ries Protection cruiser Thiepal returned last night from along the shore of Prince of Wales Island where she was searching for the survivors of the wrecked fishing boat. Unfortunately she was unsuccessful. Plenty of wreckage was found and the Notlad was examined in Mears Creek where it had been towed. She was bottom up and her cabins were badly smashed. Curiously the bottom of the uninjured but the stem was split.

place where the wreck seems to have occurred, close to point, there was wreckage on the shore including part of which the Notlad was carrying. Four blankets were on a new mattress, part of the decking and the remains of no sign of the lost men and no indication what had become of them.

The Thiepal cruised back and forth all night watching for beacon fires on the shore or any indication that the men were still alive. Finding the search hopeless they returned.

The boat as she lies is of little value. The guns which were carried by the boat were recovered.

The men who were aboard were Capt. Jack Smith, Harry Haskell, Charlie Cook and Walter Scott Pearl.

The Missing Men.

Captain John Smith was a married man, his wife and one child residing in this city near the General Hospital. He was a Canadian and was about forty years of age.

Harry Haskell was also a married man but had no children. His wife resides at 141 Green Street. He was a native of the state of Maine and was about 48 years of age.

Charles Cook was 33 years old and was a native of New Brunswick. He was unmarried and lived at the Knox Hotel. His father and two brothers, Alexander and George, are also Prince Rupert fishermen. The former lives on Sixth Avenue at Seal Cove and the latter at the rear of the post office.

Walter Scott Pearl, a native of the Maritime Provinces, and about 40 years of age, was also well known here. Some years ago he was engineer at the local Imperial Oil Works and last season installed the machinery at the Triple Island light house for Contractor J. H. Hilditch. He was not a fisherman by calling. He was unmarried and has a brother, H. L. Cook, residing here.

Purchased Boat.

It was Mr. Pearl who purchased the Notlad from William N. Dalton, of Vancouver, about a year ago. Having bought the boat he himself went fishing and last fall sold it again to John Smith and Harry Haskell. Until the vessel had been fully paid for and the deal completed, Mr. Pearl remained with her, it being his intention to leave the sea as soon as the transaction was concluded.

All the four men, with the exception of Mr. Pearl, were members of the local branch of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union.

TRADE PACT WITH RUSSIA

Britain Signed Document this Morning for Opening Up Business.

LONDON, March 16.—A trade agreement under which commercial relations are to be resumed between Great Britain and Russia was signed this morning by representatives of the two countries.

Negotiations have been proceeding for some time. Once they were broken off, but later were reopened.

OTTAWA, March 16.—The Ottawa hockey team, holders of the Stanley Cup and champions of the world, left last night to defend their title against the Pacific coast champions, which will be either Vancouver or Seattle.

OTTAWA, March 16.—Dominion income tax returns on salaries of dividends paid by individuals or corporations must be in by March 31. Returns of individual income or that of corporations by April 30.

MILITARY CYCLISTS VICTIMS OF ATTACK

DUBLIN, March 16.—One military cyclist was shot dead and another fatally wounded when attacked here today. One soldier was wounded in an attack on military despatch riders when crossing a bridge.

Factory No Intention of Building Fish Cars and Not Equipped for Work

J. L. Lee, secretary of the Prince Rupert branch of the Canadian Fisheries Association, this morning received a letter from F. W. Wallace, national secretary-treasurer, conveying further information in regard to the fish car contracts let by the Canadian National Railways.

Mr. Wallace has received authentic information that the National Steel Car Co. of Hamilton is not in a position to carry out the contract for the refrigerator cars ordered and an official of the company says he cannot understand why the company accepted the contract and why the Canadian National Railways should place the contract with them. All they could do would be to build the steel trucks and bases. The body of the cars would have to be finished elsewhere. The company is equipped for building freight cars only.

Mr. Wallace expressed the opinion that the chances of the long promised cars being finished within the next two or three months is problematical, and the matter is one that should be made a subject of an inquiry.

Telegram to Peck.

Previous to the receipt of the above, at a meeting of the joint fisheries committee of the City Council, Board of Trade and the Prince Rupert branch Canadian Fisheries Association, it was decided to send the following telegram to Colonel Peck:

"Referring to Mr. Hanna's letter to Dr. Reid dated February 25, regarding express refrigerator cars on hand in Prince Rupert from February 6 to 23; from February 1 to 6 we had a shortage of five cars, from February 23 to 28 there was a shortage of ten cars. This is for your information. Can you get us a definite assurance from Dr. Reid regarding when first of thirty cars will be delivered at Prince Rupert? Local cold storage steamers are tied up, thus directly throwing out of employment over one hundred men, primarily on account of uncertainty of securing equipment to ship their catches."

EASTER RECESS.

OTTAWA, March 16.—An Easter recess from March 20 to 29 is provided in a resolution submitted by Premier Meighen.

Manson Takes Part In Liquor Debate

Premier Objects to Liquor in Hotel Bedrooms; Farris Favrs Public Drinking in Government Con-trolled Places to Illicit Business

VICTORIA, March 16.—Discussing the question as to whether pure beer or near beer is to be sold in the province under the Moderation Act, Mr. Speaker Manson from the floor of the Legislature advocated the sale of liquor openly and honestly under proper restrictions rather than under conditions which are capable of evasion and which, he said, work havoc to the young manhood and womanhood of the country.

Hon. J. W. deB. Farris declared the worst feature of prohibition in the last three years had been the development of bedroom drinking in defiance of the law and the police commissioners had realized the hopelessness of trying to stop it. He said he would prefer to work out some form to permit public drinking in government controlled places to safeguard morality.

The proposal to permit drinking in bedrooms of hotels does not meet the approval of Premier Oliver, who stated that in face of the great evils resulting therefrom, he would not vote to make it legal to consume liquor in bedrooms.

MUST PAY A BILLION GOLD MARKS

Demand Made on Germany by Allies Before March 23.

PARIS, March 16.—The Allied reparations commission in a note to Germany demands payment of a billion gold marks before March 23. The money must be deposited in the Bank of France, Bank of England, or the United States Federal Reserve Bank.

The reparations commission announces that Germany had virtually refused to pay the balance, asserting that the twenty billions of marks had been fully paid.

CHARGES PATTULLO FAVORS DISTRICT

W. J. Bowser Criticises Amend-
ment to Forest Act, which
Passes Committee

VICTORIA, Mar. 16.—The bill to amend the Forest Act was dis-
cussed in committee yesterday for
three hours. During that time
W. J. Bowser charged Hon. T. D.
Pattullo that he was by virtue of
the provisions of the bill granting
special favors to timber interests
in Prince Rupert district. The
bill was put through its various
stages.

PLANNING A BIG DMONSTRATION AGAINST THE JEWS

BERLIN, March 16.—Arrange-
ments are being made for a mon-
ster anti-semitic demonstration
here on Sunday next. The gather-
ing will also be somewhat in the
nature of a protest against the
rupture of the reparations conference in London.

EMBARGO AGAINST CANADIAN CATTLE SUBJECT OF INQUIRY

TORONTO, March 16.—The em-
bargo against the exportation of
Canadian cattle to Britain will be
the subject of inquiry by an im-
partial commission Premier Lloyd
George intimated yesterday.

CANADIAN TRADE IS STILL ON INCREASE


OTTAWA, March 16.—The total

The work accomplished during the last season was reviewed and the financial report read by the secretary-treasurer, F. W. Grumble. There was a balance of some \$40 on hand which was considered satisfactory in view of the fact that the season commenced with a deficit, which has been wiped off. Both President W. E. Williams and Vice-President J. F. McGuire intimated they were retiring from office and general regret was expressed at losing their official services.

Dr. Chases K & L Pills**SWISS JUDGES AND SOCIALISTS****Read Out of Party for Giving Just Judgment**

GENEVA, Mar. 16.—Two Swiss judges of the cantonal tribunal at Zurich have just been read out of the Swiss Communist Party for having sentenced a Socialist workman to 40 days in jail for assaulting an unsyndicated workmen in a strike at Zurich.

The judges, Drs. Balsiger and Lüchinger, were summoned to appear before the socialist communist committee on a charge that the verdict was "incompatible with the communist doctrine." When the judges refused to appear, they were promptly ousted from the party.

Writing in the Volksrecht Journal, the judges declare that though they are socialists and demand liberty they judge according to their conscience and law without regard to outside political pressure.

Many papers commenting on the incident state that this should be an example to Swiss voters of what the result would be if communists who received their orders from Moscow were to come into power in Switzerland.

The agrarian parties of several cantons have made a proposal that all communist employees should be dismissed as a danger to the state.

FIRST RACE OF SEASON WON BY ALL OUTSIDERS

LONDON, March 16.—The Lincolnshire handicap was won today by Satyrus, a thirty to one shot. The favorite, Ugly Duckling, did not figure in the money. Senora secured second place, the betting against her being 20 to 1 and Queenbird came third with even greater odds, the offerings of the bookies on him being 100 to 1 with few takers.

HOW RAILWAYS FINANCE THEIR ROLLING STOCK

Interesting Lesson in Borrowing
Shown from Grand Trunk Operations

OTTAWA, Mar. 16.—An interesting sidelight on the manner in which railways finance their rolling stock came up in the House when Finance Minister Sir Henry Drayton, in answering a series of questions asked by A. R. McMaster said during the fiscal year 1920-21 the Grand Trunk Railway borrowed \$12,000,000 on equipment trust certificates. The certificates were not guaranteed by the Government. They were issued by the authority of the Government, but the Government was in no way responsible, as they were a mortgage on the rolling stock purchased. They were sold at 91.65 and realized \$10,998,000 in New York funds. Interest and principal were payable in New York.

On October 1, 1920, Sir Henry went on, the Government guaranteed Grand Trunk Railway bonds to the extent of \$25,000,000. The bonds were sold at 91% and realized \$23,595,205 in New York funds.

National Rolling Stock Company, a subsidiary of the Canadian Northern Railway, issued certificates to the amount of \$15,000,000. The certificates were not guaranteed by the Government, as they were a direct charge on the rolling stock. The certificates were sold at 95 and realized \$14,250,000 in New York funds, or \$14,233,431 net after deducting \$16,569 in expenses.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

MINIMUM PRICE OF FIRST-CLASS LAND REDUCED TO \$5 AN ACRE; SECOND-CLASS TO \$3.50 AN ACRE.

PRE-EMPTION NOW CONFINED TO SURVEYED LANDS ONLY.

Records will be granted covering only lands which have been surveyed purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions under joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to include clearing and cultivation, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made permanent improvements, he may be cause of ill-health, death, etc., he is granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence or improvements applied to claim makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture of claim.

Land with no improvements obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 3 years are required.

Where pre-emptor in occupation grant may record another pre-emption, he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential improvement conditions.

For grants and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased and a road or wagon construction of road to them. Rights of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The title of a deceased pre-emptor or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act, is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year from the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions made before June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for 1918.

Provision for return of money accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1918, on account of payments, fees, taxes, etc., on agricultural pre-emption.

Interest on amounts due on purchases town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enrollment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants and sub-purchases of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, in turn, of title to lands, etc., to sub-purchasers do not claim whole or entire mineral purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for systematic grazing range administration under Commissioner of Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for grazing management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers to use land.
