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IRISH PEACE MAY BE AT END

WHISKEY RUNNING IS POPULAR SPORT ON GREAT LAKES NOW

Deadlock in Negotiations Regarding Future Ireland Is Announced by Premier

LONDON, August 15.—De Valera has refused to accept the terms of the British Government constituting a Dominion for Ireland and having their basis to bring about peace in the country. He declares the conditions sought to be imposed are an interference with Irish affairs.

On the other hand, Lloyd George informed De Valera that there is to be no compromise on the question of the right of Ireland to secede from allegiance to the King, and that the conditions of the proposed settlement contain no desire on Britain's part to surrender her British ascendancy over Ireland or the impairment of her national ideals.

The Premier's statement of Ulster is also published. The deadlock is based on two vital differences, De Valera's insistence on independence and that Ulster shall be a minority faction of the Irish nation.

The disclosure caused the keenest political sensation since the publication of the correspondence between Lloyd George and De Valera. The meeting gives members, many of whom have never met each other, the opportunity of becoming acquainted and exchanging notes prior to tomorrow's meeting.

IRISH ARE DISAPPOINTED.

LONDON, August 15.—The people of Ireland, after enjoying the hope of peace, found it hard to believe today that negotiations had reached a deadlock. They place their hopes on the Irish Premier, who meets tomorrow to consider the conditions and frame a reply to the Premier.

AT ODDS WITH THE BRITISH FOREIGN OFFICE.

BARRIER ON RHINELAND BE LIFTED

PARIS, Aug. 15.—The Supreme Council has agreed to lift the economic barrier on Rhineland on September 15, provided Germany pays the fixed installment of reparations and removes the boycott on French goods.

Lord Curzon and Sir Robert Horne, British delegates, criticized the expensive administration of the treaty, especially the cost of occupation of the Ruhr Basin.

Premier Briand of France replied that the occupation of that district must continue.

DEADLOCK ON RUSSIAN AID

Not Decided Whether Administration Control Will Be Allowed to Soviet.

RIGA, Aug. 15.—(Noon)—There is no break in the deadlock between the American Relief Administration and the Soviet envoy, Litvinoff, regarding the famine sufferers. Action by Washington and Moscow will be necessary to decide the issue as to whether the American administration will compromise and permit the Soviet greater control of its personnel and the distribution of food than has been granted other countries which it has aided. The United States has now referred the matter to Secretary Hoover.

Beer and Whiskey Being Rushed Over Border Into Northern United States

DETROIT, August 15.—Beer and whisky is coming from Canada in large quantities following the ruling of a Canadian judge that the export of intoxicants cannot be stopped on the Canadian side. Eye witnesses assert that boat loads are going out from the border cities of Canada every half hour, while prohibition officers are assembling their forces for a drive on the bootleggers.

The price of whisky in Chicago has dropped from \$25 to \$14 in a week.

WINDSOR, Ont., August 15 (noon).—Hundreds of fast motor boats heavily laden with beer and whisky pushed away from the Canadian shores and landed their cargoes in the United States on Saturday night. Despite reports of special troopers patrolling the American shores, not the slightest opposition was offered.

GUSHER WRECKS OIL WELL AT PEACE RIVER

EDMONTON, Aug. 15.—Word has been received in the city that the derrick and engine room and tower of well No. 2 of the Peace River Petroleum Ltd. had been swept away and destroyed by a gusher of water.

Drilling operations for oil were in progress at the time, and a gas explosion beneath the water caused it to spurt up over the derrick with terrific force. The water swept away every vestige of the oil drilling apparatus down the bank of the river where the well was located.

The well has not been abandoned, according to information received, but it will be considerable time before the work of retrieving the machinery is completed and the drilling operations are under way again.

GOVERNMENT CONTROL BRITISH RAILROADS CEASED AT MIDNIGHT

LONDON, Aug. 15.—Government control of British railroads which was instituted at the opening of the war, ceased at midnight on Sunday.

RIGA, Aug. 15.—Litvinoff, who is in charge of the Soviet Famine Relief Committee, has agreed to American control of food distribution among the starving people of Russia.

EGYPTIAN PRINCES PASSED HERE BOUND FOR STIKINE RIVER

Princes Youssouf Kamal and Haidar Fazil Came all the Way from North Africa.

Prince Youssouf Kamal, of Egypt, and his cousin, Prince Haidar Fazil, were northbound passengers on the Princess Alice which called at this port this morning. They are on their way to Telegraph Creek to spend at least six weeks shooting moose, mountain sheep and grizzlies in the Stikine River district. The princes have come direct from Egypt expressly for this hunting trip. They were accompanied by a courier and a valet, the party being made up of four members. They will pick up guides and their pack train on their arrival at Wrangell and Telegraph Creek.

If We Want a Library We Must Pay for It.

If we wish to have a library in this city we must pay for it. There seems to be no way in which we can shift the burden on to someone else. Last autumn a meeting was held and it was then decided to try to secure a Carnegie library. The effort failed. Now we are left to our own resources. We must raise the money ourselves if we wish to have the institution here.

First Thing is A Librarian.

There seems to be a prevalent idea that the first thing needed is a big building. As a matter of fact the first thing needed is a librarian. Miss Helen Stewart says so, and she is the highest authority on libraries in the West. She is president of the Pacific Northwest Library Association.

Herbert Killam, secretary of the Public Library Commission, says the Provincial Government does not give all to libraries until the people themselves have shown that they have made a reasonable effort to help themselves.

Fallacy of Making A Wrong Start.

Nearly two years ago the business men of the city decided to start an athletic association. An organization was formed that did excellent work in the way of getting a plant together, and there have been some results that were really worth while. At the same time it has fallen far short of the ideal owing to the lack of having a trained man in charge.

What applies to the Athletic Association applies also to a public library. The most important thing is to have a good librarian and then to back him up and see that results are obtained. During the coming autumn it should be an easy matter to get together a group of men and women who have the interests of the city at heart to rouse public opinion and to organize for the formation of a library association and the institution of a library that will be a credit to the city.

There Must Be An Organizer.

Possibly the statement that the first thing in forming a public library is the appointment of a librarian is not wholly true. The first thing is for one man or woman to become imbued with the idea that this city needs a library and that determined effort can secure it. Then organization will commence, but it will fall off at the first breath of opposition unless there is someone who is determined and who will see it through.

It isn't very much help to the parents either to entice the children away to earn prizes on a Sunday in sports, when they are trying to encourage them to keep Sunday differently from any other day in the week.

Liberty-Freedom. Liberty and Freedom, there is no such thing for a would-be Christian! By the way, did "Nil Desperandum" take part in the terrible war, which was fought to save the world from being ruled by the Devil and his legions, not to give us freedom from "our duty towards God"?

From Rupert Boy. The following is an excerpt from a letter to his mother, from a boy who used to be in Rupert, who joined up the day after war was declared, became a Lieut.-Colonel when he was 26, was wounded three times, won the D.S.O. M.C. and had he lived would have also been presented with the Legion of Honor and Croix de Guerre. He was killed in July, 1918.

"Pray that I may have more strength to 'carry on', more courage to face the worst that comes, victory without giving my men unnecessary pain, and that I may be spared to return to you. If that may not be, I have not lost faith, my conscience is fairly clear, and I am not afraid to 'go over the top' to meet my maker for everlasting peace."

That boy is one of thousands of the good old bulldog breed of which the British Empire is made up. We have lost thousands of them "over the top," and must replace them with as good material—they couldn't be better. I had the pleasure of mothering him amongst many others whose homes were in Canada and Australia during the short leaves they had from France.

He was one of Canada's own boys, a real sportsman and a very regular church-goer. Have you a son or daughter like that? It is the result of soul and body training together! We are proud of our young

friends. If we could not shoulder arms and fight with the gallant boys, let us at least 'carry on' in such a manner that they will have the joy of knowing that they at least gave up their precious young lives for people, and an Empire that was worth while, not a frivolous, pleasure-seeking, lazy ungrateful people. Do not use their sacred self-sacrifice to try and cover things God has distinctly warned us not to do.

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



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DOLLY VARDEN COMPANY SUED FOR MORTGAGE

Effort Being Made to Force Payment of \$182,322.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 15.—The Dolly Varden mining property has emerged into the limelight again, in the shape of a suit filed against it this morning in the supreme court here for \$182,322, by George Wingfield, of Reno, Nevada.

It appears that under the legislation passed at Victoria in the session of 1920, by which the title to the property was finally vested in the present holders, one of the liabilities assumed by such holders was the obligation to pay this mortgage, which was originally for \$150,000, but which has grown to the amount now claimed by the accretion of interest.

The mortgage fell due on July 31 of this year, and action has now been entered by the plaintiff's solicitors, Bourne, McDonald and Desbrisay. The defendants named are the Taylor Mining Company, Ltd., the Taylor Engineering Company, Ltd., and Chas. M. Ralston, Cambie and Smith Street. Plaintiffs ask for an accounting, for foreclosure, for possession, and for the appointment of a receiver. The properties included are the Dolly Varden group, and also a number of other claims in the Cassiar district of British Columbia.
