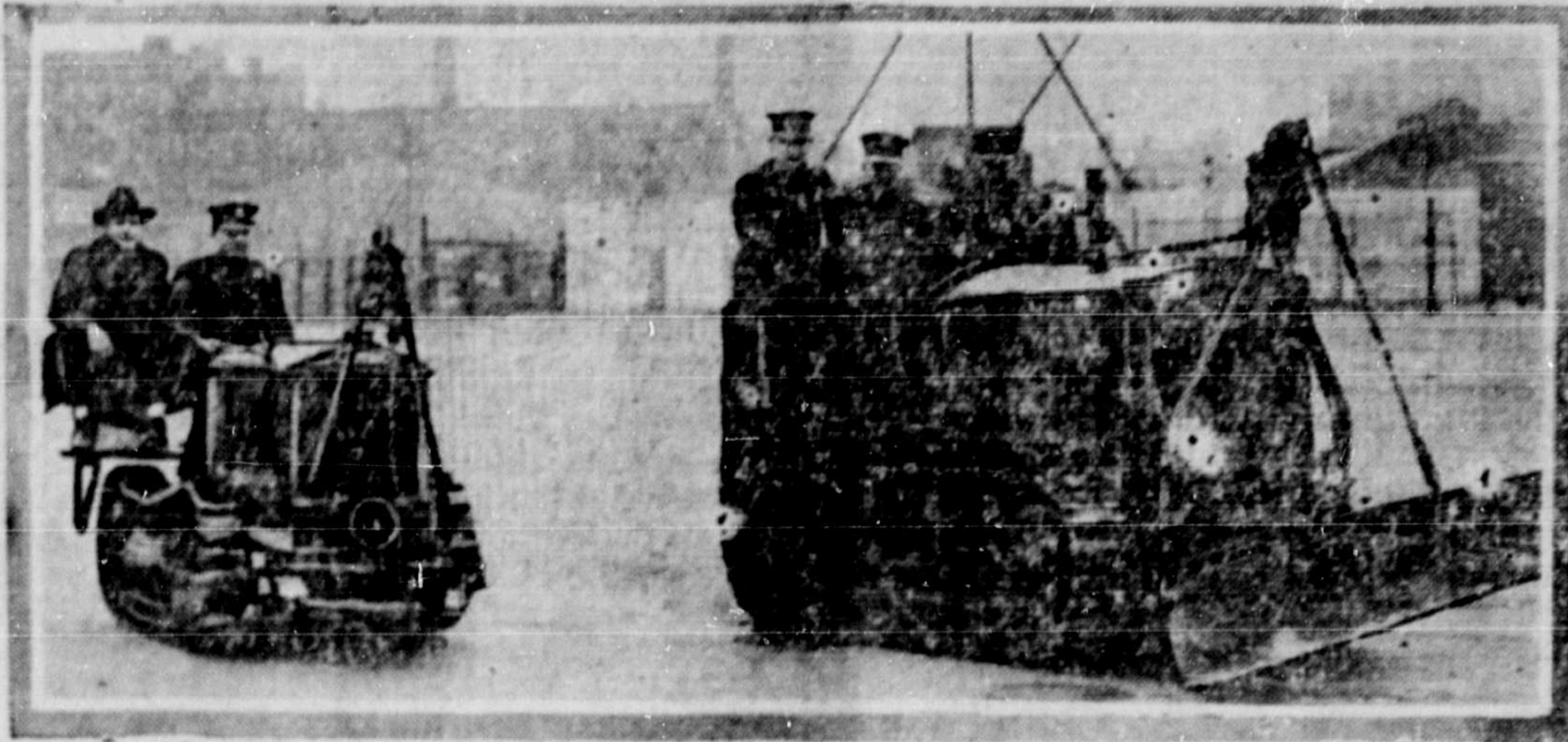

DEATH TAKES J. S. EMERSON

Owner of Local Lumber Mill Was Prominent Figure for Many Years.

E. F. Doby, manager of the Prince Rupert Lumber mill, received word yesterday of the death of J. S. Emerson, the well known lumberman and financier, owner of the local mill.

James Sharpe Emerson has for years been a well known figure in the lumber world. Several years ago he was dealing heavily in British Columbia timber and had serious disagreements with the government of the day. He fought it in the courts and won. Being an Irishman he was fond of a tussle, either with the forces of nature or with other obstacles that presented themselves.

Mr. Emerson was born in county Fermanagh, Ireland, in 1858 and was educated in that country. He went into business in Kansas state and was at different times engaged in brokerage, meat packing, stock raising and lumber manufacturing. He came to British Columbia in 1899 and at once went into the lumber business.

One son, John Emerson, is well known here and a daughter also survives him.

CONFERENCE BETWEEN SINN FEIN AND LLOYD GEORGE HAS CEASED

Hope of Peace with Ireland Not Gone, but O'Flanagan Not to be Party

LONDON, Jan. 11.—The conference between Michael O'Flanagan, acting president of Sinn Fein, and Premier Lloyd George, with a view to the peace with Ireland has been broken off and will not renew. O'Flanagan has returned to Dublin. Peace negotiations have not altogether broken down, but O'Flanagan is not to be a party to further exchanges.

SMALL ONTARIO TOWN IN GRIP OF SNOWSTORM

MATTICE, Ontario, Jan. 11.—Mattice, a small settlement on the Transcontinental Railway towards which three stranded American balloonists were rushing from Hudson Bay Territory is today in the grip of a severe snowstorm.

Candidates for Office Agree on Playgrounds

All Would Help Cause of Children; Speaker Urge Consideration of Subject and Immediate Action

"Everybody agrees with the principle of more playgrounds in the abstract, but when it comes to dollars and cents they seem to be afraid." That was the opening remark of L. W. Patmore at the playgrounds meeting last night in the Empress Theatre, W. E. Thompson presiding. Mr. Patmore said the school board had had this in mind for some time and had been gradually improving school playgrounds.

The King Edward school grounds are not big enough for a ball game, he said. Outside of Acropolis Hill there is only one place large enough available and that is at Hays Cove Circle. It will take a lot of filling and cutting to level it and the school board had been almost afraid to include in the estimates a proper sum to fix up the grounds. Whoever was on the new school board would now know the sentiment of the people is with them. There is no reason the school board should pay for this, however. The city council should do it. They should have a grounds available this coming summer. Some were in favor of a number of small grounds but he favored one large one at Hays Cove Circle. It was illogical to put it elsewhere.

Thoughtful Hero.

Mr. Patmore read a letter from G. C. Perry telling of several lots Jack Enoch had bequeathed for his purpose. This boy had gone overseas and been killed in the war but before going he had thought of the young people of the city and had left these lots for them.

Mr. Patmore said he hoped to see Acropolis Hill developed. Estimates should be obtained to find the cost of moving the rock. The regarding the necessity of better facilities, George Nickerson suggested the city making arrangements with the boat owners to carry children to the salt lakes in summer at reduced rates, in addition to other recreational efforts. BRITISH GET ORDER LEAVE

Women and Children of Britain in Persia Must Evacuate.

LONDON, Jan. 11.—The British legation at Teheran has ordered the immediate evacuation of all British women and children in view of the announced withdrawal of the British forces from Persia. It is said that as a sequel to this action there may be a Bolshevik invasion of Persia.

Rochester Makes Appeal on Record

Would Deal Drastically with Police Affairs; Stands for Playgrounds but would Welcome Power Company Here

To the Electors of Prince Rupert:

Ladies and Gentlemen,—In seeking your support for the office of mayor I feel that I am justified in doing so after serving three years as an alderman. As chairman of the Finance Committee I know of the great difficulties in raising money for new developments and no public works can be done without money.

As our bonded indebtedness is considered too high in comparison with our population, it was necessary to practice the utmost economy to carry on; however, we have pulled through nicely, and our city is today in good financial condition. Cities and towns to the east of us have defaulted on their bonds and are now practically in the hands of a receiver, owing to extravagant councils.

So far as the power question is concerned, I would welcome any bona fide electric company that would develop water power in this district and sell juice to the city. I would recommend substantial encouragement to insure development, as we must have power, but always with the city's interests guarded.

Cow Bay.

My attitude towards Cow Bay does not, and has not changed. The city has riparian rights there and the ratepayers should see that a thoroughly reliable council is elected who will not allow these rights to be taken from us.

Now that the bonds have been successfully floated and money available, street grading should be pushed with all possible speed.

I am opposed to plank roads and believe in dispensing with every foot of them wherever possible—substituting therefor permanent or semi-permanent roadways.

Playgrounds for the children in different sections of the city are an absolute necessity, in order to keep the little ones off our narrow streets, and thus avoid accidents. This should be a first charge upon the new council.

Clean up City.

And now last, but not least, comes one of the most serious questions. Attempts have been made at different times to clean up the city but apparently without much success. Personally I am satisfied that it cannot be done satisfactorily with the present police staff. Either they must go

or I must go. The ratepayers hold the key to the situation, and must decide what treatment is necessary to effect a cure. If elected next Thursday, I will surely lose no time in putting your desires into action.

Thanking you, ladies and gentlemen, for the support which I know I am bound to receive at your hands at the polls on Thursday.

CREEKS FIGHT AGAINST TURKS

Success for Both Sides Reported in Official Communique.

LONDON, January 11.—According to an official Greek communique, the Greeks have commenced an offensive in Asia Minor against the Turkish nationalist forces, resulting in important successes for Greek forces. Fighting is reported in the Mendere region, where the Greeks started to attack but had their lines pierced by the Turks in several places. Many wounded have arrived at Smyrna.

AERIAL TRAM TO PREMIER

Preparations Being Made to Construct Sixteen Miles to Tidewater.

Preparations are being made at Stewart to build a sixteen-mile aerial tram line from the Premier mine to tidewater at Stewart wharf, according to arrivals from the mining camp. By this means 100 tons a day of ore could be shipped, part of which would go to Tacoma and the rest to Anxox. With the installation of the tramline lower grade ores would be shipped than at present, and the shipments would be made the year round. The concentrates from the mill would also come out that way.

FRANK INTERCHANGE OF VIEWS ON IRELAND

O'Flanagan Gone to Dublin to Consult Friends on the Situations.

LONDON, January 11.—Father O'Flanagan's return to Dublin followed the meeting with Premier Lloyd George and Hamar Greenwood, chief secretary of state for Ireland, at which a very frank interchange of views took place.

O'Flanagan has gone to Ireland to communicate with friends, it is stated. He indirectly represented De Valera and the interview was given at his request.

DANCE ORCHESTRA HAS BEEN FORMED

The Rupert Dance Orchestra is the latest organization to be formed here. It opened last night at the weekly dance given by Mrs. B. O. Crewe in the De Lux hall at which there was a good attendance. The personnel of the orchestra is B. G. Peyton, cornet; W. McInnes, violin; H. Crawford, piano; H. White, drums.

ANNUAL REPORT OF CITY UTILITIES

Light and Telephone Departments Showed Earnings of \$35,062.19

The annual report of the Utilities Superintendent for 1920 was read at last night's council meeting and meeting with the approval of the board a vote of thanks was tendered by the council to Superintendent of Utilities T.C. Duncan.

The net earnings of the entire department for the year was \$380,62.19 and there were increases in the service rendered by both the electric light and telephone departments. The past year has been at the same time the busiest and most successful year for the department.

Slow Telephones

The telephone service has been continuous and the slowness at times has been on account of the overloaded panel. This condition will be overcome when the new panel now on order is in commission.

Speaking to the report Ald. Perry, chairman of the Utilities Committee, stated that more development and extension would have been desirable. In future he would be opposed to the Finance Committee plan of devoting the profits and reserve of this department to the work of other departments when it could be used in increasing the light and telephone efficiency with a possible reduction in rates.

B.C. EXHIBIT WINS MEDAL

Honors Taken by Display at the Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto.

VICTORIA, January 11.—British Columbia's forest products exhibit has been awarded the gold medal and diploma for the second successive year at the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, according to information received here yesterday by Hon. T. D. Pattullo.

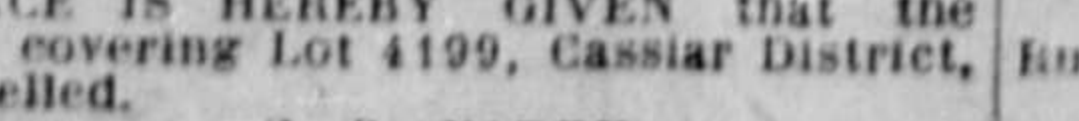

WHERE MONEY WAS EXPENDED

Alderman C. C. Perry Gives Some Interesting Figures Regarding Increased Taxation.

C. C. Perry has handed in for publication the following statement:

Mr. G. Nickerson, one of the mayoralty candidates, has expressed wonder as to what use the money raised by taxation on increased millage in 1920 was put.

The mill-rate in 1919 was 13.750.

The mill rate in 1920 was 25.168. The increase is accounted for as follows:

Reduction in assessment approximately \$2,250,000, equals 5.400 mills. Exchange, \$18,000, equals 2 mills. Amount over expended in 1919 equals 2 mills. Special rates equal 2.150 mills.

The special rates referred to are as follows—

New School 30-year bylaw (interest and redemption, annual \$10,897.33) Morse Creek Bridge 15-year bylaw (law int. & red, annual) 1,235.52 5-year Sewer Maintenance, int. & red, annual 2,373.96 20-year Water Extension, int. & red, annual 1,743.71 30-year Hydro-Electric addition—Al. int. & red, annual 1,903.95 Amount reserved for pending purchase of rock quarry 3,951.46

All the monies raised as security against future payments of interest and redemption.

In addition to the foregoing, the following extra money had to be raised, viz:—

Exchange (for 1920) \$18,000 Exchange (for 1919) 2,900 Grant to Board of Trade 900 Engineering Department 3,955 To meet appointment of Building Inspector, \$1,950.00, and for salary increases 2,500 Fire Department, for extra hose etc. Department 1,878 Health Department 2,505 Police Department 15,000 on account of increased population increase of staff and salaries and \$84,000 over-expended in 1919.

School Board 13,595 Due to increase of staff and salaries, and extra temporary school rooms. Board of Works Department 5,030 Tractor, \$2,000, maintenance of plank roads, 1919, \$6,000, and 1920, \$10,000.

As a member of the City Council, it would have pleased me better to have seen Mr. Nickerson investigate the civic expenditure before offering any criticism of the administration. I hope the details here given will be sufficient accountability for the extra millage imposed upon the ratepayers in 1920. All of them have been carefully considered, and much of the money is in the treasury.

800 children, who paraded, all had parents who were interested in this thing. The sentiment was overwhelming.

Dr. Grant Speaks.

Rev. Dr. H. B. Grant was the second speaker. He referred to the fact that in the election much had been made of Cow Bay, but this was a small question compared with the one engaging their attention. In the war it was found there were a great number of weaklings due to lack of development in youth.

"If you raise a generation of defectives they will curse you," he said. In Prince Rupert there was no place for the children to play except on the streets. That was not fair to the boys and girls. It was not giving them a chance. The children should have proper physical constitutions and that could only be obtained by plenty of play. They should have the best possible start in life.

"No individual or community ever amounted to anything without moral power," declared the speaker. Here there was not room to get the boys in teams and train them in esprit de corps. The club spirit was the one that benefited boys. It gave them moral power, one of the greatest things in national life. Children were more important than any other interest they had.

Principal Brady.

"This movement heralds the beginning of Prince Rupert's prosperity," declared J. C. Brady, principal of the high school. Too much attention, he thought, had been given to other matters. It was impossible to get pure and honest government when the children were not given opportunities to develop. Where children were deprived of free play they found discontent, and a discontented boy means a discontented man. In Rupert they were all trying to deal with this question.

"First you must investigate every possible ground," said Mr. Brady, "and then formulate a scheme to carry out the improvements in continuity. There should be a practical scheme laid down for steady progress." He said authorities decided that crime disappeared with the approach of recreation. They should make the city better every year. City corruption would be relegated to the dust if proper recreation facilities were provided.

Candidates Agreed.

Following the three speakers of the evening, practically all the candidates for the school board and city council, including the two mayoralty candidates, spoke favorably to the plan of improving the playing facilities for children. There were differences as to method and location but all agreed

SOLDIER VIEWPOINT

Editor Daily News.—With reference to the coming municipal election and the candidature of five returned soldiers for seats as aldermen, I would like to draw the attention of the public to a point of view in regard to men who served with the army overseas, which, judging from opinions expressed in the press and elsewhere, seems to be often lost sight of.

Now in the first place the returned soldier is a citizen of the country and one that in most cases has sacrificed both time and business opportunities to defend the rights of that citizenship (we will leave out all heroics and look at it from purely a business point of view).

When this citizen comes back he wants to enjoy the privileges of his citizenship and he comes back with a broader mind, a greater appreciation of the realities of life, and at first, a greater confidence in the fellowmen gained from the mutual independence of his comrades under the stress of active service. He also has acquired a belief that anything worth while can be accomplished provided "the will to do" is there.

Stand for Progress

"During the war a fact which was impressed on the soldier more than anyone was the ease with which huge sums of money could be voted by the governments for the purposes of the war, which purposes for the most part were destructive to life and property; though none the less apparently necessary to remove a menace to the progress of humanity. It is therefore only reasonable for the returned soldier to look for a like willingness on the part of the Government to promote constructive work for the development of the country and the betterment of its people, and as the majority of men returning are impressed with the same idea of improvement of conditions of life, they naturally get together to try to accomplish these things.

Practical Citizens

Therefore the general public should realize that there is something to be gained by the whole nation in co-operating with and supporting the soldier citizens in their efforts for the welfare of the country. In Kelly and Silversides you have hard working, practical citizens who have the confidence of their ex-soldier comrades and the advantages gained from war experiences. C. B. FORMBY.

FIRE CHIEF'S 1920 REPORT

Net Fire Loss in City for Year of But \$130 Establishes a Record.

The annual report of the fire chief was received last night by the city council and much gratification was expressed at the showing that was made by the department in the year 1920. There had been 52 alarms and the total damage was \$1,356.75 which was covered by \$1,226.75 insurance, leaving a net loss of but \$130. Property to the value of \$294,000 had been involved.

Considering the facts that the streets were in none too good condition and all the buildings in the city practically were of wooden construction, this report establishes a record and the fire department is highly pleased. Chief McDonald recommended in his report that this year the mains be extended to Manson Way and hydrants be installed there for the protection of increased building in that direction. The purchase of a light car was also recommended on account of the poor shape of some of the streets where the big trucks might be endangered. The mayor, aldermen and members of the department were thanked for their co-operation in the work of the past year.

GOVERNMENT AID ONLY WHERE SITUATION IS ABSOLUTELY INTENSE

Premier Oliver Replies to Mayor's Request for Grant of \$50,000.

A letter from Hon. T. D. Pattullo asking that further reports be submitted to the provincial government with a view to obtaining advances of money for street work to give relief to unemployment was referred to the new council last evening.

Premier Oliver's reply to the request of the mayor for \$50,000 was read and the premier expressed the opinion that making the unemployment situation incidental to the street work was not the correct basis and the government was only extending aid where the unemployment situation made it absolutely necessary to finance public works.

Letters from Hon. G. D. Robertson, minister of labor at Ottawa, and J. D. McNeven, deputy minister at Victoria, were also brought to the attention of the council and were left over on the suggestion of Aid, Peppy.

SECTION TWO BRIDGE ENTIRELY BUILT OF FIR

City Council Decided Last Night to Pay \$712 More for This Material.

On the recommendation of the utilities committee the city council decided last night to have E. H. Shockey construct the Morse Creek bridge of fir throughout instead of fir, hemlock and spruce as set out in the original contract. The cost will be \$712 extra or \$4 more per thousand feet which still leaves the tender of Mr. Shockey some \$1,500 below that of the next lowest bidder.

WHO DELAYING COW BAY NOW?

City's "Pet Aversion" Crops up to Haunt Dying Council.

Last night the farewell meeting of the 1920 city council was held and it was only fitting that the Cow Bay question, the city's family skeleton, should come forth from its closet to haunt the board's dying session. A letter from Hon. Frank Carvell, chief railway commissioner, had the effect of bringing such about and each of the council members had another opportunity of delving into the intricacies of the problem while the press sat back with sighs of disgust and, with glances of trepidation towards the mayor's pedestal, ventured to bring forth the seductive weed and take their minds far from the smelly atmosphere of Cameron Cove, commonly known as Cow Bay, and privately termed with various phrases of unparliamentary nomenclature.

Mr. Carvell stated that the railway's renewed application for the filling of Cow Bay had reached Ottawa while he was on the ground in Prince Rupert. He had asked for the city's attitude but the city's reply had not answered the question. It was up to the commission to give a decision and Mr. Carvell thought the city should be interested. Before there was a decision, of course, the railway commission would have a public hearing on the question.

Where is the Plan?

Ald. Perry then tried to find out what had happened to the map on which the city council and Board of Trade had agreed to the filling. Evidently this map had disappeared and the old plan of 1917, which the council didn't like, had cropped up again. The question was: "Where was the plan of the Board of Trade?" Much general information was then forthcoming but it wasn't quite clear where the plan had gone although the Privy Council thought it would be alright to fill Cow Bay providing the railway took the responsibility. "Now," said Alderman Perry, "who is responsible for the delay?"

Laying the Blame.

Ald. McLennan blamed it on the provincial government. They should make an offer now. Ald. Dybbavn defended the provincial government and stated that Mr. Pattullo had expressed his willingness to discuss the matter with the council. It was the council's fault for it had not set a date. Ald. Murray asked if Mr. Pattullo had made this statement to the council in writing. He thought it was the Board of Trade's undertaking. Ald. Perry thought the city council should be represented on the Board of Trade and, next year, the Board of Trade wouldn't get any grant as far as he was concerned unless they got representation. Then the motion for the consigning of "the boggy" to the new council carried with Acting Mayor Rochester remarking he thought it was up to the provincial government as much as any other body.

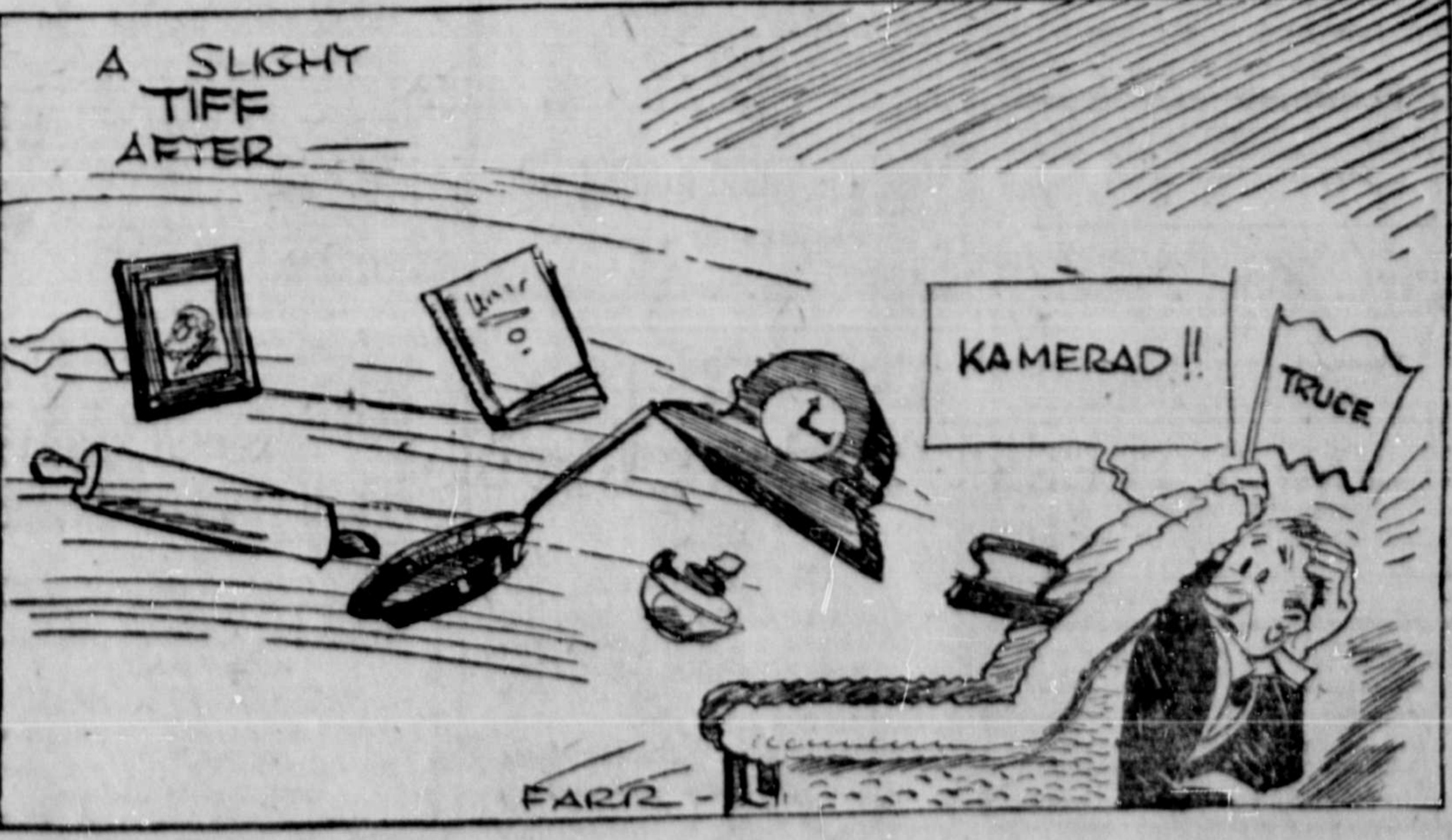

CHILDREN IN BIG PARADE

Demonstration for More Playgrounds Was Impressive One.

Over seven hundred of the city's school children joined yesterday afternoon in the demonstration parade organized in the interests of better playgrounds in the city. They were marshalled by Principals J. C. Brady and A. M. MacDonald who were assisted by the other members of the teaching staffs. The King Edward school children marched from the King Edward school along Seventh and Sixth Avenues to Fulton Street and were joined at Fulton and Fifth by the children of the Borden Street school and the Catholic school. The entire parade then proceeded through town.

There were many banners carried, some bearing striking mottoes and the parade had quite an effect in making the citizens realize the necessity and importance of playgrounds. Two of the banners read: "Our best asset, 1000 children, but no place to play," and "Where can we play?"

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.
Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not over 12.5.
Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.
Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.
Records without permanent residence may be issued after fulfilling residential requirements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 5 years are required.
Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 500 acres may be leased by one person or company.
Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 10 acres may be purchased, conditions include payment of stumpage.
Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Subsidy of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.
PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons not residing with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made restrictive.
No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 25, 1918.
Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on accounts of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.
Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 31, 1920.
SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.
Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic dressing of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may file applications for leasing based on management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
