Fire Visits Port Simpson Again

IRISH ARE CONSIDERING PEACE TERMS AT DUBLIN TODAY

Doctor's Residence Destroyed Flames Nearly Wiped Out Hospital at Old Indian Town

The residence of Dr. William Sager, medical superintendent at the Port Simpson Hospital, was totally destroyed and the hospital was seriously threatened by a fire which broke out about 9 o'clock this morning and showed indications for a while of spreading to serious proportions. Fortunately, by 12 o'clock the blaze was under control, with no fire left but the smouldering embers where Dr. Sager's home formerly stood.

The exact origin of the blaze is not known, but it is believed that it was started by sparks from the chimney dropping on the roof of the destroyed house. As everything was very dry, this building was soon entirely in flames as well as the bush surrounding. The hospital caught fire, but feverish work with four or five hose pipes and blankets on the roof saved it with little damage being done. All preparations, however, were made to vacate it.

A water dam was recently put in at the hill back of the hospital, and a very good pressure was obtainable through the pipes from it, thus making possible the efficient fighting of today's fire. Dr. Sager's home was totally destroyed, although some of the furniture was saved. The total damage as a result of the fire will likely be in the neighborhood of \$3,500. The hospital was covered, by insurance but the house was not.

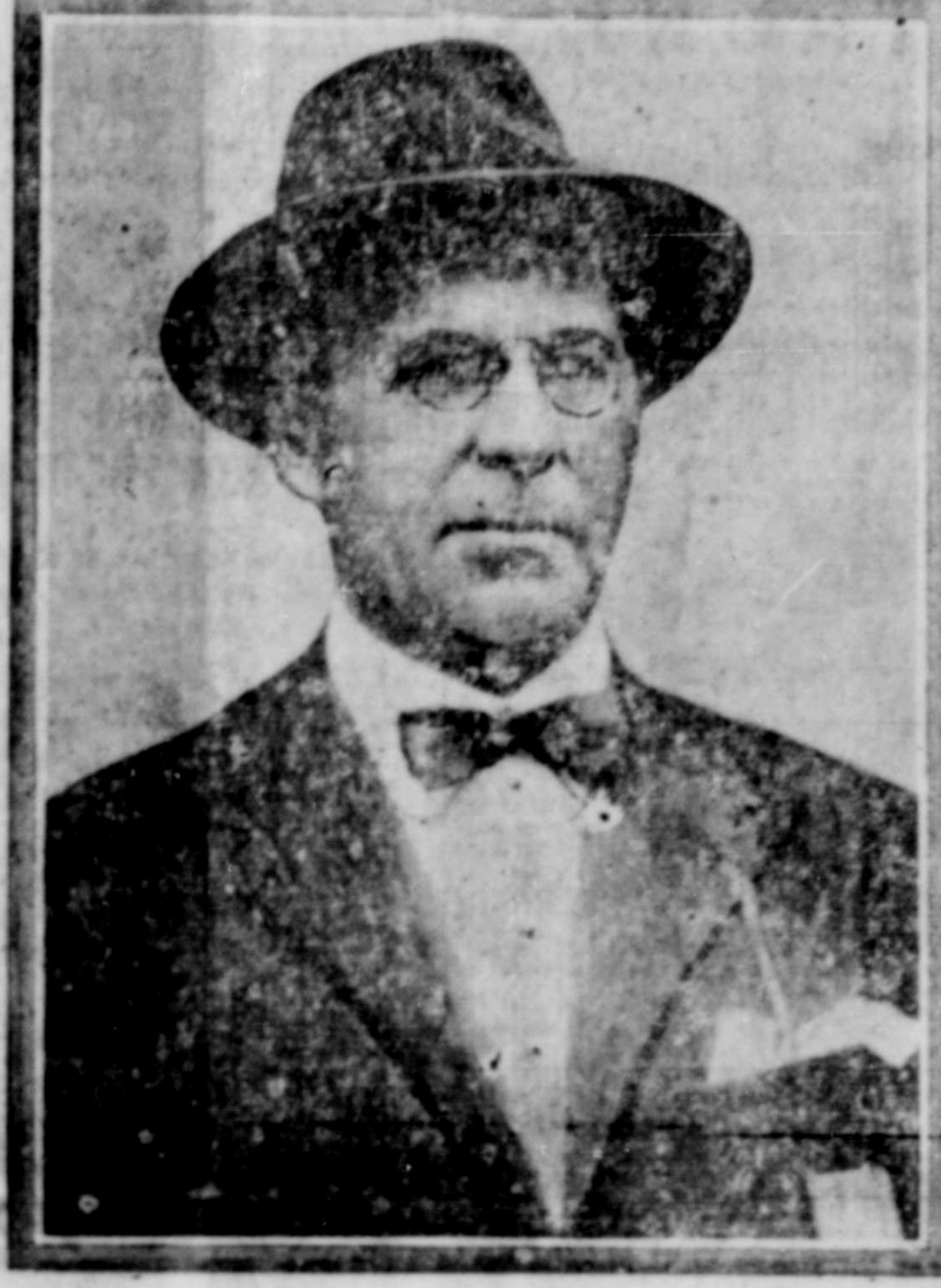
FIRE CAUSED BY EXPLOSION

Peace Proposals Are Being Considered at Dublin Today by Valera and Republicans

DUBLIN, July 25.—The Irish peace proposals made by Premier Lloyd George to De Valera in London last week have been taken up by the republican leader with his cabinet today in the Mansion House.

LONDON, July 25.—The statement in regard to the Irish peace negotiations, which it was hoped Lloyd George would make in the House of Commons today, will not be forthcoming, the Premier saying in reply to questions that he hoped to be in a position to make a statement shortly.

The Premier's inability to make a statement of the terms offered the Irish was due to the fact that De Valera and his colleagues are still considering the peace proposals.

The Daily Mail says the Government will release from jail all Sinn Fein members of parliament held in detention so that they may attend the republican parliament when the peace offer is being considered. This is in answer to a request said to have been made by De Valera.

The fire burned for three hours and it was only the fact that there was not a breath of wind that saved the rest of the town. Arrivals from Hyder last night describe the flames and smoke from the burning hotel as making a straight column into the air. Many residents of Stewart rushed over to Hyder and did much work fire fighting before the fire had entirely died down, the tide had risen below and the burning embers were then thrown into the sea.

It was known that the man Fred Card, had become entrapped in the blaze and search for him was made as soon as possible. His remains were discovered, terribly charred in the ashes near where his bed had fallen, by Dr. Davis and W. Dunn. Deceased was a cook at the Premier mine and his funeral took place yesterday afternoon. Two other persons received minor injuries when they jumped from the upper storeys of the hotel, other means of exit having been made impossible.

RAILWAYS REFUSE ARBITRATE WAGES

Head of Railwaymen's Brotherhood Claims Right to Have Claims Passed On.

OTTAWA, July 25.—The Canadian National and Grand Trunk Railway managements have refused to submit the question of wage reductions to an arbitration board, according to A. R. Mosher, president of the Railwaymen's Brotherhood, who claims the right of arbitration on behalf of the workers.

SILESIAN COMPROMISE FRANCE AND ENGLAND

Briand Agrees to Calling of Supreme Council to Consider Matter.

PARIS, July 25.—A compromise has been effected between France and Britain on the question of Silesia. Premier Briand of France will probably submit to the calling of a meeting of the Supreme Council the first week in August and will withdraw the demand for a meeting of Silesia experts.

British University Men Beaten by Americans at Cambridge on Saturday

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., July 25.—The American college men beat the British in the university athletic meet here on Saturday. Harvard-Yale won a majority of the track and athletic events, beating Oxford-Cambridge in the 100-yard dash, running high jump, 120-yard high hurdles, broad jump, two-mile run, half-mile, putting the 16-pound shot, throwing the 16-pound hammer.

The only wins of the visitors were the quarter-mile dash and the mile run.

Former Meets.

The meet was the fifth staged between the international rivals. Oxford and Cambridge won the first set of games held at the Queen's Club, Kensington, England, in 1899, 5 events to 4, first places only counting. Harvard and Yale won the second meet, held at the famous Berkeley Oval in New York City, Sept. 25, 1901. The score was 6 events to 3. The Americans were victors in 1904 when they defeated the English collegians at the Queens Club, again by a score of 6 to 3. In 1911, when the games were held for the third time at the Queen's Club grounds, Oxford and Cambridge evened the score by winning 5 to 4.

Americans in Lead.

Harvard and Yale teams lead in the number of points scored, 20 to 16, the Englishmen on both victorious occasions barely nosing out the wearers of the Crimson and the Blue, but the individual performances of the Britons in previous meets have surpassed those of the Americans, the records show. Previous to this year, Harvard athletes established records for two events, the hurdles and the 100-yard dash and Yale only one, the high jump, while Oxford has made the best marks in three events, the two-mile run, the hammer throw and the broad jump, and Cambridge leads in four events, the 440-yard run, the half mile, one mile and three mile races. The three mile has been run only once in

OTTAWA, July 25.—The Canadian railways in 1920 experienced one of the most unfavorable years in their history, states the preliminary report. The ratio of operating expenses to operating revenue was 97.17 per cent, in 1920 against 92.2 for 1919.

LIBRARY FOR THIS CITY

Address in Methodist Church Last Night Advocates Getting Busy.

The need of a public library in Prince Rupert and possible means of obtaining one was the subject of an address given last night in the Methodist Church by the pastor, Rev. Hacker, in which attention was drawn to the fact that British Columbia generally was without public libraries, there being only three in existence in the province, in Ontario on the other hand there were 400 libraries.

The suggestion for getting a library for Prince Rupert was that the policy in vogue in California and other places might be adopted. By the expenditure of \$500 a year 4,000 books could be secured from Vancouver, 1,000 each three months. Transportation of these each way would have to be paid and, in the event of special books being ordered by mail, the postage would have to be paid.

The speaker advocated the matter being taken up by the church and fraternal societies, a special appeal being made on some particular day for books. In this way he thought from 500 to 1,000 books could be obtained as a nucleus.

Mr. Hacker mentioned that Prince George has taken the matter up with Vancouver and was adopting the plan. He thought that by making an addition to the present reading room or by securing the Red Cross Hut, something might be done. A public library was a very desirable institution and some steps should be taken this autumn to get one.

Value of Rain Difficult to Estimate.

Some people think that the only value of rain is to make the crops grow. If it were we might be poor in this neighborhood. Rain has a value, however, much greater than its irrigating value, so far as this district is concerned. Rain is one of the chief sources of power in the North country, and the muskeg which we so heartily dislike is the means of conserving the rain in such a way that it gets away gradually into the streams. Some people grumble at the conditions under which they live. Others capitalize the conditions and draw interest on them. This is what we can do here. We have some fine water powers in this part of the world caused by the abundant precipitation, and the thing to do is to cash in on them. They have no value as long as they go to waste. Harness them and they at once become useful.

Move Industries To Pacific.

Says Douglas Spencer, writing in an English publication: "Goal is a wasting, water a non-wasting asset." He declares that throughout the Empire there will be without doubt a movement of industries to localities where cheap power is available. Britons must prepare for this at once, many people think.

"When the iron industry moved from the locality of Ashburnham in the south to that of Middlesbrough in the north it was not disastrous to the British people. When the steel industry moves from the Middlesbrough district to the coast behind the Queen Charlotte Islands, and when the shipping industry moves from the Tyne to the Fraser and the deep-water inlets to the north of it, will the British nation suffer?"

"But a preliminary question has to be asked: Will British capital remove the sites and will British people operate the industries? I think that the answer to the duplex question is in the affirmative. This being so, will the British suffer? To this question I have no hesitation in asserting that the British will not suffer. On the contrary, it can be declared that Great Britain and the British nations will benefit and that the world will benefit."

Sees a New Industrial Centre.

"I see in the near future a vast number of British people living in comfortable and healthy towns and hamlets adjacent to the greatest hive of industry the world has ever seen. In order of assets first take the islands, the natural breakwaters, behind which are hundreds of miles of deep, still water, untroubled by the gales of the Pacific; then proceed along the still channels and up the quiet inlets where a ship can tie up to a thousand-year-old spruce and yet have fathoms of water beneath her keel; step ashore and begin to climb the mountains behind, first penetrating the primeval forest (for a specimen of the trees, vide the flag-staff in Kew Gardens); take your hammer, where you see some fall of rock has exposed a body of ore and break off a piece containing copper, or note the iron-stained soil; perhaps, too, a few specimens of burlamine may be taken as indicators of tin.

Displacing The Atlantic.

"Finally, stand on one of the high summits and listen to the roar of rushing streams and waterfalls beneath you, the force of the non-wasting asset. Get shining glimpses of cascades to right and left of you as far as you can see, feel the soft breeze pleasantly warmed by the Japanese current, which here washes full up against the coast and bends northward again. Throw your thoughts inland, too, and realize that behind the height on which you are standing are thousands of acres of coal lands ready for the chemist's art.

"I can see this and much more. I see the people are as British in the new location as the people who moved from Ashburnham to the north. I see benefit to the world because this race, established on the British Columbian coast, will help the Australians, the New Zealanders and the rest to maintain the peace of the Pacific Ocean, the ocean which is to outstrip the Atlantic in trade as the Mediterranean as the most busy sea in the world."

PREPARING TO SHIP ORE FROM MINE AT HYDER

Fish Creek Property Being Rapidly Developed and Will Ship in Autumn.

Activity at the Fish Creek mining properties is reported by mining men who came south from Stewart last night. W. B. Tonkin of Seattle is developing his property rapidly, twenty men being employed there under Harry Tanner, manager; ore is being taken out and as soon as the snow comes regular shipments are expected to be made from this mine. It is silver-gold ore and is just as rich as that taken from the Premier mine, according to all reports. The question of the quantity of ore is the only thing about which there is doubt, no diamond drilling having been done to prove the property.

There are nine men working on the Benson property at Fish Creek and a bunch of men are developing the properties at the Marmot River. Dr. McKechnie and H. Crawford McGee have been there looking the prospects over and they are particularly pleased with the showings.

BRING SKELETONS FROM THE NORTH

Thirty-three Remains of Eskimos Taken to Halifax from North of Mackenzie.

HALIFAX, July 25.—Thirty-three Eskimo skeletons arrived in Halifax from the Far North recently for examination and measurement on behalf of the Canadian Government by Dr. John Cameron, Professor of Anatomy at Dalhousie University. The skeletons have been brought from the land of snows by the Canadian Arctic Expedition party which has spent five years in Canada's frigid zone studying the customs, languages and the characteristics of the Eskimo race. They were found in the region north of the Mackenzie River.

Dr. Cameron estimates that upwards of three years will be required to complete the study of the skeletons and make the thousands of measurements necessary. The greater part of the work will be devoted to the skulls and the peculiarities of their formation. When completed the information obtained from the examinations will be published by Dr. Cameron. The book will be a standard work of reference on the physical characteristics of the Eskimo race. A special study of the teeth of the skeletons will be made by Dr. S. G. Ritchie of Halifax.

PREMIER MILL IS READY FOR OPERATION

President Wood Returns After Visit of Inspection at Northern Camp.

R. W. Wood of Fernie, president of the Premier mine, who passed through southbound last night reports that the mill at the Premier is ready for operation. It has turned over but no quantity of ore has yet been put through it. The capacity of the mill is 100 tons a day and it is expected it will be in operation without interruption very soon. While in Stewart, Mr. Wood inspected the Red Cliff mine which he and his associates recently bonded and which they expect great things from.

Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

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YUKON GOLD ENGINEER HAS GONE SOUTH

Says Shortage of Hard Rock Miners in Yukon—Mayo Is Tent City.

That sufficient development work has been done to warrant the declaration that the Keno Hill section of the Mayo District will produce high grade ore for several years, but that nothing has yet been uncovered that assures sustained production of large tonnage for a long period of years is the declaration of James O. Greenan, engineer in charge of the Yukon Gold Corporation's operations there. The Yukon Gold Corporation has done several thousand feet of development work and is pushing the work as fast as possible with the facilities at its command. It has shipped 2,500 tons of high grade ore this year, and it is preparing for mining for shipment next year.

Labor Shortage at Mayo.
Mr. Greenan, who has gone south on a holiday, says there is a shortage of hard rock miners in Mayo District. The prevailing wages there are \$5 a day with board and lodging. The district is attracting a great number of people from other sections of Yukon Territory, and many former Yukoners have returned to the Territory to prospect or work in that country. Mayo is becoming quite a town. Tents are going up every where and many good cabins have been built. Mayo is the terminus of river navigation for the mining district. Keno is the town in the actual mining field, and there conditions, as far as the town are concerned, are similar to those at Mayo. Mr. Greenan says there are now 300 or 400 people in the district.

Longest Shipment of Ore.
Mr. Greenan says the Yukon Gold Corporation is shipping its ore to the Shelby Smelter at San Francisco via St. Michael, a distance of 5,000 miles. It is the longest distance any mine in the world is shipping crude ore for treatment. Through a special permit the Canadian Government made Mayo a sub-port of entry and permitted American vessels to come up the river and take the ore on at that place and carry it to St. Michael. Here it will be transferred to ocean vessels for shipment to San Francisco.

Again Next Year.
The Yukon Gold Corporation will take out ore again next winter for shipment. It will be mined during the summer, fall and winter, and transported to the landing at Mayo over the ice and snow. The company is now working 25 men and would work more if they were available.

The Yukon Government has a crew of men working on the road, which will make the transportation of the ore less difficult in the near future than it was last winter.

New Finds Reported.
New finds of ore have been made in various sections of the Mayo district this summer, according to Mr. Greenan. The Titus Dredging Company is working a crew of men on High-Creek, and it and other companies and individuals may ship ore next year.

Taylor, Drury and Pedlar of Whitehorse have recently established a new general store at Mayo, and it is reported to be doing well.

Permanent Camp.
Those developing in the Mayo district are strongly in hope that one or more bodies of ore of such extent as to guarantee a large tonnage may be discovered, and engineers are of the opinion that the indications that such will result are favorable.

MORE FISH ARE TAKEN

Conditions on the Skeena Improving But Far From Good Pack Expected.

Fishing improved a little toward the week end on the Skeena River, boats getting an average of about 30 fish each, owing to the bad weather last week a number of fishermen did not go out every day but better conditions are expected during the remainder of the run. The pack this year is bound to be small however. Inverness pack to date is 4,300 cases but most of the other canneries have not put up that many.

Cohoos are coming pretty steadily now and some fairly good catches are reported at Dundas Island. Unless there is a big run of cohoos the fish run this year is likely to be far below the average and this seems to be about what the canners want owing to the glut of the market. In Alaska the market is much worse than it is here, with the result that salmon are being brought here from Alaskan waters and sold to local canners.

Reports from some of the canneries indicate that a number of the fishermen are in debt for outfit and maintenance to the cannery stores and that unless there is a marked change in the next week or two they will finish the season in debt.

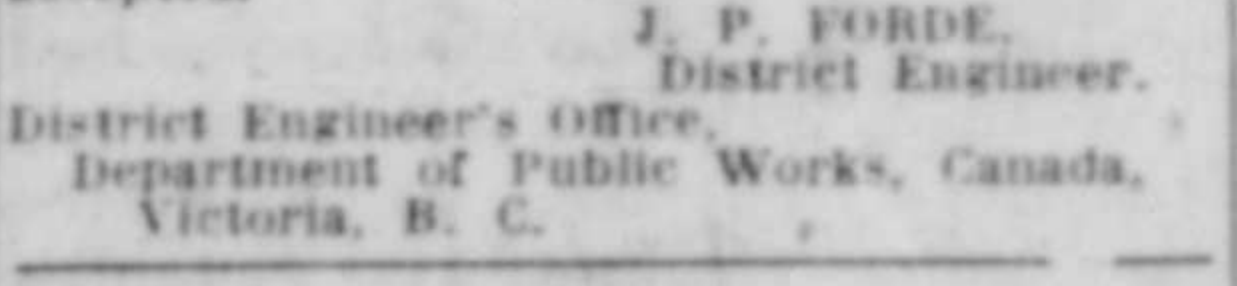

CROP REPORT GOOD FOR WEST

East Suffered From Heat and Drought and Crops There Are Light.

The Bank of Montreal crop report indicates that on the prairies the crops will be generally good, but the Eastern province they are very light. In this province the crops are heavy everywhere. The report follows:

Edmonton District—Sufficient moisture, wheat practically all headed out. Oats and barley coming on well. Hay doing better than usual.

Calgary District—Prospects north half district better owing to rains since last report, south half not so good; fair crop but less than average expected in whole district. Some damage by hail. Hay short crop.

Lethbridge District—All wheat headed. Estimated average yield 12 bushels. Should increase with favorable weather. Late rains being good, first cutting of alfalfa excellent. Prairie hay short but no fear feed shortage.

Regina Districts—Prospects above average except extreme west district where suffering from drought. Hail damage above average. Cutting will start in two weeks.

Saskatoon District—Wheat and oats doing well and former nearly all headed. Prospects good except in few districts which suffered from drought. Scattered hail losses reported.

Winnipeg District—While crops have suffered slightly from heat there have been beneficial showers. Crops maturing rapidly and early harvest with satisfactory yields expected.

Province of Quebec. Indications point to a light crop. Hay probably 50 per cent of the normal. Cereals, root crops and grass pasture have been improved by recent rains but still need moisture.

Province of Ontario. The prolonged dry weather has checked growth and only moderate crops are now expected. General conditions have been somewhat improved by recent rains, although they came too late to be of benefit to a large percentage of crops. Cutting and threshing of wheat is now in full progress. While in some localities, notably around Guelph and Paris, returns of over forty bushels per acre are reported, in other districts the crop is poor and on the whole it will probably be barely an average crop. Other grains are likely to show a light yield; they are short in straw and are ripening prematurely. Hay crop varies generally satisfactory. Small fruits show fair returns. Roots and tobacco are doing well. Pasture is short and dry. More rain is required.

Maritime Provinces. Crops generally are still greatly in need of moisture although recent rains have improved prospects. Hay is expected to be light. Root crops are generally fair. Grass pasture generally is poor. Conditions in Prince Edward Island have been improved by recent rains.

Province of British Columbia. Hay cutting nears completion. Crop heavy throughout. Grains heading out well and indications point to a full crop. Roots continue satisfactory progress. Tomato prospects now excellent. Apples, large and well colored; other fruits developing satisfactorily. Cherry movement at peak and quality good.
