Russian Settlers Opposed to Census

NO OPPOSITION TO BRITISH GOVERNMENT WAS EXPRESSED YESTERDAY

Coalition Attack on Lloyd George Failed To Develop in House

LONDON, June 24.—The so-called coalition revolt against Premier Lloyd George and his administration did not materialize in the House of Commons yesterday when the question of the salaries of cabinet ministers was discussed.

No attack was made when Mr. Lloyd George defended the selection of Dr. Addison as minister without portfolio. The house finally approved of his appointment at a salary of £2,500 per annum.

Discussing business conditions, the prime minister stated that from signs observed and information received there would shortly be a substantial trade boom in Great Britain.

TROOP TRAIN WAS WRECKED RESULT MINES

MUCH BRITISH CAPITAL GOING TO AUSTRALIA

Irish Trouble Continues at Belfast and Cork. Ten Million Pounds to Be Spent in Business Enterprises.

MELBOURNE, June 24.—By Canadian Press.—The movement of British capital into Australian manufacturing industries continues. Speaking in Sydney recently, the federal treasurer stated that not less than 10,000,000 pounds sterling of new capital, Australian and British, is proposed to be spent in new enterprises in Australia.

From March 22, 1920, to February 22, 1921, he said that 22 new enterprises or extensions of old ones had been registered with a capital of 3,500,000 pounds sterling, half of this amount being for woolen and knitting factories.

A large number of foreign (not British) companies are awaiting action on their application for permission to register, which had been held up under the war precautions act. The aggregate capital of these applicants according to the federal treasurer is 20,000,000 pounds sterling. Regulations have now been issued under the amended war precautions act, and several applicants have been permitted to register.

CHINAMAN CHARGED SUPPLYING LIQUOR HAS BEEN DISMISSED

LONDON, June 24.—As the labor conference at Brighton has offered nothing tangible in the way of support of striking coal miners, doubt is now expressed as to the calling of a conference of all unions to discuss the advisability of declaring a general strike.

Labor Conference at Brighton Offers Nothing Tangible in Support of It.

LONDON, June 24.—As the result of the defeat of Lloyd George Government candidates in recent by-elections by independent Anti-Waste candidates there is just now a great deal of speculation in political circles about the prospects of a general election in the early autumn.

A great deal of significance is attached to a letter from the Marquis of Salisbury, who, commenting on the result in East Hertfordshire, where the Coalition Unionist whom he supported was beaten, says:

"The fact is that the Government no longer possesses the full confidence of the Unionist Party."

The Marquis therefore advises every Unionist association to request Unionist members and candidates henceforth to consider themselves free from any binding obligation to support the Coalition Government.

ALBERTA WILL HAVE ELECTION

Stewart Administration Will Go to People on July 18.

EDMONTON, June 24.—The date of the general provincial election in the province of Alberta has been fixed for July 18 with nominations one week earlier.

It is expected that the Liberal administration under Premier Gains, Stewart will be sustained. The government, at present, holds 33 out of the 55 seats in the legislative assembly.

No organized farmer movement is expected but it is understood that there will be a number of individual farmer candidates nominated by local organizations in many of the sixty-one seats that will be contested at this election. Similar to Saskatchewan there may be a larger number of independent members returned in this province.

Local Men Elected as Representatives at Annual Masonic Convention at Victoria.

VICTORIA, June 24.—D. H. Morrison, of Prince Rupert, has been elected as a Grand Lodge representative at the annual Masonic convention now going on here. Prince Rupert is well represented in the list of delegates to the convention.

Mr. Morrison has been chosen Grand Z of the Royal Arch Masons.

POPULATION OF UNITED STATES

Increase in Japanese Greater Than Any Other Race Shown by Census.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—The racial composition of the population of the United States is shown by the recent census to be: 94,822,431 whites; 10,463,013 negroes; 242,659 Indians; 411,025 Japanese; 61,686 Chinese, and 9,485 miscellaneous.

The growth of the Japanese population in the last ten years is greater than any other race the increase having been 55.9 percent.

The total population of the United States shown by these figures is 105,710,599.

COTTON SPINNERS ACCEPT OFFER OF THEIR EMPLOYERS

Strike in Manchester, affecting 200,000 Workers, Thus Ended.

MANCHESTER, June 24.—The employers' wage settlement plan has been accepted by all branches of the cotton spinning trade here. The strike, which affected two hundred thousand workers, is thus ended.

RATES OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS ARE LOWEST IN B.C.

OTTAWA, June 24.—Canada's birth rate in 1920 was 27.47 per thousand, while the death rate was 13.31. The marriage rate was 8.94. British Columbia had the lowest percentage in both birth and death rates.

LOCAL VETERANS MAY SELL BEER AGAIN TOMORROW

Executive of Local Association Will Have Meeting This Evening.

Bear selling to members will likely be resumed at the Great War Veterans canteen in this city tomorrow morning. There will be an executive meeting of the Association tonight when final details will be arranged.

General commendation has been expressed about the city for the manner in which the local Association has acted in awaiting definite word from Victoria in regard to the Liquor Board's attitude on beer selling before resuming the business here. They have taken a sensible course on the question in not deciding to challenge the law by opening before.

AMERICAN MONEY FOR IRISH RELIEF

DUBLIN, June 24.—Alderman Laurence O'Neill, Lord Mayor of Dublin, who has been visiting the United States in the interests of the Irish White Cross Society, announces that the Society has a sum of \$5,000,000 to be used solely for the succor of needy Irish.

GREEKS LOSE ON ISMID FIGHT WHEN DIVISION REMOVED

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 24.—The Greeks are shortening their line on the Ismid front. As a result of the withdrawal of the eleventh Greek division, the Turkish Nationalists captured Adubazar and Sabaja without fighting.

Band of Naked Men and Women Attack Mounted Policeman on Attempting Arrest Doukhobors

GRAND FORKS, June 24.—Several members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police were yesterday attacked by a band of naked Doukhobors of both sexes when an attempt was made to arrest the ringleaders in a revolt against complying with the census requirements. Eight of the Doukhobors were finally overpowered and sent to the Nelson jail for thirty days. They will also be recommended for deportation. On arrival at Nelson the Doukhobors marched singing to the provincial jail.

A good deal of trouble has been experienced in the big colony here by census enumerators in obtaining the information made necessary by census requirements. The Doukhobors stoutly refuse to answer certain questions asked.

Efforts on the part of the government to force them to comply with any regulations are generally met with demonstrations in the form of nude parades in which men and women freely mingle. These parades are not unusual in this district.

LOTS OF FISH ON SALE TODAY

Prices Are Low But Market Is in Flight Lieutenant Proctor, V.C., Good Condition—Plenty of Cars.

Halloul is not selling at very high prices at the Fish Exchange these days on account of the ample supply of fish coming in and the other favorable market conditions including a good supply of refrigerator cars. Most of the fish sold this morning went at prices under 9c and there was also a drop in the price of second class fish which was getting 1c per pound in the most of cases. There were about 170,000 pounds handled through the exchange today.

Resumption Clubs

Selling Beer Seems Likely.

It is apparent from the Victoria despatches received yesterday that the Liquor Control Board is going to allow the sale of beer, at least in returned soldiers' clubs. The proviso seems to be that the sale will be confined exclusively to bona fide members of the clubs. After a conference with the attorney-general, all the veterans' clubs in the province, it has been decided, will resume the sale of beer to their members. This would lead one to believe that all alike are to be free of prosecution in taking this course. The next thing then will be a demand from all other clubs, and there are now many of them in the province to be accorded the same privilege and it is difficult to conceive of how the liquor board is going to prosecute them either. It seems reasonable to expect that within a few days there will be a general resumption of beer selling in all the clubs in the province.

Will Club Charters Be Abused?

If this is allowed and all the clubs are permitted to sell beer to members, it remains to be seen where the line is to be drawn. Many owners of places who were formerly carrying on an open bar business in near beer will, doubtless, make application for incorporation of their premises as clubs. In some of these clubs the matter of membership is so simple that the condition that only bona fide members be served will be overcome quite easily. In any case it will be a difficult matter to police such places to see that the law is being lived up to in this respect. It is to be hoped that the club charter will not develop into a purely commercial proposition for the benefit of persons who formerly operated near beer bars and wish to continue in that business. It such is to be the case the "beer clauses" of the Moderation Act might just as well be dropped altogether. Since many of the clubs under prohibition were little better than gambling dens and saloons the condition will be no better than it was before with near beer bars on every corner.

Action by Legislature

Will be Necessary.

It is evident that there will be changes in the beer clauses of the Moderation Act when it comes up at the next session of the legislature in the fall. The Liquor Control Board can make these clauses inoperative at the present time but they cannot be left in that status. It must be remembered that doing this only means the countenancing of open breaking of the law. All clubs which are now selling beer, even with the understanding that they are not to be prosecuted, are acting illegally as far as the Moderation Act is concerned. The selling of beer, except by the government vendor, is forbidden and the liquor board cannot change that provision. The legislature will either have to instruct the liquor board to carry out the law, change the law to fit the case, or wipe it off the statute books altogether.

Drunkenness and Bootlegging More Dangerous.

Even though the Liquor Control Act may already be developing some impracticable and unsatisfactory features, there is one clause in it that is going to be a good one. That is the section in regard to drunkenness which provides for a fifty dollar fine for those guilty of being drunk and the demand that they divulge the source of supply of their liquor. It is safe to predict that with such a punishment there is not going to be so much drunkenness as there was before. If a man does become intoxicated it is likely that precautions will be taken for keeping him away from the eye of the law and the nuisance will, at least, be removed from the public sight. It is satisfactory to know that the prevalence of open drunkenness will be reduced. The fact that drunks are to be made enforced witnesses in bootlegging cases may also have the effect of discouraging this illicit business especially since the punishment for this offence is also much more severe than it was before.

PLEASSED WITH PROGRESS ON COURT HOUSE

A. C. McDougal returned to Calgary last night after inspecting local work.

Construction work on the new provincial government court house at Market Place is proceeding with expedition. A. C. McDougall of the contracting firm of McDougall & McNeill, of Calgary, which has the work in hand, left last night on his return to Calgary after a visit of inspection. He expressed much satisfaction before he left the city on the manner in which things were proceeding on the job and was pleased with the progress so far.

Mr. McDougall stated that, in the neighborhood of two months, the concrete work would be finished. The present woodwork that is being put up at Market Square is the framing which will receive the concrete. By the time this concrete work is finished the building will begin to take shape and its size will be fully evident. Around the concrete will put on the cut stone and brick, with which the exterior is finished.

Assembling Materials.

At the present time Albert & McCaffery, the local partners in the big job, are busy assembling materials for the building. A great part of the materials for the masonry is already on hand. Mr. Albert also returned south last night with Mr. McDougall. The latter expects to pay regular monthly visits to Prince Rupert until the work is completed.

J. H. McNeill, a partner in the firm of McDougall & McNeill, and the engineer superintendent of the work here, is being kept busy laying out the various parts as a contract of this magnitude needs a great deal of supervision and planning out.

Mr. McDougall, speaking of conditions on the prairies this year, stated that conditions looked excellent. There was a prospect of a bumper crop which would have its great effect on this province in the transportation of grains by way of the Pacific ports. There would be also the indirect result of added prosperity throughout the west.

SEED 5,000 YEARS
OLD IS PLANTED

BALTIMORE, June 24.—A Morning Glory seed, reputed to be 5,000 years old, has been bought to Baltimore and planted in the garden of Mrs. W. Chapman Robinson, in Green Spring Valley. in Prince Rupert


June 24, 1911.
