WORK ON COURT HOUSE COMMENCES TOMORROW

NO NATION COULD TOLERATE REPARATIONS TERMS, SAYS VON SIMONS

Court House Construction is to Commence Tomorrow when First Ground Will Be Broken

Work on the new Government buildings will commence tomorrow. A. C. McDougall and J. H. McNeil of the firm of McNeil and McNeil, contractors with registered offices in Alberta, Saskatchewan and British Columbia, will do the actual construction, being associated with Albert & McCaffery in the contract. McDougall in an interview this morning said his firm will undertake the work of construction and Albert & McCaffery will assemble the material for the building. The two firms are associated in the contract. The work is to commence tomorrow morning and a number of laborers will be put on getting the trenches for the foundations. Discussing the work further, Mr. McDougall said it would be completed in a quarter of a million dollars would be spent on it this year. Architect Whittaker who arrived this morning is gone up the river to look at some gravel, which the miners wish approved, and there will be no delays pushing the work ahead. The superintendent of construction is already on the ground. Mitchell Albert of the firm of Albert & McCaffery arrived from Vancouver this morning in connection with the contract, which was announced, was let to his firm.

PRINCE GEORGE IS CHARTERED FOR EXCURSION

VANCOUVER, April 27.—The Board of Trade has chartered the steamer Prince George for the trip to Prince Rupert, Stewart and Anyox, leaving here on June 7. It is understood she will carry a considerable contingent of Victoria Chamber of Commerce members as well as Vancouver.

TAYLOR RETURNING FROM OLD COUNTRY

Expected He Will Make Some Announcement in Regard to Operating Dolly Varden.

A. J. T. Taylor, president of the Taylor Mining Co., which operates the Dolly Varden mine at Alice Arm, is expected to return to Vancouver next Wednesday from an extended trip to the Old Country where he will be in connection with the future operations of the silver property. It is expected that with Mr. Taylor's arrival in Vancouver some announcement as to the activities of the company at Alice Arm this season will be made.

B.C. TEACHERS ARE TO STUDY IN FRANCE

Three Chosen from Vancouver and Victoria for Next Year.

VICTORIA, April 27.—Henr. Ghodet, M.A., specialist in French at King Edward High School, Vancouver; Miss Mary Hamilton, teacher of French at Victoria High School, and Miss Pauline Ginzburgher, M.A., of the University of B. C., have been selected to represent British Columbia at the universities of France next year. Scholarships worth \$1,200 for the purpose were voted by the Legislature at the recent session.

RUSSIA IS TRYING TO CONCLUDE TREATIES

Taking Advantage of Reparations Difference to Sign Up with Germany

RIGA, April 27.—Soviet emissaries have been sent to conclude trade relations with Norway and Sweden and also Germany. They will endeavor to conclude a German treaty before May 1, seeking to take advantage of the Reparations dilemma to obtain an advantageous treaty.

DISAPPEARANCE CASE IS BEING INVESTIGATED

Partner of Haldens at Quesnel Gives Reasonable Account of Himself.

QUESNEL, April 27.—In connection with the disappearance of the Halden family from a farm here last October, the story told by David Clark, Halden's partner, who is in custody, is that Halden returned two days after he and his family left in an automobile on October 29. This is borne out by the discovery that the outgoing man registered at a hotel in Kamloops on November 3 alone. After Clark advertised for Halden and he failed to appear, Clark said he considered he had a right to dispose of the stock and provisions. The jewelry, he claims, was given him in lieu of wages and everything belonging to Halden was taken over under foreclosure.

FACES CHARGE OF KIDNAPPING

Michelson Has Additional Charge Preferred Against Him in Police Court.

E. Michelson, of the boat Valorous, charged with robbery with violence from Jack Miller of 10 cases of liquor, was further charged in the police court this morning with kidnapping. On account of the inability of the crown to obtain two material witnesses as yet both cases have been further adjourned until tomorrow morning. In the meantime the police are searching for these witnesses and already several expeditions have been made in the vicinity of the city but without success up to the present.

EPAULINE ARRIVED IN TOW OF FISH BOAT

Was Surveyed this Morning in Drydock Following Striking Rock in Millbank Sound.

The fine launch Epauline, the property of F. L. Buckley of Point Gray and Buckley Bay, ran on a rock in Millbank Sound when coming north in charge of two Japanese. She struck near Low Point and the keel and planking were badly injured and the shaft, rudder and propeller bent. Fortunately she was able to get a tow northward and arrived in Prince Rupert yesterday morning. In the afternoon she was docked at Wallace's and a survey made by Capt. McCoskrie on behalf of the Insurance Company of North America which carries the risk. An estimate is being prepared today and it is probable the launch will be repaired here. The Epauline is 68 feet long with 17 ft. beam and is 8 feet deep. Her gross tonnage is 57, net 41. She is one of the finest yachts on the coast, splendidly appointed and well suited to coasting in these waters. She was used a good deal here during the aeroplane spruce production days. The owner of the boat was expected to leave Vancouver for the east last night.

LABORATORY FIUME AGAIN IS GOING IN IS CUT OFF

Auxiliary of General Hospital to Underlie Whole Arrangements

FIUME, April 27.—The people's party occupied the city hall, ejecting the administration. Fascist and D'Annunzio adherents then occupied other buildings and declared martial law. The Italian Government has closed the frontier with a brigade of infantry and sent a torpedo boat destroyer to stop the rioting.

MINISTER OF LANDS ARRIVED HERE TODAY, ADDRESS ROTARIANS

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, arrived today on the Prince George from Victoria and will spend some time in his district. Among the places he will visit are Terrace and Prince George. He will address the Rotary Club tomorrow.

CUP CHALLENGER TO BE LAUNCHED TONIGHT

VANCOUVER, April 27.—The Royal Vancouver Yacht Club challenger for the Pacific Lipton Cup, the Patricia, designed by G. H. Nicholson, the famous British designer, will be launched here tonight. The cup is now held by the owners of Sir Tom of the Seattle Club.

Miners Strike Outlook Is Rather Blue Today

LONDON, April 27.—The miners, following their meeting with the mine owners, declared the proposals of the latter were no advance toward agreement on the fundamentals of a strike. What they were asking for was a national pool of money and a wage board. The conference between the owners and miners and Sir Home was without result. Today Sir Robert meets the miners and after that the miners. He declared he did not know how money could be found to meet the demands of the miners.

German Delegate Makes Big Talk in Reichstag Regarding Reparations

LONDON, April 27.—The British Government is inquiring informally into the new German offer.

BERLIN, April 27.—Explaining the reparations proposals, Von Simons declared in the Reichstag there was a limit to the allied policy of force which no nation could tolerate. Simons charged that the French were smashing German trade and declared Germany would enter into the land of promise and freedom, even if France occupied Ruhr to enslave the workers for years.

Oriental Immigration Is Discussed at Ottawa by H. H. Stevens, Vancouver

OTTAWA, April 27.—The question of immigration was debated in the House of Commons yesterday and there was an intensely interesting discussion.

H. H. Stevens of Vancouver urged exclusion of all Chinese except businessmen. Evasion of the regulations, he said, had the effect of flooding British Columbia with Orientals. The choicest lands were taken up by them, making competition impossible for white people. Mr. Stevens asked that Orientals be forbidden to own or lease lands. He blamed them for the drug traffic in British Columbia and expressed the opinion that the province would be better without them.

TORNADO DEVASTATES A MISSOURI TOWN

BRAXTON, Missouri, April 27.—A tornado demolished every business building in town and many homes. Twelve people were killed and many badly injured. Braxton has 600 inhabitants.

Harper, a director, was received with regret and Harry Lipsitt has been chosen to take his place on the board of directors.

A committee was appointed comprising F. G. Dawson, W. E. Thompson and G. H. Munro, to start a membership drive. Membership and season tickets will be issued. The former will cost \$1 and will merely entitle the purchasers to membership in the association and the privilege of exhibiting in all classes free of charge. The season tickets will entitle the holders to free admission to the exhibition and will cost \$2.

Country Dance.

Some time about the middle of May it is proposed to put on a country dance to raise funds for the improvement of the grounds about the building. It was also decided last night to add to the prize list sections for the exhibit of thoroughbred dairy cattle, sheep and pigs. For the past two years these classes have been deleted from the prize list.

Hospital Day To Be Celebrated.

A National Hospital Day has been set for the 101st anniversary of Florence Nightingale, which falls on May 12. The day is being celebrated everywhere with the object of drawing special attention to the work done by the hospitals with a view to closer co-operation between the public and the institutions.

In Prince Rupert there is a very worthy institution excellently conducted and the people of Prince Rupert will be asked to consider the splendid work it is doing, especially in connection with the day set aside as hospital day.

The day is intended to be one of widespread hospital propaganda, which will establish greater interest, greater co-operation and stimulation for better service. The program for the day is left to each individual hospital to arrange as it sees fit, but several suggestions have been put forth by the committee, many of which will be carried out in Vancouver," says the Daily Province.

Some of these are—that the various hospitals have "open day" to the public so that they can see through the institution in this day various functions for the hospital, as, nurses' graduation exercises, balls, dances, teas, etc.; that the various clubs and organizations during the week of May 12 celebrate the day of devoting time at their meetings to addresses on hospital affairs; that the ministers refer to the work of the hospitals from the pulpits the Sunday previous; that the theatres assist in the propaganda by slides and movies; that the hospitals distribute descriptive pamphlets of their work and service; that the merchants decorate their windows accordingly, and many other features to make it a real day.

Britain Reduces Her War Debt.

In spite of her domestic difficulties Great Britain is paying off her war debt. Press despatches announce that she is already clear with Japan, Argentine, Holland and Spain and that large sums have been paid to United States and Canada. This is a most encouraging condition and one that gives hope for the future. If Britain can do that, surely it should be an easy matter for Canada to grapple with her financial situation and deal with it intelligently and effectually. National credit is most important to a nation and British credit has almost always been good. It is time Canada was restoring the condition of her currency and establishing her credit once more so that she may be able to deal with the United States on equal terms.

Debased Currency Has Its Value.

While those of us who buy have to suffer from the poor condition of Canadian currency and the adverse balance of trade, there are compensations. Take the position of Anyox as an example. It is the discrepancy in the matter of currency that makes it possible for the smelter and mine there to operate, at the present price of copper. There is a margin in favor of the producer on this side to the extent of from twelve to fifteen per cent. This enables the smelters on this side of the line to make a profit while the smelters on the other side are shut down. It militates against the employees but it is better for them to have work, even at the low rate of wages, than for the smelter to be closed and those who have homes there to be obliged to leave.

Commence Permanent Road Building.

The Board of Works recommends to the City Council that two streets of the city be graded instead of replanked. This looks like a sensible policy. We cannot always live here with planked streets and the sooner we get down to permanent work the better it will be for the place. Eventually all the streets will have to be graded and it is time the work was begun.

Great Success Scored by Great War Veterans' Association Last Night.

Unqualified success attended the smoker held in the Empress Theatre last night by the Great War Veterans' Association in aid of the newly-formed band. The hall was filled with an audience that was highly satisfied with the entertainment that had been afforded. There was a long program of music, recitations, dancing and boxing but the feature of it all was the presence of the band which did itself credit. Refreshments and smokes were kept flowing in generous style during the whole of the evening.

J. H. Kelly, president of the association, was the chairman of the concert. After making a few introductory remarks he called upon the band under Bandmaster Greenfield, which played in excellent manner the old favorite, "Colonel Bogey" march. Through out the evening the selections of the band were greeted with great applause and encores demanded on every occasion.

First Half.
The first half of the program included several splendid songs and recitations. R. Robertson sang "My Old Woman," and in response to the demands of the audience encoered with "I'll Never Forget the Day," Principal J. G. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.



COMMEMORATES YPRES BATTLE

Special Service Held at Christ Church, Anyox, on Sunday

ANYOX, April 27.—A goodly number turned out to the commemorative service of the Second Battle of Ypres on Sunday evening last, the preacher for the occasion being the incumbent, Rev. J. B. Gibson. There were special psalms and lessons suitable to the occasion, a reminder of the dark days of the war. In his address the speaker said: "We commemorate a feat of arms performed by our own kith and kin which will live in history for ever. The wave of battle that fell on our soldiers at Ypres has baptized the Dominion into nationhood, Canada, through the sacrifice of her sons, glows with a new meaning before all the civilized world."
He referred to the outbreak of war and Britain's response to the distress calls of gallant little Belgium.

When war was declared, Canada decided to raise an expeditionary force to aid in upholding the honor of the Motherland. An offer of 20,000 men was made to and accepted by the British Government. As this news flashed across the Dominion the fires of patriotism were stirred and the

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$1 an acre; second-class to \$1.50 an acre.
Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.
Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjustment of pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.
Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made pre-emptive improvements, same may be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.
Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and one acre each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvement of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.
Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without action of selection, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased to one person or company.
Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.
Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.
PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons jointly or severally with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of deceased pre-emptors may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, and formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.
No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.
Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.
Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from settlement to March 31, 1920.
SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.
GRAZING.
Grazing Act, 1913, for systematic development of livestock industry provided for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for certain classes of campers or travellers, up to ten head.

manhood of Canada hurried to arms, with the result that within two months an army of 33,000 men fully organized and equipped, was sent to the aid of the Motherland.

These were the men who were called upon to measure their valor and prowess with the German hordes in what is known as the Second Battle of Ypres—one of the bloodiest battles in the records of the British Army.

Poisoned by Gas

The speaker briefly recounted the incidents of the battle where poisonous gas was first used by the Germans, compelling the French, who occupied the trenches on the left of the Canadian Division, to retreat. The Canadians had to extend their line and were faced by at least four divisions of the enemy, supported by immensely heavy artillery. But the line never wavered. For five days and nights the battle raged on; at the end, Canada, with exactly half her troops killed and wounded, still stood a daunted facing the foe.

Conan Doyle's Account

"Strong forces of the Germans had only five miles to go in order to cut the great nerve ganglion of Ypres out of the British system. They were provided with new and deadly devices of war. They were confronted by no one save a single division of what they looked upon as raw colonial militia. Yet of the five miles they could only accomplish two. It needs no vision of over-wrought men to see the doom of God in such episodes as that."

Three Lessons

Three great lessons were learned from this battle. First of all the great lesson of self-denial. The soldiers have re-learned for us the Christian principle of the Cross—that is the forsaking of everything for the sake of serving humanity, the laying down of life for the com-
