VANCOUVER, Oct. 28.—The forward part of the Canadian Merchant Marine steamship, Canadian Exporter, which was wrecked on Willapa Bar on July 31 en route from Vancouver to the Columbia River, was driven off the bar in last night's storm and foundered in deep water. Soon after the Exporter ran on the bar she broke in two and the after part sank some time ago.

Japanese Steamer Sinks off Flattery All Reported Saved

SEATTLE, Oct. 28.—Freighter West Ivan is proceeding toward Yokohama today with the crew and passengers of the Japanese steamer Kiku Maru, which sank last night in a hurricane 1200 miles off Cape Flattery. Details are lacking. News of the vessel foundering was sent out by the West Ivan early this morning. All aboard are reported to have been saved. It is believed the vessel carried a number of passengers. She was on her way to Kobe when she was damaged in a storm several days ago, and it was reported that she was returning to Seattle for repairs.

PARIS JOINS DEMANDING INVESTIGATION

Board Administration to
be held if Attorney General
Has Way.
PARIS, Oct. 28.—W. J. leader of the opposition legislature, demanded an investigation into the matter of the administration of the liquor licenses and the liquor tax. He said that the government had been negligent in the matter of the liquor tax and that the government should be held responsible for the charges made by the liquor tax. He would insist on an investigation and was not deterred by allegations made.

BRITANNIA MINES, Oct. 28.—Two miners, L. C. Craig and Francis Patenaude, who had been entombed in the shaft since Thursday night of last week, were rescued last night alive but very much exhausted. Both are expected to recover.

EDMONTON SPENDS MONEY ON SPORTS

Over \$4000 Given by Civic Bodies
Toward Skating Rink.
EDMONTON, Oct. 28.—The city commissioners are recommending that open air skating rinks be provided this season along the lines laid down last winter, when rinks were established at 169th Street and 80th Avenue on the south side; 95th Street and 107th Avenue in the east end, and at 144th Street and 102rd Avenue in the west end. At these rinks a caretaker was provided and the rinks were used by the school and church hockey leagues, including a playing membership of about 500 boys each. In addition to these rinks the city gave assistance by supplying water for rinks at Riverdale School, Bennett School, Highlands School, 143rd Street and 99th Avenue, and the North Edmonton School. The total cost to the city was \$2707, in addition to which the school board made a grant of \$1400. The commissioners report a balance from the appropriation of \$1692, estimating that the cost of providing the rinks this season will be \$2216. It is suggested that the school board be asked to again contribute \$1400.

CONFERENCE SUSPENDED

Believed by Papers Government
Will Get Big Support
Police.
LONDON, Oct. 28.—The conference between the Sinn Fein representatives and the British government has been suspended until after next Monday, the day which is set for the discussion in the House of Commons of the government's policy in dealing with the representatives of the Sinn Fein. Even the committee meetings of the representatives have been set over for today and Saturday. The belief is expressed generally in the newspapers that the Government will receive a big majority in supporting its policies in dealing with the Sinn Fein representatives.

PRINCE GEORGE IS OFF PONTOONS AND KINDERSLEY IS UP

Hudson Bay Power Schooner
Will Have Repairs Made Following
Northern Trip.
Hull repairs to the Grand Trunk Pacific steamer Prince George have been completed at the Wallace Shipyards and the vessel was taken from the pontoons yesterday. She is now lying at the dock where interior repairs and overhauling will be proceeded with. The Hudson's Bay power schooner Lady Kindersley was this morning taken up on the pontoons where her hull will be examined and minor repairs will be made. The propeller which was damaged by contact with ice in the Arctic Ocean will also be put in shape. She expects to leave for the south early tomorrow.

CHARLES IS LODGED AT TIFFANY ABBEY. SAY COMMISSIONERS

BUDAPEST, Oct. 28.—British French and Italian military commissioners in Hungary visited the Benedictine Abbey at Tiffany and later made an official affidavit that the ex-emperor Charles and his consort were lodged there. The abbey is surrounded by troops.

FILIPINO WOMEN AND CHILDREN ARE DROWNED IN RIVER

Manila, Oct. 28.—Ten Filipino women and children were drowned off the northern coast of the island of Luzon while attempting to cross the mouth of the Carayan River in a rowboat.

LEPER FOUND AT WINNIPEG

Russian Will Be Sent to Darcy
Island in British Columbia
or to New Brunswick.
WINNIPEG, Oct. 28.—Prompt measures were taken by the city health department and Dr. Gordon Bell in handling a case of leprosy which came to Winnipeg directly from a village in Saskatchewan. The patient is a native of Southern Russia, where the disease was contracted. He has been affected probably about eight years. The man has lived for the past five years in a village in Saskatchewan and came to Winnipeg for treatment of a skin disease. Dr. Gordon Bell immediately diagnosed it as leprosy and at once communicated with the city health officer, Dr. A. J. Douglas. As is customary in such cases, the patient is being treated under instructions from the federal health department. Isolation has been carried out since its nature was known and the man will be removed shortly to one of the federal government's leprosia, of which there are two, one in New Brunswick and the other at Darcy Island, British Columbia. Dr. Douglas said much was being done for persons suffering from this disease in the way of alleviation of symptoms, and cures had been reported.

JUMPED FROM TRAIN, LEGS ARE SEVERED

WINNIPEG, Oct. 28.—Jumping from a running train to join a section gang at Yonke, Ont., Henry Rearie, section laborer of the Canadian National railway, leapt to his death. He was picked up with both legs severed from his body and one arm off. Touringquets were applied to the bleeding members and he was put on the train for Superior, but died at 8 o'clock on the way there. Rearie was about 22 years of age and lived at McCallum Place, Winnipeg. He was working with the gang at Yonke, near Sioux Lookout and was about to rejoin his gang when he met with fatal injuries.

BELFAST, Oct. 28.—Reports received here indicate that the Irish republican army is very active in County Donegal. A force numbering 800 men is said to have marched through the village of Milford, proceeding to assigned quarters. Another camp is to be established at Carrick.

He was of Canadian nationality and was born around Stewart, B. C. Albert Johnson, also of Prince Rupert, survives him. Funeral services are in the hands of B. C. Undertakers.

TRUST WINS AGAINST FINANCE MINISTER OF B. C.

ON, Oct. 29.—The Privy Council has decided in favor of the Royal Trust Company of the British Columbia financial ruling that the rate of succession duty payable on the province out of the estate of the late Sir William Gage is \$8,523 instead of \$10,000 as claimed by the province. The province pays the costs of the case.

SUM TO BE SPENT ON B. C. HOME MISSIONS

ONTO, Oct. 28.—The sum of \$25 was allotted to British Columbia to be spent in home missions by the Methodist Board of Canada by the Board of Home Missions at its meeting in Toronto. **Meighen's Doom
 Has Been Sealed.**

Every indication from the East seems to be that the Meighen Government is bound to go down to defeat at the election, the campaign for which is now in progress. There is also every indication that the Liberal party will be the predominating influence in the next government, and probably that party will have a clear majority over all others.

Prince Rupert has always been a Liberal town. It was Liberal at the last election and there has been nothing to indicate a change in public opinion except that two or three business men who have more or less intimate relations with the Government candidate have gone over to support him. Prince Rupert district is just as much Liberal as ever it was.

**Attempt is Made
 to Camouflage Issue.**

An attempt is being made to camouflage the issue. A candidate, who has consistently until the day of his election announcement backed the Meighen Government and who is generally throughout the country looked upon as a Meighen man, comes into the contest. He announces that he is still a Liberal, although independent. His backers, who are the Conservatives of the city, put him forward to try to steal the Liberal support away from the regularly nominated Liberal candidate. That is the condition today.

There is nothing we can fight this election upon but the political record of the candidate. If we were looking for a military leader we should know what to do. As was pointed out at the Liberal meeting, the other night, military leaders do not make good legislators. Invariably they have proved failures. We doubt even if it is gratitude to send a man to Ottawa to Parliament just because he has been a successful military leader. Colonel Peck was in Parliament throughout a good deal of the last session and we have not discovered in Hansard any record of his having discussed on the floor of the House the question which to us was important above all others, the provision of fish cars. It remained for a Nova Scotian to take the floor in our behalf. The Skeena representative was so close to the Government that he could not even air this grievance for fear of offending them, and yet he now comes out as an independent and says he is a Liberal. Truly the ways of the politician are hard to understand.

**Inconsistency
 of Argument.**


In discussing the situation recently the gallant Colonel referred to a speech made by William Duff, member for Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, in which he championed the cause of Prince Rupert and showed the Government in Parliament the great need there was at this port. The Colonel says that was nothing. All the time he, the local member, was working on the matter. The inference is that the speeches of the opposition in Parliament are of no value, but it is the work of a supporter of the Government that counts.

Admitting that the Colonel is right, we get back to the question of the value of sending a man to Parliament who is bound to be in opposition. The Meighen party, the party to which the Colonel belongs so far as his record shows, will be defeated, so any supporter of his will be in opposition. He will be in a somewhat similar position to that of the member for Lunenburg in the last Parliament. He will make speeches in the House but will have no influence with the Government. The Government will still look to Fred Stork for advice in regard to this constituency even though defeated, for such is the custom of governments on either side.

**Send to Ottawa
 Government Supporter.**

A supporter of the Government to be is the man to send to Ottawa. The Liberals will win in spite of the millions being spent on the campaign by the wealthy plutocrats who are backing Meighen. With the Liberal party in power, the party that first put Prince Rupert on the map, the friends of the northern district, we want there a man to see that we get what is coming to us. Fred Stork is that man. He will be the Liberal adviser anyway, but we want to have him right on the job so that he can be of real use to us. The electors of Skeena will be making a grave mistake if they send to Ottawa any other.

SPEAKERS AT ROTARY CLUB

M. A. Macdonald, F. G. Congdon and J. Kingham Give Interesting Addresses at Luncheon.

VALUE OF SANE PUBLIC OPINION

There were three interesting addresses at the Victoria Rotary Club luncheon yesterday by F. G. Congdon, and M. A. Macdonald of Vancouver and Joshua Kingham of Victoria, the two former speaking on the value of such an institution as the Rotary Club and Mr. Kingham an interesting talk on how the Victoria Rotary Club carries on and hints as to what might be done here. Mr. Congdon gave it as his opinion that such clubs as the Rotary Club function might obviate the necessity of a legislature. A surgeon was called in only in case of disease and the object of legislation was to deal with a diseased condition of the body politic. There was a growing multiplicity of legislative bodies which was not always desirable. The best people did not require ordinances to govern their life and conduct. An idea seemed to prevail that edicts were required on every available subject but this was not correct.

Interest in Reform

In every community it is wise to train men to deal with matters of legislation and it seemed strange that businessmen often did not realize the value of taking an interest in legislation for the betterment of the community. In dealing with such matters as slums it was often left for the churches and other similar institutions to give the required impulses but in order to secure success they had to have the co-operation of the businessmen. Once the businessmen took up the work of fighting disease and other social evils there was hope of getting results. The ministers of the Gospel could give the great impulses but they had to be helped by the businessmen of the community. When these got the idea that the ideal state is desirable there would be an improvement. The most ideal thing in the community was looking after the welfare of the boys. Prevention was better than cure. By proper inspiration and direction the men of the next generation could be a great improvement over this.

Revolutionary Impulse.

Speaking of the revolutionary impulse, which at the present time was very strong in the world, the speaker suggested that while a certain amount of evolutionary sentiment was essential to the welfare of the community, it was not well to be too much possessed with the idea. There was a desire to tear down without considering what was to come after. The best way to deal with this was to see to the education of the youth.

M. A. Macdonald.

Mr. Macdonald, who is an honorary member of the Kiwanians Club, spoke of the similarity of the two organizations and of the good work both were doing by developing steady poise in a community. There was need for a steady hand. There was confusion and chaos on

every hand. The great cure for this condition was a sane public opinion. This could be developed by such organizations as these.

"Public opinion is the greatest force in the universe," declared the speaker. Men either follow it or make concessions to it. It seatters prejudices.

Public opinion could be formed by intercourse of mind with mind both in private life and in clubs such as the Rotary Club. Other forces in forming public opinion were the press, the pulpit, the melody of creeds, the law which made for orderly thought and various other agencies.

Material and Altruistic.

As in the creation of this planet from a state of chaos to its present orderly course so the planets of thought which promote order in society were gradually formed. This was true in the material as well as the altruistic sphere. If the altruistic was developing it gave better opportunities for material success.

"All are anxious to see British Columbia grow. Panegyrics are not uncommon about British Columbia and her great resources. We are exercised about the means of turning the natural wealth into use. It is the finest province in Canada, the gem of confederation, but we must better ourselves. Intelligent effort must be devoted to developing the resources. All understand the goal, but the way to it is not so clear. Nature does not yield up her treasures easily here. In any line expert knowledge is necessary and capital is needed.

Highway of Future.

"The Pacific looms large," declared the speaker. "It is the great highway of the future. We should learn to think Pacifically. Get our eye on the Orient. The possibilities among the three hundred millions of China who are breaking the bonds of centuries and taking on the habits of civilization. If I were to draw a picture of China and Japan awakened I should have to draw on my imagination in order to contemplate the picture. We must remember that the race is to the swift and the battle to the strong.

Mr. Kingham.

Mr. Kingham spoke of Prince Rupert Rotary Club as the baby club of the province. He told of the benefits that had been derived in Victoria and urged contemplation of the motto, "He profits most who serves best."

GISCOMBE MILL TO TAKE OUT LOGS FOR CUTTING NEXT SPRING

PRINCE GEORGE, Oct. 28.—News has been received here that the big Giscombe mill will take out logs this winter in order that cutting may recommence in the spring. A. C. Frost, the well known railroad builder and capitalist, who is the backer of the concern, has been at Giscombe making final arrangements.

Reports say the plan is to take out seven million feet of logs for cutting operations in the spring.

The Giscombe mill has been idle since 1919. It last operated at a reduced output in that year. The mill has a capacity of 115,000 feet of lumber in ten hours running. It is the largest and most modern saw mill on the line of the C.N.R. in the central interior of the province. Originally located at Willow River the first units of the mill were moved to Giscombe during the war, and these were added to on the present location until the one up-to-date plant which is found there today was brought into being.

IMMIGRATION AGENT VISITS PRINCE RUPERT AFTER INFORMATION

EDMONTON, Oct. 28.—Miss Mabel Dass of the Dominion Government Immigration Department is to visit Prince Rupert and points along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific in the near future, getting first-hand information in connection with the work of inducing Minnesota people to come to Canada.

Miss Dass is to visit the Peace River country first and then turn her attention to Jasper Park, the Bulkley and Nechaco valleys, and finally Prince Rupert. She wishes to see interior British Columbia in winter so that she can give first hand information in regard to conditions.

Miss Dass makes her headquarters at St. Paul.

NEW GRAND LODGE OF THE SONS OF ENGLAND

WINNIPEG, Oct. 28.—The institution of a Sons of England grand lodge in Manitoba marks another milestone in the growth and progress of this order since its inception in 1874. Incidentally Manitoba is the second province to form a provincial grand lodge, a flourishing grand lodge having been in operation in Alberta for several years.

It is now nearly 50 years since eight Englishmen met in Toronto and formed the first lodge which has now reached a total membership of 30,000. More than 7,000 Sons of England served in the great war and 849 paid the supreme sacrifice.

TERRIBLE EAGLE

Further Particulars of Attack on Child at Vanderhoof Recently.

Further particulars regarding the attack on a nine year old child by a bald headed eagle at Vanderhoof are given in the Nechaco Chronicle as follows:

While the nine year old daughter of W. S. Gibbs, of the Mapes district, was playing out in the veganda a large bald headed eagle came down and swooped upon her, catching the child with its talons by the arm and fleshy part of her body. The child screamed and ran for the door, but could not get past the screen door. The screams attracted the mother's attention, who came out and tried to beat the bird off, but without success. The child hung onto the door with one hand, against the logs of the bird. Matthew Semple happened to be near the house, and hearing the child's cries, came over quickly to investigate. On seeing the incident he picked up a big stick and clubbed the eagle to death. A remarkable feature is that the bird did not pay any attention to its assailant, apparently being entirely taken up with endeavoring to get away with the child. When dead the eagle measured over seven feet. The child's flesh was torn, but apart from that no serious damage was done, and little Miss Gibbs is getting along nicely.
