Soviet Government Is Now Bankrupt

FORMER MUNITIONS BOARD HEAD CHAIRMAN GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY BOARD

Moscow Despatches to Paris State That Premier Lenin Sends Out Distress Signals

RIGA, May 30.—According to direct despatches received from Moscow from independent sources Lenin, the Soviet Russian premier, has declared that communism is in complete bankruptcy and has asked that the presiding officers of the All-Russian Central Executive Committee approve of an unlimited return to capitalism. He also asks that all constitutional Democrats and other parties be recalled for the purpose of rebuilding the state.

This action would completely upset the system now obtaining in Russia and would mean the downfall of the soviet regime as a failure. The despatches are causing more attention from the diplomats of all Europe than has any news for months.

YOUNG MAN WAS DROWNED WHILE GOING PORCHER

E. A. Gurster, Aged 22, Lost His Life Saturday Afternoon at 5:45.

Another instance of the tragedy so often attendant upon the inability to swim is to be recorded in the drowning of Edward A. Gurster, a young man employed at the dry dock and well known in the city, who lost his life 125 yards from the shore of Porcher Island on Saturday afternoon.

In company with Miss Kitty Noelle, who was going to visit friends at Porcher Island, Ted, as the deceased was commonly known, and a fisherman, Oscar Olsen, left here in the launch Fish Belle at 2 o'clock on Saturday afternoon. In Carr Passage near Porcher Island, there was a breeze blowing as the engine power was supplemented with the sail and about 5:45 the young man who had been in the cabin most of the time came up on deck to get some fresh air. Shortly after coming out there was a change of wind and he was struck by the sail boom and swept overboard into the water. Heard Shriek.

Olsen, who was below at the time, heard a shriek from the air and rushing up saw what had happened. He immediately stopped the boat and put off in the dugout towards the struggling lad but his boat upset and he had difficulty in saving himself by clinging to the upturned craft and making for shore which he reached in an almost unconscious condition. Meanwhile, Gurster was seen by Miss Noelle from the launch to rise to the surface three times and finally sink.

Aid was summoned from some of the ranchers on the island and all night until 3 o'clock in the morning the shore nearly the drowning was patrolled but without avail. Finally, Miss Noelle and Olsen returned to Prince Rupert yesterday morning and the police and coroner were notified of the accident.

Police Search. Later yesterday morning another search party consisting of Provincial Constable Alex Saint, Olsen, Reginald Clark, Russell McRae and Sid Davis, the two latter partners of the deceased in their residence on Third Ave., left for Porcher Island. The afternoon was spent with grappling irons in an endeavor to recover the body, but the efforts were, however, unsuccessful and the

search was given up. The settlers on the island say that the current in Carr Passage is so strong that the body was likely swept out and the chances of recovery are remote. The party returned to the city last night.

Ted Gurster was but a young man 22 years of age. His parents Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Gurster reside at 915 Robson Street, Vancouver, and the lad was brought up and educated in that city. His father conducts a tobacco business at Bowen Island. There are two brothers and one sister. Deceased, since coming here two years ago, has been employed at the shipyard and for a while was steward in the Prince Rupert Club. He had become well known and was well liked by all with whom he came in contact.

GENERAL SMUTS AND COLLEAGUES LEAVE ATTEND CONFERENCE

CAPETOWN, May 30.—General Smuts, premier of the Union of South Africa, accompanied by a large party, which includes several of his cabinet colleagues, sailed for London on Saturday to attend the Dominions' conference. A great ovation was given as General Smuts and his party departed from this port.

MORE KILLINGS TAKE PLACE IN IRELAND

Constables, Soldiers and Civilians Fall Victims in Dublin Raids

GORK, May 30.—Two Fitzgerald brothers, a soldier and a railway porter, were taken from their homes here and killed. A party of Ulster policemen were fired on in Tyrone. Constable Coulter was killed and one man with whom he was speaking later died of wounds. Another man wounded in the attacking party escaped.

The Wonderful Valley of the Bulkley River.

By the Editor.

A trip through the Bulkley Valley is sufficient to dispel any idea as to the inadaptability of the district for agriculture. Bright green fields of timothy are seen everywhere and chocolate brown land that has just been plowed or seeded and which very soon will also be green. Everywhere prosperity is apparent.

The people of the Bulkley valley are fearful of boomsters and also they dislike a pessimist. They are anxious that the outside world shall know the truth about the place and that new settlers who come shall have a good idea of the difficulties as well as the possibilities.

We drove through the best part of the country around Telkwa, more particularly the Tyee Lake and Round Lake districts. There are few farming districts as pretty as these anywhere in the world. The land is rolling, partly covered with timber, but with large stretches,

cultivated, with herds of cattle and here and there a flock of sheep. The cattle had wintered well and are now finding plenty of grass in the fields or on the range.

Bulkley Crops

The principal crop is timothy hay, with oats coming second and wheat and barley following close.

The question of wheat growing is discussed a good deal. Last year there was summer frost that injured, but all was sold at a good price for chicken feed. Usually, we were told, wheat ripens well and grades high. Wheat growing

is not the future industry of the valley, however. At present beef raising occupies the attention of most of the farmers, but dairying is likely to take precedence in the near future, as that is the industry almost all are looking forward to.

Let us tell you of a visit we made to one of the leading farmers.

Prudhomme's Ranch

We went to see Alex Prudhomme, for we all knew him and although we might have been opposed to him politically at the last election, that has nothing to do with our trip through the country. We found he was

Sir Joseph Flavelle Is New Chairman Grand Trunk Railway Board Directors

MONTREAL, May 30.—Sir Joseph Flavelle has been elected chairman of the Grand Trunk board of directors. Howard G. Kelley, president of the railway, is made a director retaining the post as president.

With the government's new move in nominating and cabling to London the names of the new Grand Trunk directors, this pioneer railway for the first time in its history gets a Canadian directorate as a prelude to being taken over by the Canadian people for whose benefit it will be run hereafter.

Even though the appointments are temporary while arrangements are being made for bringing the system into co-ordination

with the Canadian National Railway system, some of them will likely become permanent.

The naming of Sir Joseph Flavelle as chairman accords with the general impression created some weeks ago that he might be sought after by the Canadian government to act as chairman of the unified board of directors when all the government roads are brought under one management. That he is not a railroad man is urged by some who object to the appointment but the report made is that he was not a munitions man before he took over the munitions board and managed it successfully for

VANCOUVER, May 30.—There is no foundation for the report that the Dominion fisheries cruiser Malaspina had captured a Japanese sealer, says a wireless message from Captain Holmes Newcombe of the Malaspina.

Two Railwaymen.

Mr. Kelley's name in the list of directors does not necessarily mean that he will be one of the permanent men. It is necessary to have on the board one closely associated with the management of the Grand Trunk Railway, and one like Mr. Mitchell, closely associated with the Canadian National Railways, so the process of co-ordination can be aided by expert knowledge of both sides of the problem.

Mr. Newcombe's presence on the board will enable him to get a good grip of the safeguards necessary to put into the legislative framework to see that the country's interests are kept foremost.

Whether Mr. Kelley remains on the board or not it is expected he will have a high managerial post offered him.

OLE EVINDSEN VISITS MEXICO

But Finds British Columbia Good Enough to Make Home

TIA JUANA IS REAL ORIGINAL OPEN TOWN

Missed Another Fortune when at Races—Class Doesn't Count

Ole Evindsen, the well-known Alice Arm prospector and one of the original discoverers of the famous Dolly Varden mine, has been spending a few days in the city and expects to return south on the Campsun tomorrow night. He has bought a twelve acre fruit farm in South Vancouver and he intends to remain there a while getting things in running order.

Mr. Evindsen, accompanied by Mrs. Evindsen and daughter, Alma, spent the winter in California and while there they bought a Paige car which they brought North to Vancouver. Coming from San Diego in the car the trip to Vancouver was made in 16½ hours actual running time, although they made many side trips and spent three weeks on the way. They called en route North in the Imperial Valley, Tia Juana, skirted along the Mexican border, and passed through San Francisco, Los Angeles, Bakersfield, Portland, Seattle and other cities.

Everybody Intoxicated

Mr. Evindsen gives a very interesting description of Tia Juana and other places in Mexico near the border. Tia Juana is nothing but a drinking and gambling town. The buildings are big, shabby frame structures, most of them wide open, with no windows or doors. In these buildings are big bars along which range at every hour of the day and night thousands of American visitors, men and women, in various stages of intoxication. Along the streets are parked hundreds of cars.

Variety in Gambling

The main business of the citizens of Tia Juana is professional gambling and their customers are the visitors from the United States. Behind the bars in the resorts are to be found all the gambling games and devices known—roulette wheels, wheels of fortune, stud poker, draw poker, faro, black jack and all kinds of dice games.

The stakes are high and all the business is done with American and Mexican silver. At one place, Mr. Evindsen says, he saw a table with a high pile of silver in the centre around which a person could not encircle the arms.

American "Suckers"

All the gambling in Tia Juana is crooked and the people who run it are merely there to part the easy American "sucker" from his money. Horse racing is featured. Some of the highest class ribboned racing stock from the United States is taken there, but it very seldom ever wins.

Instead some old nag looking like a cart horse and listed by the bookmakers at 11 to 4 odds leads them all. It just depends on the management of the race. The

best horses which have the big money on them are pulled generally so that some cripple, with no takers, crosses the line first.

Missed a Fortune

Mr. Evindsen tells of how he missed a fortune on the ponies. LETTERS OF BENJAMIN FRANKLIN IN PRAGUE

PRAGUE, May 28.—Two letters written by Benjamin Franklin, one in French dated Paris in 1782 and another in English, dated Philadelphia in 1786, have been found among the documents in the Museum of History at Prague, an inventory of which is being made for the purpose of drawing up a new catalogue.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$6 an acre; second-class to \$3.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Particular pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions in joint interest, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1 acre before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, by payment of \$10 per acre, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificates of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he farms with his wife or in conjunction with his farm, without any such occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 30 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after three years of residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding \$40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows in inaccessible locations may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rent of one-half of the road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The scope within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war, unless otherwise directed.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 26, 1918. There are no limits for five years.

Provision for return of money accrued, due and used paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase tows, oil, jute, cotton and other members of Allied Forces, or dependents required direct or indirect, remitted from entitlement to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who fail to complete purchase, involving forfeiture and fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes.

Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1910, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner.

Annual grazing permits issued based on grazing arranged prior to established owners. Herdsmen or managers may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or tourists, up to one head.

BIG TIMBER HANDLED ON QUEEN CHARLOTTES

Al Hayden, Formerly Logging at
Alice Arm, Arrives From
Thurston Harbor.

Al Hayden, formerly in the logging business at Alice Arm but now doing similar work at Thurston Harbor for the Whalen mills, reached the city on Saturday afternoon and intends to go south this week to spend a few days in Vancouver.

Mr. Hayden says the spruce timber on the Queen Charlottes is about the best in the world.

Many logs he has put into the water measured eleven feet at the butt and contained 20,000 feet of lumber. This spruce is all taken to Swanson Bay where it is made into pulp or box lumber.

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
