GERMANY MUST PAY OR SUFFER CONSEQUENCES

UNITED STATES ADOPTS FRENCH MILITARY SYSTEM FOR INCREASED ARMY

Allies Putting Thumb Screws on Germany to Enforce Their Demands being Compl ed with

VICTORIA, April 22.—In addition to the troops now on the front an extra 100,000 men are provided to enforce the allied demands if they are not met by Germany by May 1. Among the penalties provided by the allies are that Germany continue to work the Ruhr mines under Allied control and production is to be heavily taxed. German Imperial Bank holdings must be transferred to the Allies at Coblenz and Cologne branches as security, or it will be taken by the Allied Commission. Germany has withdrawn her shipping estimate, admitting it was inflated and promises to submit a lower valuation.

UNITED STATES DECLINES TO BE MEDIATOR

Germany Must Submit Proper Proposals Before Action is Taken.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—The United States Government declines to mediate between Germany and the Allies in regard to reparations question. Berlin refused last night. Washington, however, considers it inadvisable to renew negotiations if Germany submits proposals as would present a basis for discussion. Communication was in answer to a German note received yesterday asking President Harding to supervise the reparations negotiations.

ALLEGED CHILD KILLS NO MONEY

Decided That Illegitimate Marriage Not Provided for in Field Will.

BRIDGEVILLE, Ill., April 22.—Anthony Marsh, the son of Henry Field, Chicago, and Peggy Marsh, the London-born girl, is not entitled to inheritance of any of the Field's millions. The court made this decision on the ground that there was no provision in the Field will for any illegitimate offspring.

FORMER MAYOR OF WINNIPEG FOUND DEAD LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, April 22.—Al Pratson, former mayor of Winnipeg, was found dead in a room in the Hollywood district with a bullet in his head. It is believed to have committed suicide.

ARMENIANS DRIVE TO SEEK SAFETY

NEW YORK, April 22.—Deserting from Premier Vratzian Armenia says the Government has taken to the hills while the Bolsheviks threaten the inevitable annihilation of the Armenian people.

CAR SHORTAGE AGAIN ACUTE

Every Day Fish is Being Taken From Prince Rupert to Foreign Ports.

There were five carloads of halibut offered for sale by the various boats at the Fish Exchange this morning but there were only three refrigerator cars available so only three carloads of halibut were bought for eastern shipment. The car shortage is becoming acute again and day after day boats are leaving port or selling at short prices for cold storage.

Residence of Bishop Set on Fire By Incendiarists.



King George of England has called the army reserves and volunteers to active service in the threatened industrial revolution. The King's action was caused by the refusal of the striking coal miners to renew negotiations with mine owners and the decision of the "Triple Alliance" to strike on Tuesday unless the miner's terms for a conference are met.

Actual Construction of Aerial Tram Line from Premier Has Commenced

STEWART, April 22.—Work has started on the actual construction of the new aerial tramline connecting the Premier mine with tidewater between Stewart and Hyder. B. Graham, representative of the Riblets Company, is in charge of the work which will take at least six months to complete and will employ about two hundred men.

There will be approximately fifteen anchor stations and 150 towers, requiring about a million feet of timber.

The capacity of the tram when completed will be ten tons per hour carried in thousand pound buckets.

The power to operate the tram will be generated by a fifty horse power electric motor.

This line will be the second longest aerial tram on the continent, the longest being in Wyoming. That one is sixteen and a half miles in length.

Mr. Graham has taken an office in Hyder where he will make his headquarters.

B.C. LUMBER FOR EGYPT

Major Fisher Trying to Arrange for Permanent Market in That Country

VICTORIA, April 22.—Efforts to build up a permanent market for British Columbia lumber in Egypt and neighboring countries are to be made by Major R. E. Fisher, who recently visited the Province in connection with an order for eight million feet of ties for an Egyptian railway.

Word has just been received by Hon. T. D. Pattullo, member for this district in regard to the matter.

EXCISE REVENUE.

OTTAWA, April 22.—The total revenue from excise taxes for the year ending March 31 was \$79,268,264.

United States Army Is To Be Increased by Ten Thousand; French System

WASHINGTON, April 22.—Secretary of War Weeks announces the inauguration immediately of a skeletonized military general headquarters for active military operations in time of war following the French system. General Pershing will preside.

Secretary Weeks asks that provision be made for a regular army of 165,000 men or ten thousand men more than the last Congress allowed. The total army appropriations for which he is asking is \$330,000,000.

STEAMSHOVEL TRACTOR FOR ROAD WORK

New Machine is on Way for Use in Opening up Interior Country.

In about three weeks a new tractor steamshovel of the caterpillar type is expected to arrive for use in the interior, more particularly in the Francois Lake country for use on the heavier road construction for the Provincial Government. The shovel is similar to those used on railways but instead of being mounted on a car is on a caterpillar tractor.

The new machine is expected to revolutionize road work, and if it proves quite successful, others will be provided for other parts of the new country that has to be opened up.

One of the great problems of opening up and settling a new country is making roads. Some useful work has been done by the government under the public works department, the headquarters of which is in this city. The demand is still great, however, and the new machine should be a useful factor in helping to speed up the work.

SOUTH IRELAND ASKS ELECTIONS POSTPONED

British Cabinet Has Not Yet Decided Its Action on Request.

LONDON, April 22.—The cabinet is considering the request from Ireland for the postponement of the elections to the southern parliament. No decision has yet been reached.

Harry Cameron, Aged 25, Uncovers Pct of Gold on Uncle's Farm.

SALEM, Mass., April 22.—While plowing on his uncle's farm, Harry Cameron, aged 25, unearthed a small metal pot containing a treasure worth about \$11,908. There was \$13,000 in gold.

BIG TIME AT LAUNCHING

Concert Under Auspices of Navy League to Follow Ceremony at Drydock.

31. AND BALL TO FOLLOW CHRISTENING OF SHIP

Definite preparations are being made for the first Prince Rupert built steamer, the Canadian Scottish, to slide into the water at 5:15 new time on the afternoon of Thursday, May 12, after she has been christened by Mrs. G. W. Peck, wife of the member for Skeena constituency in the Dominion Parliament. There will be the usual launching ceremonies and it is possible that a half holiday may be arranged for the whole city that afternoon.

For the same evening arrangements have been made by J. F. Maguire on behalf of the Navy League for Miss Mary Izard and Mrs. Dalby Morkill to give a concert here in the Westholme Theatre, and this will be followed by a grand invitation ball under the auspices of the Navy League in the St. Andrew's hall.

Miss Izard has already been heard here and made such a good impression that there is no doubt but she will have a good reception on this occasion. Mrs. Morkill too is well known to Prince Rupert audiences and will be welcomed.

The boys of the Naval Brigade will take a prominent part in the proceedings of the launching day both at the actual ceremony and at the entertainments in the evening.

CARVELL IS ON DEFENCE

Speaking at Saskatoon Replies to Criticism of Senator Robertson.

SASKATOON, April 22.—Hon. Frank B. Carvell, chairman of the Railway Commission of Canada, declared at a public dinner here that Senator Robertson's figures, on which he bases his criticism of the commission, do not take into consideration the conditions when pile up overtime and make gross wages unreasonable.

He blamed the big railway unions for manipulating the working conditions until they have the railroads in their grip and are largely responsible for the railway problems of today. Mr. Carvell again urged economy in the services and reduction in the wage scales.

VICTORIA, April 22.—Premier M'asey of New Zealand is expected to arrive here May 7 en route to the Imperial Conference at London.

Court House Contract.

It is a source of great satisfaction to Prince Rupert people that the contract for the new government buildings in this city has been let, and that a local firm was the lowest bidder and is to do the work. The announcement of M. P. McCaffery yesterday, through the columns of the Daily News, that actual construction work will proceed with despatch, is most reassuring and is particularly good news following the rather long wait following the preparation of the site for the building.

The substantial character of the new building will mean that there will be another landmark that will be with us for all time. It will be an example for others to follow and will definitely set this port out as a growing city that is destined to have a great future. It will add greatly to the general appearance of the city and will put to shame those who allow their buildings to go out of repair and be a menace to the community.

Similar Class to School Building.

The new Government Building will be in somewhat the same class as the school building at Hays Cove Circle. Both these piles should be an encouragement to those private concerns that have an idea of building here. They show that the city and provincial governments have faith in the city and are willing to spend money here. Visitors will be struck with the permanency of the place and, with the erection of concrete business places, we shall begin to assume a somewhat metropolitan aspect.

Need of Company To Loan Money.

It is curious that in a city like this where business is getting down to a permanent basis, there should be no building society or loan and mortgage concern ready to do business. Had it not been for the local building society, Prince Rupert Housing Ltd., it would have been impossible to borrow money on mortgage here except for a few private loans. It seems to us that the time is now ripe for some larger business house to open here and make conservative loans to those who would build. The experience of Prince Rupert Housing Ltd. has been most encouraging in connection with the repayment of loans and such an institution should prove a commercial success.

Little Bouquet From Terrace.

We have from Terrace this morning a little bouquet in the form of a letter enclosing a renewal subscription in which the writer says: "You are certainly to be congratulated on the very pronounced and rapid advance made with respect to the daily press service as furnished by the News. Wishing you success in the fullest measure." This is the sort of letter we are often getting these days and from people who were very reluctant to become subscribers. RAWHIDE ORE TO TIDEWATER

John the Finn to Work His Newly Discovered Property at Stewart.

STEWART, April 22.—John the Finn, who arrived home a few days ago, is starting to open up the Silverado property, which he discovered last year too late for work to be done on it. It is his intention to rawhide the high grade down the hill to tidewater for shipment this summer.

The property is situated just on the edge of the timber line above the mouth of the Bear River. The ore is very rich for assays made last fall ran 1100 ounces of silver to the ton.

Albert Peterson is in partnership with the discoverer on this property.

TEXT OF JUDGMENT IN APPEAL ALLOWED BY JUDGE YOUNG

The following is the text of the judgment handed down by Judge Young in the Kelly Douglas appeal which was won by the wholesale company this week:

"I am unable to sustain the conviction of the magistrate on this matter. Taking the evidence as a whole I am in doubt that either the keg or its contents produced at the trial were those delivered to Peter Wesley on the date mentioned.

Never intended. Also on further grounds: If I could accept the testimony of each witness as true it would be impossible to conjure up a case in which all the parties concerned acted in such ignorance and good faith and without suggestion of negligence or guilt. In my opinion, the Indian Act was never intended to apply to such facts and circumstances as exist in this particular case. This application must be allowed and the conviction quashed."

The appeal was made from a conviction of Magistrate McMorris some weeks ago when the applicant was fined for supplying an Indian, Peter Wesley, with an intoxicant, to wit, apple cider. W. E. Williams, of Williams, Manson & Gonzales, acted for the appellant company and T. B. Harper, city solicitor, prosecuted.

RATS GNAW HOLES IN LEAD PLUMBING

Bad Leaks Caused Recently by Rodents in Local Building.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson. The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

English people cannot be held responsible for this terrible condition for they have endorsed Home Rule for Ireland on every occasion that it has been submitted to them.
 It is the political masters who must bear the blame for the disgrace they have brought upon England. After 700 years of occupation of Ireland, the great martyr, McSwiney, said "Victory will not come to those who inflict the greatest amount of punishment, but to those who can endure the most."

LOCAL BANKER IS BACK FROM INDIES

L. M. de Gex Reports that Stocks of Sugar and Cocoa are Beginning to Move.

L. M. de Gex, manager of the local branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, returned to the city by last evening's train after a three months' visit to the West Indies. In the course of his trip Mr. de Gex was as far south as Demerara and visited the larger cities of the eastern states and Canada.

Mr. de Gex says that the commercial situation in the West Indies at the present time is not good. The planters there have been holding large stocks of sugar and cocoa on account of the falling markets hoping for higher prices. They have now decided to sell, however, and stocks are beginning to move at losses that are greater than would have been the case had they sold at the beginning of the deflation.

MANITOBANS TO BUY OWN BONDS

Hon. Edward Brown Makes Announcement in Regard to Farm Loans

WINNIPEG, April 20.—Manitobans will be given an opportunity to invest in Manitoba Farm Loans and Province of Manitoba bonds during the coming summer, Hon. Edward Brown, provincial treasurer, announced. When the bill to amend the Farm Loans act is presented to the Farm Loans association will float its own debentures instead of having the government sell bonds of the organization, as has been the practice in the past.

The bonds will be sold through bond houses in the city in any denomination and for any term which the purchaser desires. The bonds will give the purchaser an interest rate of six per cent. The Province of Manitoba bonds will be sold through the saving office. A proposal is before the minister now to sell the bonds direct from the treasury department in the parliament. It is expected that over \$100,000 worth of Farm Loan bonds will be disposed of monthly.

Mutual Aid

Mr. Brown pointed out that the original intention of the Farm Loans act was to permit one resident of Manitoba to aid another financially. By placing bonds on the open market, a farmer may aid his neighbor requiring money, directly through loaning to the Farm Loans association. The government intended to have the Farm Loans associations adopt this method of financing some years ago, but floating of the Victory loans prevented its being put into operation.
