

TOLD ABOUT PRISON LIFE

F. S. Walton Related How He Managed to Escape and Attempt to Form Irish Brigade

. One of the features of an address given by F. S. Walton at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday afternoon, George Munro presiding, was the account of how the Germans tried to form an Irish brigade at Lemberg prison camp.

According to Mr. Walton, the Irich Catholics were separated from the other prisoners and they were nersuaded, cajoled, threatened but with no effect. Then Sir Roger Casement and his wife would come and lecture to them but Casement never went where anyone could get at him. Later he was captured by the Friday, October 7, 1932 British and hanged.
