Ebert Makes Protest Allies' Action
ASKING DOMINION PARLIAMENT TO PREVENT THE IMPORTATION OF LIQUORGermany Invaded
By Allied ForcesPresident Ebert Issues Proclamation of
Protest Against What He Calls
Breach of Terms of Treaty
of Peace

AVENGE, March 8.—The armies and navies combined today in the occupation of German cities, following the refusal of Germany to accede to the reparations proposals of the allied council.

British, French and Belgian troops entered Düsseldorf this morning and at noon French and Belgian soldiers occupied Düsseldorf. The Rhine flotilla of the Allies took possession of Ruhrort.

BERLIN, March 8.—President Ebert of Germany in a proclamation declares Germany is not in a position to use force to prevent the forcible methods of the Allies in occupying additional territory, but protests against the "open violation of the terms of peace."

Ebert further said: "Our opponents imposed an unheard of and impossible of fulfillment. The work of a generation will not have sufficed to carry out the contract. We must not comply. Our honor and self respect forbid. Be patient, but the Imperial Government won't rest until the foreign yields before our right."

Premier Hughes Likely
Will be Defeated and be

LONDON, March 8.—A despatch received here from Sydney, New South Wales, says it is possible Premier Hughes of Australia may find himself out of office soon, as public feeling is going against his government and himself.

It is likely he will be defeated and he may be succeeded by Andrew Fisher, the retiring high commissioner to Great Britain.

ROME, March 8.—Pope Benedict in an allocution said there had been an appalling violence and crime in Ireland in contradiction to the laws of morality, "crimes which we condemn by whichever side committed."

SIXTY MILLION
DOLLARS LOSS
ON RAILWAYS

Estimates for Government Operation of Roads will be Very Heavy

OTTAWA, Mar. 8.—It is understood that expenditure on the Canadian National Railways will figure largely in the main estimates to be tabled in the House of Commons today or tomorrow. It is stated that last year's operation resulted in a loss of \$60,000,000, including interest charges on the Canadian National and Grand Trunk Pacific.

RUPERT BACK
ABOUT MAY 1

Capt. Nicholson Says the Prince George Will Overhaul Immediately She is Relieved.

Capt. C. H. Nicholson, manager of the Canadian National steamships on this coast, is in the city today, having arrived on the Princess Mary yesterday. This morning he was at the dry dock in connection with the repairs to the Prince John which is on the ways there undergoing overhaul. He will be in the city until Thursday night.

Speaking of the service between this city and Vancouver, Captain Nicholson said the Prince Rupert would be back on the run about May 1 and the George would then be overhauled and the double service would be commenced soon afterwards.

The Prince Albert is at present attending to the business between here and the islands and also to Stewart.

Ald. McNeill introduced a motion at last night's council meeting for the return of 2,234 feet of city steel rails that Nick Gurvich has at his coal mine in Alport. The resolution did not pass. The council but the board of works has the matter in hand and will bring in a report.

ELECTION CLUB
OVER MEMBERS

That is How Premier Drury Keeps Legislature in Line.

TORONTO, March 8.—Premier Drury is finding it difficult work steering the provincial affairs through a legislature which is almost equally divided. He holds over them the club of a threat of an early election and none of the members want to go back to the country just yet and incur the expense of another election. They cannot afford it.

In that way the farmer premier carries on but he has to move with astuteness and care and every step he takes is watched. If the opposition could get a good election cry, he would be driven from power any day.

AMBUSHERS SEEM TO
GET WORST OF FIGHT

Three Killed at Mullinchoo and Twenty Captured

DUBLIN, Mar. 8.—Four persons were killed in engagements between Crown forces and Sinn Feiners in Southern Ireland last night. A lorry was ambushed at Baillieboro and a captain and two privates were wounded.

At Mullinchoo a battle between the police and Sinn Feiners took place when three civilians were killed and twenty captured, while a civilian was killed at Toome and a policeman was killed at Rillmabook.

MANSON COMPLIMENTED

VICTORIA, Mar. 8.—Mr. Bowser paid a striking tribute to Hon. A. M. Manson. He stated he wished to express the satisfaction which members on the Opposition side felt at the fair rulings given by Mr. Speaker. Never before had he sat for three weeks in his seat without rising about decisions of the chair, he stated.

Premier Oliver Introduces
Motion Regarding Importation

Says Success of Moderation Measure Depends on Enactment of Federal Legislation Giving Province Monopoly of Importation

VICTORIA, March 8.—Unless the Dominion authorities supplement the provincial liquor measure by enacting legislation preventing importation into British Columbia except by the Provincial Government, which the new measure is designed to enact, government control and sale will fail of success, is the argument advanced by Premier Oliver in the Legislature in support of his motion calling upon the House to request the Dominion Government at the present session to pass such legislation.

The Premier said that such federal legislation would not only more be an infringement upon personal liberties or individual freedom than other legislation, it was imperative that present import operations must cease if the British Columbia measure is to prove workable.

The debate was adjourned by W. J. Bowser who will speak on it next.

Liquor Measure.

The new liquor measure was discussed for four hours yesterday in committee but little actual progress was made. There was criticism of the proposed sale in kegs, barrels or casks, sale to roomers in hotels and objection was also taken to the permit system.

To Mr. Bowser's suggestion that the Legislature name a commission and that the price at which liquor be sold be left to the board, the Premier replied that the Government proposed to fix the price and it was a matter of revenue policy.

BOMBARDS
WORKMEN

Cannon Trained on Quarters Of Workers Kill Several Hundred.

LONDON, March 8.—More than 200,000 men are on strike in the city of Moscow. During the bombardment of the workmen's quarters by artillery placed on the hills overlooking the city, several hundred were killed and many wounded.

Pope Pronounces Against Crime.

Everyone will agree with Pope Benedict that the crimes being committed in Ireland are something to be deplored. More than that they are unnecessary. Unfortunately political feeling is carried so far in that country, that it seems impossible to reason with either side.

It is to be hoped that the pronouncement of the heads of the Catholic Church will have some effect on the position as it exists in that country and that the people will return to a saner outlook. Irish people in every country of the world are watching events in the Emerald Isle with great interest, and most of them regret exceedingly the troubles which have arisen, although differing as to who is to blame.

Put Money Into Fishing Business.

Why is it so few people put money into the fishing business? That question was asked yesterday. A news item published yesterday told of Dr. Kergin taking an interest in a new fishing boat which is being constructed at Cow Bay. Others might follow this laudable example. There are many fishermen who have not enough money to finance a boat yet who would pay a part of the cost and who would look after the operating.

It is easy to get money for far away proposals. People will pour their savings into all sorts of unneccessary and foolish schemes, but when it comes to financing a basic industry, they hold back. A good investment that will do the town some good does not look as attractive to them as a poor investment that will help some other place.

Lot of Discussion Over Liquor Measure.

There is a lot of discussion going on over the proposed liquor measure, but it is very greatly to be desired that the Legislature keep within the limits of the proposal contained in the provincial plebiscite. To go beyond it means to break trust with the people who were asked to vote. Had they known it was proposed to throw the selling of liquor wide open, there would have been a different tale to tell.

The way to defeat the moderation measure is to make it too wide. The people of the province do not want to go back to the old conditions when beer flowed like water and liquor was on sale at every street corner. If the Legislature forces them into that position again, the first opportunity will be taken to make a clean sweep, not allowing even two per cent beer on the permitted list. It is not good for the people nor for business that alcohol should be consumed in large quantities.

Germany Occupied By the Allies.

Germany has been reoccupied by the Allies and steps will at once be taken to collect the money which the Germans refuse to pay. Happily for the German people, the Allies are in a different frame of mind from what the Germans were when they invaded France and Belgium. It is to be hoped, however, that the Allies will hold firmly to their position that the devastation of France and Belgium must be paid for by the German People.

On the recommendation of the reading room committee last night the city council decided to have the walls of the reading room repainted and the salary of the janitor of the room was fixed at \$15 monthly. It was also decided to call for tenders for the supplying of periodicals for the year.

The funeral took place on Monday, February 28, and all the natives of the Skidegate village turned out to pay their last respects to his memory.

OIL SHALE TESTS ON GRAHAM ISLAND

A. A. McPhail Here on His Way South After Working on the Proposal.

That the investigations in regard to the possibilities of working the oil shale claims on Graham Island are proceeding and will be completed as soon as the snow is gone, is the word brought here by A. A. McPhail, an oil expert, who has been on the islands in connection with that work. A testing machine was taken into the interior and tests made at different points. It was found, however, that there was too much snow in the interior of the island to complete the work but this will be done within the next few months.

The proposal is to extract high grade oil from the shales, which are so prevalent on Graham Island. This oil is richer in by-products than the ordinary oil from a gusher. If it can be found in sufficiently large quantities, there is every possibility of important developments in the part of the island where the rich shales are found.

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MOST SKEENA CANNERIES TO RUN THIS YEAR

Pack will Mainly be of Sockeye—
Market Flooded with Cheaper
Grades

It is stated authoritatively in
local salmon fishery circles that
fourteen out of the fifteen can-
neries on the Skeena River will
operate this season, the only one
which will not work being the Port
Edward plant. As for the can-
neries on the Nass, Rivers Inlet
and in other districts it is ex-
pected that all will open with the
exception of those that pack ex-
clusively the cheaper grades of
fish.

The market in these times being
gilted with last year's pack no
more will be required and very
little will be packed. The only
variety in which the pack will be
normal this season will be sock-
eyes. On account of these market
conditions the year's pack will be
a light one and the season will be
short. The report that only six
or seven canneries on the Skeena
will operate is, however, em-
phatically denied by many intima-
tely acquainted with the business
and who are in a position to know.

The first cannery to open this
season will be the Balmoral plant
at the mouth of the Estall River
and the largest cannery in the
North. In May it will commence
to pack spring. The rest of the
canneries will commence packing
about June 20 when the sockeye
season commences. All the can-
neries of the B.C. Packers in this
district, it is officially announced,
will operate this season.

AFTERMATH OF WITLEY RIOTS

Argument that High Prices Justified Soldiers in Rioting

GUILDFORD, Surrey, England, Mar. 8.—An echo of the Witley riots was heard in the King's Bench Division of the Law Courts when a commission was authorized by Mr. Justice Coleridge to proceed to Ottawa for the purpose of taking evidence in connection with an action brought against the Surrey County Council for damages sustained by six storekeepers of "Tin Town" at the time of the Canadian military riots in 1918-19. The claimants are not satisfied with the compensation made by the Canadian authorities.

Sir Richard Muir appeared on behalf of the Surrey County Council, and explained that the application for a commission arose through an action, or series of actions, brought against the council by the tenants of shanties called "Tin Town," which were annexed to one of the Canadian military camps at Witley.

Damage to Buildings

On Armistice Day, November 11, 1918, there was a riot of Canadian soldiers in the camp, he said, and damage was done to some buildings. Therefore, the occupants of the shops, apart from several other considerations, had the warning of the risks they were running in keeping shops and goods there. In February, 1919, there was a further riot, Sir Richard continued, and further damage to shops and contents was done, and there was a third riot, with more damage, in June, 1919.

The Camp was one which was governed entirely by the military, he said. The civilian police had no jurisdiction there at all, and were not allowed in the camp.

The military police and officers were quite unable to cope with the soldiers, he said, who took it into their heads to riot. The occupants of the tin shanties made a claim against the Canadian government, some in respect of the riots of February, 1919, and some, Sir Richard thought, also in respect of the riots in June, 1919. Some of them received compensation, others recovered none at all. Some did not apply to the Canadian government for compensation, he said.

Six Tenants Sue

Sir Richard told the Court that approximately six tenants of the tin shanties were suing the Surrey County Council for damages which the claimants said had risen from a riot. They were suing the Council under the Riot Act, he explained.

"But this was a riot of soldiers in a camp under military control, and in a place where the Surrey police would have no jurisdiction, and where, of course, they would not have a force which could possibly cope with them. That was the claim against the Surrey County Council," Sir Richard said.

The Surrey County Council said they were not liable, and if they were liable the ratepayers of Surrey would have to pay the damages.

Prices Too High

Sir Richard proceeded to argue that if the people who owned the shops put up their prices to such an extent that they provoked a riot then they were not entitled to damages. Upon that point the Surrey County Council relied on evidence from the Dominion, he said.

J. B. Melville, on behalf of the claimants, said the compensation made by the Canadian authorities was inadequate, and censured the Surrey Council for not taking steps to adjust the claims before the evidence and witnesses were removed to the Dominion.

"They did not pack up their tents and fit away immediately after the commission sat," he added.

Sir Richard then explained that the Canadian government had given the complainants what they thought they were entitled to after a full enquiry.

Had Their Bite

"They have had their bite at the Canadian authorities," Sir Richard said.

Mr. Melville replied that on November 11, 1919, the storekeepers were informed by the Canadian authorities in offering a contribution of five hundred pounds that "the Canadian authorities regret the circumstances and are making the above contribution not as an admission of liability but as an expression of regret and as an act of grace."
