## Earl Derby to Make Another Effort to Solve Irish Problem; Cardinal Warns Against Crime

LONDON, April 29.—Conversations between the Earl of Derby and the Irish Sinn Fein will be resumed in a few days when the Earl returns to Ireland, the Times says. He will act as the accredited envoy of Premier Lloyd George.

BELFAST, April 29.—Cardinal Logue, speaking at Glouce, warned the people against the commission of crimes. He said that many people both in Ireland and England were making every effort to establish peace and he knew it for a fact that if the people of Ireland would abandon crime they could obtain anything that was necessary for the country. The Irish republic would never be achieved, he said.

### GRAND TRUNK TO BE TAKEN OVER

Bill Providing for Transfer Passes Senate; House to Rise June 1

OTTAWA, April 29.—One more month of strenuous work and the session of Parliament should be over. It is expected to prorogue about June 1. The budget is the chief business remaining.

### MEIGHEN THROWING COLD WATER ON PLAN FOR EMPIRE CABINET

LONDON, April 29.—The statement of Premier Meighen that the coming meeting of the Empire Premiers in June will be for consultative purposes and nothing more is regarded by the Westminster Gazette as an attempt to throw water on the endeavor of Churchill to elevate the conference to the dignity of an Imperial cabinet.

### Supreme Council Meets Tomorrow to Discuss the Subject of Reparations

WASHINGTON, April 29.—The views of the embassies connected with the Allies are all complete with the exception of those of Italy and Japan. America's reply may be delayed until after the meeting of the Supreme Council on Saturday.

It is understood that the Allies will submit that the Berlin proposals are unsatisfactory.

BERLIN, April 29.—The departure of Lord D'Abernon, the British ambassador, to London, gives hope here that there is still a chance Britain may adjust the situation on the basis of the proposals.

It is hoped that Washington will ascertain from the Allies what portions of the proposals are unacceptable.

PARIS, April 29.—Premier Lloyd George says that Great Britain will consent to occupation of the Ruhr valley only after an ultimatum granting a certain amount of delay, it is said here.

PARIS, April 29.—Dr. Von Gertsen, head of the German war burdens commission, refused to attend a meeting of the reparations commission today for the determination of the time and methods of German payments.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—It is understood that Secretary House is still hopeful that negotiations between the Allies and Germany will be reopened. Even if the final discussion is not reached before the French begin to move into additional German territory, it is said the exchanges can continue thereafter.

### VICE-PRESIDENT OF C.P.R. WAS IN TOWN

D. C. Coleman, Capt. G. D. Neutro's and J. G. McNab are Making Round Trip to Alaska.

D. C. Coleman, vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, Winnipeg; Captain G. D. Neutro, marine superintendent of C. P.R. coast steamship services, Victoria, and J. G. McNab, formerly agent here and now divisional freight agent at Vancouver, were among the passengers in the city this morning on the Princess Alice. They are making the round trip to Alaskan ports on the big vessel which is taking the trip in place of the Princess Mary this week with Captain Slater in charge.

Mr. McNab was kept busy greeting old friends here during the stay of the vessel in this port from shortly after 8 o'clock this morning until 12 o'clock.

### U.S. TRADE IS FALLING OFF

Big Drop in Exports and Imports to and from Europe

WASHINGTON, April 29.—American exports to Europe during March amounted to \$200,000,000 as against \$465,000,000 for March last year.

The imports for the same time amounted to \$77,000,000 against \$125,000,000 for March 1920.

### LUMBER PRODUCTION FAR BELOW NORMAL

SEATTLE, April 29.—The production of 115 lumber mills connected with the West Coast Lumbermen's Association last week cut 53,000,000 feet, which is 33 per cent below normal.

### WORLD SOLD FOR \$300,000

Vancouver Newspaper Changes Hands and Will be Independent Liberal.

JOHN NELSON MADE THE PAPER VALUABLE

VANCOUVER, April 29.—Chas. Campbell of Vancouver, is the head of a syndicate that has purchased the Vancouver World for \$300,000. John Nelson, the present managing director, will leave in a few weeks for a holiday. The policy of the newspaper will be independent Liberal, it is said.

The Vancouver World has had a varied career. It was for many years a Liberal paper but when acquired by L. D. Taylor it refused to support the Liberals at an election because it did not get sufficient monetary support from the party. It gradually got into disfavor and with the breaking of the real estate boom, Taylor was figured out, and the paper was purchased by a small syndicate with John Nelson as the titular head with the position of managing director.

Business Basis.  
Mr. Nelson at once began to put the paper on a business basis. He rode in on a prohibition wave and for some time entered a great deal to the prohibition and church element, bringing the paper to the fore and steadily making it a factor in the newspaper life of the city. The paper was purchased for a very small sum and has been sold for a good round figure, and it has proved a good business venture.

Many People Are Looking Northward.

Many people in southern British Columbia and in other parts of the world are looking northward. This summer the Dairyman's Association of British Columbia are to have their summer meeting at Vanderhoof. The town is the centre of a dairying district and a successful creamery is conducted there.

Pattullo's Suggestion In Regard to Power.

Mr. Pattullo told the Rotary Club yesterday that he had been urging the promoters of the proposed new pulp mill to develop a large waterpower in this neighborhood with the object of providing power for their own mills and also possibly of supplying the city of Prince Rupert, if the city decided it was prepared to purchase.

The Daily News has constantly urged the desirability of trying to secure power here and plenty of it so that local industries may be supplied at low commercial rates. This would be a great aid to the city and her future development.

Get Big Interests To Back City.

Prince Rupert has not for many years known what it is to have any big interest backing the place and trying to help it. The city has played a lone hand and the result has not been altogether successful.

There are people who are always opposed to corporations or people who do business in a big way. These are the people, however, who are in a position to push Prince Rupert to the front. They can turn business our way and by their influence capital will come here for investment.

Result of Playing The Lone Hand.

We have seen what it meant to play the lone hand when all the big interests connected with the Dominion Government have been against us. We have wanted improvements, but the interests have said "no."

We want to forge ahead. Stagnation is not good for any of us. Living in a small and isolated place we are apt to become small in our outlook and isolated in our ideas.

PECK DEFENDS GOVERNMENT

Says is Sure Policy of Minister of Marine will Win Out

A recent copy of Hansard shows that Colonel Peck presided over the committee of the House of Commons in discussing the marine department in committee of supply. On that occasion he defended the Dominion Government.

"I am not going to carry on the discussion in defence of the policy of the minister, because we do not need to do that. It is very easy to tear things down, but it is very hard to build them up. I am quite sure that the minister's policy is going to win out, and I am prepared to stand behind it. I do not care what gibes are thrown at me about my not crossing the floor of the House. I am as good a free trader as the hon. member for Red Deer, absolutely, and if I had a little square constituency down in Alberta, I might talk a whole lot of free trade and nothing else, but I am a practical politician. I am going to fight for free trade where we can get it, but I challenge my hon. friend from Red Deer to say if he can get it from the official position in this House.

Looks In Vain
Take the leader of the Opposition (Mr. MacKenzie King), or the hon. member for Shelburne and Queen's (Mr. Fielding), or the hon. member for Quebec East (Mr. Lapointe) or the hon. member for Beauce (Mr. Beland); all these hon. gentlemen have made high protectionist speeches in this House. I look in vain for free traders on the other side of the House.

"If any hon. gentleman can show me where we can get genuine free trade or a policy that will work towards free trade I will be with him, but in the meantime you will have to show me. I always listen to my hon. friend from Red Deer with the utmost respect, and I challenge him to say whether he has any more sympathy than I have with the speeches from the official Opposition."

FOUR WERE GUESTS LOCAL ROTARY CLUB

Short Addresses from Men Building New Court House Here.

In addition to the speaker of the day, Hon. T. D. Pattullo, the Rotary Club yesterday had as luncheon guests at the St. Regis rooms four of the men interested in the building of the new court house. These were A. C. McDougall, of the firm of McDougall & McNeill; H. Whittaker, architect; Mitchell Albert, of Vancouver, and M. P. McCaffery of this city.

Messrs. McDougall, Whittaker and Albert each made a few remarks. Mr. McDougall said he was present when Mr. Pattullo put up the fight in the Legislature for the money for the building. He was a good scrapper. Mitchell Albert spoke of the splendid work the Rotary Clubs were doing in Vancouver and other places. The firm building the court house was Albert, McCaffery, McDougall & McNeill. In the matter of providing supplies any local firm would have the preference.

Mr. Whittaker said the building would be a fine one and when it was outgrown an addition could be made as the plans provided for that. The presence of such a building would put Prince Rupert in a different class.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

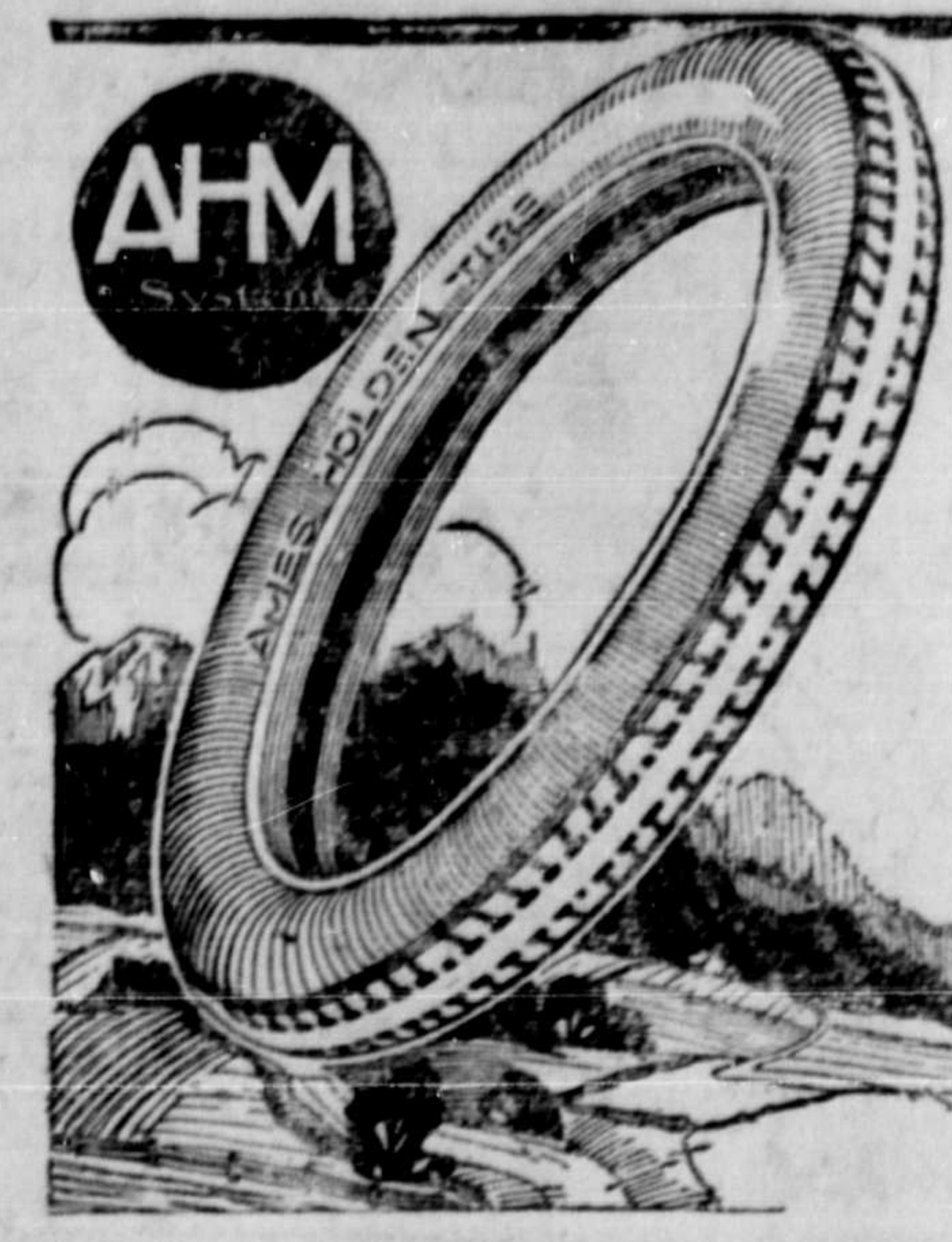

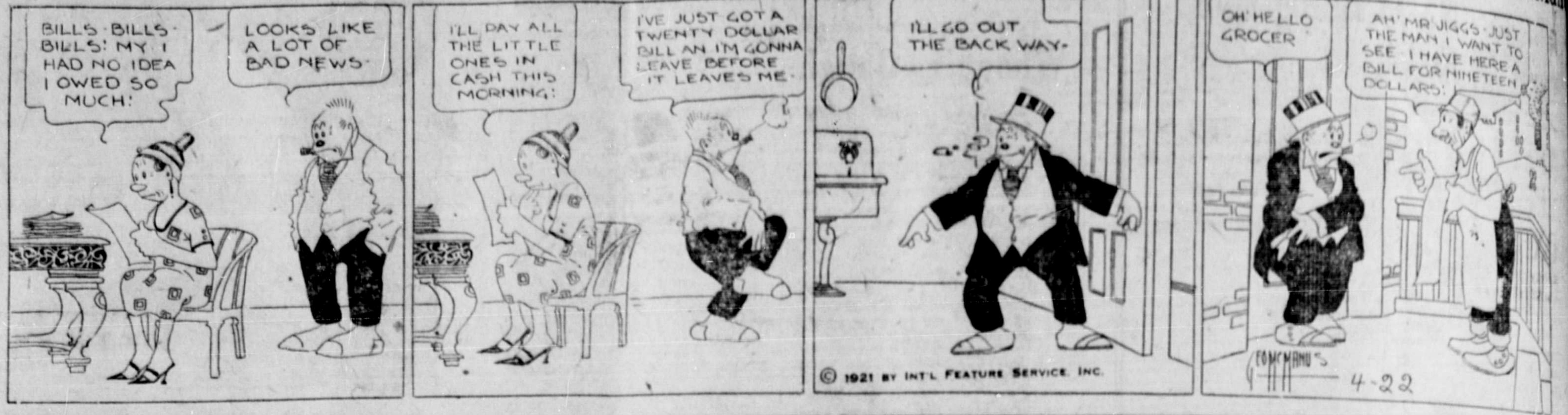

**T. D. Pattullo Addresses the Prince Rupert Rotary Club on Problems of Day**

Before the Rotary Club yesterday, Hon. T. D. Pattullo spoke particularly of the plans of the promoters of the new pulp plant in regard to this place. Not only were they proposing to install a pulp plant with a paper mill to follow, but there was an engineer coming here to consider the possibility of installing a power plant. This man was an eminent authority.

Mr. Pattullo said he had urged on the Emerson people the desirability of developing power here and the visit of the engineer was the result. He had urged the development of power to sell to the city, if the city so desired. Had the power situation been settled several years ago, there would have been double the present population in Prince Rupert today. When the people here were in need of help it would have been a great advantage to have had powerful interests helping.

**Moral Fibre.**

Dealing with Government affairs, Mr. Pattullo expressed the opinion that it was more difficult to conduct the affairs of the country now than during the war. At that time all were bent on one purpose. Today everybody was disturbed. The public mind was unsettled. Some public men were very much worried over the situation and he, personally, was not sure that it did not mean the breaking up of civilization. There was a looseness such as had never been before, both in private and public life. Nations, like many individuals, were deeply in debt and moral fibre was breaking down. This was partly due to the effort to show that capital and labor were antagonistic to each other.

Some people thought nationalization of industry was the only way out of the difficulty, but he thought this would be turning the hands of the clock backward. He was more inclined to pin his faith to profit sharing.

**Youth of Country.**

Mr. Pattullo suggested several ways in which the Rotary Clubs might aid in bringing about a better condition. He urged that they use their influence with the growing youth of the country, the boys who were just about ready to step into our shoes. An endeavor should be made to inculcate ideas of right and high moral standards. He wondered if the young people were receiving proper moral inspiration. If they were not, there would be chaos. The situation was serious and institutions, such as the Rotary Club, could exercise a stable influence. They should be progressive but they should avoid rocking the boat for fear of upsetting it.

**Load of Debt.**

Provincially they were suffering from the load of debt. The Pacific Great Eastern Railway was the fly in the ointment. The remedy was to get rid of the railroad and to formulate an immigration policy. Settling the country would give employment. Every human was an asset. There must be more people here in order to develop the industries. He suggested that the Government would have to pay more and more attention to immigration.

**HOW HOLD UP WAS EFFECTED**

Huntley Tate and Bruce Bradford Told Story of Valorous Affair This Morning.

Evidence of Albert Brooks, the owner of the boat Valorous, Huntley Tate, taxi man, and Bruce Bradford, his assistant, was heard in the E. Michelson kidnaping case this morning and adjournment was made until Monday.

Brooks, in giving his evidence, stated that, although he was the owner of the boat Valorous, he had not known of her alleged trip to Prince Rupert in November. Michelson and Charles Melby had since lived on the boat and had been employed by him on a trip to Hyder. They had brought the boat to Prince Rupert recently with the intention of packing fresh fish from Cape Ommaney for the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co.

**Tate's Evidence.**

Tate recounted the incident of the delivering of the liquor to the garbage scow on November 25. Miller, Bradford and himself had been invited aboard to go to the G. T. P. wharf after delivery had been made. The witness and Bradford had been told to go into the pilot house and Miller had gone down to the engine room. They had not proceeded very far when a cry for help was heard from Miller. They rushed to his assistance but were met by a man with some weapon who ordered them to hold their hands out of the window. This they promptly did until they were let off in the skiff on Digby Island. Tate did not identify the men in the boat with the exception of Swanson, neither was he able to describe the boat.

**Corroborative Evidence.**

Bradford gave evidence corroborative of Tate's, stating that they had held their hands out the window for twenty minutes.

**COST OF WHITE SALMON**

Editor, Daily News:

The cost of living is assuredly high in Prince Rupert and we fishermen could do a lot to remedy it—if you only allow us.

It is a shame to see the amount of white spring salmon which is dumped overboard here on the trolling grounds—good, wholesome food wasted because the fisherman is expected to catch his fish, clean and dress it, deliver it to the packer, and all for nothing.

Let me explain. A packer is employed by the fishermen to market their catch in Prince Rupert. He has to provide a boat, ice, etc., and makes the very reasonable charge of two cents a pound for his trouble. White spring salmon only fetches two cents a pound in Prince Rupert market, which exactly pays the packer, consequently before a man goes to the trouble of cleaning a whole fish, he consigns it back to the place where it came from.

Now, Mr. Editor, could not something be done to remedy this state of affairs. I wonder what the Prince Rupert citizen pays for his white salmon. It would interest us fishermen to know who is getting the rake-off on our labor.
