Injunction Against the Government POLITICAL HOUSE CLEANING GOING ON AT OTTAWA BY PREMIER

Meighen Is Left with Only
Three Members of Cabinet
Drayton, Tolmie and Kemp

(Canadian National Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, Sept. 9.—(1:45 p.m.)—All but four members of the cabinet have handed in their resignations to give Meighen a free hand in cabinet reconstruction in view of the election. Those remaining in office are Sir Henry Viger, minister of finance; Dr. Simon Fraser Tolmie, minister of justice; Sir Edward Kemp, without portfolio, and the author himself. The members of the cabinet—Foster, Reid and Calder—tend to offer for re-election but are slated for the Senate, except Doherty is booked as permanent representative at where he now is. Wigmore is also anxious to return to Ottawa. Guthrie and Ballantyne hold the view that the author is hard to find, and the Premier is in a quandary about the new cabinet.

EXECUTED FOR

MAY NOT APPEAL
THE G. T. AWARD

Province Cannot Interfere with Employment of Orientals

VANCOUVER, Sept. 9.—Until the constitutionality of the Oriental order-in-council Validation Act has been passed upon by the Supreme Court of Canada, probably in October, the Government of British Columbia is restrained by an injunction granted by Mr. Justice Murphy from prohibiting the employment of Japanese or Chinese by the holders of timber licenses in the province. The case will ultimately be carried to the Judicial Committee of the British Privy Council.

NEGATIVE POSITION OF UNITED STATES CAUSE OF MANDATES DELAY

GENEVA, Sept. 9.—Charges that the "purely negative" position of the United States had been responsible for the delay in application of the mandates by the League of Nations were made by Lord Robert Cecil at today's session.

Judge Parker Urges Knowing Each Other

Eminent United States Jurist Would Have the English Speaking Nations Stand Together

OTTAWA, Sept. 9.—A plea to Canadians to aid in promoting a spirit of friendship and goodwill between the people of Great Britain and the United States was made by Hon. Alton B. Parker of New York in an eloquent address delivered before the annual meeting of the Canadian Bar Association here.

Judge Parker, who has taken a prominent part in a number of movements for the furtherance of amicable relations between his own country and the British nations, declared the war had demonstrated to all men not blinded by prejudice that "it is now, and ever will be, wise for the two great English-speaking nations to stand together for the peace of the whole world if they can influence it, and if they cannot, then for their joint protection."

"So far as the people of Canada and the United States are concerned," the speaker continued, "we not only believe in one another, but we are right good friends. And we evidence it by visiting each other's Bar Associations, national and state, and by exchange of visits between different associations and societies. And the American Federation of Labor membership is composed of citizens of both countries. Sometimes it holds its annual meetings in your country and at other times in ours."

Closer Together.

"Now while the United States came late into the struggle," the speaker continued, "she drove with all her mighty power of men and money when she did, leaving no doubt in the minds of the wise men of these two nations that their respective peoples should assiduously cultivate friendly and affectionate relations with each other. The Canadian Government Merchant Marine steamer Canadian Scottish, Captain Hocking, completed loading here last night and cleared this morning at 9 o'clock for Portland and Vancouver, at which ports she will take on more cargo before finally leaving on her maiden ocean voyage for Australia and New Zealand.

DOHERTY TO MAKE PROTEST

CAPT. JANNEY IN HOSPITAL

Forcible Feeding Will Be Employed Result of Hunger Strike.

LETHBRIDGE, Sept. 9.—Capt. E. L. Janney, who is in jail here charged with selling stock in an airplane company unchartered in Alberta, is very weak on the thirty-third day of his hunger strike. The jail physicians ordered him removed to the hospital where forcible feeding will be employed.

In Alberta they have a "blue sky law" to prevent fraudulent stock selling. Before a company can offer its shares for public sale it must lay all its plans before a commission of three judges who investigate and, if it is found that the public would not be justified in investing in the stock, they refuse to grant the company a license. Janney was refused a license by the commissioners, but he went on selling stock at Calgary, Edmonton and Lethbridge, and is now in jail for breaking the law.

FALL SESSION END OCTOBER

John Oliver Denies that Dominion Election Will Affect Provincial Plans.

VICTORIA, Sept. 9.—Premier Oliver denies the rumor that the Provincial Government has decided to call off the fall session of the Legislature and not meet until after the new year, as the result of the Dominion election. "Nothing in it," he said. "The fall session will be held about the end of October."

NATIONAL DEBT HAS DECLINED

OTTAWA, Sept. 9.—Canada's national debt has declined by nearly \$13,000,000 during the month of August. The net debt now stands at \$23,349,498.

The decline of expenditures on capital account and ordinary and increased income tax collections are factors in the decrease of debt.

DEMAND FREE COAL.


