Local Dock will be After New Work

WELL KNOWN MONTREAL STOCKBROKER WAS SHOT BY MILITARY OFFICER

Prince Rupert Shipyard as Competing Factor in Coast Shipbuilding and Repairs

T. H. Allan of the Wallace Company before Going South Expressed Intention of Concern to Undertake Any Work

Will Undertake Repairs on S.S. Prince Albert

Make Conditions as Favorable Here as in South so that Contracts May Be Secured for the Drydock

When the announcement was made recently that the Wallace Shipbuilding and Drydock Company of Vancouver would take over the local drydock and shipbuilding yards there was prevalent a disposition to consider that the Vancouver concern would simply complete work on the two boats now under construction here for the government. Such a view does not do justice, however, to the importance to Prince Rupert of this firm's entry into the industrial life of the city.

In an interview accorded the Daily News just before leaving for the south on Thursday evening, T. H. Allan of the Wallace Company, stated that it was "our intention to compete with the Vancouver and Victoria yards on all ship repairs or new construction work which would in the result of this be self-evident. Prince Rupert could not, in the keenness of competition, successfully contend with the Vancouver yards, but from now on we will fully tender down to the margins in order to make the Prince Rupert drydock and shipbuilding yards more of a competing factor in coast shipbuilding circles than has been hitherto, a competition for which it is excellently equipped.

There is constantly being offered here in the more northern waters work, much of it very important work, that goes south, a condition of affairs distinctly to the detriment of this city. I refer particularly to repairs that logically should be done in Prince Rupert but which in the past either had not been tendered upon by the local works or if tendered were taken away through underbidding by competitors of other cities to the south.

Living Costs Vital Factor.
In view of what you say about the competency of the Prince Rupert shipyards to complete in such work how do you account, Mr. Allan, the reporter asked, "for the inability to hold work here when all ordinary circumstances would seem to make tendering at this point particularly advantageous?" To this Mr. Allan replied: "It has always been maintained by those employed here that living costs in Prince Rupert are higher than in Vancouver or Victoria and on account of this correspondingly higher rates of pay have in

pair work originating along the northern British Columbia coast, which has practically all been going to Victoria or Vancouver yards, mentioned incidentally that the Prince Albert will enter the local drydock on the 24th of this month for overhauling. There will be considerable repair work done to the vessel while in drydock, he said.
There are at present 85 men employed at the yards and not many more will be required until after next week.

SING ANTHEM CARRY JACK

Five Prominent Sinn Feiners Compelled to Make Profession of Loyalty.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—Five prominent Sinn Feiners in Ballina, County Mayo, were compelled by a force of auxiliaries to march through the streets carrying a Union Jack above their heads, trailing the Sinn Fein banner in the gutter and singing "God Save the King." They were subsequently compelled to burn the republican flag.

Following the whist drive delightful refreshments in great abundance were served and the dance followed. The music was supplied by Alex. Gray, Will Brown and Will Edmunds, the last mentioned donating his services. J. Cobb was the master of ceremonies and E. A. Woods and Joe Howe were on the door. These socials are in the hands of a joint committee of the Sons of England and the Daughters and Maids.

DOLLAR SHIP MAKING SPECIAL RUN TO NEW YORK GRANBY COPPER

VANCOUVER, Jan. 15.—The Robert Dollar Company's steamer Stanley Dollar is here on a special trip, having arrived from San Francisco to load 4,000 tons of blister copper and general cargo for New York. The special run is being made to give service to the Granby Company in the movement of their copper to New Jersey refineries. Captain McClements is expected to make the run to New York in less than twenty-eight days.

Montreal Stockbroker Was Shot Through the Heart by a Well Known Officer

MONTREAL, January 15.—On Thursday afternoon William Holland, 49 years of age, formerly secretary of the Stock Exchange clearing house and for two years manager of a firm of stockbrokers, was shot through the heart, dying a few minutes later in the office of another brokerage firm.
An hour after the shooting, Major R. J. Griffith, accompanied by his brother, walked into the police headquarters and gave himself up for shooting.
Major Griffith is well known in social, military and financial circles here. It is conjectured that Griffith, who was known to have sustained heavy financial losses in recent months, conceived an enmity for Holland, who it is stated, had received threatening letters from Griffith.

BANDITS SHOOT THREE MEN IN A POSTOFFICE

DALLAS, Texas, Jan. 15.—After a thrilling fight in which three men were shot, two probably fatally, six auto bandits made their escape from a sub-station postoffice, which they held up last night and tried to rob. They met with a more stubborn resistance than they apparently expected. All the injured men were postal employees.
Mayor Rochester and the new council will be sworn in before Judge Young at the court house at 2:30 Monday afternoon.

Coast Loggers Are Withdrawing O.B.U.

At their General Convention Expected 20,000 will leave That Organization and Make Other Affiliations

VANCOUVER, Jan. 15.—(Canadian Press)—Action which labor men believe will prove a death blow to the One Big Union of Western Canada was taken by delegates at the B. C. coast loggers' convention on Friday afternoon according to reports of the meeting. The delegates decided to withdraw from the O. B. U. and carry on their own industrial organization independently. The decision appears as a sure indication that at the general convention next week of the entire affiliated industrial workers' camp that mill and agricultural and loggers unions will sever their connections with the O. B. U. The loggers with their affiliated bodies number about 20,000.

Sad Fate of a Benefactor.

Last night the Presbyterian congregation publicly burned its benefactor, a mortgage which at one time was a charge on their property but which has at last been paid off and left them free of debt. It was a sad fate for a benefactor that had served them well for many years. Without the mortgage the congregation could not have had a place of their own in which to meet. It came to their aid in time of stress and it carried them safely over the period when they were unable to help themselves. True it was a great effort to rid themselves of its weight and free their property from its tyranny, but it is done and now they have a valuable property which Mr. Mortgage has saved for them.

The Presbyterian congregation is to be congratulated on the result of its efforts, but there are other efforts needed in order that this, the largest and probably the richest church congregation in the city, may have a building which will be a credit to them and to the city as a whole.

Two Churches To Be Built.

There are two churches which should be built here. One is a new Presbyterian Church and the other is a new Anglican Church. The Presbyterians have a church hall and the Anglicans have a Sunday school room in the basement of an unfinished building. Each of these buildings has served a good purpose and still is useful, but in each case there is need for the completed church building. In a sense they are public institutions. They serve a public need. True, for a considerable section of the community the only purpose they will serve is to send away to friends in the form of picture postcards, yet the church congregations have an influence throughout the community and the standard set by them in building, as in everything else, is studiously noted and copied. We look to church people for a lead and how can they give a lead in moral and spiritual affairs when they are content to worship in a plain inadequate hall or in the basement of an unfinished building.

New Mortgage Will be Necessary.

A new mortgage will be necessary soon. In order to prevent the disgrace of being without a church, the services of a fine new document will be requisitioned. This is the presumption. It may not rise from the ashes of the old one, but the spirit which animated the placing of the old one will again animate the congregation and cause them to get out of the rut and prepare for the good time which their optimistic pastor sees coming. He has reason for the faith that is in him. It is true that many a fine church building houses a congregation poor in spirit; but on the other hand it is difficult to conceive of a congregation which is alive to the spirit of the times being content to slumber on in a shack.

Raising Money For New Building.

It is a difficult matter raising money for a new building and of course the right and proper thing is to raise the money first and erect the building afterwards. In the case of most congregations, if they waited until they raised the money they would never have a building. With a good building there is an incentive to church work and the mortgage is the accommodating friend that comes to aid in the carrying on. Possibly the alternative is another sale of church bonds to the members on a purely business basis, as was done two years ago by the Presbyterians. These might be debentures repayable in instalments.

SEND TOBACCO TO ENGLAND

Solution of the Problem Facing Growers in Ontario

WINDSOR, Jan. 14.—The opening of the British market to Canadian grown tobacco may prove the solution of the difficult problem with which the growers of Essex and Kent have been faced for some time, it was learned here today.

It has been announced that the English market can take millions of pounds of leaf, and as the Canadian crop is of superior quality to that grown in the United States this year it will probably receive the preference. Already one firm has received a large contract from English importers.

The Canadian Tobacco Growers' Co-operative Company, Limited, Kingsville, commenced operations at its plant yesterday and will handle 100,000 pounds of leaf a day. This corporation has gained access to the English markets.

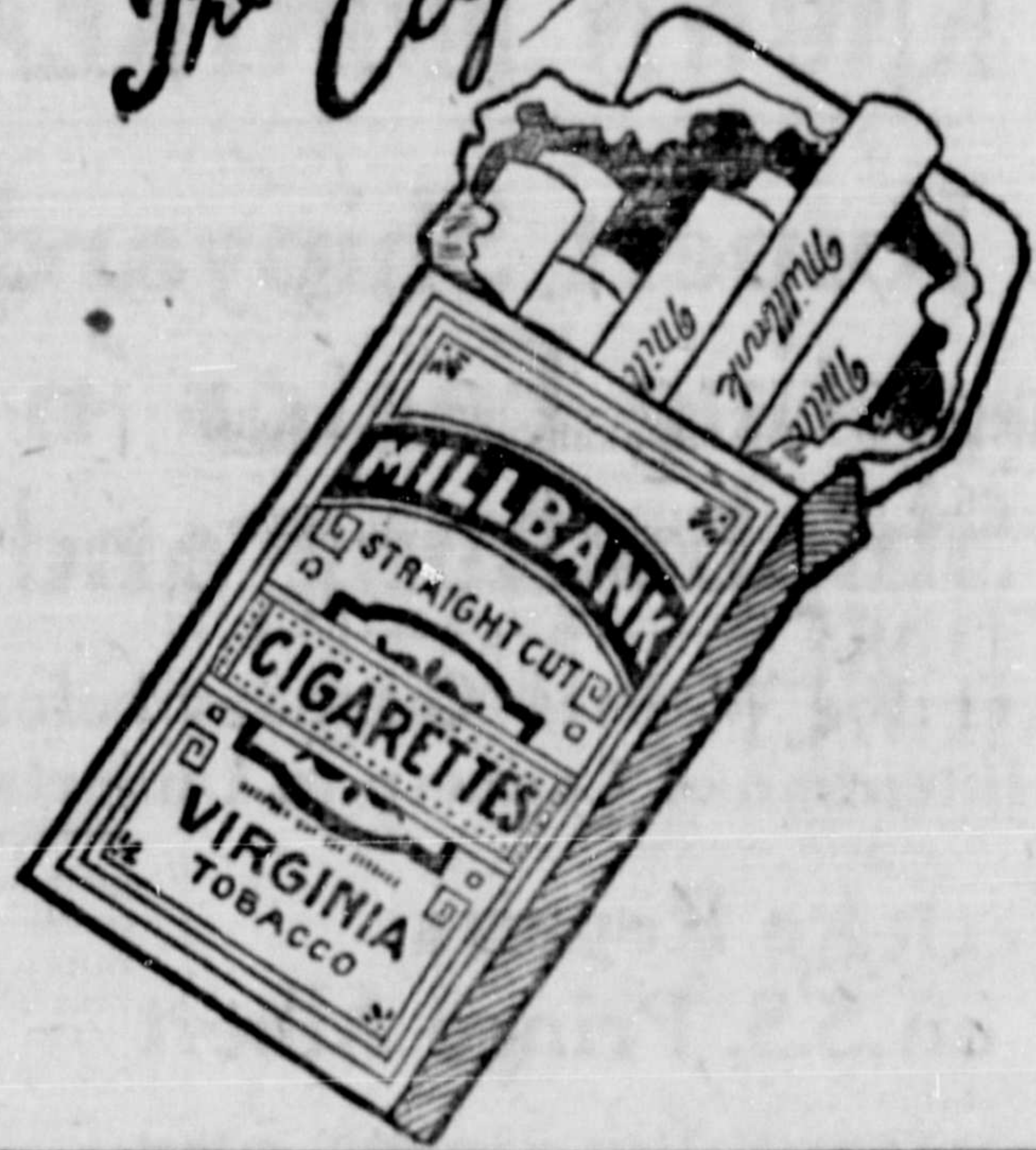

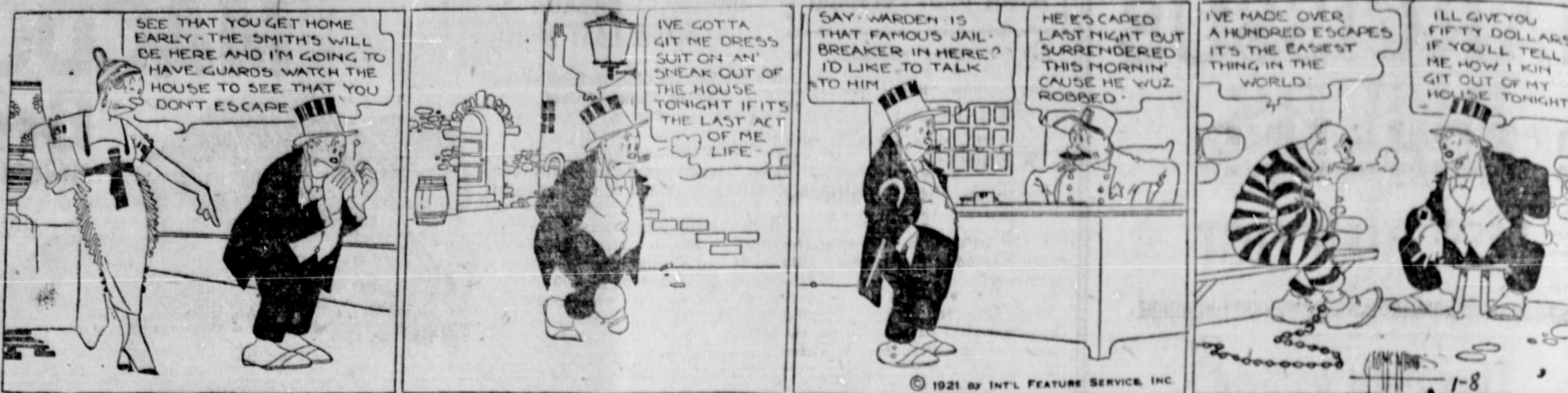

CHURCH BURNS ITS MORTGAGE

Spectacular Feature at Annual Congregational Dinner in Presbyterian Hall.

NEW BUILDING IS UNDER DISCUSSION

Encouraging Reports Read and Officers Elected Last Night for Coming Year.

The old mortgage on the Presbyterian Church property, which was recently paid off was spectacularly burned last night by the congregation and there was a good deal of talk of a new building to be used both as a church and Sunday school. The present church is wholly inadequate for the needs of the Presbyterian people, especially in regard to its Sunday school accommodation.

There was a large attendance at this the annual meeting and congregational dinner of the First Presbyterian Church in the hall. The proceedings commenced with a fine spread provided by the Ladies Aid Society which was fully appreciated and at which there was a fine spirit of good will and common fellowship shown. There was an abundance of eulogies and every factor towards the success of the dinner was fully looked after by the ladies who were in charge.

With the dinner over the meeting was called to order by Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant, the moderator. The first report received was that of the Sunday School from L. M. Fuller, the superintendent. Mr. Fuller reported \$228.30 in collections with the expenditure exceeding this by \$7.04. The average attendance was in the neighborhood of 100 per Sunday. More teachers should offer themselves so that the work might be better carried on.

Ladies Aid Report.
The report of the Ladies Aid from Mrs. Eggert was read by A. M. Manson, congregational secretary. The gross receipts for the year had been \$1,465.26 and \$600 had been given to the general church fund. There were 36 members of the aid in attendance during the year but towards the latter part of the year the attendance had fallen off greatly.

In speaking to the report Rev. Dr. Grant said that the gross receipts of the aid was a great credit. In Chalmers Church, Vancouver, a much larger church than this one, they had been highly pleased with \$1,500 as had been also St. John's, Vancouver, with \$1,000. He urged that each lady of the church set aside one day a month for the work of the aid. The report was received with a hearty clapping of hands by the men and D. C. McRae made congratulatory remarks.

Burning of Mortgage.
A. M. Manson, who was chosen for the twelfth term as secretary, read the financial report of the church and it was in the course of the reading of this report that the feature of the evening, the burning of the mortgage, was carried out. Led by Piper Alex Macdonald, dainty little Miss Olive Munro and Marjorie Manson entered the hall and after marching past the various tables bore the liability document to the head table where it was kindled by F.

Garlon, the senior elder of the church, and held by Dr. Grant until it was consumed. During the course of the burning the gathering rose and sang "Auld Lang Syne."

Mr. Manson read that the church had assets amounting to \$7,158.22 and a surplus account of \$14,177.35. Receipts during the year had been highly satisfactory. The envelope collection had been \$2,619.15, open collection \$1,086.98 and the magnificence sum of \$6,763.10 had been realized through the Forward Movement campaign. With the paying off of the mortgage and the clearing of the bonded indebtedness the church had made a record that was excelled by no other church in Canada. The total collections for the year of \$1,298.17 averaged more than \$100 per family.

Urges New Church.
Mr. Manson suggested that the time had come to make plans for the building of a church, first to accommodate the Sunday School and then to house the congregation. Other churches in the city had at least commenced and it was time the Presbyterian Church was doing the same. There should be enlarged envelope collections and the churchgoers should thus assist the management in gaining an idea of the revenue.

D. C. McRae, J. M. Patterson, A. L. Carruthers, J. W. McKinley and J. N. Sinclair also spoke to the report.

Officers Elected.
Successors to the retiring managers, J. G. Steen, Thomas McClymont and W. A. Matheson were named, the two first being re-elected and J. W. McKinley chosen to take the place of Mr. Matheson who had gone to New Zealand and whose return was indefinite. The trustees, G. R. Naden, F. G. Dawson and A. M. Manson were re-elected and votes of thanks were passed to J. Lorne MacLaren, auditor, J. L. Christie, acting secretary, Miss Edmunds and the choir, and the Ladies Aid.

Dr. Grant then presented the sessional report and in doing so made some stirring remarks on the anti-church wave that was passing over the country. Church people should take the wave as a challenge and fight for their principles. Dr. Grant also made an eloquent appeal for church attendance in its true spirit, welcoming strangers and volunteers for Sunday School teachers. His report showed 16 baptisms in the year, 16 certificates of membership, one profession and a total membership of 123 members.

With the singing of the doxology the gathering broke up about 8:30.

DORA MAY BE RAISED SOON

Effort Expected to be Made to Steal Little Steamer from Ocean

Ketchikan, Jan. 15.—The little steamer Dora, the well known Alaska boat which was operated from Seward to Unalaska for over a score of years and recently wrecked on the east coast of Vancouver Island, may be floated and her cargo salvaged, according to advices reaching Juneau on the Princess Mary.

Capt. Fred Hovick, master of the little steamer at the time of the wreck, claims that the Dora can be salvaged despite the fact that she slipped off the shoals where she was beached and sank in 12 feet of water. First Mate John Hartley also believes that the little steamer can be saved. It is understood from the advices received on the Princess Mary that the attempt to refloat the Dora will shortly be made. The steamer is of wooden construction, staunch, and is not believed to have been seriously damaged.

The Dora was bound from Seattle for Unga, Akun Island and Dutch Harbor with a cargo of supplies for the Behring Sea Fisheries Company's codfishing stations in that part of Alaska, when she was wrecked.

CANADA AND U.S. NAVY ON THE PACIFIC

Special Correspondent of London Daily News says Squadron on This Coast

PERFECT ACCORD WITH THIS COUNTRY

Possible Attitude of Canada in Event of U.S. and Japanese Trouble

(NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—(By Canadian Press).—P. W. Wilson, former member of the British House of Commons and now United States correspondent of the London Daily News, claims to have information to the effect that the Canadian Government has reached an agreement regarding Oriental immigration with representatives of the Republican administration which will assume office in the United States on March 4. That Canada is considering building a small navy for Pacific waters and that the Dominion warships will cooperate with the United States Pacific fleet are statements which are also made by Mr. Wilson, in a cablegram, reviewing the United States-Japanese situation, which he sent to his paper recently. This cablegram is printed by the New York World in connection with its campaign for disarmament. It says, in part: "In memoranda submitted to be submitted there was doubtless submitted the inevitable question whether the British Empire, in whole or in part, would side with Japan in certain circumstances. The supposition was at once negated. The safety of the Canadian seaboard was apparently discussed also, and when Senator Harding's victory became certain, Republican statesmanship, already powerful in the Senate, and especially in the Foreign Affairs Committee, engaged, so it seems, into intimate but confidential and unofficial conversations with Dominion statesmanship, of which one indication was the declaration of Prime Minister Hughes that a White Australia welcomes every American battleship launched. "Unless there be disarrangement this is also the Canadian attitude. There is now perfect accord between the future Republican administration and the Dominions, described in one quarter as a solid front on immigration. "Unexpected Present. "Some weeks ago Canada considered building a small navy for Pacific waters, which project was part of conversations proceeding on a unified command. Unexpectedly to Canada the British Admiralty made a present to the Dominion of cruisers and destroyers. Any unified command must necessarily be under American supervision and must be limited to the Pacific.
