# Good Hope of Starting Steel Plant

## WORK AT SHIPYARD STARTED AGAIN THIS MORNING; MORE MEN EMPLOYED

### Mackenzie Pleads for Soldiers' Beer

Key Wants Legislature to Approve Commissioners under new Act; Duncan Favors Another Method and No Prescriptions

VICTORIA, March 3.—Unless the returned soldier clubs are allowed to sell beer under the Government control measure they will be driven out of existence and the splendid work they have been carrying on will be stopped, declared Capt. Ian Mackenzie, moving on the liquor bill in the Legislature yesterday. He was serving as a director of the Moderation League and representing practically all the returned soldiers' organizations in the province.

The returned soldier representatives visited the Parliament today and presented all the members with a copy of "the clause," which they inserted in the bill.

The clause proposes a special license to authorize vendors to sell beer in incorporated clubs. In his speech Capt. Mackenzie went with the Moderation resolution asking that it be sold by the glass during hours in approved establishe... where meals are served. Pooley of Esquimalt, however, asked that the names of the proposed members be submitted to the Legislature for their approval of the bill. He favored the question of appointment of three men on the commission, not

with Duncan of Cowichan, but said he thought the whole a good one. He favored the nomination of the election by the moderation exhibition parties and the League. He also urged abolition of prescriptions.

### TWENTY PER CENT ARE IDLE

Shipbuilders Have No More Contracts in England, Says London Paper.

LONDON, March 3.—Almost twenty per cent of the shipbuilding berths in England are vacant and the shipbuilders have no contracts on hand, says the Morning Post. Twice as many orders have been cancelled as have been placed.

### WALLACES LAUNCHING VESSEL AT VANCOUVER

Canadian Skirmisher will Take Water on St. Patrick's Day—Miss Langford Sponsor

NORTH VANCOUVER, Mar. 3.—St. Patrick's Day, March 17, has been chosen as the date for the launching of the steel freighter, Canadian Skirmisher, being built by Wallace's here for the Canadian Government merchant marine services.

Miss Dorothy Langford, charming Vancouver society girl and niece of F. W. Peters, G.P.R. superintendent, and who danced with the Prince of Wales during his visit here last summer, will sponsor the launching.

The Skirmisher is the sixth similar vessel built for the Canadian Government and completes the Wallace contract.

### Steel Works Proposal Looks Very Good to Local Expert

A. C. Garde Tells J. C. Gavigan to Bring Message of Encouragement to People of Prince Rupert; Site Proposed is Near Port Edward

"Tell the people in Prince Rupert that everything looks favorable for the establishment of a smelter on Kaien Island near Prince Rupert," said A. C. Garde to J. C. Gavigan at Victoria a day or two ago. Mr. Gavigan was in Victoria, Vancouver and Seattle on a buying trip in connection with the Rupert Table Supply when he met Mr. Garde in Victoria fairly bubbling over with the apparent success of the smelter proposition which he had been taking up with the recently formed iron and steel company and also with the Government.

Mr. Garde said the Provincial Government had promised a suitable piece of land near Port Edward for a site and the whole scheme had been laid before the promoter of the steel enterprise with the result that they said it was the best proposal that had been made to them so far. They left on Saturday for England where the whole scheme will be laid before the old country capitalists who were men and possibly developing the Copper River coal field which has a good coking coal. Magnétite would be secured from one or more of the big deposits in the neighborhood, possibly Porcher Island.

The company that was incorporated last November is known as the Coast Range Steel Company, capitalized at \$15,000,000, with head office at Vancouver. The provisional directors at the time of incorporation included John D. Kearns, L. J. Landal, Ma-

jor Moore, A. T. Congdon and G. Stora of New York.

London engineers have been on the coast investigating the possibilities and it was announced in November that the investigations would take 90 days at least to complete. These have now been made and the engineers and promoters are on their way to England to lay their whole scheme before the principals. Some further investigations and tests will be necessary before any definite work can begin, and it is just possible that it may be decided to establish the works on Vancouver Island or the lower mainland, but Mr. Garde is confident that his proposal is better than any of the others and the engineers and promoters admit that it is the best they have yet received.

Consequently he is very much enthused over the possibility of success.

### MORGAN'S DOG TEAM WON DERBY

Delayed by Blizzards Time Took to Cover 200 Miles was Nearly Thirty-four Hours.

THE PAS, March 3.—C. B. Morgan's dog team won the dog Derby yesterday, the time taken to cover the two hundred miles with a sled was 32 hours, 50 minutes. The rest of the entries were far behind.

Blizzards were encountered on the trip, making the going very hard and uncertain.

### Work Resumed in Local Shipyards

Whistle Blew This Morning for First Time in Months; Number of Men Being Put to Work

With the welcome blast of the whistle at 8 o'clock this morning, shipbuilding operations were again resumed at the local dry dock after the long tie up following the failure of the Newman Erb contract. The new Wallace contract for the completion of the two Canadian Government merchant marine ships that have lain idle all winter is at last under way and men are being taken on today as they apply for work at the gates of the yard. Up to noon 75 men had been started and more are being taken on steadily. A start was made under instructions from J. A. Butt and J. B. Boudreau, representing the Dominion government, and final instructions from the head officials of the Wallace Shipyards at Vancouver are expected at any time.

Speaking to the News this morning, Hubert A. Wallace, director, stated that although things were now definitely started, work would have to be resumed slowly and it would be a few days before work was in full swing. The opening up of the power house and other details will await the receipt of further instructions from the Vancouver office.

### PRINCE ALBERT REPAIRS DONE

Leaves for Stewart at Ten O'clock This Evening—Fearful is Out

The Prince Albert was discharged from the local dry dock this morning, her annual overhaul now being complete. The Prince John was also at the dock transferring her cargo for Stewart to the Prince Albert. The latter vessel sailed at one o'clock for the island and the Albert goes tonight at ten o'clock to Stewart.

Extensive repairs to the tug Fearful, engaged in towing sand from McNicholl Creek to the new ocean dock are also complete and that vessel was also discharged.

#### GLASS WORKS FIRE

Financial Loss from Glass Works Burning was \$700,000.

BALTIMORE, Ohio, March 3.—A tank filled with molten glass burst and started a fire which destroyed the Gorschuk glass plant, the loss amounting to approximately \$700,000.

### Horrible Condition in Siberia is Described

Lieut.-Colonel Young, Red Cross Commissioner, Just to Canada after Two Years Spent in Country

VANCOUVER, March 3.—Describing conditions in Siberia as appalling, Lieut.-Col. Douglas Young, commissioner for the Red Cross Society in Russia, is here en route to Ottawa following two years' work in that country.

Colonel Young declared that all Russians, irrespective of their political sympathies, acquired an immense respect for Canada. He recalled incidents which served to tell the horror which had overwhelmed Russia. On one of his journeys he brought relief to a train load of people, whom he found lying in tiers of three along the cars, reduced to such a condition through want of medicine and surgical appliances that they were operating on themselves and each other with kitchen knives without any anesthetics.

Typhus was devastating Siberia, Colonel Young said, and glanders. If a man developed glanders he was shot because the disease was so infectious.

SOLID FIVE  
DO GOOD WORK

Bringing Resources of North Before People of Southern B.C.

VICTORIA, Mar. 3.—(Special by Mail)—More has been accomplished in the interests of the northern half of British Columbia through the work of the government's "Solid Five" in the present Legislature than is seen on the surface. Hon. T. D. Patullo, minister of lands and member for Prince Rupert; Hon. A. M. Manson, Speaker of the Legislature and member for Omineca; Bert Kergin, of Atlin; Harry G. Perry, of Fort George, and John A. Yorston, of Cariboo, are bringing repeatedly before the other members the tremendous wealth of the northern districts, pointing out the climatic advantages, the riches of forest, sea, mine and farm and fostering and developing an interest in that part of British Columbia which promises to ensure greater government assistance during this and coming years.

## Concerted Effort

With the session scarcely "down to business," little of a constructive nature has been accomplished, but the northern members are working hard in the interest of their ridings. There is a concerted effort noticeable this year which has not been in evidence heretofore and it promises to bear good fruit. The completion of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway to Prince George has been provided for, through the introduction of a bill by the minister of finance to borrow four million dollars for that purpose.

## Progress Loans

Agricultural development will receive greater support from the government than in the past, and the lands of the Skeena, Bulkley, Nechako and Fraser Valleys will be developed through government assistance. The minister of agriculture, Hon. E. D. Barrow, is completing plans for a system of "progress loans," which will be available for all classes of settlers. Under the supervision of the provincial land settlement board, sellers who have secured farms and commenced their development may acquire financial aid from the government sufficient to enable them to go ahead with

## WAR RELIC

## Capt. Hersey Presents Interesting Token to Montreal Regiment

MONTREAL, Mar. 3.—A war relic that will be highly prized has been presented to the officers' mess of the Royal Montreal Regiment by Capt. A. C. Hersey, of the Canadian Grenadier Guards. It is a brass plate, fashioned from the case of a three-inch shell and inscribed with the names of 120 officers and men of this regiment which had been affixed to a memorial cross erected by the R.M.R. to its heroic dead in the Tara Hill Cemetery on the Somme. The plate was carved by one of the battalion's N.C.O.'s who had survived the engagement in which the others were killed.

Capt. Hersey, with his wife, was in France last year on his honeymoon, and visited the battlefields of the Somme, where he had also served. During his tour he went through the cemetery at Tara Hill and saw the memorial cross. After erection this had been subjected more than once to enemy shell fire, of which it now showed numerous traces. Capt. Hersey noticed that the plate was missing.

On walking round the cross, however, he found the plate some distance away, scarred by the shell fragments that had torn it away from the cross and which had also deeply scarred the cross itself. Capt. Hersey took a photograph of the cross, denuded of its plate and with its marks of shell fire, and brought the plate itself with its tragic inscription back to Canada. This he presented, with a reproduction of the photograph of the cross, artistically framed in a mahogany case, to the officers' mess of the Royal Montreal Regiment.




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## B.C. BEST SPOT ON CONTINENT



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


## ARISTOCRATS PEEL POTATOES

Mme. Lubinoff Organized Group to  
Cut Wood and Perform Other  
Tasks

WARSAW, Mar. 3.—Driven from palace to hovel, some of the members of the aristocracy of old Russia now are peeling potatoes or chopping wood here for a living.

Five thousand men and women and children, some of whose residing titles once brought them homage of courtiers, are clustered here, after having fled to Poland before the Bolsheviks. Helping them to help themselves is Mme. Ludmila Lubinoff, herself a refugee, though born a princess of one of the old Russian houses and the wife of the civil governor of Warsaw.

This remarkable woman is conducting soup kitchens, sewing rooms and workshops for members of her unhappy class and taking orders from her art men who once commanded the armed forces of the Russian Emperor. On her staff are admirals, generals, governors, mayors and members of the old Petrograd court, while her husband has laid aside his gubernatorial duties to become her secretary.

### Hides Tragedy

A beautiful woman, she hides the tragedy of her life under an assumed name that is an example to the unhappy folk to whom she ministers. A woman of action, too, for she escaped from Petrograd with her two sons after freeing her husband from the fortress of Peter and Paul and arming him with a fictitious passport that enabled him to flee to Warsaw. Here the family was reunited.

Selling virtually all she possessed to aid her fellow countrymen, Mme. Lubinoff organized the Warsaw branch of the Russian Red Cross, which is being aided by the American organization.

Sparing not herself, Madame Lubinoff has not spared the perils of refugees, which included a raid on the former Russian Guards who collapse from exhaustion while waiting for their food yard which she has established in a Russian orthodox church at 5 Podwala—a squallid property placed at her disposal.
