COMMUNISTS IN POWER IN ITALY TODAY

PREMIER BONAR LAW IS SET FORTH AS THE APOSTLE OF TRANQUILITY

Fascisti Government is to Take Charge Italian Affairs Under Mussolini

ROME, Oct. 30.—Benito Mussolini, leader of the Fascisti, who has been called by King Victor to form a cabinet, arrived in Rome today and was given an enthusiastic welcome by the crowds. Mussolini immediately went to the King's palace. It is believed that a new ministry will be constituted in the course of the day. The railway traffic in Italy which was suspended yesterday by order of the military authorities was resumed today. Mussolini declares that the Fascisti must go into power without alliance with any other party but granting some portfolios outside the Fascisti party. This is the culmination of a revolt against the politicians long ago begun by the Fascisti and crowned with success yesterday when the King, greatly moved, embraced the deputy Diacechi, one of the supreme military authorities of the Fascisti and told him he would gladly get Italy a Government most suited to the new spirit pervading the country. He then entrusted Mussolini with the task of forming a ministry.

No Reprisals
LONDON, Oct. 30.—The Rome commander of the fascist states that the squads in the city will not carry out any reprisals. **ROME, Oct. 30.**—The newspaper *Zion Socialista* today says it is learned that all the members of the communist party were informed last night that the party is ceasing operations today and all its members are to be released from party discipline.

BLUENOSE IS HOME AGAIN

Received in Silence as She Arrives at Lunenburg: Flagg Half Mast
LUNENBURG, Oct. 30.—The schooner *Bluenose*, international fishermen's speed champion, reached her home port and was received in dead silence by the assembled fishing fleet, which broke out with half mast flags in honor of Capt. George Demone of the *Bluenose*, who was accidentally drowned the night after the victory was won at Gloucester. The body of Demone, accompanied by Capt. Walters of the *Bluenose*, will arrive at Lunenburg today aboard the Canadian destroyer *Patriot*. Celebration of the *Bluenose* victory has been postponed until after the funeral.

COPE TO MANAGE LLOYD GEORGE'S ELECTION PLANS

DUBLIN, Oct. 30.—A. W. Cope, assistant secretary for Ireland and the official who was mainly responsible for the Anglo-Irish treaty, has resigned to become chief political organizer for ex-Premier David Lloyd George in the forthcoming election campaign.

Olef Hanson, the local timberman, states that no further information regarding the letting of C. N. R. contracts this winter has been received. His company is still working on the original instructions to start cutting operations.

AMERICA WILL NOT PARTICIPATE IN NEAR EAST PARLEY
WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—United States has definitely communicated to the Allies her refusal to take part in the Near East conference proposed for Lausanne. Washington will have financial observers but no diplomatic representation.
CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 30.—Turkey has accepted the invitation to the Lausanne conference.

IMMIGRATION YOUNG PEOPLE

Minister of Interior Gives Radio Address on Government Plans
EDMONTON, Oct. 30.—"I am hopeful that we shall be able to bring out from Europe, from Great Britain, and from the United States a great number of 'teen age boys and girls,'" stated Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the interior, speaking over the Journal radio in connection with the Dominion government's emigration policy. "I see in this a splendid field for our endeavors, and I believe that these young people will probably make better Canadian citizens than those of mature age."

OLD CASTLES WERE FIRED

Antrim and Lydian Fortresses Destroyed by Republican Incendiarists
BELFAST, Oct. 30.—Antrim Castle, built during the reign of Queen Elizabeth and the home of Lord Masereene of the Ulster government, has been completely destroyed by fire and one woman lost her life in the flames. Lydian Castle in Galway, built in the days of Oliver Cromwell, was also destroyed by incendiary fire systematically carried out while the owners were held under guard by the Republicans.

SATURDAY'S GALE CAUSED DAMAGE TO THE HART BUILDING

Saturday night's blow did considerable damage about the Hart Block, Third Avenue and Fifth Street. The big plate glass window at the side of Gil's Cigar Store was shattered at 3 a.m. and the awnings of Steve King's clothing store and M. McArthur's boot shop were broken.

Nelson, of 344 Ninth Avenue East, and John Ozden, 136 Ninth Avenue East, at his residence at 410 Ninth Avenue East, where he has lived alone for many years. Deceased had come to his death through a hemorrhage of the lungs and had been dead probably 48 hours before his remains were discovered. He had been suffering from tuberculosis for some time.

Political Reaction and Even Lethargy is Feared by Enemies of Premier Bonar Law's Cabinet

LONDON, Oct. 30.—Not the least part of the political campaign now in progress here will be devoted to appraisal of the new premier and Bonar Law has been singled out by his partisans to champion the cause of tranquility and safety first. In high political quarters it is declared that if tranquility is what the nation wants it must be conceded that a better man could not be chosen to carry out this desire. These quarters assert that however much his friends and enemies disagree on Law's other personal characteristics, they are united in agreeing that he represents straightforwardness, steadfastness, stability and sincerity, and that he has all the attributes of tranquility. There seems to be a considerable part of the population which harbors the belief that under Bonar Law the pendulum may swing too far the other way and result not in stable government with accompanying tranquility, but in unwholesome political lethargy perhaps even positive reaction.

C. Turgeon has been appointed to a seat in the senate and Lucien Proulx of Magazette has been appointed secretary to the High Commissioner's office in London.

ASKS BOUNTY ON DOG FISH

George Bushby Addresses Council of Board of Trade on Subject

ARE VERY DESTRUCTIVE

Prior to Passing Resolution Matter is Discussed at Meeting

Prior to the passing of the resolution asking the Dominion Government to grant a bounty on dog fish, George Bushby, addressed the Board of Trade at length on the subject and there was considerable discussion and a good many questions were asked the speaker. Mr. Bushby said:

"I presume that you all are aware of the nature of the plant which I am operating, and that you realize the usefulness of such a plant as a complement to the fishing industry, providing, as it does, the means of disposal of the waste which is inevitable in the fishing business, and in the disposal of that waste the Reduction Plant converts it into most useful and valuable products, namely, edible fish meal, suitable for supplying the protein element in the feed of domestic livestock such as poultry, swine and cattle, fertilizer, for the enrichment of the soil, especially as regards fruit and vegetable cultivation, and oil, indispensable in the tanning industry and also used in the soap and paint manufacture as well as in other branches of the arts and crafts.

Continuous Operation

"You will readily understand that, in order to make such a plant remunerative, it must be kept in practically continuous operation during the entire year, for when the steam cookers and dryers are allowed to cool considerable loss ensues. Under present circumstances the plant here operates under the disadvantage that when the salmon canning season closes the plant has only the waste from the halibut fishery to depend upon for raw material, a very insufficient supply in proportion to the capacity of the plant to absorb raw material. The management, therefore, has been casting about to avail itself of a steady and ample supply of raw material, and has, logically turned its attention to the most ready and available source, shark and dogfish.

"These fish abound in the waters adjacent to Prince Rupert and in all our British Columbia waters and upon the Atlantic coast, and wherever they exist they prey upon the fisheries, destroying vast quantities of edible fish and cause much damage to fishing gear.

Public Benefactors

"Those who contribute towards the destruction of these pests must be regarded as public benefactors, but, gentlemen, it requires the expenditure of money to do the work, and this brings me directly to the kernel of my subject.

"In the first place, do not rush to the conclusion that I am here to ask for anything for my company. I have no such intention. I am here to tell you that it is beyond the resources of any individual or company or group of persons to adequately develop this fishery, for it will become a fishery. It is a community matter and must be undertaken, in part, by the custodian of our fisheries, the Dominion Government.

"Any reduction plant operating in this province is competing for business in a very close market, and the larger the output of the plant the keener the competition, for the reason that difficulty is generally experienced in finding ready buyers for large lots of goods, and the placing of such large lots upon the market always has a tendency to sag the market.

Market Limited

"Our market in Canada is extremely limited at the present time, for the consumer has not awakened to the advantages of utilizing our products as stock feed and fertilizer, but this market will grow in proportion to the knowledge which is disseminated regarding the use of these commodities.

"Our market for oil is in the state of New Jersey, away on the Atlantic coast, in direct competition with the Menhaden and other well established oil supplies. In this case we face a transcontinental freight rate of 84.95 per

hundred, handling charges and a duty of 20 per cent ad valorem, and face keen competition into the bargain.

"Our market for edible fish meal and fertilizer, as regards at least 90 per cent of our sales, is in the United States, with a coast-wise freight rate and a duty of 15 per cent ad valorem, and this market, not being very large, cannot absorb large shipments without feeling the effect and affecting prices.

"From a community point of view, our sales to the United States are very beneficial, as much outside money is introduced into the local circulation through these sales. We export goods and import cash. A very fair exchange, and we, as sellers, find that our business relations with our friends to the south of us are most satisfactory. And please, in this connection, bear in mind that this company has the habit of spending its money with the local merchants, a very good habit and one to be more universally adopted.

material. To operate successfully we must obtain our raw material at a price which will enable us to operate at a profit. We cannot pay a large price for raw material, we should not pay anything for it at all, and make a profit after paying cost of manufacture, overhead, handling charges, transportation and duty. If we cannot operate at a profit all upon a large scale, but we would cut down our staff to a minimum and content ourselves with taking care of the waste from the halibut fishery during the winter. "Such a proceeding would not pay anybody, if carried out. We would buy very little fuel, little foodstuff, few supplies of any kind, would maintain possibly four men on the payroll, would be of very little benefit to the community, in fact we would just rust out in a comfortable manner for want of some reasonable means of utilizing the superabundant supplies of raw material, swimming about at our very doors, carrying on their nefarious occupation of fish destruction." ers, the small fishermen would have little occupation other than that of strolling down to Cow Bay to see that his boat had not sunk during the night, a Rip Van Winkle existence for all concerned or who should be concerned in this branch of industry.

National Importance

"In making a careful study of the situation the following would seem to be the most important elements, and it will be seen to what an extent the entire nation will be benefited, for this is not a local matter but one of national importance.

"The government, custodians, in trust for the people, controls the fisheries and must be held responsible for the reservation and conservation of the potential wealth entrusted to its care. The government must, therefore, take up its share of the burden and has a distinct duty to perform which includes the destruction of such predatory fish as destroy the fisheries, and at the same time it should do all in its power to foster the industrial establishments which furnish the means of disposing of the carcasses of the predatory fish which will be captured, because such establishments will be creating fresh sources of national wealth.

"Ruskin briefly defines what the wealth of a nation consists of, in the following terms:

"The wealth of a nation, first, and its peace and well-being besides, depend upon the number of persons it can employ in making good and useful things."

That quotation sums up in a few words a wonderful appeal to a people to diligently apply its energies to manufactures.

Foster Industries

"The local community then, has a duty to perform to itself, for by wisely fostering such industries as are established or which may desire to establish themselves locally, the wealth of that community will be assured in the manner defined by the Immortal Ruskin.

"The outstanding feature of this matter is that the permanent establishment of a successful industry devoted to the conversion of sharks and dogfish into useful commodities, will be the means of utilizing the natural resources of the particular locality concerned.

"In order to make possible the establishment of this industry and in order to develop the shark and dogfish fishery there must be assistance derived from the Dominion government, and I am, therefore, asking you to consider the advisability of approaching the Dominion government, through the proper channels, with the object of impressing upon it the necessity of offering a bonus to the fishermen for the destruction of shark and dogfish as a means of ridding the waters of these destructive pests and as a means of producing national wealth in the form of manufactured commodities, having as a base of raw material the carcasses of such shark and dogfish as may be destroyed under the bounty.

Must be General

"I am referring to all fishermen and all reduction plants, wherever situated, either on the Pacific or on the Atlantic. It would be a poor policy to ask the government to give special privilege to any one part of the country. This matter is not sectional but distinctly national.

"But it is obvious that the citizens of Prince Rupert, the greatest fishing centre upon the Pacific coast and one of the greatest fishing centres in the world, should take the lead in a matter like this, and it is also incumbent upon us to take such steps as will lead to the development of the fishing business to its utmost capacity, and until there is a thriving shark and dogfish fishery and also a fishery for the numerous species of edible fish abounding in these waters, the citizens of this community should be tireless in the expenditure of their energies along the lines of development. Prince Rupert has not contented, at this date, to develop her fishery to any extent. The development is purely on the surface, but take warning and do not allow your means of existence to be destroyed by either wasteful means or by natural destroyers.

"The winter is upon us and many of the fishermen who own small boats have begun to lay them up. Possibly some of them

have the necessary savings upon which to live during the winter months and possibly many have nothing to live upon, but all must be in a position of facing the winter with feeling not unmixed with a certain amount of anxiety.

"Boats and gear depreciate rapidly when not in use, and the same applies to men. Work must be found for boats, gear and men, and please include the plant up the inlet when discussing this matter, for we have a heavy investment in machinery and employ a number of men.

Fishing Activity

"With a bounty and with what we can afford to pay for the fish there will result a very considerable amount of activity in the fishing part of the community, a fresh avenue of opportunity will be opened up, and, without a doubt, the experience of this winter will amply demonstrate that with a due amount of thought given to the means of handling the trade, a permanent addition will be made to the fishing occupation and a lucrative business built up for all concerned, and who, in Prince Rupert, is not concerned with the fisheries?

"I have no intention of embarking upon a lot of figures in order to tell you of how many millions of dollars worth of fish the destroyers consume in a year, for I believe they exist in countless

millions, so figures would be useless. I am not going to compile a lot of figures to prove this contention or that, for the main thing, after all is said, is to start a new industry which will be the means of giving employment during the winter months, every winter, to an ever increasing number of men, to keep going such industries as the one I am operating and which are the means of distributing large sums of money in the localities in which they are established, to turn hitherto useless fish into useful products, and to partially rid the fishing grounds of such destructive agencies as shark and dogfish."

HEARING OF TIMBER CASE FROM TERRACE FINISHED IN COURT

Mr. Justice Murphy Reserves His Judgment For Three or Four Weeks

Taking of evidence in the George E. Keith vs. George Little, timber land damage action from Terrace was completed in the Supreme Court Friday afternoon before Mr. Justice Murphy. On Saturday argument of counsel was heard and decision reserved by His Lordship for three

or four weeks. The case was the only civil action, outside of one divorce, at the local Assizes and its hearing took three full days. Archie Donaghy, of Terrace, and T. B. Hooper, of Prince Rupert, appeared for the plaintiff and L. W. Patmore and W. O. Fulton, of Patmore & Fulton, were both in court for the defendant. Witnesses for the plaintiff were L. R. Callahan, J. Doull, J. Keiso and George Keith and for the defendant, James Turnbull, Olof Hansen, B. E. Allen, John Viger, J. McLaren and George Little. The sum of \$30,000 is involved in the action.

PIONEER MERCHANT AT VICTORIA DIES

VICTORIA, Oct. 28.—William Wilson, 84 years of age, a pioneer merchant of Victoria and Cariboo and former member of the Legislature, died here Friday. He came to Victoria from London, England, in 1864, by way of Cape Horn.

PEACE RIVER CROPS

VANCOUVER, Oct. 28.—Ernest Japsor of Rolla who is visiting here says the Peace River country grew splendid crops this year but lack of transportation prevented marketing.

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
