Miners and Owners Come to Terms

GREAT HEED IS PAID TO CANADIAN STATESMEN AT IMPERIAL CONFERENCE

British Coal Strike Is Over and One of Greatest Struggles between Labor and Capital Thus Brought To End

LONDON, June 28.—The coal strike is over. After a period of three months in which the greatest struggle between capital and labor of modern times has taken place a tentative agreement has been reached and the mines will reopen next week with the return of the men to work. The settlement between miners and owners is based on the government granting its subsidy of £10,000,000.

The greatest relief is manifest all over Great Britain with the announcement that was last night made to this effect. Rich and poor alike are joining in the joy of the occasion and London has put on an air of general thanksgiving that has hardly been seen since the declaration of peace in Europe in 1918. Such a sudden settlement had not been looked for and the enthusiasm is, therefore, much more intense than it would have been had a similar announcement been made a few days ago when a settlement seemed so close at hand.

LONDON, June 28.—It was officially announced today that the British coal strike had been settled. Premier David Lloyd George will ask parliament to authorize the granting of the £10,000,000 subsidy to the mining industry.

If the subsidy is granted, the men, who have been on strike since April 1, will return to work on Monday.

PARLIAMENT MEMBERS TO PAY IMPOT

Mr. Justice Audette Finds Provincial Ministers and Members Subject Income Tax.

OTTAWA, June 28.—The salaries and indemnities of the members of the provincial parliaments and the cabinet ministers are subject to income tax according to the ruling of Mr. Justice Audette, of the Exchequer Court, who sees no reason for discrimination in favor of the parliamentarians. This decision was a result of the test case launched by Hon. J. A. Garon, minister of agriculture in the Quebec provincial cabinet.

The judge has also found that the government is empowered under the British North America Act to impose direct taxation within the provinces to arise revenue for provincial purposes. Such taxation, he holds, does not conflict with federal taxation.

BIGGEST CATCH OF SABLE FISH

The Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company's trawler James Carruthers arrived in port yesterday afternoon from a fourteen days' trip with 200,000 pounds of black cod, the largest catch of this fish ever before made at one time in northern waters.

WILL DRILL FOR OIL IN KITSUMGALLUM VALLEY

Northern Men Preparing to Start Operations the First of August.

The Kitsumgallum Basin Petroleum Co., Ltd., with head office at Terrace, was recently gazetted. The company has holdings near Bosswood, Kitsumgallum Valley, about thirty miles from Terrace, consisting of eight sections. G. F. Schaub promoted the company and he has associated with him a wholly local directorate as follows: George Little, of Terrace; W. H. Tobey, Prince Rupert; J. P. Kirkpatrick, Smithers; J. H. Bearcey, Cenavale, and S. T. Finnegan of Terrace.

Oil seepages were found on the property some years ago but no attempt was made to prospect it or to promote a company. Geologists years ago reported it a good country to prospect in for oil. The company recently organized hope to meet with success and thus develop a new source of wealth in the district.

The prospectus issued states that the company will secure the services of an experienced and reliable driller with a modern outfit. It is expected the drilling will be started in August and it is estimated the oil will be reached at a depth of between 1,500 and 2,000 feet.—Omineca Herald.

PEOPLE WERE TOO HEAVY FOR PLANE

London to Paris "Air Express" Stops to Unload Some.

LONDON, June 27.—Owing to the excessive weight of three fat persons among the passengers an "air express" setting out recently from the London air station to travel to Paris ascended so slowly that after it had risen about 100-feet, the pilot decided that his load was too heavy for the 230-miles journey, and returned to the aerodrome. A second airplane was then run out from the sheds, and some of the passengers from the first were transferred to it; whereupon both machines flew off in company to Paris.

ULSTER FAVERS THE CONFERENCE

Premier Craig, on Behalf of His Parliament, Has Accepted Invitation.

BELFAST, June 28.—Premier Craig has accepted the invitation of Lloyd George to the proposed conference of representatives of northern and southern Ireland and the British Executive with a view to restoring order in Ireland. The acceptance has been made on behalf of the Ulster government.

BABINGTON HAS CONTRACT

Awarded Job of Delivering Rock From Smith Island to City.

Captain H. B. Babington was awarded the contract for the crushing, hauling and delivering of rock for surfacing the city streets at last night's meeting of the city council. There were a number of tenders from local contractors. The specifications called for four separate quotations: Crushing and mixing at the quarry at Smith Island; towing to Cow Bay; placing in bins at Cow Bay, and delivering on the streets of the city.

Sgt. Captain Babington's quotations were respectively: \$2.25 per cubic yard, 75 cents, 68 cents and \$1.00, amounting to a total of \$9.68 per cubic yard which was 6 cents below the next lowest tender. There is 12,640 cubic yards estimated in the contract.

WAR VETERANS STOP THE SALE OF BEER

The local Great War Veterans Association today ceased selling beer in the canteen on Third Ave. pending further developments. The provincial association is taking up the whole question with the provincial government.

Terrace Sawmill Completely Razed by Fire Breaking Out at 3.30 Yesterday Afternoon

TERRACE, B. C., June 28.—Yesterday afternoon about 3:30 o'clock, fire broke out in George Little's sawmill and totally destroyed what has been a familiar landmark for many years to passengers on passing trains.

Most of the lumber and logs stored in the yard were saved by the strenuous efforts of the mill crew assisted by the citizens generally. Hoses were put into use and were supplemented by a line of buckets.

There is no insurance on the mill. It is the only sawmill in the north that has been running continuously for the past nine years. Although at times the operation of the plant was not altogether profitable it was never closed down even when times were at their worst.

Mr. Little already plans on rebuilding on the site occupied by the destroyed mill.

The origin of the fire is unknown.

PRINCESS LOUISE NAME OF NEW VESSEL

Steamer for C.P.R. Coast Steamship Service Now Nearing Completion.

VICTORIA, June 28.—The new vessel for the Alaska service which is being built for the Canadian Pacific Railway Co. at the Wallace Shipyards, North Vancouver, will be named the Princess Louise. The vessel will be completed late this fall, it is understood.

LOCAL VENDORS ARE G'ZETTED VICTORIA

Official Announcement Appointment P. I. Palmer, Here, and G. Sutherland, Prince George.

VICTORIA, June 28.—P. I. Palmer, Prince Rupert, and G. Sutherland, Prince George, have been gazetted liquor vendors under the Moderation Act. The stores at both points have now been opened by these men.

LOCAL LIQUOR FIRM GETS EXPORT LICENCE

In return for payment of the sum of \$3,000, which is the annual fee, the Middle West Wine Co., Ltd., of Fraser Street has received their licence under the new Moderation Act, permitting them to do an export business.

The firms holding export licences under the old Prohibition Act are apparently very little affected by the change to the Moderation Act. While the above mentioned company like others cannot make deliveries from their local warehouses in the province to points in B. C., orders for their British Columbia customers will be filled from their warehouse in Calgary and sent by express direct to the consumer and in any quantity. The warehouses within the province of course are for the purpose of handling orders for goods going out of British Columbia.

FARMER WINS MEDICINE HAT

Unionist Candidate Defeated by a Majority of More Than 2,000.

MEDICINE HAT, June 28.—Robert Gardiner, the United Farmer candidate, was elected in the federal by-election here yesterday by a majority of more than 2,000 votes over Col. Nelson Spencer, the Unionist candidate. The contest was a very spirited one and a full vote was recorded. The Unionists, before the announcement of the result seemed to be very confident of winning the seat.

Sweeping Victory.

MEDICINE HAT, June 28.—The sub-United Farmers of Alberta secured a sweeping political victory in the federal by-election here yesterday when their candidate, Robert Gardiner, of Exeter, defeated Col. Nelson, the government candidate, by a huge majority which, it is expected, will reach the 8,000 mark by the time all the outlying polls have been heard from. Last night with 88 polls to be heard from the Gardiner majority was 5,000. All 488 polls are rural ones and they will still further swell the majority of the victorious farmer candidate.

The by-election was caused by the death of Hon. A. L. Sifton, former Unionist member in the House of Commons.

Talk of Election.

OTTAWA, June 28.—With the Medicine Hat by-election out of the way, political interest is now turning to other vacant seats. There are five of these and the results of the elections will, no doubt, have an effect on the government's decision as to whether or not it will carry on until after the next session.

It is not expected that election will be made before Premier Meighen returns from England where he is attending the Imperial Conference and the Conference of the Premiers of Overseas Dominions. There is talk of a redistribution of seats taking place in the fall in view of the warning of Premier Meighen to the close of the session to his followers that they should organize in preparation for an early election contest.

SICILIAN VOLCANO BREAKS OUT AGAIN

People Abandon Homes and Flee for Safety When Great Explosion is Heard.

ROME, June 28.—The Stromboli volcano off the northern coast of Sicily has again burst into activity. It began with a loud explosion which caused the people to abandon their homes and flee to safer locations in Sicily.

PASTOR MEMBER OF LEGISLATURE MOVES TO CITY OF VICTORIA

COURTENAY, June 28.—Rev. Thomas Menzies of Sandwick, member of the legislature for Comox, has resigned his pastorate at Sandwick after 24 years' service. On account of Mrs. Menzies' health it has been found necessary to leave the Comox valley. They will take up their new residence in Victoria.

Premier Meighen Sets Down Proposals for New Imperial Policy

LONDON, June 28.—Premier Arthur Meighen of Canada in addressing the Imperial Conference today laid down the principles on which he believes the future British Imperial policy should be based.

He suggested that the dominions be kept informed on matters affecting Palestine, Mesopotamia and similar countries and that they should be consulted directly on matters affecting the Empire as a whole.

Britain should enter into no treaties without the advice of the dominions and such treaties should be subject to their approval. In all questions where the United States is concerned he demanded that the advice of the Canadian Government should be accepted as final. Premier Meighen's speech has been considered so important that the consideration of the Anglo-Japanese matter has been postponed to permit discussion by the conference of the proposals he has advanced.

KID LEWIS BEAT JACK BLOOMFIELD IN TWENTY ROUNDS

LONDON, June 28.—Kid Lewis last night defeated Jack Bloomfield in points in a 20-round bout for the middleweight championship of England.

SAYS NEWSPAPERS ADVERTISE BEST

Toronto Man Address Retail Merchants' Association.

TORONTO, June 28.—Addressing the dry goods section of the Retail Merchants' Association at its convention here, T. M. Humble, a well known advertising writer of this city placed emphasis on the value to merchants of newspaper advertising.

"Every reader of newspapers is a possible customer," he said. "Newspaper advertising cost less per actual thousand of people reached than any other form of publicity, not counting the prestige of your name appearing in a reputable newspaper. There never was a time in merchandising when newspaper advertising was more necessary or potent in its power to get business. Newspapers are the safest, surest and cheapest means of reaching the greatest number of people."

PRINCETON MERCHANT SUFFERED PRIVATIONS

Fred Howse Returns Home After Being Lost in Hills.

PRINCETON, June 28.—After all hope of ever finding him alive had practically been abandoned, Fred Howse, son of A. E. Howse, the local merchant, turned up at his home here on Saturday, plainly showing marks of privation and suffering he had undergone while wandering in the woods without food.

Four days ago Mr. Howse's auto plunged over an embankment and crashed at the bottom, and he sustained a concussion that is believed to have resulted in a temporary aphasia, causing him to wander aimlessly into the hills. Search parties were organized and a country-wide search was instituted, but no trace could be found of the missing man and hope had been practically abandoned when he came to his home to the great relief of his wife and parents.

POLICE STRIKE IN QUEBEC CITY

Believed, However, That Backbone is Broken—Militia Ready.

QUEBEC, June 28.—With several leaders of the Union of Civic Firemen and Policemen under detention and a number of policemen ready to return to duty on the terms offered by city, it is believed that the backbone of the strike of firemen and policemen, which began on Saturday, has been broken. The 22nd Regiment is being held in readiness to check any disorders that might arise with the police off duty.

DOUKS PUT ON HALF RATIONS

Prisoners From Grand Forks Giving Considerable Trouble at Nelson Jail.

NELSON, June 28.—The eight dourhobors from Grand Forks who were imprisoned for refusing to give census figures and obstructing the duties of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police have refused to scrub out the jail cells and have been placed on half rations. One of the prisoners has been on hunger strike since Saturday.

De Valera and
Sir James Craig.

The bringing of Eamonn de Valera and Sir James Craig together in conference would undoubtedly be an important step towards the restoration of peace between the clashing forces of Ireland. In these two men are found the leaders of the two main opposing forces of the troubous Isle. Valera represents the section of Ireland which wants the country to be a republic independent of England; Craig, who is largely supported in Ulster, favors government of Ireland by an autonomous parliament similar to those which obtain in the dominions such as Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Newfoundland and South Africa. Under either form of government Ireland would have Home Rule. The difference is that under Valera's system Ireland would no longer be under the British flag, while under Craig's, the country though self-governing still would owe allegiance to the Motherland. To bring these two together in conference might be possible but to get them to agree on the future government of Ireland will be a far more difficult matter.

Settlement of Irish
Matters Very Difficult.

But it would not be impossible to bring Valera and Craig to an understanding as to the future for both are considered to be reasonable men. If an arrangement between the two was eventually agreed upon, it could not be expected that there would be an immediate transition from the present state of affairs in Ireland. Valera and Craig are leading groups of people who are most unruly and obstinate. The Irish have worked up their enmity to such a state that it is almost a habit with them and the jealousy and hatred could not be wiped out in a single day or week or year. The state of feeling between the two main contending forces in Ireland has been developing in bitterness for hundreds of years and it would probably take as many hundreds of years to bring harmony. It would not be exaggerating at all to state that peace and goodwill in Ireland will grow more slowly than it ever will between the Allies and the Central Powers. To settle the civil strife in Ireland would involve psychological difficulties which would far eclipse those between any of the hostile nations in Europe today.

A Plea for Use of
Canadian Production.

The report from Ottawa yesterday that imports had taken such a decided increase in the past year that exports had made an even more decided decrease is not one to be pleased with. A country whose imports exceed its exports is not in a healthy condition, either economically or financially. The report shows that Canada is not drifting in the right direction. The figures should teach the Canadian people one important lesson—that it is necessary to use more Canadian products. That is the only way in which each and every Canadian can help to make and keep his country prosperous. It should be remembered that the purchase and use of an imported article when a domestic one can be used instead is helping the other country at the expense of Canada. When one pays for an article of foreign manufacture he is sending the most of the money he pays for it out of the country. It is helping to raise the exchange rate against his own country and provide employment for foreigners outside. He is indirectly working a hardship on himself. The prosperity of a country reflects itself on the prosperity of the citizen of that country. The use of an imported article not only helps the foreign country but it hurts the home country and every person who belongs to it.

ON OWN EGGSCITY COUNCIL AND
ANGLO-JAP TREATY

Wants Dominion to Regulate the
Matter of Immigration for
Themselves.

Local Fisheries Office Institutes
New Departure in Propa-
gation of Fry.

The local Dominion Fisheries office has received instructions from the Department at Ottawa to prepare for the carrying of 400,000 pounds of salmon eggs from the canneries of the Skeena River to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage plant here. The spawn will be placed in cold storage and later, probably about February, will be taken to the Babine and Lake-Isle hatcheries and there used for feeding the small salmon in course of development.

The work is to be started in a few days by the patrol boat Nora. The eggs will be carried in fifty pound trays and, as a great quantity cannot be taken on a single trip, it is expected that the transportation of the spawn will take some weeks. Later the other patrol boats will assist in the work.

This order marks a new departure in the hatchery business of the North. It is expected that the use of the eggs, which are usually thrown away as refuse at the canneries, will effect quite a saving for the department in the elimination of buying other food for the small salmon. The experiment will be watched with interest by those interested in the propagation and growth of the fish in the hatcheries.

SALMON PACKING
WILL LIKELY BE
FINISHED EARLYINVITATION FIRE CHIEF
TO GO TO CONVENTION

The salmon packing season this year will likely end with the closing of the sockeye fishing on August 21. Then the most of the canneries will close after having operated a little less than two months.

The only circumstances by which the season would be extended after August 31 when usually the pack of hump, dog salmon and cohoes is carried on, would be a sudden movement of the large stocks of pinks that are on hand, and with which the market at the present time appears to be glutted.

Seattle Halibut
Buyer Says Fish
Are Getting Small

SEATTLE, June 28.—The way the halibut fishery is going is indicated by a statement of one of the Seattle fish buyers who says there was a time not so many years ago when a special effort had to be made to prevent the bringing in of too many "whales," or extra large halibut, from the banks off Vancouver Island, but for the past year or more he has not seen more than 40,000 pounds of "whales" in a fare, while many fares run half or more than half "chickens," and small ones at that.



BAD EFFECT OF COAL STRIKE

London Air Is Clear But Social Season is Dismal Failure.

LONDON, June 17.—All society is bemoaning the failure of the London season. The week preceding the Derby should have seen gaiety approaching its height; but the widespread effects of the coal crisis have put a damper on the round of pleasure scheduled for this time of the year, and old staggers find it hard to recall any similar period when so little private entertaining was done.

No society debutantes are coming to town. Shortage of money has caused many society folk to cancel all their London engagements and to spend the summer as cheaply as possible in the country. By the King's desire, courts have been postponed and hotels and theatres are reporting slumps.

Overseas Visitors.

There are a number of overseas visitors in London, but "not enough to go round," as one hotel manager put it, and were it not for the Americans who have come over for the polo games, those who have to live out of the profits made in the season would be in despair.

Dressmakers, tailors, and entertainment caterers are doing next to nothing, the reason being that the present period of industrial unrest makes it impossible to see month ahead.

Efforts were made to make the Henley Regatta a social success. Henley is always a gay dress pageant. According to the fashion papers, the modish colors are yellow and red, with flower and fruit designs and hats trimmed with wreaths of imitation vegetables.

Atmosphere Clear.

The only benefit the coal strike has conferred upon London is the absence of smoke and fog. The continued clearness of the atmosphere is surprising Londoners, who are discovering views of their city the existence of which they hardly suspected.

Public health has benefited very greatly, according to official health statistics. There has been an astonishing decrease in bronchial and pulmonary complaints. Pneumonia cases have gone down as much as 50 percent compared with March.

Dr. John S. Owens, chief of the advisory committee to the Meteorological Office on atmospheric pollution is the authority for saying that London's air has now reached a purity never before attained under modern conditions of life.

SOUTH AFRICAN BEAT AMERICAN AT TENNIS TODAY
