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## Ebert Makes Protest Allies' Action ASKING DOMINION PARLIAMENT TO PREVENT THE IMPORTATION OF LIQUOR

### Germany Invaded By Allied Forces

#### President Ebert Issues Proclamation of Protest Against What He Calls Breach of Terms of Treaty of Peace

BRUSSELS, March 8.—The armies and navies combined today in celebrating the occupation of German cities, following the re-occupation of Germany to accede to the reparation proposals of the Allies.

British, French and Belgian troops entered Düsseldorf this morning and at noon French and Belgian soldiers occupied Düsseldorf.

The Rhine flotilla of the Allies took possession of Ruhrort.

BERLIN, March 8.—President Ebert of Germany in a proclamation declares Germany is not in a position to use force to resist the forcible methods of the Allies in occupying additional German territory, but protests against the "open violation of the terms of peace."

Ebert further said: "Our opponents imposed an unheard of burden of reparation upon us. The work of a generation could not have sufficed to carry out the contract. We must not comply. Our honor and self respect forbid. Be patient, but the Imperial Government won't rest until the foreign powers yield before our right."

### Premier Hughes Likely Will be Defeated and be Succeeded by A. Fisher

LONDON, March 8.—A despatch received here from Sydney, New South Wales, says it is possible Premier Hughes of Australia may find himself out of office soon, as public feeling is going against his government and himself.

It is likely he will be defeated and he may be succeeded by Andrew Fisher, the retiring high commissioner to Great Britain.

### POPE BENEDICT IS AGAINST VIOLENCE AS IN IRELAND

ROME, March 8.—Pope Benedict in an allocution said there had been an appalling violence and crime in Ireland in contradiction to the laws of morality, "crimes which we condemn by whichever side committed."

### SIXTY MILLION DOLLARS LOSS ON RAILWAYS

Estimates for Government Operation of Roads will be Very Heavy

OTTAWA, Mar. 8.—It is understood that expenditure on the Canadian National Railways will figure largely in the main estimates to be tabled in the House of Commons today or tomorrow. It is stated that last year's operation resulted in a loss of \$60,000,000, including interest charges on the Canadian National and Grand Trunk Pacific.

### FEW SMALL HALIBUT BOATS SOLD CATCHES

Ten Cars Available Today in Railway Yards is Adequate for Light List Arrivals.

A few small boats were in for this morning's fish sale. Today there are seven cars in the yard and three more are due tonight, so there are plenty to handle today's business.

### ELECTION CLUB OVER MEMBERS

That is How Premier Drury Keeps Legislature in Line.

TORONTO, March 8.—Premier Drury is finding it difficult work steering the provincial affairs through a legislature which is almost equally divided. He holds over them the club of a threat of an early election and none of the members want to go back to the country just yet and incur the expense of another election. They cannot afford it.

In that way the farmer premier carries on but he has to move with astuteness and care and every step he takes is watched. If the opposition could get a good election cry, he would be driven from power any day.

## Premier Oliver Introduces Motion Regarding Importation

### Says Success of Moderation Measure Depends on Enactment of Federal Legislation Giving Province Monopoly of Importation

VICTORIA, March 8.—Unless the Dominion authorities supplement the provincial liquor measure by enacting legislation preventing importation into British Columbia except by the Provincial Government, which the new measure is designed to enact, government control and sale will fail of success, is the argument advanced by Premier Oliver in the Legislature in support of his motion calling upon the House to request the Dominion Government at the present session to pass such legislation.

The Premier said that such federal legislation would not any more be an infringement upon personal liberties or individual freedom than other legislation. It was imperative that present import operations must cease if the British Columbia measure is to prove workable.

The debate was adjourned by W. J. Bowser who will speak on it next.

#### Liquor Measure.

The new liquor measure was discussed for four hours yesterday in committee but little actual progress was made. There was criticism of the proposed sale in kegs, barrels or casks, sale to roomers in hotels and objection was also taken to the permit system.

To Mr. Bowser's suggestion that the Legislature name a commission and that the price at which liquor be sold be left to the board, the Premier replied that the Government proposed to fix the price and it was a matter of revenue policy.

#### LONDON, March 8.—More than 200,000 men are on strike in the city of Moscow. During the bombardment of the workmen's quarters by artillery placed on the hills overlooking the city, several hundred were killed and many wounded.

### HOCKEY FINALS ARE NEXT WEEK

Vancouver and Seattle to Play off, As Result of Last Night's Game.

VANCOUVER, March 8.—The final play off in the professional hockey championship series on the Pacific coast takes place next week. Yesterday Vancouver beat Victoria by a score of 5 to 0, thus bringing Seattle and Vancouver together and these two teams will have to play the championship game.

### GOVERNMENT KEPT INFORMED OF MOVES ALLIES AND GERMANY

OTTAWA, March 8.—Premier Meighen announced in the House of Commons that the Government is being kept informed of the proceedings in connection with difficulties between the allies and Germany.

VICTORIA, March 8.—There is fair possibility that the new liquor control bill will be passed by the Legislature at the end of this week. It is now ready for discussion in committee.

The beer clause remains the centre of interest and it is unknown how the members will vote on it.

### OFFICIAL DINNER FOR OFFICERS OF NAVAL SQUADRON

VICTORIA, March 8.—An official welcome will be extended to the Royal Naval squadron by the British Columbia Government at a dinner on Thursday, March 10. Lieut.-Governor Nichol, Premier Oliver, members of the cabinet and representatives of public organizations will be present.

The squadron is due to reach Esquimalt on Wednesday.

### RUPERT BACK ABOUT MAY 1

Capt. Nicholson Says the Prince George Will Overhaul Immediately She is Relieved.

Capt. C. H. Nicholson, manager of the Canadian National steamships on this coast, is in the city today, having arrived on the Princess Mary yesterday. This morning he was at the dry dock in connection with the repairs to the Prince John which is on the ways there undergoing overhaul. He will be in the city until Thursday night.

Speaking of the service between this city and Vancouver, Captain Nicholson said the Prince Rupert would be back on the run about May 1 and the George would then be overhauled and the double service would be commenced soon afterwards.

The Prince Albert is at present attending to the business between here and the islands and also to Stewart.

### LABOR CANDIDATE ELECTED YESTERDAY FOR BRITISH HOUSE

LONDON, March 8.—In the constituency of Penryn, Yorkshire West, W. Gillies, Laborite, was elected to the House of Commons by a majority of 576 over independent and coalition Liberal candidates.

The seat was formerly held by a Liberal.

### ELECTRICAL WORKERS RETURNED TO WORK

Reached Agreement with Company Along Lines of Arbitration Award.

VANCOUVER, March 8.—Two hundred electrical workers who have been on strike, went back to work today, having reached an agreement with the company based on an arbitration award.

### MINING SURVEY SULPHITE MILL SITE SEAL COVE

Being Cross-sectioned and Findings Being Taken by Engineer Jack Miller.

### FINANCIAL REPORTS FROM EAST

Reports for the sulphite pulp mill at Seal Cove proposed by the British interests commenced on Monday on the ground between the mill and the cold storage under Jack Miller, formerly of the purpose of estimating the costs of construction and the boundaries for the site of the plant. The site is being cross-sectioned in twenty feet and the musketry sounded. Water soundings for the proposed wharves are being taken.

Reliable reports from the east and to the financing of the project are being received in the city and preparations are being made for the float bonds. No report has been received here from the Dayton engineer, expected the project through the week.

Nothing of sawmill affairs this morning. E. F. Dohy, manager of the Prince Rupert Lumber Co. and representative of the Emerson interest, stated that lumber conditions remained about the same and there was still no prospect of the resumption of the sawmill.

### OPIMUM SEIZED

Chinese Members of Crew of Empress of Russia Arrested.

VANCOUVER, Mar. 8.—More than 1,000 worth of opium was seized from the crew of the Empress of Russia when they were arrested yesterday on the Orient and was found on the dock when the seizure was made.

### SHIPYARD CASE MAY BE SETTLED

Asking Court to Set Date of Appeal.

VANCOUVER, March 8.—(Special)—R. L. Reid, K. C., asked the court to set the date for hearing the appeal by the Dominion Government against the order giving the Prince Rupert drydock equipment to the creditors. An agreement, however, may be reached before the hearing is called.

### KERGIN SEES UNFRIENDLY DISPOSITION

Objects to United States Not Permitting Liquor Through Alaskan Territory.

VICTORIA, March 8.—The report that the United States will prohibit the transit of intoxicating liquor to points within British Columbia, H. F. Kergin, member for Atlin, sees an unfriendly act on the part of the States. He directed a number of questions in connection therewith to the attorney-general at yesterday's session.

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### AMBUSHERS SEEM TO GET WORST OF FIGHT

Three Killed at Mullinchoo and Twenty Captured

DUBLIN, Mar. 8.—Four persons were killed in engagements between Crown forces and Sinn Feiners in Southern Ireland last night. A lorry was ambushed at Baillibrooke and a captain and two privates were wounded.

At Mullinchoo a battle between the police and Sinn Feiners took place when three civilians were killed and twenty captured, while a civilian was killed at Toames and a policeman was killed at Kilmallock.

### MANSON COMPLIMENTED

VICTORIA, Mar. 8.—Mr. Bowser paid a striking tribute to Hon. A. M. Manson. He stated he wished to express the satisfaction which members on the Opposition side felt at the fair rulings given by Mr. Speaker. Never before had he sat for three weeks in his seat without rising about decisions of the chair, he stated.

The letter from T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, in regard to the exchange of waterfront for the city's riparian rights in Cow Bay was further laid on the table by the city council last evening.

David Wells and Joseph Wells Indians of Port Simpson, pleaded guilty to the charge of assaulting a police officer before Judge Young yesterday afternoon and are coming up today for sentence.

A bylaw for the consolidation of bond issues was put through its first readings at last night's council meeting and was laid on the table until it has gone through the hands of the inspector of municipalities.

On the recommendation of the reading room committee last night the city council decided to have the walls of the reading room re-kalsomined and the salary of the janitor of the room was fixed at \$15 monthly. It was also decided to call for tenders for the supplying of periodicals for the year.

Bylaws for the borrowing of \$50,000, \$10,000 and the payment of the indemnity of the mayor and aldermen, were given their first, second and committee readings at the council meeting last night and were passed. A clause has been inserted in the latter bylaw whereby an alderman loses a month's indemnity if he misses four or more consecutive meetings, unless on city business.

Ald. Kerr, chairman of the board of works, in answer to a query by Ald. Frizzell at last night's council meeting, reported that the board of works had recently inspected the rock quarries at Sockeye, Tyee and Smith Island and that a recommendation would be brought to the council as soon as transportation costs between each of the quarries and the city had been ascertained.

## DEATH TAKES INDIAN CHIEF

**Elijah Nunstins of the Skidegate Haida Passos, Aged 93 Years.**

SKIDEGATE, March 8.—Elijah Nunstins, one of the old time chiefs of the Haida Indians, died here on February 26 at the age of 93 years. He was the last of the tribal chiefs, who with their followers, amalgamated years ago to form the two important native villages of Haida and Skidegate. The funeral took place on Monday, February 28, and all the natives of the Skidegate village turned out to pay their last respects to his memory.

## OIL SHALE TESTS ON GRAHAM ISLAND

**A. A. McPhail Here on His Way South After Working on the Proposal.**

That the investigations in regard to the possibilities of working the oil shale claims on Graham Island are proceeding and will be completed as soon as the snow is gone, is the word brought here by A. A. McPhail, an oil expert, who has been on the islands in connection with that work. A testing machine was taken into the interior and tests made at different points. It was found, however, that there was too much snow in the interior of the island to complete the work but this will be done within the next few months.

The proposal is to extract high grade oil from the shales, which are so prevalent on Graham Island. This oil is richer in by-products than the ordinary oil from a gusher. If it can be found in sufficiently large quantities, there is every possibility of important developments in the part of the island where the rich shales are found.

### AFTERMATH OF WITLEY RIOTS

Argument that High Prices Justified Soldiers in Rioting

GUILDFORD, Surrey, England, Mar. 8.—An echo of the Witley riots was heard in the King's Bench Division of the Law Courts when a commission was authorized by Mr. Justice Coleridge to proceed to Ottawa for the purpose of taking evidence in connection with an action brought against the Surrey County Council for damages sustained by six storekeepers of "Tin Town" at the time of the Canadian military riots in 1918-19. The claimants are not satisfied with the compensation made by the Canadian authorities.

Sir Richard Muir appeared on behalf of the Surrey County Council, and explained that the application for a commission arose through an action, or series of actions, brought against the Council by the tenants of shanties called "Tin Town," which were annexed to one of the Canadian military camps at Witley.

**Damage to Buildings**  
On Armistice Day, November 11, 1918, there was a riot of Canadian soldiers in the camp, he said, and damage was done to some buildings. Therefore, the occupants of the shops, apart from several other considerations, had the warning of the risks they were running in keeping shops and goods there. In February, 1919, there was a further riot, Sir Richard continued, and further damage to shops and contents was done, and there was a third riot, with more damage, in June, 1919.

The Camp was one which was governed entirely by the military, he said. The civilian police had no jurisdiction there at all, and were not allowed in the camp.

The military police and officers were quite unable to cope with the soldiers, he said, who took it into their heads to riot. The occupants of the tin shanties made a claim against the Canadian government, some in respect of the riots of February, 1919, and some, Sir Richard thought, also in respect of the riots in June, 1919. Some of them received compensation, others recovered none at all. Some did not apply to the Canadian government for compensation, he said.

**Six Tenants Sue**  
Sir Richard told the Court that approximately six tenants of the tin shanties were suing the Surrey County Council for damages which the claimants said had risen from a riot. They were suing the Council under the Riot Act, he explained.

"But this was a riot of soldiers in a camp under military control, and in a place where the Surrey police would have no jurisdiction, and where, of course, they would not have a force which could possibly cope with them. That was the claim against the Surrey County Council," Sir Richard said. The Surrey County Council said they were not liable, and if they were liable the ratepayers of Surrey would have to pay the damages.

The position taken by Sir Richard was that the whole of the records of the court of enquiry held after the riots and all the witnesses had been moved to Canada. An effort had been made, he said, to get documentary evidence from Ottawa, but this had failed.

**Prices Too High**  
Sir Richard proceeded to argue that if the people who owned the shops put up their prices to such an extent that they provoked a riot then they were not entitled to damages. Upon that point the Surrey County Council relied on evidence from the Dominion, he said.

J. B. Melville, on behalf of the claimants, said the compensation made by the Canadian authorities was inadequate, and censured the Surrey Council for not taking steps to adjust the claims before the evidence and witnesses were removed to the Dominion.

"They did not pack up their tents and hit away immediately after the commission sat," he added.

Sir Richard then explained that the Canadian government had given the complainants what they thought they were entitled to after a full enquiry.

**Had Their Bite**  
"They have had their bite at the Canadian authorities," Sir Richard said. Mr. Melville replied that on November 11, 1919, the storekeepers were informed by the Canadian authorities in offering a contribution of five hundred pounds that "the Canadian authorities regret the circumstances and are making the above contribution not as an admission of liability but as an expression of regret and as an act of grace."

The commission which Justice Coleridge has authorized to proceed to Ottawa will endeavor to get evidence from Canadian demobilized soldiers that would enable the Court to say whether or not excessive prices were charged the soldiers while they were stationed at Witley, and whether there was justification for a riot taking place.

In the meantime the case will stand over for a month until the return of the commission. The question of costs was raised, and the Court agreed to a request by Mr. Melville that as far as the costs of the commission were concerned they should be reserved to the judge at the trial.
