## Famine And Cholera Rife In Russia

### GOVERNOR GENERAL ARRIVES IN CANADA TODAY FROM ENGLAND

#### Baron Byng Arrives at Quebec and Will be Sworn Tomorrow

QUEBEC, August 10.—Baron Byng of Vimy, Canada's new Governor-General, arrived this afternoon on the big C. P. R. ship Empress of France. He will be entertained privately tomorrow, when the formal swearing in will take place at the legislative buildings. The Mayor of Quebec has declared a holiday to celebrate the event.

Following the swearing in, Baron Byng will proceed to Ottawa, where he will take possession of Rideau Hall, the official residence, recently vacated by the Duke of Devonshire. The new Governor was met by a number of members of the cabinet.

#### LABOR AND SOLDIERS IN CONFERENCE

Met Provincial Cabinet Conference with Industrial and Civic Leaders.

SPRUIT, Aug. 10.—Representatives of labor and the soldiers will be called to a conference on the present situation with members of the Provincial Government next week. Following the provincial conference, a national conference with industrial and civic leaders on Monday, Attorney General announces.

#### PROUD AGAIN BRITAIN-FRANCE

BRITAIN, Aug. 10.—President of France announces that Britain and France have agreed to a compromise plan for the settlement of the Upper Silesia crisis. This agreement has cleared the tense situation and it is thought that the two nations will rapidly dispose of remaining questions before the end of the month.

#### MAYOR PUTS UP JUNIOR SHIELD

Dry Docks Are Winners This Year of Handsome Rochester Trophy.

The Rochester Shield is the latest trophy in local sporting circles. It has been put up by Mayor Harry B. Rochester for the Junior Football League series, which has already been won this season by the Dry Dock team.

The shield is a handsome affair and is made of quadruple plate silver, beautifully decorated, and mounted on a mahogany base. On it are eight smaller shields, upon which will be engraved the winners for each year.

The trophy reached the city yesterday and is now in R. W. Cameron's jewellery store, where the final touches will be put on before it is presented to its winners for this year.

#### RICKARD RENEWS LEASE ON ARENA

JERSEY CITY, Aug. 10.—Tex Rickard has renewed for one year the lease on the arena at Boyles, thirty acres in extent, and announced another world's heavyweight championship to be staged there next July. He will arrange a bout in which Dempsey will meet the most logical opponent.

### Fire Raging In Russian Oil Fields Accentuates Famine and Cholera; Lenin Makes an Appeal for Aid

LONDON, August 10.—Fires are raging at eighteen oil wells at Batum, Russia. There appears to be no means of extinguishing the great conflagration and the loss will be enormous. The disaster is the more keenly felt because of the famine and cholera in the district and the scant supply of other fuel.

PARIS, August 10.—Premier Lenin has telegraphed a relief appeal to the Socialist newspaper Humanite here, predicting the famine bids fair to approach the horror of 1891. He asks the workers and agriculturists of other countries to come to the aid of Russia as a ready means of aiding the Soviet republic.

#### FISH ARRIVALS

Boats Are Now Getting Ice and Are Clearing for Halibut Banks.

Eleven halibut boats with 115,000 pounds of fish, sold their catches at the Fish Exchange this morning. The price still continues low, the highest paid boats receiving but 8.1c. There is still a shortage of ice but several of the boats were able to get it yesterday and cleared for the banks. It is expected that the most of them will be out in the course of a day or so. For a long time there has been no ice at Ketchikan and there has been a shortage here for the past few days. The Western Packers, at Butedale, are advertising that they have plenty of ice and bait on hand at their plant.

#### BODY OF DROWNED MAN REACHES HERE

Fred Guenan Was Employee of Lakelse Hatchery—35 Years of Age.

The remains of the late Fred Guenan, who was drowned recently in Lakeise Lake, reached here last night accompanied by the widow and Constable Mansour, of Terrace. Following an inquiry by the coroner, arrangements will be made for interment here. The two witnesses of the accident, Edward Hunter and R. Neaton, also arrived.

Mr. Guenan was an employee of the Lakelse Hatchery. He was 35 years of age and was a returned soldier. He leaves to mourn his loss a widow. There were no children.

#### BRITISH WIN YACHT SERIES

Final Race by Four Points and Entire Series by Twenty-Five Margin.

COWES, Aug. 10.—The sixth and final race in the six-metre yacht series was won by the British from the Americans by four points. The British thus win the series by a margin of twenty-five points having lost in only one race.

Major J. E. Brandt arrived this morning on the Prince Rupert from Vancouver.

#### SETTLEMENT OF DISPUTE

Conciliation Board Awards Wage of 62 1/2 c Per Hour to Fish Packers.

The conciliation board in the wage dispute between the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. and the Fish-packers concluded its sessions yesterday and has sent its report to Ottawa, where official announcement of settlement will be made. The report embodies that the fish packers shall be paid 62 1/2 cents per hour with overtime proportionately. They have been receiving 67 1/2 c since last summer when a conciliation board at that time made that award. The board this time consisted of J. H. McMullin, Chairman, Col. S. P. McMorde, representing the company, and George B. Casey, for the men.

#### WINNIPEG STREET CAR MEN NEW ORGANIZATION BROKE FROM THE O. B. U.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 10.—A new street car men's organization known as the Independent Federation of Carmen was formed when a large number of the local carmen, dissatisfied with the One Big Union, organized under that name. The international has repudiated them both.

#### Professional Hockey for Alberta League During the Coming Winter; Coast Games

CALGARY, August 10.—At a meeting of the Big Four Hockey League it was decided to disband and form the Alberta Hockey League, playing out and out professional hockey. Negotiations will be entered into between the new league and the Patricks of the Coast League for a play-off.

An invasion of Eastern Canada is to be made by club scouts with a view to securing players. Many of the men who played last season are not available for the coming winter, and no attempt will be made to take any of the stars from the coast teams.

If it is found that the new league is able to secure the players and raise teams that can successfully compete against the coast teams, there should be some exciting hockey the coming winter.

#### ENGINEER DIED LAST EVENING

Death of John A. Sutherland Occurred Following an Operation—Result Railway Wreck.

After having lain in the General Hospital for three months and a half following the railroad wreck of April 22 near Salvus where he sustained serious fractures, John Angus Sutherland, engineer, passed away last night at 5 o'clock, after an operation which took place at 9 o'clock in the morning. At noon it became known that Mr. Sutherland's condition was critical and his wife and brother, Dr. C. W. Sutherland, were called to the bedside and were present when death came.

The news came as a shock to the city generally for the deceased was widely known and was very popular. Hopes for his ultimate recovery had seemed promising and the end came suddenly. The deepest sympathy of the community will go out to the widow and family in their great loss.

#### STOLE FURS BUT FAILED TO GET AWAY

MONTREAL, Aug. 10.—Thieves cut a hole through an eighteen inch brick wall and stole \$10,000 worth of furs from Lazarre Company. As the automobile, which was to carry off the booty, stalled, they had to abandon most of the haul so the loss to the company was comparatively small.

#### MANY LIVES ARE LOST IN NORTH

Famous Prospector Who Sold Eldorado Mine Believed Dead.

DAWSON, Aug. 10.—Con Van Alstyne, the famous prospector, who staked Eldorado mining claim and traded it off when it failed to pan out to the man who took two million dollars from it, was lost on a prospecting trip and is believed to be dead.

A party of unknown trappers was lost in the Black River rapids within the Arctic circle. John McLeod, a British Columbia pioneer, has been missing since March last and is believed to be dead.

#### SUPREME COUNCIL IS IN OPTIMISTIC MOOD OVER IRISH AFFAIRS

PARIS, Aug. 10.—British officials at the Supreme Council are optimistic over the possibility of an Irish peace settlement. An agreement is now believed probable following McKeown's release from prison.

#### BRITAIN VOTES LARGE SUM TO THE RAILWAYS

LONDON, Aug. 10.—The House of Commons voted for the Railway Bill, granting payment of £60,000,000 to the railways in compensation for the withdrawal of government control.

#### DROWNING FATALITY.

LOMBARDY, Aug. 10.—Five members of the family of Thomas Toohy were drowned when the father, his son and two daughters, made a heroic but ineffectual attempt to save the life of the youngest of the family at Otter Lake.

**Treaty With States  
 Is What We Need.**

What we need here is a definite treaty with the United States in regard to fishing privileges and the right of boats landing at ports of the other country and also in regard to shipments in bond and the freedom from duty of fresh fish. Such a treaty would stabilize things and we should all know where we are. To be at the mercy of some party government in power on either side of the line tends to instability. As it seems impossible just now for us to annex the United States, the next best thing we can do is to make a treaty with them. Such a treaty is not impossible and would tend to do away with friction between the countries and to make it possible for both to settle down to business.

**Right of Using  
 Canadian Ports.**

The United States has cancelled the privilege hitherto granted Canadian vessels of using American ports to land their fish and any other privileges accorded Canadian citizens and boats of Canadian registry. There is talk of Canada also cancelling privileges hitherto granted Americans. We believe that both are making a mistake. The freest possible trade relations should be fostered between the two countries and nothing whatever should be done to interfere with business coming to Canadian ports. Possibly Prince Rupert is affected more than any other port. American fishing vessels use this port all the time and we welcome them here. We do not know an American from a Canadian and our merchants value U. S. money just as highly as our own.

**Ketchikan's Efforts  
 Will Prove Abortive.**

The efforts of Ketchikan to induce Congress to pass a law discriminating against Canadian packed fish will prove abortive, because the fishermen do not want such a law. The American fishermen like to come here with their catches. They get more favorable treatment. The effect of any discriminatory law is to increase the cost of handling the fish and to make the business of catching them less profitable. The people of Juneau realize it, for they are trying to secure a steamship line to this port in order to market their fish. The Legislature of the Territory of Alaska is against any law which interferes with the free movement of fish to this port.

**What Action  
 Should We Take?**

The question is what action we should take under the circumstances? We are the most concerned of any place in Canada and yet we know little of what is going on and we take no steps toward expressing ourselves. Of course the Fishermen's Association has taken a keen interest in it, but there are others interested besides the Fishermen's Association. The fishermen themselves have never spoken so far as we know, and the business men and residents of this port have not taken the matter up.

**Government Railway  
 Or Private Corporation?**

The matter of who is to own our railways does not seem to be settled yet. The government has taken control, but the baby is so big and bulky and so expensive to feed that its foster-parent is already feeling the infant a burden. Rumors have been common here that the New York Central Railway is likely to acquire the system, and there is also talk of the Flavelle-Mackenzie interests being asked to take over the big child that the people of Canada do not want. In the meantime the government is taking every possible dollar from the people to keep up the show of owning their own transportation system. It is like living in a heavily mortgaged house where the interest is twice as heavy as rent would be.

**1000 BARRELS  
 OIL DAILY FROM  
 DISCOVERY WELL**

**Government Issues Report on  
 First Gusher in Mackenzie  
 River Basin.**

The first important government geological report on the Mackenzie River oilfields since the bringing in of the "Discovery Well" by the Imperial Oil at Fort Norman a year ago has been made public by the Dominion Government and contains much evidence of a promising nature concerning the new field. The report is signed by E. M. Kindle and T. O. Bosworth and the statement is made that "The sum of the geological evidence, together with the result of the test well, indicates an extensive oil region in which a number of oil-fields may occur. The capacity of the field are matters beyond present calculation, but they are likely to be comparable to those of other Palaeozoic oil fields."

**Cover Many Miles.**  
 The geological description of the initial well is of interest, in view of the fact given in the report that the formation in which oil was found extends up and down the Mackenzie River for many miles. The report states:

"As soon as the drill had penetrated the superficial gravel it entered the lower sandy measures of the Bosworth series continuing in them to a depth of about 225 feet.

"Almost from the outset oil was coming into the well, and before a depth of 100 feet had been reached there was a potential production, estimated at 10 barrels a day.

**Oil Was Haled.**  
 "The dark Fort Creek shales were reached at 255 feet, and continued to the bottom of the hole. In these beds, also, showings of oil were encountered almost throughout, and many barrels of oil were haled.

"At 783 feet a strong flow of oil was struck. For ten minutes a column of oil spouted from the 6-inch casing to a height of 75 feet above the derrick floor, after which the well was capped. The flow on that occasion probably exceeded 600 barrels of oil. On two subsequent occasions the valve was opened with similar results.

**Thousand Barrels Daily.**  
 "The data available do not admit of any reliable estimate of the well's capacity. It seems likely that the yield may be nearly 1,000 barrels a day. Increased production may be obtained when the well is deepened. It is considered that the Beavertail limestones have not been reached.

"Whether this first well will yield a steady production or not is at present quite uncertain; but it has already demonstrated the prospect of important oil fields in the region.

"The crude oil from the well is of light color, low specific gravity, high gasoline content, and low cold test."

In commercial terms the oil consists of:

Galolene	22.5
Illuminating oil	38.5
Light lubricants	33.9
Medium lubricates	4.1

Sheriff Shirley and his brother George, have made a little Eden of their two city lots on Taylor Street where they have a plantation of cherry trees, strawberries, peas, cauliflowers and maples. The garden was produced out of the raw muskeg.



**Daily Sight-Seeing Trips.**

From this point the party took daily trips by air to the surrounding scenes. One day was spent in viewing the glacier from the air, a wonderful sight from this vantage point. Another day was spent in circling about Cameron Lake and Lost Lake while the surrounding country was thoroughly covered by air in the seven days of camping. On the route up Mr. Hubbard landed at Port Alberni for gasoline, and flew on to the lake without further stop. During the camp Mr. Hubbard came back to town for his mail flights.

**Over Buttle's Lake.**

The party also flew over Buttle's Lake and the surrounding territory. Many fine views of the wonderful scenery, taken from the air were secured, and will form a wonderful collection of aerial photographs of Vancouver Island. A particularly fine photograph of Mount Alberni was obtained, and is now being enlarged. ## MOUNTIES FIND ILLICIT STILL

Island in Saskatchewan River is Location of Distiller's Den.

EDMONTON, Aug. 9.—On a wooded island in the middle of the Saskatchewan River about fifty miles east of the city Royal Canadian Mounted Police have discovered a fully equipped still, apparently used for the illicit manufacture of spirits and a quantity of the product. Their arrest of Nick Lypowyk who was found lurking in the vicinity of the still has given rise to criminal court proceedings against him, as he denies all knowledge of the ownership of the machinery and says that he never in all his life manufactured a drop of liquor.

**Watched Day and Night.**

For five days and five nights Sergt. Spriggs and Constable McLaughlin and Moeen camped out on the banks of the Saskatchewan river near the village of Ginea in order to trace the alleged distiller to his den on the uninhabited island and trap him in his act of producing the moonshine. They began their vigil on the twenty-fifth day of July and on the second day they observed Nick Lypowyk rowing a boat from the mainland to the island where he beached the boat and cast something ashore, then having observed the red coats made the pretence of fishing. The constables marked the spot where accused's boat had landed and in the darkness of the night swam the river and secreted themselves on the island and discovering foot marks and a faint trail they were led to the place where they found the fully equipped still and a quantity of liquor which had the appearance of having been recently manufactured.

**Finally Got "Visitor"**

For several days there was no movement to or from the island. No one approached the still or came to claim it until July 30th while constable Moeen was left alone on the island, the other to men having gone to the mainland. The accused came to visit the scene. Crawling on his hands and knees through the thick underbrush he approached the still and Constable Moeen who was in hiding quite near accosted him and made his identity as an officer of the law known to him.

**Offered Bribes.**

At this point, according to the court evidence, a fifty dollar bribe was offered the stalwart policeman and the two men rowed to the mainland to get it, the constable agreeing to the arrangement in order that he might secure the betrayal of the accused into the hands of his fellow officers. The fifty dollars were secured and turned over to Sergeant Spriggs, who was in charge of the scouting party. The bills were exhibited in the court as evidence against the accused.
