Missing Steamer And Crew Are Safe

DOMINION ELECTION IN FALL IS NOW CONSIDERED CERTAINTY

She was towed by the Observer and is now heading for Esquimaux. Information was received in the last message from Captain of the Canadian Observer to B. C. Keeley, the agent here of the Canadian Merchant Marine.

Welsh Magistrate Alleges Chinese Smuggled Into England and B.C. by Boss

LONDON, Sept. 1.—The police magistrate at Pontypridd, in the Rhondda Valley, Wales, asserts that a capitalistic boss in involved in the wholesale smuggling of Chinese workers into England and British Columbia. Stowaways brought before him are said to have been systematically handed along from one ship to another in an effort to pass them into England without passports, and he states that evidence showed the connection with British Columbia Chinese immigration.

CANADIAN SCOTTISH READY FOR SERVICE

Canada and United States.

The Chautauqua has provided two speakers who have urged on the people here the desirability of close friendly relations between Canada and the United States. The same speakers when lecturing in United States territory urge similar action. The value of a good understanding between all members of the English-speaking world is their theme.

There was little need of such advice here, for in Canada generally there is a feeling of goodwill toward our bigger neighbor. We look with admiration on the United States people, but at the same time we sometimes look critically on some of their actions, just as one member of a family is not afraid frankly to criticize another.

Sometimes we think the United States might be more considerate of her neighbor, but on the other hand we are glad to co-operate in all good work. We welcome United States capital in this country and depend very largely on it to develop our resources. Many Americans live here and are highly esteemed. Often American citizens change their allegiance to that of the Union Jack and they are none the worse for it. Canadians going to the United States to live permanently become citizens of that country. It is the least they can do in the land where they make their living.

We all look with regret at the long boundary line that separates the two countries. At the same time there is no thought on this side of transferring allegiance from Britain to the United States. Geographically we are of this continent, sentimentally and politically we are of the British Empire, free as any republic, but bound with the thongs of sentiment.

We are close to the boundary line between United States territory and Canadian territory. We meet American citizens every day and it is difficult to tell an American from a Canadian. At the same time we are true to our allegiance. We are proud of the British Empire and of the flag which is its emblem.

Mr. Pattullo's Visit Overseas.

Mr. Pattullo, the member for this district and one of the outstanding figures in the Oliver Government, is at present overseas doing some valuable work for the province. He is doing publicity work which could be done in no other way and he is also looking into the question of markets. In this he has the authority of a cabinet minister and his influence is accordingly much greater than that of any paid agent or trade representative. Speaking of the visit an English publication says:

"Though no such encouragement is being given now, by either the Dominion or the provincial governments, as resulted in the record immigration during the decade 1903-1913, it is becoming recognized that the opportunity for acquiring certain types of settlers was never greater than at present. Farmers and men of means who have practical knowledge of the land are now more disposed to think of acquiring freehold acreage in the Overseas Dominions, inasmuch as one result of post-war conditions has been to increase their difficulties in providing for their children.

"In view of this fact, the Minister of Lands in the British Columbia Government is making a very opportune visit, for, as he announces in an interview in this week's 'Canada,' there is now an opportunity, in a newly opened tract of land in the province admirably adapted for mixed farming, for acquiring from 100 acres upwards at from \$2.50 to \$5 per acre, freehold. This area of 200,000 acres, which is well served by railways, has been specially thrown open by the government with a view to attracting British settlers with small capital but good practical knowledge. So much has been heard of British Columbia as a fruit-growing, lumber and fish-exporting province, and as the greatest scenic and sporting area of the Dominion, that the fact of its possessing an immense acreage in all respects suitable for mixed farming cannot be too well advertised.

Marketing British Columbia Timber.

Mr. Pattullo's proposed visits to the Scandinavian countries, and to Egypt, are also timely, in view of the greater attention which the stress of war attracted to British Columbia's enormous timber resources. Hitherto it seems to have been left to a few far-sighted Americans to realize what the immense growth in the use of wood-pulp and other grades of timber must mean to British Columbia's development in the near future. The large orders for railway sleepers which reached the province recently from Egypt also serve as a proof that Europe knows more of some of Canada's scarcely touched natural resources than it did in 1913.

"Indeed there are many indications that, though Canada, like the rest of the world, requires a breathing period in which to re-establish her domestic labor conditions before again actively encouraging immigration on pre-war lines, there are now better opportunities for the small capitalist to acquire overseas holdings than may be available when the general financial and trade dislocation has passed away."

COLONEL C. W. PECK TO TOUR WITH MINISTER

On Way West After Visit to Ottawa—Tells of Visit to Battlefields.

A despatch to Vancouver newspapers tells of the return of Colonel Peck from Europe as follows:

"The greatest pleasure of all is to get back to Canada, the finest country in the world," said Col. "Cy" W. Peck, M.P., of Prince Rupert on his return from England and France. Colonel Peck went to England as commander of the Canadian Bisley team in early June. He has since made a tour of France and Britain and comes back with fresh impressions.

"The battlefields," he said, "are making a wonderful recovery. In another year they will not be recognized by the men who fought on them. Even old Ypres is changed and is being rebuilt rapidly. The Cloth Hall is being restored and everything is taking on a new appearance.

He visited all the Canadian battlefields from Ypres to the Somme. Regarding the Canadian graveyards, he said:

"The graves of the Canadian dead are being looked after as well as possible and they are gradually being transformed into perfect shape.

"In England," said Col. Peck, "things are moving better and I believe that trade is improving. As to the Irish situation, I believe that the British people are of the opinion that the government has gone the limit in its offers to Sinn Fein, and if the proposals are rejected the people will be on the side of Lloyd George."

Col. Peck is on his way west and will make a tour of British Columbia with the Minister of Agriculture.

EMPLOYEE OF PULP COMPANY IS DEAD RESULT OF BURNS

VANCOUVER, Sept. 1.—Edward Beadle died in the General Hospital here this morning as a result of burns he received when he was scalded by escaping steam at the Whalen Pulp and Paper Company's Woodfibre plant, in Howe Sound on Saturday. Deceased, who was a native son, was unmarried and leaves to survive him his parents in New Westminster and four sisters and two brothers.

CAPTAIN IMRIE ON IRELAND

Deals with Problems of That Country in Fine Lecture Last Night.

CHAUTAUQUA SPEAKER

Compares Difficulties of Britain with Those of United States.

Both Britain and the United States have their racial and territorial problems with which to deal but if they stand shoulder to shoulder they can preserve the peace of the world. That was the sentiment expressed in the lecture last night on "Self Government" by Capt. Norman Allan Imrie at the Empress Theatre in one of the Chautauqua series of lectures. The speaker was one of the clearest, most fluent and most humorous that has visited Prince Rupert and he entertained an appreciative audience for an hour and a quarter last night without difficulty. Preceding him were sleight of hand tricks by Prof. De Jen and excellent singing by Mrs. De Jen.

Growth of Empire.

In his address Captain Imrie outlined the growth of the British Empire from two little islands until it stretched throughout the world. He compared with this the growth of the United States by gradual process from a few states on the East of the Alleghenies to its present size, including Alaska, the Philippines, Sandwich Islands and part of the West Indies and showed that to a large extent the problems of one were the problems of the other. Each had a subsidiary population as in India and the Philippines and each had a racial problem. Today more than one-third of the population of the earth owed allegiance to either Great Britain or the United States, and each of the two flags flew over a country that was democratic in government.

Problems of Each.

The problems of both Britain and the States were what he called "the melting pot," making good citizens out of a heterogeneous mass of people from all quarters of the globe, and the caring for the people in the dependencies like the Philippines and India and leading them on to a condition where they might enjoy self-government. United States had the Negro problem and the Japanese problem and Britain had the Irish problem. In regard to the latter many Americans tried to place Britain in the light of a great bully with his hand on the throat of Ireland.

Irish Question.

Capt. Imrie then went on to deal with the Irish question. He explained that the country was divided racially, religiously and politically. In the south was the ancient Celtic race, and in the north the Scotch Irish who had settled in the country a few hundred years ago. The Irish of the north were wealthy while those of the south were comparatively poor. Belfast was the city where the big ocean liners were built and where linen was manufactured. The north of Ireland was largely Protestant whereas the south was largely Catholic.

Three Parties.

In Ireland there were three political parties. In the north was found the Unionist party, in the south were the two parties Nationalist and Sinn Fein. In spite of the fact that Ireland had only four million population she had 105 representatives in the British House of Commons, whereas Scotland with five millions had only 70 members. Capt. Imrie then told of the efforts to secure home rule for Ireland, of the early efforts of Gladstone and the success of Asquith. There was formed the Sacred League and Covenant in a list of men who swore they would fight rather than be ruled by the south.

All Lined Up.

The war came and Ulster sent her soldiers to fight against Germany immediately the call went out, and the Nationalist leader, John Redmond, also pledged the services of the Nationalists. The Sinn Fein leader, Sir Roger Casement, instead went and offered his services to Germany and was caught and paid the penalty. The Easter rebellion followed and after it the big convention which sat for ten months trying to find a basis of agreement under

which the north and south could work together. The British Government was anxious to be rid of the question, to give anything the country wanted as long as they knew what they wanted, but they could not throw over the Unionists, who had stood by the Empire in the time of her need.

TWENTY-ONE YEARS IN POLICE SERVICE
 On September 1, 1900, Chief A. C. Minty First Joined Provincial Police.
 Today is quite a landmark in the career of Chief A. C. Minty, of the provincial police, for it marks the twenty-first anniversary of his joining the force. Having joined the department at Ashcroft in 1900 as a constable, he has seen service in many parts of the province. He was first made a chief constable at Fernie in 1909 and came first to the north in 1914, as chief of Hazelton. Since then he has served in Central B. C. right from Yellowhead Pass, the Alberta border, to the coast at Prince Rupert. His service has always been highly efficient and satisfactory and Chief Minty is now considered one of the most valued officers on the whole force.

TAKE UP RAILS AND TURN SOUTH END OF PACIFIC GREAT EASTERN RAILWAY INTO SCENIC HIGHWAY

(Continued from Page one)

noon for Vancouver and from there took a steamer to Squamish at 9:15 Thursday morning arriving at 12:30. A special train was waiting for them there. This consisted of a diner, three tourist sleeping cars from the C.P.R., a through freight car for mules, a baggage car and a day coach. This was the first train with a diner and sleeper, heavy equipment, to run on the Pacific Great Eastern Railway and was the first train ever to go from Squamish to Quesnel. The taking of the loaded freight car also established the first through freight service.

Night at Lillooet.

After the beauty spots had been enjoyed, the train reached Lillooet at 11 o'clock on Thursday night. The most of the members went into the town, a distance of a mile and a quarter from the railway station, either on automobiles or by foot. At 6 o'clock on Friday morning the journey was continued and Quesnel was reached at 10 o'clock that night, a short stop having been made at Williams Lake. In Quesnel there was a meeting followed by a dance to celebrate and mark the occasion of the first through train to Quesnel.

End of Steel.

On Saturday morning at 7 o'clock, the party left on the day coach over the unballasted track towards the end of steel. Leaving the line at a point ten miles from Quesnel the abandoned cottonwood Creek was inspected. Returning to the end of steel, dinner was served at the Northern Construction Company's camp and then they proceeded to inspect the new line and the new bridge. They saw how the government had abandoned 17 miles of road and a 3000 foot bridge for 12 miles of road and a 600 foot bridge. Thus a great saving in cost had been effected and the distance had been shortened and a better grade had been obtained. The cost of building this new section would be covered by the saving in abandoning the old one.

A Record Run.

At seven o'clock on Saturday the party returned to Quesnel and left almost immediately. Stopping at Williams Lake, a short meeting was held followed by a dance. They left there at 1 o'clock in the morning and made the through run to Squamish reaching there at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The trip had established a record of tonnage and time over the railway. The party took passage on a steamer from Squamish and, making a call at Bowen Island, reached Vancouver at 8 o'clock in the evening.

before Monday and on that day will catch the Princess Royal to make a tour of the Northern part of Atlin constituency. This trip, Mr. Kerwin anticipates, will take him about a month. He will go in from Skagway to Atlin and returning will stop at Wrangell to go up the Stikine River to Telegraph. He expects to have this trip nicely over by November 1, about which time the fall session of the legislature will commence.

COHOES RUNNING 100 TO BOAT

J. T. C. Williams Gives Summary of Season's Fishing.

J. T. C. Williams, inspector of fisheries, returned yesterday from a visit of inspection to the southern portion of the district. He reports that some of the southern canneries are still fishing coho, but most of them have closed down. The run of sockeye all over the district has been poor, about one third of the average pack being taken. The run of pink generally was away above the average, especially in the central portion of the district, some of the creeks being completely blocked with fish. Only a small quantity of this variety were packed. The run of springs was fairly good on the Skeena and the fish were in splendid condition. On the Naas the run of this variety was poor.

The run of coho is on at the present time and they are coming in good numbers averaging about thirty on Rivers Inlet and Smith Inlet, with high boat being about one hundred for the 24 hours fishing.

At Bella Coola the run of springs was good, and the coho are commencing to run in fair quantities.

Taking the district as a whole it has been a disappointing season, as the run of sockeye fell down for some unaccountable reason, the spawning grounds being well seeded four and five years ago.

The run of pinks could not be taken advantage of on account of the phenomenally low figure obtainable for canned product.

There is not much data from the spawning grounds at present, but what has been received is encouraging, especially at Babine Lake.

FOG STILL IS OVER OTTAWA

No Word as to Possible Time of Election—Premier Is Undecided.

OTTAWA, Aug. 31.—Political organizers are here and the influx of members of parliament continues and discussions are going on all over the lot, but the fog has not lifted. The pendulum swings lack and forth. Members of parliament express confidence that there will be another session and the indications for the moment point that way, but the pro-election influence both in and out of the cabinet is potential, and until some decisive conclusion is announced either alternative may be followed.

There is no argument that has not been put forward by the conflicting schools of thought, and Mr. Meighen is fully pondering over them all. What is said to weigh rather heavily with him are the views of the members from Ontario, the province upon which the greatest reliance is placed. In the main, but not wholly, they are against an election, predicating their opposition upon the hypothesis that the decline and fall of the agrarian party—which they most fear—is at hand. The great argument for an election is that the atmosphere will not clear until one is held and that the national situation is so serious as to call for a new mandate.

The trend today seems rather in favor of another session, but there is high authority for the statement that the Prime Minister has not come to any decision.

"K. ZODOK" IS CANON MEMBER

Hinchcliffe Does Spy Act in Connection with P.G.E. Work.

Premier John Oliver and members of his Legislative party touring the Pacific Great Eastern Railway got the thrill of their trip at Quesnel when "K. Zodok," the down-and-out bewhiskered bohunk who had been hanging around construction camps asking for a job, and had often been seen sitting in some secluded spot watching men work, turned out to be Canon Hinchcliffe, M.P.P. of Victoria, says the Vancouver Sun.

The Canon refused to make the inspection trip with Premier and other members of the Legislature because, he said, he had planned to go elsewhere in the province at the time the trip was scheduled. He also said that he intended to make his own inspection of the P. G. E.

Ten days ago a mysterious individual was seen around Quesnel. He was found one night sleeping in a garage. One night he came to the hotel, and registering as K. Zodok of Vancouver, was given accommodation.

Asked For Job.

Early last week Assistant Engineer Kelly was approached by a man giving the name of Zodok, who asked for a job on bridge work. Mr. Kelly was satisfied with his appearance as a worker until he examined his hands which showed that he had not been accustomed to manual work. When he was turned down because of this, Zodok said that his hands were soft because he had just come out of hospital.

For a few days after the Zodok was seen hanging around the camps and was fed at the navvies' grub-houses. One afternoon he sat for nearly three hours at the side of the right-of-way watching men work at the filling which had given way and thrown one of the construction engines into a gully.

Is Recognized.

Enquiries were made by construction officials as to the identity of the mysterious Zodok. Suspicious that he was Canon Hinchcliffe were confirmed when the Premier's party arrived Friday night and identified him.

REVELATION REGARDING EXPENSIVE DEPARTMENTS IN BRITISH GOVERNMENT

LONDON, Sept. 1.—The Select Committee on Estimates, of which Sir Frederick Banbury is chairman, has turned a searchlight on the salaries and war bonuses of some of the inflated departments. The revelations in a report just issued are astounding. It conveys, as the estimates themselves are not designed to do, an impression of vast and expensive departments, with a multitude of officials in receipt of large salaries and earning those salaries in insatiable offices that devour the public revenues.

It is almost essential to make a chart in order to get a complete idea of the grading and sub-grading of officials. In the Treasury there are a Permanent Secretary, three Controllers, three Departmental Secretaries, a Principal Assistant Secretary, a Director of Women's Establishments, and no fewer than 11 heads of divisions, the humblest of whom receives a salary, including bonus, of £1,999 a year. In addition there is a temporary representative in the Ministry of Transport whose salary is £5,000 a year. Altogether there are 21 officials of the Treasury who receive more than £1,000 a year, as against eight in 1914. This is the Department which the Chancellor of the Exchequer says is unable to carry out that investigation of the national expenditure for which the Cabinet desires to set up a Committee of Business Men from outside Parliament.

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
