Large Section of Old Eastern Village Ruin Result of Big Blaze

PRINCE RUPERT, B. C., Sept. 8.—Approximately one-third of the town of Annapolis Royal has been wiped out by fire. The buildings in the business section with an estimated value of thousands of dollars have been destroyed. A cigarette thrown in a stable is believed to have been the cause of the devastating fire. Annapolis Royal is the oldest white settlement on the North West coast of Nova Scotia.

MORE PUPILS START SCHOOL

Additional Teachers Will Likely Have to Be Appointed—Great Increases.

The opening of the city schools this week has seen an increase in all classes and schools which have exceeded the expectations of the school board and officials. There will be a meeting of the board tonight and it is likely that the appointment of more teachers will be authorized to handle the large number of pupils.

GREAT GOLD STRIKE REPORTED TO HAVE BEEN MADE IN NORTH

FAIRBANKS, Sept. 8.—Reports received here describe the richest gold strike ever made since the Wilbour Creek days. The finds have been made along Wilbour Creek north of here. A stampede of miners and prospectors is commencing. A sensational discovery is reported and experts are investigating.

REYNOLDS IS FACING TRIAL

Man Who Cut Throat on Comox Avenue Last Month Appears Before Judge Young.

Clarence Reynolds appeared in the police court this morning charged with attempted suicide by cutting his throat on August 4. Accused was committed for trial without evidence having been taken and his case is proceeding this afternoon before Judge Young. L. W. Patmore is counsel for the defense.

Premier Oliver Declares Unjustifiable Action of Meighen Forcing Election

VICTORIA, Sept. 8.—"I have no hesitation in stating my opinion that the action of Premier Meighen is absolutely unjustifiable," declared Premier Oliver in the first statement on Dominion politics since the general election was announced. The effect, he says, is to deprive Western Canada for the next five years of a large proportion of the representation to which it is entitled.

VALERA IS EXHORTED

To Accept Dominion Status for Ireland—Moderates Active.

DUBLIN, Sept. 8.—Activity is apparent in moderate Irish circles to prevent a rupture of negotiations between the Sinn Fein and the British Government.

Secretary May Refuse Local Exhibits if Not Entered by Saturday Night.

While sports and attractions holding the spotlight as far as the Fair is concerned, the business of taking entries is going along steadily. Many exhibits have been entered and several heavy exhibitors have sent in their papers already. Local entries close on Saturday night and after that time the accepting of them rests with the discretion of the secretary. It is highly desirable that all people in the city who intend to exhibit should submit their entries before Saturday night so that when the rush of outside exhibits comes in next week no inconvenience will be caused either to local or outside exhibitors.

ROYAL MAIL SHIP ASHORE OFF SPAIN

Twelve Hundred Passengers of Almazora Will Likely Be Taken Off Today.

LISBON, Sept. 8.—The British Royal Mail steamer Almazora, carrying 1200 passengers is surrounded off Cape Espichel. It is expected her passengers will be taken ashore today.

ARRANGEMENTS COMPLETE FOR BIG BASEBALL SERIES ANYOX AND PRINCE GEORGE

Baseball is to be the great game of the Fall Fair this year. The big elimination series has now been arranged, in which Anyox, Prince George and Prince Rupert teams will take part, and the winner will be expected to go south to meet Ocean Falls on their own grounds. This is the announcement made this morning by Ben Seif, who is managing the big event.

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GRAND TRUNK APPEAL RIGHT

May Go to Supreme Court of Canada or Privy Council

OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—Under the agreement with the Dominion Government the Grand Trunk has the right of appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada or to the Privy Council of Great Britain against the award of the Board of Arbitration in the Grand Trunk Pacific purchase scheme under which the common and preferred stock of the company is declared to have no value.

AND MUST MAIN WITH THIS EMPIRE

De Valera Invited to Confer with Cabinet Ministers

Sept. 8.—The British cabinet has invited De Valera to a conference with cabinet ministers on September 20. The Daily Mail, however, says that De Valera is not expected to remain with the cabinet.

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ONLY AT MONTREAL IS UNEMPLOYMENT SERIOUS IN QUEBEC

MONTREAL, Sept. 8.—"Only one centre of population, Montreal, is faced with an unemployment situation which will demand courageous treatment," states R. W. Gould, secretary of the Quebec division of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association. In a report he has just completed on the industrial, commercial and agricultural condition of the Province of Quebec, he states that the situation does not cause undue alarm.

YAKIMA WINS CHAMPIONSHIP

Eight Teams in Pacific International League Next Season Likely.

TACOMA, Sept. 8.—It is expected that eight teams will play in the International Pacific Baseball League next season, four being considered insufficient by the directors.

CHINESE DELEGATES TO CONFERENCE WILL ARRIVE ON BIG SHIP

Empress of Russia Will Bring Big Party for Disarmament Parley at Washington.

VICTORIA, Sept. 8.—When the C.P.O.S. steamer Empress of Russia, now on this side of the Pacific Ocean, again makes this port from the Orient she will have aboard as passengers the Chinese delegation to the Disarmament Conference to be held in Washington. The party from Peking is said to consist of 139 members. They will sail from Hong Kong on October 13 and will arrive here on November 3.

Is Charlie a Real Actor?

It is a very common thing in some circles to ask fool questions of an editor, expecting that even if he knows nothing about the subject he will try to answer. An example of that is seen in the question which heads this article. Is Charlie a real actor? There is but one Charlie in the world so there is no need to ask another fool question in order to further explain.

Possibly some people will point to the popularity of Chaplin and say that is an indication that he must be an actor because he entertains so many millions of people, who go again and again to see the same pictures. And yet that is not a reason. He is a comic genius rather than an actor, but he is also developing as an actor if the movie critic of the London Times is to be believed. Here is what the highest authority says of him:

London Times and Comic Favorite.

"The Kid" is the most ambitious production in which Charlie Chaplin has as yet essayed his peculiar pranks, and marks a distinct step forward in his ideas at humor. He has always been humorous even when he has been most erudite, for he is a natural comic genius. Hitherto, however, he has confined himself to humor of the type which may be described as 'knockabout.' He used to delight in falling down and causing other people to do the same. It must be admitted that he could fall down in a supremely humorous way, but that kind of thing was soon bound to pall, and it eventually did. Now he has aspired to higher things. The films in which he used to appear were farces; 'The Kid' is almost a comedy. Charlie Chaplin is still his own inimitable self, but that self is so mellowed and improved and so much more subtle that at times it is transformed into something quite new. He acts as well as clown.

The film itself does not call for very much comment, although it is worthy of note that it tells quite a possible story in quite a possible way. There are moments when it forgets to be comic and becomes positively tragic, and even in these moments Charlie Chaplin participates with credit. Altogether it is a revelation of his powers. He is no longer the comic mountebank; he is now the polished comedian, who should please the majority of his former detractors without alienating his millions of worshippers. Formerly it was the custom to say that Mr. Chaplin played down to the level of his audiences. Now it is to be hoped that he will lift his audiences up to this new level of his own."

Drunkenness is Dangerous Habit.

One of its beastliness, drunkenness is a dangerous habit, especially in a good many occupations in which the lives of the public may be endangered. The following quotation from the Toronto Globe in connection with this matter is very timely in this city:

"Liquor in a motor car is more dangerous than dynamite. How long would the management of a railway tolerate the taking of a bottle of whisky into the cab of his engine by a locomotive engineer? There would be no opportunity for a second offense. Men of otherwise good repute are apparently disposed to disregard the law which forbids the carrying or keeping of liquor in motor cars. Fines for the breach of this law are frequently imposed, yet they seem to have little effect in making an end of the practice.

In several motor accidents recently of a serious nature the persons responsible have been arrested on a charge of drunkenness. The magistrates may not be able to impose a jail sentence without the option of a fine upon persons who carry liquor in their cars, but they can discourage the dangerous habit by intimating that anyone discovered to be intoxicated while in charge of a motor will be sent to prison for a term long enough to make the practice distinctly unpopular. A motor car driven by a drunken man along a crowded city street is a menace to every foot passenger upon it, as well as to other motorists. The growing habit of carrying a hip-pocket flask while motoring should be stamped out ruthlessly. It is even more prevalent among the rich and influential than among people who in pre-prohibition days were most prone to public drinking."

Drunken Person Is Sorely Punished.

It has become the fashion in some quarters to think it rather a sport to drink too much. The great mass of the people, however, look with pity if not with contempt on the person who cannot control his appetite for strong drink. There is nothing clever about being able to drink until the senses go, and certainly nothing to feel proud of. As a matter of fact it is the first step toward a criminal.

CHARLIE BO MUST STAND HIS TRIAL

Case Against Chinese Merchant Will Go to Fall Assizes.

VICTORIA, Sept. 8.—The application for a writ of habeas corpus, made by W. C. Moresby and R. C. Lowe on behalf of Charles Bo, on bail to appear at the Fall Assizes to answer to a charge of bribery, was dismissed in a judgment handed down in Vancouver by Mr. Justice Murphy. The refusal of the application means that the bill against Charlie Bo will be presented to the Grand Jury at the Fall Assize along with the bills against Dr. Ernest Hall and Joseph North. Police Commissioners, charged with misfeasance of office.

In his written judgment Mr. Justice Murphy says: "It is conceded that if there is any evidence against the accused this application must fail. I have perused the depositions again and am of the opinion that I cannot hold there is no evidence whatever against the accused. Such expressions as 'You fix him up, Dr. Hall,' 'You fix him up, Fry,' which are sworn to have been used by accused when it is alleged accused paid over money to North, might, I think be held by a jury to mean that the accused meant some of the money should reach Fry. Indeed, if North were not a Police Commissioner, it could hardly be argued, ought to be passed upon by a jury. The fact that North is a Police Commissioner does not, I think, take these expressions entirely out of the category of evidence.

"That fact is merely another bit of evidence calling for consideration by the jury, when deciding the question of intention on the part of the accused in reference to Fry. The application is refused."

J. S. Brandon acted for the Crown and the preliminary proceedings in connection with the habeas corpus.

VANDERHOOF

A Dominion Government Geodetic survey party has been camped at Vanderhoof for the past three weeks. They will go from here to Nichol and Prince George. N. H. Smith is in charge of the party and the other members are: W. J. Lowndes, R. D. Kinnord, C. F. Towney, F. W. Smallwood, W. E. Hughes, A. L. Grant and A. Hammore.

J. B. Armishaw, G. H. Ostrum and F. C. Borhaven interviewed Hon. Dr. King, minister of public works, on his recent visit here. The minister strongly advised one creamery for all of Central British Columbia.

PUSH FORWARD P. G. E. WORK

Provincial Government Determined to Construct Line to Prince George.

VICTORIA, Sept. 8.—More than ever determined to construct the Pacific Great Eastern Railway through to Prince George, as the result of opinions obtained through the recent excursion from Squamish to the end of steel at Cottonwood River, Premier Oliver and Hon. John Hart, minister of finance, are busy seeking ways and means to finance the undertaking. Only 63 miles separate the steel-head and the city of Prince George and 3,000 tons of steel are now on hand at the latter point. The Premier hopes to lay at least 20 miles of this before winter, with the line to be completed early next summer.

What may happen the southern stretch of the road from Squamish to Lillooet remains in doubt. Many of the excursionists who made the trip expressed opinions that this section might well be abandoned as a railway and the route used as the trans-provincial highway. This would necessitate the construction of the Ashcroft-Glinton cut-off, with direct connection being made with the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific lines. Certainly it is, the road will be completed as rapidly as possible to Prince George.

STOP FIGHTING AND WORK TOGETHER, SAYS ATTORNEY-GENERAL

The cities of British Columbia and the Government should stop fighting and unite to evolve plans for securing more revenue from the taxpayers of the Province. Hon. J. W. B. Farris, Attorney-General, told the Union of B. C. Municipalities at its convention at Alberni last week. "The present situation is very simple," Mr. Farris declared. "The municipalities are in need of money from taxation and the Province needs every dollar it has, and very likely will need more. There is no use our trying to take revenue from each other when there is not sufficient to go around.

"The only thing to do is to get more from that defenceless person, the taxpayer, and we can work out the methods of doing so at the next session."

Mr. Farris said that if the Government ever decided to bring in a bill creating a Local Government Board the municipalities could not complain that they had not been given an opportunity to discuss the matter.

ALICE ARM

Work will be continued throughout the winter on the Bellevue Group, Hlanee River, according to present plans.

A. J. Bone, who with Mr. Hodgson has been operating claims up the Hlanee River this season, left last week for New York. From there he will go to Peru to act in an advisory capacity for an American mining company.

There was a double header baseball game last week between Camp Eight and Town players. The latter won both games by scores of 5 to 4 and 16 to 8.

AIRMAN IS ON HUNGER STRIKE

Captain E. L. Janney Visited Here With Vancouver Excursion in June.

LETHBRIDGE, Sept. 8.—Captain Janney, hunger striker in jail here, refuses to break his 32 days fast. He has already lost 33 pounds weight and his heart is weakening. It may be necessary to resort to forcible feeding shortly.
According to a despatch to the Vancouver Sun from Flint, Michigan, Captain Janney, who visited here with the Vancouver Board of Trade excursion last June, is under arrest in Lethbridge jail at Kitchener, Ontario, charged with obtaining money under false pretences. He has been in jail for 32 days and, according to officials, has eaten no food in that time.

First to Enlist.
Captain Janney is said to have been the first man from Canada to enlist in the Air Force during the war. He had a splendid war record and this summer attempted to establish an aircraft company to carry on commercial trading in the far north. Several months ago he was arrested in Vancouver on charges of obtaining money under false pretences in Alberta and was returned there. Later he embarked on another promotion scheme in Flint, Michigan, and other Eastern cities which led up to his present arrest.

Here in June.
When the Vancouver excursion came here last June, Captain Janney established his popularity with the Vancouver business men by being very much "the life of the party." In Prince Rupert he narrowly averted falling into the hands of the police for a window breaking episode, an incident of one of his "parties." He did not return south on the excursion steamer but spent a few days visiting in Terrace. Wearing a police uniform here he attracted the attention of many citizens.

As far south as Ocean Falls, as far north as Alice Arm and as far east as Prince George they are clamoring for battle and there is little chance of meeting all the demands this season.

The only suggestion that can now be offered at this late date in regard to the settling of the championship is to leave it over until next year unless some speedy arrangements are closed within a very short time. It is too bad that such splendid enthusiasm as now exists in the various towns had not made itself felt earlier in the season. But there is another year coming and inter-town baseball will then likely take a more important place than ever it did before in the North.

In keeping with every other department of the Fair this year, the sport card next week promises to eclipse anything ever before presented to fans at Exhibition time. Probably the most generally interesting feature of all will be the baseball elimination series, between Prince George, Anyox and Prince Rupert. But besides this, there will be lots of other events and the competition for the football awards will be as keenly contested as ever and will keep the soccer enthusiasts entertained. There is also a possibility of there being a basketball game between Anyox and Prince Rupert, making a fitting opening feature for the season which will soon commence.

The handball court next to the city hall will be an actual thing in a very short time. The lumber has been provided and the firemen, who are to build it, are getting ready to make a start. Although it will be a little late in the season by the time it gets in operation it will be already for next year and will be put in good use then if not sooner. It will be a valuable addition to the Fire Department's recreation equipment.

The Anyox baseball team will be here in time to play their first game next Wednesday. They will come either on a small boat or on the Camosun on Tuesday. The Prince George ball team will be here on Thursday evening's train. Definite arrangements for the schedule of games have not yet been set out but there will be an early meeting of the Baseball Association to go into this matter and decide how the series is to be conducted.

BY-LAW NO.

A BY-LAW TO CONFIRM AN AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE PRINCE RUPERT PULP & PAPER COMPANY LIMITED AND THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT. WHEREAS on the 9th day of August A.D. 1921, an Agreement was entered into between the Prince Rupert Pulp & Paper Company Limited and the City of Prince Rupert, which agreement was in the words and figures following:

THIS AGREEMENT MADE IN DUPLICATE THIS 9TH DAY OF AUGUST, 1921, BETWEEN PRINCE RUPERT PULP & PAPER COMPANY LIMITED, a body corporate incorporated under the laws of the Province of British Columbia, hereinafter called the "COMPANY," and the City of Prince Rupert, a body corporate, incorporated by Statute of the Province of British Columbia, hereinafter called the "CITY."

WHEREAS the Company proposes to establish in the City of Prince Rupert, in the Province aforesaid, a Pulp Mill which will require in its operation a substantial supply of water, and WHEREAS the Company's Engineers have estimated that the City has a surplus of over three thousand U. S. gallons of water per minute which may be brought through the City water mains (not in excess of three thousand U. S. gallons per minute) for a period of ten (10) years for the operation of its proposed Pulp Mill, subject, however, to the future requirements of the City by reason of its growth for commercial, domestic and power purposes.

NOW THEREFORE THIS AGREEMENT WITNESSETH:

1. That in the event of the Company erecting a Pulp Mill in the City of Prince Rupert, and requiring for the purpose of running the said Mill a supply of water, the Company at its own expense, and using only commonly recognized standard equipment, shall install and maintain the City water system at its own expense and to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, and to enable it to take and use the City water mains (not in excess of three thousand U. S. gallons per minute) for the purpose of its proposed Pulp Mill, and in making such connections shall install suitable check and gate valves adequate to protect the City water system from damage by reason of such connections.

2. That in the event of the Company electing to take said water from the City mains and before so doing, the Company shall install and maintain the City water system at its own expense and to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, and to enable it to take and use the City water mains (not in excess of three thousand U. S. gallons per minute) for the purpose of its proposed Pulp Mill, and in making such connections shall install suitable check and gate valves adequate to protect the City water system from damage by reason of such connections.

3. That in the event of the Company electing to take said water from the City mains and before so doing, the Company shall install and maintain the City water system at its own expense and to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, and to enable it to take and use the City water mains (not in excess of three thousand U. S. gallons per minute) for the purpose of its proposed Pulp Mill, and in making such connections shall install suitable check and gate valves adequate to protect the City water system from damage by reason of such connections.

4. That in the event of the Company electing to take said water from the City mains and before so doing, the Company shall install and maintain the City water system at its own expense and to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, and to enable it to take and use the City water mains (not in excess of three thousand U. S. gallons per minute) for the purpose of its proposed Pulp Mill, and in making such connections shall install suitable check and gate valves adequate to protect the City water system from damage by reason of such connections.

7. That in the event of the Company electing to take said water from the City mains and before so doing, the Company shall install and maintain the City water system at its own expense and to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, and to enable it to take and use the City water mains (not in excess of three thousand U. S. gallons per minute) for the purpose of its proposed Pulp Mill, and in making such connections shall install suitable check and gate valves adequate to protect the City water system from damage by reason of such connections.

S. gallons per minute) for the purpose of its proposed Pulp Mill, and in making such connections shall install suitable check and gate valves adequate to protect the City water system from damage by reason of such connections.

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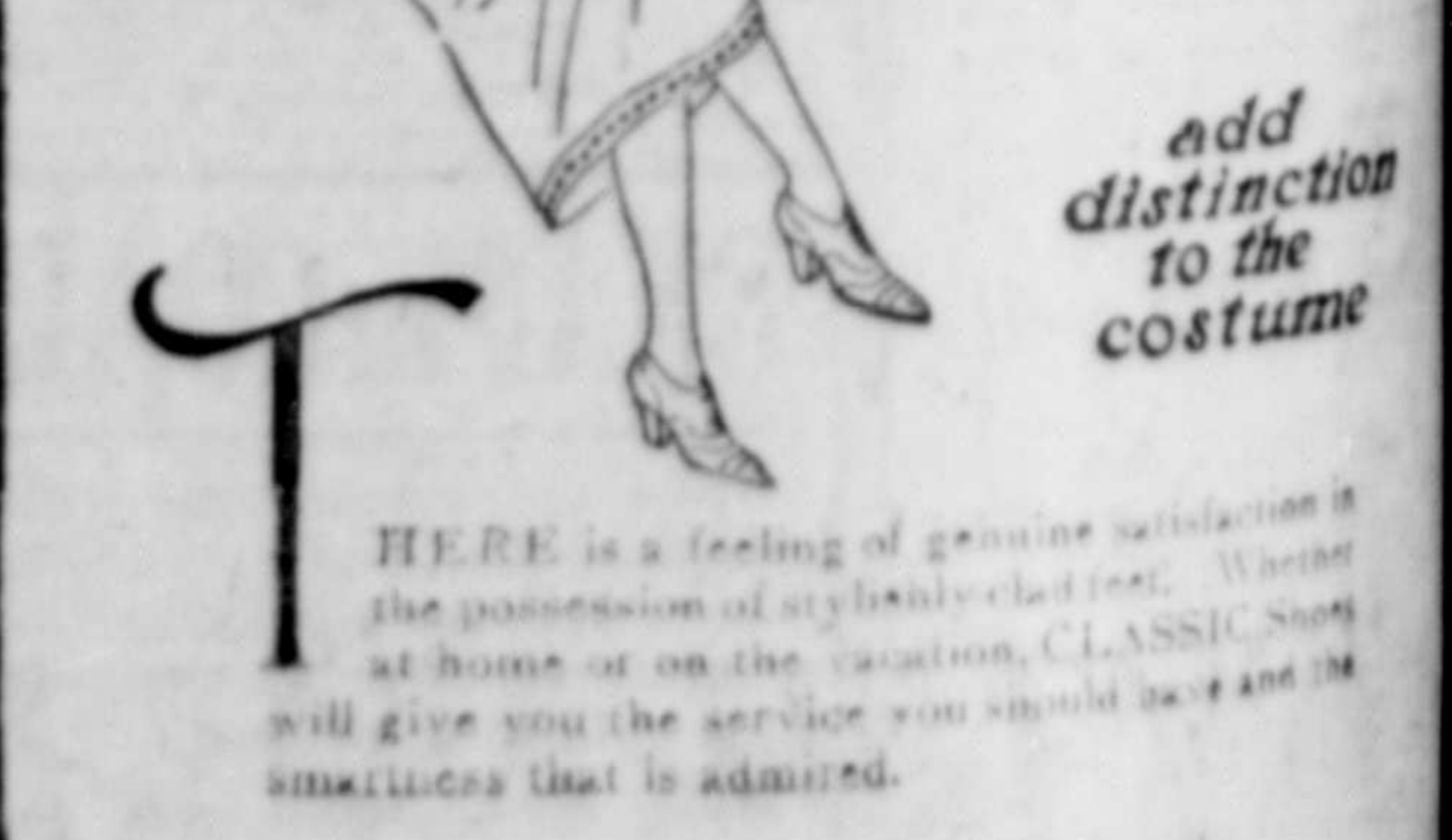
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
