LIQUOR MONOPOLY BEING ASKED BY PROVINCE FISH CAR SITUATION REVIEWED BY THE EDITOR OF FISH TRADE JOURNAL

EDITORIAL

WATERFRONT.

Plans are being made in the city that the Provincial Government has refused to give the city any waterfront. Statements are not correct. A letter was read from Mr. D. Pallullo, member for Prince Rupert, at the recent meeting of the City Council in which he stated to be a party to a deal for waterfront property for which rights which he did not have. It seemed to me that the pressure was being put on the city when the minister was ready to consider anything without any such pressure. It is to be for the benefit of the city.

On several occasions, Mr. Pallullo told the city that if they could show that they need a waterfront for a specific purpose, if the property is available, the city will get it. If it is to be handed over to the city, it is to be held until it happens to need it. Mr. Pallullo considers the Provincial Government just as good as the people's property. That is the way he took a year or two ago. There is nothing to indicate that he has changed his mind.

Fishermen's Float.
A few years ago or thereabouts, Mr. Pallullo secured for the use of fishermen and other boatmen a fine little float at Cow Bay. This was as large a float as was ever able to build on the waterfront. The fishermen pay nothing for the use of the floats and they are kept up at the expense of the Provincial Government, whereas if they were kept up by the city, they would be kept up by the city. It would be a matter of handing over the care of the waterfront from the larger property to the smaller.

In Public Interest?
I believe that if there is a waterfront needed in the neighborhood of Cow Bay, the Provincial Government, if available, they will be willing to hand it over to the city, if the city shows that it is to be used in the public interest. They have not refused to give it, but they have more than once to hand it to the city to be held by and not used, just as many applications have been refused.

WAR CABINET IS BUSY ON ESTIMATES
Downwards is Expected when Submitted to Parliament.

VICTORIA, March 5.—The cabinet devoted its week-end to revision of the estimates, probably will be submitted to the House of Commons next. They are expected to show a considerable reduction of expenditure compared with last year's estimates.

Canadian Fisherman Editor Reviews the Fish Car Grievance

Complete Review of Situation with very Caustic Comment by Wallace, Secretary of the Canadian Fisheries Association

For the establishment of a distinct and enlarged Fisheries Administration at Ottawa, no better argument can be advanced than to give herewith some idea of how the fishing industry of Prince Rupert, B. C., has been stifled and held back from its legitimate development by the Canadian National Railways, says F. S. Wallace in the Canadian Fisherman under the caption of "Strangling an Industry."

In all our experience of the many drawbacks which militate against the proper development of our Canadian fisheries, we have never seen anything to equal the nonchalant manner in which the officials of the Canadian Government Railway Systems have treated the urgent needs of a great industry, and the whole story is one of "passing the buck," unfulfilled promises, humbug and absolute indifference.

For some years now, Prince Rupert has suffered from a shortage of refrigerator cars for transporting the immense quantities of fresh and frozen halibut and other fish which are landed, or which could be landed, at that port by Canadian and American fishing vessels exploiting the fishing banks west and north of Prince Rupert.

The shortage of express refrigerator cars has long been a serious matter with the fish

WOULD KEEP COW BAY OPEN

Resolution Offered by C. O. Rowe at Board of Trade Meeting Last Night Passed to Committee.

A resolution submitted to the Board of Trade by C. O. Rowe last night with regard to the dredging of Cow Bay was referred to the committee appointed to deal with the matter with the name of Mr. Rowe added thereto. The resolution follows:

"Whereas, the land surrounding and the bed of Cow Bay belongs to the Canadian National Railway's under agreement with the provincial government dated March 16, 1918.

"And whereas, the provincial government has refused to grant the city of Prince Rupert waterfrontage for civic use.

"And whereas, the only access to the sea from the city of Prince Rupert, which can be freely used, is Cow Bay where the city possesses certain riparian rights.

"And whereas, much development work is contemplated by the city which will necessitate the large quantities of materials.

"And whereas, the complete or even partial development of this harbor would be of great advantage to the city and fishing and other trades.

"And whereas, the cost of excavation would not be excessive and the material excavated could be used for the building of the necessary wharves and piers.

"Be it resolved that the Dominion Government of Canada give the matter of carrying out the following improvements to the inner harbor at Cow Bay in the harbor of Prince Rupert its earnest consideration and support, to wit: The dredging of the inner harbor to a sufficient depth of water at all stages of the tides for safe entrance and anchorage, and the provision of wharves and landing stages and other facilities necessary to the speedy handling of business between boats and shore."

Discussion.

Mr. Rowe in speaking to the resolution said Cow Bay was a very valuable place for the unloading of freight. It could be enlarged and would be of great value to fishermen.

Capt. Freeman, who seconded the resolution, said the cost of the work, he estimated, would be about \$200,000 and this would add 800 feet of waterfrontage. It would be a great asset to the city.

J. F. Maguire said that a wrong step now might do irreparable harm in the future. They should do nothing to jeopardize the fishing industry. The bay should be retained as a valuable asset. He thought they would find ample room for warehouses without filling in the bay. It is now and might be in the future a great asset and could be made a protected harbor at a small cost. The fishermen at this place had never got a fair show and this convenience should be kept for them.

Provincial Government Will Ask Dominion Co-operation

Application Will Be Made to Have New Dominion Law Prohibiting Importation of Liquor into B.C. Except by Government

VICTORIA, March 5.—Application to the Dominion Government to enact legislation during the present session prohibiting importation of intoxicating liquor into British Columbia except through the provincial government is to be made, according to a motion introduced into the Legislature by Premier Oliver yesterday.

This step is being taken in view of the belief that the province has not the power to prevent importation of liquor or to impose a special tax of \$2.50 a bottle on all such importations as proposed in the original draft of the Moderation Bill.

The sudden terminating of the debate on the motion for the second reading of the liquor bill after four short speeches by Burde of Alberni, Henniger of Grand Forks, Uphill of Fernie and Kerzin of Atlin. As no other members were desirous of speaking the motion for the second reading unanimously passed.

The bill will now go into its committee stage.

The Debate.

In the debate yesterday Major Burde strongly advocated a beer clause for sale in clubs, especially soldier clubs.

Henniger announced himself as a sort of prohibitionist and held that the great majority of voters did not want beer in the clubs.

A strong appeal for a beer clause that would not restrict beer to soldier clubs only was made by Uphill.

Kerzin said he stood by his previous pronouncement that the people of Atlin wanted liquor as free as water, of good quality and reasonable in price.

WARREN NOW BUSY AFTER FISH CARS

A. L. Hager of Vancouver Interviews General Manager of Canadian National.

A telegram was received this morning by Jas. L. Lee, secretary of the local branch of the Canadian Fisheries Association, from A. L. Hager, president of the association at Vancouver, in regard to the fish car situation as follows:

"Had satisfactory interview today with Warren. He has wired instructions to his Winnipeg office to lease all passenger equipped refrigerators possible, irrespective of cost.

"Warren says he will exhaust the resources of all the American railroads in an endeavor to satisfy shippers' requirements pending completion of the new refrigerators.

"Endeavored to impress Warren with the necessity of looking after Prince Rupert's fishing industry."

HOTLY CONTESTED HOCKEY GAME WAS PLAYED LAST NIGHT

Neither Victoria nor Seattle were Able to Break Overtime Tie and Game Called

VICTORIA, Mar. 5.—After playing three overtime periods Seattle and Victoria called off last night's hockey game, neither team being able to break a four to four tie. The game was one of the most hotly contested played this season and enthusiasm was worked up to a high pitch towards the last, as either team came close to netting the tally that would have won the contest. The match may be replayed.

CREDITORS HOLD BACK EQUIPMENT

At Meeting This Afternoon Revoke Former Decision.

(Special 2:45 p. m.)
VANCOUVER, March 5.—After a meeting of the creditors this morning, W. E. Hodges announces that the creditors have decided to withhold the dry dock equipment after being advised that R. L. Reid, K. C., gave notice yesterday of the government's reserving the right to appeal from the recent finding turning the equipment over to the creditors. The completion of the ships is thus still held up.

SHIPYARD IS STILL WORKING

Telegram From Vancouver Leaves Everything Uncertain But Men Still Employed.

The shipbuilding situation remains rather uncertain, but in the meantime the Wallace company has 75 men employed and no orders have yet been received to stop working on construction.

Word was received here last night through the Canadian Press Ltd. confirming the special despatch published in the Daily News yesterday and adding "Hodges says further delay must arise in the completion of the two government ships."

D. G. Stewart, one of the inspectors representing local creditors, said this morning he had received no word from Vancouver but he personally was in favor of trying to settle with the government as soon as possible and not interfering with the progress of work on the ships. He intimated that there was nothing to be gained from fighting the government. He thought terms could be arranged.

Mr. Clark, representing the liquidator, had, up to the time of going to press, received no word countermanning the order to hand over everything to the government.

BARTER SALMON FOR WET GOODS

Government Vendor Goes to Old Country to Arrange Purchases.

VICTORIA, March 5.—The attorney-general announces that H. A. Urquhart, government liquor vendor at Vancouver, has been despatched to the Old Country in connection with purchases to be made by British Columbia when liquor control becomes effective. He will secure information in regard to securing a supply direct from the distilleries and will go into the question of bartering British Columbia salmon for liquor.

An explanation was received by the Board of Trade at the meeting last night as to why the Chekawa was sent south for repairs. It was explained by the department that it was simply for the purpose of changing her engine.

ANOTHER ROAD
TO WATERFRONT

If City Connects Up Near Seal Cove Likely Government Will Make Road.

A. L. Carruthers, provincial government engineer, and some of his staff yesterday made a trip over the streets of Section 8 leading towards the government reserve, on which the Seal Cove Marine Ways is now located, with a view to ascertaining where a street leading from the city to this reserve would come out. When such a street is built it would be likely that the government would make a connecting road on its own property to connect up any industrial plants that might establish there and it is likely that the proposed road from Prince Rupert to Port Edward would lead out that way.

The local provincial engineer intends to make a trip over the proposed route of the Port Edward route in the course of a few days.

The public works department seems to favor a route to this property by way of Eleventh Ave., Justin or Immanuel streets and Canada Avenue, while Mayor Rochester is in favor of the Eighth Avenue route. The crossing of the railway right-of-way is the main hindrance to the latter route which has a much more convenient grade. There are several rugged cliffs and bluffs that would restrict the Eleventh Ave. route.

The government reserve surrounds a fine natural bay which it is felt would make a better anchorage for fish boats than Cow Bay and fish boat repair work and winter laying up might be centralized there. The main drawback to the using of the bay now is the lack of a road connecting it with the city.

GORD STANDARD
ESTABLISHED

That is Aim of Meeting Held in London Recently

LONDON, Mar. 5.—Need or restoration of gold standard in Great Britain was emphasized at a meeting of the Sound Currency Association recently held here. Sir George Paish, financial expert who visited the United States about a year ago, said the financial position of this country would not be sound until the gold standard was restored. "We could then be able to pay for things we require from other countries in goods and services without needing credit operations and without fearing the gold drain from this country," he said. "The gold standard of Europe must also be reestablished. We will not be able to resume the gold standard here until we are able to put out new capital abroad to the extent of £300,000,000."

D. M. Mason, who presided, said the Chancellor of the Exchequer had estimated that he would have at the end of the fiscal year, a surplus of £234,000,000 which he proposed to use for the reduction of the public debt. Mr. Mason suggested that if £50,000,000 or £100,000,000 were set aside for the purpose of gradually redeeming the redundant currency, in a comparatively short time there would be parity of exchange between Great Britain and the United States and other gold standard countries.

LORD BEAVERBROOK
DISCUSSES SUCCESS

Judgment, Industry and Health Are Three Necessaries No Bar to Advancement.

LONDON, March 5.—Lord Beaverbrook, writing in the "Sunday Express," discussed the qualities which make for success.

"For my own part," he stated, "I speak of the only field of success I know—the world of ordinary affairs. Success is partly a matter of predestination and partly of free will. You cannot make a genius, but you can either improve or destroy it, and most men and women possess the assets which can be turned into success."

"The qualities which make for success are three: Judgment, Industry and Health, and perhaps the greatest of these is Judgment. Genius goes to the heart of a matter like an arrow from a bow, but judgment is the quality which learns from the world what the world has to teach and then goes one better."

"But judgment may prove a sterile capacity if it is not accompanied by industry."

"The dominions of the British Empire abolished long ago the privileges which birth confers. No bar has been set there to prevent poverty rising to the heights of wealth and power, if the man were found equal to the task."

"The same development has taken place in Great Britain today. Men are no longer born into Cabinets; the ladder of education is rapidly reaching a perfection which enables a man born in a cottage or a slum to attain the zenith of success and power."

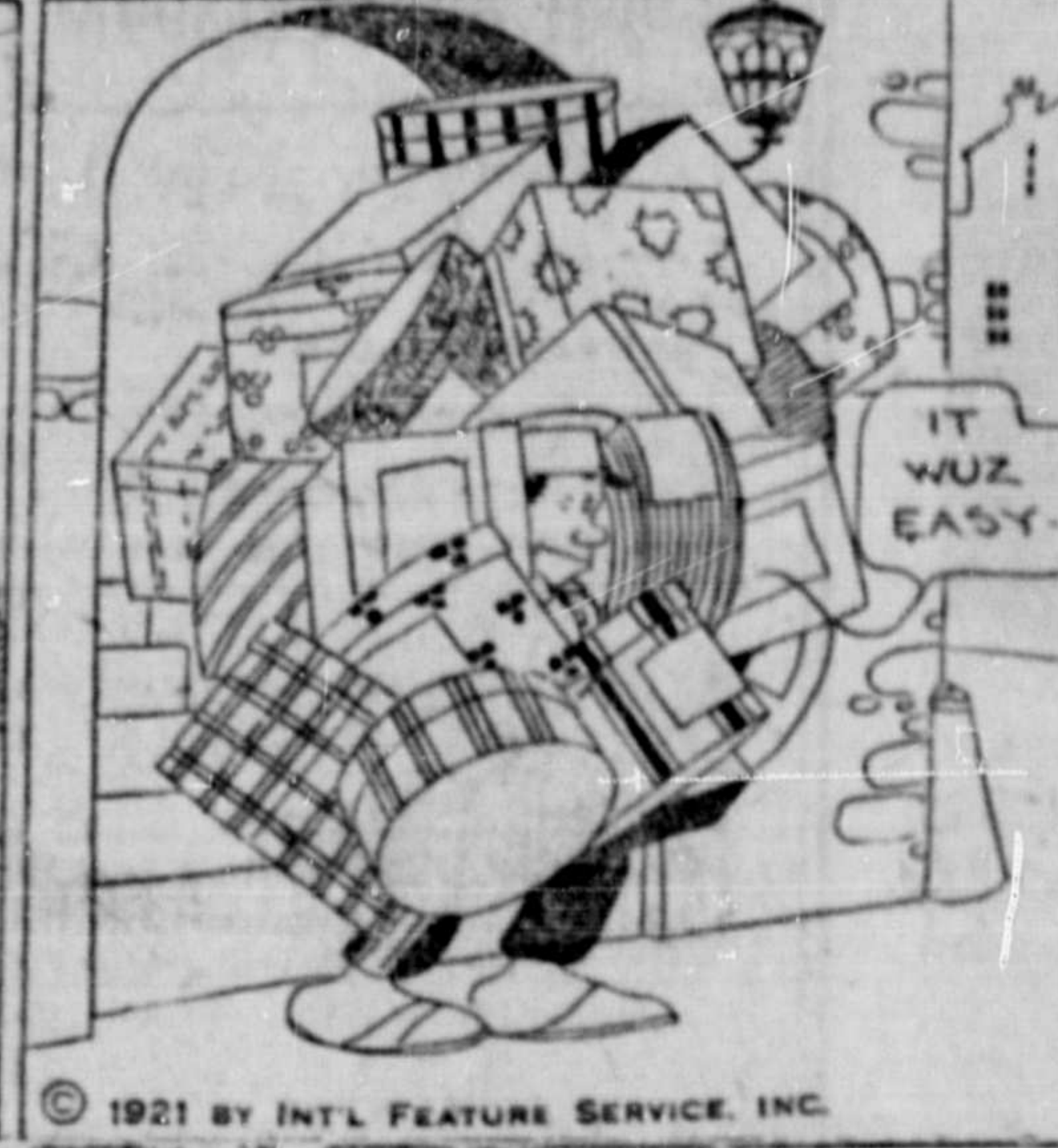

CANADIAN FISHERMAN EDITOR REVIEWS THE FISH CAR GRIEVANCE

(Continued from Page One.)

Prince Rupert's greatest assets. Every citizen of the place derives some benefit, directly or indirectly, from the fisheries. Were it not for fish, the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway would have but little excuse for making Prince Rupert a terminal. It is one of the biggest eastward hauls the railroad has. Take away the fish and there is little else.

Not Care Two Pins
One would imagine that the officials in charge of the Grand Trunk Pacific and Canadian Government Railways, and the Canadian Express Company which is allied with it, would do everything in their power to foster the fishing industry at their terminal port; that the Minister in charge of the Government railway system would be only too glad to develop a remunerative business in an effort to show a profit rather than the depressing annual deficit which is a feature of the system. But such is, evidently not the case. It would appear that neither Minister or the officials under him care two pins whether the railway prospers or not. Here's the story. You can judge for yourself.

When hostilities ceased the fish trade of Prince Rupert and the Board of Trade made representations to the Minister of Railways and Express Company officials asking that additional express refrigerator cars be built and placed in commission as soon as possible to take care of the increasing fish shipments of the port. One hundred cars were suggested as being necessary to take care of the business offering and same was confirmed by an affidavit from the General Manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway.

Early in 1920, a considerable time after the initial request was made, the railway announced that thirty express refrigerator cars would be built and placed in commission as soon as possible.

Resolutions
At the Convention of the Canadian Fisheries Association held in Vancouver in June 1920, Prince Rupert delegates brought the matter of their car requirements before the convention and a resolution was passed drawing attention to the need.

On July 8th, 1920, the Prince

Rupert branch of the Canadian Fisheries Association followed this up by asking the executive to press for cars.

Both these resolutions were placed before the Hon. J. D. Reid, Minister of Railways, and the National Secretary of the Canadian Fisheries Association in a long communication to the Minister dated July 28, 1920, elaborated upon the handicap the Prince Rupert fish trade was laboring under through lack of proper transportation equipment, and he furnished statistics showing the amount of tonnage which was diverted from the port of Prince Rupert through lack of cars.

The Minister was travelling through the West when the letter was sent, but the Asst. Deputy Minister acknowledged same and stated that he was forwarding the communication to the President of the Canadian National Railways system for his information.

The Prince Rupert branch of the Canadian Fisheries Association, through their secretary, J. L. Lee, kept the matter prominently before President D. B. Hanna of the Railway System and also enlisted the aid of the Transportation Division of the Department of Marine and Fisheries. This latter department through J. H. Conlon, made representations to relieve the car shortage as soon as possible, but this matter is one that calls for the personal attention of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries himself and not that of an official who is saddled with too many varied tasks and whose standing is not likely to impress the Railway Moguls. However, Mr. Conlon did what he could from the departmental side.

Millions Lost

Secretary Lee of the Prince Rupert C. F. A. kept a record of the car shortages at Prince Rupert and same were mailed monthly to Chairman Garvell of the Board of Railway Commissioners, President D. B. Hanna of the National Railways, Department of Marine and Fisheries, and the National Secretary of the C. F. A. These records told of a serious state of affairs—serious to have commanded the earnest consideration of any business man but evidently not serious enough for a government official. Men who can sleep easy administering an organization with a deficit of many millions do not lose any slumber over the demands of a bunch of fish men for more cars, or chances for securing big business.

Owing to the uncertainty of the supply of cars fishing vessels are avoiding the port of Prince Rupert and are carrying their catches to Alaskan ports and to Vancouver and Seattle. Vessels are daily coming in to Prince Rupert with large trips of fish and finding no cars available, they clear again for another port. One small vessel with a catch of 80,000 lbs. of halibut means \$2,400 in tolls (Continued on Page Six.)

SUPPORT OF ALEX. MANSON

Speaker of Legislature Backs Up Prince Rupert in Request For Road.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade last night a copy of a letter sent by Alex. M. Manson, member for Omineca, to the minister of public works regarding a road out of Prince Rupert was read as follows:

"Permit me to place myself on record as approving of the expenditure of public money in building a road from the city of Prince Rupert east to the canneries on the Skeena River, and for the following reasons:

"First—There are a very large number of motors in Prince Rupert at present and we collect therefrom a very substantial amount of license fees for which no direct return is given by the Government.

"Second—The city of Prince Rupert, from a commercial standpoint needs a highway to the canneries where a very considerable amount of business is done during six or seven months of the year.

"Third—Such a highway would be a link in the ultimate highway to the interior.

"Fourth—The city of Prince Rupert is on an island and is completely cut off at the present time from a recreation standpoint and an outlet is necessary to provide a much-needed method of recreation."

NO WET GOODS FOR THE YUKON

Cannot Be Carried in Bond Through United States Territory.

VANCOUVER, March 5.—The entire Yukon territory and some of the points in northern British Columbia will be done dry, temporarily at least, as the result of a ruling of the United States authorities under the Volstead law. It will be no longer permissible to carry liquor in bond through Alaskan territory and that will shut off the Yukon, the Stikine and other points in Canada that are supplied only through American territory.

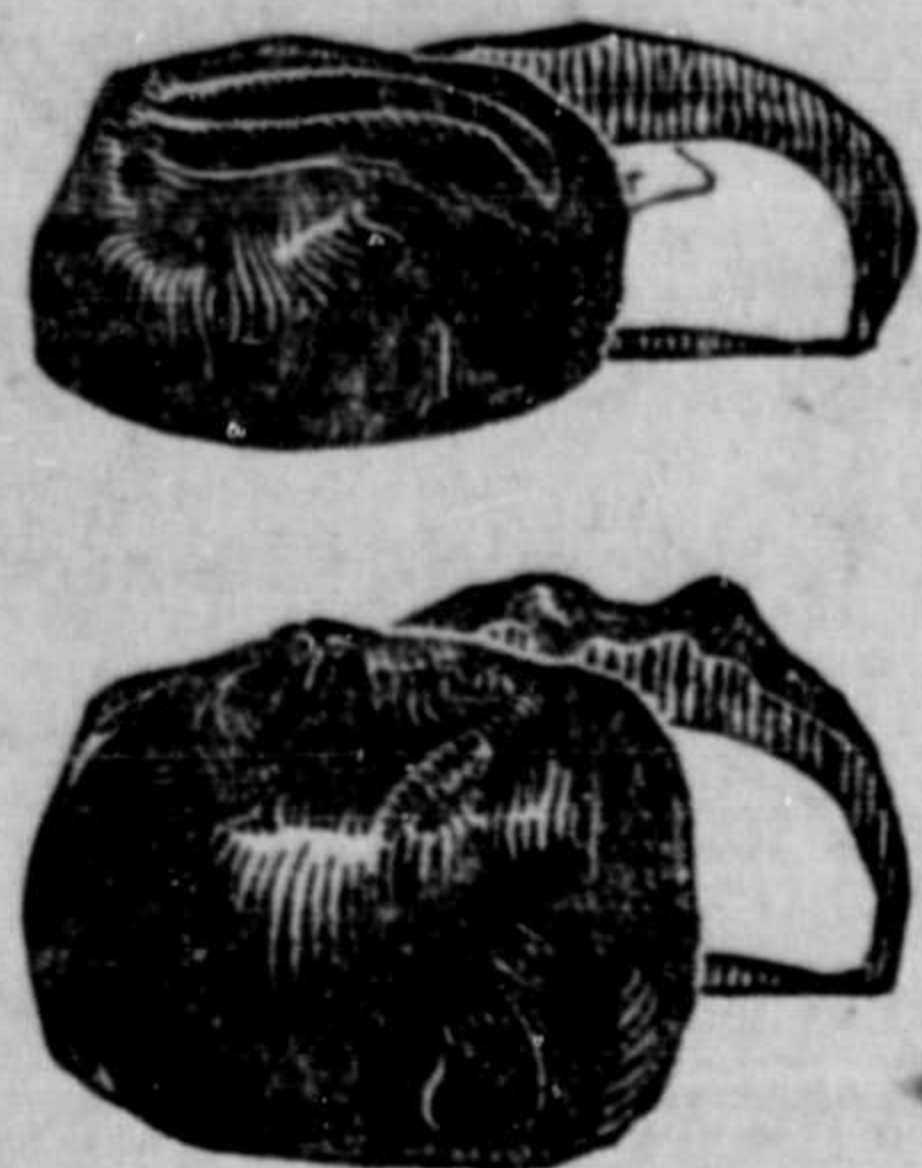

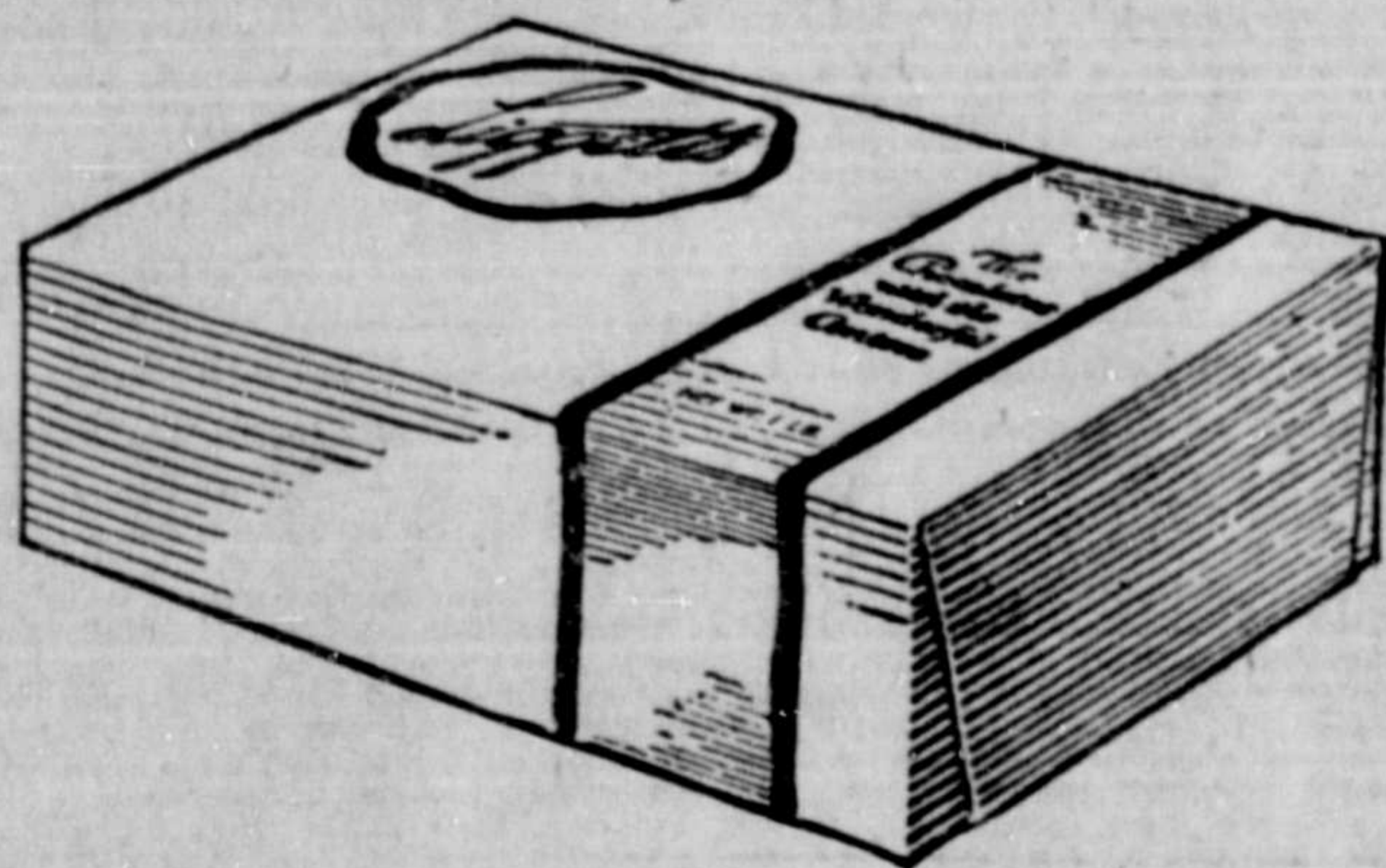

to the Express Company. Such business is being turned away from Prince Rupert daily and millions of dollars in revenue is thereby lost to the Government Railways.

Being Humbled

Let us see now what has been done about the extra refrigerator cars promised so long ago. The thirty new cars were promised for delivery in August, 1920. August came and no cars. The delivery would be made sure in November, 1920. November came around and no cars in sight. December came and the year closed with nothing doing. The Rupertians were beginning to feel that they were being humbugged. Fishing boats were coming in, and finding no cars available they went off to other ports with their skippers and crews indignant at the waste of time and money incurred by calling in at Prince Rupert.

The whole city of Prince Rupert took an interest in the matter in January, 1921, and mass meetings of the citizens were held and the wires kept hot demanding to know from the railroad officials when the cars were really forthcoming. A letter received from President D. B. Hanna of the Government Railways, and dated December 27, 1920, stated that the delays was unavoidable, but the thirty cars would be delivered by the end of March. This date is too late for the early spring traffic in fish, which is very heavy, and further enquiries were made of the railway officials to find out if some of the cars could not be delivered earlier.

President Pullen of the Canadian Express Company all read the same old chant—"Understand first car will be delivered March 15 and balance by March 31." All of which, after the unredempted promises of the past, were most unsatisfactory.

President A. L. Hager of the Canadian Fisheries Association was then appealed to and asked to secure definite information. He wired to Secretary Wallace at Gardenville, Que., to interview President Pullen of the Express Company in Montreal and get a definite answer as to car deliveries. The Secretary received only the usual reply, viz.: "That latest advice from manufacturers is that delivery may be expected in March." One item of information was added when the name of the manufacturers was secured, namely, the National Car Company at Hamilton, Ont.

Factory Closed

A representative of the Canadian Fisherman was then sent to interview the National Car Company at Hamilton to find out what progress had been made with the construction of the long promised cars. He went there on February 9, and interviewed one of the highest officials of the car company and his report is that—

"The car company has been, and is at present, closed down. It is expected to resume operations in a week or so. No start has been made on the construction of the promised cars, and the only information adduced is that the Car Company expect to start work on an order of 1,000 freight cars for the Government and that it was hoped that the thirty refrigerator cars would be put through at the same time."

To sum it all up; There is certainly no change of these thirty express refrigerator cars being delivered in March and the promises of the railway officials amount to nothing but bluff and humbug.

Spineless Administration

The whole matter reflects the spinelessness of the present Governmental administration. There seems to be no backbone to it and no definite policy appears to have been worked out to pull the country up from the mire it has sunk in through the ravages of war. A huge debt hangs overhead, but no effort is made to nullify and instead of confining expenditure to the development of remunerative natural resources, the Government in power has incurred still greater obligations by the purchase of duplicating railroad systems and the building of steamships which could have been constructed elsewhere at lower

But that common axiom of plain business has been ignored by the present Government who are really to blame for the state of affairs existing in their own railroad system.

High Officials

It is no use blaming the minor officials for negligence in the Prince Rupert affair. The blame lies on the men higher up and we do not hesitate to name the Minister of Railways, Hon. Dr. Reid, for his indifference to the request for more equipment, and the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, for his lack of interest in the development of a great fishing port. If the latter had given more time and thought to fishery matters, his influence in the Cabinet could easily have secured action in the matter of supplying Prince Rupert with more refrigerator cars.

The whole fishing industry of Canada will suffer from this species of humbug until we get a Department of Fisheries with a responsible official at the head of it and a Minister who will give ear and action to the plain suggestions of the industry along the lines of sane development.
