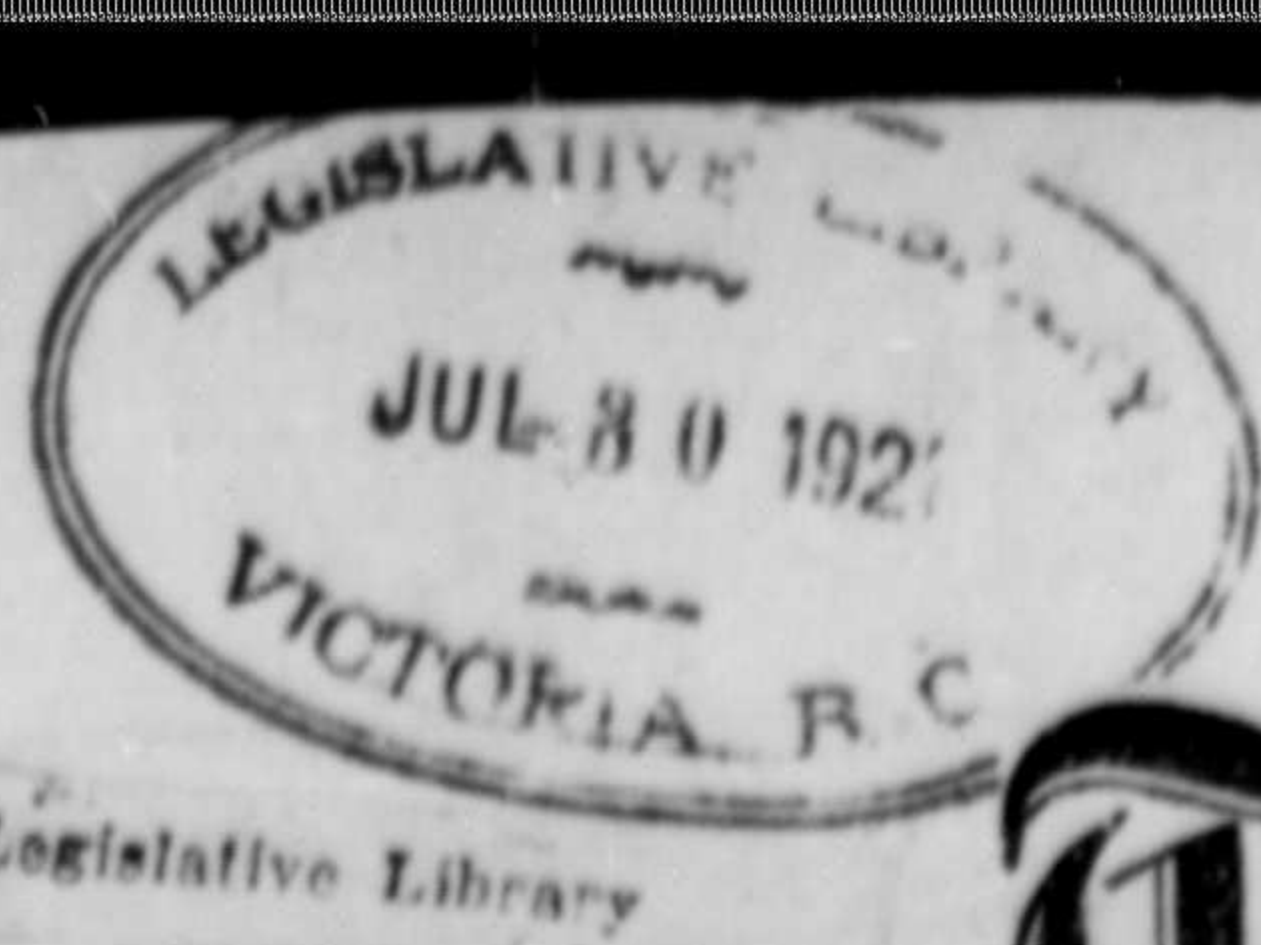

Water Supply For Pulp Company REID MCLENNAN OF RUPERT WINS GOVERNOR GENERAL'S MEDAL

City Council Submits By-law to Ratepayers for Agreement with Proposed Paper Concern

The City Council last night conferred in committee with E. Doby, local manager for the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Company, and an agreement was reached on terms for the supplying of water to the company. This agreement will be taken up by the city officials and will be presented in the course of a few months to the ratepayers for their adoption or rejection. It will come up at the same time as the three school by-laws which were put through their first stages at the meeting last night.

The path of the agreement which the council will submit for approval of the ratepayers, that the company be allowed to take water over and above the requirements of the city, this supply to exceed 2000 gallons per minute. In return the company will be required to install water pump and water valves and to keep the reservoir full to overflowing.

The by-law will be forwarded to the ratepayers for approval before being submitted to the city council.

The power question was also taken up at the meeting last night for reconsideration. The city committee remains firm in its stand refusing the extension of time for the company to accept the supply of the 500 horsepower demand. Ald. Perreault, chairman of the committee, stated as much last night. Doby was heard on the matter and a general discussion took place on all phases of the question. At 12:20 the council adjourned without a vote, for the first time in the history of the city. The discussion will be resumed again next week.

LONDON, July 26.—Austen Chamberlain, the government leader, said today in the House of Commons that he hoped for prorogation of parliament by August 26 but he foreshadowed the possibility of another session in November or December. He said that the government would pass legislation necessary to effect a settlement of the Irish question.

REID MCLENNAN IS WINNER GOVERNOR'S MEDAL IN DISTRICT

VICTORIA, July 26.—Reid L. McLennan, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. McLennan, Prince Rupert, is the winner of the Governor-General's medal in District No. 10, Northern British Columbia, according to the results of the entrance examinations announced by the department of education this morning. His total marks were 794 out of a possible 1100. There were three candidates writing for the honor from the Borden Street School.

BEER APPEAL NEXT FRIDAY

Various Matters Affecting Sale of Beverage Under Revision—Prices Changed.

VICTORIA, July 26.—The whole matter of beer selling by ex-service organizations will be taken up by the supreme court at Vancouver on Friday next, it was intimated by counsel for the Army and Navy Veterans, when the charge against the latter came up in the police court yesterday.

New prices for beer sold by the Liquor Control Board has been put through and are to become effective August 1. They affect outlying districts chiefly.

FIRE AT TRAIL DAMAGE \$30,000

TRAIL, July 26.—The Star theatre, three stories and a restaurant were destroyed by fire including the mounted police headquarters. Stock was saved from the buildings and as a result the loss will not exceed \$10,000 all of which is covered by insurance.

SOLD BEER AGAINST LAW

Two Members of Overseas Mechanics' Club Convicted at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, July 26.—Archibald Campbell and David Kirkwood, officials of the Overseas Mechanics' Club, were yesterday found guilty before Magistrate South of selling liquor contrary to the Act. Sentence will be pronounced on Wednesday. This is the first of a number of charges against the club for selling beer.

BIG TENNIS MEET OPENS AT CAPITAL HON. DR. F. S. TOLMIE RETURNS FROM ENGLAND

Progress Made in First Championship Matches at Victoria Yesterday.

VICTORIA, July 26.—Progress was made yesterday in the first day of the Pacific Northwest sectional doubles, singles and junior tennis championship matches as well as in the British Columbia open championship. Players from California, Oregon, Washington and British Columbia are taking part.

VICTORIA, July 26.—The first discovery in British Columbia of Calcite is reported by Dan Savoy, a pioneer prospector in the Trout Lake district, who is here.

IRISH POLICE CIVIL BASIS

Executive Preparing to Make Change, Disbanding Auxiliaries.

BELFAST, July 26.—The Irish executive is considering reorganization of the Irish police, disbanding of the auxiliaries and the moving of the Royal Irish Constabulary and the Dublin Metropolitan force to a strictly civil basis.

Turkish Nationalists Are Retreating Before Strong Advance of Greek Forces

ATHENS, July 26.—The tide has turned strongly in favor of the Greeks against the Turkish Nationalists in the Asia Minor hostilities. The Hellenic forces are on the advance and the Turks in the past day have suffered heavy reverses.

An official Greek agency says in an announcement that the Turkish losses in killed and wounded, prisoners and those missing now amounts to seventy-five per cent. of their entire fighting strength in the Asia Minor war area.

LONDON, July 26.—Owing to the successful Greek advances of the past few days, the Turkish Nationalist government in Asia Minor has been obliged to transfer the seat of government and the Turkish Nationalist Assembly to Sivas.

Big Sockeye Run May Yet Come Says Inspector J. T. C. Williams

That the sockeye fishing will yet improve and the season not be as poor as one as anticipated is the expressed view of Inspector Williams, who has just arrived from the Skeena River canneries and is proceeding to visit other parts of the district. He says that the eggs of the fish taken so far this year are very poorly developed, being scarcely any larger than number six shot, whereas they should be almost as large as peas. This seems to indicate that the fish are not mature and the real run is yet to come.

Another good reason for thinking that the run is to come is the reports from the outside are to the effect that there are plenty of sockeye in the Skeena, Skeena and Skeena Straits and also that so far hardly any fish have reached the spawning grounds at Lakelse Lake where the hatcheries are located.

Spawns Close Friday. Mr. Williams says that the season for spring salmon fishing on the Skeena River closes Friday night next at midnight. There has been a good run of spring salmon which is now ending up a little and they wish to protect those fish and allow a sufficient number to reach the spawning grounds.

CANADA TO BE HEARD

Sir George Foster Says Dominions Will Be at Least Indirectly Represented.

OTTAWA, July 26.—Even if Canada is not accorded representation at the Washington Conference the disarmament views of Canada will be placed before the delegates. Sir George Foster, acting premier, stated this morning that "the voices of the colonies would be heard" through representatives selected by the mother country if not directly.

BAGPIPES AND STEP DANCES FIRE DAMAGES CUNARD LINER

Competition to Be Put on at Athletic Grounds Next Week.

At the Elks' Flag Day, Wednesday of next week, there are to be two competitions put on as extras, which it is expected will prove great attractions.

A silver cup, suitably engraved will be donated to the best bagpipe player in the city.

Gold, silver and bronze medals will be given to the girl under 15 years of age who dances the best step dance, highland fling, sword dance, Irish reel, Welsh dance or any other step dance. For this event Jim Sturgeon, a professional bagpipe player who will not be entered in the competition will play.

In order that all may be able to see the dancers and the players in the competition, a platform 20 feet square is to be erected on the grounds in such a position that everyone may see plainly.

It is proposed to make Flag Day an annual event in this city and this initial effort is expected to be something beyond the ordinary.

Greatest Care Against Fire.

It is better to be careful than sorry. To prevent fires is much better than to put them out. The fires at Hyder and Port Simpson should be warnings to Prince Rupert people not to take any chances. In the two cases mentioned conditions were good for keeping the fires under control. The next time they may be different and then there will be a holocaust which would be frightful. Happily, Prince Rupert has a good fire brigade that has always done good work and doubtless will do so again. The thing is to be watchful all the time.

Learn to Swim When Weather Warm.

Now the weather is warm is the time to learn to swim. It is useless to expect anything of the sort in the winter. Summer is the season, and there is no more suitable place than at the Salt Lake. It is not necessary to tell Prince Rupert people that. It is good advice, however, to suggest that this summer should not be allowed to pass before they have learned to swim sufficiently well to help themselves should they fall into the water.

Preparing for Fall Exhibition.

While the directors and other officials of the fall fair are doubtless making proper preparations for the fall fair, The Daily News would like to call the attention of the people of the city and district to the desirability of making the coming fair a record-breaker. The way to do this is to prepare now. It is impossible to plan an exhibit and prepare it in a few hours or a few days. There is but one way to make it a great success and that is to begin at once and keep it in mind. Whatever we give our best thought to is that in which we shall succeed.

Value of Education To Community.

The value of education in any community is difficult to estimate. The right kind of education is the most valuable asset a community possesses. Addressing the summer school of teachers the other day Dr. Weir of Saskatchewan province is reported to have said:

"Teachers are the most self-sacrificing people in the world. They are the pioneers of democracy. Their ideals are to aid others as much as they can, despite any inconvenience to themselves. Anglo-Saxons have the greatest democracy, therefore Anglo-Saxons ought to have the best teachers.

"We, the teachers, and the public are going to work in harmony. Education is a subject that deeply concerns and greatly interests the public. It is for their own good and they are beginning to realize it. Education has been making rapid strides along the lines of development that far-seeng men have set for it. These men are teachers and it is the work of this generation to carry on the good work. Men like Socrates began it; men like Luther have carried it on, and now it is for us to attend to.

"Teachers are makers of Canada. They help to bind the country together. They are national developers and not provincial boosters, although they may interest themselves in their own province as well as in the affairs of others. But in Canada our aim covers a wide field. We are a new country and the study of education is also comparatively new, therefore we have a great and important task before us.

"It was once a belief that teachers were born; now we know that they are also made. Although general scholarship is an important essential, specialized training is paramount. A great deal more stress must be laid upon this latter. Education begins with the cradle and ends with the grave. The more a man studies the happier he is, and the more he knows the more he realizes just how limited is his knowledge."

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RESIGNATION IS DEMANDED

Former Superintendent of Education Refuses to Leave Principalship of Victoria High School.

VICTORIA, July 26.—A demand for the resignation of Dr. Alexander Robinson, principal of the Victoria High School, will be made by the Board of School Trustees Mrs. Spofford asking taken at a special meeting of the Board to discuss conditions at that educational institution consequent upon the outcome of the recent investigation by officials of the Department of Education. A resolution presented by Mrs. Spofford, asking Dr. Robinson to hand in his resignation, met with the opposition of but one member of the Board, Trustee Mrs. Condy-Johnson.

Dr. Robinson was present at the meeting and addressed the Board at length. When the resolution was approved he made known in emphatic manner that he would refuse to comply with the terms of the resolution.

Not Dead Yet.

"You have not killed Dr. Robinson yet, I may tell you gentlemen, May I bid you good-night?" said Dr. Robinson, as he left the Board room. He is under contract with the Board until December next.

Another resolution arising out of the High School imbroglio was one sponsored by Mrs. Spofford, seconded by Trustee Riddell, rapping Frank Andrew, teacher of the High School staff, for alleged criticisms of the Board's administration.

Trustee Mrs. Andrews was the only member of the Board absent from the meeting.

The Ultimatum.

The discussion in consequence of which the Board's action was taken arose out of the letter written by Dr. Robinson to the Board, in answer to one from the Board enclosing a copy of the report of the investigating committee, and drawing attention to the findings of the committee, and asking that the faults reported upon should be corrected. The resolution as presented by Trustee Jay was as follows:

"Having considered the letter of Dr. Alexander Robinson, in reply to the Board's communication of July 12th, having in mind also the very inharmonious feeling that exists at this moment between the principal and nearly all of his staff, and in view also of the results of the matriculation examination now before the Board, which indicate that the inefficiency in the High School is not due alone to the five teachers to whom letters were sent at the end of May last.

The Resolution.

"Be it therefore resolved, "Firstly, that Dr. Robinson be informed that the Board regrets to advise him that it believes the best interests of the Victoria High School demand that he be requested to submit his resignation as principal forthwith.

"Secondly, that the teachers of the High School be advised that the results of the matriculation examinations are very disappointing to the Board and in view of which fact, as well as the recent findings of the investigating committee, careful observation will be kept of their work during the coming term, and an unfavorable report from either the Provincial or municipal inspector will undoubtedly lead to a request for the resignation of the teacher concerned."

REHABILITATE THE FISHERIES

State of Washington to Co-op-
erate with British Columbia
in Restoring Fraser.

VICTORIA, July 26.—The
Fraser River salmon is now to
have a chance, according to an
announcement from the Hon.
William Sloan, Commissioner of
Fisheries.

Rehabilitation of the annual
run, which has been disastrously
depleted through over-fishing
during the last few years, is
predicted by the Department of
Fisheries here as a result of the
gentlemen's unwritten agree-
ment between the State of
Washington and the British Col-
umbia Government.

As a result of this agreement
all waters of Puget Sound are
closed to commercial salmon
fishing between August 26 and
September 15 inclusive, which
would normally cover the greater
part of the pink run. These
waters are also closed from Oc-
tober 26 to April 30 with the ob-
ject of protecting silversides,
chums and steelheads.

This will practically eliminate
for the present season the pack-
ing of pink salmon on Puget
Sound and will probably also
prevent the packing of all fall
fish in any quantity, as it will
not pay to open the canneries
for these grades after closing
down, it was explained here to-
day.

The purpose of the order is
to permit the greater part of
the pink run to escape to the
spawning grounds. It is ex-
pected to materially increase the
run of this species in the next
cycle.

Longer Closed House.

By the order which went into
effect on Wednesday salmon
fishing in the Northern and
Western part of the Puget Sound
district, except with gill nets, is
prohibited between 4 p.m. Thurs-
day and 4 a.m. Saturday of each
week during July and August.
The same area is closed to gill
net fishing between 6 a.m. Fri-
day and 6 p.m. Saturday of each
week during July and August.

The former weekly closed sea-
son was from 6 a.m. Saturday to
6 p.m. Sunday for gill nets and
from 4 p.m. Friday to 4 a.m.
Sunday for other gear, simulta-
neous with that in British Col-
umbia.

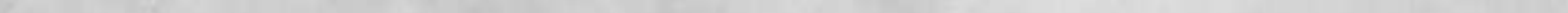

AMALGAMATE CITY BOARDS

Alderman A. E. Todd of Victoria
Makes Proposal For His City.

VICTORIA, July 25.—Alderman A. E. Todd, formerly mayor of Victoria, makes a suggestion to the council of this city for a change in civic administration in order to secure unity of action. He suggests that the schools and police be managed by committees of the council instead of by separate elective bodies. The memorandum which he has drawn up reads as follows:

(1) To improve Victoria's Municipal Government the first essential is the existence in Victoria of a progressive, wide awake, thoroughly representative Chamber of Commerce. (This is becoming an accomplished fact.)

(2) Form into a single unit City Council, School Trustees and Police Board, retaining for the whole the title or designation of "City Council."

(3) The "City Council," as at present is the case, to be a board of eleven individuals, namely, a Mayor and ten Aldermen.

(4) Schools to be under special "Education Committee," elected by the Council among

themselves. Mayor to be Chairman of the Committee. Directly under the Committee to be a "Manager of Schools" just as under Police Commissioners is Chief of Police; or under Streets Committee is City Engineer; or under Legislative Committee the City Solicitor; or Fire Wardens the Fire Chief; or Health Committee the Medical Health Officer.

(5) Police to be under a special police committee to be known as at present, as the "Board of Police Commissioners" to consist of Mayor, as Chairman, as is now the case, and two members of the Council, elected by the Council from among themselves.

(6) Aldermen, same number as at present, elected for four-year terms; half retiring every second year. Between election vacancies to be automatically filled by the highest elected in the last election; if unwilling to act, the next highest, and so on.

(7) Mayor's term of office four years. Elected by the public. To give entire time to municipal duties, and not actively to engage in private business during term of office.

"It is a very wrong principle that one elected body should have to find the money for another elected body without having any control of the expenditure of such money," Alderman Todd declared in discussing the second proposal in his memorandum.
