BEST KNOWN STEAMER SANK AND LIVES LOST

RENUOUS HOCKEY LAST NIGHT WHEN VANCOUVER WON FROM OTTAWA

Steamship Governor Sank; 9 People Missing following Collision with a Freighter

PRINCE RUPERT, April 1.—The Admiral liner Governor bound from Seattle to Seattle sank at midnight last night after colliding with the freighter West Harland near Port Townsend while en route to Seattle from the south. The collision resulted in the death of one hundred and sixty persons, which included the passengers and crew, escaped in life boats and were picked up by the freighter and taken to Seattle. The Governor is one of the most popular steamers operating on the Vancouver-Seattle route. She is 5,000 tons register, 391 feet long and 19 feet deep. She was built in New York and is a sister ship to the President. She is the property of the Pacific Steamship Company, the largest of the new company when the Pacific and the Admiral were consolidated. She is known in the north, having made trips to Alaska, calling at Prince Rupert once. She was seized and was quite

MODERATION BILL PASSES

Needs Only Signature of Lieutenant-Governor to Become Law.

VICTORIA, April 1.—The Moderation Bill providing for the sale of liquor including beer in sealed packages from a Government store, as asked by the people last autumn at the provincial plebiscite, passed its third reading in the Legislature yesterday. It has now only to receive the signature of the Lieutenant-Governor before becoming law. The amendment moved by Thomas Uphill of Fernie asking that municipalities be given the right to license beer houses was defeated before the motion for the third reading was put.

Will Make Occasional Trips Here Says J. C. McIntosh, Member For Nanaimo.

PACIFIC IN WINTER, ATLANTIC IN SUMMER

Rumors that Fleet May Not Return to East Coast This Year.

VICTORIA, April 1.—Both the Pacific and Atlantic coasts are to share in the presence of the Canadian naval squadron, according to J. C. McIntosh, M.P. for Nanaimo who has returned home from Ottawa.

Mr. McIntosh states that it is proposed by the Government to station the ships of the Canadian fleet on the Pacific coast for the winter months and on the Atlantic for the summer. While they are stationed at Esquimalt, they will make occasional trips to Prince Rupert and Vancouver.

There are rumors here that the fleet may not return to the Atlantic this year, but will remain here during the summer.

MORE CASH FOR MEMBERS

Sessional Indemnity Increased From \$1,600 to \$2,000.

VICTORIA, April 1.—The members of the Legislature have increased their salaries and indemnities. Premier Oliver's salary has been raised to \$9,000 a year and all other cabinet ministers to \$7,500. That of W. J. Bowser as leader of the opposition goes to \$2,000 a year in addition to the sessional indemnity. The indemnities of members goes up from \$1,600 to \$2,000. The only salary that remains unchanged is that of the speaker which remains at \$1,800.

IRISHMAN LANDS BUT MUST PROCEED THROUGH TO ENGLAND

VANCOUVER, April 1.—Osmond Osmonde, the Irish sympathizer, has been permitted to land on agreement to proceed across Canada for England.

Roy Clothier Purchases Mine at Marmot River and Work to Commence

STEWART, April 1.—Roy Clothier has purchased a half interest in the Salvador group of mineral claims on the Marmot River with Alex. McInnes. There are three short tunnels driven on the property showing two feet of gold bearing quartz. The vein has been carefully sampled by Clothier and an assay gives \$20 a ton, ten per cent of which is free gold.

The new owners are arranging to start work immediately driving a tunnel on another five-foot vein showing good gold values on the surface. The idea is to ascertain if the values continue and go down to a sufficient depth. The Salvador property where the work is being done is one mile from tidewater with low elevation.

Insane Man Is Shot By Local Constable at City Lockup During a Fracas

As a result of a fracas which occurred in the police station last night about 11 o'clock, Paul Post, of Usk, who has been declared insane and who was to have been taken to New Westminister asylum last night, is today nursing a couple of flesh wounds in his left arm and shoulder caused by revolver shots inflicted by Constable George Leek who has been suspended by Chief W. H. Vickers pending a special meeting of the police commission.

About 11 o'clock last night preparations were being made to take Post to the steamer Prince George to start on his southward journey to the Asylum, when he went on the rampage. Constable Leek was at the time on duty and went into the cell room to remonstrate with the man but he made at the officer in a threatening manner with a broom in his hand. Howe left him and locked the door of the room.

It was then that Constable Leek came in and the two officers attempted to quiet Post. Even with assistance they were unable to do so and Constable Leek fired a couple of shots into the air with the intention of frightening him. This, however, proved without

avail so the shots were fired into the fleshy part of his arm and shoulder. The victim was soon overcome then and placed in a cell where Dr. Tremayne was called to examine him. The wounds were pronounced to be of a minor nature and not serious. Car licenses have been issued in the last fortnight to Fred Stork, Ford, and the Canadian Fish & Gold Storage Co., Ford.

Favors Formation of a New Province in Northern B.C.

At the public meeting called by President Williams of the Board of Trade to discuss a proposal to form a new province in the north the following resolution was passed after an amendment to delay action for further information had been defeated:

"Whereas there is a proposal to create a new province to consist of all that part of British Columbia north of latitude 52 and the Canadian Yukon.

"And whereas we feel that this portion of the province is not receiving fair treatment from the provincial government which is composed for the most part of residents of the southern portion of the province.

"And whereas we believe that the affairs of this portion of the province could be much more effectively administered under our own Legislature.

"Be it therefore resolved that this meeting of Prince Rupert citizens goes on record in favor of the dividing up of the province and that we petition the Government of Ottawa to allow a plebiscite to be taken in the district mentioned in order to determine the same."

In opening the meeting, Mr. Williams explained that he had called it as president of the Board of Trade. He had personally not gone into the matter fully but was in favor of it. He felt that human nature was the same the world over. Men had not added much to his original fund of knowledge. It was still difficult to get from place to place and our territorial knowledge was limited. Each person knew his own locality best. People in politics, government or business were largely influenced by selfish interests. Selfish interest it was that brought us up from monkeys.

A voice: "Some of us." The speaker went on to say it was impossible to ignore so great a principle. Laws were made so that the majority benefited and the minority frequently suffered. To overcome this to some extent the country was divided into sections called provinces. The larger they were the less they represented the people. Prince Rupert was very small compared with other cities, yet she had all the problems of any other. With a view to enable the people to lay before the centres their requirements, the smaller divisions were formed such as municipalities.

All Voting Power. Northern B. C. had little to say with only four members in the Legislature out of forty-seven. It was difficult to let our requirements be known. The south has all the voting power and got everything. The railways headed for Vancouver, because Vancouver wanted them there. If branches had been built for the G. T. P. instead of building the P. G. E. it would have been better for the development of the province, but the difficulty was we did not see B. C. through Vancouver eyes.

Mr. Williams then discussed taxation, arguing that with the exception of the income tax, auto tax, amusement and poll taxes, all were raised in unorganized districts. But the unorganized districts did the paying on timber and mines. Everything was taxed double, treble and super-taxed. He thought the people of the north were thoroughly capable of taking care of themselves. They would have more income to spend if the change were made and there would be more chance of their wrongs being remedied. There

was nothing worse in a community than to have wrongs unheeded. The outlying parts of the province had not at present enough to say. To be fair the territory should be cut into smaller provinces. Mayor Rochester.

Mayor Rochester said there were things to be said for and against and he would like to (Continued on Page Five.)

RESTORATION CHARLES NOW IS UNLIKELY

BUDAPEST, April 1.—The Jugo Slav and Czech Slav countries are protesting the return of Charles to the Hungarian throne and his placing of armies on the borders. The situation in Hungary is said to be in hand, the Government informing Switzerland that Charles will be returning to his exile in that country at once.

IRISH REPORT IS PUBLISHED

Committee of One Hundred in United States Suggests U. S. Intervention.

WASHINGTON, April 1.—The report of the committee of one hundred investigating the Irish question is now published. It repeats the familiar anti-British charges and complains that they lack any official British defense and asserts that the United States intervention in Ireland is becoming inevitable. The British embassy has issued a statement calling the report biased and misleading.

HAWAII LEGISLATURE ASKS BEER AND WINE

Says Islands Do Not Want Prohibition and Drunkenness Increases.

HONOLULU, April 1.—The Hawaii legislature has petitioned the United States Congress for four and a half per cent beer and fifteen per cent wine. The Legislature claims the people of that territory do not want prohibition and that drunkenness is worse since prohibition went into effect.

Coal Strike is Serious Matter.

The British coal strike is a very serious matter. The coal mining is the chief industry of that country and if the mines are tied up most of the other industries have to close from lack of fuel.

At this distance it is difficult to tell the pros and cons of the problem. Apparently the miners consider they have right on their side, but whether or not public opinion is with them will remain to be decided. On the surface, as the dispatches come through, it would seem as if the men were wrong, but questions of war profits enter in and give it a somewhat different aspect. The hope is that a settlement will be arrived at. Up to noon today there was no news to indicate whether they had actually gone on strike, but everything pointed that way. Before going to press the news will probably arrive.

Meeting Discussed New Province Move.

Last night's meeting to discuss the formation of a new province was largely in favor of the move, but many who voted for it did so because of a desire to show that we in the north have not from any government, Dominion or provincial, received just that amount of consideration that our importance deserves. Very few people really expect to get a new province formed unless it be those who have not given the subject any consideration.

The chief argument in favor of the formation of a new province is that we have not received good treatment. That is, no real reason. A section of a province or a country cannot break away just because it is dissatisfied. The only reason for a change would be that the province is too big and unwieldy to be handled as a unit, and that it would be easier to manage if divided. No other reason is worthy of consideration. The purely selfish reason of benefiting one city or district by making the change, is not to be considered for a moment and would not be considered by the Dominion or provincial authorities, much less by the British Parliament before whom it would have to go.

No Change Without Consent.

Changes of the kind proposed cannot be made without consent of all the province. It would be unreasonable to propose that a province could be divided up at any time on the whim of a certain section. Government could not go on under those conditions. There never has yet been a division of a province already formed, although additions to Manitoba and Ontario have been made and new provinces have been formed from former territories.

It would be very nice to have a new province with Prince Rupert as capital, but if this point of view was presented to Prince George and it was shown to that city that this city was strongly opposed to the completion of the P. G. E., there would be a different tale to tell when that city was heard from.

We shall get some cheap advertising from the movement to secede but that is all. There is little possibility of a change ever being made, although it might be desirable to have the province divided as suggested. It must be remembered that the addition of the Yukon to the province would make it larger than it was before lopping off the strip along the south border, as proposed by way of the 52nd parallel.



PANTAGES MADE BID FOR FIGHT

Offered Tex Rickard \$850,000 Privilege Staging Battle at Tia Juana

LOS ANGELES, April 1.—Alexander Pantages, the theatrical magnate, has offered Tex Rickard \$850,000 for the privilege of holding the Dempsey-Carpentier heavyweight championship battle at Tia Juana, Mexico, near the United States border. Rickard, replying, states that the site for the fight has already been selected, but in the meantime, is being kept secret. It is expected that Rickard will announce the particulars on April 9.

SPORT

The Great War Veterans' band is going to be a decided acquisition to the city generally and from the progress already made it looks like Prince Rupert might really have a band of her own in the near future, something which has been needed for a long time. For celebration days and big sport events there is nothing that can take the place of a band in working up enthusiasm. The Callies believe this as they use their own pipes when they are going into soccer battle. We may expect to see the Great War Veterans' make their appearance at the Acropolis Grounds this season with their football squad to the tunes of the brass band and if they are to be playing with the Callies there will be plenty of music, with the pipe band spelling off while the other are getting breath.

Who is going to buy the indoor baseball bat? That seems to be the only obstacle now in the way of a match between the Sons of Canada and the Elks. At least that is the only apparent reason for the delay. The Elks say they are ready and so do the Sons, but there is no bat, some of the boys having broken it while practising last Sunday. But that is only a repetition of an old story. As long as someone is willing to pay good money to buy supplies all is serene, but when there is no one in sight willing to do so then they all look at each other and wonder what's the matter. An indoor baseball bat costs only a few dollars, but there is no official order to buy it.

FAVORS FORMATION OF A NEW PROVINCE IN NORTHERN B.C.

(Continued from Page One.)

hear expressions of opinion rather than to give them.

Mr. Orne then moved his resolution which was seconded by C. O. Rowe.

Fred Stork said he came as a listener. The movement he thought originated from a sentiment rather than a business point of view. The desire for a change had been brought about by dissatisfaction at the way in which we had been treated. Dissatisfaction, he reminded them, was not a new idea. He had lived in the Kootenay and there people felt they were not properly treated and wanted a new province formed. If this had been allowed at that time, it would have been proved premature for today many of the cities in that part of this country were deserted. Had there been a separate province they would have been in bad shape.

Mr. Stork then referred to the dissatisfaction of the municipalities which went to the Government and said they wanted money. South Vancouver was in the hands of the sheriff. There were abnormal conditions all through the country. From the information at hand he did not feel he could vote on this question intelligently. The present debt of \$53,000,000 would have to be partly allotted to the new province and the present costly provincial services would have to be duplicated.

Alderman Dybhavn. said the province was an empire in itself and if the Yukon was added it would be still larger. They had always complained of not getting just treatment. The country here was revenue producing and it was only by looking after our own needs that we could get just treatment.

Thomas McClymont. Thomas McClymont did not like to form a snap judgment on a matter of this kind. On the face of it, it would seem as if Prince Rupert would benefit, but it had not proved very beneficial to Victoria to be capital of the province. There had been talk of the wealth and resources of the north, but these were useless without population. In the early days, improvements had all been made in the south because the people were there. Now it would be the turn of the north. The population of British Columbia altogether was not much greater than that of the city of Seattle.

An Amendment. Mr. McClymont then moved an amendment that this matter be deferred for three months and that a committee be appointed to gather data in regard to the money collected and expended in the north. He drew attention to the fact that last year the estimates passed for Omnivox constituency were larger than for any other constituency in British Columbia. He objected to the duplication of government officials with another set of political grafters and parasites.

Mr. McGorkindale explained that he had been trying to get statistics but had found it difficult. He thought there was a population of 50,000 north of the 52nd parallel more than there were in B. C. when the province was formed.

North Outstrip South. M. M. Stephens said he came to learn. He thought the province was large enough and rich enough to support itself. The north was now far outstripping the south. The trend of capital was toward this part of the country. He would be sorry to see the resolution given to the three months' hoist.

N. McKay gave a resume of some of the historical facts in connection with the formation of the province and expressed the

opinion that when the turn of northern B. C. came to get improvements, the money would be all gone. The P. G. E. had been built for the purpose of diverting trade from Prince Rupert.

C. O. Rowe said if a new province was formed we should probably get a square deal among ourselves. He spoke of the auto tax we paid, yet we had no provincial road on which to drive. He did not think this part of the province got a square deal.

Seconded Amendment. Geo. Hill seconded the amendment of Mr. McClymont. He thought more facts and figures should be obtained.

Alderman Kelly urged that we should be unanimous in regard to this matter. All they were asking was that a plebiscite be taken.

F. S. Wright submitted a number of figures in regard to the amounts raised in the north from mines and timber and fish and expressed the opinion that the north had not received fair treatment.

H. F. Pullen said he would support the resolution although he did not think there would be any results. He said he did not think the big north had any right to trim off a slice of the south without consulting with the part to be sliced off. There would have to be a change in the British North America Act in order to get the change completed. Government could not go on if any dissatisfied section could secede.

The amendment was then put and defeated and the motion carried by a large majority.

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AVIATORS ARE NOT AFRAID

No Objection to War Vessels Firing at them They Say.

RELATIVE VALUE OF PLANES AND SHIPS

WASHINGTON, April 1.—The United States army aviators have become so enthusiastic over the proposed experiment of bombing naval vessels under approximate wartime conditions that scores of them have suggested that the fleet be allowed to fire back at the planes with anti-aircraft guns.

While admirals and generals have been advancing and disputing claims that the airplane is far superior to the battleship as a war weapon, army pilots have flooded the office of the air service director with pleas that the matter be settled under honest-to-goodness war conditions.

They have been all wrought up over the subject since that not distant day when Josephus Daniels, then Secretary of the U.S. Navy, ordered to stand bareheaded on the deck of a battleship and let Brigadier-General Mitchell, head of the U.S. Air Service in the war, take a crack at him with a bombing airplane.

Practice on Ships
Meanwhile in several of the air service flying fields bombing practice against silhouette warships placed upon the ground is being carried on. Official tests with a view to determining the relative value of aircraft in warfare are being conducted at the Aberdeen Proving Ground in Maryland.

Army fliers claim that they could sink the biggest battleship with one direct hit with a 1,100 pound bomb dropped from an altitude of 9,000 feet. They contend that the explosive would have such force that it would buckle in the plates of the war-
