EMPEROR THEATRE

Disarmament Difficult In Spite of Burden of Taxes on All Countries

WASHINGTON, August 16.—(By Canadian Press.)—Not all optimism with respect to the forthcoming disarmament conference. It is true that most of the official outgoings and the comment seen in print assumes the conference will be a success and result in a definite and satisfactory agreement for the reduction of armaments, or at least of naval armament. But under the surface talk is of a decidedly different nature.

Everybody is hoping, of course, that the conference will succeed and will result in such a start in the reduction of

Britain by reason of her geographical and maritime situation—something which some able men here advocate—the road to disarmament, or large reduction of armament, would be comparatively easy.

What of Future.

Here is the thing which far-sighted men are asking and they think the question may overtake the conference into doing something worth while. It is: "What will happen if the disarmament conference fails? Will the United States then in spite of itself be driven headlong toward another war, presumably in the Pacific?" Another war is too terrible to contemplate. It might mean the wreck of western civilization. After all, the fear of this untoward thing, suspended like the sword of Damocles over the conference, will be the most potent force working toward an understanding.

SAVED GIRL THEN DROWNED

Sad Tragedy Stirs People of Courtenay and Comox Valley.

COURTENAY, Aug. 16.—News of a sad drowning tragedy agitated the people of Courtenay and the whole Comox valley yesterday. Miss Winona Farley fell into the Courtenay River and John Sutherland went in after her and succeeded in bringing her to shore. He was so exhausted from the effort, however, that he fell back into the river and was drowned.

The Courtenay is a swift running stream which passes through the town into Comox harbor.

Wheat Crop Will Yield Large Sum.

The wheat crop this year is estimated at something like 300,000,000 bushels throughout this country, the largest ever reaped. The buying power of the Dominion will be the greatest in history. There is bound to be business doing when nearly half a billion dollars gets into circulation.

Reports received from manufacturers and jobbers indicate that stocks of merchandise are lower than they have been for years. The faltering market made it desirable that everyone should clean out old stocks and purchase carefully until bottom was reached. That condition cannot continue long. Merchants must buy because customers demand it. With the return to a period of buying, there will be a return of employment and, while there is no indication that prices will again advance, there will be more trading.

Common Interests of Neighboring Countries.

During the year ending May last the official statistics show that Canada purchased more goods from the United States than she did during the previous year. While her purchases were over \$800,000,000, the purchases from the United Kingdom amounted to less than \$200,000,000. We are bound to do business with the United States and that country is bound to do business with us. Our interests are bound together so closely that national sentiment has little effect. It seems a pity that under these conditions Canada and the United States cannot live side by side, mutually helpful the one of the other, and without erecting tariff walls against each other.

Irish News Is Not Encouraging.

The news telegraphed through yesterday to the effect that there was a deadlock in the negotiations between the British Government and the republican element in Ireland caused much disappointment here, where people take a deep interest in Irish affairs and would like to see a settlement of outstanding difficulties. Possibly the meeting today will decide to continue negotiations under the terms laid down by Lloyd George. The offer of Dominion status under which the complete management of her own affairs is offered Ireland, just as Canada has the complete management of her own affairs, it was thought would have been a sufficient inducement to the recalcitrants. It is to be hoped that no reversion to the horrible condition of a few weeks ago will be tolerated by the leaders of either side.

Election Not Earlier Than Next Spring.

A Canadian Press telegraphic despatch received yesterday stated that if the Dominion Government lost out in the coming by-elections there would likely be an election in the spring. Apparently that is the earliest time at which the government would feel itself called upon to appeal to the country, and then there will be another excuse to carry on until summer, unless all signs to the contrary fail. There is little hope or fear of an early election. It is a possibility but not a probability.

Protect Our Insectivorous Birds.

It may appear startling, but it is a fact, that if all the insect pests ravaging our crops could be suppressed, and all the plant and tree diseases eradicated, and the increased revenue derived by the country thereby could be turned into the Dominion treasury, there would need to be no question of taxation. This idea is largely substantiated by the fact set forth by the Dominion Department of Agriculture that a conservative estimate of the annual loss in Canada to field, orchard and garden crops due to destructive insects is upwards of \$200,000,000. As our authority says: "To this huge devastation must be added the enormous annual destruction caused by forest insects, stored produce insects, etc." Upon this statement the entomologist founds a well-sustained argument in favor of the protection of insectivorous birds, such as the prairie horned-lark, the robin, the somewhat despised crow, the red-breasted nuthatch, the western tanager, the myrtle warbler, the chickadee, grouse, gulls, and many other kinds. In the state of Iowa it has been estimated that tree sparrows annually devour something like 985 tons of seed weeds.

Speaking of the robin, an investigator in Toronto found that a single bird kept in confinement ate 165 cutworms in one day. Another authority states that a brood of prairie horned-larks consumed 400 cutworms in one day. This same authority, Norman Griddle, Dominion entomologist in Manitoba, declares that six crows are capable of consuming three bushels of grasshoppers in one season. It is recorded that in certain places in Manitoba areas of growing grain have been saved from destruction by the pestilential grasshopper owing to a large flock of gulls. In light of these facts it is gratifying to be informed by the Dominion entomologist, Arthur Gibson, that the importance of protecting our useful birds is becoming more and more recognized, especially by farmers and fruitgrowers.

INCINERATOR IS PROPOSED

City Council Is Preparing Bylaw to Be Presented to Ratepayers in September.

The city council went into committee of the whole last night to deal with the proposed incinerator bylaw and after a long discussion rose and reported progress. Expert advice is now to be sought in regard to the kind of an incinerator to be installed and the site of it. The bylaw will be submitted to a vote of the ratepayers along with other bylaws to be voted on next month.

The by-law proposed by the Board of Works provides for an expenditure of \$25,000 and the site which has been selected by it is on City Reserve Block 28 about 600 feet south of Hays Creek in McClymont Park. This site is on a hillside and will allow for the dumping of the refuse right into the incinerator from a platform. It was decided to leave the definite estimate and the site over for a week until more information can be obtained.

In Other Cities.

Communications were read from the city of Nelson, Transcona, Fort William and Kitchener strongly recommending incinerators in use in those cities. In Nelson the incinerator was within 175 feet of the City Hall and there was no smoke or gas nuisance. It had been designed and erected by a local man, had been in use for six years and the cost of operation per year was \$470. It consumed 10 or 12 loads a day and has a capacity for from 30 to 36 loads. In the other three cities Sifko or Ideal incinerators were in use all with good satisfaction. Both these incinerators are turned out by the same company.

A letter was also received from a man named W. M. Rook, of Vancouver. He offered to install an incinerator of his own design here of any capacity. He had installed them all over the country with great success and won out in international competition in New York City. Mr. Rook is advisory and consulting engineer for the Dominion Building, Vancouver. It was decided to wire to him setting forth the city's plans and details of the proposals.

Little Extra Cost.
The Sifko incinerator which the Board of Works now has in mind is a neat structure and is pleasing to the eye. There is neither smoke nor gas nuisance. The estimated cost was \$25,000 but it is now possible that that may be considerably reduced. It will be a one cell affair capable of having added to it more cells. The one cell will take care of a population of ten thousand people. The present cost of taking the garbage sewer to sea will cover the cost of operation of the incinerator.



BRINGING UP FATHER**DELAY PASSING
POWER BYLAW****ACTIVITY IN
LOCAL REALTY**

E. F. Duby Asks That It Be Set
Over Until Return of City
Solicitor.

The bylaw which has been
drawn up regarding the supply
of water to the Prince Rupert
Pulp and Paper Co. was intro-
duced and given its first reading
at the meeting of the city
council last night. The by-law
was gone through clause by
clause and its passage was set
over for a later date.

In regard to the power con-
tract which was set out by the
council last week and was left
in the hands of the superintend-
ent of utilities and the city
solicitor, City Clerk Woods an-
nounced that E. F. Duby, man-
ager of the company, had said
that in its present form it would
be unsatisfactory and would not
be accepted by the company. Mr.
Duby had suggested that the
council not waste its time on the
matter now but hold it over until
the return of City Solicitor
Hooper when it might be amicably
settled. The objection raised
by Mr. Duby and the company
was of a technical nature.

Ald. Perry, chairman of the
Utilities Committee, explained
that in drafting the contract Mr.
Duncan had followed the resolu-
tions of the council, making only
such additions as to provide
safeguards for the city.

Orange Delegation.

In regard to the concessions
to the Prince Rupert Pulp and
Paper Co., there was a delegation
from the Loyal Orange Lodge consisting of Frank
Haugh, W. F. Cameron, Henry
Smith and J. G. Johnstone, Mr.
Johnstone, the spokesman, asked
on behalf of his lodge that a
clause be inserted in the agree-
ment providing for the employ-
ment of white men in the mill
instead of Orientals.
