## Big Settlement Scheme Stuart Lake DEFINITE SCHEME IS BEING DISCUSSED BY IRISH CONFERENCE

### James Craig to Consult With Members of Conference Regard to Ulster Boundary

LONDON, Nov. 4.—Sir James Craig, Premier of Ulster, has received the Government invitation to consult as to Ulster's attitude toward the proposals regarding the boundary between Ulster and the south of Ireland. Other questions involved in the Irish settlement are to be discussed with Lloyd George and the cabinet committee on one side and the Sinn Fein delegation on the other. The Sinn Fein delegates led by De Valera have submitted specific terms which the Government thinks feasible if the Government of Ulster agrees to them. Sir James has so far taken the stand that there must be no interference with her rights as at present constituted and that no settlement which changed her status could be considered. Before the meeting of the Sinn Fein delegates with Lloyd George, Sir James Craig expressed a desire to be present in order to represent the interests of Ulster. This was ignored until such time as a settlement had been arrived at. Specific terms have been arrived at and it seems as if a settlement of the vexed question is in sight.

#### ASSASSINATION OF JAPAN'S PREMIER STABBED IN BREAST

TOKIO, Nov. 4.—The people of this city were shocked today with the news that Premier Hara had been assassinated. He was stabbed in the breast today at the railroad station in this city. Kei Hara became premier on September 30, 1918, and held the position of minister of justice as well as first minister.

#### FIVE KILLED IN JERUSALEM

Arabs Attacked Jewish Quarters and Fightline Ensued with Fatal Results.

JERUSALEM, Nov. 4.—Five persons were killed—four Jews and one Arab, and thirteen others were wounded in a racial dispute which arose here yesterday. There has been a feeling of irritation here for some time between the Jews and the Arabs, the latter feeling rather keenly the change of administration from Mohammedan to Christian. So keen became the dispute between the factions that the Arabs attacked the Jewish quarters and a fight ensued resulting in five fatalities.

#### LADY LAURIER LAIL TO REST

Several Thousand People Attended the Funeral of Distinguished Lady.

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—This morning several thousand people attended the funeral of Lady Laurier in Notre Dame cemetery, the mourners including many of the most distinguished men of the country. The procession was a large one and many thousands lined the streets. The body was laid to rest side by side with that of Lady Laurier's late eminent husband in a sheltered knoll in Notre Dame cemetery.

#### GRAIN INQUIRY WILL PROCEED

Court of Appeal Decides Commission is Legally Constituted Body.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 4.—The Manitoba court of appeal has decided that the Royal grain inquiry commission is a legally constituted body and entitled to proceed with its investigation of the Canadian grain business. The court delivered judgment this morning. This judgment dissolves the injunction which restrained the commission from going on with its investigation.

#### Thousand Families for Stuart Lake District Arranged by Pattullo

VICTORIA, Nov. 4.—Yesterday Hon. T. D. Pattullo told the Legislature that arrangements had been made through the British Government to bring one thousand families from Great Britain to settle in the Stuart Lake country in Northern British Columbia on a 200,000-acre land reserve north of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway.

While overseas Mr. Pattullo submitted the scheme to Alfred Bigland, chairman of the British parliamentary committee, for the formation of a non-profit-making organization, offering the land for sale to settlers at a classified price, and promising that every dollar obtained from the sale of the land be spent in schools and roads. The committee accepted the offer.

#### FOUR-YEAR-OLD SWIMMING PRODIGY.



Richard Hendrick of Los Angeles, champion juvenile swimmer of the Pacific coast, has won three medals for his aquatic performances, although only four years old. He got one for swimming at the age of one.

#### Oliver Invites Members of Legislature to Bring Out Evidence of Wrongdoing

VICTORIA, Nov. 4.—Premier Oliver yesterday closed the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne. He promised that definite charges against the Government would be probed. He accused Mr. Bowser of misrepresenting facts and misleading the people. The Government was faced with a big task and confronted with huge financial obligations, but he wished to shelter no wrongdoers.

The Premier said he would not seek to punish his colleagues or Government officials unless evidence of wrongdoing was submitted. He could not suppose a man guilty because no attempt had been made to prove his innocence. He invited the members to speak out if they had actual knowledge of wrong doing.

#### Nicomon Island.

The Legislature voted on the Gatherwood motion which expressed regret at the Government's attitude to the petition of the Nicomon Island settlers on the Dike question. The motion was defeated by 26 to 42. The labor members did not vote.

Mr. Farris declared that no responsibility rested with the Government which had done its best in the Nicomon district in contrast with the former Government which did nothing at all. Mr. Farris said a permanent policy must be worked out between the Federal and Provincial authorities.

#### High Power Wireless at Vancouver to Communicate Direct with Prince Rupert

VANCOUVER, Nov. 4.—The big high-power wireless station, announcement of the building of which was made in the summer by G. J. Desbarats, deputy minister of naval service, during the time of his visit here, is to be erected on the west shore of Lulu Island, it is understood here. This will be the most powerful station on the coast and will be used for long distance messages. So powerful will it be that it is expected to communicate direct with stations as far away as Prince Rupert and Southern Alaska in the north and with Honolulu in the west.

This station is to be the first of a series which will be part of the Empire wireless chain. It is impossible to erect it at Point Grey because of the interference with messages sent by the instrument there now. Experiments have been conducted with a view to securing a site that would show the least possible interference and yet be near enough for telephone communication with the city. Lulu Island is the place chosen, it is believed.

When Mr. Desbarats was in Prince Rupert last summer he stated that the installation of the Point Grey high power station would later be followed by the placing of a similar station at or near Prince Rupert, in order that there might be direct communication between this port and Vancouver by wireless. At present it is necessary to relay messages. This takes time and is expensive and tends to inaccuracy.

#### KILLED BY TRUCK IN FOG AT VICTORIA

W. A. Rountree Stepped off Sidewalk and Was Run Down by Vehicle.

VICTORIA, Nov. 4.—W. A. Rountree, 45 years of age, stepped from the sidewalk into the fog yesterday and was killed by a passing motor truck.

#### LEGISLATORS TAKE HOLIDAY

Adjourned Last Night Until Tuesday Next for Thanksgiving Celebration.

VICTORIA, Nov. 4.—The call of Thanksgiving turkey was so strong yesterday that the members of the Legislature decided to adjourn so that those living within a short radius of the capital might visit their homes for Thanksgiving Day. The work of the session has been pushed forward with greater speed than usual and the members were quite ready for a short holiday. Committee meetings and caucus meetings and receptions of delegates in addition to the regular sessions of the House have been giving the ministers a very strenuous time.

#### GOVERNMENT GIVES \$10,000 AID SUFFERERS

Britannia Relief Fund Gets Substantial Gift by Big Donation.

VICTORIA, Nov. 4.—Announcement was made in the Legislature yesterday that the Provincial Government would grant the sum of \$10,000 toward the relief fund being raised for the sufferers by the Britannia Beach flood disaster. Many families are left destitute owing to the wage earner having been lost. Children are without parents and many who were saved have neither furniture nor household goods left. Some again are in the hospital. A fund is being raised to relieve the suffering and contributions are already being made for that purpose.

#### FINE MEETING AT BURNS LAKE

Fred Stork Continues Triumphant Tour Through Bulkley Valley.

BURNS LAKE, Nov. 4.—There was a fine meeting of Burns Lake people and people from all the surrounding district to hear Fred Stork and F. T. Congdon discuss the issues of the day. Naturally the railway policy came in for a good deal of criticism on the part of the speakers and met with an instant response.

At the close of the meeting Mr. Stork was assured by those present that he would get a handsome majority from this district on election day. It was apparent that the people wanted an opponent of the present Government in Parliament to represent this district.

#### ON FIRE OFF NOVA SCOTIA

Large Vessel Burning 400 Miles Southeast of Halifax Yesterday.

HALIFAX, Nov. 3.—A large vessel which has not yet been identified is on fire 400 miles southeast of Halifax, according to a message from the British Tanker Saxoleine, received by the Canadian naval branch here. There were no signs of the crew and it is assumed that they have escaped. All the vessels in the neighborhood are steaming to the assistance of the burning craft.

**Must Defeat Present Government.**  
 One thing necessary at the present time is to defeat the Meighen Government. If Fred Stork is elected he will vote to turn out the Government, but should his opponent be returned his record indicates that he is likely to vote with them. At any rate it is true that all the Conservative forces are behind the independent candidate. Not one is with Stork, so far as can be ascertained.

The Liberal party is the party that put Prince Rupert on the map. It is the party that staked its future on the building of the G. T. P. Railway, and it is the party that will do things for this port and for the whole district if ever anything is to be done. Stork goes to Ottawa as a Liberal, not a hidebound Liberal, but a Liberal who will support the Mackenzie King Government just as long as they stand for Liberal principles and as long as they do the right thing by this district.

The Conservatives in this city believe that by supporting Colonel Peck they will perpetuate the Meighen rule. They believe that by doing so they will continue in power the Government which stands for high protection, for the present system of railway administration, and if they are sincere they must know, too, that it means the sidetracking of Northern British Columbia.

**Backed by Forces of Conservatism.**  
 Unfortunately it is necessary to place Colonel Peck because he is before the people under such curious circumstances. He was a consistent supporter of Premier Meighen up to the end of last session, voting with him on every important occasion and voting against any proposals made by the leaders of the Liberal party. Now he states that he is an independent, but he is supported by the same group. He is behind him all the force of the Conservatives who look to defeat Mackenzie King and the other Liberals by defeating Fred Stork.

There is but one thing for all true reformers to do at the present time. There is but one man to vote for, and that man is Fred Stork. There is no alternative if they are sincere. He is as independent as anyone when the interests of the district are at stake, but he is pledged to the principles of Liberalism and will be associated with such men as Mackenzie King, Lemieux, Fielding, and that clever French-Canadian, Ernest Lapointe, who gave such a splendid address here a year ago.

**Has Visited Prince Rupert.**  
 Mackenzie King and his associates have been here. They have seen the condition of affairs, they have heard the complaints of the local people, and they have promised that if returned to power they will right many of our wrongs. What more could we ask? Has Meighen ever been here?

**Vital Interest in Election.**

Prince Rupert and the mining camps and the interior farming districts are intensely interested in this election. They see that by making a change they have everything to gain and nothing to lose. They have not only a principle at stake but their personal interest is also at stake. If the Liberals are elected and the railway put on its feet the whole district will benefit. We depend on the railway for our very life. Without it we cannot exist, and on its progress and success depend the progress and success of Prince Rupert and the whole adjacent territory. That then is the issue. Let others fight over the tariff. Let Meighen try to tie down the effete East to the tariff issue. The issue with us is the railway—the lifeblood of Prince Rupert, the progress of the district.

If Prince Rupert makes progress it will become a valuable market for the interior farming districts. If Prince Rupert makes progress there will be a good railway service for all the country. If Prince Rupert makes progress the mining camps of the North will be better served than they are today. They will get better transportation, better roads, better public improvements. Everything depends on the railway, and the railway depends on the defeat of the incompetent Meighen Government and the election in their place of a group of men who will listen to our requests and who will be interested in seeing this port the thriving place it was planned to be when it was conceived by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Charles M. Hays.

**LEARN MUSIC IN SCHOOLS**

That is Suggestion to School Board from H. C. Bailey of This City.

Members of the school board have received a letter from H. C. Bailey in regard to teaching music in the schools. The department of education provide an outline of a musical course for use in the public and high schools and it is understood that the supervising principal is keen on having the work started here. In all the larger cities they have musical instruction and even at Ketchikan music is taught in connection with the public school. Mr. Bailey says in part: "To what extent is Music considered an instrument of culture in this city?"

The purpose of this letter is to claim for music a prominent place in the ordinary educational life of the Community, to awaken some interest which may develop into some serious music endeavor and to arouse discussion concerning the possibility of appointing a musical supervisor for the public schools of this city.

**Music a Necessity.**  
 "The elimination of Music from the homes, hall and churches of our city, would bring about a condition that is unthinkable, which merely proves how great a necessity music is."

"The necessities of life—are those things which are required to satisfy our physical, mental and spiritual wants, therefore music is a necessity. Whatever form of society of tomorrow may take, the school children of today will be its leaders and followers, and if, as one philosopher says, 'the city of the future is to be a city of music,' they, the children, must learn to sing and play their part to render harmony out of discord."

"Music in the public schools has become an indispensable requirement and has come to stay as part of the curriculum. How best to meet conditions has often been a serious problem, for which a knowledge of harmony is essential. Harmony is to music what grammar is to language."

Mr. Bailey then goes on to outline a course of study which he would recommend.

**KILLED COUGAR WITH BIG ROCK**

Animal Was Savage and Attacked Hunter at Valdez Island.

CAMPBELL RIVER, B. C., Nov. 4.—Armed only with rocks, Dave Vanstone, well known Vancouver lumberman, recently killed a large cougar, infuriated as a result of a rifle wound, at Valdez Island.

Mr. Vanstone was in his row-boat skirting a timber claim when he heard calls from a hunter in the woods. Landing, he found that a settler had fired his last cartridge and that the cougar, wounded, was showing fight and acting in a most ferocious manner.

Mr. Vanstone armed himself with two rocks and was fortunate enough to land hard with one of these on the animal's nose. The cougar was momentarily stunned and Vanstone quickly crushed its skull with a larger rock. The hunter who fired the first shot, however, will collect the bounty. The cougar was eight feet six inches long and easily the largest ever killed in the district.

**GERMANY GETS BACK HER TRADE**

Tonnage Entering Hamburg is 80 Per Cent Former Peace Traffic.

HAMBURG, Nov. 4.—German's ocean freight-carrying trade is making steady progress toward regaining its pre-war volume. Harbor statistics indicate that the aggregate tonnage of vessels using this port have reached 80 percent of the peace traffic.

Announcement of steamers bought back from former enemy powers follow each other in rapid succession, and harbor facilities are already proving insufficient to accommodate the growing traffic, now that big plants such as Krupps and Erhardt's, which formerly manufactured war material, are turning out peace goods in great quantities for overseas consumption.

Shipping authorities are urging the revival of ambitious pre-war plans for harbor extensions, on the ground that with the rapidly increasing export trade, the port will in two years time be far too small, and freight business will be lost to Scandinavian ports.

**To South America.**  
 Germans expect the South American trade especially to take a big impetus early next year, when the new Hamburg-South American Company's liners will be placed in commission.

Besides the Hamburg-American Company's new liners, Bayern, Hansa and Wurtemberg, three 12,000 ton passenger and freight steamers will be placed in the North American service by the North German Lloyd of Bremen; to be followed by the 30,000-tonner, Hindenburg, now being completed. New services are also being planned by both the Hamburg and Bremen companies to the Far East.

**LIBERALS STRENGTHEN FORCES IN THE EAST**

Entry of Sir William Pugsley into Political Field and Sir Lomer Gouin is Significant.

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—The nomination of Hon. William Pugsley, lieutenant-governor of New Brunswick, as a Liberal candidate in St. John, following as it does the selection of Sir Lomer Gouin for one of the Montreal seats, is an evident attempt by the Liberal party to strengthen its forces for the political campaign. Governor Pugsley was one of the picturesque parliamentarians in the not distant past and in the naval blockade of 1913 his resourcefulness in obstruction knew no bounds. He was appointed to the lieutenant-governorship in 1917 and so his term has a year yet to run. It is well understood here that in quitting prematurely to accept a party nomination he will be succeeded as lieutenant-governor by General H. H. McLean, late M.P. for Royal. Mr. Pugsley is going up against a stiff proposition in St. John, where his principal opponent will be J. B. M. Baxter, the new minister of customs. Down there, however, the main politics is the "port" and it is not unusual to return one member of each party for the two seats.

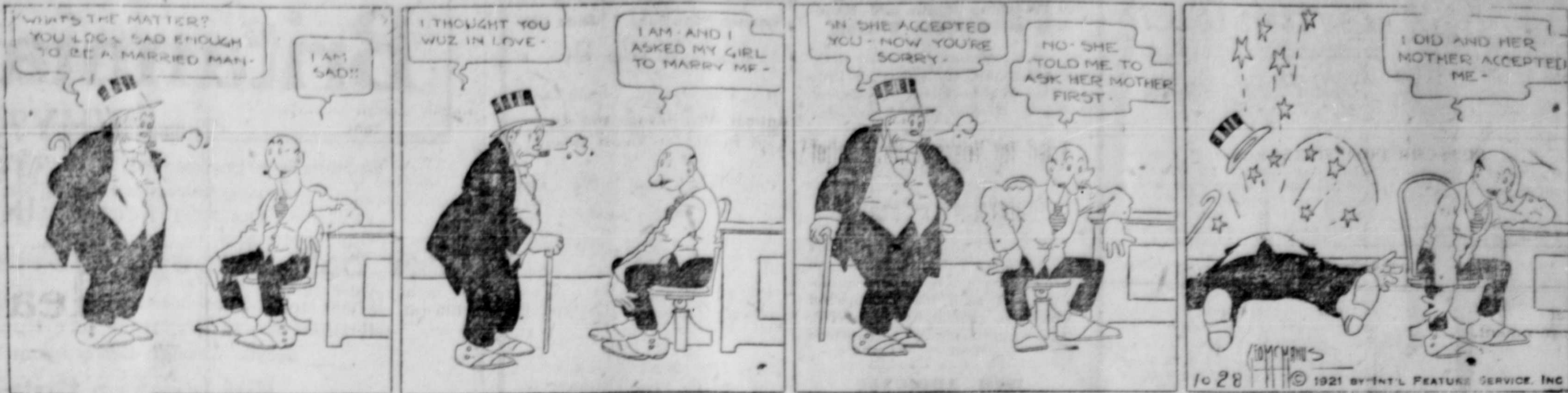

### BRINGING UP FATHER

### WAS SOCIALIST NOW PREMIER

Head of French Government and Former Premier at Washington Conference.

Aristide Briand, premier of France, who heads the French delegation to the Washington Conference on the Limitation of Armaments, is 59 years old. He was once a socialist leader and helped to guide the destinies of France during the most critical periods of the great war. He was born at Nantes, the big industrial city at the mouth of the Loire, and has served, respectively, as Minister of the Interior, Minister of Justice, Minister of Foreign Affairs, President of the Allied Supreme Council, a member of the War Council and four times as premier of France. He has been called "an intellectual colossus" as well as a political shrewd and few men have wielded such great influence in French public life.

Briand first became a world figure in the Chamber of Deputies as the author of the law providing for separation of church and state in 1906 and for his victory over syndicalism when, by passing the railroads under military law, he called all the workers to the colors and broke the great strike of 1910. He accepted and enforced the principle that "the interests of the whole nation are supreme and must and shall outweigh the interests of any class, section or body."

**Rene Viviani.**  
Rene Viviani, former premier, the second member of the French delegation, was also at one time a socialist leader. He has served as cabinet Minister in several portfolios. He is at present chairman of the League of Nations' Commission to Limit International Armaments.  
M. Viviani is no stranger to America. He has visited this country on two occasions, once in 1917 when he came as a member of the French War Mission with General Joffre and again in the spring of 1921 when he was voted the freedom of New York City and visited Colonel Roosevelt's grave.

He is 59 years old and was born in Algiers. Educated in Paris, a lawyer, he was elected to parliament in 1893 and served for many years of that body until Clemenceau appointed him a member of his cabinet. He is famous as an orator.

## BELLA COOLA COLLECTION AT OTTAWA

Harlan Smith Adds to Indian Exhibit in Victoria Memorial Museum.

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—A very interesting exhibition now on view in the Victoria Memorial Museum is that of part of the collection of objects from the Bella Coola Indians of British Columbia, made by Harlan I. Smith in 1921. The Bella Coola Indians live at Bella Coola, at the head of the South Bentick Arm. The section in which they live is about 60 miles inland from the Pacific coast, midway between Vancouver and Prince Rupert, and is one of dense forest, glaciers and snow-clad mountains. Included in the collections are climbers with which the Indians used to take the bark off trees; rope, made of the inner bark of cedar; a fish knife, made by sharpening the hinge edge of a giant mussel shell, and a trough made from the bark of red cedar, and used for catching the oil which drops from roasting salmon.

**Fire Making.**  
One of the most interesting features is a fire-making apparatus, the drill being of red cedar and the hearth of cottonwood. This is now obsolete as it gave way to flint and steel and more recently to matches. There is also a sample of dried dog salmon, which was the staple food and used to be stored in boxes. Other articles in the collection are: a cake of certain dried berries, which was used for making Indian ice cream, a wooden spoon for general purposes, some adze blades, a spindle wheel, a hammer made of stone, a drying dress made of the inner bark of red cedar, a suli case, a coarse mat, a rattle and a mask.

## YUKON HAS ELECTED THREE CONSERVATIVES AND TWO LIBERALS

YUKON, Nov. 4.—(By Canadian Press.)—The political history of the Yukon is comparatively brief. Following the discovery of gold in the territory in the late 90s, and the subsequent development of the natural wealth of that far northern part of the Dominion, the district was given parliamentary representation and the first election was held in 1902, when J. H. Ross, Liberal, was elected. Two years later, in 1904, Dr. Alfred Thompson, Conservative, was elected. Then in 1908 F. T. Congdon, K.C., secured the seat. In 1911 Dr. Thompson was again elected, and he was endorsed once more at the general election in 1917. Thus in fifteen years, 1902 to 1917, Yukon has on five separate occasions returned three Conservative and two Liberal members of Parliament.

## LENSE GRINDING IS A LOCAL INDUSTRY

John Bulger Puts in Special Machinery for Purpose, Electrically Driven.

Prince Rupert boasts another new industry. This time it is in connection with the science of optometry. John Bulger, the local jeweler, has installed the latest electrically operated machinery for the grinding of optical lenses. One machine cuts the shape of the lense required from specially manufactured blanks with a diamond cutter, and the lense is then ground to the required prescription on a special type of emery wheel driven by electricity, the hole in the lense being drilled by a diamond drill, electrically operated. With this installation it is possible, in the event of a person breaking a lense, to have a test made by the lense tester and a new lense cut and ground to the exact shape and prescription. Anyone requiring special glasses can get the lenses ground very quickly. This service will undoubtedly prove to be a boon to the public.

## THE POPULATION OF SWEDEN INCREASES

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 4.—The population of Sweden numbered 2,903,762 persons in January of this year, according to official figures just now published. The increase during 1920 was 56,725. This increase is the highest recorded in Sweden in the last 100 years, both absolutely and relatively. The mortality was 13.29 per thousand, which is the lowest hitherto recorded in Sweden, and Swedish statisticians proudly report this figure as a world's record. They affirm that Sweden is the healthiest place on earth.

The proposal is to build the addition to the front of the present residence making a vestibule, a large living room and a study in addition to the present rooms. At the meeting the report of the treasurer showed the financial condition of the Church to be healthy.

### LADY WRITES OF CONDITIONS IN PETROGRAD

Has Had No Meat for Three Years and No Sugar.

RIGA, Latvia, Nov. 4.—(Associated Press).—After several years of consigned science, letters are now coming out of Russia from American, English and Russian people of gentle birth who remained and survived the great experiment in human lives in communist Russia. These letters in an impressive way tell the mere task of keeping alive has meant to these persons accustomed, before the revolution, to lives of luxury.

Here is an extract from a letter written by an American woman, 83 years old, from Petrograd.

"In three years, I have not heard from any of my friends, the dearest I have in the world. They must be greatly astonished at my having so far survived all these horrors, at my years, when thousands of younger people are daily dying of starvation and unrelieved hardships.

**Food is Need.**

"It was most kind, and thoughtful of you to send that money, I only hope it may arrive. For of course, although I work seven to eight hours a day (official translation work, comparatively well paid) the economic conditions are so monstrous that it is impossible to earn anything near enough for the very bare necessities of life. No wonder when butter and sugar are 25,000 rubles a pound.

"Therefore, what I need more than money is food, the plainest articles of food. These three years I and my faithful companion, for many years my maid, but for whom I should certainly not be living today, have subsisted on black rye-bread and water, porridge and gruels, drinking our so-called 'tea' and 'coffee' (sorry surrogates) without milk and sugar, with black bread, well salted. We have forgotten what bread is like, and as for eggs, I should like to see one before I die.

**No Meat in Years.**

"Now the assistance I would crave of you is simply this: From time to time send me food. We have not seen meat for three years, and for pity's sake send sweets, and sweets, but most especially candy and chocolates. Do not laugh at me, just imagine, three years without sugar or anything sweet. The longing for sweets at times becomes absolutely morbid.

"One thing more, and an essential one; send two or three candles. We are given electricity only for a couple of hours. Kerosene or candles are not to be had any more for any amount of money, so we have no means of striking a light during the dark hours of night, which is not only extremely uncomfortable, but may on occasion be a real danger."

### STRONG MAN IN KING CABINET

Hon. Rudolph Lemieux is Outstanding Figure in Canadian Political Life.

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—(By Canadian Press).—Hon. Rudolph Lemieux, K.C., B.C.L., L.L.D., with 25 years of service in the House of Commons, is, irrespective of party, one of the outstanding figures in parliament. First elected to the House of Commons for the constituency of Gaspe in 1896 he has been a member of the House ever since. Hon. Mr. Lemieux was re-elected in the general elections in 1900 and was chosen by acclamation in 1904 and was again elected acclamation in the same year on his appointment as solicitor general. In this by-election he was also elected in Nicolet by a majority of 342. In the general elections in 1911 Mr. Lemieux was defeated in Gaspe but was elected in Rouville having accepted two nominations. At the general election in 1917 he was elected in both Maisonneuve and Gaspe.

Under the Laurier government Mr. Lemieux held the posts of solicitor general, postmaster general, and eventually became minister of marine and fisheries on August 11, 1911, in succession to Hon. L. P. Broderick. Mr. Lemieux retired from office with the Laurier government on October 6, 1911. During his parliamentary career Mr. Lemieux has gained for himself a splendid reputation as a speaker and parliamentarian, and it is frequently mentioned in political circles that he will be one of the strong men in the cabinet should the Liberals secure power.

Club Member.

Mr. Lemieux is a member of the Eighty Club of the Liberal National Club, London, England. In addition to many clubs and associations in Canada. In recognition of his services in promoting better and closer relations between France and Canada, the French government in March 1906 created him a knight of the Legion of Honor and later an officer of that order. In 1907 Mr. Lemieux acted and in 1910 represented Canada at the inauguration of the parliament of the Dominion of South Africa. In 1918 he was elected president of the Royal Society of Canada.

Mr. Lemieux was born in Montreal, November 1, 1866 and was educated at Nicolet College and Laval University. In his early days Mr. Lemieux engaged in active journalistic work but practically gave this up when he was called to the bar in 1891. In 1896 Mr. Lemieux was appointed to the Law Faculty of Laval University and lectured on the History of Canadian Law until 1906.

LORD GREY'S WILD DUCKS

In Flock of Falloeden are 23 Varieties, Ten of Which Are British.

Lord Grey of Falloeden is known as a sportsman but not so well as a breeder of wildfowl. In an address before the Berwickshire Naturalist Association he told of these recently. He has been rearing them for 37 years and has 23 varieties of ducks ten of which are British.

The British birds are:—Mallard, widgeon, pintail, garganey, shoveller, teal, tufted duck, pochard, red-crested pochard, and white-eyed pochard. The foreign birds are:—Spotted-bill duck, wood duck, mandarin, Chiloe widgeon, Chilean pintail, Bahama pintail, Chilean teal, Brazilian teal, Japanese teal and versicolor teal.

Striking Distinction. For the purpose of observation the most striking distinction Lord Grey said, was—between those birds which undergo the "eclipse," changing the color of their plumage from brilliant to dull-hue in the breeding season, and those which do not. The mandarin drake and the Carolina wood drake are two of the most brilliant. Anyone without knowledge of birds would hardly believe that the drake and duck had any relationship, but about the end of May and beginning of June the drakes lose their brilliance and assume a dark color like the females. Although this is the rule generally speaking among British ducks, it is not the rule with ducks all the world over, or even in the same species.

Dealing with the actual breeding of the different species, Lord Grey mentioned an interesting incident in connection with a Carolina or North American wood duck, which selected as her nesting place an old elm tree about 300 yards from the water. The hole in the tree was 21 feet from the ground, and, being anxious to learn how the duck got the young brood down, Mr. Henderson, his gardener, kept close watch at the time when he thought the brood was due to hatch out. Presently the duck flew down from the hole into the grass, and began calling; then one by one the little ducklings came to the edge of the hole and fell to the ground. When measured, the nest was found to be 2 feet below the hole. For the newly hatched birds to climb that distance, to fall 21 feet and then follow their mother 300 yards to water, was, he thought, a tremendous tribute to the energy of nature.

Do Not Carry Young. Lord Grey said he had seen it stated that when the common wild duck nested above the ground the mother carried the young down, but this incident in the case of a bird whose natural nesting place was a hole in a tree rather went to disprove that.

Presently the duck flew down from the hole into the grass, and began calling; then one by one the little ducklings came to the edge of the hole and fell to the ground. When measured, the nest was found to be 2 feet below the hole. For the newly hatched birds to climb that distance, to fall 21 feet and then follow their mother 300 yards to water, was, he thought, a tremendous tribute to the energy of nature.

## BIRTH CONTROL IS DISCUSSED

England Aroused Over Utterances of Lord Dawson, the King's Physician.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The British people are all discussing birth control. Lord Dawson, personal physician to King George, has come out boldly advocating it and his utterances have aroused a sharp division of opinion, some in praise and others in severe condemnation. The interest of the general public was largely stirred by the relation of his subject to the present problems of unemployment, and such suggestions as Lord Northcliffe's that immigration to Australia is the only solution for Australia's problem, as well as that confronting England.

Lord Dawson, however, does not believe in carrying control to the point of race suicide either with reference to the race or the individuals concerned. "Maternity gives woman her most beautiful attributes," he said, but he savagely attacked the moral basis of the Lambeth conference resolution which held that sexual relationship as an end in itself was inseparable from procreation.

Stephen Leacock Gives Notable Address to British-American Union at Oxford.

OXFORD, Eng., Nov. 3.—(By Associated Press).—Dr. Stephen Leacock, head of the department of political economy in McGill University at Montreal, told the members of the British-American Union in an address here Friday evening that the British and American peoples should have a better knowledge of each other, maintain more sympathetic personal relations, if a British-American union, without pledge or compact, is to become a fact.

He declared that the time for a "parliament of man" and "federation of the world" was not yet. "The League of Nations, though it may contain within it seeds of future concord, cannot serve as yet as a shield against aggression and injustice," he affirmed. "The principal hope of the world is to be sought in the continued friendship of Britain and America."

**Peace or Ruin.**  
"The vast communities of people gathered under the British and American flags represent an organization of power easily superior to any force that could conceivably be brought against it. Where these two nations lead, the world must follow. Peace and war lie in their hands. On the other hand, disagreement between Britain and America spells ruin—not only for ourselves but for the world. So great is the power of each that war between them could mean nothing but mutual destruction. Neither could conquer; both must fall.

"The efforts of every honest citizen should be bent towards the maintenance of peace relations and mutual understanding. There is no question here of union in the narrower sense of federation in its organic form. A century and a half ago it might have been. But the page is written and cannot be blotted out.

**Sympathy Not Symbols.**  
"But for the more real form of union there is still ample need and opportunity. The basis is there in a common speech, a common literature and a common tradition. To a great extent the tie of a common descent still holds. The union that is needed is not one that is contrived with pen and ink and written on a scrap of paper, but the union that reflects an understanding and a common purpose, a union of sympathy and not of symbols.

"To my thinking the best and truest means of union is to be sought in enlightenment. Our quarrels in the past have arisen from our lack of knowledge of one another, our inability, through ignorance, to share one another's point of view. For this the remedy is better knowledge. The more we can interchange our thoughts the more certain are we of agreement. As far as possible, we should seek to share one another's ideas through books, through the press, through the drama.

"We should facilitate in every way the sympathetic relations of our great universities. Harvard should come to Oxford, and Oxford in return should come and sit among the elm trees of Cambridge, in Massachusetts, listening. There should be between Britain and America a constant and perpetual interchange, a sort of tidal ebb and flow, of all that makes for scholarship and literature. Much is already done. But much remains. In business, men have long since found out that the personal relation is everything. We must apply the same to our political relations. We must not rely upon conclaves of cabinets and congressmen. We must know one another. In the face of such knowledge ill-will will vanish, and British-American union, without bond or pledge or contract, will become a fact."
