Mackenzie King Cabinet Announced

PRINCE OF WALES GETTING GOOD RECEPTION ON VISIT TO INDIA

New Dominion Administration Being Sworn In Today: B. C. Gets Public Works Portfolio

OTTAWA, Dec. 29.—The Mackenzie King Cabinet will be sworn in at 3 o'clock this afternoon, the Arthur Meighen administration holding its last session today. The Governor-General will meet the retiring Premier at 2:45 and at 3 o'clock will proceed to swear in Mr. Mackenzie King and his ministers.

SURPRISE VICTORIA.

VICTORIA, Dec. 29.—The announcement that Hon. J. H. King, Minister of Public Works, is to go to the federal cabinet came as a surprise here. The intention was not generally known and Dr. King's name had not been mentioned prominently.

BOWSER SAYS HAS EVIDENCE

Inquiry into Doings of Game Board Has Been Resumed—Important Witnesses.

VICTORIA, Dec. 29.—The Game Board inquiry before Magistrate Henry Shaw acting as a royal commission has resumed its session.

Hon. W. J. Bowser, leader of the opposition in the legislature, took the stand and said that he would give the names of several men capable of submitting expert evidence to prove that the charges laid by H. H. Pooley, member for Esquimalt, against Dr. A. R. Baker were correct. Mr. Bowser preferred not to give the names of these men at the inquiry because they would be subjected to interference if they were known.

Mr. Pooley also gave evidence along this line and said that he was prepared to prove all the charges which he had made.

It is understood that the witnesses referred to will be subpoenaed.

M. B. Jackson, M.P.P. for the Islands, and W. G. McMyrn, superintendent of the provincial police, were also examined.

RELIEF WORK GOING ON IN CITY NOW

Acropolis Hill, McClymont Park, Cemetery Road and Ninth Avenue Getting Attention.

Grading operations are taking place on the athletic grounds situated on Acropolis Hill, and some 35 men are employed on the work, which is being undertaken as part of the relief scheme being carried out in the city during the winter.

A gang of men are also employed at Hays Creek on the log boom.

The cemetery road is also undergoing some necessary alterations and clearing, and Ninth Avenue is also having attention.

A few men are employed on ditching work throughout the city. The work is arranged on a sliding scale; married men are working five and five and a half days a week, and unmarried men from two to two and a half days a week, according to their circumstances. Married men with large families are working the full week.

CIVIC WELCOME TO BRITISH WARSHIP

H. M. S. Raleigh, Admiral Paakenham, is in Vancouver for Two Weeks' Stay.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 29.—A civic welcome has been officially extended to Admiral Paakenham and the officers of His Majesty's ship Raleigh which will spend two weeks at this port.

MEIGHEN'S ACT IS HIGHHANDED

So Declares Mackenzie King Regarding Making Vacancy and New Election in Grenville.

OTTAWA, Dec. 29.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, premier elect, has bitterly condemned what he describes as "the high handed action" of Hon. Arthur Meighen, premier, in issuing writs for the election in Grenville County, Ontario, where the defeated premier, it is understood, is seeking to be re-elected. Mr. Mackenzie King said that he had had no knowledge of such action until he had seen the report in a newspaper.

The premier elect said that Mr. Meighen's last act as premier like his first would go down in history as one of usurpation in defiance of the expressed wishes of the people. He had apparently given A. G. Casselman, the member elect for Grenville, a job in the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment so that he could create a vacancy for himself.

ITALIAN BANK IN NEW YORK CLOSES FOLLOWING A RUN

NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—The Italian Discount and Trust Co., correspondent of the Banca Italiana di Sconto, of Rome, which is also closed, shut its doors today following a run.

FRENCH ATTITUDE IS DISAPPOINTING

LONDON, Dec. 29.—The news of France's action before the Washington armament conference refusing to accept an allotment of submarines of less than 90,000 tons is printed here in the London newspapers under captions indicating disappointment.

LIQUOR RUNNER

Seized Today at Boston With Cargo of Alcohol.

BOSTON, Dec. 29.—The British schooner Golden West, with a cargo of alcohol and a case of liquor aboard, was seized by customs cutter outside the port, bound here from Halifax.

TWO BANK MEN WERE KILLED

By Bandits Who Held Up Pearl River National Bank and Escaped.

PEARL RIVER, N.Y., Dec. 29.—Four bandits shot and killed the assistant cashier and the clerk of the National Bank here today. They escaped after having wounded the railroad guard. It is not known if they obtained any loot.

FISHERIES DEAL IN KETCHIKAN

H. C. Nunan and Others Acquire Interest in Beagle Packing Company.

KETCHIKAN, Dec. 29.—Through a deal consummated recently, Charles Deppe sold his interest in the Beagle Packing Company to H. C. Nunan, M. J. Heneghan and G. F. Paup. The consideration for the deal was not given but it is said to involve a substantial sum, in that it had to do with one of the best cannery properties in this section.

All of the purchasers of the Deppe interest are well known and all have had interests in the fisheries for a number of years.

Mr. Deppe has no intention of leaving Ketchikan, but is not prepared to announce his future plans.

LABOR CONFEDERATION MANUFACTURING BOMBS

Two Persons Killed and Five Wounded in Factory Explosion Today.

LISBON, Dec. 29.—Two persons were killed and five others wounded today through an explosion of bombs which it is alleged were being manufactured in a building belonging to the Lisbon General Confederation of Labor. The government is maintaining order and some arrests have been made.

UNDERSTOOD FARRIS WILL RETAIN SEAT

J. W. deB. Farris, who resigned the provincial attorney generalship last week, is spending the holidays with relatives in New Brunswick. His friends in Vancouver understand he will retain his seat in the legislature.

Future British Monarch Opens Calcutta Memorial In Honor Queen Victoria

CALCUTTA, Dec. 29.—In spite of threats of boycott and cool receptions, the visit of the Prince of Wales in India is proving a highly successful and the future King of Britain is gaining a warm place in most of the hearts of the people of India. His pleasing personality and his boyish grace are making him very popular among all the people, both English and native, and the attempts at passive resistance towards him launched in some quarters are fading by the way. The proceedings of his reception are free from untoward incidents or demonstrations.

The ceremony of opening the Victoria Memorial here in honor of the Prince's illustrious great-grandmother, the late Queen Victoria, was a pleasing manifestation of the reception being accorded him. The affair took place amid scenes of splendor and enthusiastic and cheering crowds were in attendance. The magnificent edifice took fifteen years to build and is of great architectural beauty.

LIBERALS LOYAL.

ALLAHABAD, Dec. 29.—In opening the fourth session of the All-India Liberal Federation, Govind Vih, the president, said in his address that it was the duty of the liberals to offer their most loyal and cordial welcome to the Prince of Wales. He urged that the Liberals strive for full Dominion status within the British Empire.

GHANDI BELIEVED TO HAVE SUPERNATURAL POWERS IN INDIA

LONDON, Dec. 29.—A dispatch to the Westminster Gazette says that the popular belief in India that Gandhi, the Nationalist leader, possesses supernatural powers is growing. Non-cooperators are trying to persuade all Indians to use no cotton cloth except that of native spinning and weaving.

BOYCOTT IS CALLED FOR

Egyptian Doctors Tell People That British Boycott Sacred Duty.

LONDON, Dec. 29.—A dispatch to the Mail from Cairo says that at a meeting of Egyptian doctors held last Tuesday a resolution was passed calling for the boycott of the British among all classes. The boycott, the doctors say is a sacred national duty. The Egyptians are said to be beginning to withdraw their deposits from the British banks.

LAWLESSNESS STILL IN CITY OF BELFAST

Bombs Thrown, Shots Fired, Storekeepers Held Up and Tillis Robbed.

BELFAST, Dec. 29.—There were further outbreaks of lawlessness here last night. Several shots were fired and bombs were thrown. Storekeepers were held up by armed men and their cash drawers were looted. No one was injured.

FAVOR ANGLO- IRISH TREATY STILL GROWS

Although Report that Dail Eireann Had Accepted It is Unofficial.

DUBLIN, Dec. 29.—Reports of a secret meeting of the Dail Eireann resulting in a decision to ratify the Anglo-Irish treaty are unconfirmed. Inquiries elicit the information that the situation remains much the same as it was before. There is, however, a strong feeling among the Sinn Fein classes of Ireland in favor of ratification. Various organizations of public and semi-public nature have demonstrated this in voluntary votes that have been passed favoring the pact.

Believe Ratification Safe.

LONDON, Dec. 29.—The majority of English newspaper correspondents in Ireland see in the growing volume of sentiment for peace treaty an indication that the ratification will go through easily soon after the Dail Eireann reconvenes next Tuesday. The constant increase in the number of expressions of public opinion in favor of the treaty is emphasized by the correspondents.

VANCOUVER WON HOCKEY GAME

Defeated Seattle Last Night by Score of Five to Nothing.

SEATTLE, Dec. 29.—Coming back in top form, Vancouver last night defeated Seattle by a score of 5 to 0 in the Pacific Coast Hockey League fixture.

Was Brilliant Win.

"Smoky" Harris and his hard boring pals on the Vancouver forward line proved too much for the Metropolitan and the result was that they were swamped in the five to nothing score. It was Vancouver's first win on the Seattle ice in this season's play of the Pacific Coast Hockey Association. The Millionaire's victory was a brilliant one and the work both on the forward line and in defence was excellent.

SCHOONER SWIFTSURE REGARDED AS LOST

Last Sighted on October 12 by Schooner Florence—Was in Heavy Gale.

The Seattle halibut schooner Swiftsure, with a crew of six, has been missing since October 12, and is now regarded as lost, says the Pacific Fisherman. She was last sighted by the schooner Florence in a heavy gale off Yakutat, Alaska. She sailed from Seattle September 12 and from Ketchikan September 26, for the Yakutat banks.

The men aboard were Capt. K. E. Skotheim, John Skotheim, engineer; Andrew Thompson, Ole Astad, Gus Hogan and John Johnson, fishermen.

The funeral of the late Silas Dawson will take place from the Presbyterian Church on Friday, December 30, at 2:30 p.m.

Irish Situation is Looking Bright.

If recent despatches from Ireland may be taken as any indication, the predominance of sentiment even among the rebellious Sinn Fein and kindred factions in Ireland seems to favor the acceptance of the Anglo-Irish treaty. The final decision will rest with the Dail Eireann, which is to assemble again next Tuesday to go on with the question. It would appear from the latest news of the situation in Ireland public opinion so favors the treaty that the Dail Eireann will be forced by its own people to accept the pact. Although disappointments in regard to the settlement of the long standing question have resulted in the past when indications were almost as promising, it seems that now a lasting agreement is closer at hand than it ever was before. With the situation looking as bright as it does today, it seems reasonable to expect that the Dail will give a favorable decision and the last step towards settlement will have been made.

French and British Attitudes Differ Vastly.

The French attitude on naval disarmament seems to be providing the chief discordant note at the Washington conference, while the British attitude on most of the questions seems to come nearest being the ideal one. These conditions seem natural in many ways. France has been holding out for maintenance of armaments, while Britain has been going to the extreme in the other direction. The attitudes reflect the national dispositions of the two countries in regard to international affairs. France traditionally is a more militaristic nation than Britain and also a more distrustful one. Fault may be found with both but, be that as it may, both are conscientious. Both no doubt are striving towards international peace and, at the same time, national preservation. Feeling in Britain and America is that disarmament will meet the objective of world peace effectively. On the other hand, France seems to think that the continuation of armaments will meet the same end. In expressing that view the nation has exposed itself to the suspicion that it and its representatives harbor unpeaceful designs. It is pitiful that the French people, who are possibly more pacific and more dominated by the horror of war than any people in the civilized world, should be thus misunderstood. It is to be hoped that the world will not continue in this misunderstanding, for if it does the work of the conference may be all in vain.

Great Work Being Done by Commercial Institutions.

It is as well that the public should be reminded from time to time of the significance which attaches to the success achieved by our great commercial institutions. From the most humble beginnings our banks and assurance companies have risen and expanded coincidentally with the growth of the Dominion itself. Each historical development, such as those which have occurred in connection with agriculture, lumbering and, latterly, industrialism, has seen a corresponding broadening and strengthening of the basis of national finance. Trials and difficulties marked the genesis of assurance in Canada. The people knew next to nothing of its principles, and were indifferent to its advantages. In many cases there was even keen opposition on the ground that it was an interference with the workings of Divine Providence. The profound and beneficial change which has come over the attitude of the public is exemplified by quoting the aid which the big Canadian assurance companies were able to render their country when the world-storm burst in 1914. The huge concentration of savings in their hands enabled them to come to the aid of the government in a way which up to then had been well nigh inconceivable. The Dominion had never till then tried to raise a national loan within its own boundaries. That it was able to finance its own side of the war was largely due to the assurance companies subscribing to Canadian government loans no less a sum than \$235,114,150. The larger subscriptions were not all accepted in full, but the amount actually allotted to the companies and taken up by them totalled \$182,538,350. Some weeks ago the public was startled by the announcement that one company alone had assurances in force at the present moment to the amount of over \$500,000,000. The deep significance of such huge figures, both to our national life and to the homes of the people, is now doubly emphasized by the further announcement that the same corporation has since its formation paid considerably over \$100,000,000 to its policyholders. Apart altogether from the fact that these figures show the power to allay distress that lies within the hands of such institutions, it must be borne in mind that the mere existence of such concerns tends to stabilize national life and to infuse into a great proportion of the people of the Dominion a feeling of intense security.

SALVAGE WORK ON LAURENTIC

Season's Work Results in Salvaging \$25,000,000 Gold Bullion.

PORTSMOUTH, Dec. 29.—The Admiralty salvage vessel Racer and her tender, the Canadian drifter No. 1, which left Portsmouth in the spring with the object of recovering the remainder of the gold from the ill-fated armed liner Laurentic, which has been at the bottom of the sea off one of the wildest parts of the North Coast of Ireland since January, 1917, have returned to Portsmouth for the winter. The result of the expedition has been the recovery of between five and six million pounds worth of bullion, and there remain two or three millions worth still to be brought to the surface. Operations will be resumed again in the spring.

A ship of 11,900 tons, the Laurentic was in the service of the Government as an armed cruiser when she was sunk in over twenty fathoms of water. Of her crew of 175 officers and men, only 121 were saved, among the survivors being her commander, Capt. R. A. Norton, R.N.

Three Years Sunk.

Over three years' pounding by the Atlantic swells has transformed the great liner into a heap of twisted debris; and her decks, which settled down on the sea-bottom, covered an area of several hundreds of feet. The wreck was practically covered with gravel and silt, as it is in a position in which it receives the full force of the Atlantic gales. This obstruction had to be pumped away as far as possible by powerful pumps placed in position by the divers, as the gold was at the bottom of the huge mass of wreckage. The plate girders had to be blasted and cut away by explosives, and the task of the divers was both difficult and dangerous. In consequence of this the Racer carried a re-compression chamber for the purpose of treating cases of illness which the divers might contract in the course of their hazardous task.

The vessel engaged in salvaging the Laurentic is about all that remains of the splendid Admiralty Salvage Section, which was brought into being during the war. With this exception the section came to an end with the completion of the wreck-raising operations on the Belgian coast. In the case of the Laurentic the rate paid is half a crown for every £100 worth of gold recovered, and this divided between all employed in the work is equal to about one halfpenny per cent. per head.

YEAR 1926 WILL BE BAD ONE, SAYS ASTROLOGY PAPER

LONDON, Dec. 29.—In the year 1926, the world is scheduled to be shaken to the foundation, physically and politically. There will be a succession of famine and plagues, of floods and shipwrecks, rioting and revolution, according to the British Journal of Astrology, which drew the horoscope. Six years later the great Armageddon is scheduled for the final conflict between Mohammedanism and Bolshevism against the united Anglo-Saxon world. It will end in universal peace but with few left on earth to enjoy it.

HARDING LIKELY TO VISIT ALASKA 1922

Tells Seattle Men at Washington He Will See Them Next Year in Seattle.

SEATTLE, Dec. 29.—Prospects for a trip to Alaska by President Harding in the summer of 1922 are very bright according to information received by the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, which has been active in the proposal to have "The President" come to the territory. Press advices from Washington, D. C. say that President Harding fully intends to come to the Pacific Coast and then go to Alaska next summer. Only last week the President told Seattle men at the capital that he would undoubtedly see them in Seattle next summer.

PROCESS FOR MAKING AIRPLANES INVISIBLE

Hull, England, Man Claims He Has Discovered Secret, But Science is Skeptical.

LONDON, Dec. 29.—Mr. Ernest Welsh, of North Ferris, near Hull, claims to have discovered a metal with the transparent properties of glass, by which aeroplanes can be rendered invisible.

Mr. Welsh is a man of inventive ideas. During the war he experimented with a rocket-like apparatus to bring down zeppelins, submarine signals and silent guns have received his attention, and he has placed on the market a device for the improved lighting for ships and a system for gassing rats.

Scepticism is expressed by London scientists upon the reported claim by Mr. Welsh.

Dr. Rosenham, of the National Physical Laboratory, a well-known authority on glass and steel, said that it was not possible to make any metal transparent, nor had great success been achieved in making glass strong enough to resist fracture.

Light Through Gold.

Mr. Shaw Scott, of the Institute of Metals, said the essential of a metal was its opaque character. "The only method in which any metal has been made at all transparent has been by heating," he said.

"We have pieces of metal at the Institute, notably gold, beaten out to such ultra-microscopic thinness that it shows a certain amount of translucency, a greenish light being able to pass through it."

"This was only an experiment into the ductility of the metal," he added. "It is possible to get silver and aluminum down to this fineness, but it is of no special constructive use."

Mr. Welsh has, apparently, not submitted his invention to the research department of the Air Ministry.

An official of the Department said that certain forms of camouflage and the use of highly polished aluminum were very successful in making an aeroplane invisible.

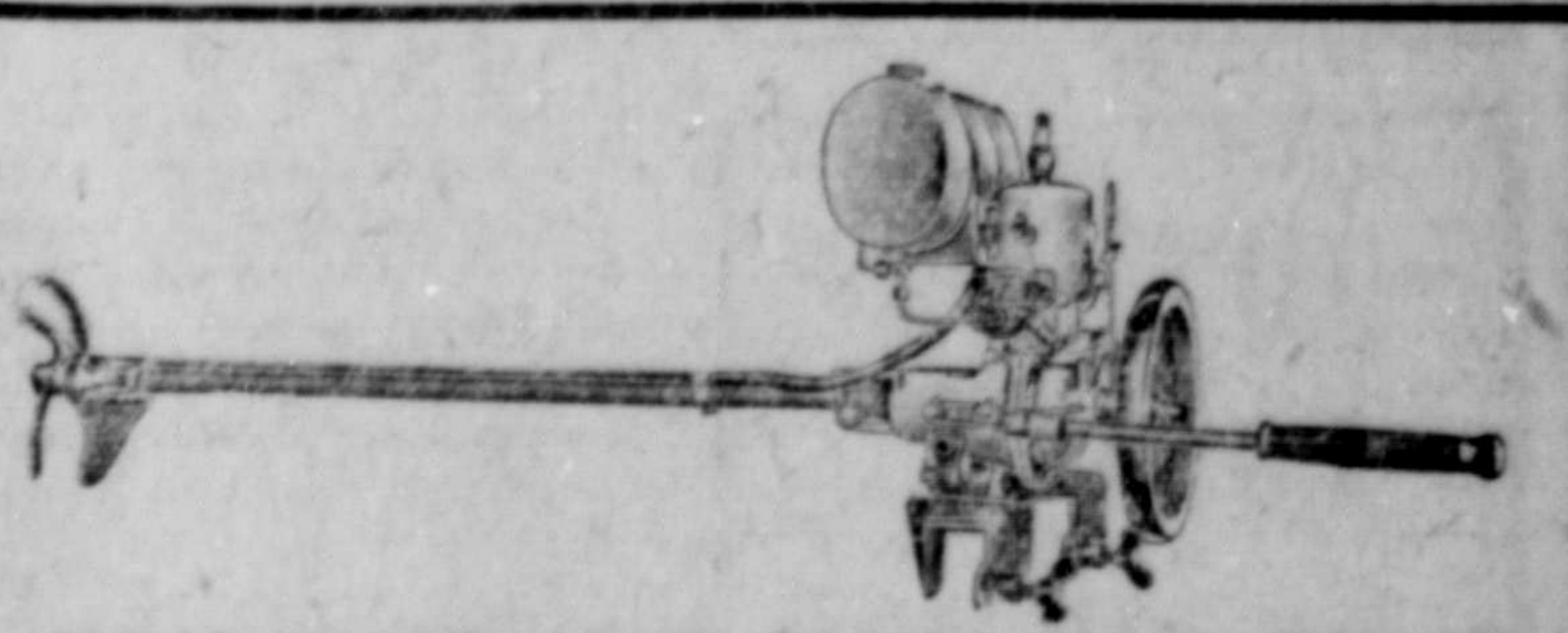

BRINGING UP FATHER



ALPS GIVING UP THE DEAD

Drought and Hot Summer Caused Glaciers and Snowfields to Melt Unusually Much.

GENEVA, Dec. 29.—The long drought and the long hot summer this year caused the glaciers and the snowfields to melt so much that bodies of climbers have been found who have been lost for many years. In some cases all hope of ever finding them had been abandoned. At Zermatt it is even hoped that the remains of Lord Frederick Douglas, who was killed on July 11, 1865, during Whymper's first ascent of the Matterhorn, may now be discovered. It will be remembered that during the descent of the Matterhorn on that occasion Mr. Hadow, the Rev. Charles Hudson, the guide, Michel Croz, and Lord Frederick Douglas were all killed, and that the bodies of the three first-named were recovered but not that of Lord Frederick Douglas. It was assumed that he fell some 5,000 feet on to the glacier below, where he may very well have fallen into a crevasse.

Missing 18 Years.

Recently the body of Josef Tressch, belonging to a well-known family of Swiss guides, was found at the foot of the Kliserstock, in the Gotthard range, after he had been missing for eighteen years. The remains of a Swiss school teacher, who disappeared in the accident towards the end of 1914 in the Piz Languard range (Grisons), have also been found, after seven years. Bodies of other long lost tourists and climbers have been found not in the Swiss Alps alone, but in the French Alps and in Tyrol.

In the opinion of Alpine guides and climbers, if this winter is as snowless as the last, then next summer it should be possible to discover all the bodies of persons who have disappeared in years gone by on glaciers and snowfields. As yet, the mountains have been merely powdered with snow, whereas generally the first heavy snowfalls have occurred by this time.

SERBIA IS NOW DISEASE FREE

Great Improvement in Many Respects in the Little Kingdom.

NISB, Jugoslavia, Dec. 29.—(By The Associated Press)—Serbia today is practically free of epidemics of disease. The population never enjoyed better health or more genuine contentment. The hospitals never held fewer patients. The death-rate seldom has been lower. Doctors have rarely found it so difficult to make a living. This is regarded as remarkable in view of the fearful scourges which claimed half its population during the world war and the post-armistice period.

The correspondent, who visited Serbia at irregular intervals during 1918, 1919 and 1920, recently made another journey through the country. He noted an amazing change in the appearance of the people. The men and women looked strong, vigorous and well-fed. They wore the finest homespun clothing. The children were fat, rosy-cheeked and full of life. The babies were plump, bright-eyed and smiling. All were warmly clad. Everywhere the homes were examples of cleanliness, comfort and abundance.

No such picture could be found in Serbia in years previous. In 1918, for example, when the armistice mercifully intervened and saved Serbia from extinction, the correspondent saw men and women clad in rags, afflicted with disease, homeless and hopeless, dying of inanition as they walked. He observed babies wrapped in empty flour sacks, in newspapers, and even in pieced-together leathers, life bones showing through their frail little bodies for want of sustenance or as a result of disease. He visited hospitals packed with typhus-ridden patients; orphanages overflowing with parentless children; asylums crowded with the feeble-minded and distracted.

Complete Recovery. But Serbia of 1922, or Jugoslavia, as it is more correct to call it, presents a different scene. The country has emerged from those years of misery, want and woe in almost miraculous fashion. It is a changed nation, not merely politically and territorially, but physically and spiritually. While the rest of the world has been squabbling over territorial boundaries, economic zones, reparations, indemnities and internal strife, Jugoslavia has been "sawing wood" and minding her own business.

LOG SHORTAGE IN PROVINCE

On Account of Early Fall Snow and Closing Up.

An acute log shortage has developed in British Columbia, says the Portland Timberman. This is blamed partly on the early fall of snow and partly on the tendency of loggers to close up operations for a few weeks to firm the market for the spring opening. There are said to be only 97,000,000 feet of all kinds of logs at present, although in October there were probably more than 115,000,000 feet, and that was considered light enough in view of the heavy demands on the mills to fill orders before the new year. The scarcity of cedar logs has brought about an inquiry to ascertain how much has been shipped across to the Japanese market in the form of logs and large cants. Approximately 10,000,000 feet of cedar logs have been shipped from the Pacific Coast to Japan during the first six months of the year, and it is declared that this amount would have made 100,000,000 shingles.

The situation has already had an effect on the market and prices have advanced substantially. Fir logs have advanced about one dollar a thousand within the last week, run of the camp being quoted now at \$15.50. Cedar average boom logs, is as high as \$22. Hemlock has risen to \$12, largely as a result of increased activity in the pulp mills.

Hemlock Demand Improves.
The market for hemlock has improved steadily although it is still quite a way from being particularly lucrative to the trade. American railroads have been buying considerable hemlock siding, and eastern cities are buying hemlock for inside trim. The Oriental market is accepting larger quantities of hemlock for the manufacture of tea and rubber boxes, most of the material going to Chinese ports and Singapore. Such plants as the Genoa Bay Lumber Co. and the Sidney Mills, Ltd., have been exporting hemlock squares to Japan in fairly large volume.

LIBERAL MINORITY OF THREE IN HOUSE
Death of McGibbon Leave King with 116 Seats in House of 234.

OTTAWA, Dec. 29.—By the death of P. R. McGibbon, member-elect for Argenteuil, the Liberal party finds itself with a nominal strength of 116 members in a total of 234 who are now entitled to seats in the House of Commons.

When the House has formally opened and the Government has named its speaker, its strength will have still further reduced to an actual minority of three seats as represented by 115 Liberal members and 118 of all other parties.

There is, however, the possibility that by immediate action on the part of the incoming administration a successor to the late Mr. McGibbon may be elected in time to sit in the next parliament. According to Bourgeois' rules of parliamentary procedure where a vacancy occurs due to the death of a member in the interim between the general election and the opening of the House, two other members may address their warrants to the Chief Electoral Officer for a writ of election. The Chief Electoral officer may then issue such writ at any time after such vacancy occurs. This would make possible the election of a member within thirty days of the issuance of the writs as it is unlikely that the usual two-weeks delay would be required in view of the recent revision of the electoral lists.

Under the ordinary procedure where a seat becomes vacant formal notice must be given to the Speaker subsequent to the opening of the House but this will entail a delay likely to prevent a member from attending the first session of Parliament, should it be a brief one.

Premier Meighen, incidentally finds himself in this predicament, it being necessary for him to await the presentation of the resignation of one of his supporters to the Speaker at the

FLOODS INTERFERE WITH PROCESS OF FISH PROPAGATION

Salmon Egg Production in B. C. Encouraging in View of Conditions.

OTTAWA, Dec. 29.—The recent floods in British Columbia have rather upset the general order of things in salmon spawning. The abnormal conditions undoubtedly interfered with commercial fishing, allowing more than the normal number to ascend the rivers and seed the spawning grounds. On the other hand the natural beds have been seriously disturbed by nature's violence and the work of the government hatcheries has been hampered. In the whole it is doubtful that a sufficient number of salmon above the normal has escaped the fishermen to compensate for the large number of eggs destroyed in the beds.

Despite this setback to fish cultural work, general results in the British Columbia hatcheries have been good. In connection with the Pemberton hatchery, for example, the run of salmon was not at great as last year, but it was equal to that of 1919 and 1918, and fully five times that of 1917, the last "big run year," which appears to be a very encouraging indication.

The total collection of eggs in this district, while not as large as last year, totaled 27,000,000, which is considered exceedingly satisfactory in view of conditions.

ODD DEVICE FOR MAKING HOME POWER
Invention to Make Rocking Chair Run Household Machines.

SOREL, Dec. 29.—A new invention will be manufactured at Sorel if everything turns out as well as expected. This invention consists of a machine actuated by a rocking chair which, it is said, generates enough power to run any machine in the house, such as washing machines, sewing machines, fans, etc.

NEW MORALITY IN GERMANY

Changes in Family Life—Decrease in Marriages.

BERLIN, Dec. 29.—There is a revolution in progress in Germany which has hitherto met with little comment, because it is less visible to the naked eye than any of the other upheavals to be observed here since 1918. Nevertheless, more far-reaching results may well be expected of it than of many more noisy signs of disintegration. Nothing more or less than the adaptability, sanctity, and permanency of the marriage tie is in question, with its whole endless chain of consequences in relation to the foundation of the State.

Sock Darners Wanted.
Though it has been impossible hitherto to obtain completely accurate statistics of the birth-rate since the war, the number of marriages celebrated in the early months of the Republic was entirely satisfactory from the point of view of all eager to reconstruct and re-people an exhausted country. An increase over former years was attributed to the unpleasantness of resigning life, and the exorbitant price of the bachelor, the fact being taken for granted that the girls were always willing to accept upon demand. Strangely enough, it is now the reluctance of the

female population upon which the decrease of marriages in 1921 is based. The German woman, more slave to tradition than in any other of the Northern countries of Europe—who has been known in her more enlightened, or rather desperate moments, to invest the imperial doctrine of church, children, cooking, and clothes with such glorified terms as ethics, psychology, kitchen chemistry, and the expression of individuality—is rapidly becoming the pioneer of what can only be termed a new morality. In short, the "bon ami" is rapidly taking the place of the husband, and the menage-a-deux that of the well-regulated domestic establishment.

The desperate dissipation of Berlin has nothing to do with these new conditions visible everywhere to the prayer beneath the surface and very soon to be apparent to all the world. It is the most sedate and sensible women of all, daughters and sisters of the academic class, who are yielding to the pressure of circumstances.

Large Income Necessary.
Economic conditions are such in Germany that only a very large income can provide for the family. The wife, willing to be a wage earner, loses, in spite of revolutionary decrees protecting the married woman worker, as often as not a remunerative position on her marriage. Moreover, greatest consideration of all in a country where the bride not only provides household linen but furniture as well, the war-widow whose hand is eagerly sought on account of her snug little home, loses her pension. There seems only one solution to the exigencies of daily life, and that is being universally adopted. It is surprising how swiftly accepted codes of morality change after a few highly-respected individuals have dared to take the plunge, within the limits of a small community. That this community is rapidly increasing can only point to the effects, insidious or otherwise, example following upon a general upheaval of everything and anything affecting the domestic life of a nation.

Decline in Birth Rate.
The decline in the birthrate already apparent is due far more to this cause than to the considerations of expense generally accepted. The fight raging against the Socialist doctrine of open propaganda for limiting the population by means hitherto regarded as illegal—meetings in support of such measures are now advertised largely at every street-corner in Berlin—have not yet succeeded in greatly influencing individual views. It seems the State interference is powerless in non-Catholic countries. But at this time of year, glancing through the advertisement columns of the big dailies, when with true German sentiment "Christmas Wishes" looms largely, the decline in seekers after matrimony in comparison with former seasons strike one as significant. The "gentleman of imposing presence and assured circumstances" looking for a wife this week "with dark hair, figure plump and full, a furnished flat, and ample means" is quite an exception.

MIGHT HAVE BEEN KING OF BELGIUM

Illegitimate Son of Late King Leopold Visiting in Vienna.

VIENNA, Dec. 29.—A "distinguished foreigner" arrived in Vienna a few days ago Baron Lucien Philippe Marie Vaughan, a youth of seventeen, the illegitimate son of the late King Leopold of Belgium, who, with his instructor, is on a journey through Central Europe. This young man recalls the romantic affair of King Leopold, who, as an old man of seventy-two, fell in love with Caroline Lacroix, a peer's daughter, bought her Larnoux Castle, near Paris, where he spent most of his time and surrounded the lady with princely splendor. Making her the "Baroness of Vaughan," he was wedded to her by the Court chaplain in the private chapel of his castle at Laeken.

In 1905, at the Cape Ferrat Castle, on the Riviera, she had a son, the lad who is now visiting Vienna; in the birth register is the entry—"Father unknown." Despite this modesty the King's three daughters were greatly upset, as they and others suspected that little Lucien Philippe Marie would be the future King of the Belgians, for, according to the Belgian Constitution, all classes are equal before the law, and there is no such thing as "morganatic marriage." But to attain this end King Leopold would have had to undergo civil marriage with Caroline Lacroix, without which the wedding was invalid. For unknown reasons the King did not do so.

SAVAGE SOW KILLED AND DEVOURED BOY

PARIS, Dec. 29.—A farmer of Jougneux, having surprised a little boy in the act of stealing apples from his orchard, succeeded in catching the child and for punishment shut him up in a pigsty together with a sow. He remained deaf to the terrified cries of the boy, but when a few hours later he came to set the child at liberty a horrible sight greeted his eyes. The sow was engaged in devouring the corpse of the unfortunate child. The farmer, who was nearly lynched by the crowd which gathered on the scene, has been arrested.
