LONDON, April 29.—There is another deadlock in the miners' strike. The cabinet is considering another hour of daylight saving with a curfew in order to conserve the heat and light. The coal shortage is becoming serious, and the whole country is feeling the pinch.

The miners rejected the Government offer of a limited strike, claiming that the guarantee of wages offered is insufficient.

LONDON, April 29.—Conversations between the Earl of Derby and the Irish Sinn Fein will be resumed in a few days when the Earl returns to Ireland, the Times says. He will act as the accredited envoy of Premier Lloyd George.

BELFAST, April 29.—Cardinal Logue, speaking at Gloucester, warned the people against the commission of crimes. He said that many people both in Ireland and England were making every effort to establish peace and he knew it for a fact that if the people of Ireland would abandon crime they could obtain anything that was necessary for the country. The Irish republic would never be achieved, he said.

They will have only an hour in Prince Rupert unless arrangements are made with the railway company to hold the train while the dairymen take a drive around the city.

SUPREME COUNCIL MEETS TOMORROW TO DISCUSS THE SUBJECT OF REPARATIONS

WASHINGTON, April 29.—The views of the embassies connected with the Allies are all complete with the exception of those of Italy and Japan. America's reply may be delayed until after the meeting of the Supreme Council on Saturday.

It is understood that the Allies will submit that the Berlin proposals are unsatisfactory.

BERLIN, April 29.—The departure of Lord D'Abernon, the British ambassador to London, gives hope here that there is still a chance Britain may adjust the situation on the basis of the proposals.

It is hoped that Washington will ascertain from the Allies what portions of the proposals are unacceptable.

PARIS, April 29.—Premier Lloyd George says that Great Britain will consent to occupation of the Ruhr valley only after an ultimatum granting a certain amount of delay, it is said here.

PARIS, April 29.—Dr. Von Gertzen, head of the German war burdens commission, refused to attend a meeting of the reparations commission today for the determination of the time and methods of German payments.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—It is understood that Secretary House is still hopeful that negotiations between the Allies and Germany will be reopened. Even if the final discussion is not reached before the French begin to move into additional German territory, it is said the exchanges can continue thereafter.

KELLEY WILL SPEAK ABOUT GRAND TRUNK

To Submit Report on Dispute
Monday—Will be Some Plain

LONDON, April 29.—The financial editor of the Yorkshire Post says that there will be plain speaking on Monday when the shareholders of the Grand Trunk Railway meet to hear the report of President Howard Kelley on the dispute between the Canadian government and the management. The editor expresses the hope that no attempt will be made to hinder the transfer to the government.

U.S. TRADE IS FALLING OFF

Big Drop in Exports and Imports
to and from Europe

WASHINGTON, April 29.—American exports to Europe during March amounted to \$200,000,000 as against \$165,000,000 for March last year.

The imports for the same time amounted to \$77,000,000, against \$125,000,000 for March 1920.

Trade with South America also shows a very decided increase.

SEATTLE, April 29.—The production of 115 lumber mills connected with the West Coast Lumbermen's Association last week cut 53,000,000 feet, which is 33 per cent below normal.



HOW HOLD UP WAS EFFECTED

Huntley Tate and Bruce Bradford Told Story of Valorous Affair This Morning.

Evidence of Albert Brooks, the owner of the boat Valorous, Huntley Tate, taxi man, and Bruce Bradford, his assistant, was heard in the E. Michelson kidnapping case this morning and adjournment was made until Monday.

Brooks, in giving his evidence, stated that, although he was the owner of the boat Valorous, he had not known of her alleged trip to Prince Rupert in November. Michelson and Charles Melby had since lived on the boat and had been employed by him on a trip to Hyder. They had brought the boat to Prince Rupert recently with the intention of packing fresh fish from Cape Ormanay for the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co.

Tate recounted the incident of the delivering of the liquor to the garbage scow on November 25. Miller, Bradford and himself had been invited aboard to go to the G.T.P. wharf after delivery had been made. The witness and Bradford had been told to go into the pilot house and Miller had gone down to the engine room. They had not proceeded very far when a cry for help was heard from Miller. They rushed to his assistance but were met by a man with some weapon who ordered them to hold their hands out of the window. This they promptly did until they were let off in the skiff on Digby Island. Tate did not identify the men in the boat with the exception of Swanson, neither was he able to describe the boat.

In the Letter Box

COST OF WHITE SALMON

Editor, Daily News:

The cost of living is assuredly high in Prince Rupert and we fishermen could do a lot to remedy it—if you only allow us.

It is a shame to see the amount of white spring salmon which is dumped overboard here on the trolling grounds—good wholesome food wasted because the fisherman is expected to catch his fish clean and dress it, deliver it to the packer, and all for nothing.

Let me explain. A packer is employed by the fishermen to market their catch in Prince Rupert. He has to provide a boat, ice, etc., and makes the very reasonable charge of two cents a pound for his trouble. White spring salmon only fetches two cents a pound in Prince Rupert market, which exactly pays the packer, consequently before a man goes to the trouble of cleaning a whole fish, he consigns it back to the place where it came from.

Now, Mr. Editor, could not something be done to remedy this state of affairs. I wonder what the Prince Rupert citizen pays for his white salmon. It would interest us fishermen to know who is getting the rake-off on our labor.
