Years That Crew of Notlad Are Lost H CAR FIASCO REACHES CLIMAX IN LETTER RECEIVED IN CITY TODAY

Thiepval Returns Without Crew of Fish Boat Notlad

Wrecked Craft was Found Bottom Up
With Stem Split; Boat Wreckage
on Shore

Maritime Protection cruiser Thiepval returned last night from along the shore of Prince of Wales Island where she was searching for the survivors of the wrecked fishing boat Notlad. Unfortunately she was unsuccessful. Plenty of wreckage was found and the Notlad was examined in Mears Chuck. She had been towed. She was bottom up and her cabins were badly smashed. Curiously the bottom of the boat was uninjured but the stem was split.

The place where the wreck seems to have occurred, close to Point, there was wreckage on the shore including part of the boat which the Notlad was carrying. Four blankets were on a new mattress, part of the decking and the remains of a stove. There was, however, no sign of the lost men and no indication what had become of them.

The Thiepval cruised back and forth all night watching for beacon fires on the shore or any indication that the men were still alive. Finding the search hopeless they returned.

The boat as she lies is of little value. The guns which were carried by the boat were recovered.

The men who were aboard were Capt. Jack Smith, Harry Haskell, Charlie Cook and Walter Scott Pearl.

The Missing Men.
Captain John Smith was a married man, his wife and one child residing in this city near the General Hospital. He was a Canadian and was about forty years of age.

Harry Haskell was also a married man but had no children. His wife resides at 441 Green Street. He was a native of the state of Maine and was about 48 years of age.

Charles Cook was 33 years old and was a native of New Brunswick. He was unmarried and lived at the Knox Hotel. His father and two brothers, Alexander and George, are also Prince Rupert fishermen. The former lives on Sixth Avenue at Seal Cove and the latter at the rear of the post office.

Walter Scott Pearl, a native of the Maritime Provinces, and about 40 years of age, was also well known here. Some years ago he was engineer at the local Imperial Oil Works and last season installed the machinery at the Triple Island light house for Contractor J. H. Hilditch. He was not a fisherman by calling. He was unmarried and has a brother, H. I. Cook, residing here.

Purchased Boat.
It was Mr. Pearl who purchased the Notlad from William N. Dalton, of Vancouver, about a year ago. Having bought the boat he himself went fishing and last fall sold it again to John Smith and Harry Haskell. Until the vessel had been fully paid for and the deal completed, Mr. Pearl remained with her, it being his intention to leave the sea as soon as the transaction was concluded.

All the four men, with the exception of Mr. Pearl, were members of the local branch of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union.

TRADE PACT WITH RUSSIA

Britain Signed Document this
Morning for Opening
Up Business.

LONDON, March 16.—A trade agreement under which commercial relations are to be resumed between Great Britain and Russia was signed this morning by representatives of the two countries. Negotiations have been proceeding for some time. Once they were broken off, but later were reopened.

WORLD CHAMPIONS LEAVE FOR WEST FOR HOCKEY GAMES

OTTAWA, March 16.—The Ottawa hockey team, holders of the Stanley Cup and champions of the world, left last night to defend their title against the Pacific coast champions, which will be either Vancouver or Seattle. The first game will be played on Monday night.

INCOME TAX RETURNS MUST BE IN MARCH 31

OTTAWA, March 16.—Dominion income tax returns on salaries of dividends paid by individuals or corporations must be in by March 31. Returns of individual income or that of corporations by April 30.

MILITARY CYCLISTS VICTIMS OF ATTACK

DUBLIN, March 16.—One military cyclist was shot dead and another fatally wounded when attacked here today. One soldier was wounded in an attack on military dispatch riders when crossing a bridge.

Factory No Intention of Building Fish Cars and Not Equipped for Work

J. L. Lee, secretary of the Prince Rupert branch of the Canadian Fisheries Association, this morning received a letter from F. W. Wallace, national secretary-treasurer, conveying further information in regard to the fish car contracts let by the Canadian National Railways.

Mr. Wallace has received authentic information that the National Steel Car Co. of Hamilton is not in a position to carry out the contract for the refrigerator cars ordered and an official of the company says he cannot understand why the company accepted the contract and why the Canadian National Railways should place the contract with them. All they could do would be to build the steel trucks and bases. The body of the cars would have to be finished elsewhere. The company is equipped for building freight cars only.

Mr. Wallace expressed the opinion that the chances of the long promised cars being finished within the next two or three months is problematical, and the matter is one that should be made a subject of an inquiry.

Telegram to Peck.
Previous to the receipt of the above, at a meeting of the joint fisheries committees of the City Council, Board of Trade and the Prince Rupert branch Canadian Fisheries Association, it was decided to send the following telegram to Colonel Peck:

"Referring to Mr. Hanna's letter to Dr. Reid dated February 25, regarding express refrigerator cars on hand in Prince Rupert from February 6 to 23; from February 1 to 6 we had a shortage of five cars, from February 23 to 28 there was a shortage of ten cars. This is for your information. Can you get us a definite assurance from Dr. Reid regarding when first of thirty cars will be delivered at Prince Rupert? Local cold storage steamers are tied up, thus directly throwing out of employment over one hundred men, primarily on account of uncertainty of securing equipment to ship their catches."

RAILWAYMEN RESENT WAGE CUT PROPOSAL

On New York Central Will be
Rejected by All Except the
Brotherhoods.

NEW YORK, March 16.—All the skilled and unskilled workmen except the four brotherhoods, it is announced, would reject the wage cuts, proposed by the New York Central Railway.

Manson Takes Part In Liquor Debate

Premier Objects to Liquor in Hotel
Bedrooms; Farris Favors Public
Drinking in Government Con-
trolled Places to Illicit
Business

VICTORIA, March 16.—Discussing the question as to whether pure beer or near beer is to be sold in the province under the Moderation Act, Mr. Speaker Manson from the floor of the Legislature advocated the sale of liquor openly and honestly under proper restrictions rather than under conditions which are capable of evasion and which, he said, work havoc to the young manhood and womanhood of the country.

Hon. J. W. deB. Farris declared the worst feature of prohibition in the last three years had been the development of bedroom drinking in defiance of the law and the police commissioners had realized the hopelessness of trying to stop it. He said he would prefer to work out some form to permit public drinking in government controlled places to safeguard morality.

The proposal to permit drinking in bedrooms of hotels does not meet the approval of Premier Oliver, who stated that in face of the great evils resulting therefrom, he would not vote to make it legal to consume liquor in bedrooms.

**MUST PAY
A BILLION
GOLD MARKS**

Demand Made on Germany by
Allies Before March 23.

PARIS, March 16.—The Allied reparations commission in a note to Germany demands payment of a billion gold marks before March 23. The money must be deposited in the Bank of France, Bank of England, or the United States Federal Reserve Bank.

The reparations commission announces that Germany had virtually refused to pay the balance, asserting that the twenty billions of marks had been fully paid.

CHARGES PATTULLO FAVORS DISTRICT

W. J. Bowser Criticizes Amend-
ment to Forest Act, which
Passes Committee

VICTORIA, Mar. 16.—The bill to amend the Forest Act was discussed in committee yesterday for three hours. During that time W. J. Bowser charged Hon. T. D. Pattullo that he was by virtue of the provisions of the bill granting special favors to timber interests in Prince Rupert district. The bill was put through its various stages.

PLANNING A BIG DEMONSTRATION AGAINST THE JEWS

BERLIN, March 16.—Arrangements are being made for a monster anti-semitic demonstration here on Sunday next. The gathering will also be somewhat in the nature of a protest against the rupture of the reparations conference in London.

EMBARGO AGAINST CANADIAN CATTLE SUBJECT OF INQUIRY

LONDON, March 16.—The embargo against the exportation of Canadian cattle to Britain will be the subject of inquiry by an impartial commission Premier Lloyd George intimated yesterday.

Three refrigerator cars arriving from the east last night were shipped out again this morning loaded with fish bought at yesterday's sale. Again there are no cars in the yards and none are yet reported for arrival.

OTTAWA, March 16.—The total value of Canadian trade for the first eleven months of the fiscal year ending February 28 was \$2,288,518,171 or \$178,059,967 greater than the grand total for the same period of the previous year.

Notlad Wreck

Regretted by All.

The wreck of the fishing boat Notlad is one of those sad events that come to every fishing community occasionally. Prince Rupert has been singularly free from fatal accidents and as a result the present is the more impressive. It again brings to notice the risks attendant on the calling of the fisherman and is one reason why it should be a remunerative business.

The Daily News wishes to join with the rest of the community in expressing sympathy with those who are today wondering whether or not to mourn as lost the men who faced the dangers of the deep. We can ill afford to lose the fine men who every day go out to gather the fish harvest. It is to be hoped that even yet the missing men may be found, although we have to admit that the outlook is not encouraging.

Good Work in

Publishing Book.

The Dominion Government department of health has sent out a most useful little book entitled "The Canadian Mothers' Book," mention of which is made elsewhere. It is one of the first fruits of the establishment of a department of health at Ottawa and the Government is to be commended for the excellent work and the department officials for carrying out the detail. It is something new in this country but is a move in the right direction.

There is such lamentable ignorance among so many of the young people who undertake the serious duties of life that anything which can be done to educate them is worthy of commendation. The health department has made a good beginning and it is much to be desired that they keep up the work. The next important move to the publishing of the book is providing for its circulation. It might be a good thing to let every clergyman have a supply and make it compulsory for him to distribute them to the young couples on their wedding days, or possibly it might go as part of the wedding certificate.

Deplorable Condition Regarding Fish Cars.

There is a deplorable condition in regard to fish cars. The information received today by the Canadian Fisheries Association will certainly make the people of Prince Rupert stop and think. It looks to us as if this port never occupies more than a passing thought in the minds of the people at the head of affairs. Happily we have friends at court and our cause is being taken up with vigor. We hope that we shall yet secure that degree of attention which is our due.

Clergy Disappoints Many Followers.

Many of those who were putting their faith in the farmers' party, now called the National Progressives, as the one that would lead them along lines of radical legislation, are disappointed to find that Hon. T. A. Crerar, the leader of the party, believes in private enterprise wherever possible and not in government ownership. He apparently agrees with many of the older statesmen that the least governed country is often the best governed. What we want to see is the people getting out and doing things for themselves instead of eternally harking back to the Government for aid.

Unfortunately in so far as Prince Rupert is concerned we have to look to the Government for our railway and port development, because the Government owns the railways and it is the duty of the Dominion Government to build wharves and other shipping facilities everywhere throughout the country. We also look to the Provincial Government to provide us with facilities for the carrying on of the business of the province in this district such as the new Government Buildings. These matters are incidental. What we want is to develop our own district as much as possible. Encourage private enterprise and not depend on the work the Government brings to make us a livelihood.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

EDMONTON PRICES
EGGS AND PRODUCE

EDMONTON, March 16.—Fresh eggs were offered here today at from 40c to 50c per dozen, which is a reduction of 10c over last week. Dairy butter was offered by eight or ten dealers at from 50c to 55c per pound, and at these prices was finding a ready market.

Three or four dealers were offering beef at 8c per pound for front quarters and 13c for hinds. One farmer was offering pork at 20c per pound.

Fresh Radishes.

Potatoes were selling in small quantities at 80c per bushel. One dealer was offering cabbages at 4c per pound, turnips 3c, beets 3c, parsnips 5c and carrots 3c per pound. A few fresh radishes were offered at 10c per bunch. The demand for vegetables was fairly light.

Two or three chickens were offered by one dealer at \$1.75 each. Stove wood was selling at \$4 per load.

KRONSTADT PAPER
SAYS TROTSKY IS
THE SOUL KILLER

STOCKHOLM, March 16.—A new revolutionary newspaper, the *Kronstadt*, has appeared at Kronstadt. It publishes an energetic resolution passed by the soldiers of the fortress, appealing to the leaders to hold fast.

"The people have had enough of Communist yoke," says the newspaper. "The soul killer, Trotsky, must be told that we are not frightened by his threatening proclamations thrown down by aeroplanes on their way to Kronstadt. Our hearts go out over our corpses. We have made up our minds to conquer or die. Down with the blood-thirsty Trotsky and his followers."

GIANT OCTOPUS-TOWS
BOATS FORTY MILES

PALM BEACH, Fla., March 16.—Florenz Zeigfeld, Jr., and J. Leonard Neopige battled for eight hours with a giant ray, or devil fish, that towed two boats forty miles from Palm Beach and 17 miles to sea and then escaped when the cables broke, although its body bore four harpoons, eight rifle bullets and fifteen wounds from lances. The sea monster was in sight of the bathers near the breakers' pier, when discovered. Harpoons were thrown into the monster which immediately sped away and escaped when the lines parted. Airplanes followed the boats and watched the struggle.

MUST REGISTER SOON
FOR PROVINCIAL VOTE

Lists Close on April 4 and Court of Revision Sits May 16.

The provincial voters' lists close on April 4 and the court of revision sits on May 16. It will be necessary for all those who failed to vote at the last provincial election to register again for their names were automatically taken from the list. For those who did vote the names will be retained without further registering. The Dominion Government used the provincial lists up till the 1918 election when special lists were prepared. What procedure is to be taken before the next federal election in the matter of voters' lists has not been announced locally as yet.

SWISS JUDGES AND SOCIALISTS

Read Out of Party for Giving Just Judgment

GENEVA, Mar. 16.—Two Swiss judges of the cantonal tribunal at Zurich have just been read out of the Swiss Communist Party for having sentenced a Socialist workman to 10 days in jail for assaulting an unsyndicated workman in a strike at Zurich.

The judges, Drs. Balsiger and Luchinger, were summoned to appear before the socialist communist committee on a charge that the verdict was "incompatible with the communist doctrine." When the judges refused to appear, they were promptly ousted from the party.

Writing in the Volksrecht Journal, the judges declare that though they are socialists and demand liberty they judge according to their conscience and law without regard to outside political pressure.

Many papers commenting on the incident state that this should be an example to Swiss voters of what the result would be if communists who received their orders from Moscow were to come into power in Switzerland.

The agrarian parties of several cantons have made a proposal that all communist employees should be dismissed as a danger to the state.

FIRST RACE OF SEASON WON BY ALL OUTSIDERS

LONDON, March 16.—The Lincolnshire handicap was won today by Soratus, a thirty to one shot. The favorite, Ugly Duckling, did not figure in the money. Senora secured second place, the betting against her being 20 to 1 and Queenaguld came third with even greater odds, the offerings of the bookies on him being 100 to 1 with few takers.

BROTHER LOCAL MAN CONCEIVED GREAT PROJECT

Arthur E. Morgan Credited with America's Second Biggest Engineering Plan

"The greatest engineering work undertaken by Americans since the building of the Panama Canal and the greatest flood prevention work ever attempted in the world," is credited to the genius of Arthur E. Morgan, brother of J. R. Morgan, of this city, by Floyd W. Parsons, writer of the "Everybody's Business" department in the Saturday Evening Post. The special article dealing with the Miami, Ohio, regional flood control project appears in the Saturday Evening Post of February 4. It is interesting to note that this tremendous work, which will cost \$25,000,000 and will take nine years to complete, was conceived by Mr. Morgan who, when he went to school, was considered a "dull boy," but has become one of the greatest engineers of America through his work in the states of Ohio and Tennessee.

Great Miami Flood

In 1913 a great flood swept over the Miami Valley causing death to hundreds of persons and causing a property loss of several million dollars. All the towns and cities of the valley, including Dayton, were inundated and when the waters returned to their usual levels the people of Ohio looked upon a scene of death and devastation unparalleled in modern history.

Rising to the occasion from their misfortune the people of Miami decided to adopt a plan for the common safeguarding of the whole valley and Engineer Morgan was called in. He spent weeks in studying the region and drew up a proposed law, the Conservancy Act, whereby the communities of the whole valley would unite and remove the menace and, after a hard struggle, it was passed.

To Redeem Losses

It took five years to plan the project, two years of construction have passed and now, it is estimated, two more years will bring the great work to a conclusion. River channels will be improved and there will be five great dams and at the base of each dam will be concrete conduits so that no more water can pass through them than the river channels can carry away. All flood water in excess of this will be confined by the dams in retarding basins until the danger has passed and then it will be distributed in the farm lands where it is required. The waters are not only to be controlled, but it is intended they shall redeem with their usefulness the ravages of the past.

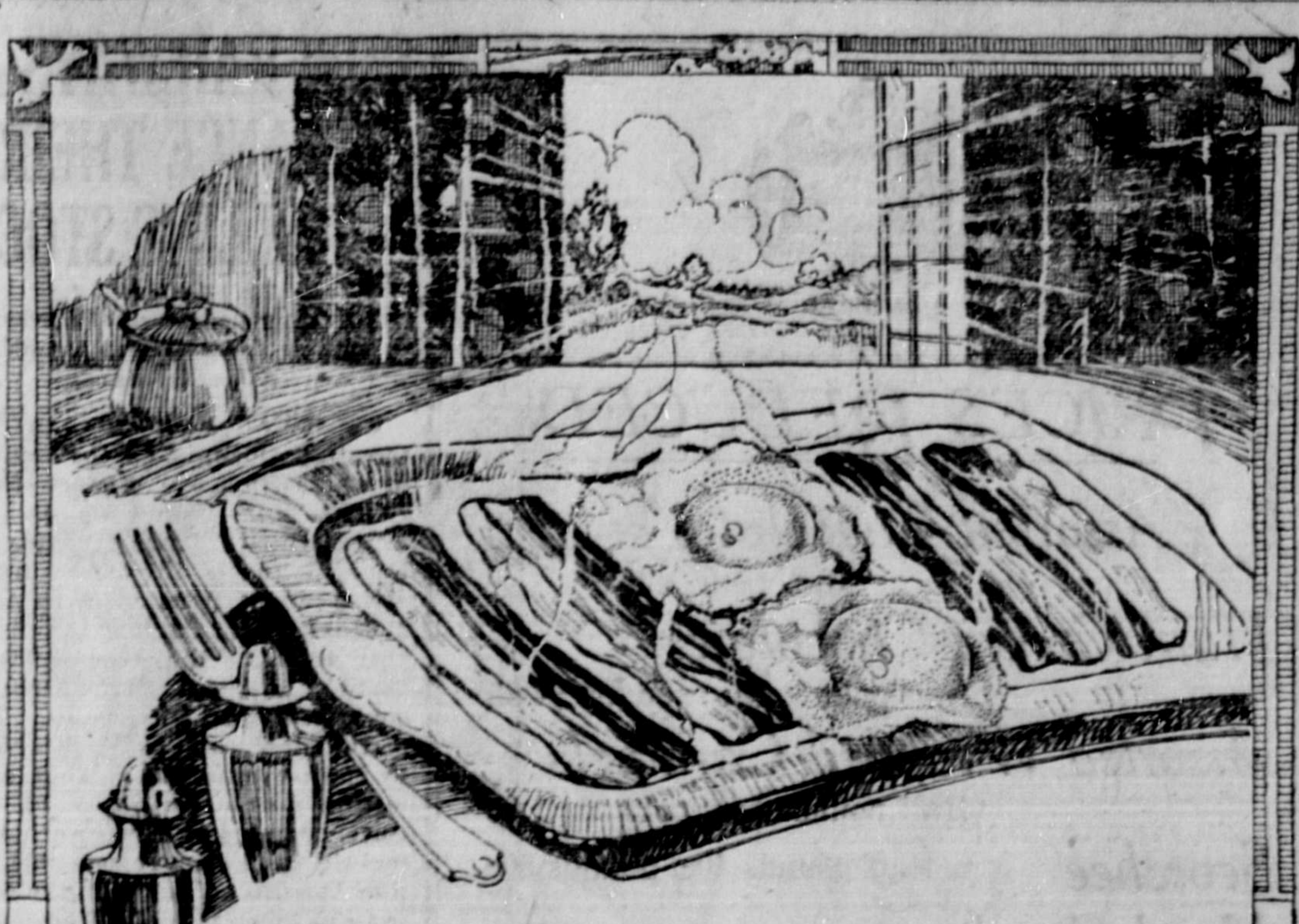

HOW RAILWAYS FINANCE THEIR ROLLING STOCK

Interesting Lesson in Borrowing Shown from Grand Trunk Operations

OTTAWA, Mar. 16.—An interesting sidelight on the manner in which railways finance their rolling stock came up in the House when Finance Minister Sir Henry Drayton in answering a series of questions asked by A. B. McMaster said during the fiscal year 1920-21 the Grand Trunk Railway borrowed \$12,000,000 on equipment trust certificates. The certificates were not guaranteed by the Government. They were issued by the authority of the Government, but the Government was in no way responsible, as they were a mortgage on the rolling stock purchased. They were sold at 91.65 and realized \$10,998,000 in New York funds. Interest and principal were payable in New York.

On October 1, 1920, Sir Henry went on, the Government guaranteed Grand Trunk Railway bonds to the extent of \$25,000,000. The bonds were sold at 91.65 and realized \$23,595,205 in New York funds.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$15 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may adjoint for pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of at least 5 acres are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided satisfactory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 60 acres may be purchased, conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are recorded for five years.

Provision for return of money accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.
