New Railway Policy Is Announced

P. G. E. TO BE INVESTIGATED BY FORMER C. P. R. ENGINEER

National Railways and Grand Trunk Under Same Management Both Old Boards Are Dissolved

Minister of Railways Deals With Finances of System; Proposes Breaking Into Units each Under General Manager; Nearly Hundred Million Needed

OTTAWA, April 12.—In the railway budget speech which was read to the House of Commons yesterday by Hon. W. C. Kennedy, minister of railways, the minister stated that the Canadian National and Grand Trunk lines were to be placed under a unified control shortly with a co-ordinated management and one board of directors, thus automatically abolishing the Canadian National Railway Board and the Grand Trunk Railway Board.

The new railway board will be asked to advise on the division of the huge system into units, each with its own general manager, subject to the general policy laid down by the board.

The government will institute an investigation into the financial affairs and business methods generally of the railways passing under control of the new board.

Mr. Kennedy announced that the total vote for railway expenditure this session would be \$97,220,000 compared with \$180,000,000 last year.

The Canadian National lines ended the year 1921 with a net deficit of \$56,674,944 as compared with the 1920 deficit of \$67,505,059. Drastic curtailment of expenditures effected a reduction in the debt.

The gross earnings increased slightly and totalled \$126,691,455. The deficit on the Grand Trunk Pacific was six millions less than in 1920. A greatly improved showing in the operation of this road since the amalgamation with the Canadian National and the co-ordination of operations in the west, which had brought down the loss from ten millions on a gross of fourteen millions in 1920 to a loss of four millions on a gross of sixteen millions in 1921.

Operating expenses on the national system, including the Grand Trunk Pacific, in 1921 was \$142,784,357, a decrease of nearly twenty millions over the previous year.

Touching on the matter of freight rates, Mr. Kennedy said he proposes to ask the House to appoint a special commission to examine into the rate question, with power to summon the executives of the various railways. It would then be for the commission of the House to take such action as it considered necessary.

BALFOUR IS NOW AN EARL

Accepts Title and Will Sit in House of Lords, Which He Will Lead.

LONDON, April 12.—King George has conferred an earldom upon Sir Arthur James Balfour, it was officially announced today.

Quite recently Sir Arthur, then plain Mr. Balfour, was made a Knight of the Garter. Up to that time he consistently refused to accept any decoration or title.

The new title gives Balfour a seat in the House of Lords, which it is generally understood he will lead on behalf of the government.

IRISH TRUCE IS DECLARED

BELFAST, April 12.—A truce has been declared between the Ulster special constables and Free State troops which have been menacing the proximity along the Fermanagh border between Ulster and the South of Ireland.

GRAND TRUNK APPEAL.

LONDON, April 12.—No appeal in the Grand Trunk Railway arbitration award has been entered for the next term of the Privy Council consequently it is impossible that the appeal can be heard this side of July.

EASTER HOLIDAY IN PUBLIC OFFICES

Provincial Departments Close From Thursday Afternoon Till Tuesday Morning—Post-office Closes.

All provincial government offices in this city will be closed from Thursday afternoon until Tuesday morning, thus giving the employees an opportunity for a good holiday.

The postoffice both on Friday and Monday will be open for general delivery of letters and registration for one hour only, between 9 and 40 a.m.

All stores will be closed Friday, but Monday is optional.

The Daily News will not be published on Friday, but there will be a paper as usual on Monday.

ENGINEER TO INVESTIGATE

John G. Sullivan to Report on Engineering Phase of P. G. E.

HINTON WAS ALSO THERE

Another Expert to Report on Operating and Traffic of Railway.

VICTORIA, April 12.—John G. Sullivan, formerly chief engineer of the C. P. R., has been selected by the provincial government to investigate the Pacific Great Eastern Railway. He will devote his time especially to the engineering features of the road and another expert will investigate the operating and traffic phases.

W. P. Hinton, formerly head of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, has travelled over the road in his private capacity, and while his comments will be welcomed by the government, Premier Oliver says that Mr. Hinton did not act in his official capacity on behalf of the government.

MANSON BECOMES MINISTER OF LABOR RAILWAY DIRECTOR

Will Have Charge of Affairs of P. G. E. Jointly with Oliver and Hart.

VICTORIA, April 12.—Hon. A. M. Manson, attorney general, was sworn in yesterday as minister of labor, which portfolio has been held by Premier Oliver since Mr. Farris resigned.

Mr. Manson will be the Government representative on the directorate of the Pacific Great Eastern jointly with Premier Oliver and Hon. John Hart.

NEW OCEAN DOCK CONTRACT IS DONE

Number of Workmen Who Have Been on It Returned East by Morning Train.

The contract for the building of the superstructure on the Canadian National Railway ocean dock here has been completed. This morning a number of the workmen who have been engaged on the work returned by the train to Winnipeg and Saskatoon. A large part of the roofing is on, this work being done by the Prince Rupert Supply Company.

Capt. Nicholson Announces Change Islands Schedule and Skippers of Steamers

Captain G. H. Nicholson, manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific Coast Steamship Service, arrived from the south today, his mission here on this occasion being in connection with the inauguration of the company's summer schedule. He will return south on the Prince Rupert tomorrow night but will be back again next week. A. Gillard, his secretary, accompanies him.

Speaking on his arrival in connection with the new service, Captain Nicholson said it would go into effect on May 8 as had been announced before. The Prince George and Prince Rupert will give a bi-weekly service, the former vessel arriving here on Wednesdays and the latter on Saturdays. Sailings south will be at midnight on Thursdays and Sundays as before. The Prince George will take over the run of the Prince Rupert next week while that vessel goes into the local dry dock for a fortnight's overhaul. The George is being taken into the dock this afternoon for painting and cleaning up preparatory to resuming service.

Queen Charlottes.

The service this year will be much the same as last with the exception of the Queen Charlotte Island route. This season the Prince John will give a fortnightly service between here and Vancouver calling at all Island points both northbound and southbound and connecting with the large vessels here both arriving and departing. On alternate Saturdays the John will leave Vancouver for the Islands and this port reaching here Thursday mornings. Returning south she will leave here at 8 p.m. on Saturdays calling at the Island ports again and arriving in Vancouver on Wednesday afternoons. By this change the Islands will practically be given a weekly service and a greater degree of promptitude of calls will be ensured.

The Prince Albert will be operated principally this summer in the freight interests but, commencing about the middle of July and until the end of August will make Vancouver an approximately alternating dates with the Prince John calling at Skidegate and other south Queen Charlotte Island points as may be found necessary on the route between Vancouver and Prince Rupert.

Capt. Donald Reinstated.

The Prince George, this summer, will be commanded by Captain Moorehouse while Captain Donald will skipper the Prince Rupert. Captain Nedden will have charge of the Prince John and Captain J. McKernan, now chief officer of the Prince Rupert, will take command of the Prince Albert.

This morning a number of officers of the company arrived from Vancouver in connection with the resumption of the service by the Prince George. These included R. Knox, acting superintendent engineer of the company, James Hodgson, foreman carpenter, W. D. Reid, foreman carpenter, Ales Munro and H. G. Milvain, of the Prince George engineering staff.

The first bents for the bridge to connect the new Canadian National Railway station with the sidewalk in front of the general offices have been raised and the work of bridge building is now proceeding. The structure is being built of heavy timbers fastened together with heavy iron bolts.

RESTORATION OF RUSSIA IS LIVE SUBJECT

Report of Allied Experts Handed in to Economic Conference Today.

GENOA, April 12.—The report of the Allied experts on the restoration of Russia and also of Europe was handed to the delegates of the financial conference. It points out that the restoration depends largely on the assistance Russia is prepared to give foreign enterprise and capital and unless Russia is prepared to effect a profound transformation in the actual condition of the country affecting commerce and industry, foreigners will refuse to resume old enterprises or begin new ones in Russia.

BIG LEAGUE BASEBALL ON

First Match of the Season Opened This Afternoon at New York.

NEW YORK, April 12.—Warm weather but overcast skies ushered in the baseball season of 1922 here. Weather forecasts, however, brought cheering assurance to the fans of New York and Brooklyn. THIS MONTH WILL BE BIG ONE FOR FISH BUSINESS

Already Million Pounds Has Arrived Since April 1—One Thousand Fish.

One thousand of halibut was marketed at the Fish Exchange this morning, the arrivals and sales being as follows:

Cape Spencer, 7000 pounds; Winnie, 4000 pounds; D. G. F. No. 4, 8000 pounds, and Ingrid H., 6000 pounds, sold to the Sinclair Fisheries at 10c and 4c.

Volunteer, 5000 pounds, sold to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. at 9.5c and 4c.

This month promises to be a record-breaker in the amount of fish handled at this port, for to date, with little over one-third of the month passed, the total has reached just about the million pound mark.

Good Roads Will
Be Marked Improvement.

The roads which are being built in the city will be a great improvement and will give us a somewhat civilized air. They will be economically a sound investment and will place the city on a new plane, lifting her from the pioneer state and placing her in a class with others.

Road building has been a sign of civilization since the earliest ages. The making of permanent city roads indicates a step in advance. The next step will be to grade more of the suburban roads and to get the provincial government to build roads out of the city connecting up with the surrounding country.

Tackling Railway
Problem in Earnest.

The Dominion Government is tackling the railway problem with courage and in such a manner as seems likely to bring results. Just what the new proposals mean it is not yet possible to tell, but it would seem to indicate that this section of the system will be run as a separate entity under a general manager and that it will be for that manager to make good in its development. We have no inside information, but the telegraphic despatches today would seem to indicate that the various lines would be run independently, although co-ordinated with the other parts of the system under one central head.

If the Grand Trunk Pacific is placed under a management distinct from the other parts of the system it will be all to the advantage of this place. It will be the business of the manager of the section to make it pay and in doing so it will be necessary for him to give good service and develop the business over this particular section.

Huge Vote for
The Railways.

The railways are costing the country an immense lot of money. Practically one hundred million dollars is to be spent this year, a sum which a few years ago would have seemed an impossible amount. Compared with \$180,000,000 last year, however, it is a vast economy. If the country continued to spend such huge sums for many years in succession it would mean financial ruin. The hope of the country is to put the railways on a paying basis and make them self-supporting if not profitable. If Mr. Kennedy can do that he will have accomplished a huge task. He will have done a service to the country which it will be difficult to repay. It is a great opportunity for great work and there are possibilities of success. In the development of this railway policy Prince Rupert has everything to gain. The success of the railway means success to this city and prosperity to the surrounding country.

Genoa Conference
Is Great Event.

No matter what is the final outcome of the Genoa Conference, the gathering is an eventful one in that it is another step toward reaching international unity by peaceful means rather than by the arbitration of arms. The old way was for the strong nation to go out with a club and force the smaller nation into submission. It might not be putting it too strongly to say that is the present way. The Washington conference, followed by the present conference, marks the beginning of the development of a new era. While no one will believe that in the present state of society it means that conferences will take the place of war, it is only the beginning of a new condition. It is the expression of a tendency which in time will develop.

The economic conference seems to be most unwieldy. There are so many delegates, speaking so many languages and holding such diverse views on life that it seems almost an impossibility that there should be much practical good come from it. Yet with such men taking part as the premiers of Great Britain and Italy, it is possible that something may be done to bring order out of chaos. Even should there be no such good result the conference will mark a new epoch in the evolution of the race.



THE MINERAL PROPERTIES THE PAS BEEN CONFIRMED

WINNIPEG, April 12.—By the arrival at The Pas, Manitoba, of L. Heidenreich, consulting engineer, to take charge of development work, confirmation has been given to the reported sale of green Copper Lake gold claims to the Nipissing Mine of Cobalt New York. The claims are located in the mineral areas north of The Pas, and were located by Gordon, formerly chief engineer of the Hudson Bay Railways. Low-grade ore has been found on several of them, in addition to one spectacular pocket of it. It is said that \$100,000 will be spent in development work.

HING INDUSTRY IN NOVA SCOTIA IS SHOWING ACTIVITY

More Ships Gone Out This Year Than at Any Time Since War.

HALIFAX, N. S., April 11.—(Canadian Press)—Nova Scotia will have a larger number of deep-sea fishing vessels engaged in the spring fishing than in any spring since the war, and leaders in the fishing industry anticipate a season of great activity. The fishing business was one of the first to go to pieces, when the tide of business depression set in, but it is now well on the road to recovery, and the activity everywhere manifest in this industry is giving an impetus to all kinds of business throughout the Province.

Scores of schooners have already sailed for the fishing banks and others are being fitted out as fast as possible. The well-known racer Bluenose was one of the first to sail.

To the spring fishing Lunenburg, which for some years past had numbers of grand banking ships lying idle, will sent out practically every vessel of its fleet, which is not away on a fishing voyage. And whether or not the spring trip is a success, indications are that every vessel suitable for the fishing will be pressed into service for the summer trip to the Grand Banks. Much ice has been reported on some of the fishing banks this spring, but in spite of that the fishing skippers have been eager to make an early start.

According to prominent fish merchants here the fish markets are in a position to absorb a catch this year. Very few dealers have stocks of any importance on their hands, and for the past two months prices have been increasing, though usually this season of the year the tendency of prices is to decline. There does not appear to

be any noticeable increase in the consumption of fish, as might be expected during the period of general business depression, though fish was the first food stuff to drop to the low price level. The present favorable market conditions was comparatively small, and available stocks are now smaller than at any time for years. A big catch this year will be necessary to meet the current market demands and provide the normal carry over of stocks.

With the revival of the fish industry, the shipyards where wooden vessels are constructed are also showing signs of activity.

ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION FOR LONDON WOMEN

LONDON, April 12.—Formation of an athletic association for women has been endorsed by the general committee of the Amateur Athletic Association. The action was suggested at a recent meeting of the committee when the question of female athletes and their control was approved in principle. Affiliation of the women's organization with the Amateur Athletic Association was also proposed.

FRENCH WILL ENTER BIG MARATHON RACE

PARIS, April 12.—The French athletic authorities will make a strong bid for the Marathon Race, the feature event of the 1924 Olympic Games. They are already paying particular attention to developing their colonial runners. Colonel See, formerly in charge of the Joinville Military School for Physical Culture, is now in Northern Africa and competitions have already started over the full marathon distance, in order to choose from the Arabs and other natives, Olympic candidates for the 26-mile distance.

FOOTBALL ENTRY FEE INCREASED TO COVER SCOTTISH TOUR COST

Dominion Association Looks For Quick Recovery From Difficulty.

WINNIPEG, Man., April 12.—Advocating an increase in the fee charged on each registration card issued from 10 cents to 25 cents as a means of overcoming the deficit resulting from the unfortunate ending of the Scottish tour last year, President D. Macneil of the Dominion Football Association, is confident of an early recovery in the financial standing of the association. He hopes, within a short time, to see the big deficit caused by the disastrous United States program staged by the Scots, combined with the loss sustained in the Connaught Cup series, wiped out entirely. Mr. Macneil's plan of increasing the registration fee will be put before the delegates at the next annual meeting.

The petty squabbles which, following Secretary Roy's financial statement, threatened at one time the disintegration of the association, have all passed to the great beyond, according to Mr. Macneil and practically all the provincial bodies with the exception of Manitoba and Alberta, have all renewed their affiliations with the parent association. It is anticipated that Manitoba and Alberta will sign up following their annual general meetings, to be held shortly.

From the fact that Quebec and Ontario between them require 7,000 registration fees, it is evident that by the president's method of charging a 25-cent fee on each, a very respectable sum can be realized, sufficient not only to clear off outstanding debts but also to create an annual revenue.

FAME OF BABE RUTH REACHES TO FRANCE

It Was the Money That Carried His Name Across the Ocean.

PARIS, April 12.—The fame of the great Babe Ruth has at last crossed the ocean and French publications have recently been filled with the narrative of the superslugger's exploits.

He of the 59 home runs is not being exalted in France for the number of fences he has driven the ball over but the debt he has made in the bankroll of the club owners.

"The swing of his bat is terrible but the swish of his pen is deadlier," said the staid Avenir referring to the signing of the reported \$500,000 for Five Years' Contract."

"The virtuoso of the home run is also an ace in the business end of it," the Paris Midi comments.

The cost of plant is expected to be about \$250,000 and it will supply not only the Canadian demand but also that of Great Britain, Australia and other British Dominions.

Bothacker laboratories, similar to the one to be established in Canada, are already in operation at Chicago and Hollywood.
