Premier Confers with Ulster Leader
LOCAL BUSINESSMAN WRITES OF PROBABLE FUTURE THIS CITYNo Definite Result Yet from
Conference Between Lloyd
George and Valera in London

LONDON, July 15.—The meeting between Premier Lloyd George and de Valera lasted from 4:30 until 7. Later the British premier met the cabinet, following which he had an audience with King George.

At the meeting with the cabinet the Premier informed them that he had nothing to disclose as yet in regard to the meeting with de Valera except that both had striven hard for peace. They will meet again today.

Downing Street was blocked all day yesterday with Irish sympathizers singing hymns, reciting the rosary and waving Sinn Féin flags without interference from pedestrians.

Lloyd George and de Valera had tea together and the several hours of discussion is said to have ended amicably.

Today's Meeting.

LONDON, July 15.—(noon).—Lloyd George and de Valera were in conference again this morning for an hour and a half after which an official communiqué was issued as follows:

"Further conversations between Lloyd George and de Valera took place this morning in Downing Street and will be resumed at a later date, possibly today."

Those in close touch with the situation believe the preliminary talks between the Prime Minister and the Irish leader have been worked out and that the next step will be a consultation between Lloyd George and Sir James Craig, Ulster premier, whose meeting is expected to take place this afternoon.

The Ulster leader left Belfast for London last night.

Craig Arrives.

LONDON, July 15.—(later).—All interviews with the Irish republican leader concluded for the time being, Lloyd George this afternoon received Sir James Craig, the Ulster Premier. Upon reaching Downing Street, Sir James went direct to the cabinet room to confer with the Prime Minister.

JAPAN HOLDS
BACK FROM
CONFERENCE

Thinks Disarmament Too Big
Question to Be Combined With
Any Other.

WASHINGTON, July 15.—It is understood that Japan has withheld her consent to participate in the conference of powers interested in the Pacific Ocean. She has, however, accepted the invitation to attend the disarmament conference.

Japan it is said, considers the disarmament question too big to be combined with any other problem and fears the preliminary discussion might precipitate diplomatic difficulties on the delicate questions having to do with the Orient.

Washington officials hope to bring about a general discussion of Pacific questions and bring Japan into it.

NIAGARA RIVER HAS
BIG TOLL OF LIFE

NIAGARA FALLS, July 15.—The Niagara River has taken a toll of seven lives in the last few days. All the accidents were cases of drowning.

TROOPS ARE
CALLED OUT
KOBE, JAPAN

Strikers Attempted to Take
Possession of Dockyards.

KOBE, Japan, July 15.—The troops were called out today to aid in quelling a disturbance caused by strikers. Thousands of workers at the dockyard here charged a police cordon in an attempt to take possession of the dockyards and carry out a project of their control by the workers.

Order was restored, but not before a number of the strikers had been wounded and the ringleaders arrested. The trouble followed a strike of the employees for higher wages.

PUBLIC WORKS OFFICE
OPENED HERE AGAIN
IN FEDERAL BUILDING

The Dominion Government public works office in this city has been reopened with J. B. Lambert, one of the engineers of the department, at present in charge. The location of the office is on the third floor of the Federal Block next to the office of Burke & Small, chartered accountants. The amount of work coming under the supervision of the department this season has necessitated the reopening of the office in the city.

SIR SAM HUGHES IS
SINKING FAST AT
LINDSAY, ONTARIO

LINDSAY, Ont., July 15.—Sir Sam Hughes, former minister of militia in the Borden Government, who has been ill for a long time here, is sinking fast and is not expected to live long.

INDIANS SURPRISED
BY AIRSHIP ARRIVAL

EDMONTON, July 15.—The arrival of the Imperial Oil Company's plane at Fort Smith created a furore among the Indians there, who had never seen anything of the sort before. They promptly named it "Jesus Ship," believing it to have something to do with the great spirit.

STRAWBERRIES
LIGHT CROP

Lack of Rain at Terrace Results
in Comparatively Small
Output.

J. C. Gavigan returned to town on the delayed train last evening from a visit to Terrace, the strawberry centre. Mr. Gavigan says that the crop is only a light one there this season on account of the lack of rain during the later growing period. The hopes which the earlier part of the season raised in the expectation of a bumper crop have been dashed and many of the growers are rather disappointed with the result. Production is now at the peak, however, and large shipments are being made to Edmonton and other eastern points. The demand for Terrace berries from the prairie towns is increasing every year. The quality of the Terrace berries and the time at which they are ripe are the two factors which will secure a steady demand and a good price for the growers.

Owing to the light crop and the strong demand for them at prairie points, it seems unlikely, Mr. Gavigan says, that the price will go below \$4 a crate this season for preserving strawberries. This great demand for berries is the one thing which will cause the housewife disappointment who put off until the last securing her supplies for preserving.

The acreage at Terrace under strawberries this year is greater by far than ever before and will be substantially increased next year so that even with a light crop, the total quantity of berries shipped is much larger than last year. With the eastern markets widening every year, the future of the Terrace district seems assured.

ADDISON RESIGNS
COALITION CABINET

Announcement Over Criticized
Appointment Made in London.

LONDON, July 15.—The resignation of Christopher Addison as minister without portfolio in the coalition government has been announced. His appointment was made by Premier Lloyd George just a short time ago and there was a good deal of controversy and criticism over it, especially as regards the salary that he was to be paid.

ANYOX ONE BINS
BURNED; LOSS \$30,000

Word was brought from Anyox last night of the destruction by fire of the ore bins of the Granby Company, solicited Mining & Smelting Co. The fire started on Wednesday night and the loss is said to be in the neighborhood of \$30,000.

HEADS NEW POLAR EXPEDITION.



Sir Ernest Shackleton will sail from London late in August with a party of explorers to chart 10,000 miles of remote Antarctic regions. The enterprise will be known as the Shackleton-Rowett Oceanographic and Antarctic Expedition.

Port of Prince Rupert Has
Wonderful Destiny, According
to J. F. Maguire of This City

The importance of Prince Rupert as an ocean port is well set forth in the following letter received today:

Editor, The Daily News: The statements made by Mr. Nicholson at our last Board of Trade meeting regarding direct shipment of freight from Prince Rupert to England and your editorial references the following day to the same subject tend to revive thought and stimulate activity concerning the approaching debut of Prince Rupert as one of the world's important shipping ports. That Prince Rupert is inevitably destined to occupy this position should be apparent to anyone cognizant of the salient features of the situation and willing to consider them with intelligent impartiality, aided by the lessons of history and the unerring "Oracles of Time." The truth of the old aphorism about following the line of least resistance will find another exemplification in the place called Prince Rupert, "and that right early."

Everything Favorable.

To be the ocean terminus of a 3000 mile transcontinental railway with a practically water-level grade from ocean to ocean; to possess a land-locked harbor capable of affording safe accommodation to a thousand merchantmen, free the whole year round from everything that constitutes a difficulty or a danger to even the least skillful navigator—no ice, no fogs, no currents, no narrows, no shallows, no sandbanks, no extremes of heat or cold. To own a waterfrontage fully seven miles in length, with a sufficient depth of water at the lowest tides, almost at the water's edge, to float the largest vessel as yet built or likely ever to be built; to find all this at the great Northern gateway of such a country as Western Canada and within a few miles of the Pacific Ocean on whose shores the most important commercial and international developments of the twentieth century will take place, constitutes a heritage of priceless value such as few, if any, other seaports in the world possess. I venture to think that it will not be very long till East and West wake up to the realization of this fact.

Line of Least Resistance.

The line of least resistance between resurgent Asia with its teeming millions now stretching out their hands to the west, and the Atlantic seaboard of the North American continent is via Prince Rupert beyond all doubt. By that "line" both time and money can be saved, and at least equal safety with any other "line" secured. What navigator from the Orient would hesitate for a moment to select Prince Rupert as his port of entry in preference to Vancouver or Seattle, if he had his choice?

In 1904 I heard the late Lord Roberts at a lecture in London on "The New Pacific" say: "The centre of international gravity is now shifting to the Pacific Ocean, and it is mainly in that direction that the dominating factors will be found when any serious future complications arise. The strategy of the new Pacific therefore is now a matter of business calculation that will soon come home to the (continued on Page Four.)"

Canada's Marksmen
Make Good Showing
Bisley Competitions

BISLEY, July 15.—Weather conditions are unsettled for the first stage of the St. George's challenge cup competition here today. The scores made by Canadians come very high and the team is reflecting great credit on the marksmanship of the Dominion. Out of a possible 75, Major C. R. Grove, of Guelph, made 72, the highest score. Private A. H. Caplin, of Vancouver, made 65, as also did Major Richardson, of Victoria.

The Prince of Wales' match was won by Sergeant Northcote, of Manchester. In this shoot Private Caplin came thirty-second, Major Grove seventh, and Sergeant Hawkins, of Toronto, fiftieth.

NELLIE M'CLUNG IS
EDMONTON CANDIDATE

Making Good Run and Will Probably Be Elected in Alberta Capital.

EDMONTON, July 15.—Nellie McClung, the famous author and lecturer, who is one of the Liberal candidates for Edmonton city, is conducting a whirlwind campaign. In a speech delivered here she said it was useless talking to Conservatives as they had settled convictions but could not help it. Some women were just as uninteresting.

Mrs. McClung is stirring up people who formerly have not been interested in politics. It is expected that she will be elected.

LITTLE REPUBLIC
DOUBLES ITS ARMY
FROM THREE TO SIX

PARIS, July 15.—There is great agitation in the little state of San Marino, declare the afternoon papers. The smallest republic in the world has decided to double the size of its army. At present it consists of three carabinieri, and it is proposed to bring this number to six. The party of United Democrats in the state are crying out against this waste of public money.

CONFERENCE
IN LONDON

Preliminary Meeting on Disarmament Among British Leaders.

LONDON, July 15.—A preliminary disarmament conference in London is probable in order that the British representatives may get opinions of all the Dominion premiers preparatory to the Washington conference at which all the nations will be represented.

SNIPING IN
BELFAST ALL
YESTERDAY

Steady Stream of Wounded Carried to Hospitals Ceased With Curfew.

BELFAST, July 15.—Sniping throughout the day in the city streets got beyond control yesterday afternoon, causing a steady stream of wounded for the hospitals and the complete suspension of traffic in two important streets. The shooting ceased suddenly at curfew.

An infantry regiment is on duty here today. The sniping is the aftermath of the Orange celebration when there was free fighting in the streets and many were killed or wounded.

Resume Control.

BELFAST, July 15.—The military resumed control of the North Queen Street area this morning. Armored cars patrolled the street as a result of last night's rioting in which two persons were killed and between thirty and forty others were wounded. A number of public houses were looted.

CLOUDBURST
CAUSES HAVOC

Wall of Water Rushes Down River, Inundates Village and Destroys Crops and Cattle.

ALLANCE, Neb., July 15.—A fourteen foot wall of water rushing down the White River last night caused havoc in the town here and did much damage. Alliance was inundated and the town of Crawford was threatened, while thousands of cattle perished. One man was killed and many are believed to have been drowned while farms were destroyed and crops ruined. The flood was caused by a cloud burst in the vicinity.

VILLAGE DESTROYED

SPOKANE, July 15.—The entire village of Milan was destroyed by fire yesterday and 500 people are homeless. The loss is \$50,000.

How We All Try To Fool Ourselves.

We all try to persuade ourselves that things are or are not. We are all creatures of emotion and we enjoy or suffer mostly through our expectation of what is going to happen. Just now we are all looking forward to a hard winter. Just why, we cannot tell. We have heard people say it is likely and have come to believe it. There we may be fooled, for it may not be a hard winter after all. If we get it out of our heads that the outlook is bad we shall perhaps have an influence on prospective conditions, but if we see everything dull leaden grey like a fisheries cruiser, we may really suffer, in prospect if not in reality.

Something over a year ago people had the notion that Stewart was to have a boom. People rushed in there and were soon stranded, victims of their emotions. There was no boom. It did not come off. If there is any prospect of dullness in the coming winter, it is for us to show our mettle and light up the dull skies with electricity generated in our minds and lives. It does not need to be dull and will not be dull unless we allow it to be so.

There never was a time when Prince Rupert was better than she is today. There may have been more loose change in sight, but never before was there such stability as is apparent. We have entered on the second stage of development, the period of permanent buildings, of concrete blocks, of brick store fronts, of permanent street work and of the owning of homes.

Price of Fish Rather Low.

While the price of fish is rather low during the hot months of summer, it must be remembered that a dollar is worth a good deal more in Prince Rupert today than it was a year ago. Prices have dropped very considerably, so low in fact that visitors from the south remark that there is no noticeable difference between the cost of living here and in the other coast cities. Ten cents today is equally as good as twelve cents a year ago, so far as the fishermen are concerned.

Need of Building Society Here.

The Daily News has often mentioned the need of a building society here. Yesterday W. J. Alder, whom we all know, strongly advocated the extension of operations of the Prince Rupert Housing Limited. He suggests that if shares were sold on the installment plan, and loans made to owners of shares only, there would be no difficulty in raising sufficient money locally to make a number of loans each month continuously. He says that such associations are operated almost everywhere in the United States and that towns are built in that way.

Prince Rupert Housing Limited has done excellent work in a small way and if its scope can be extended it will be an excellent thing for the city. If it does not take up the method, another association might be started which would do the work.

Value of Punctuality Not Appreciated.

The value of punctuality is not appreciated in this city. Very few people ever expect to be punctual at a meeting, to the great annoyance of those who are there on time. Yesterday at the Rotary Club Mayor Rochester gave an interesting talk on the value of punctuality and urged the members of the club to take the lead in the matter. In working for the railway for a number of years he had been impressed with the punctuality habit and had never forgotten it.

The worst feature of the habit of being late is the loss of valuable time on the part of those who are punctual. Mayor McGlymont, when at the head of the city government, always aimed to commence the proceedings on time and he succeeded very well. Aldermen were usually there because they knew the business would go on without them if they did not get there.

The busy man who gets to a meeting on time and finds no one else there and half an hour or more to wait before the proceedings commence is likely to make use of language more expressive than polite.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

EDMONTON MAN OPENS MARKET

W. G. Broomfield Proposes to Establish Wholesale and Retail Business if Warranted.

W. G. Broomfield, an Edmonton produce merchant, has opened up a store in the Ennad Block with a stock of Alberta eggs to offer to the consumers of Prince Rupert. Mr. Broomfield is a prominent merchant in Edmonton and in that city has a market in which are employed no less than 26 men, all of whom are veterans of the Great War. Mr. Broomfield himself also being a returned soldier. In Edmonton the business is confined exclusively to eggs, butter, poultry and game.

The venture in Prince Rupert is merely in the nature of an experiment, and if it proves successful a permanent wholesale and retail business will be established in the city. Shortly it is expected to bring in a stock of butter as well as eggs and dressed poultry. Coming direct from the farms of Alberta, the quality of the produce is assured.

PRIEST TAKES SEAT ITALIAN PARLIAMENT

First Since Loss of Temporal Power by Pope: Four Germans, Five Slavs.

ROME, July 15A.—The new Italian Parliament will have some striking characteristics. The provinces annexed to Italy in consequence of the great war are sending four Germans and five Slavs to their new capital to sit in the Chamber of Deputies and among the Slavs there is a priest, the Rev. Virgilio Scholz, who has been elected for the Gorizia constituency.

No priest has sat in the Chamber since 1870, when the temporal power was lost to the Pope. It was said that the Vatican had forbidden this Slav cleric member to press his candidature, but the official announcement of his selection is now published.

AVALANCHE IN RIVER INUNDATED TOWN AND CAUSED LOSS OF LIFE

IRGA, July 15.—Heavy loss of life from an unusual accident in the town of Vyernyi, Russian Turkestan, is reported from Moscow. A great avalanche from the mountain top fell into the river flowing through the town blocking the channel and causing a flood which inundated Vyernyi.

PEASANTS KILL MEN REQUISITIONING FOOD

REVAL, Estonia, July 15.—The Moscow newspaper, Economic Life, asserts that during the month of May more than 200 employees of the Bolshevik Food Department, making requisitions of food, etc., in the country, were killed by peasants or bandits.

BACHELORS TAXED \$10 IN MONTREAL

Annual Call Just Sent Out in That City with Penalty for Refusal.

MONTREAL, July 15.—The annual call on the bachelors of the city to pay \$10 toward the cost of maintaining the police, fire and other protection accorded to the citizens, is now being made by the City Clerk, Rene Bauset. Notice has been given to all bachelors liable to the tax to have their names and addresses registered at the Department of Licenses and Privileges at the City Hall, or at one of the police stations of the city on or before August 1 next.

Notice is also given to all persons, companies or corporations having in their employ bachelors liable to the tax, to file at the same office a list certified under oath of the bachelors, with their full name, occupation and address, on penalty of a fine of \$10 or two months in jail. The bachelor's tax for this year is payable on September 1 without further notice.

All bachelors who pay not less than \$10 in other taxes to the city will be exempt from the bachelor's tax for this year, but they must give in their name just the same, and then submit proof to the superintendent of Licenses and Privileges that they have paid the other taxes to the city.

PORT OF PRINCE RUPERT HAS WONDERFUL DESTINY ACCORDING TO J. F. MAGUIRE OF THIS CITY

everyday calculations of every
shop-keeper in London as well
as every merchant and farmer in
Canada.

First Class Significance.
At the same lecture another
eminent military authority said:
"The Pacific terminus of the C.
P. R. and G. T. P. railways
already more than rival in im-
portance Vladivostok and
Port Arthur and Dalny, and
those railways may at any time
surpass in military value and
any historic interest the Trans-
Siberian Railway. A glance at
the map will show the strategic
and maritime points, whether
relations with Asia be pacific
or hostile. To neglect our British
Columbia ports would be
madness; they are already of
first-class significance."

The greatest authorities in the
United States, as in England,
such as Captain Mahan, Homer
Lea and Hubert Baneroff, have
for the past twenty-five years
emphasized the immense im-
portance and value of our British
Columbia Ports in view of the
coming vast expansion of
trans-Pacific trade and travel.

Strategic Position.
It appears, therefore, that both
as regards commercial oppor-
tunities and possible interna-
tional complications on the Pa-
cific Ocean (the ocean of the
future) Prince Rupert occupies
an exceptionally favorable strate-
gic position, the contemplation
of which should cheer and stim-
ulate everyone having an inter-
est of any kind in its future.

Who can doubt that just as soon
as the necessary docking and
coaling facilities are provided
they will be availed of by the
owners of ocean-going vessels
for the transportation of mer-
chandise, and perhaps passen-
gers also, across the Pacific,
seeing that it will be the quick-
est, cheapest and safest route
available! The largest vessel
now afloat could come alongside
our new wharf at low water with
the utmost ease and safety and
find all the necessary facilities
for loading and unloading cargo
expeditiously, while at least a
day and a half could be saved in
its transportation between China
and New York or Montreal.

Time is Money.
The cargoes of silk and tea
coming regularly from China are
worth many millions of dollars,
and the advantages of saving
even one day in transit are quite
too great to be neglected by
those directly interested. Apart
from the saving of time there
would be a money saving, in in-
terest and working expenses, of
at least \$5,000 on an average
cargo. The marine insurance
rate from Oriental ports to
Prince Rupert is the same as to
Vancouver. It ought to be less,
as every experienced mariner will
testify. In this connection it
should be noted that the Japan
current runs toward the North
Pacific Coast and thus favors
shipping coming this way as
compared with more southerly
ports on this coast.

Cheerful Courage.
Now, sir, if what I have here
written is anything like correct
surely there is neither room nor
justification for gloomy fore-
bodings or dreary pessimism
regarding the future of this
highly favored port. On the
other hand are we not justified
in "putting a cheerful courage
on" during the little further pe-
riod of waiting that lies before
us, and, withal, doing our indi-
vidual best meantime to hasten
the "consummation so devoutly
wished for?"

ELECTION IN ALBERTA IS ON MONDAY

Liberals Expected to Win, But Nothing Certain Following Recent Federal Result.

EDMONTON, July 15.—While reports from the various districts throughout Alberta are somewhat confusing owing to the political bias which always accompanies reports at the time of an election, there is every reason to believe that the Liberals will be returned to power under Premier Stewart with a majority sufficient to carry on. The election by acclamation of the premier in Sedgewick, the only candidate so returned, is an indication of the political trend. Liberals have candidates in all but two of the provincial constituencies and the only real opposition is from the United Farmers, who, however, have failed to put up candidates in seventeen seats. In some of those independent candidates are running.

Encouraging Example.
Following the federal election in Moose Jaw and the immense farmer majority there recently, there is naturally a little trepidation among Liberals. The confidence of the opposition in some constituencies is having an effect.

In Edmonton and Calgary there is a full representation of Liberals, Conservatives, Independent and Labor and there are labor candidates at Lethbridge and Medicine Hat.

Outside of the big cities, the Conservatives have practically given up the fight only Clearwater, Lethbridge, Stony Plain, Wainwright and Lac Ste. Anne and Athabasca having candidates.

The election takes place on Monday but it will be late in the evening before the results are known.

BRITISH TEACHERS WILL TOUR CANADA

LONDON, July 15.—Under the auspices of the Grand Trunk Railway, eighty British school teachers will sail from Liverpool for Canada on July 30 to make a tour of the Dominion.

Certainly if more courts were provided and the people learned to play the game, it would be beneficial to all. Prince Rupert people do not have enough outside recreation and tennis, should therefore become popular if the right conditions for playing it are provided.

CAPITAL OF TURKEY IS ISOLATED

Little Business Done with Outside World and None Paying Debts.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 15.—Business is at a standstill here owing to the uncertainties of the Russian and Turkish political situations. Normally the importing and exporting centre for the Near and Middle East and partially for the Balkans, this city is now a commercial islet, its warehouses filled with merchandise of every description for which there is no market.

Everybody gives everybody else, with nobody paying bills. A financial crash would have come months ago but for the fact that no firm can afford to demand payments of its bills. To do so would throw the debtor into bankruptcy, force more unsaleable goods on the market at sacrifice prices, and the firm forcing payment would in its turn be called on to pay bills which, under present conditions it cannot meet.

There is an increasing number of trading ships going to South Russian ports, mostly British, Greek and Italian. To date, no American ship has gone, partly because of lack of trade and, in the case of Shipping Board vessels, the decision of the management not to permit any of its ships to touch Bolshevik ports.

These vessels that do go to Black Sea ports of Russia claim the ventures are failures, yet keep on going, apparently finding enough business to pay ship expenses.

Other than American tobacco buyers, many merchants find the risks of trading so great, partly because of fluctuating exchanges, that they prefer to speculate in exchange. They claim the risks are smaller. Banking business for the present consists in good part of such speculations on the part of customers.

In the face of such a situation Constantinople remains the dearest of world capitals, from the point of view of living. Retailers of food and clothing have formed practically a trust to keep up prices. They claim they bought their goods at high prices and must sell them so. As there is no such thing as price controls or public opinion here, retailers are permitted to gouge the refugee population at will.

HEAVY FINES FOR SMUGGLING

Determined Attempt By British to Prevent Sending Liquor From Bermuda to States.

HAMILTON, Bermuda, July 15.—The Colonial Parliament has just passed a special law to prevent liquor smuggling from Bermuda to the United States. Anyone putting intoxicants aboard a vessel bound to American ports incurs a fine of £25 and the penalty for a second offense is £50. Local dealers who are found to be in connivance with the law-breakers are penalized and may be deprived of their licenses.

This law, which is now in effect, was brought about thanks to the reckless manner of carrying on illicit operations during the past year. Not only were hiding places for "booze" in all parts of the ships utilized, but the smugglers went so far as to open up barrels of potatoes in the hold and insert whiskey bottles.

Injury to Trade.

Discovery of this practice led to the outcry from local produce shippers who foresaw interference with their deliveries entailing delay and money losses. The Bermudians were concerned over the possibility of having the liners held up at New York by Federal agents to the peril of legitimate trade and the interruption of tourist traffic on which local prosperity so largely depends.

The recent capture, off the Carolina coast, of a schooner with 45 barrels of whiskey loaded here at St. Georges, also had its effect in hastening legislation.
