Plans for Station Building are Here

RECENT DEVELOPMENTS IN COAL STRIKE SITUATION APPEAR PROMISING

Railway Company Submits Plans for Depot to Council; Brick and Cement Structure

The plans for the Canadian National Railway station for Prince Rupert were submitted to the city council last night along with the announcement that the company had made application to the Railway Commission for approval of the site. The letter from the company was ordered acknowledged and filed and the plans are laid on the table for one week so that they may be studied by the aldermen with a view to advancing suggestions at next week's meeting.

The site of the station is on the water side of the tracks just behind No. 2 shed. Its location will be practically where the wagons and trucks now go to unload freight cars. Leading to the station will be an eight-foot covered-in overhead walk which will join the street in front of the present G. T. P. office building, the old hotel. It is understood that the overhead for vehicular traffic now leading to the wharves will be retained and will provide an entrance from the rear of the station building.

Two Storeys.

The plans provide for a brick and reinforced concrete building of two storeys measuring 100 feet by 41 feet. On the ground floor will be the express room, baggage room, parcel room, office and boiler room. On the first floor, connected to the ground floor by stairs, will be the general waiting room and the ladies' waiting room. The overhead from the present offices will join the building on the first floor.

In speaking on the plans Ald. Ibbotson stated that, although they might not come altogether in the matter of size and appointments with his expectations, in view of the fact that the company was taking steps to have the station built he would not want to put any obstacle in the way of getting the building erected by criticizing the plans. A would not favor the lodging of a formal complaint.

The mayor stated that the only suggestion he had to make as yet was that the platform between the station and the tracks be covered. These plans showed no provision for that.

It is likely that the plans will be further discussed at next week's meeting of the council.

DISASTROUS FLOODS IN WASHINGTON

Columbia River Overflows Dykes and Does \$5,000,000 to Crops

WOODLAND, Washington, May 31.—Flood waters in the Columbia River, which broke through 75 feet of dyking north of here yesterday, are spreading after having flooded five thousand acres to a depth of from eight to ten feet. There is no loss of life, but the damage to crops is estimated as close to \$5,000,000.

VOTE IS MADE TO CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT

Totals \$5,782,195 to be Devoted to Many Different Purposes.

OTTAWA, May 31.—The Commons has voted the balance of supplies of the Department of Customs and Inland Revenue, totalling \$5,782,195, covering salaries, stationery, revenue, cruises and miscellaneous supplies.

UNITED STATES MAY RECOGNIZE PRESENT MEXICO GOVERNMENT

MEXICO CITY, May 31.—Negotiations following the American memorandum to the Mexican government have reached a stage where the recognition of the present Mexican government under Obregon by the United States is freely predicted.

CANADIANS ARE PREPARING TO EVEN TARIFF

Will Equalize American Excise with Taxes on Potatoes, Wheat and Flour

WINDSOR, May 31.—A tariff corresponding to the United States tariff is already on the Canadian statute books and will be enforced immediately against American potatoes. Potatoes will be taxed twenty cents per bag, wheat twelve cents a bushel and flour fifty cents a barrel.

MALASPINA REACHED PORT THIS MORNING

Captain Newcombe Shows Absurdity of Report of Sinking Jap Sealer.

The fisheries protection steamer, Malaspina, arrived in port this morning at 10 o'clock. Upon being interviewed by the Daily News, the commander, Captain Newcombe, stated that there was absolutely no foundation for the story that the Malaspina had captured and sunk a Japanese sealing boat. He was much surprised when he received a cable from the marine editor of the Vancouver Daily Province asking for confirmation of the story. The captain also pointed out the absurdity of the report that he had sunk the boat, which would be an entirely uncalled for proceeding.

After taking on stores and attending to certain other matters the Malaspina will leave again tomorrow on her patrol duties.

WAS SHOT DEAD.

QUEENSTOWN, May 31.—John O'Connell, a prominent resident of this city, has been shot dead.

ASK ABOUT CONFERENCE

Lloyd George's Official Residence Inundated with Requests for Information

LONDON, May 31.—The official residence of Premier Lloyd George has been inundated with requests for confirmation or denial of the reports that De Valera and Lloyd George had held a conference. A definite answer to the queries is being withheld.

CONFIDENCE IN LEIPSI WAR COURT

LONDON, May 31.—Sir Ernest Pollock, solicitor-general, has returned to London from Leipzig where he attended the opening trial of the German war criminals. He is satisfied that the court may be regarded with the fullest confidence.

CITY JOINS UNION OF MUNICIPALITIES FOR WHOLE CANADA

Feels Value Received in Work Organization Did in Connection Railway Taxation.

The city council last night decided to join the Union of Canadian Municipalities by paying the \$15 annual fee. Mayor Rochester and others expressed the feeling that this city had already received valuable assistance from this organization in its efforts against the attempt of the Canadian National Railway Company to free itself of municipal taxation. Largely through the efforts of this organization this had been made impossible. The Union had saved the city much money that might have had to be paid to solicitors.

The annual convention of the Union is to be held in Ottawa on July 27, 28 and 29 and the question of sending a delegate will be taken up later.

CITY MAY PROVIDE WATER AT COW BAY

Mayor Brought Question up at Council Meeting Last Evening.

The board of works is to take up the matter of making connection from the city water main to the government float at Cow Bay. The matter was brought up at the council meeting last night by Mayor Rochester, who said that he felt the fishermen were entitled to a closer connection. There are two alternate routes, one from the government wharf and the other from the Third Avenue main.

The city is to call for tenders for the printing of 350 annual reports of the city's business.

WHAT HAPPENED YESTERDAY IN EMERALD ISLE

List of Executions and Killings, Pillage and Destruction

BERLIN, May 31.—Constable William Mitchell has been court-martialed and sentenced to death for killing Magistrate Dixon recently in Wicklow.

Two civilians, Foley and Maher, were sentenced to death for the murder of a sergeant in May, 1919.

An unsuccessful attempt was made on Sunday at the curfew hour to burn the Liberty Hall in the course of disorders. Two civilian prisoners, Martin Hurrell and William O'Brien, were killed while attempting to disarm a sentry in the Tipperary barracks.

A railway porter was killed near Dublin.

THREE NEW EXPRESS CARS ARE DUE HERE BY TONIGHT'S TRAIN

Five of the new Canadian National refrigerator cars have now been reported west of Winnipeg. Three of them are expected to arrive on tonight's passenger train. They will be the first to reach here of the new order.

OBSOLETE WARSHIPS ARE REPORTED SOLD

LONDON, May 31.—A paper states that the Imperial Government has sold eleven obsolete warships to a Sheffield firm for £750,000.

The loan under the Better Housing Scheme to A. J. Collison has been transferred to Edward Shrubbsall. Mr. Collison is leaving the city.

UNIONISTS HAVE BIG MAJORITY IN ULSTER

BELFAST, May 31.—The complete returns for the Ulster elections show forty Unionists, six Sinn Feiners and six Nationalists elected. Sir James Craig will be the premier in the first administration.

PUBS CLOSE IN SCOTLAND

Seventy-Seven Saloons Alone in Glasgow Suspended on Saturday

GLASGOW, May 31.—A number of public houses in Scotland closed on Saturday as a consequence of the coming into effect of prohibition.

Seventy-seven houses closed alone in the city of Glasgow, a portion of which has adopted local option. Several residential districts went solid for prohibition in the recent elections.

CROWN FORCES IN IRELAND WILL BE SUBJECT COMMONS

LONDON, May 31.—Premier Lloyd George has announced to the Commons that it is proposed to strengthen the Crown forces in Ireland, and that a statement would soon be made to parliament on the subject.

SOLDIERS AND CIVILIANS IN AEROPLANE WRECK

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Five United States soldiers and two civilians were killed in the wreck of an ambulance airplane en route to the airplane review at Langley Field. The machine apparently fell from a great height.

Premier Threatens Compulsory Action Settlement Strike

LONDON, May 31.—Premier Lloyd George plainly hinted yesterday at compulsory arbitration of the coal miners' strike in answer to the indignant question of a union official. Mine owners would be subject to the same treatment as the miners if they stood in the way of a settlement of the coal strike. Jail, it is presumed, is threatened for officials hampering negotiations.

A proposal for the gradual scaling of wages with the government grant of ten million pounds and the owners' profits being used to assist in breaking the fall of pay will be voted upon by the miners on Friday.

A permanent settlement is to be worked out by arbitration by the National Wage Board or a tribunal of three or by single arbitrators. It is suggested that the terms brought in exclude the question of the pool of wages.

LONDON, May 31.—Another step towards industrial peace in Britain was taken today when the locomotive engineers dropped the embargo against the transportation of imported, or what is known as "tainted" coal in an effort to support the miners now on strike. The embargo proved a failure.

Meanwhile voting is going on by districts of the miners on the government's proposal that the dispute be arbitrated.

DAIRYMEN ARE ON WAY NORTH

Tailed for Vancouver Last Night on Prince Rupert en route Vanderhoof

HON. E. D. BARROW COMING; WILL REMAIN THREE WEEKS

VANCOUVER, May 31.—The Fraser River and Vancouver Island dairymen, accompanied by Hon. E. D. Barrow, provincial minister of agriculture, and officials of his department, left here last night on the steamer Prince Rupert for Prince Rupert on their way to attend the Dairymen's convention to be held this week in Vanderhoof. The party will return here via Williams Lake and the Pacific Great Eastern Railway. Mr. Barrow will inspect the land settlements along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific for the next three weeks.

LOCAL AUDITOR TO HANDLE CITY BOOKS

George Rorie Will Conduct Work For City in the Future—Quarterly Reports.

George Rorie, of the firm of Rorie & Small, has been appointed city auditor to carry on the work formerly done by Riddell, Stead & Winter, of Vancouver. It is felt that the duties can be more efficiently performed by a local man who would always be on hand. Mr. Rorie will make quarterly reports and his remuneration will be \$1,000 per annum, the same as was paid before. This action was adopted by the city council last night on recommendation of the finance committee.

CHARLTON SWORN IN PRIVY COUNCILLOR

OTTAWA, May 31.—W. A. Charlton, M.P. for Norfolk, has been sworn in as a member of the Privy Council.

ESMONDE FOUND GUILTY, IS TO BE SENT AWAY

Jury Recommends Deportation and Accused Leaves Court Room to Prepare.

VANCOUVER, May 31.—Osmond Thomas Gratton Esmonde has been found guilty of sedition by a jury which recommended his deportation to Justice Morrison. The judge permitted Esmonde to leave the court room to prepare for departure, he having undertaken to leave the country. The judge's charge contained some favorable recommendations, and the jury deliberated for forty five minutes. It is believed Esmonde will proceed to England via eastern Canada.

Esmonde conducted his own defence. In his address to the jury, Mr. Justice Morrison denounced the Irish Self-Determination League. He stated that the wrong man was in the box and that Esmonde was only a tool for the troublemakers.

GERMANY HAS HANDLED OVER BIG PAYMENT

First Billion Gold Marks Received by Allied Reparations Committee

PARIS, May 31.—Germany yesterday completed the payment of a billion gold marks, the first payment on reparations under the peace treaty. Eight hundred and fifty million gold marks were handed to the Reparations Commission of the Allies and a courier from Germany a few days ago paid one hundred and fifty million gold marks.

AIRPLANE PILOT WAS KILLED AT FESTIVAL

Joe Peters Falls During Celebration at Portland Yesterday Afternoon.

PORTLAND, May 31.—Joe Peters, pilot of a photographer's airplane, was fatally injured yesterday afternoon when his machine fell during the Rose City motorcycle races. Two photographers were slightly injured.

Not Very Large Station Provided.

Prince Rupert is glad to receive the plans for the station, accompanied by the news that the railway company has made application to the Railway Commission for permission to erect the building. From cursory review of these plans, however, they seem a little disappointing because they do not provide for a large building as many had expected. In defence of the plans the company will doubtless say that the proposed building is plenty large enough for present requirements and that may possibly be quite true. The company is only following out the policy that it generally seems to adopt when dealing with Prince Rupert, that is, providing for what will do at the present and not looking forward to the future; not providing for increased business but waiting for that business to demand provision for itself. In other words, it is working on a stand-still basis instead of a basis of progress and enterprise. However, as Alderman Dybhavn wisely said, it is no use criticizing but it is best to accept what can be obtained. This city has been waiting a long time for a station and any kind of one will be welcome. The plans submitted to the city council do provide for a substantial building but the question is: Is the building one that will fill requirements for ten or twenty years? Does it fulfill the pledges that have been made to the city on account of past privileges granted the company by the municipality and which the government naturally takes over with the possession of the system?

New Salmon Dock To be Fine Structure.

Although some disappointment may be expressed with the station building and the refrigerator car supply to this port, credit must be given where credit is due. The new salmon dock which is now under construction on the waterfront is going to be a decided acquisition to the place. The building of it will provide accommodation for a large amount of fish and the facilities for handling it will be both modern and convenient. Word has been received from Col. Peck that the superstructure is to be built as originally planned and the whole dock, the pilldriving and decking of which is nearly complete, will be covered with sheds and upper work that will be very substantial and well equipped. It is at least pleasing to see this recognition of the importance of this port for it shows that more business is expected when this dock is obtained under the circumstances that apparently prevail.

Mineral Resources Calling Attention.

The Dominion Government realizes that the North possesses potential mineral resources and shows it by sending a number of experts into the country this season to explore and make surveys. The north coast, the Queen Charlotte Islands and the Alice Arm district, all tributary to Prince Rupert, will be visited by these experts. In reports of mines and mining issued from the Dominion Department of Mines for the past few years, northern and central British Columbia has been conspicuous by its absence. The explorations and surveys made this season will, doubtless, bring interesting information that will appear in the next reports of the department. It will advertise the district and provide something that the public, especially that section of it interested in mining, wants.

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TAKING CENSUS IS LARGE JOB

Will Cost About Two Million Dollars and Many will be Employed

The organization by which the census of Canada is to be carried out commencing tomorrow is a large one indeed. The nucleus exists in a small permanent staff at Ottawa constituting one of the branches of the Bureau of Statistics. This branch maintains connection between census and when one impends all the plans are originated by it and the necessary expansion of personnel arranged for. This expansion falls into two classes, those who go the field work and collect the facts and those who tabulate the facts and make the reports.

In planning the field work the country is first divided into "census districts," each of which is placed in charge of a "census commissioner." The districts are then divided into "sub-districts," varying in population from 600 to 800 in rural localities and from 1,200 to 1,800 in urban. The sub-district is the territory allotted to a "census enumerator," who conducts the house to house and farm to farm canvass, and who is the only census official with whom the public comes directly in contact.

Altogether the census of 1921 will employ 247 commissioners and probably 13,000 enumerators. For the compilation of the census an extra staff of 350 to 400 clerks will be engaged at Ottawa.

Months for Results

It is expected that from two to five weeks from June 1 will suffice in normal localities for the completion of the field work. After the third or fourth month it should be possible to give out the first results for many cities, towns, counties, etc. As to when the final count by provinces for the entire Dominion will be available, so many unforeseeable contingencies are possible that prophecy is dangerous, but it is expected that five or six months should enable a close approximation to be made.

What It Costs

Altogether the census will cost about two million dollars. The amount set aside this year is about one million and three quarters; but there was a vote of \$80,000 last year for equipment and preparatory work and another quarter of a million will probably be required in 1922 and 1923 to finish.

LOOKING FOR RARE BIRD ON PORCHER ISLAND THIS YEAR

C. deB. Green, Prominent Naturalist, Will Spend Three Months There if Necessary.

Among the passengers who arrived in the city last week on the Prince Rupert was C. deB. Green, who for twenty years has been a land surveyor in the Okanagan. Mr. Green is a naturalist who has delved deeply into bird life and he is going to spend three months on Porcher Island, if necessary, in order to secure a marbled murrelet.

Last year he secured the only egg of this bird in possession on the Pacific coast. It is now in a museum in Tacoma but scientists attach no credit to the find unless the bird that laid the egg is also shown with it. This summer Mr. Green hopes to get both bird and egg.

The restricted train service on account of the coal strike will bring thousands of additional motor cars and busses to the Epsom Road which even in normal times is packed with every sort of vehicle journeying to the Downs to witness the popular race. Therefore congestion is expected and every means of ensuring safety is being put into use.

The race this year will have an international character on account of the various horses entered. The list includes A. K. Macomber's American racer, The Bohemian. The list yesterday showed 25 entrants, but some may be withdrawn. As The Bohemian was beaten in France betting is 100 to 3 against him. The present favorite is Craig an Eran, Viscount Astor's colt, which won the Thousand Guineas race this year. He is being offered at four to one. Sir James Buchan's Alan Breek is listed five to one, Leighton, five to one, Humbrist and Lemonora, eight to one, Highlander, twenty to one, and Puck's Sahib, 25 to one.

At the quarter post of the major league baseball race reached on

Sunday, two teams in each league have outstripped all the others. Pittsburgh and New York are away ahead in the National, with the latter strongly favored as this year's pennant winner and a possible world's series taker. Cleveland and New York, in the American League, are fighting closely for the championship in the younger league. The Yankees are said to be the best drawing card in the whole bunch this season and this is due in no small degree to "Bambino" Ruth who is hammering out the homers faster than ever before. New York's ambition now is to bring the pennants in both leagues home and their chances look good.

The fight between Dempsey and Brennan at Madison Square Garden on December 14 proved that Dempsey is not the great "man killer" that he is touted to be. It also showed that he is not invincible to the strength and courage of an opposing fighter and that Carpentier will have a good chance of annexing the title next July 2 when the two meet. Pictures of the fight will be exhibited here next week and then the local fans will see what a struggle Dempsey had in the second round and how he nearly lost out. The pictures will also show what really put Brennan out in that contest.

LONDON, May 31.—Who will win the Derby tomorrow? That is the great question that is being asked everywhere today.
