SEVERE FACTIONAL FIGHTING IS GOING ON NOW

PREMIERS OF BRITISH EMPIRE WILL CONSIDER FAR REACHING PROBLEMS

Guerilla Warfare in Ireland Becoming More and More Cruel; Terrible Crimes Being Committed

DUBLIN, June 20.—Factional fighting and guerilla warfare is increasing in fierceness and intensity. The list of casualties and destruction for the week-end shows this clearly. The strife seems to be now getting even more general. Dublin saw more slaughter the last two days than there has been for months. Six soldiers and ten civilians were wounded fighting after an ambush on crown forces in Dublin. There was bomb throwing and rifle fire. Troops and auxiliaries were rushed to the scene. An ex-soldier named Pike was killed in one suburb and two ex-soldiers were killed in another, while the fighting was proceeding in the centre of the city. Armed civilians were found laying road mines at Colbawn on Saturday and were fired upon. Two were killed and two wounded.

A police patrol was ambushed near Newmarket. The attackers lost one killed, one wounded and one captured. Aged Woman Wounded. A man named Philip was dragged from his home at Grandpoussan and was shot dead. His mother, seventy years of age, was wounded. Patrick Darcy, a school teacher, was shot dead at Carralcaire and was labelled as a spy.

Steamers carrying supplies for the crown forces at Spike Island were boarded by twenty armed men and all the provisions were thrown overboard. Four coast-guard stations in County Dublin were burned down. The Wexford County court house was bombed and destroyed. Ravensdale Castle, in County Louth, formerly the property of Lord Arran, was set on fire.

Following the shooting of Constable Campbell near Duncalk on Friday armed men entered a saloon and took the two sons of the proprietor, John Walters and Patrick Walters, from their beds and killed them.

PARIS AUTO BANDITS ARE BUSY AGAIN

Robbed Jewelry Stores Quite Openly—Kept Onlookers at Bay Rifle Fire.

PARIS, June 20.—Auto bandits looted jewelry shops at the week end taking booty valued at half a million francs. Onlookers were held at bay by rifle fire. The robberies were quite open and daring and were witnessed by many pedestrians. The bandits were heavily masked and the identities were impossible to recognize.

VETERANS' BAR AT FERNIE HAD NEAR BEER CONFISCATED

Were Selling on Saturday and the Police Made Raid in Evening.

FERNIE, June 20.—The Great War Veterans' Club sold beer to its members here on Saturday. The club was raided in the evening and the beer confiscated by the police of the city. No charge was laid up to Sunday night.

STILL AFTER RAIL SIGNALS

Destruction of Boxes and Burning of Cabins Spreads to Manchester.

MANCHESTER, June 20.—Attacks attributed to the Sinn Fein were carried out on Saturday night against the railway signal boxes at various points in the vicinity of this city. Several railway cabins were also burned but no arrests have as yet been made.

It is believed that an organized attempt is thus being made to interrupt traffic in England and special precautions are being taken by the fast moving trains on the various lines to prevent possible wrecks. The destruction is similar to that which was carried on around London last week.

PRINCESS ENA IS CHARTERED IN SOUTH

Will Carry Lumber for Dollar Company.

VANCOUVER, June 20.—The coastwise freighter Princess Ena, of the B.C. Coast Service, has been chartered by the Canadian Robert Dollar Steamship Company to carry a cargo of lumber from the mill at Roche Point to San Pedro, according to information given out by both companies concerned.

The Princess Ena is well-known in coastwise shipping circles having been on the run to northern canneries and points on Vancouver Island for some time. She will be able to go on berth at Dollarton early in July.

FIRST MEETING OF ULSTER SENATE WAS HELD THIS MORNING

Marquis of Dufferin and Ava is Elected Speaker.

BELFAST, June 20.—The Senate of the Ulster or Northern Irish Parliament, comprising 22 Unionists who were elected without opposition on June 14, held their initial meeting today. The Marquis of Dufferin and Ava was elected speaker.

FRENCH STEEPLECHASE

Won by Roi Belge, Forty to One Shot, Yesterday in Paris.

PARIS, June 20.—Roi Belge, a forty to one shot, yesterday won the French National Steeplechase of four miles and one hundred yards.

ALLIES OFFER TO MEDIATE BETWEEN GREECE AND TURKEY

PARIS, June 20.—Britain, France and Italy have asked King Constantine, the Greek monarch, to accept Allied mediation to prevent general warfare between Greece and Turkey arising out of the present hostilities between Turkish Nationalists and Greece.

LETTER RECEIVED FROM VANCOUVER

Vancouver Board of Trade Says Desires to Assist Prince Rupert.

Secretary G. V. Egan of the Board of Trade is in receipt of a letter from W. A. Payne, secretary of the Vancouver Board of Trade, extending to the local organization the warmest expressions of thanks for the kind reception that had been accorded them on their recent visit here. He voiced the feeling of all the Vancouver members of the Board of Trade, in expressing admiration and surprise at the growth and development that has taken place in the city lately.

The cheerfulness and optimism displayed on all sides had particularly struck the visitors. "It is just such a spirit as is displayed by Prince Rupert that is going to make British Columbia the biggest and best province in the Dominion of Canada," was one phrase made use of in the letter. The secretary concluded by saying he wished the citizens of Prince Rupert to feel assured that Vancouver was behind them in every way, and was out to assist and aid in the development of her sister city in the north.

ENGAGEMENT RUMORED OF PRINCESS MARY AND PRINCE OF SWEDEN

LONDON, June 20.—It was said that the engagement will shortly be announced of Princess Mary to the Duke of Seania, the Crown Prince of Sweden. His first wife was Princess Margaret of Connaught, second daughter of the Duke of Connaught. Princess Margaret became the bride of Prince Gustavus Adolphus 16 years ago, and died May 1, last year, leaving five children. The Crown Prince is 39 years old. Princess Mary was 24 in April.

SEIZED OPIUM AS CHINAMAN TRYING SMUGGLE ASHORE

VICTORIA, June 20.—Customs officials here seized 141 lbs of opium, valued at approximately \$3,000, which a Chinaman was attempting to smuggle from aboard the Blue Funnel liner Teagar at the Outer Wharf.

NORWAY IS DRY BUT DOES NOT LOOK LIKE IT

Great Number of Arrests Made Account Liquor.

CHRISTIANIA, June 20.—Norway is supposed to be a dry country but no less than 23,975 persons were arrested last year for being drunk. There were, besides this 34,550 persons arrested for sundry misdemeanors traceable to the effects of intoxicants.

MUCH LIQUOR ARRIVES HERE

Fifteen Hundred Cases for Local Consumption Came in Today.

Fifteen hundred cases of wines and spirits arrived this morning on the Princess Alice for the Prince Rupert government liquor vendor together with a car load for Prince George. Carpenters are at work at the Glapp building on Fraser Street making necessary alterations in the store to be used as a supply depot. P. I. Palmer, vendor, expects to be ready for business in a day or two.

In regard to the handling of beer, Mr. Palmer stated today, that for the present, at any rate he was having shipments from below handed over to the various local representatives of brewery companies who would fill orders for customers. This will be done on orders from Mr. Palmer being produced.

VICE REGAL PARTY GONE FROM OTTAWA

Bid Farewell to Capital and Will Visit Quebec a Month.

OTTAWA, June 20.—Their Excellencies the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire made their final departure from Ottawa by special train Saturday at 7 a.m. A guard of honor was provided by the Governor-General's foot guards and an escort of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police escorted their carriage from government house to the station. Their Excellencies arrived in Quebec on Sunday morning and will be remaining at the citadel for about a month.

CHINESE EXCLUDED AT VICTORIA FROM ENTERING CANADA

Forty-one to be Sent Back Home Account Clauses Immigration Act.

VICTORIA, June 20.—Forty-one Chinese, arrived on the N.Y.K. liner Suwa Maru, will be deported. They are barred by the skilled and unskilled clauses in the new Immigration Act.

COLLEGE PROFESSOR HEADS ATHLETIC BODY

Dr. J. G. Davidson Elected President of B.A. Amateur Athletic Union.

VANCOUVER, June 20.—Dr. J. G. Davidson, of Vancouver, was elected president of the B.C. Amateur Athletic Union on Saturday night. Dr. Davidson is associate professor of Physics at the University of British Columbia.

Epochal Conference Starts In London Today and Will Be Watched by Whole World

LONDON, June 20.—Premier David Lloyd George of England, Premier Arthur Meighen of Canada, Premier Jan Smuts of the Union of South Africa, Premier Massey of New Zealand, and Premier Hughes of Australia today commenced their consideration of the Empire's policies at the Conference of Overseas Premiers.

It is indicated that the Anglo-Japanese alliance, Imperial defence, Imperial policies in regard to foreign affairs and other matters of far-reaching importance will be discussed at this conference.

Many viewpoints will be advanced and, doubtless, some important decisions will be made so all of Europe will have its attention focused on this epochal gathering.

CAR SITUATION MUCH IMPROVED

RICHMOND WAS NOT DAMAGED

Contact with Sand Bar Down the Coast Does Not Hold Tanker up.

The big oil tanker Richmond from San Francisco, which steamed into the harbor on Saturday afternoon after spending a number of hours aground on a sand bar at Lowe Inlet, seventy miles south of here, will have finished unloading the 70,000 barrels of oil she had for this place by tonight and will then leave on her return journey. Upon examination shortly after her arrival in this port, it was found that she had not sustained any injuries to her keel through the grounding on the sand bar. The trouble with the steering gear, which caused the accident, has been repaired and the big steamer is ready to go to sea again.

DENVER, June 20.—John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, today formally announced that he would be a candidate for the presidency of the American Federation of Labor against Samuel Gompers, the present president.

MISSING MAN WAS FOUND DEAD NEAR CITY PRINCE GEORGE

PRINCE GEORGE, June 20.—While engaged in the pulp cruise on May 25, members of the forest department's staff found the remains of the body of an old prospector named McKittrick, who was missed early in the spring. They came upon the remains about ten miles up the McGregor river. McKittrick was 65 years of age. He had been visiting a trapper up the river, and from his attitude, it is believed that he had seated himself on a snowshoe under a tree to rest, and had quietly fallen asleep and died in the bitter cold prevailing at that time. Animals had destroyed the body to a great extent, but the party buried his remains, marking the grave by a snowshoe at the head and foot and blazing a tree. His identity was established by a gun license.

Two Views on Local Court House.

Two views are being taken in the south in regard to the building of the new court house at Prince Rupert. Those in opposition to the government, as well as those who are bound up in the interests of the south and do not want to see anything come Prince Rupert's way, accuse the government of extravagance. Firm and Home, a Vancouver weekly allied with the Vancouver Sun, whose publisher is launching a fierce attack on the provincial government at the present time, in a recent issue printed on its front page a critical leading article condemnatory of the present administration and mentioning the local building says the government is "spending \$600,000 for a court house at Prince Rupert large and luxurious enough for ten times its present population" and that "the present quarters are good enough." The defence for the building and the view that is being taken by many people in the south, as well as those in the north, is that this place is worth while and the future prospects, more than immediate necessity, warrant the new building. Indeed, the city is likely to have that "ten times greater population" before the Vancouver Sun has any idea that it will and it is on the strength of that prospect that Hon. T. D. Pattullo has been successful in obtaining the building for the city.

Prince Rupert and Permanent Buildings.

Starting with the building of the fine new school at Hays Cove Circle and the new court house, Prince Rupert is about to start on an era of permanent building. The buildings that are now being planned for the city, both public and private, will be more of a permanent nature than any ones that have before been built here. Every city has its stage of "shabby" business houses and residences, but if a city is to become worth while it is not going to continue the erection of such buildings. The prosperity of a place is largely judged by the outsider on the quality of its buildings. A town of lumberedown and disreputable structures does not inspire confidence while an air of permanence and quality most certainly does. The time is here when Prince Rupert should be showing signs of permanence and there is no doubt but what this is warranted. Indications are that Prince Rupert is about to emerge from its state of temporary buildings and in building structures of solidity and permanence will take on the air of a city that has a future in which at least its residents are confident. The provincial government, by the erecting of such a fine court house, is showing its confidence in the place. Is this not enough to inspire confidence in others when it comes to building?

Hard Times Seem Easier Here.

While bankers and business men and people generally in the south are moaning over the hard times and are making blue predictions for the immediate future, Prince Rupert people are still maintaining a feeling of optimism and confidence. Comparatively speaking, Prince Rupert looks bright and cheery. True business is slack and money is not so free as it was a few months ago and this place is affected by the general depression that is passing over the entire world at the present time, but the spirit here is much more cheerful than in most other cities. This is largely because unemployment is not being felt to any great extent and the people are busy. All here are earning enough to live comfortably and this cannot be said of the larger places. In such unsettled times as these the unemployed seem to flock to the great cities and that is why Prince Rupert, in common with the other smaller cities, is passing through hard times so smoothly.

ANOTHER COLD STORAGE MAY COME TO PORT

B. C. Packers Will Move Steveston Plant Either to Vancouver or Prince Rupert.

VANCOUVER, June 20.—Just where the B. C. Packers' cold storage at Steveston is to make its home in the future has not been decided, according to officials of the Association, but it has been decided to close the big storage and move it to either Vancouver or Prince Rupert.

This cold storage was originally at New Westminster, but high waterfront taxes and the impression that it might serve both the salmon interests of the Fraser and the halibut requirements of the West Coast banks. In recent years, however, the salmon have gradually disappeared from the Fraser river and the halibut have forsaken the West Coast for new haunts in the north, with the result that the big cold storage at the mouth of the Fraser has become little more than a herring warehouse for the Japanese.

The association has had leanings towards Prince Rupert for some time because of the big runs of salmon, cod and halibut in the northern waters, but it is possible that the plant will be installed at Vancouver. For some years an attempt has been made to try and bring fish from the north to the Steveston plant, but the cost of transportation has been too high and the plan was abandoned. George Cassidy, manager of this cold storage, is one of the most expert authorities on the fish packing in British Columbia.

ADVERTISING ON CENSUS PAPERS

New Departure in Government Transactions Instituted in Britain.

LONDON, June 20.—A new departure in government transactions in the disposal, for a cash consideration, of advertising space on census papers; a proceeding which the official mind would formerly have looked upon with horror.

Even now, a proposal of an enterprising advertising agency to pay the government £11,000 for the use of the backs of 11,000,000 forms to be used in the forthcoming national census, was at first summarily rejected by Dr. Christopher Addison, the Health Minister.

Sir Alfred Mond, First Commissioner of Works, and a keen business man, saw the advantage of drawing revenue from this source and persuaded the Minister to consent to the innovation.

Some time ago, the same advertising firm offered £50,000 for the use of empty space on ration books; but the authorities would not listen to the proposal.



The vessel, according to the report is held at approximately \$450,000. The C.P.O.S. will replace the Japan with the Empress of Canada and the Empress of China.

VANCOUVER, June 20.—A. H. MacNeill, K.C., has returned from a visit to Rossland, made in company with L. C. Gilman, vice-president of the Great Northern Railway, for which Mr. MacNeill is general solicitor in British Columbia.

That company has notified the people of Rossland that it intends to abandon its train service to Rossland. The question was discussed by a meeting of the Rossland Board of Trade, in an endeavor to reach a solution of the difficulty by providing new freight traffic for the line. The annual loss is now \$48,000.

LABOR LEADER SPEAKS HERE

W. A. Pritchard, One of Winnipeg Strike Leaders Speaks Under O.B.U. Auspices.

There was a large attendance at the weekly forum held in the McIntyre Hall last night, many ladies being noticed amongst the big audience. The address of the evening at the open forum last night was delivered by W. T. Pritchard, the well known socialist and labor leader of Winnipeg, who served twelve months recently for strike conspiracy. Mr. Pritchard, who is spending a few days in the city is delivering three addresses while here. The first was on Saturday, on the subject of "The Winnipeg Strike Trials," last night he spoke on "World Problems," and tonight he will deal with "Labor Organization."

His address last evening, was listened to with great interest and many of his points were received with applause by the audience. Mr. Pritchard dealt, as the subject called for, with matters of world wide moment. He deprecated an attitude of parochial conservatism, or the small town view of which people of the west were apt to take up through being far removed, from the great centres of industry in the East. Everything that happens in the East or the Old World reacts and is felt amongst even the smallest community in the most outlying districts of the Great West.

Condemns System. The speaker made a stinging and scathing indictment of the present capitalistic system which while having in the past fulfilled a great mission in making production possible, of all the useful and good things that were used and enjoyed by mankind, today had arrived at a point where although sufficient was pro-

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$1 an acre, second-class to \$1.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-tilled land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor has occupation not less than 1 year, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted a certificate of title, and improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be leased, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same as required, title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years. And improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including clearing and cultivation, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he may record another in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 30 acres, may be leased as homestead title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 60 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 100 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Release of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from settlement to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS. Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole or part of purchase price due original purchaser, purchase price due may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING. Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

PEACE RIVER GOLD RUSH SOON PETERED OUT-LITTLE METAL

EDMONTON, June 20.—The gold rush in the Peace River district, has "petered" out according to word brought to the city by Inspector Hancock of the Alberta Provincial Police at Peace River. The rush was strong and enthusiastic while it lasted, the inspector reports, but very little gold was found that would lead to a display of any great amount of enthusiasm.

Inspector Hancock reports the grain to be in excellent condition throughout the Peace River country but that a little more moisture would do a great deal of good. Farmers at all points, he says, are looking forward with enthusiasm to a bountiful crop and are well satisfied with present conditions.
