Sir Joseph Flavelle Is New Chairman Grand Trunk Railway Board Directors

MONTREAL, May 30.—Sir Joseph Flavelle has been elected chairman of the Grand Trunk board of directors. Howard G. Kelley, president of the railway, is made a director retaining the post as president.

With the government's new move in nominating and calling to London the names of the new Grand Trunk directors, this pioneer railway for the first time in its history gets a Canadian directorate as a prelude to being taken over by the Canadian people for whose benefit it will be run hereafter.

Even though the appointments are temporary while arrangements are being made for bringing the system into co-ordination with the Canadian National Railway system, some of them will likely become permanent.

The naming of Sir Joseph Flavelle as chairman accords with the general impression created some weeks ago that he might be sought after by the Canadian government to act as chairman of the unified board of directors when all the government roads are brought under one management.

Mr. Kelley's name in the list of directors does not necessarily mean that he will be one of the permanent men. It is necessary to have on the board one closely associated with the management of the Grand Trunk Railway, and one like Mr. Mitchell, closely associated with the Canadian National Railways, so the process of co-ordination can be aided by expert knowledge of both sides of the problem.

Mr. Newcombe's presence on the board will enable him to get a good grip of the safeguards necessary to put into the legislative framework to see that the country's interests are kept foremost.

Whether Mr. Kelley remains on the board or not it is expected he will have a high managerial post offered him.

NAVIGATION WILL BE OPEN SOON ON YUKON

First Vessel Expected to Leave Whitehorse Bound North on June 6.

DAWSON, May 30.—Navigation from Whitehorse to Dawson and the mouth of the Yukon River and tributary points will open in a few days. The first steamer is expected to leave Whitehorse for Dawson on June 6.

OLE EVINDSEN VISITS MEXICO

But Finds British Columbia Good Enough to Make Home

TIA JUANA IS REAL ORIGINAL OPEN TOWN

Missed Another Fortune when at Races—Class Doesn't Count

Ole Evindsen, the well-known Alice Arm prospector and one of the original discoverers of the famous Dolly Varden mine, has been spending a few days in the city and expects to return south on the Campsun tomorrow night. He has bought a twelve-acre fruit farm in South Vancouver and he intends to remain there a while getting things in running order.

Mr. Evindsen, accompanied by Mrs. Evindsen and daughter, Alma, spent the winter in California and while there they bought a Paige car which they brought north to Vancouver, coming from San Diego in the car the trip to Vancouver was made in 76 1/2 hours actual running time, although they made many side trips and spent three weeks on the way. They called en route north in the Imperial Valley, Tia Juana, skirted along the Mexican border, and passed through San Francisco, Los Angeles, Bakersfield, Portland, Seattle and other cities.

Everybody interested in Mr. Evindsen gives a very interesting description of Tia Juana and other places in Mexico near the border. Tia Juana is nothing but a drinking and gambling town. The buildings are big, shabby frame structures, most of them wide open, with no windows or doors. In these buildings are big bars along which range at every hour of the day and night thousands of American visitors, men and women, in various stages of intoxication. Along the streets are parked hundreds of cars.

Variety in Gambling
The main business of the citizens of Tia Juana is professional gambling and their customers are the visitors from the United States. Behind the bars in the resorts are to be found all the gambling games and devices known—roulette wheels, wheels of fortune, stud poker, draw poker, faro, black jack and all kinds of dice games. The stakes are high and all the business is done with American and Mexican silver. At one place, Mr. Evindsen says, he saw a table with a high pile of silver in the centre around which a person could not encircle the arms.

American "Suckers"
All the gambling in Tia Juana is crooked and the people who run it are merely there to part the easy American "sucker" from his money. Horse racing is featured. Some of the highest class ribboned racing stock from the United States is taken there, but it very seldom ever wins. Instead some old nag looking like a cart horse and listed by the book-makers at 11 to 1 odds leads them all. It just depends on the management of the race. The

Missed a Fortune

Mr. Evindsen tells of how he missed a fortune on the ponies. Never having had any experience at the game, he saw one good looking horse offered at 100 to 1 odds and thought he would put a ten dollar bill on it. His partner pool-pooed the idea and asked what was the use of throwing away the money, so it was not placed. When the race was run Mr. Evindsen's pick came in a couple of hundred feet ahead of all the rest. Thus he missed \$1,000 that he could never have made so easily in the hills of Alice Arm.

Best People Here

Mr. Evindsen says he wouldn't have missed the trip for anything, but he doesn't like Mexico. Nobody is natural down there and life isn't normal. So he came back north to Vancouver, which is just lively enough for him. He is going to look after that farm for a while and then he may go back to the hills again. That's where he finds men of his own kind—big, both in physique and in character. It's all right to spend a holiday in Mexico or California, the weather's fine and the scenery's great, but for "reglar fellars" the hills of British Columbia have far and away the best stock.

ALICE ARM HAD ITS ANNUAL CELEBRATION

Anyox Went up in Force to Enjoy Day.

There was a big celebration at Alice Arm on Tuesday last, Victoria Day. There was a complete program of field events and also a baseball game with Anyox, which resulted in an 8 to 2 victory for Alice Arm. There were many excursion boats from the smelter town and every condition was auspicious for the success and enjoyment of the day. This was Alice Arm's fourth Victoria Day Celebration and was quite as successful as any of the previous ones.

SETTLING ALGUCIAN AFFAIRS AT STEWART

N. Van Debroek and F. C. Dunn Reached Portland Canal Town. Last Night

STEWART, May 30.—N. Van Debroek and F. C. Dunn arrived in Stewart by the Provincial on Friday night for the purpose of settling up the claims against the Spider mine. The Spider was developed last year by the Algucian Mining Company, a Belgian syndicate, which is now declared to be insolvent. They have a number of creditors here and there are large claims against them, including those for last summer's packing and supplies.

MRS. BERGDOLL HAS FORTUNE TIED UP

Must Submit Statement of Grover's Possessions before She Gets Hers

PHILADELPHIA, May 30.—All the property in the Bergdoll family has been confiscated by order of President Harding. 

LETTERS OF BENJAMIN FRANKLIN IN PRAGUE

PRAGUE, May 28.—Two letters written by Benjamin Franklin, one in French dated Paris in 1782 and another in English, dated Philadelphia in 1876, have been found among the documents in the Museum of History at Prague, an inventory of which is being made for the purpose of drawing up a new catalogue.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions without residence, but such making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportional improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year.

Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements and residence maintained on Crown grant land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Lease of one-half of one of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provided for grazing districts and range administration under Commission. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for esters' campers or travellers, up to ten head.

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BIG TIMBER HANDLED ON QUEEN CHARLOTTE'S

Al Hayden, Formerly Logging at Alice Arm, Arrives From Thurston Harbor.

Al Hayden, formerly in the logging business at Alice Arm but now doing similar work at Thurston Harbor for the Whalen mills, reached the city on Saturday afternoon and intends to go south this week to spend a few days in Vancouver.

Mr. Hayden says the spruce timber on the Queen Charlottes is about the best in the world. Many logs he has put into the water measured eleven feet at the butt and contained 20,000 feet of lumber. This spruce is all taken to Swanson Bay where it is made into pulp or box lumber.

Ernie Moss Expects to Get Out First Issue Next Saturday.

ALICE ARM, May 30.—Ernie Moss has set up his printing establishment in George Brugg's old store here and expects to get out the first paper ever issued here next Saturday.

OIL SHALE MAN ON WAY SOUTH

Thomas Howson says Great Prospects on Queen Charlottes

Thomas Howson, a mining and financial man who is well known in the province, has just returned from the Queen Charlotte Islands where he is interested in an oil shale proposition. He leaves for the southern coast cities tomorrow night. Mr. Howson, who was one of the first to take up this industry in this part of the country, is going south for the purpose of interesting capital in the enterprise, so that operations may be gone on with on a large scale and opportunity be given to ascertain the undoubted wealth which the Islands possess in the matter of obtaining petroleum by extraction from the oil bearing shale that is in such abundance in that locality.

Scotland was the first country in which the discovery was made that fuel oil could be obtained in this manner and the industry has been thriving there for many years. Now there are several parts of the United States that are being exploited for the same.

Mr. Howson, who is widely conversant with the matter, is most enthusiastic about the opportunities on the Queen Charlotte Islands, where the shale carries a far larger percentage of oil than any place he has so far seen. He hopes to see a plant established on the Islands in the near future, and another profitable industry going in this part of the province.

SEED 94 ACRES IN ONE DAY FOR SOLDIER FARMER

War Veterans on Land Exhibit Splendid Spirit of Co-operation to Help Stricken Brother

REGINA, May 29.—A striking incident which forcibly demonstrates the co-operation which is being exhibited by the soldier settlers on the Ochopowace Reserve, near Whitewood, Sask., is the case of P. H. Watson, ex-lieutenant in the C.E.F., a soldier settler on this reserve.

On the twenty-third of April last, while Mr. Watson was splitting wood on his farm, a chip struck his eye. He received local medical attention, and as he was carrying on his spring work during windy weather his eye did not improve. The local doctor advised him to proceed to Winnipeg, and upon his arrival there it was reported that it was doubtful whether Mr. Watson would recover the sight of the eye.

As the seeding season was progressing, the neighboring farmers south of the Reserve organized a bee among the soldier settlers and in consequence on May 4 fifteen four-horse teams, with eight drills and drag-harrows, went to work on Mr. Watson's land and seeded 94 acres in one day. The settlers' participation in this work provided their own feed for their horses during the day.

Following the marriage an enjoyable wedding breakfast was served and best wishes for health and happiness were extended to the couple. Mr. and Mrs. Purser will reside permanently in the city.
