General Workers May Join Strike

OTHER CONFERENCE BETWEEN LLOYD GEORGE AND LEADERS; NO RESULT

Another Million and Half Workers Decide to Support Miners and Others on Strike

OTTAWA, April 14.—(Noon)—The Federation of General Workers representing a million and a half workers in more than 200 industries in this country outside the triple alliance, has decided to support the triple alliance in the strike in the interest of the miners.

OTTAWA, April 14.—A conference this morning between Lloyd George and officials of the triple alliance of labor failed to reach any agreement. The conference concluded within two hours without any progress apparently having been made toward a settlement of the grave labor situation.

It was reported that the Premier made a long statement in which he appealed to the workers not to precipitate a crisis. The situation today appeared gloomy. Arrangements are being made by the transport men and railwaymen to quit work tonight at ten o'clock and on the other hand the Government is sending volunteers and making every possible preparation for the emergency.

FAMOUS PRIEST DIED YESTERDAY

Rev. Father Dandurand, Dean of the Oblate Congregations was 102 Years of Age.

WINNIPEG, April 14.—Rev. Father Damase Dandurand, O. M. I., dean of the Oblate order and oldest Catholic priest in the world, died at St. Boniface yesterday. Less than a month ago he celebrated his 102nd birthday.

It is interesting to note that when he was a baby the doctor said he was too weak to live. "Well," says Father Dandurand, "my weakness that was apparent seems to have been a pretty long one and must have liked the task of preserving me."

Father Dandurand was born on March 23, 1819, in the village of La Prairie, Quebec, of pure French parentage, his grandparents having fled from their homeland during the reign of terror of 1793.

Canadian Oblate.

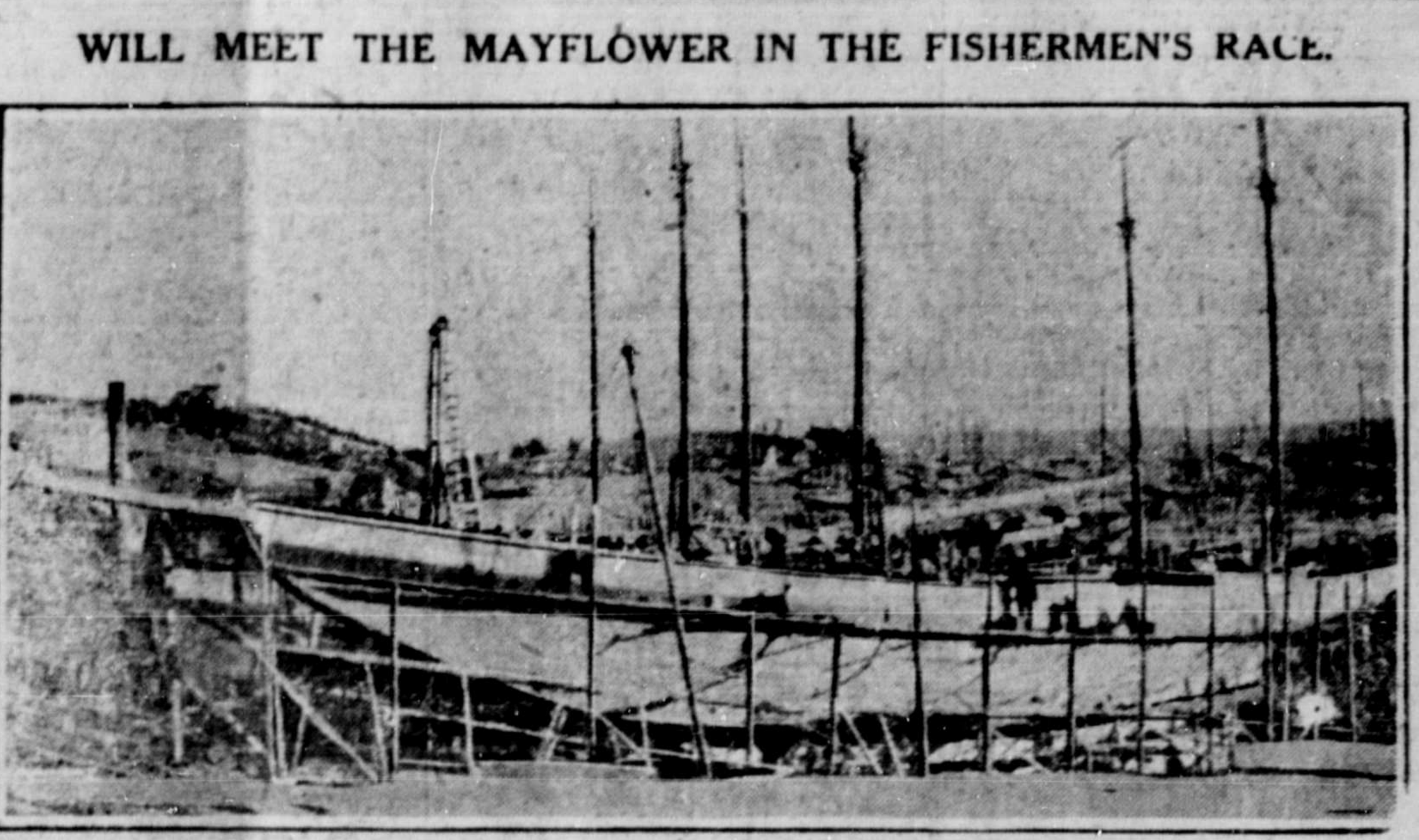
He was the first Canadian priest to join the Oblate in Canada. He has been vicar of Ottawa, then vicar-general to its first bishop; administrator of the same diocese, first Winnipeg parish priest for a short time and founder of St. Charles, Man., parish.

Being an official at the Montreal Bishops' Conference, it was Father Dandurand's duty to welcome the first four Oblates who came to Canada from France upon their arrival at Montreal in December, 1841. He later joined the Oblates, taking his first vow as a member September 2, 1842. The youthful priest immediately entered into the trying work of preaching missions, which he continued for three years in eastern townships.

In 1844, he was appointed to Ottawa. For thirty years Father Dandurand labored in Ottawa, his exceptional abilities as administrator securing for him the elevation to the vicar-generalship of that important diocese.

Golden Jubilee.

In 1891, when the Oblates celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of their arrival in Canada, Father Dandurand accompanied Mr. Faehle. During the same year the golden jubilee of his ordination was celebrated with great pomp in St. Boniface. He received the homage of his brother Oblates and a golden chalice was presented to him by Mr. Duhamel, the archbishop of Ottawa, as an offering from his former parishioners in the capital.



THE BLUENOSE JUST BEFORE LAUNCHING

WILL MEET THE MAYFLOWER IN THE FISHERMEN'S RACE.

The care and the attention devoted to the Bluenose, a Canadian schooner, in the international schooner race, has been unequalled in the history of Lunenburg. N. S. shipbuilding. The dimensions of the Bluenose are, length over all, 141 feet; beam, 27 feet; depth, 11 1/2 feet. She carries 10,237 square feet of canvas. The keel of the Bluenose was laid on December 10, 1919, by Devonshire driving the first bolt. Captain Angus Walters, who skippered the vessel in the last year's elimination race, is to sail the Bluenose. The vessel is expected to leave for the Banks on her first fishing trip, April 15. The spars for the Bluenose were made in Halifax, and are now at Lunenburg, ready to be stepped.

MINISTER OF LABOR CALLS F. B. CARVELL

Defends Canadian Labor Unions Against Charges Made by Commissioner

OTTAWA, April 14.—Senator Robertson, minister of labor, denied statements made publicly by Hon. F. B. Carvell, chairman of the Railway Commission, that American labor leaders forced the extension of the McAdoo award to Canada.

Senator Robertson stated in the Senate that the Canadian labor unions were free from American influence, and Mr. Carvell was apparently not acquainted with the real facts. The increase in wages was not excessive, the minister of labor said.

FIRST MEETING OF COMMITTEE

Feels That Agitation for Split of Province Will Have Good Results.

A meeting of the committee appointed by the mass meeting of citizens recently held to secure data on the division of the province at the 52nd parallel was held last evening in the Board of Trade rooms. C. H. Orme, convenor, presiding.

G. V. Evelt was appointed secretary with F. S. Wright to assist in the gathering of further data. The opinion of the committee is that it has embarked on a long job but a determined effort is to be made to have all the data on hand at the earliest possible moment.

C. H. Orme mentioned that, if it did nothing else, the movement would be of great advertising value to the community. D. G. Stewart felt that a movement of this kind would be a demand in itself for better treatment from the governments.

To Co-operate.

It was decided to communicate with all associations throughout the district and in the Yukon with a view to obtaining their co-operation. Hon. T. D. Pattullo and Hon. W. J. Bowser will also be written to.

Those present at the meeting last night were C. H. Orme, Thos. McClymont, D. G. Stewart, F. S. Wright and G. V. Evelt.

TEN YEARS HARD FOR MANSLAUGHTER

EDMONTON, April 14.—Ten years imprisonment with hard labor at Prince Albert Penitentiary was the penalty imposed on Clarence Johnston, the Entwistle man who shot and killed Edwin Cecil Thew on March 20, 1921, and was found guilty of manslaughter in the supreme criminal court here. Mr. Justice Hyndman pronounced sentence Saturday morning after H. H. Robertson had made a strong plea for leniency on behalf of his client. The judge held out the hope that the term might be shortened in consideration of good behavior on the part of the prisoner.

ARTIST IS DEAD

BOURNEMOUTH, April 14.—William Strang, 62 years of age, painter and engraver, is dead.

GERMANS TO PAY ALLIES LARGE SUM

Between 120 and 150 Billions Expected to be the Amount Set.

PARIS, April 14.—Germany's obligation to the Allies is to be fixed at between 130,000,000,000 and 150,000,000,000 gold marks, it is reported. The reparations commission has been preparing data on the question for some time and a definite announcement will be made very soon. When the definite amount is set the Germans will know exactly what they have to do. They have from the first asked that this be done.

VICTIM OF HOLDUP WAS OF WELL KNOWN FAMILY ON COAST

In connection with the report yesterday of the death in Vancouver of W. F. Salisbury, F. W. Hart of this city says the brother, Fred Salisbury, is well known along the coast. He was a brother-in-law of Mr. Hart and the father is also well known everywhere on the coast.

The tragic end of Mr. Salisbury at Vancouver was the subject of general regret and surprise here.

LORD MERSEY BACK ON JUDGE'S BENCH

LONDON, April 14.—Owing to congestion in the Divorce Court Lord Mersey at the age of 71 has returned to the bench. He conducted the inquiries into the Titanic and Empress of Ireland disasters.

PREVENT CRITICISM

Athens, April 14.—Parliament has voted a partial martial law to prevent newspaper attacks on the Government military policy.

Government Majority Was Down to 21 on Reciprocity Motion of W. S. Fielding

OTTAWA, April 14.—Eight millions for shipbuilding and estimated sums for interim supply was forced through the House of Commons under the closure rule last night at 2 a. m. The compulsory vote gave the Government a majority of 24.

The debate was further blocked by a motion by Hon. W. S. Fielding that Parliament ratify the reciprocity treaty. This was defeated by a majority of 21. Other technical amendments by the opposition had to be voted down before the Government could carry the supply items.

Baseball and Lacrosse to Flourish in Victoria This Season; Rithet Backs Ball

VICTORIA, April 14.—Victoria is to be a real sports centre this year. There will be plenty of lacrosse, and baseball in addition to the usual fare of tennis, cricket and minor sports.

Lacrosse is to be a very live sport here. Last night it was decided to organize a Vancouver Island Lacrosse League. Victoria and Sidney have entered and it is expected that Nanaimo and perhaps other teams will take part.

Soccer League.

The final of the Jackson Cup series will be played on Saturday when the Metropolis and Victoria West soccer teams meet for the championship of the city as a result of yesterday's game when the Victoria West team won from the Comrades by a score of 2 to 0.

ENGLISH JOURNALS DO NOT COMMENT ON HARDING'S ADDRESS

Silence is notable Feature of Reception That Speech Gets in London.

LONDON, April 14.—The most striking feature in Great Britain as far as President Harding's first address to congress is concerned is the absence of editorial comment on it by the leading journals of the country despite the fact that the new president dealt with international relations and touched on the League of Nations, stating his utter opposition to it as it now stands.

The Morning Post and the Daily Chronicle are the only two British London papers to give it any consideration as yet.

DELAY IN SENDING REMAINS FOR BURIAL

Former German Empress' Body Will Stay in Holland Until First of Week.

DOORN, April 14.—The German Government has insisted on delay in sending the body of the late former empress to Potsdam for burial. The remains will not leave here until Monday.

DEBURST DESTROYED YOUNG LIVES

Children Killed and Much Property Done in State of Texas.

MEY, Texas, April 14.—Children were killed and property injured by a cloud-burst in the village of Melissa. The place has a population of about 1,000 and property and crop damage here and in the neighborhood is being reported. Every church in the district is destroyed. Eight trains were derailed, the wreckage strewn along the tracks. One railwayman was injured so badly he will probably die.

PROSPECTORS GETTING BACK TO THEIR MINES

Disappearing Snow on the Hills Around Stewart and Alice Calls Them Back

The clearing of snow from the hills of the North sees the return of the prospectors and miners who have spent the winter outside and tonight several will leave for Stewart when the Prince Albert pulls out, many of them having arrived on the Prince George yesterday from the south.

John J. Roahli, better known as "John the Finn," and one of the notable characters of Stewart camp arrived yesterday after having spent the winter in San Francisco. He goes North tonight. It was he who made the gold strike near Stewart last fall.

Dan Davis, who runs a road house between the Premier mine and the town of Stewart, also goes in on the Albert. He has been several months visiting in cities of the Middle States.

Harry Scholey, a pioneer of the Yukon and a resident of Stewart for the past two years, is also in the city on the way North after having been undergoing medical treatment at a private sanitarium in Vancouver. He is accompanied by his partner, Paady Bagan.

A. Hobell, a well known Alice Arm prospector is also in the city registered at the Hotel Prince Rupert.

READY-MADE HOUSE FACTORY DESTROYED

VANCOUVER, April 14.—The factory of the Twentieth Century Ready-Built House Company was destroyed by fire last night, the loss amounting to \$40,000. Surrounding houses were badly damaged.

ROSETTOWN, April 14.—Under Martin, former Conservative member of Parliament, died here today at the age of 80.

Coal Bunkers Badly Needed.

The Alberta Government is anxious to do business with Prince Rupert. They wish to use this port as the medium through which coal for the north coast shall be shipped.

It is understood that many influences have been at work to try to prevent Prince Rupert getting bunkers. The mines on Vancouver Island are very much interested in the proposal and would be glad to block the move.

Only a short time ago, the general manager was ready to build the bunkers. Now he has changed his mind, it is said, and there is nothing doing in that direction.

Cost of Towing Coal to This Port.

The cost of bringing coal to this port by water is \$4 a ton from Vancouver Island. The cost to Ocean Falls is \$2 a ton. Coal can be taken by water from this port to Ocean Falls for \$1 a ton and the same rate can be obtained to Anxox.

There is a demand for over a quarter of a million tons a year on this coast, all of which might come through this port and this would bring boats here all the time.

Fish Cars for Local Business.

General expressions of pleasure were heard from businessmen and others yesterday at the news given out through this paper, that fish cars are now really being built.

At last something is being done, and we shall expect to see the first new car here in the near future. It is to be hoped that now the work is under way the number of cars on order may be increased and we may get a sufficient supply to handle the local business.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

GOOD PRICES BEAVER SKINS

Mink to Number of 47,000 Not All Sold Yesterday at New York

NEW YORK, April 13.—Sales during the first half of the spring auction of raw furs now going on in the Masonic Hall here passed the million dollar mark yesterday when the pelts that went under the hammer realized approximately \$295,000. This brought the grand total to date to \$1,095,851. The two most important collections sold were heavier and mink. Active bidding for the latter featured the day. More than 6,000 beaver skins were sold at prices which averaged 20 per cent above the winter sale figures.

Canadian Skins. The mink offering, which totalled over 47,000, was not fully sold and the unsold pelts will be auctioned today. The best prices were paid for fine eastern Canadian skins. Cat skins did not do as well as usual. The best blue and black pelts brought only 18 cents each, and the general run of prices was 15 per cent below those paid at the January sale of the New York Fur Auction Sales Corporation.

Low Prices. With the exception of Persian lamb and marmot, most of the less important furs sold today were lower than in January. Marmot ran 10 per cent above winter prices, with the better grades of Persian lamb unchanged. The low grade Persians were neglected.

NATIONALIST LEAGUE.

Editor Daily News:

On Tuesday you published a letter from Lem Gong of this city which made some disparaging remarks about the Chinese Nationalist League. In order that you and other people here may not be misled I should like to explain the object of this society of which I am president: The League is formed:

- 1. To maintain the political unity of China and the Chinese people. It objects to territorial partition and also to division of the people into classes.
2. To foster local self-government as opposed to the patriarchal idea.
3. To make possible political assimilation with other races.
4. To adopt such social policies as may be suited to our people with especial reference to government ownership of public utilities.
5. To maintain international peace, or in other words to help "make the world safe for democracy."

There are seventeen thousand members of the League on this coast and our leader is Dr. Sun Yat Sen, who has been proclaimed president of China. He and his followers want to get away from the corruption of the old political parties and to build a new China, where the people will govern and which will have the respect and confidence of the rest of the world. The charge was laid against Radenbaugh on the evidence brought out at the inquest last week of John A. Swanson who was murdered at the Royal, in which several of the gamblers admitted playing there on a percentage basis.
"H. V. Kauffman, commonly known as "Goffey" who was one of the dealers, left town the day after the inquest was held. He is said to have started for Prince Rupert, having come to the conclusion that Ketchikan was no place for him to linger longer."

TENT CITY TO OPEN IN JUNE

Mount Robson Park Camp to be Ready by July 1.
Plans have been completed by the Canadian National Railways for the opening of camps for summer tourists in both Jasper and Mount Robson Parks.
Jasper Park Camp which has been in operation for several years back will be located on the same site as previously, on beautiful "Lac Beauvert" about two miles distant from Jasper station. This camp, better known as the "Jasper Park Tent City," will be open for guests about June 15 and will be continued until September 15. Accommodation will be provided for from 75 to 100 guests. It will be operated by J. W. Brewster.
Mount Robson Park Camp will be located about three miles from Mount Robson station, and accommodation will be provided for from twenty to forty people. This is the second year for this camp, which is used primarily as a base for tourists going into the Mount Robson and Berg Lake region, situated eight or ten miles from the base camp. The camp will be open for guests from July 1 to the end of August, and will be operated by Messrs. Dennison & Brittain.

PREPARING FOR NORTHERN TREK

Accommodation will be Provided for Large Number to Go to Oilfields

EDMONTON, Alta., April 12.—There will be ample accommodation for all persons seeking transportation to the northern oilfields, according to local officials of the three northern transportation companies who are now completing arrangements for the carrying of passengers and freight north. Reports to the contrary are incorrect and the transportation companies declare there will be no trouble in the way of moving all the men and supplies to offer. It is estimated that 3,000 passengers or even more can be carried by the three companies—the Hudson's Bay Company, Northern Trading Company and the Alberta & Arctic Transportation Company—operating on the Mackenzie and Peace River routes.

Not Stampede
Just what proportion the trek into the north will assume cannot yet be determined, but to this date there are no signs, according to information from the steamboat offices, of a stampede. That there will be a far larger travel list on the Mackenzie route than ever before is certain, but the stories of "thousands of brave men feverishly preparing for their northward dash" are being taken here at a fairly heavy discount. Opinions among those interested in the northern development differ as to the number of men who will probably be going north this summer, but a fair estimate, based on reports and on bookings with the steamer companies and inquiries already on their lists, puts the seasons total at about one thousand.

Return Tickets
Some eighteen or twenty round trips to the Fort Norman oilfields can be made by the combined services of the three companies, it is stated, if there is sufficient business offering. Few or many trips will be made, according to the number of passengers wanting to go. In all cases, it is understood, the Mounted Police will insist upon return tickets being purchased, and the estimated capacity of the three lines is based upon their ability to move the passengers back before the close of navigation.

Abandon Air
The federal government's geologists and field workers in the south will be taken north by the river route and not by airplane, the air board having, it is stated, in the interest of economy, abandoned its plans of transporting five government geological survey parties from Peace River. It has now been decided to build barges and to move the men and their supplies in that slower but much more economical way. The route followed by the barges will probably be the Peace, Slave and Mackenzie Rivers, most of the work under prospect being in the vicinity of the Fort Norman and Windy Point oil fields.

MOTOR BOAT WILL SOON BE NEEDED

Senior League will Likely Have Four Clubs and Junior Three—More Possible

INNOVATION MADE IN CONTROL BOARD

Big Attendance Last Night Shows that Interest in Game is Unabated

There were fifty persons in attendance at the annual meeting of the Prince Rupert Amateur Football Association last evening. Financial reports were submitted, officers elected and the manner of conducting the game this year received full discussion. The meeting was held in the City Hall and the attendance was highly satisfactory.

A financial report for the year which was submitted showed that the income from last year's games had been \$1,012.16 and after all expenses, including medals and cloths to the various clubs, had been paid there was a balance of \$23.86 left.

Following this there was a discussion as to how football would be governed this year and the elections of officers took place resulting as follows:

President, E. A. Woods.
Vice-President, D. C. Stuart.
Secretary-treasurer, George S. Russell.

These officers will be supplemented with one delegate from each club in the league and will make up the association which will govern all matters of finance, arrangement of games and general business.

Board of Control

An innovation was adopted in the appointment of a board of control, the special business of which will be to settle all disputes and regulate the conduct and discipline of the game. This board was chosen as follows: J. R. Mitchell, George Hill, A. T. Parkin, S. D. Macdonald and E. R. Tabrum.

It was recommended at the meeting that insurance against accidents to players on the field be taken out so as to eliminate the necessity of staging benefit games. No action was taken in this matter however.

Four Senior Teams

There will be four teams in the senior league and three teams in a junior league, according to a survey taken from the delegates at the meeting last night. In the Senior League will be the Sons of Canada, Sons of England, Great War Veterans and Gallies. The Junior League will consist likely of the King Edward School, High School and Dr's Dock.

Three footballs are to be donated by the association to the juniors.

Each of the prospective Senior League teams had delegates attending the meeting last night. There is a possibility that more clubs may yet join.

GIANTS LOOK LIKE WINNERS

Line-up of Situation in National League with the Opening of Season

CHICAGO, April 13.—Despite the many changes in both the playing personnel and managers of clubs, baseball authorities look forward to another banner year in the big league races which commenced yesterday. Notwithstanding the unprecedented popularity of the game during the past two years, club owners and league officials are making plans for even greater things.

With the return of Johnny Evers as manager of the Chicago Nationals, a new fighting spirit is expected to be instilled into the players—a spirit that was totally lacking last season. The pitching department is considered one of the best of the league with Alexander, Taylor and Vaughan forming the backbone. Killifer will do the bulk of the catching.

The personnel of the Phillies will be practically the same as last year but if the veteran pitchers perform as expected they will possibly end up better than they did then. The Philadelphia National infield, however, is said to be anything but reassuring.

Pittsburg is experimenting with a lot of new men this season and little prediction can be made. Maranville will be at short and will be a great acquisition.

Giants are Strong.

Right up in front from the start is the place in the 1924 pennant race which the followers of the New York Giants expect that the team will occupy. If careful preparation and excellent coaching during training can bring success the Giants should certainly have the best of it. Manager McGraw and his assistants seem to be pretty well satisfied that they will be able to put a championship team into the flag contest.

The Cincinnati Reds are a re-modelled ball club from the one which won the National League series and the scandalous world's series in 1919. There are only three of the old players left in the game. The team has, however, developed unexpected strength and the work of the infield has been high class. Manager Moran feels his club will win far more games than it will lose and fans are sure it will finish in the first division.

Old Timers Here.

Brooklyn's chances in the National League this year should seem to depend more upon the changed conditions in the other clubs than upon an estimate of the Superbas' own strength. They start the season with practically the same lineup as last year and the age of some of the players

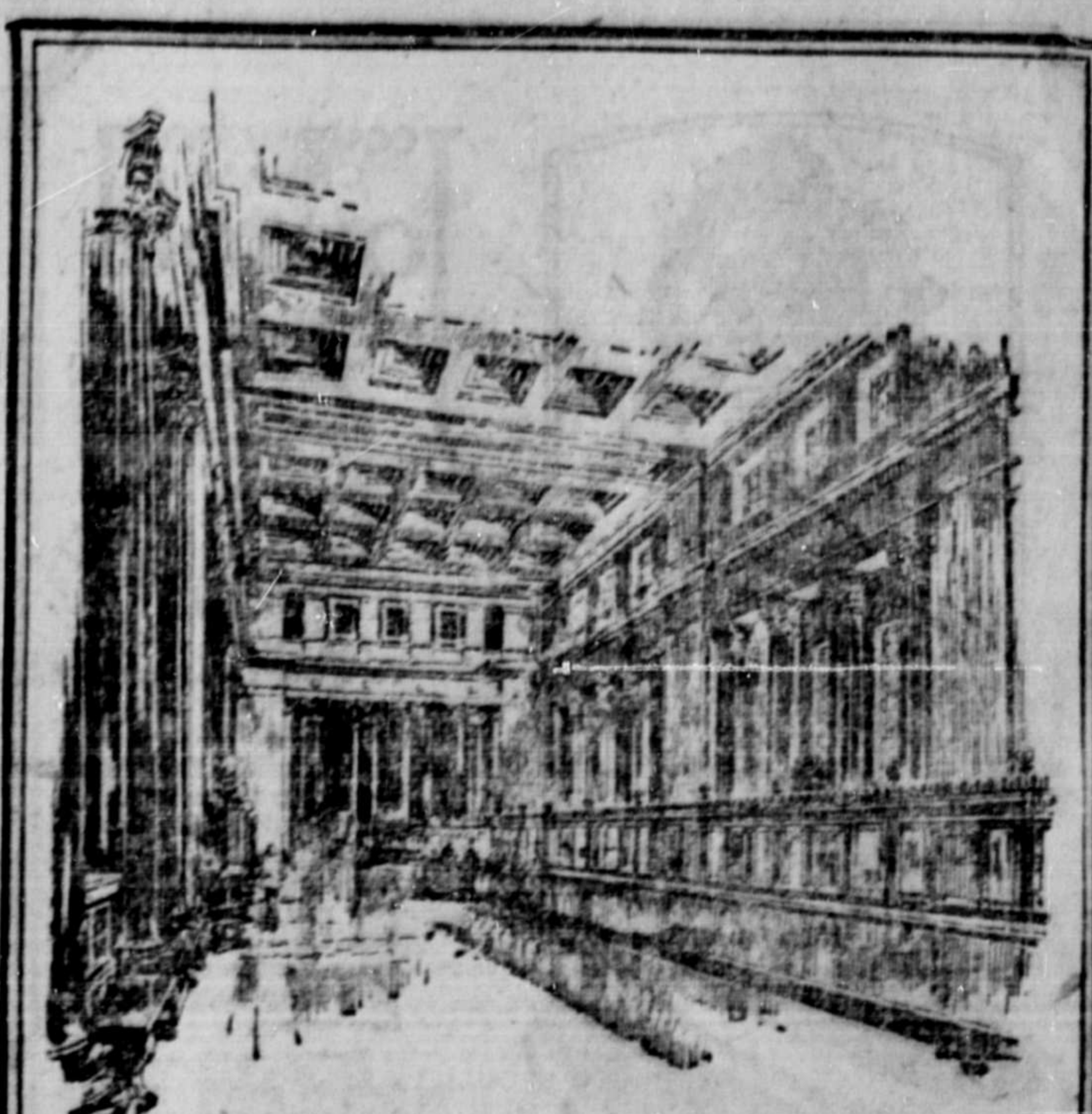
Sport Chat

During the period of forty-five years in which various teams have fought for the National League pennants those representing Eastern cities have won 23 championships while Western clubs have captured 17. Chicago leads with 11 pennants, Boston is second with nine and New York third with eight. In the American League Boston and Philadelphia have each won six pennants, giving the East a total of twelve while the Western clubs have accumulated nine, five for Chicago, three for Detroit and one for Cleveland. Other pennant winners in the National League were: Brooklyn, 5; Pittsburg, 4; Baltimore, 3; Providence, 2; and Detroit, Philadelphia and Cincinnati, one each.
