Disarmament Scheme Proposed By United States Secretary of State Hughes Is Radical

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The armaments conference yesterday and Secretary of State Hughes was appointed president, with Arthur J. Balfour, head of the British delegation, as secretary. President Hughes in the opening address presented American plans for the limitation of naval expansion. He declared of a naval holiday in which all shipbuilding should be abandoned and older ships of the present type scrapped. This was the keynote of the American proposal for general principles. The plan is as follows:

That all capital shipbuilding, either actual or projected, be abandoned.

That further reduction in the naval forces be made by scrapping certain older ships.

That in general regard should be had to existing naval armaments by the powers concerned.

That capital ship tonnage be a measurement of strength and a proportionate allowance of auxiliary craft be prescribed.

That the United States program would scrap all capital ships under construction, fifteen in number, and five older battleships. Great Britain would stop construction of her four new ships of Hood type and scrap all her second and first line battleships of the King George V. class.

That Japan would abandon plans for two battleships and four cruisers now yet laid down, and in addition would scrap all capital ships and four battle cruisers in process of construction and all ten of the pre-dreadnaughts and battleships of the old line.

That the tonnage proposed to be scrapped and abandoned would amount to 845,740 tons in the United States, 583,375, and Japan, 133,000 tons.

The conference has adjourned until Tuesday.

STEWART IS LIVELY CAMP

Pat Daly Says He Has a Second Premier in the New Alaska.

OTHER MINING ACTIVITY

According to D. B. Morkill, who is in the city today, Stewart looks as if it would very soon be a very lively camp. Pat Daly is again to the fore there. He bonded the New Alaska mine recently up the Salmon River about eleven miles from Stewart and is already making a very fine showing of ore. Pat claims he has found a second Premier mine.

The Big Missouri is not yet being operated, but the gangs of men are ready awaiting final instructions from the East.

The Premier train is about completed and will be in operation in about a month. They continue shipping increasing amounts of raw ore, concentrates and bullion.

Work is proceeding on the Silverado, and the Algonquin Company is negotiating with a view to again starting work on the Spider group, on which they spent a lot of money recently.

ORIENTAL ORDERS GIVE IMPETUS TO LUMBER BUSINESS

J. R. Stewart, auditor for the Government Liquor Control Board, who recently arrived from Victoria on Government business, has just returned to the city from Stewart and proceeded to eastern points as far as Fort George on this morning's train.

Mr. Stewart says that quite a number of the lumber camps on Vancouver Island have started up again, and will be working all the winter. The Victoria Lumber Company have taken on quite a number of men just recently, and will be occupied in logging and sawing all through the winter. The companies on the island have recently received quite a large order from lumber for Oriental shipment, hence the present activity.

STORK WELL RECEIVED

Addresses Meeting at Telkwa Last Night with O. C. Lawson Presiding.

TELKWA, Nov. 12.—Fred Stork had a good reception here last night at a meeting which he addressed and over which O. C. Lawson presided. The people here are looking forward to a change of Government.

KING'S SPEECH

LONDON, Nov. 12.—The King's speech proroguing Parliament called on all parties to forbear in the Irish differences and expressed hope for good results from both the Irish and disarmament conferences.

Parliament re-assembles on January 30 or earlier if there should be an emergency.

FIGHT TONIGHT.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Pete Herman of New Orleans who lost his title to Johnny Buff last September is to meet Roy Moore of St. Paul in a fifteen round bout here tonight.

Good progress is being made on the superstructure of the new Salmon Wharf. There are about twenty-five men employed, the majority of whom are local men, who are engaged at present in sawing timbers and framing trusses ready for erection.

John Toner announces a dance on Monday night in the Fishermen's Mugup when a new cook will be nominated. Several clog dance artists are expected to perform. This is for deep sea fishermen.

SAANICH WATER BONDS BRING BIG PRICE; \$100,000 ISSUE SOLD

VICTORIA, Nov. 12.—One hundred thousand dollars of Saanich bonds for the Gordon Head waterworks extension have been sold for 100.75, subject to the completion of necessary legal formalities. Reeve Watson announced. The bonds are 6 1/2 per cent. The names of the brokers purchasing the issue are being withheld until the formalities are completed.

LOUTET PEEVED

Writing Committee of the Legislature Expressing Dissatisfaction.

VICTORIA, Nov. 12.—President Jack Loutet of the Union of B. C. Municipalities writes the municipal committee of the legislature stating that the Union is dissatisfied with the provisions for municipalities revealed in the budget speech yesterday. He says they will present no more time this session, ostensibly for the relief of the Government at the expense of the inhabitants of the municipalities.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—The Conservatives have elected Victor Edmund for the Hornsey division. He was given a majority of 2016 over the independent Liberal.

Stork Sees No Change in Skeena Constituency since His 600 Majority in 1917

HOUSTON, Nov. 12.—"At the last election I had nearly six hundred majority from the home vote, and after visiting practically every section of the constituency I am unable to see any evidence that this majority will be reduced." That was a statement made by Fred Stork, the Liberal candidate, at the meeting here Thursday night. H. H. Silverthorne was chairman and the gathering took place in the Houston Hotel dining room. The Liberal candidate was given a good hearing on the tariff, railway and other questions of the day, and it was evident he will obtain good support here.

Mr. Stork discussed an article in the Interior News signed by F. B. Warner calling on him to ask for a new convention and taking exception to the convention which was held at Prince Rupert and in which the Omicron riding was represented. Mr. Stork said that due notice of the convention had been sent to every district and two delegates from Smithers and one from Hazelton were present and also two proxies were held for the interior. At that time no other name than his was submitted. That was on July 12. Surely ample time had elapsed since then to bring this forward before Mr. Warner left for the south. Mr. Stork said he had conversed with him and nothing had then been said about this. He thought it did not look good. It was rather significant that this should be left over until the eleventh hour.

CUNARD TO RUN WEEKLY STEAMSHIPS

Fine Service Canada to England Arranged for Next Spring.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 12.—The Cunard line of steamships announces that it will resume its Canadian service commencing with the steamship Albania on May 6 next between Montreal and London, followed by the Andania on May 13, and afterwards by the Tyrrenia, Autonia and Ausonia, all new oil-burning steamers, giving a weekly service between Montreal and England. They will carry only two classes of passengers, cabin and steerage.

Putting on this fine fleet is something previously unknown in maritime history, operating a regular weekly service right from its inception and welding another strong link in the chain which ties the Dominion to the home land.

MANY SUBJECTS BEFORE HOUSE

Unemployment is Discussed and Noeland's Resolutions Out of Order.

EIGHT HOUR DAY

VICTORIA, Nov. 12.—The Legislature spent most of Thursday discussing the Noeland's resolution asking that the Legislature give attention to unemployment.

Premier Oliver objected to that part of the Noeland's motion which suggested that a grant of a half million dollars be made to meet the unemployment problem, saying that the proposal was out of order unless advanced by the Government as under the rules of the House only the Government can initiate legislation involving the spending of money.

Hon. J. W. deB. Farris said the Dominion Government was in constant touch with the Provincial Government and showed a willingness to co-operate.

W. J. Bowser said the Government was extravagant in many other things and could not refuse to relieve unemployment.

INSANE FROM MUCH LIQUOR

Soldier Shot Companion at Halifax and Killed Self.

HALIFAX, Nov. 12.—Hearing two shots in rapid succession, soldiers forced an entrance into one of the barrack rooms and found Gunner Edward Raven dead and Gunner Thompson seriously wounded, both of the Royal Canadian Garrison Artillery. At the inquest held on the occurrence it was found that Raven had done the shooting while under the influence of liquor, which had made temporarily insane.

EXPECT SETTLEMENT OF IRISH QUESTION

LONDON, Nov. 12.—Although one or two newspapers express disappointment at the Ulster cabinet's rejection of the British Government plan for settlement of the Irish question, the London morning papers generally see no reasons to regard the situation as more serious or the hope for settlement as being lessened.

BOARD COMMERCE ACT WAS ILLEGAL

Nov. 12.—The Privy Council has found that the Board of Commerce and Industries and the Board of Trade in Canada Parliament in violation of the provisions of the Commerce Act in respect of property and civil rights.

POLITICAL SITUATION

Enthusiasm in Ontario for the Conservative Leader.

Nov. 12.—Outside of Ontario there are only three or four men in the East that the Conservatives are hopeful of winning. Both Mackenzie King and Cregar have been pouring out into the Conservative and this has put Mr. Cregar on the defensive. He has been flag-waving and tariff not getting him anywhere on an occasion.

Throughout Ontario Mr. Cregar has had a patient hearing and there has been little enthusiasm for his cause, and the opinion is that the Premier will have such a small following in election day that he will be a minister. It is prophesied that the Liberals will come very close to having a majority of the House and that they will get support of the agrarians, with Cregar in the cabinet.

IS RAGING AT SHAWNEE, OKLAHOMA

Nov. 12.—A four-million-dollar fire destroyed cotton warehouse here. The fire spread to Rock Island and ships at Shawnee, Oklahoma is still raging.

Fish Creek Mine at Stewart Making Good Showing Under Rapid Development of Owners

W. R. Tonkin, president and general manager of the Fish Creek Mining Company, arrived from Stewart yesterday, and has particular reason to be pleased with the success of their operations. Fifteen men have been working all summer in developing the property, and several shipments of high-grade silver-ore have been made to the Tacoma smelter. Work has been going on in the upper tunnel, where they have cut through a five-foot contact fissure vein carrying the same shoot of high-grade copper and steel galena ore as the surface. This vein was exposed by means of open cuts for a distance of 600 feet, which carried a shoot of high grade ore for the whole distance. A cross-cut tunnel was started in September in order that work could be carried on when the snow came. By this tunnel a vein at a depth of 58 feet has been tapped, after driving for 120 feet. The vein has a width of five feet, one third of the ore being of a sufficient grade to warrant shipment. The balance runs from \$30 to \$40 per ton. The walls are well defined there being an absolutely clean cleavage.

Sufficient supplies are on the ground to take care of the present crew during the winter, as from now on the work will be kept going continually. Work will be directed to drift in both ways on the vein, and it is the intention to sink a winze to a depth of at least 50 feet.

As soon as Mr. Tonkin returns to Seattle a hoist will be obtained and shipped to the property for this purpose. The drift for the East will gain additional depth on the vein of about 100 feet under the brow of the hill. As the ore is mined it will be sorted and that of a high grade nature will be sacked for shipment. With the advent of spring the snow becomes packed and double-ended sleds can be used to advantage.

Early in the coming year Mr. Tonkin expects to have the financial position of his company in such standing that compressor machinery can be installed and also a flotation plant. Past operations have been responsible for the accumulation of a large amount of second grade ore representing good money. There is on the dock at the

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Geraldine Farrar has brought a divorce action supplanting her husband's separation suit. Farrar's grounds for asking a divorce are unspecified. Lou Tellegen had alleged cruelty and desertion as grounds for separation.

John Hart Makes His Budget Speech Finances Healthy

VICTORIA, Nov. 12.—In presenting the budget speech to the Legislature yesterday afternoon Hon. John Hart, minister of finance, informed the members that while the province had heavy obligations to shoulder, the credit of British Columbia was still improving in the markets of the continent.

The total appropriations for 1920-1921 amounted to \$21,645,080.73 and the total expenditures on all accounts aggregated \$19,620,680.95, a net saving of \$2,018,399.78.

The total expenditure on current account was \$15,236,934.35, or \$17,667 greater than the revenue. The net debt of the province on March 31 last was \$39,530,003. Amounts borrowed since then brought the total funded debt up to \$61,851,436 against which the sinking funds had accumulated on November 1, 1921 to amount approximately to \$7,900,000, making a funded debt on that date of \$53,951,435. Temporary borrowings have, however, brought the net debt up to \$55,011,436.

FIRE DAMAGE IN ALBERTA INCREASES

Damage from fires in the province of Alberta is steadily increasing and the extent of this increase this year over last year averages over \$50,000 a month.

From figures of the fire insurance branch it is shown that for the first eight months of this year there have been ten deaths reported as a result of fires and four injured. The property damage for those eight months amounts to \$972,000, the high month being June with \$220,165 of property damage and three deaths.

Every month the big loss is in the number of dwellings burned and during the year the total number of homes which went up in smoke were 275. There were also twenty-one hotels burned, the epidemic in hotel burning being in May when nine were burned. There were eleven elevators burned, eleven schools, and about 275 barns.

Taken by months, the loss by fires has been for January, 1921, \$94,412; for February, \$173,380; March, \$110,352; April, \$80,848; May, \$163,494; June, \$220,164; July, \$61,670; August, \$63,806.

G.W.V.A. BAND AT OPENING BASKETBALL

Three Games Tuesday Night, with Girls Opening at 7 O'clock.

The basketball season opens on Tuesday evening with three games that seem likely to prove of great interest. The G.W.V.A. band will be present and there will be a formal opening with one or two very short speeches. "Whereas there is considerable development and settlement along the road leading North from Terrace through the Kitsumkalum Valley," and

"Whereas we are informed that the said road is in a very dilapidated and impassable condition,

"Be It Resolved that the Executive of the Prince Rupert Liberal Association recommend to the Minister of Lands that the District Engineer be instructed to examine in loco said roads and that the necessary appropriation be made to put the said road in a good passable condition for the benefit of the settlers and any development work that may require its use."

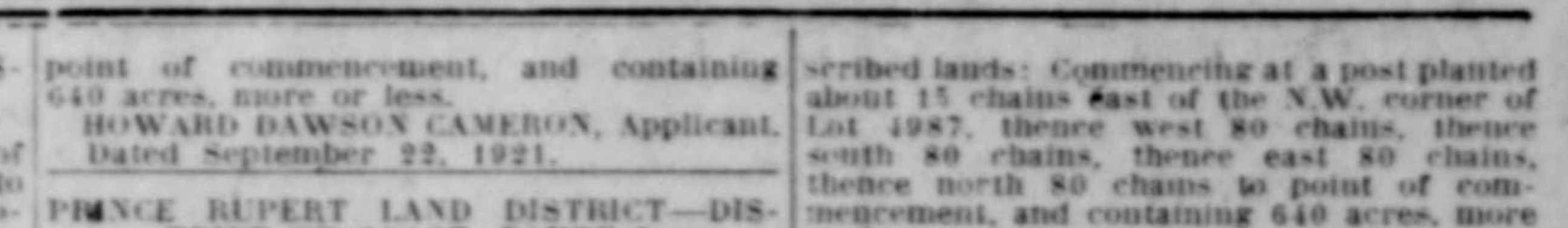

DOCTOR URGES THAT NURSE BE APPOINTED

Letter Received by School Board from H. E. Tremayne, Urging Action.

At the meeting of the school board on Thursday night a letter from Dr. H. E. Tremayne was read in which it was urged that a school nurse be appointed. The letter follows:

Gentlemen: "I have the honor to present to you the advisability of the appointment of a school nurse. This appointment would make the present system of Medical Examination of School children of some value instead of at present being more or less of a routine procedure. As it stands now I can only report to the parents of the child that some attention is required as for instance adenoids, tonsils or teeth may need attention but there is no way in which this can be followed up. In many cases the parents do have these things looked after, but in others either for financial reasons, lack of interest, etc, nothing is done, and time after time it is noted on the medical cards, that the child is deficient in one of these ways."

"With a nurse as a permanent official, things would be very different. She would be able to follow up all these children who need attention, and convince their parents that it is in the interest of the child's welfare they should be attended to. She would be able to find out what reason was given for not giving them the attention required, and if it was financial, could make arrangements where, by the proper attention could be secured without a large outlay. "A nurse would also be of the greatest service in the early recognition of infectious diseases amongst the children. She would be present at several schools daily, and the teachers could refer to her at any time any child who seemed at all ill. "It is impossible to state the many ways that a nurse would be of service but I can only say, that such an appointment would enhance the value of medical examination of children manifold, and I would respectfully recommend that such an appointment be made."

During the recent floods Ben Lawrence was doing assessment work on his property up Glacier Creek, and during that time about 100 yards of the glacier broke off and fell into the creek, damming it up for a whole day, says the Portland Canal News. Mr. Lawrence says that some of the pieces were at least 50 feet thick. This glacier is receding very fast, even under normal conditions. Pieces that were all ice ten years ago are now upon rocks and mountain side. This glacier, in this regard, is like all others in the district.

ASKS A QUESTION?

Editor Daily News: I noticed in a recent issue of your paper that your staff it was quite right to ask questions, so here goes:

As a strong Liberal newspaper the Daily News keeps telling us in almost every edition as news and editorially that Mackenzie King is going to be the next Premier of Canada, and that being the case we must vote for Fred Stork and send him to Ottawa as our representative, as he belongs to the Mackenzie King party. If we don't—well, this northern section of B. C. will be "out of luck."

Question—All right, Mr. Editor, now suppose Fred Stork is elected for this constituency and then again suppose that the Meighen or Greer party goes into office at Ottawa. (One case is just as possible as the other) what will be the position of Prince Rupert and district in a case like that?

Before answering my question just bear in mind that Fred Stork is unknown at Ottawa, whereas Col. Peck is a highly respected man at Ottawa by all sides of the House, not only as a soldier but as a fighter for the right of northern B. C. and I heard Mackenzie King, the Liberal leader say so in the Westholme Theatre at Prince Rupert some months ago.

J. MYHILL-JONES. The Answer. In answering Mr. Myhill Jones it must be remembered that the editor of the Daily News is not a candidate in this election and anything he may say does not commit the Liberal candidate, although the News, as is suggested, is supporting Mr. Stork.

Colonel Peck declared at recent theatre meeting that he had broken with the Meighen administration on two points. His supporters, when talking for the public, say he is not a supporter of the Meighen administration, but when they are talking in private they acknowledge that it is because he is against the Liberals that they are supporting him. Some of the wives of local Conservatives are very outspoken in regard to this. They consider that in voting for Colonel Peck they are voting for a supporter of the Meighen administration. From Mr. Myhill Jones' question it looks as if he expected his party, the Conservatives, to be returned and Colonel Peck as one of them.

In the case of the return of the Meighenites or Greerites to power, a most remote contingency, Prince Rupert could not get any worse treatment than she has been getting during the past few years with Colonel Peck as the representative. We do not doubt Colonel Peck when he says he worked for the constituency, but his efforts did not bring much fruit. He failed because he was backing the wrong party.

CAPTAIN FREEMAN AGAIN

Editor Daily News: In answer to Mr. Clarke in today's News, would like to call attention to the fact that Col. Peck is the candidate, not myself, also I am not a Conservative, having resigned early this year, I am a Canadian. Both the editor and Mr. Clarke fail to get the point that a good workman does not work for the money alone, Col. Peck has received his salary, but in my estimation he is entitled to our approbation for work well done. Our ballots are the best method of expressing our appreciation.

Re your statement that Mr. Duff brought the fish car question before the house, will state that he did so at Col. Peck's request. You yourself believed Mr. Reid when he promised the cars, not once but twice. Being honorable men both you and Col. Peck did not think for a minute that Mr. Reid would deliberately deceive us, until Mr. Reid was proven false. Col. Peck deserves commendation for the use of diplomacy in a difficult situation.

MUCH PILFERING ON NATIONAL RAILWAY AT EDMONTON YARDS

For a long time the company officials were at a loss to know what was becoming of the freight as the cars coming into the yards and going out to their destination always appeared to be in perfect order; the seals not showing any signs of having been tampered with.

That someone had found a way to counterfeited the seals was discovered by accident as it were. A part of hunters looking for chicken in the bushes adjacent to the city stumbled across a quantity of shoes and other articles and a number of freight car seals and reporting to the C.T.P. authorities the cue was given to the detectives who have since rounded up a number of suspects.

Company officials state that the loss from the thefts amounts to \$25,000 to \$30,000 and that as a result shippers in R. C. are beginning to ship by other lines.

PREMIER OLIVER GETS GIRL OUT OF JAIL TO CARE FOR BABY

VICTORIA, Nov. 12.—Gladys Neff, 21 years of age, found life hard in Vancouver and succumbed to the temptation to make easy money with which to feed and clothe herself and her little baby boy selling liquor quietly.

She found this more congenial and profitable than working in a store or in a factory, until the police brought her before Magistrate Shaw one day and she was sentenced to six months in jail. That was on September 6.

When she went to jail, however, there was no one left to look after the baby.

When Premier Oliver learned of the baby's plight he immediately took steps to get Gladys Neff out and had the Government pass an order-in-council remitting the balance of her sentence. She has been in jail nearly two months.

Magistrate Shaw and the city prosecutor of Vancouver both told the Premier that they had investigated the case of the mother and her baby and found that the baby needs its mother's attention. They said they thought the mother should be released from jail so that the baby would not suffer any unnecessary hardship.
