BRITAIN PROPOSED CANCEL INTER-ALLIED DEBT

EXPORTS TO U.S. LAST YEAR FROM THIS PORT SHOWED LARGE INCREASE

Austin Chamberlain Says It Was Proposed to Cancel All Allied War Debts but Refused

Washington Officials Claim Suggestion was Considered to be Unofficial and therefore Not Officially Considered by United States

BIRMINGHAM, February 5.—Austin Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, in a speech to his constituents last evening, said the British Government had formally proposed the cancellation of all inter-allied debts, but the proposal was unacceptable to the American Government. He thought to make them again would be beneath the dignity of their country and would render them liable to misconception of motive.

Mr. Hays had been ill for some time. In the autumn he and Mrs. Hays decided to go to California for the winter, returning here in the spring. G. P. Tinker was left in charge of the business here.

The late Mr. Hays was a native of Iowa. He came to Kai-n Island during the summer of 1904 and has remained here ever since. For several years he was the personal representative of his brother, the late Charles M. Hays, but was not in any way connected with the railway.

Mr. Hays was the sole agent for the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Co. in Prince Rupert and conducted the sale of the company's property in the early days of the townsite. Until the time of his death he was interested in the real estate business and also had property interests here.

Secret Service Agents have Unearthed Plot in London

Scheme to Blow Up Old Scotland Yard Recruiting Station Failed through Lack of Courage of Conspirators

LONDON, February 5.—The Daily Graphic says that secret service agents have unearthed a plot to blow up old Scotland Yard, now being used as a recruiting depot for the Royal Irish Constabulary.

The plot, it is stated, was for the conspirators to pose as recruits and leave their coats, in the pockets of which powerful bombs were to be concealed. The coats would be hung up in the building.

The only reason for the failure of the plot seems to have been that the courage of the plotters failed them at the last moment.

BACKS PECK BY KLAMATH IS ON A ROCK

Board of Trade Passes Resolution At Meeting Last Night Regarding G. T. P. Officials.

At the regular meeting of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade held in the city council chamber last night, W. E. Williams presiding, a motion by C. H. Orme seconded by J. F. Maguire, but with G. A. McNicholl dissenting, was passed as follows:

"Whereas at the last regular meeting of the Board of Trade Colonel G. W. Peck named some of the enemies of Prince Rupert, this board hereby goes on record as endorsing his remarks and believes that the situation is as he has stated. We know that these gentlemen mentioned are not in sympathy in any manner with this port and we believe it would be in the best interest of Prince Rupert and the Canadian National Railway Co. if they were removed from their positions so that they would not be subjected to the inconveniences and hardships continuous on sojourning in this city whenever it is necessary to visit here."

TRIED TO ESCAPE BY SWIMMING THE RIVER

MONTREAL, Feb. 5.—John Clargo, eighteen years of age, of Vancouver, and a companion were rescued from the St. Lawrence River at Dorval after an attempt at escape from the police. He had been arrested on a charge of burglary and was trying to swim across.

Exports in Excess of Previous Year

Prince Rupert Sent to United States Million and Quarter Dollars Worth of Goods More than in 1919

Official figures prepared by the American Consulate and supplied to the Daily News through the courtesy of E. A. Wakefield, American Consul, show an increase in the value of exports to the United States from this port for the year 1920 to be about a million and a quarter dollars greater than for the previous year.

While the quantity of halibut and salmon was greater last year than for the year before, the value was less, due to the lower prices. Following are the figures:

Much Regret at Passing of Mr. Hays.

The death of David H. Hays, news of which has been received here today, will be deeply regretted by all who knew him in this city. He was a man of sterling character, always bright and cheerful and intensely optimistic. His opinion was often sought and always considered with respect. In his death Prince Rupert loses one of her best citizens.

Small Places are Prone to Rumors.

A small place is very much given to spreading rumors and often the slightest hint is magnified into something real. Prince Rupert in this respect is still in the village condition. Start a rumor and it flies around the city like wildfire. Everybody is interested in everybody else and the result is that gossip is very prevalent. Very often great injuries are done to people by means of malicious rumors. Business is injured for others and there are all sorts of complications caused because rumors are sometimes construed as fact.

Splendid Work of Local Academy.

The work done by the good ladies of St. Joseph's Academy in educating the young people of the city, training them both in useful work and in the arts, is well recognized by everyone. The musical recital, an account of which was given yesterday in these columns, gives some idea of the work of love which these splendid women perform. Many a girl will look back to the inspiration she received at St. Joseph's as the starting point in her career. It is a great work and the Daily News is glad to be able to add its quota of praise to that of others who know more intimately of the work being done there.

Better Condition in Few Months.

The general opinion in business circles, which are likely to be well informed, is that by late spring or early summer there will be an improvement in general business. Already there are signs that the worst may be past. There will undoubtedly be lower prices in a few lines, but on the whole it may be said that there is likely to be greater stability from this time on. Any downward price movements will be slow after this.

All reports from the east are that a better and more hopeful spirit prevails. Factories are clearing off their surplus stock and are preparing to reopen and many have already reopened. Some did not close but simply reduced the output.

The unemployment situation is still bad, but there will be busier times in the very near future. The slump has hit a good many people hard, but most of the business people of Prince Rupert are in fairly good financial condition and there is likely to be less disturbance to business here than in most places.

Proposal Was Made To Cancel War Debts.

The British Chancellor of the Exchequer says there was a proposal made to the American Government to cancel all war debts. All were fighting for the same cause and the British gave of the manhood and womanhood of the country to an extent unknown in the United States. They bore the brunt of the fighting for years before the Americans came in and the least that country could now do would be to help pay the financial debt. The debt of blood can never be paid.

NEW YORKERS ON BIG FIGHT

Say Canadians Trying to Snatch Great American Industry

THOUSANDS SAVING TO WITNESS BATTLE

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—The negotiations now under way between Tex Rickard and C. F. Graham, of Montreal, regarding the staging of the Dempsey-Carpentier bout in the Canadian city have been the subject of a good deal of comment in the New York papers. The majority of local sports writers express the view that Rickard will not definitely accept the proposition which has been put up to him by the Montreal promoters, at least until he has exhausted every effort to make it possible to hold the fight in New York. Meanwhile Rickard's negotiations with Mr. Graham and his associates have aroused widespread interest in Montreal's possibilities as a battleground for the fistie stars and the advantages which the Quebec city would offer to those who find the Volstead type of beverages not entirely to their taste.

The New York Times in a re-posal to hold the big fight in cent editorial linked up the pro-Montreal in a jocular vein with the Fordney Emergency Tariff Bill which would exclude Canadian wheat from the United States by imposing a prohibitive tariff. This article, which was headed, "Our Lady of the Blows," declared that the Fordney bill has "stirred some of our Canadian friends into natural threats of commercial retaliation."

Snatch Great Industry

"If we won't let their stuff come in, they'll keep ours out, snap their fingers at geography, and buy of the British manufacturer," continues the Times. "Now Canadian enterprise seeks to snatch from us a great national and international industry. The commercial exchange of thumps between John Dempsey, the American hero, and Georges Carpentier, the paladin of Gaul, is to be transferred to Dominion soil if the Northern grangers of America exportation of these heavyweights can trade have their way. The means heavyweight finance. The romantic sum of \$700,000 is said to be the consideration. If the two egregious strikers ever do collide in Canada, what an amount of American money will go from here to there!"

Thousands Saving

"Thousands of citizens are saving, no doubt some will even go so far as to steal, money for the purpose of witnessing the most expensive transaction in the history of slugging. There have been plenty of great fighters. To none has so lofty a financial program been offered. The price of a seat is a week's wages to the salaried. Who can calculate the amount of hotel bills, the hire of taxis, the wild American plunge into the sea of Scotch? Who can reckon the mighty aggregate of American assets that will be lost to the United States. The exportation of this memorable 'mill' may have a notable effect on Canadian exchange. Yet nobody raises a finger to protect our home industry, Dempsey the huge. Nobody thinks of grabbing Carpentier, an imported industry to be fostered here, and of detaining the fat profits that might be made from his labors in the home market. With an edifying altruism, Americans will watch the removal, if it takes place, of these two great sources of wealth, play joyfully at the new game of enrich instead of beggar your neighbor and await with satisfaction and relief the interplay of battering 'dukes.'"

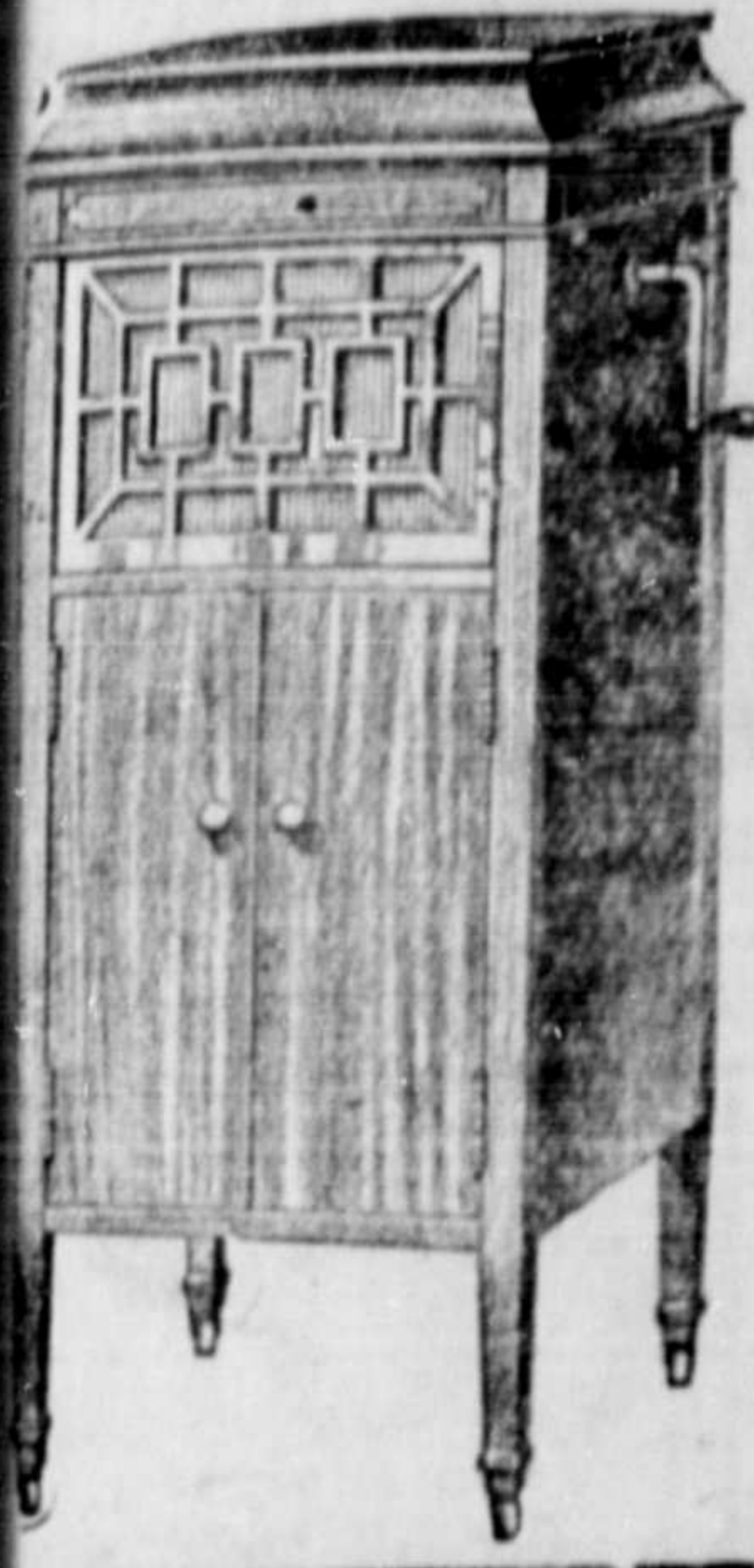

JAZZ IS DEAD IN ENGLAND AT LAST, REQUIESCAT PACE

LONDON, Feb. 5.—The "jazz" is dead in London, says P. J. S. Richardson, one of the foremost English authorities on dancing. He declares that no "new" dances will be popularized this year, but the fox-trot, one-step and tango, which have held international interest for two or three seasons, will be standardized.

"Previously those taught the same dances by different teachers found themselves hopelessly at sea when they tried to dance together," he said. "Through standardization, on which the majority of dancing instructors in London have now agreed, a common framework in the steps will be insured without eliminating all chance of introducing individual variations. Freakish and eccentric 'light gymnastic' such as exaggerated forms of 'jazz' are rapidly passing out."

The King's several brothers are also heartily disliked in Venizelist circles, for they never miss an opportunity for making disparaging remarks about the Cretan statesman, thanks to whose astute diplomacy Greek territory was extended to its present frontiers.

Queen Sophie's motherly instincts, however, got the better of royal blood prejudices and she received her morganatic daughter-in-law with open arms. Alexander was Queen Sophie's favorite son.

Queen Sophie has given orders for the employment of an English first-class nurse in preparation for the birth of Mme. Manos' child.

BOARD JOINS CONFEDERATION

A. C. Garde, T. H. Johnson and E. F. Doby Asked to Represent Local Businessmen at Vancouver.

LIVE RESOLUTIONS TO BE FORWARDED

The Board of Trade at its meeting last night decided to affiliate with the Associated Boards of Trade of B.C. and appointed A. C. Garde, E. F. Doby and T. H. Johnson, who are just now in Vancouver, as delegates to attend the convention next week.

Resolutions will be forwarded endorsing the scheme of provincial aid to trunk roads and asking that a road to connect Prince Rupert with the interior be included in the general policy.

The principle of open ports was also endorsed and a request that Prince Rupert be made one of the open ports on this coast will be asked.

The convention will be asked to endorse the demand of Prince Rupert for sufficient fish cars to handle the traffic and ask that pressure be brought to bear on the Dominion Government to provide them.

SECURE INFORMATION THROUGH PARLIAMENT REGARDING RAILWAY

That is Proposal of the Board of Trade in Regard to Cost of Operating.

In connection with a refusal of General Manager Warren of the Canadian National Railway to give the Board figures showing the cost of operation per mile of the road and also the income derived from the road, the matter will be taken up further by the committee and possibly questions in regard to the same will be asked in the House of Commons at the forthcoming session.

G. W. Nickerson in discussing it said he thought Col. Peck would secure the figures they asked on the floor of the House. It was rumored that the "railway" company was operating the road and the officials did not know what was the cost. He thought it would put them in bad if they stated publicly that they did not know.

UNEMPLOYED MEETING

Mayor and Some of the Aldermen Been Asked to Attend Sunday Meeting

A mass meeting of the unemployed has been called by their committee for Sunday night in the McIntyre Hall for the purpose of considering the local situation.

Mayor Rochester has been asked to speak and Aldermen Kerr and Silversides are also asked to be present.

Mrs. M. A. Burbank will arrive from the south on Wednesday to join her husband who is in the city at the present time in the C. N. R. engineering department. Mr. and Mrs. Burbank were wedded last Monday in Vancouver after an acquaintance of little more than 24 hours, the bride having been Miss Monica Page, of Regina.

M. P. McCaffery moved that a telegram be sent to President Hanna in regard to the matter.

G. W. Nickerson: "I think Mr. Hanna said when he was here that the boats would not be taken off this run."

Dave Thomson: "Oh, they say anything when they are here!"

A protest against any such action will be made by the board.

WILL PROTEST LACK OF FISH CARS EVERY TIME IS SHORTAGE

The matter of fish cars was again discussed at the meeting of the Board of Trade last night. From the discussion it came out that about ten foreign cars are on their way here in addition to some of the Company's old cars. No new ones have yet been delivered.

The matter was left in the hands of the fisheries committee with power to act and on the understanding that every loss to the port through fishing boats having to go away would be promptly protested to Ottawa.

INCREASED FEE

Board of Trade Members Must Pay Little More and Pay Promptly.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade last night, the constitution of the organization was changed to provide for the payment of a fee of \$12 a year instead of ten by members in future, and further providing that members three months in arrears be given another three months notice and if they do not pay their dues they be dropped from the organization.

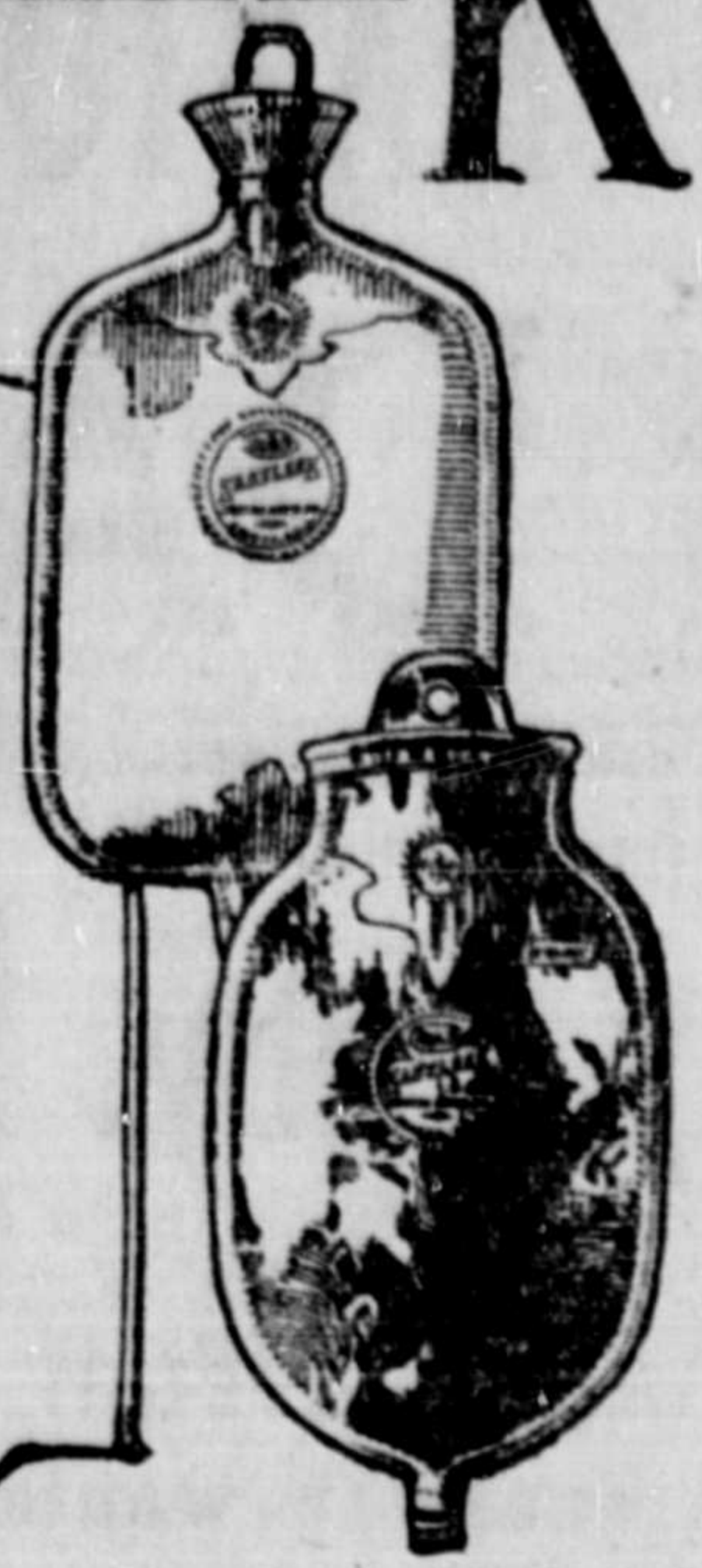

SOLDIERS' CHILDREN ARE TO BE EDUCATED AUSTRALIAN STATE

MELBOURNE, Feb. 5.—The Australian government has undertaken to educate the children of Australian soldiers killed or totally incapacitated in the world war. At least 12,000 children are expected to benefit.

The plan covers the whole range of the educational curriculum, in industrial, agricultural and professional courses, together, where necessary, with periods of apprenticeship and a subsidy by way of maintenance while undergoing such training. A fund of approximately \$6,500,000 is on hand, which includes a grant from the Federal Government of \$4,000,000 and a transfer from the Repatriation Trust Fund of approximately \$650,000. Large contributions are assured from other sources.

HATCHERY MAN OF ALASKA ON PROPAGATION

A. J. Sprague Says Only One Species Should Spawn in One Creek

In summing up the work of the Territorial Hatcheries for the year 1920, in regard to the planting of salmon streams and the observations made by the field force of the habits of the various species of salmon in the streams of Southeastern Alaska, A. J. Sprague, superintendent of U. S. Territorial Hatcheries, reached some interesting conclusions which he contributes in the following article:

"Owing to the extreme low water conditions the available spawning grounds were limited for spawning fish to seed the beds. On account of the low water conditions, the Chum, Humpy and Coho first runs were assisted wherever possible to reach the up-river beds, but little could be done except on the shallow gravel bars.

Loss of Eggs

"The fact is known somewhat to the general public that where more than one species of salmon use the same stream for spawning purposes a great and distinct loss of eggs takes place. The first run spawns and passes away while the next run digs up these same spawning beds and deposits in turn its eggs. If it were a condition whereby the eggs deposited by the first run had remained until the hatching period, no damage would have been done. This is not the case, however, as it is known that it takes from 40 to 100 days varying with the temperature of the water, before they are out and free from the gravel. On Duck, Knutsen, Auk Cove creek and other streams, a part of the second run of eggs were secured and ninety per cent of these will be returned to the strams and buried in the sand in the eyed stage. In addition to this some two million Humpy eggs were secured and will also be planted to build up this species of fish at the present time not found in some of these streams, such as Duck, Knutsen, Auk Lake, Fish Creek, Carlson, Cabin and Admiralty Island streams.

Salmon Trout

"Some interesting facts have been brought to light on such streams as have been raked and screened to prevent the ascent of salmon trout up with the spawning salmon to eat the salmon eggs. Salmon trout are found in salmon streams only during the spawning salmon season. I mean by this that they are by no means numerous, although the smaller size fish may be found. If we investigate a little we find by a wise provision of nature the young yearling salmon feed on the eggs and young of the salmon trout in streams. In other words, if there are no salmon trout there are no salmon. For under natural conditions where you find one you find the other. It is nature's way of distributing and balancing the food proposition in the water domain.

Hibernating

"I will also state that the larger Dolly Varden or Salmon Trout hibernates for the winter in salt water on short coast streams, but where large lakes are found on the larger streams they remain in the deep water lakes. "What will, I think, be an interesting experiment, will we hope soon take place, when we plant grayling taken from the streams of the interior in coast streams. This fish is in every way the equal of the trout, but is strictly a vegetarian fish and does not feed on salmon spawn. "All the above statements are made on actual experiments and are not based upon theories or suppositions."
