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## Soldier's Leave In Ireland Is Stopped REPLY OF DAIL EIREANN TO BE MADE ISSUE OF PEACE OR WAR

### Valera Holds Out For Complete Independence of Ireland; General Opinion Seems Against Fighting

BRISTOL, August 16.—At the opening today of Dail Eireann, a republican parliament, De Valera reiterated the Sinn Fein demand for separation from Britain. He claimed that the only way the people recognized was the ministry of the Dail. He and his colleagues, he stated, had adopted toward the principle laid down by Cardinal Mercier toward the British intended to make it the issue of peace or war.

De Valera said that virtually impossible conditions surrounded negotiations with the British Government, for the position was that of an unarmed man facing a man pointing a pistol. He stated that the proposed reply to Lloyd George would be made in private session. All understood the seriousness of the situation. The cabinet had decided for a republican government. Irish freedom and independence were not realizable in any way.

### SOCKEYE SEASON TO CLOSE FRIDAY NIGHT

Very Few This Variety Now Running—Haysport Cannery Closes.

Although the sockeye fishing season does not close until Friday at midnight, the run is practically finished this year and very few salmon of this variety are now being caught. Haysport cannery, on the Skeena River, is the only operating plant already closed down. The others are still busy fishing for and packing pinkies, cohoes and a few remaining sockeyes.

### HALF-MILE SLIDE ON THOMPSON RIVER

Stream Rise Twelve Feet After Being Blocked by the Debris.

ASHCROFT, Aug. 16.—A landslide with a half mile frontage came without warning at Basque on the west side of the Thomson River, changing completely the aspect of the country in that district. The river upstream rose twelve feet.

The railways on the Eastern side of the river were unimpaired and trains are running as usual.

### PAUPER, NOT MILLIONAIRE

Man Thought to Be Theatrical Magistrate Turns Out to Be Poorhouse Inmate.

DES MOINES, Aug. 16.—A writ of habeas corpus was granted to the chief of police against private detectives for the surrender of a man they say is Ambrose J. Small, Toronto millionaire and theatre owner, who has been missing since December 1919. The detectives claim the man was found in an isolated farmhouse just outside the city. He is without legs as a result of a train accident, and is in a dazed condition.

A theatrical man, who met Small in Canada, was taken to the place the detectives say, and identified the legless man as Small.

TORONTO, Aug. 16.—The alleged finding of Ambrose Small, theatrical magpie, has caused a sensation here. His secretary John Doughty is doing time in jail for theft of bonds from his employer and grave suspicions were cast upon Doughty in connection with the sudden disappearance of Small. Following the disappearance Doughty left Toronto and was arrested in Portland, Oregon.

### Disarmament Difficult In Spite of Burden of Taxes on All Countries

WASHINGTON, August 16.—(By Canadian Press.)—Not all is optimism with respect to the forthcoming disarmament conference. It is true that most of the official outgivings and the comment seen in print assumes the conference will be a success and result in a definite and satisfactory agreement for the reduction of armaments, or at least of naval armament. But under the surface talk is of a decidedly different nature.

Everybody is hoping, of course, that the conference will succeed and will result in such a start in the reduction of armaments as to mean lighter tax burdens for the world. Americans have been fond of thinking of themselves as lightly taxed in comparison with other peoples, but they have abandoned that sort of an impression. Thinking men are saying that the tax burdens of the United States are getting to be intolerable and cannot continue and that expenses—especially those of navy and army—must be reduced so as to lighten this load. No doubt it is entertained that statesmen of other enlightened countries take the same view as to their own national tax problems.

But granting all this, there is under the surface much doubt and misgiving about the success of the disarmament conference. The obstacles in the way of success are formidable. In the first place, there is doubt as to how far the Pacific complications with Japan can be adjusted. A part of the Japanese people are anxious to settle them but there is the militaristic element to be taken into account. How far its influence will prevent an agreement, no one can tell but it is recognized here as an obstacle.

French insistence that if she disarms on the land side, the other countries must agree to protect her eastern border, will block any arrangement with this country, and probably mean failure of movements to reduce armaments. The senate will not ratify any such agreement any more than it would ratify Article 10.

It is assumed here that Great Britain, though anxious for reduction of naval burdens, will still insist that this be so effective as to insure British naval supremacy. This is taken to be the meaning of the recent statement attributed to Lloyd George that Great Britain would go on building. While it is recognized here that Great Britain by reason of her position could hardly be expected to abandon her naval supremacy, on the other hand when it comes to this country entering into an agreement which recognizes such supremacy, there arises the very practical question whether the senate will approve it. Obviously such an agreement would be under fire from many elements in the United States the instant it was announced.

On the whole, therefore, it is a good deal easier to talk about disarmament and reduction of armaments than to formulate a program which will get anywhere.

If the Anglo-Japanese alliance were thrown overboard, there is no doubt it would contribute to the possibilities of success of the conference. Feeling is here that the influence of Canada and Australia, as well as other dominions, will be highly useful in this respect. If this were effected and the United States would yield a certain degree of naval preponderance to Great

Britain by reason of her geographical and maritime situation—something which some able men here advocate—the road to disarmament, or large reduction of armament, would be comparatively easy.

Here is the thing which far-seeing men are asking and they think the question may overawe the conference into doing something worth while. It is: "What will happen if the disarmament conference fails? Will the United States then in spite of itself be driven headlong toward another war, presumably in the Pacific?" Another war is too terrible to contemplate. It might mean the wreck of western civilization. After all, the fear of this untoward thing, suspended like the sword of Damocles over the conference, will be the most potent force working toward an understanding.

He was so exhausted from the effort, however, that he fell back into the river and was drowned.

### NEW TENDERS OCEAN DOCK

Are to Be in by August 31—Contract Not Awarded Finally.

New tenders are being called for the superstructure on the ocean dock here and are to be in by August 31. They will be on the same specifications as were used when the first call was made. Mitchell & Currie, to whom the contract had been provisionally awarded, have been notified that there was a mistake and that their tender had not been finally accepted.

No further word has reached the city as to the letting of the Prince George and Prince Rupert station contracts.

Wheat Crop Will Yield Large Sum.

The wheat crop this year is estimated at something like 300,000,000 bushels throughout the Dominion, the largest ever reaped. The buying power of the Dominion will be the greatest in history.

Reports received from manufacturers and jobbers indicate that stocks of merchandise are lower than they have been for years. The falling market made it desirable that everyone should clean out old stocks and purchase carefully until bottom was reached.

Common Interests of Neighboring Countries.

During the year ending May last the official statistics show that Canada purchased more goods from the United States than she did during the previous year. While her purchases were over \$800,000,000, the purchases from the United Kingdom amounted to less than \$200,000,000.

Irish News Is Not Encouraging.

The news telegraphed through yesterday to the effect that there was a deadlock in the negotiations between the British Government and the republican element in Ireland caused much disappointment here.

Election Not Earlier Than Next Spring.

A Canadian Press telegraphic despatch received yesterday stated that if the Dominion Government lost out in the coming by-elections there would likely be an election in the spring.

Protect Our Insectivorous Birds.

It may appear startling, but it is a fact, that if all the insect pests ravaging our crops could be suppressed, and all the plant and tree diseases eradicated, and the increased revenue derived by the country thereby could be turned into the Dominion treasury, there would need to be no question of taxation.

Speaking of the robin, an investigator in Toronto found that a single bird kept in confinement ate 165 cutworms in one day. Another authority states that a brood of prairie horned-larks consumed 400 cutworms in one day.

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INCINERATOR IS PROPOSED

City Council is Preparing Bylaw to Be Presented to Ratepayers in September.

The city council went into committee of the whole last night to deal with the proposed incinerator bylaw and after a long discussion rose and reported progress. Expert advice is now to be sought in regard to the kind of an incinerator to be installed and the site of it.

The by-law proposed by the Board of Works provides for an expenditure of \$25,000 and the site which has been selected by it is on City Reserve Block 28 about 500 feet south of Hays Creek in McClymont Park. This site is on a hillside and will allow for the dumping of the refuse right into the incinerator from a platform.

In Other Cities. Communications were read from the city of Nelson, Transcona, Fort William and Kitchener strongly recommending incinerators in use in those cities. In Nelson the incinerator was within 175 feet of the City Hall and there was no smoke or gas nuisance.

A letter was also received from a man named W. M. Rook of Vancouver. He offered to install an incinerator of his own design here of any capacity. He had installed them all over the country with great success and won out in international competition in New York City.

The Sifko incinerator which the Board of Works now has in mind is a neat structure and is pleasing to the eye. There is neither smoke nor gas nuisance. The estimated cost was \$25,000 but it is now possible that it will be a one cell affair capable of having added to it more cells.

Unemployment relief moneys granted to municipalities this winter by the governments may be used for permanent work if a resolution moved by Ald. Kerr and seconded by Ald. Kelly and passed by the council last night is adopted by the governments.

McMURRAY RAILWAY MAKING PROGRESS

EDMONTON, Aug. 14.—D. D. Murdoch, contractor for the new section of the Waterways line from the present end of steel at Lynton to McMurray, states that conditions generally on the new grade are entirely satisfactory.

There are 340 men at work on the new section and every portion of the track is covered, this help being sufficient to carry the work to completion by the time stipulated.

The steel is now being removed from the discarded section of the old track, and is being relaid on the new grade at a point six miles from McMurray, while a commencement will be made at laying steel from the Lynton end of steel on August 20.

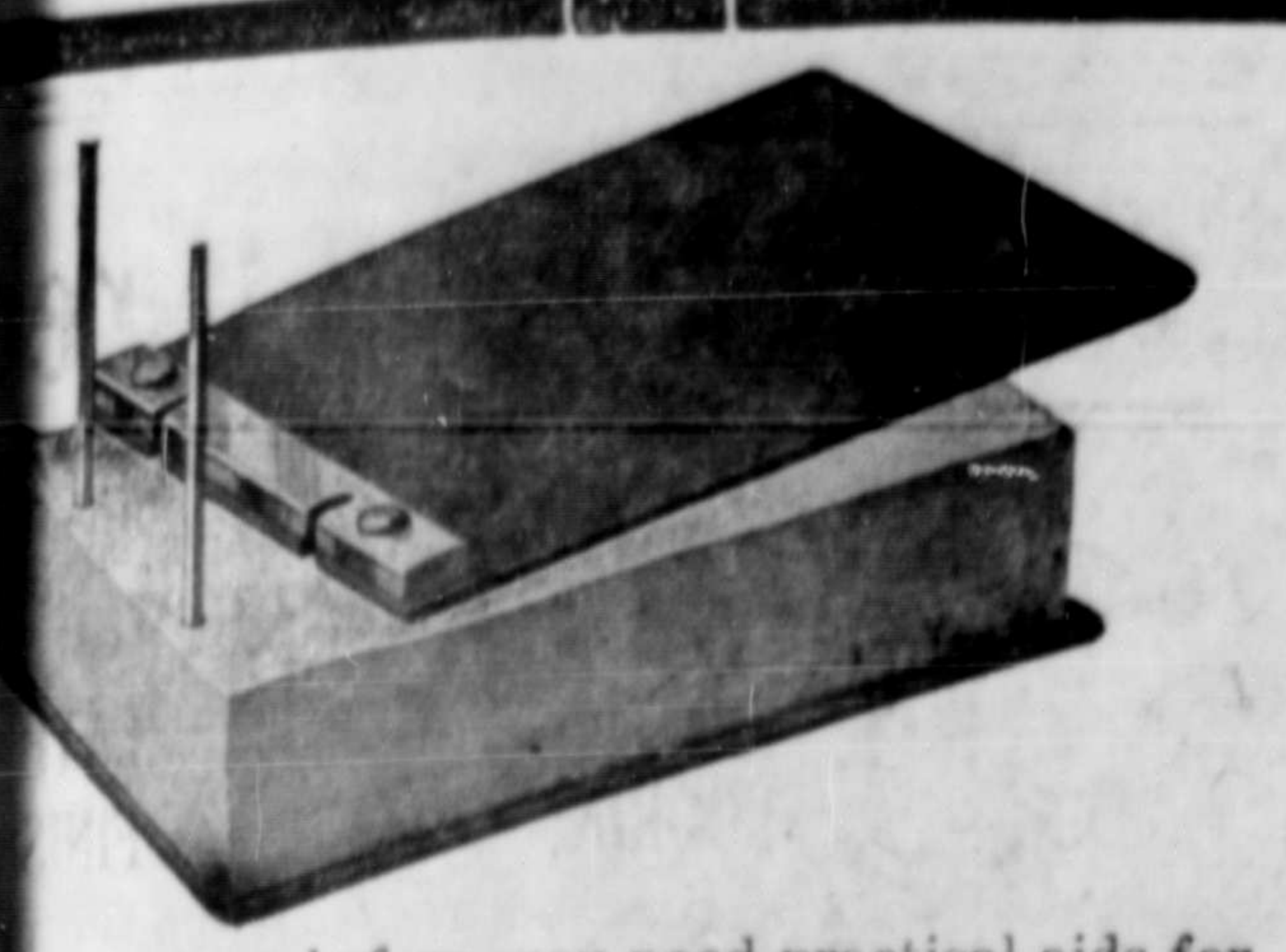

Editor Daily News:  
While holding in deep respect the opinions of those who have forwarded names as suitable for our new Public School, I am strongly inclined to favor the name of "William Booth" as the most suitable, and, this I do for the following reasons.  
His war record is one that teachers can make use of to instill the deepest patriotism among the children of the schools. He was splendid in the simplicity of his life, splendid in his heroic devotion to duty, splendid in the simple friendships of life, and splendid in his death. He walked among us as one of ourselves with no pretensions to court favor or applause, yet embodying a strength of soul, and a simplicity of devotion, that stamps him for all time as a hero soul.  
**Powerful Lesson.**

Secondly, in selecting the name of "William Booth" we inculcate a powerful lesson to the humblest child in the school, viz, that it is not wealth, high lineage or social distinction that will merit the reward, but "duty well and nobly performed" in whatever sphere of life he may be placed.  
Finally; what more powerful weapon can be placed in the hands of teachers to warn the school children of the constant dangers lurking in our public streets from passing traffic, than to point to the name of "William Booth" who lost his life that the children of Prince Rupert might live.

### DELAY PASSING POWER BYLAW

**E. F. DUBY Asks That It Be Set Over Until Return of City Solicitor.**

The bylaw which has been drawn up regarding the supply of water to the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co. was introduced and given its first reading at the meeting of the city council last night. The by-law was gone through clause by clause and its passage was set over for a later date.

In regard to the power contract which was set out by the council last week and was left in the hands of the superintendent of utilities and the city solicitor, City Clerk Woods announced that E. F. DUBY, manager of the company, had said that in its present form it would be unsatisfactory and would not be accepted by the company. Mr. DUBY had suggested that the council not waste its time on the matter now but hold it over until the return of City Solicitor Hooper when it might be amicably settled. The objection raised by Mr. DUBY and the company was of a technical nature.

Ald. Perry, chairman of the Utilities Committee, explained that in drafting the contract Mr. DUNCAN had followed the resolutions of the council, making only such additions as to provide safeguards for the city.

**Orange Delegation.**  
In regard to the concessions to the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co., there was a delegation from the Loyal Orange Lodge consisting of Frank Haugh, W. F. Cameron, Henry Smith and J. G. Johnstone, Mr. Johnstone, the spokesman, asked on behalf of his lodge that a clause be inserted in the agreement providing for the employment of white men in the mill instead of Orientals.

It was pointed out that the officials of the company had stated that 80 percent of the payroll would be for white labor in the mill. The majority of the council were averse to the principle of inserting such a clause. The government allowed the employment of Oriental labor and it would be stepping on dangerous ground for the council to enact such legislation. It was suggested, however, that the company might strengthen its position by definitely outlining its plans in regard to labor.

### ACTIVITY IN LOCAL REALTY

**Thomas McClymont Turns Over Deals for Exchange Block and Prince Rupert Hotel Corners.**

There has been an increased activity in the local realty market during the past few weeks and the transfers of several important business properties have been transacted.

Thomas McClymont has closed a deal for the property known as the Exchange Block at the corner of Third Avenue and Sixth Street. The vendor was E. C. Mitchell of Oklahoma, and the purchaser was a local resident.

Another important transfer consummated through the same dealer was the double corner at Second Avenue and Sixth Street, better known as the Prince Rupert Hotel site. This was sold by the Scott estate, the purchaser being a non-resident. This property is subject to a 99-year lease, ten years having already expired.

Both the deals have involved revenue producing properties.
