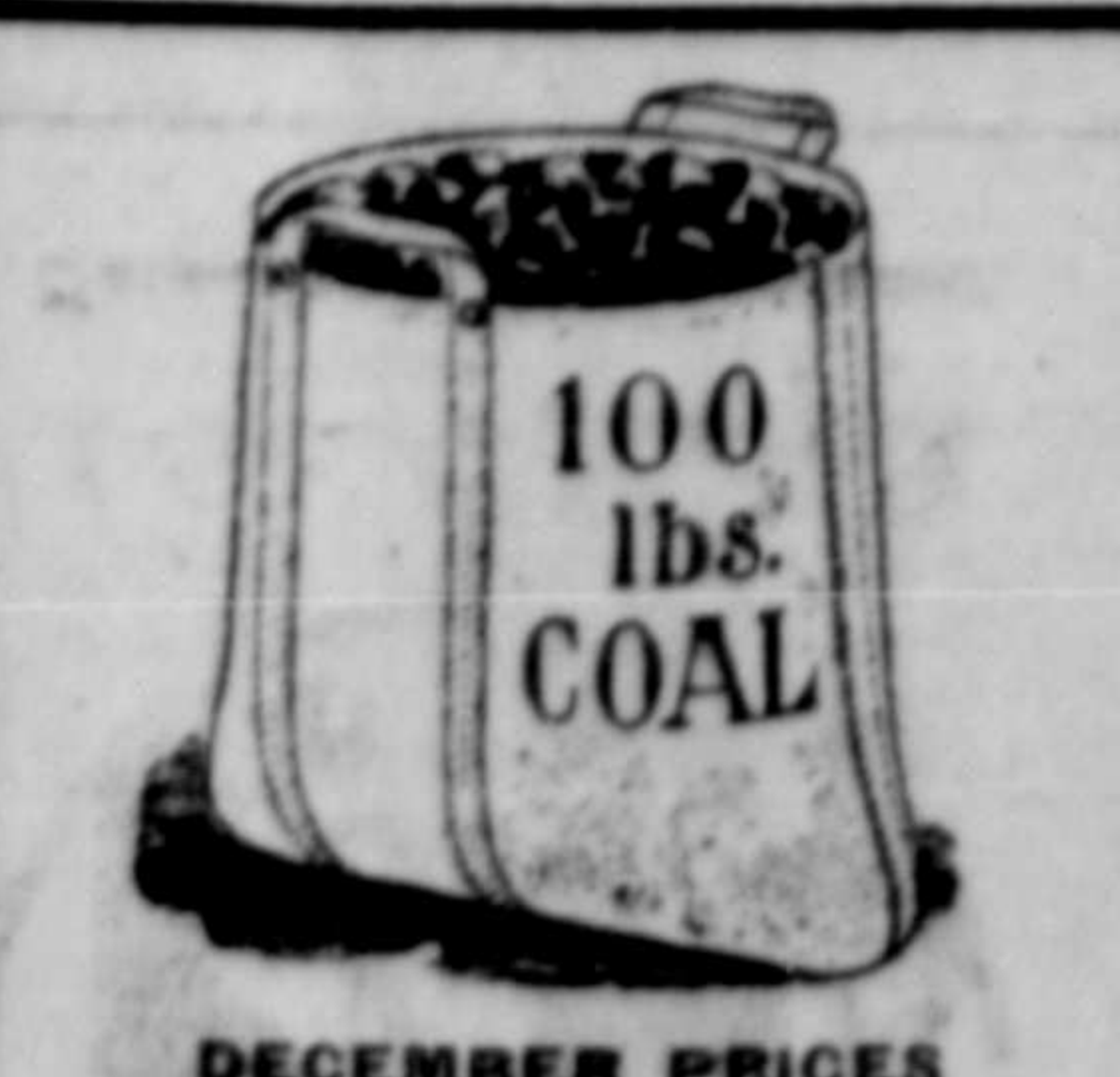
