New York Ball Teams Have Lead Fire at Smithers Destroys Two Hotels Last Night at 8.30

Smithers Hotels Were Burned Down in Big Fire Last Night

SMITHERS, Sept. 27.—Fire which broke out here at 8:30 destroyed the Royal Hotel, owned by D. A. McRae, and the hotel owned by Mrs. J. Yohn. Both were large structures and the ball park on the east side of town. The buildings were totally destroyed. The blaze, it is believed, was caused by turning of a kerosene lamp in one of the bedrooms of the hotel.

DIED WHILE OUT HUNTING

Body of "Mac" Lacaille, Naas River Gas Boat Engineer Found on Shore.

Lying cold and stiff with hands crossed over his heart, the body of a man named Lacaille, commonly known as "Mac," engineer on the cannery tender Kitwanga, of the B. C. Packers' Cannery at Naas Harbor and well known at the mouth of the Naas River, was found on the sandy shore 4 or 5 miles from Naas Harbor on Saturday afternoon. Lacaille had been out on a hunting trip for a week and it is believed succumbed to heart trouble which was a result of his war service.

Arrivals from the Naas on the Camosun this morning told the story. Lacaille had gone out hunting up the river from the cannery on Monday in his skiff. The Dominion Fisheries patrol boat Linnet had been in the vicinity and the deceased was to have kept in touch with it. On Wednesday the Government boat came by and saw Lacaille. Returning on Thursday, deceased was not seen. Anxiety was then felt and Manager G. Chambers ordered a search with the result that the dead man was found on the shore by the Linnet. It is thought that he had been attempting to climb to a higher bank and his heart had given out.

The body was brought to the city today by the Linnet and Coroner J. H. McMullin is investigating the circumstances. Lacaille was a man of middle age and is survived by a wife and daughter in England and another daughter in Los Angeles.

TAKES GROOM AS BRIDEGROOM.

Dr. S. F. Tolmie Nominated For Victoria to Contest Seat at Coming Elections

VICTORIA, Sept. 27.—Hon. Simon Fraser Tolmie, minister of agriculture, received the renomination for the constituency of Victoria City at a meeting held here last night, five hundred people being present. He will run as a member of the recently formed National Liberal and Conservative Party of Canada and as a supporter of the Meighen administration. He addressed the meeting on the work of the government.

Dr. Tolmie is a veterinary surgeon and farmer and was previous to the war time election live stock commissioner under the Dominion Government. He was chosen as a candidate at that time because he had never expressed any political views and it was thought would represent both the Conservative and Liberal Unionists. He was opposed by Stewart Henderson, but no one at that time took Mr. Henderson's candidature seriously. He was returned by an overwhelming majority.

On Dr. Tolmie being chosen for the position of minister of agriculture he had to go back to Victoria of re-election and came very near being defeated by J. S. Barnard, a labor man from New Westminster. Who will oppose him this time in Victoria has not yet been announced but on this occasion the Liberals are well organized and the minister is likely to meet his Waterloo.

VICTORIA, Sept. 27.—The City Council at its meeting last night decided to apply at the next session of the Legislature for power to combine into a single unit the city council, school board, police commission and library commission under the city council.
The plan is one suggested by Alderman E. F. Todd, formerly mayor of the city and the father of the good roads movement throughout the Northwest.

AMALGAMATE ALL SOLDIERS

Victoria Instructs Delegate to Convention G.W.V.A. to Veto For Scheme.

VICTORIA, Sept. 27.—Comrade H. W. Hart, one of the original founders of the returned soldiers' organizations in Canada, has been appointed to represent the G.W.V.A. at Port Arthur convention with instructions to demand that the G.W.V.A. convention either support the amalgamation of all veterans' organizations in Canada or the Victoria branch of the G. W. V. A. will pass out of existence.

The Victoria branch also disapproves the Dominion body accepting the custody of canteen funds.

CANADA COMING CLOSER BRITAIN

Greatly Improved New Steamship Service on Way to Becoming Accomplished Fact.

LONDON, Sept. 27.—A new steamship service which will make a four day run between Canada and the United Kingdom is on the way to becoming an accomplished fact says an announcement recently made in the London Newspapers by the recently formed Canadian Chamber of Commerce.

DECREASE FOREIGN TRADE OF THE COUNTRY

OTTAWA, Sept. 27.—Canada's imports for the year ending August 31 last amounted to \$961,278,042, a decrease of \$300,000,000 compared with the similar period of 1920 and \$90,000,000 more than in 1919.
The exports for the current year of \$1,212,187,163 plus \$16,000,000 for foreign goods exported show an increase of about two millions over 1920 and a decrease of twenty millions compared with 1919 in domestic products.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—New York's two major league baseball teams the Yankees and the Giants breathed a little easier today than they have for quite a while, while they could look back at their nearest rivals the Cleveland Indians and the Pittsburgh Pirates without seeing winners.

VICTORIA WILL PAY HIGHER SALARIES TO POLICE THAT CITY

VICTORIA, Sept. 27.—The city council at its meeting last night agreed to a compromise on the police commission's application whereby 52 members of the Victoria police force will receive an increase of \$7.50 a month payable as from April 1.

NO PLEBISCITE ON LIQUOR QUESTION IS CONTEMPLATED

EDMONTON, Sept. 27.—No plebiscite for government control of the dispensation of liquor is anticipated this winter, according to Hon. J. E. Brownlee, attorney-general. In fact no representations along that line have been made to the new government.

It is probable that some new legislation for the enforcement of the act will be brought down at the next session however, and the attorney-general is going into the whole matter, familiarizing himself with the present law, and also getting information as to the powers of the province in enacting prohibitory legislation.

SUBMARINE SANK

Three Lost When Undersea Boat Went to Bottom of Harbor.

SAN PEDRO, Sept. 27.—Three men are believed to have been lost when the United States submarine R-6 sank at her moorings in Los Angeles harbor early this morning.

MINE OWNERS ARE CLOSING

Dispute with British Government Over Payment of Huge Sum.

LONDON, Sept. 27.—Several mine owners in South Wales have decided to close their collieries through a misunderstanding which requires a payment of the total sum of \$750,000 towards wages which the owners believed the Government would pay. They are now called upon to meet a deficit and the owners declare they cannot carry on any thousands that may be added to the Welsh unemployed through the dispute.

ASKS WORKMEN STOP SUPPLY OF MUNITIONS

Third Internationale Sends Out Appeal Against Support of Enemies.

RIGA, Sept. 27.—The Third Internationale appeals to the workmen of the allied countries to block the shipment of munitions to Poland, Roumania and other Russian neighbors. It asserts that France and Great Britain are conspiring to precipitate war in these countries against Russia.

Carl Radek, Soviet minister, asserts that Lord Curzon's charges in the latest note are based on false and forged notes sold to him by German agents. Curzon accused the Soviet Government of a breach of faith by a campaign of intrigue against Great Britain.

AMMUNITION FOR IRISHMEN

Chicago Man Arrested Charged with Supplying and Offering to Instruct in the Use.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—George Gordon Rorke, commission agent for ammunition, has been arrested here charged with conspiracy to furnish the Irish Republicanists with guns and ammunition and to "instruct them in the use of weapons." Bail was allowed in \$3,000.
Rorke was accused of being associated in the despatch of the firearms found on the East side recently.

HINDUS BUYS AUTOS

VANCOUVER, Sept. 27.—All records in automobile circles here are now being broken by sale of motor cars to Hindus. For a long time, the Asiatics have been contented with the primitive horse and wagon to ply their trade as peddlers of wood and vegetables here, but now they have acquired more progressive ideas and are buying used trucks and autos.

Economic Conditions
Change Our Habits.

Economic conditions have a great effect in changing our habits. Sometimes hard times are good for us although we do not realize it. Take as an instance the Yukon miners. A despatch received yesterday states that they are remaining at work during the winter instead of coming out as usual. Ordinarily they would have spent the winter in the cities to the south, mostly a life of idleness which is not good for anyone. To remain at work is much better than to be idle.

Similarly the Indians and white trappers are off to the woods this year instead of hanging around the settlements. What could be better than a life in the open air or in a camp in the woods for the winter with a settled occupation which engages every minute of the time and is full of interest and expectation? It is an ideal existence.

Any life of hope and expectation is a life worth while. It is the life which is not offered by the men who would revolutionize society. There is no provision for the thrill of achievement, the joy of making good. In trapping there must be all sorts of pleasure in watching the traps from day to day and in matching your skill with the skill of the animal in evading you. It is not unlike newspaper making, where every day sees something new and it is impossible to tell what the next hour will bring.

Joy in Our Work
Is the Greatest Joy.

The greatest joy in the world comes from work well done. Some writers have said it is the only joy. That is why a man often becomes great through his hobby rather than through the calling at which he earns his living. His hobby he can choose carefully, and if he does not like it he changes it for something else. It is difficult to make changes of one's work, for there is not time during life to test out many different callings. Blessed is he who chooses his calling right, the joy of the world is reserved for him.

Dope Peddlers Should
Be Severely Punished.

If there is one person more contemptible than any other in this world it is the man or woman who peddles dope of any kind. No one would mind them selling anything that was useful as long as it did not injure anyone. Drugs such as morphine, opium or cocaine, however, are drugs that kill physically and morally. The dope fiend is a lost man. There is no hope of reform. To create a taste for such a drug is worse than criminal.

We hang a man who kills another, but the man who starts another on the drug route to shame and death is given a comparatively light punishment. He is sent to prison for a few years.

For certain assault cases the lash is the punishment. If the lash is ever legalized it seems it should be for the man or woman who is caught supplying another with the drugs. Were it not for these messengers of the devil there would be few drug addicts, yet today they may be counted by the thousands. They are found in every grade of society. While the underworld is possibly the natural home of the drug addict, it is not uncommon to find people who use morphine or cocaine in the very highest strata of society.

Jump in Price
of Halibut.

While the season is getting rather late and the weather is not by any means good, the sudden jump in the price of halibut will give an impetus to fishing and most of the boats will be out. For some time the price has been low and a few boats laid up because they could not sell fish profitably at the prices paid. Now the price offered is a profitable one and if the weather will allow all the boats will be fishing.

WORKINGMEN FIRST.

Editor Daily News:

I am pleased to see that the editor of The Daily News takes the stand that in involuntarily estates where there is not sufficient money to pay both wage claims and Government Claims, the Provincial Government should not rank ahead of wage claims.

In the case of the estate of the Acropolis Spruce Lumber Co., Ltd., I put this matter fairly up to the Minister of Lands, the Attorney General, and the Premier of this Province and in each case have received a reply that they would do nothing.

In my opinion, it is wrong and immoral for the Provincial Government, by reason of its power, to force priority to the exclusion of labor claims. It is reverting to the law of the jungle, where might is right. Of all creditors the workingman is most needy and least able to protect himself and the Government is least needy and most able to take care of itself. In the Estate above mentioned, the Government's attitude is on a par with a big dog taking the bone away from the weaker starving dog. The Provincial Government either lacks a proper sense of justice, or fails to see itself as others see it.

Board of Trade.

Last January I moved a resolution which was passed by the Prince Rupert Board of Trade, asking the Government to provide legislation and machinery whereby the laborer would be guaranteed his wages. Wronged unrighted are the seeds of revolution. Is it any wonder that this class of people is dissatisfied and turbulent today? Surely the least our Government can do is to see that this very large and important class of people receives its just due; the fruits of the labor of their hands, and that in priority to all else. This, in my opinion, would be in accordance with Liberal policy and tradition and one just cause of discontent would be removed. I trust that even yet the Government will change its policy and do justice.

POSTAGE RATE.

Postmaster Morrison points out that the new rate on postage is not a domestic one but refers only to postage outside of Canada but within the Empire which has been three cents for one ounce and which after October 1 will be four cents. Rates on newspapers have also been changed.

SYNOPSIS OF
LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$1 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Pre-emption pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1 acre before receiving Crown grant.

Where pre-emption is in operation, no less than 3 years, and has made improvements, he may be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records name each year. Failure to make improvements recorded will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvement of \$100 per acre, including 2 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emption holding Crown grant may record title to the land if he requires land in conjunction with his claim, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown-granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 20 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The Act is extended to the estate of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 26, 1918.

Provision for return of money accrued, due and paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emption.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Armed Forces or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from settlement to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING

Grazing Act, 1918, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Block-owners may form Associations for management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

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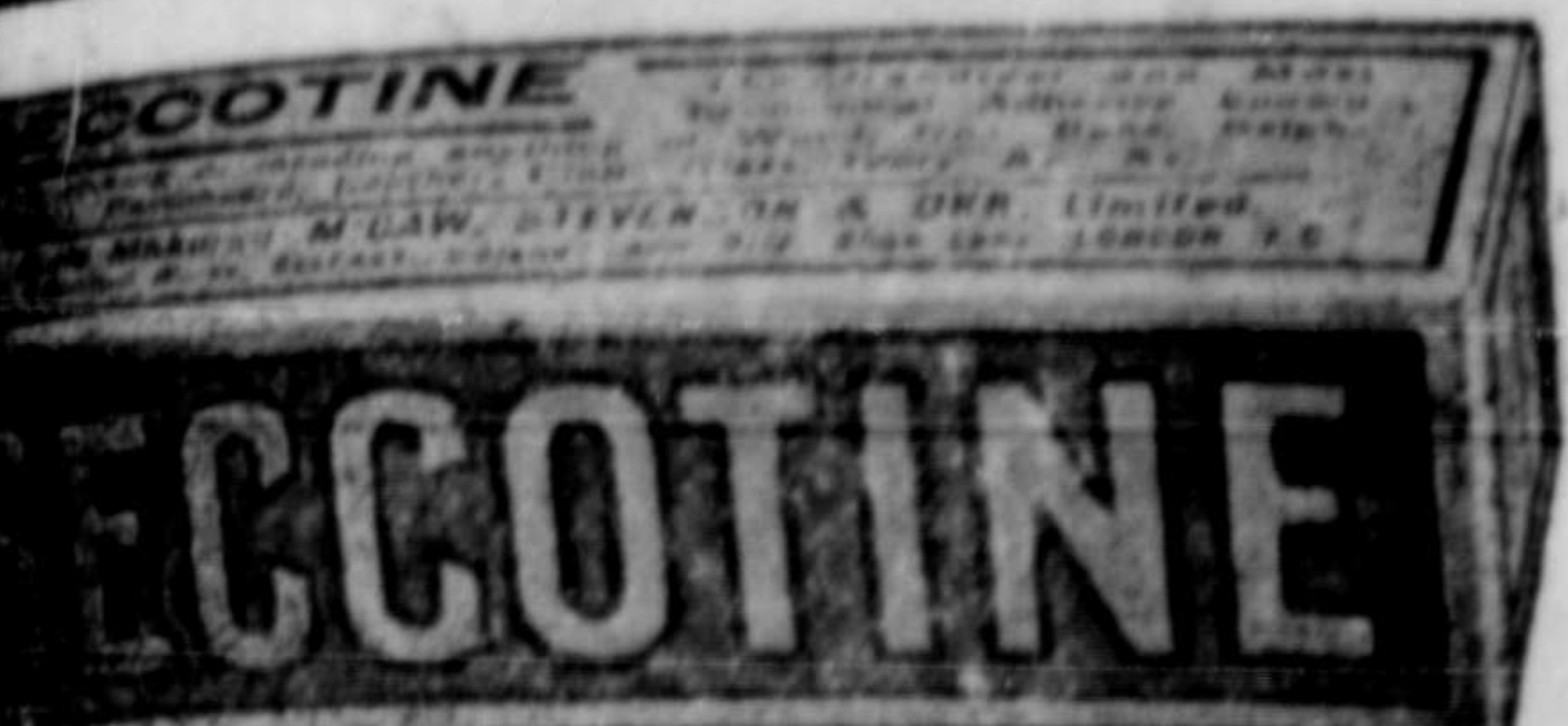

**AMBULANCE MATTER GOES TO COMMITTEES**

Mayor Recommends That City Reconsider Decision to Purchase One—Not an Easy Matter.

The city council last night referred the matter of securing an ambulance back to the Utilities and Hospital Committees for consideration and report.

The mayor reported that he had made inquiries while in the south on the matter. The matter was not easily solved. In some cases the ambulance was owned by the hospitals and the cost of operation was borne by the city. In Vancouver private companies operated the ambulance and the police had a patrol wagon which could be used for the purpose. He recommended that the city's decision to purchase an ambulance be reconsidered.

Ald. Perry explained that the Utilities Committee and the Hospital Board had gone into the matter. The city could own an ambulance and operate it either from the police or fire departments or have it at the hospital where the janitor could drive it, a local taxi firm had offered to set an ambulance if the city would make a grant. He thought this would be a good plan.
