## Disarmament Scheme Proposed By United States Secretary of State Hughes Is Radical

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The armaments conference yesterday and Secretary of State Hughes was appointed with Arthur J. Balfour, head of the British delegation, President Hughes in the opening address presented American plans for the limitation of naval expansion. He declared of a naval holiday in which all shipbuilding should be abandoned and older ships of the present scrapped. This was the keynote of the American proposal for general principles. The plan is as follows:

That all capital shipbuilding, either actual or projected,

That further reduction in the naval forces be made by scrapping certain older ships.

That in general regard should be had to existing naval by the powers concerned.

That capital ship tonnage be a measurement of strength navies and a proportionate allowance of auxiliary com-

craft be prescribed.

The United States program would scrap all capital ships

construction, fifteen in number, and five older battleships.

Great Britain would stop construction of her four new ships

Hood type and scrap all her second and first line battleships

the King George V. class.

Japan would abandon plans for two battleships and four

## Fish Creek Mine at Stewart Making Good Showing Under Rapid Development of Owners

W. R. Tonkin, president and general manager of the Fish Creek Mining Company, arrived from Stewart yesterday, and has particular reason to be pleased with the success of their operations. Fifteen men have been working all summer in developing the property, and several shipments of high-grade silver-ore have been made to the Tacoma smelter. Work has been going on in the upper tunnel, where they have cut through a five-foot contact fissure vein carrying the same shoot of high-grade copper and steel galena ore as the surface showing. During the summer

this vein was exposed by means of open cuts for a distance of 600 feet, which carried a shoot of high grade ore for the whole distance. A cross-cut tunnel was started in September in order that work could be carried on when the snow came. By this tunnel a vein at a depth of 50 feet has been tapped, after driving for 420 feet. The vein has a width of five feet, one third of the ore being of a sufficient grade to warrant shipment. The balance runs from \$30 to \$40 per ton. The walls are well defined there being an absolutely clean cleavage.

Sufficient supplies are on the ground to take care of the present crew during the winter, as from now on the work will be kept going continually. Work will be directed to drift in both ways on the vein, and it is the intention to sink a winze to a depth of at least 50 feet.

As soon as Mr. Tonkin returns to Seattle a hoist will be obtained and shipped to the property for this purpose. The drift to the East will gain an additional depth on the vein of about 100 feet under the brow of the hill. As the ore is mined, it will be sorted and that of a high grade nature will be sacked for shipment. With the advent of spring the snow becomes packed and double-ended sleds can be used to advantage.

Early in the coming year Mr. Tonkin expects to have the financial position of his company in such standing that compressor machinery can be installed and also a floatation plant.

## John Hart Makes His Budget Speech Finances Healthy

VICTORIA, Nov. 12.—In presenting the budget speech to the Legislature yesterday afternoon Hon. John Hart, minister of finance, informed the members that while the province had heavy obligations to shoulder, the credit of British Columbia was still improving in the markets of the continent.

The total appropriations for 1920-1921 amounted to \$21,645,080,73 and the total expenditures on all accounts aggregated \$19,620,680.95, a net saving of \$2,018,399.78.

The total expenditure on current account was \$15,236,931.35, or \$17,667 greater than the revenue.

The net debt of the province on March 31 last was \$39,530,003. Amounts borrowed since then brought the total funded debt up to \$61,854,436 against which the sinking funds had accumulated on November 1, 1921 to amount approximately to \$7,900,000, making a funded debt on that date of \$53,951,435.

## Stork Sees No Change in Skeena Constituency since His 600 Majority in 1917

HOUSTON, Nov. 12.—"At the last election I had nearly six hundred majority from the home vote, and after visiting practically every section of the constituency I am unable to see any evidence that this majority will be reduced." That was a statement made by Fred Stork, the Liberal candidate, at the meeting here Thursday night. H. H. Silverthorne was chairman and the gathering took place in the Houston Hotel dining room. The Liberal candidate was given a good hearing on the tariff, railway and other questions of the day, and it was evident he will obtain good support here.

Mr. Stork discussed an article in the Interior News signed by J. B. Warner calling on him to ask for a new convention and taking exception to the convention which was held at Prince Rupert and in which the Omicron riding was represented. Mr. Stork said that due notice of the convention had been sent to every district and two delegates from Smithers and one from Hazelton were present and also two proxies were held for the interior. At that time no other name than his was submitted. That was on July 12. Surely ample time had elapsed since then to bring this forward before. Only the day before Mr. Warner left for the south Mr. Stork said he had conversed with him and nothing had then been said about this. He thought it did not look good. It was rather significant that this should be left over until the eleventh hour.

## CUNARD TO RUN WEEKLY STEAMSHIPS

Fine Service Canada to England  
Arranged for Next  
Spring.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 12.—The Cunard line of steamships announces that it will resume its Canadian service commencing with the steamship Albania on May 6 next between Montreal and London, followed by the Andania on May 13, and afterwards by the Tyrrhenia, Autonia and Ausonia, all new oil-burning steamers, giving a weekly service between Montreal and England. They will carry only two classes of passengers, cabin and steerage.

Putting on this fine fleet is something previously unknown in maritime history, operating a regular weekly service right from its inception and welding another strong link in the chain which ties the Dominions to the home land.

## INSANE FROM MUCH LIQUOR

Soldier Shot Companion at Halifax  
and Killed Self.

HALIFAX, Nov. 12.—Hearing two shots in rapid succession, soldiers forced an entrance into one of the barrack rooms and found Gunner Edward Raven dead and Gunner Thompson seriously wounded, both of the Royal Canadian Garrison Artillery. At the inquest held on the occurrence it was found that Raven had done the shooting while under the influence of liquor, which had made temporarily insane.

## Waterfront Whiffs

Doings of the Mosquito Fleet Which Is the Chief Source  
of Prince Rupert's Prosperity

The offices of the Admiralty Board, in the absence of the Admiral of the Mosquito Fleet, report that nothing of an untoward nature has taken place during the past week.

Thanksgiving Day passed off quietly although the crews of the fleet met with unqualified success in rustling up loose change and all were able to partake of a good Thanksgiving dinner befitting the occasion. The extremely bad weather experienced during the past week abated somewhat recently which has enabled the work of the fleet to proceed on something like normal lines.

Several of the crews have obtained permission from the Admiral to refit and clear from port on hunting and trapping expeditions, some of the crews having made provision to stay out for a long period. It is anticipated that there will be fair money in the trapping business this season. Last season the prices of the various furs fluctuated to such an extent, generally against the trapper, that very few took to the wilds to trap and as a consequence it gave the animals a chance to multiply to a degree, and this season it is expected the price of fur will advance over the prices offered last season. Anyway "taking a chance" is the slogan of the stout hearted men comprising the personnel of the Mosquito Fleet and, as already stated, the trapping is going to be the pastime of a goodly number during the coming season. It is reported that hunters of deer have not been disappointed and several parties have returned recently with their apportioned quota of the coveted animal.

The Kaien, Captain Jack Knutson, made port Wednesday last with a record catch of 23,000 pounds of halibut which was sold to the Royal Fish Company at 12.60 cents for the first class and 5 cents for second class fish. This constitutes one of the finest catches of fish ever landed at this port, taking into consideration the short time the boat was out, which was only three days.

The Sherman, Captain Woods, arrived in port Thursday morning with a catch of 7,000 pounds of halibut. Some pretty rough weather was encountered but other than preventing them getting a larger catch no damage was done.

The Birnie, Government Lighthouse tender, arrived in port on Saturday last, and left on her regular jaunts on Thursday.

The Bringgold, arrived in port on Wednesday afternoon with 1000 pounds of halibut.

There is marked activity in the vicinity of Cow Bay. The road work, undertaken by the Provincial Government, is well under way and a gang of men are already hard at it. The fact that the work has been started with some vim is very gratifying to the workers around the bay.

The Provincial Capt. A. Swanson, returned from Surf Inlet on Sunday last, to which point he had been with a hunting party. Good sport was the order of the day and each gun was responsible for a trophy of the chase.

The fish smoking plant of the Shrubshall interests has been handicapped this week by the absence of the managing director, Bill Shrubshall, who has been

Among other items there is to be a championship clog dancing exhibition, the winner to receive an extra large sized portion of clam chowder soup in which it is expected there will be a valuable pearl. During the function fried oolichans will be served without charge, and the nomination of a new cook is to take place. The gentleman previously responsible for the culinary department has recently received money from home and he is anxious to get out and spend it.

The Silvery Spray, Captain W.

Tayne, is outfitting at Cow Bay in preparation for a prolonged hunting and fishing expedition, and will be leaving port in the near future. Smith Inlet and Ocean Falls will be visited during the trip.

The Narbethong, Captain Freeman, has been absent from port on some sort of a secret mission. Members of the Mosquito Fleet report that the Narbethong left early Thursday morning throwing out a smoke screen and that it was impossible to see which way she headed.

The launch "Oh Baby," Captain Mylith Jones, is engaged in towing lumber up to Shawatlans Lake for the city.

Captain George Cook of the W. & F. has his boat in dry dock undergoing repairs.

The Wake, Captain Jack Beaufie, is under charter and having completely refitted is proceeding with a party to Smith Inlet, Ocean Falls and points south. George Place is acting as chief engineer on this trip.

The Beaver Cove, Captain Bud Corly, left port Thursday morning on a prospecting trip. Bud has evidently got something good in his sleeve as he is very reticent about his movements these days, and even with reporting to the Fleet Admiralty offices.

The Molly May, Captain March, has completed her repairs, and is leaving for the deep sea fishing grounds on Monday next. Now that her somewhat extensive repairs are completed the Molly May is a snappy looking craft and will doubtless give a good account of herself.

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## DOCTOR URGES THAT NURSE BE APPOINTED

**Letter Received by School Board from H. E. Tremayne, Urging Action.**

At the meeting of the school board on Thursday night a letter from Dr. H. E. Tremayne was read in which it was urged that a school nurse be appointed. The letter follows:

Gentlemen: "I have the honor to present to you the advisability of the appointment of a school nurse."

This appointment would make the present system of Medical Examination of School children of some value instead of at present being more or less of a routine procedure. As it stands now I can only report to the parents of the child that some attention is required as for instance adenoids, tonsils or teeth may need attention but there is no way in which this can be followed up. In many cases the parents do have these things looked after, but in others either for financial reasons, lack of interest, etc., nothing is done, and time after time it is noted on the medical cards, that the child is deficient in one of these ways.

"With a nurse as a permanent official, things would be very different... She would be able to follow up all these children who need attention, and convince their parents that it is in the interest of the child's welfare they should be attended to. She would be able to find out what reason was given for not giving them the attention required, and if it was financial, could make arrangements whereby the proper attention could be procured without a large outlay."

**The Answer.**

**GLACIER RECEDES AT STEWART RECENTLY**

During the recent floods Ben Lawrence was doing assessment work on his property up Glacier Creek, and during that time about 100 yards of the glacier broke off and fell into the creek, damming it up for a whole day, says the Portland Canal News. Mr. Lawrence says that some of the pieces were at least 50 feet thick. This glacier is receding very fast, even under normal conditions. Places that were all ice ten years ago are now open rocks and mountain side. This glacier, in this regard, is like all others in the district.
