Miners May Vote to Accept Terms

AUGMENTED ARMY WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR DISCIPLINE IN IRELAND

Indications are That Coal Mining May Be Resumed in Great Britain on June 20

LONDON, June 11.—The vote now being taken of the miners on the owners' proposals is expected to favor a return to work under the new conditions. It is believed that work will be resumed in the coal mines on June 20.

All sections of the people of Great Britain are now in a most optimistic frame of mind regarding the situation. The mine owners see imminent disaster impending the whole coal industry if the strike is allowed to continue much longer and the miners themselves are feeling the effects of nearly three months' unemployment. In many cases great privation is being suffered but through it all the workers have displayed great fortitude and optimism.

BAD FOREST FIRES IN EAST

Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia are suffering

CHARLOTTETOWN, June 11.—A bush fire in the eastern part of King's County destroyed a Roman Catholic Church rectory and another residence at St. Margaret's. The loss is placed at \$30,000.

AMHERST, N. S., June 11.—Forest fires in the Herbert River and Philip River districts in Cumberland county are raging with unabated fury. Nearly 100,000 feet of sawn lumber and several thousand feet of cut logs have been destroyed. Yesterday the flames were still gaining headway.

ADMIRAL SIMS CALLED BACK

Speech on Irish in America Delivered at London Not Pleasing.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—Admiral Sims' leave of absence in England was revoked today by Secretary of the Navy Denby. The admiral has been ordered to report at once.

The action follows Admiral Sims' alleged remarks in a speech at London on the Irish in America to which strong objection was taken by Irish sympathizers in the United States.

ALBERTA EDITOR IS CHOSEN PRESIDENT WEEKLY NEWSPAPERS

VANCOUVER, June 11.—V. G. French, editor of the Wetaskiwin, Alberta Times, was chosen president of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers' Association yesterday at the annual convention being held in this city.

FREIGHT LAUNCH TOWED TO PORT

The fishing boat Celestial Empire, belonging to the New England Fish Co. of Vancouver and at present under charter to Capt. B. Johnston who is operating it for towing purposes in these waters, was towed into the harbor this morning and taken to the dry dock in a disabled condition. Liqueur trouble is the cause.

SWEDEN ADOPTS A BASIS REGULATION OF WORKING HOURS

STOCKHOLM, June 11.—Both houses of parliament have passed a bill regulating the basis of working hours for workmen and laborers in this country similar to that laid down at the Washington labor convention.

HAVANA, June 11.—Eleven deaths from bubonic plague occurred in Tampico, Mexico, during May.

ALEX. PAULSEN CHARGED WITH RECENT MURDER

Said to Have Made Confession Implicating Young Prisoner Already in Okalla.

VANCOUVER, June 11.—Alex. Paulsen was formally charged in the police court this morning with the murder of W. F. Salisbury, Jr., on the night of April 12 last.

In an alleged confession, Paulsen implicated Allen Robinson, aged 19 years, who is now serving two months in Okalla Prison Farm for vagrancy, accusing him of firing the shot which killed Salisbury. Paulsen was remanded until Monday at the request of City Prosecutor McKay.

Archie Simpson is being held on warrant as a material witness. It is alleged that Paulsen told him of the shooting and that he also saw Paulsen shake off his musk-tie and noticed his hand digging on the night of the murder. Robinson, jointly charged with the crime, refused to say anything.

RAIN WANTED IN THE PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

Otherwise Hay Crop May Be Lost, Says the Minister of Agriculture.

QUEBEC, June 11.—Nothing but rain will save the hay crop throughout the province according to the minister of agriculture. The rest of the crops are looking very well.

CANADIAN WOMAN GOING TO GENEVA

OTTAWA, June 11.—Mrs. J. O. Smith, wife of the Canadian immigration officer at London, will represent Canada at the international conference on welfare of women and children under the auspices of the League of Nations at Geneva.

WRESTLING TITLE

NEW YORK, June 11.—The wrestling champion, Stanislaus Zbyszko and Ed "Strangler" Lewis are matched for a title bout on June 27.

CARPENTIER MAY HAVE OVER-TRAINED

NEW YORK, June 11.—Fear of overtraining appears to haunt Carpentier and his manager. He is declared to have trained at too fast a pace, although he is now in tip-top condition.

J. Fred Simmonds, who spent several weeks in Prince Rupert last summer, organizing the local Elks' lodge, is in the city, having arrived with the Board of Trade excursion from Vancouver. Mr. Simmonds, who did not continue with the party on the trip to Anyox and Stewart, is spending today in town on business connected with the Elks' lodge.

REPORTS SAY THAT KINGGEORGE'S DAUGHTER WILL WED SERBIAN PRINCE



Prince Alexander, Regent of Serbia, and Princess Mary of Romania, who are to be married, according to rumors that have been broadcast. Prince Alexander will shortly make a visit to Great Britain, where he will be entertained by King George.

EXPECTING SULPHUR SHOWERS ON ACCOUNT REPORTED VOLCANOES

SITKA, June 11.—The reports of renewed volcanic eruptions in the Aleutian Islands are causing the people of southeastern Alaska to expect more sulphur showers similar to those which eight years ago were noticed as far south as Prince Rupert. At that time considerable damage was done to wearing apparel and other articles made of cloth by the peculiar chemical action of the dust.

MAYOR BRANDT TO STOP OFF IN CITY

J. F. Brandt, one of Prince Rupert's earliest pioneers who is among the excursionists from Vancouver making the trip on the Prince George under the auspices of the Board of Trade of the southern city, expects, on his return from Stewart tomorrow, to leave the party and spend a few days in town in order to visit his numerous friends in the city and generally renew his associations with Prince Rupert. Mr. Brandt is overseas with the 102nd Battalion and was one of the most popular officers of that unit.

ENGLISHMAN WON EVENT

Thousand Guineas Golf Tournament Won by A. B. Mitchell

GLENEAGLES, June 11.—A. B. Mitchell, of the North Foreland Club, defeated Joseph Kirkland, the Australian open champion, and won the Thousand Guineas professional golf tournament.

A. B. Williams, who arrived a few days ago from Victoria with a Provincial government timber cruising party leaves today for Kitimaat where the rest of the summer will be spent in the woods. Mr. Williams says he looks forward to the pleasant life in the out of doors, but hopes the flies will not be too troublesome. A man after nearly three years spent in the trenches of France and Belgium, he thinks he will be able to pull through.

Government Orders Cessation Stoppage Irish Authorities

LONDON, June 11.—The Daily Mail says that the government of Great Britain has instructed the Irish authorities to cease reprisals. An augmented army will in future be responsible for order in Ireland.

The Central News says that one hundred Sinn Feiners have been arrested in County Monaghan by the military authorities who have ordered the cessation of the trowler traffic carrying food to West Donegal ports since the cessation of train traffic. West Donegal is said to be completely cut off now.

MURDER OF SOCIALIST

Followed by General Strike in Munich—Political Revenge.

BERLIN, June 11.—An independent Socialist named Gareis was shot and fatally wounded last night following a lecture he had made against clericalism. A general strike has been declared in Munich as a consequence of the murder which is generally looked upon as a political revenge.

VANCOUVER EDITOR WAS MUCH PLEASED WITH PRINCE RUPERT

Alex. Shaw, news editor of the Vancouver Sun, who is touring the north with the Vancouver Board of Trade excursion, was much surprised with the development and progress that he saw in Prince Rupert during the visit here yesterday. He had previously no idea that the town was so far advanced. He is so enthusiastic that he is writing a feature story which will shortly appear in the Sunday Sun. It will deal with the industries and building here and will be illustrated with pictures taken while here.

CONVICT ESCAPES FROM TWO DEPUTY SHERIFFS CHARGE

CASTLE ROCK, Wash., June 11.—Roy Gardner, under sentence to McNeil Island prison for robbing the mails, made his escape today for the second time while enroute to the prison in charge of two deputy sheriffs here. He escaped from the train with a heavily armed confederate. A battle in the mountains is expected.

FINAL FIGURES FOR THE S'SKATCHEWAN PROVINCIAL VOTE

REGINA, June 11.—The final figures in the Saskatchewan provincial elections show forty seats for the government and an opposition of seventeen comprised of various factions, mainly independent. Three elections have been deferred.

ACCIDENTS IN MAY ON CANADIAN RAILWAYS

OTTAWA, June 11.—A total of 123 accidents for May were reported yesterday by the commission in charge of railway lines under the supervision of the government. Thirteen were killed and 120 were injured.

SAID ATTEMPT TO STOP KING GOING IRELAND

Shooting in Belfast Attributed to This Cause.

BELFAST, June 11.—A police sergeant and two constables were shot in the street here yesterday and two others were seriously wounded. The shooting is attributed to Unionist quarters to an attempt on the part of the Sinn Fein to create such conditions in Ireland as would prevent King George from coming to attend the opening in state of the Ulster parliament on June 22.

FORBIDDEN TO GO ON ROOF

Athletic Festival Trinity College Abandoned and Arrests Made.

DUBLIN, June 11.—The residents in the vicinity of Dublin Castle have been forbidden to go on the roofs of their homes under a penalty of being shot.

The athletic festival planned for weeks in Trinity College has been abandoned as a result of threatening letters. Forty-two young men attending the signaling school at the headquarters of the National Irish Foresters have been arrested.

DELAYED GAS BOAT FROM PORT CLEMENTS ARRIVED HERE SAFELY

The gas boat Nortonian arrived at one o'clock this morning from Port Clements after having been en route from that port since last Tuesday. On account of the delayed arrival of the boat, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police had intended sending out a search vessel today, but the safe arrival of the craft made this unnecessary. The boat brought over a number of passengers and the passage was quite rough, shelter having to be sought en route.

MAYOR GALE MAY OPPOSE STEVENS

Dame Rumor Busy at Vancouver on Federal Election.

VANCOUVER, June 11.—It is freely stated here that Mayor R. H. Gale, who is now on a trip to the Old Country, will oppose H. H. Stevens, M.P., at the next federal election for Vancouver constituency. Mayor Gale enjoys an immense measure of popularity in the city and he would make a good standard bearer for the Liberal party.

FLYERS NEARLY GET TO OTTAWA WITH NEW MACHINE BUT LEFT IT

OTTAWA, June 11.—Col. Robert Leckie and Captain Johnson, Air Board flyers who were to have brought a special machine from Halifax, reported at the Air Board office here this morning. Their machine was left 21 miles west of Montreal owing to minor engine trouble.

Vancouver Visitors Learn a Good Deal.

The day spent in Prince Rupert by the Vancouver Board of Trade excursionists will prove of great benefit to the people of both cities. In the course of the visit attributes of this city, which the visitors never even imagined existed, were revealed. These people will now go back to their home town and will have facts and figures with which to show that Prince Rupert is no mean city and that her future is assured. One prominent man on the excursion made the statement that he had not known there was an ocean dock under construction here before he actually saw it. No doubt others were surprised with other features of the city's up-to-dateness. Another person seemed to be even surprised that there were electric lights. That, however, was plain ignorance. The fact remains, however, that yesterday's visitors came here expecting to see some substantiation for the boasts that the city makes and the most of them saw even more than they had expected.

Made in B. C. Week to be Observed.

The figures quoted by Bruce McKelvie, manager of the "Made in B. C." campaign, on the possibilities that might be developed out of a greater use of home products seem almost startling but on investigation, with the use of paper and pencil for a few minutes, their truth can readily be proved. They show obvious facts which the people of British Columbia do not seem to have realized fully. This campaign has never yet been formally introduced in Prince Rupert but now would be a good time to start. June 20 to June 25 is to be "Made in B. C." week and the stores in the southern cities are preparing to feature B. C. goods in their advertisements and shop windows in that week. What would be more fitting than that local merchants do similarly? If the people of B. C. can learn the lesson of using home products and act accordingly their doing so will rebound on the general business of the province in the alleviation of unemployment and the promotion of local industry and everyone will benefit indirectly in a greater degree of prosperity that will be thus brought about.

Saskatchewan Approves Government.

The Saskatchewan provincial election has been featured by the proportionately large number of independent candidates that have been returned. One of these Independents even defeated a Government cabinet minister. The rout of the Conservative party with but two seats in that province out of sixty-three is apparent. The Martin administration has a handsome working majority, having returned forty-five of its candidates. The opposition of eighteen seems small, it is true, but it will be a watchful one—one that will join with the government in all constructive measures and policies, but one that will ever be on the alert for anything that may be doubtful. The people of the province, judging from a general survey, are quite contented with the record of the Liberal administration and signified that feeling conclusively at the polls.

Coal Strike Situation Looks Much Brighter.

Definite steps are now being taken in Great Britain by both sides in the strike situation towards a settlement. Both owners and employees are by now doubtless feeling the pinch, each in their own way. Both seem to be in more tractable moods. A settlement and the resumption of operations now is closer in sight than it has ever been since the strike started nearly three months ago. A few more concessions on either side, no greater than the ones that have already been made, will bring about a happy ending of the deplorable state of affairs.

Mr. Barr, up till a short time ago, was employed in the Prince Rupert Drug Store here and during his residence of a year in the city took part in various amateur theatrical productions in which he showed considerable talent.

ANTIQUE LAMP WAS SOLD AT HIGH PRICE

LONDON, June 11.—An Arab glass lamp of the 14th century which formed part of the late Morgan S. Williams' collection of arms and armor was sold here recently for £2,500.

The lamp bears inscriptions from the Koran while another inscription has been translated as "Power and might to our Lord and Sultan, Protector of the World and Religion."

ANCIENT TOMBS ARE DISCOVERED IN ASIA

LONDON, June 11.—Students of the English School of Archaeology have discovered at Mykalosson, in the Greek province of Boetia, 35 tombs dating from the fifth and sixth centuries before Christ. The condition of the tombs, if ascertained, have not yet been announced.

Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

June 11, 1911. Mayor William Manson left on the Prince George this morning for Victoria to obtain the signature of the Minister of Lands to the assessment agreement. His Worship does not expect to be in the south more than a day or two. During his absence Alderman Smith will fill the mayoralty chair.

Captain Smith, of the city police department, was found dead this morning in his bed at the Knox Hotel. He died of heart failure. The deceased, who acted as jailer at the provincial prison used by the city, was apparently in good health up to last night. He was a man well over fifty years of age and had lived a life of adventure, having been to most parts of the world.

Protection for Millions About to Be Invested.
By the Editor.

Prince George is expecting to have a big pulp and paper company established there in the near future. Everyone hopes they will get it and the probability is that they will. If they do it will be of great benefit to Prince Rupert and to other parts of the province.

The members of the big syndicate owning the timber and pulp leases are preparing to put up a good many millions of dollars which will never be returned, if they can be assured a reasonable rate of interest on their investment. They are men who delight in big things and who take great pride in developing the resources of the country. They want to use the timber resources but they do not want to invest a lot of money and then find it all gone up in smoke in a night.

Supply Important.
R. J. S. Tyhurst, manager of the Fraser Timber Syndicate, explained the matter in a long interview given Dick and I at Prince George. He stated that supply of raw material was even more important today than plant. Some concerns had gone into production in a big way and soon found themselves with a rapidly decreasing supply of timber which promised to leave them stranded in the near future. This condition would be disastrous.

Fire Danger.
The danger from fire, Mr. Tyhurst explained, was an ever-present one. It might be possible that just as they had several millions of dollars invested in a plant, a big fire would wipe out their source of supply of timber and then all their efforts would be wasted. He is asking that the forest protection be handed over to his concern and that the Provincial Government bear half the expense. At present there is no earnest effort to prevent fires and the wardens are too few to be effective. Also there was danger from sparks from the coal burning locomotives and he thought oil should be used through that section of the Canadian National line. There was no need for oil burning near the coast because climatic conditions took care of the timber. In the interior the case was entirely different and oil burning was necessary.

Benefit Prince Rupert.
Mr. Tyhurst explained that Japan was the present market for a good deal of pulp and paper and the product would likely be shipped through Prince Rupert while the sulphur, iron pyrites, and other products necessary to making sulphite, would probably come in that way. He was of opinion that Prince Rupert would benefit very materially from the paper mill, if it should be installed. For every car of paper exported, they would have to import four cars of material used in the process of manufacture. They had lime on the ground and a small deposit of iron pyrites had been discovered in the neighborhood but everything else would have to be imported.

Perpetual Supply.
The Fraser Timber Syndicate has 350 square miles of timber and with this made into a perpetual timber reserve, they could cut only the big timber and take from the land regular crops just as they do in Germany and other European countries. This would

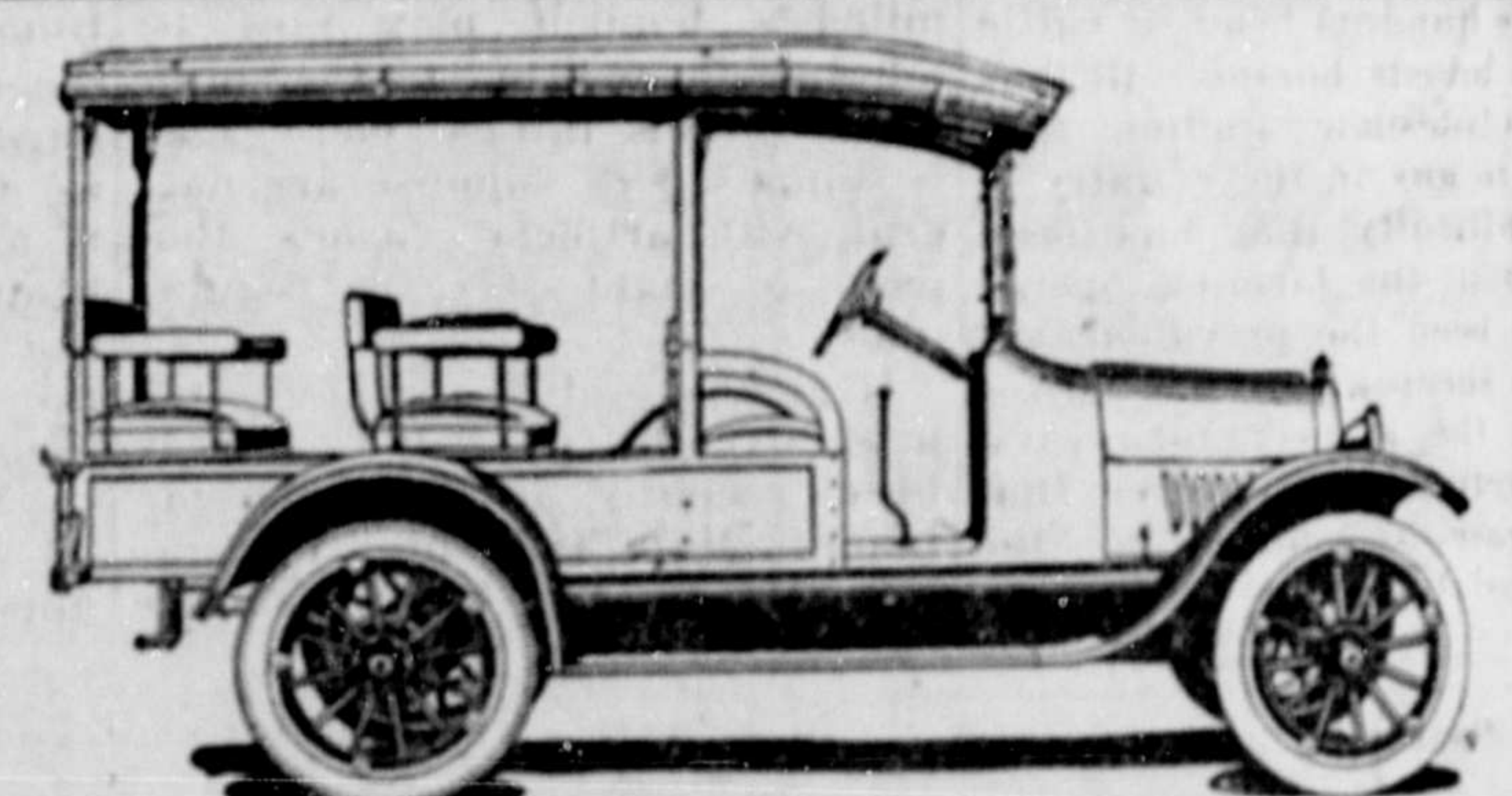

Irrigation as Aid to Farmers of Bulkley

By the Editor

Many people scoff at the idea of irrigation as applied to the lands of the interior, but there is one farm in the neighborhood of Houston that stands out prominently as an example of a successful irrigated farm. I refer to the Diamond D. farm, owned by Charles Barrett, known to his friends as Charley Barrett.

Mr. E. Williams, Dick Pullen and I visited this ranch and saw the irrigation system work. We remained all night and were hospitably entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Barrett, getting up at six in the morning for a real breakfast and leaving soon after seven, bound eastward for Bulkley Lake.

Large Farm.

Mr. Barrett has 2,500 acres and with about 1,200 acres of land and 200 acres of this is irrigated. As a result Mr. Barrett instead of growing from a half to one ton of wheat per acre, he gets more than four tons. These streams are fed by this work and the water is very small. While irrigation is not necessary, it is highly desirable, especially in a dry season.

Mr. Barrett has between two and three hundred head of cattle and breeds horses. He has a fine stallion that would be any in the country. The difficulty that has been with him in the farming operation has been the prevalence of sheep and horses. After being the subject for years, Mr. Barrett has discovered that the disease is caused by the use of lime and by using a remedy of lime it is entirely cured.

Pioneer Ranch.

Another farm we visited was that of Archie McInnis of North Bulkley. The land there is very good so that it is difficult to get the immense crops of hay. He has 360 acres, of which 110 is cleared, and he wintered a head of short-horns which he put this spring in good condition. Here again we were entertained most hospitably and got some idea of the capabilities of the country. Mr. McInnis is an optimist and believes the country is second to none from a farmer's point of view.

Not beyond the Pioneer ranch, we saw Mr. McInnis' place, and water over the road and irrigation with our Ford was very difficult. Half way

through we got a little off the road and there we stuck until hauled out by a horse. This was only the second haul out of the trip and we did not get another. The passengers had to get out and push on several occasions but we did not have to appeal for outside help.

LACE AND HOSIERY BUSINESS IS BEING HIT BY COAL STRIKE

NOTTINGHAM, June 10.—(By Canadian Press).—The coal strike is having a serious effect on the two leading industries of Nottingham: lace and hosiery. Several factories have already closed down and unless there is a settlement of the strike in the near future other factories will be forced to close down for lack of fuel. In the month of March there was a general feeling of improvement in these industries and the coal strike came just at the time when the lace and hosiery trade were making preparations for extending their operations and thus furnishing work for many who are now out of employment.

LADIES' EYELASHES ARE NOW ON SALE

NEW YORK, June 10.—Ladies' eyelashes have become salable articles. The dressing table in millinery's boudoir may now be adorned in addition to the numerous other things mere man is supposed to suppose are natural, with artificial lashes that paste on right over the regular ones.

This innovation in feminine attractiveness was on display here, recently at the American Ladies' Hair Dressing Association Exhibition. Other nature savers included a half bobbed wig to cover the old-fashioned long hair, thus relieving the necessity of cutting it. A parable in moving picture form was shown, demonstrating how a wife, who had lost her husband's affection, regained it by rejuvenating her rose petal cheeks.

MAJORITY OF PRUSSIAN WOMEN CONSERVATIVE

BERLIN, June 10.—The majority of Prussian women voters are conservative in their political sympathies, a compilation of the vote cast at recent elections has disclosed. As high as 59 per cent of the vote cast by the conservative parties was by women electors; the extreme radical organization polled a woman vote of 37 per cent.

GREAT COST OF FINDING OIL

Col. J. K. Cornwall Says \$1,000,000 Has Already Been Spent.

WINNIPEG, June 10.—Different companies and individuals interested in the oil fields of the north have expended close to \$1,000,000 on development work, according to Col. J. K. Cornwall, who has been mentioned as a possible administrator of the Fort Norman oil district. Col. Cornwall was a recent visitor here on his way to Edmonton from New York and Montreal, where he had gone in connection with oil development work.

The people of the north do not find the attitude of other parts of Canada very encouraging in view of their great faith in the possibilities of their northern oil fields, he said. On his visit east he found very little interest was shown in the development of the latest resources of the great Canadian north.

"The initial cost of finding oil is considerable," Col. Cornwall stated. "Once it is discovered and transportation is arranged the cost of production is the lowest of any known resource with the exception of water power. Transportation in the north is not difficult. From the present end of steel at Peace River to Pine Point on Slave Lake, the southern edge of the oil field is a very fertile country. The character of the soil warrants railway construction in itself and the possible productiveness of the area would support a railway. Settlement is pushing out in that direction."

"The eastern portion of Great Slave Lake, which is practically an inland sea, is very rich in mineral prospects," Col. Cornwall said. "Gold mining machinery is going in this year. Vast copper areas lie between Great Bear Lake and Bathurst Inlet. Iron deposits were discovered last season on both sides of the Mackenzie river about latitude 63 north. There is sufficient timber for all requirements of the country. Vegetables and all hardy cereals are easily grown as far as the Arctic circle. It is a healthy country and a very beautiful country. The people are happy and contented and are looking forward to seeing their country developed."

"Ninety-eight per cent of the oil used in Canada at present is imported. The north looks forward to being able to stop this importation and to put Canada on the map as one of the great oil exporting countries of the world," the Colonel concluded.

VALUE OF ENGLISH PENNY MAY BE RISED

MANCHESTER, June 9.—The Manchester Chamber of Commerce has discussed a proposal to raise the value of the English penny so that 10 pennies would equal 1 shilling. The suggestion, it is pointed out, would obviate the necessity for any new coinage and the decimal association has expressed itself as in favor of the idea.

Mr. Buck is well on in years. He wears a patriarchal beard and makes a living from keeping goats. They are high bred animals and fine milkers, some giving as much as five and a half quarts a day each. There are thirty of them in addition to a number of kids. Whenever Mr. and Mrs. Buck went the goats followed.

Mr. Buck says that four years ago he had tuberculosis but by living an outdoor life and drinking goat's milk he is well again, and he recommends the cure to everyone so afflicted. In spite of his advanced years he likes the sing songs of his own composing mostly in praise of his favorite animals. He is taking up a pre-emption near Forestdale in a place where he and his wife have to ride in on horseback.

We enjoyed our visit of a few minutes with Mr. and Mrs. Buck and hope they will have a great success with their fine flock.

HAS DISCOVERED THE PROCESS TO MAKE GOLD

New York Scientist Demonstrates Possibly Making Elements.

NEW YORK, June 11.—(By Canadian Press).—Dr. Charles Benson Davis, of this city, in a paper which he has just submitted to Engineering Foundation, claims to have solved the problem of manufacturing gold. He declares he has already successfully demonstrated the possibility of making gold and other chemical elements, such as silver, platinum and copper, by transmutation of a common element. He has shown samples of the metals he claims to have made to members of the Engineering Foundation and has requested that body to investigate his claims and his methods. Dr. Davis is a well-known chemist and has a high standing in his profession. He is a member of the Chemical Society of Industry, a Fellow of the British Chemical Society, and an honorary member of the Societe Academique d'Histoire Internationale. He is the author of several papers which have been published in chemical journals.

VANCOUVER AFTER BUNKERS

Would Export Yellowhead Coal from That Port.

Vancouver is also trying to establish coal bunkers and the harbor commissioners of that port for some time past have been considering the matter. Various conferences have been held with engineers with shipping men and engineers' plans have been prepared.

It is understood the commissioners at a meeting held recently considered the proposition to create a bulk to be used in the bunkering. This scheme is said to be feasible, and the question of the cheapest and most easily available craft may result in some of the commissioners taking a run over to Seattle to inspect the fleet of wooden war-built hulks in Lake Washington, which the United States Shipping Board is anxious to dispose of.

Permanent Bunkers.

Though the harbor board officials make no statements on the subject it is believed the arrangements now under consideration for meeting the situation temporarily, the ultimate aim being to establish permanent bunkers at some advantageous position on the waterfront.

Conferences have been held between the commission and Capt. Baird, and other shipping men on the subject of the best methods of bunkering.

It is understood that the activity of the board is partly inspired by the fact that one of the Yellowhead Pass mines has sent a representative to this port who has urged the establishment of bunkers, declaring if these bunkers could be obtained, his mines could assure the port of a demand for the coal. It is reported that the coal will be exported, and in large quantities. Yellowhead Pass is the route of the Canadian National railway into British Columbia through the Rocky Mountains.

VISITORS HAD GREAT TIME

P. Malin, President Vancouver Board of Trade Expresses Thanks.

Yesterday turned out to be a beautiful day as regards weather, despite all forebodings to the contrary, and the visiting members of the Board of Trade excursion could not have had a better opportunity of seeing the city and surroundings than was afforded them. The morning was spent in touring the city and inspecting the various industrial points of interest, the dry dock, cold storage and fish plants and the new wharf dock.

The afternoon was taken up with a visit to the Salt Lakes and a run around the harbor, a number of gasoline launches being chartered for the purpose. The day was enjoyed by the visitors who were loud in their praises and enthusiasm about all they had seen and learned of the city and the North.

Big Dance.
The evening dance was given by the Board of Trade at the Andrew's Hall in honor of the visitors. It was in every way a most successful affair. There were between three and four hundred people present including most of the members of the visiting Board of Trade. The orchestra which is accompanying the excursion from Vancouver, furnished most excellent music till 2 o'clock, when they gave place to the Western orchestra, the former having to join the rest of the excursionists on the boat which left at midnight to continue its trip to Anxoy and Stewart. An excellent buffet supper was served, under the able direction of Mrs. H. O. Grewe, assisted by Mesdames Hubert Ward and C. A. Gibson and Misses Fulton and Erskine.

Just before midnight, J. P. Malin, president of the Vancouver Board of Trade, made a brief speech thanking the people of Prince Rupert for the fine reception that had been accorded.

RUMANIAN KING TO BE CROWNED

Monarchs Have Been on Throne Seven Years, But no Coronation Account War.

ALBA JULIA, Transylvania, June 11.—King Ferdinand and Queen Marie of Rumania will be crowned here September 24. Plans are now being made for the erection of a church for use in the religious service of the coronation and in memory of the great battles which brought Greater Rumania into being. The church, it is expected, will serve for the crowning of all future kings of Rumania.

On the outskirts of this little Saxon town, where five hundred years ago Michael the Brave, Rumania's George Washington, scored a victory over the Hungarians, a monumental arch, with reliefs commemorating events in Rumanian history, will be erected.

On the coronation day, after a service at the new church, at which all the Rumanian Bishops will be present, the King and Queen, crowned, will proceed to the new triumphal arch, where there will be a great military pageant.

Gala Entertainment.
In the afternoon and evening there will be gala entertainments, including a banquet in the hall in which the union of Transylvania and Rumania was proclaimed in December, 1918.

The next day the Sovereigns will arrive in Bucharest and make a triumphal entry into the Rumanian capital. Here also an arch will be erected to commemorate the day for future generations.

King Ferdinand and Queen Marie have occupied the Rumanian throne nearly seven years, having succeeded the late King Carol in October of 1914; but on account of the war they never were formally crowned.

It is expected that soon after the coronation, the King and Queen will visit the United States.

SMITHERS

Word has been received in town, that a new vein has been struck on the Harvey group of claims in the Babines. The new showing, which is reported as most promising, was opened up in the process of cleaning up some fallen timber by fire which buried the moss and other light covering over the vein. The vein is said to be six feet wide and to be of a nature similar to the high grade ore opened up and shipped from another part of the property.

By an order in council passed on May 27, Smithers is established as a registry for all bills of sale, including chattel mortgages, in that section of the county of Prince Rupert within Omineca electoral district. J. E. Kirby is registrar.
