LAST WORDS IN BRITISH ELECTION TONIGHT

FILIBUSTERING METHODS OF CONSERVATIVES ACHIEVE LITTLE AT VICTORIA

Old Country Electors Go to Polls Tomorrow to Choose Parliament

LONDON, Nov. 14.—The last words in Great Britain's election campaign will be spoken tonight.

The electors go to the polls tomorrow to pick a new parliament from among 1386 candidates seeking seats in the House of Commons. In 373 constituencies the fight will be duels between the candidates of two parties, while in 242 other constituencies the battle will be more complicated with the presence of three or more contestants.

The wisest political seers are uncertain as to what the general result may be.

The contesting candidates comprise the following: Conservatives, 410; National Liberals, 105; Liberals, 352; Labor, 322; Independent Conservatives, 12; Conservative Democrats, 2; Independents, 21; Independent Labor, 2; Elder Unionists, 13; National Democrats, 6; National Unionists, 2; Anti-waste, 1; Agriculturists, 2; Socialists, 1; Communists, 5; Nationalists, 3; Sinn Fein, 1; Cooperatives, 5.

SEATTLE WON FIRST HOCKEY

Pacific Coast Opener Resulted:
Metropolitans, 5; Millionaires, 2

VANCOUVER, Nov. 14.—The Seattle Metropolitans invaded this city last night for the opening game of the Pacific Coast Hockey Association's schedule and, when it was all over, they had emerged victors over the Vancouver Millionaires by a score of eight goals to two. A record crowd watched the match.

FRENCH CONSULS WERE EXPELLED

From Asia Minor Points by Kemalists—More Troops Called

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 14.—The French consuls at Merzina and Adana in Asia Minor have been expelled by the Kemalists. They were appointed under the Soudan Pact to insure protection of the Christians.

From Khareput come reports that the Kemalists are calling all men liable to military service and sending them to Mosul.

M. POIREE, NOTED FRENCH AVIATOR, AND MECHANICS KILLED

PARIS, Nov. 14.—M. Poiree, the noted French aviator, and his two mechanics were killed today when their machine crashed during the competition for the Grand Prix for commercial airplanes.

CHILI DEATH LIST GROWS

More Villages and Towns Affected Than Known
First—Perhaps
2,000 Dead

SANTIAGO, Chili, Nov. 14.—Later reports greatly augment the casualty list in the Chili earthquake and tidal wave disaster. The arrival of vessels from northern Chili ports brings reports of disaster to towns and villages not already heard from augmenting the number of casualties. The death list is now variously estimated at between 1,500 and 2,000 souls.

Severe earth tremors were again noticed throughout the country last night.

FIFTY-ONE MEMBERS LIBRARY TO DATE

Institution Opened for First Time Yesterday Afternoon at 1 o'clock

The new Public Library opened its doors to the public on Monday afternoon and up to noon today there were fifty-one members on the roll. Miss M. Grant, the librarian in charge, explained that the temporary quarters on Third Avenue would only be occupied for two months until a permanent locale is found.

There are about 2000 volumes for reading to choose from including all manner of fiction, historical and other works. There are also several reference books and more are to be expected shortly.

The hours are from 4 to 6 p. m. daily while the office will be open from 7 to 9 p. m. on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday.

CITY COUNCIL PUTS CLUBS OUT BUSINESS

Chief of Police Vickers has obtained the approval of the city council for the cancellation of the licenses of the clubs and managers which have been convicted under the Liquor Act. The license cancellations are dated from November 7. The clubs and managers affected are—Kaien Island Club, Frank Buckley; Central Club, Frank Stevens; Marathon Club, T. Shackleton; Citizens Club, G. Gleason; A. A. Social Club, James McAlenan; Travelers Club, J. Dahlberg.

DECISIONS GIVEN IN GURVICH CASES TODAY

Nick Gurvich Found Guilty of Having Unsealed Liquor and Fined \$50; Mrs. Gurvich Dismissed

Magistrate McLymont found Nick Gurvich guilty of having unsealed liquor in his possession this morning in the police court and ordered him to pay a fine of \$50 with the option of thirty days in jail. Mrs. Gurvich also appeared for decision this morning on a charge of selling liquor but the magistrate stated that the evidence in the case was such that he had to dismiss it. In voicing his personal opinion, his Honor said that, as Mrs. Gurvich was the mother of a large family, he hoped that he would not see her in court again. T. B. Pooper prosecuted and L. W. Patmore defended in both cases.

According to the evidence in the Nick Gurvich case, ten bottles of Scotch whisky including nine bottles of John Dewar's and one King George IV, together with a bottle of rum partly filled and some beer was found at the accused's residence, 622 Fraser Street. There were government seals for all except the King George IV whisky and the rum.

Evidence introduced Monday was to the effect that the accused had found two bottles of King Dewar's among the four cases of Dewar's shipped from Calgary. The crown counsel contended that no mention was made of these when the government seals were procured. He also announced that the accused's story about the rum being diluted was true.

Considerable comment was made by both counsel in regard to the way in which the Liquor Board carried out the provisions of the act. It was contended that individual stamps should be put on each bottle rather than the case and the crown intimated that the matter would be brought to the attention of the authorities.

The C. E. R. steamer Princess Mary made port at five o'clock Monday afternoon from the south with a very small passenger list and forty tons of general cargo. The vessel sailed again at 7.15 p. m. for Skagway taking a small shipment of freight. Her northern passenger list was exceptionally light, the majority of the people coming south at this time of the year. Dan A. Sutherland, re-elected Congressman for Alaska, was a passenger for Juneau.

UPPER END OF P. G. E. TO C. N. LINES

Member for Cariboo Will Recommend Sale of Materials North of Quesnel

VANCOUVER, Nov. 14.—The sale to the Canadian National Railways of all material on the Pacific Great Eastern Railway line north of Quesnel will be recommended by T. G. McBride, federal member of parliament for Cariboo, in a speaking tour of his constituency which he will begin shortly. The sale, Mr. McBride thinks, should be conditional, however, on the Canadian National building the railway into the Peace River country.

EXPLOSION IN FERNIE MINE

Orderly Exit as Made and Only One Man Injured—Mine Closed Now

FERNIE, Nov. 14.—One miner was injured when a "bump" occurred in No. 1 mine of the Coal Creek Mining Co. yesterday and all operations in the mine have been suspended.

The "bump" occurred in the main counter tunnel where haulage and travelling ways were shattered in the explosion. The men who were in the mine made an orderly exit bringing with them the injured man whose name is Dan Isanueck. A check revealed that nobody had been trapped.

An investigation into the cause and extent of the damage has been postponed until the proper authorities can go down. Owing to the severity of the "bump" it is thought that work will be impossible in the mine for some time.

JUVENILE BASEBALL BOYS WERE EN FETE AT ANNUAL BANQUET

The Falcons and Midgets teams of the Juvenile Baseball League were en fete at their annual banquet last evening in the St. Regis Cafe. Twenty-one boys did full justice to the excellent repast that was set before them and the entire evening was one of much youthful fun. Singing and music ended up the affair which was in progress about an hour and a half. W. J. Cash, the organizer of the league, presided, and was assisted by Harvey Fraser. In addressing a few remarks to the boys, Mr. Cash bade them farewell and expressed the hope that their activities would continue in the future as enthusiastically and successfully as in the past.

\$300,000 FIRE IN MONTREAL COLLEGE

MONTREAL, Nov. 14.—The University of Montreal was visited with a disastrous fire last night which damaged the buildings to the extent of \$300,000.

ASSESSMENT RESOLUTION

City of Prince Rupert Will Ask That no Changes be Made at Victoria

On motion of Ald. Theo. Colart, seconded by Ald. Montgomery, the city council last night passed a resolution opposing any legislation tending to change the present municipal act as regards assessment. The discussion arose over a report that the executives of the Union of B.C. Municipalities were asking for such a measure. The resolution was telegraphed to Premier Oliver, Attorney General Manson and Hon. T. D. Pattullo.

One clause however was deleted by the council. It dealt with the prospect of the necessity for a receiver for certain municipalities. The resolution follows:—

"Whereas the executive of the Union of B.C. Municipalities is asking the provincial government to enact special legislation concerning the assessment;

"And whereas the plan to equalize assessment rather than assess at actual cash value, as proposed by the above executive, would simply give power to municipalities to raise the assessment without limit, as long as it would be equitable, and thus allow them to raise more money for general expenditures and permit reckless spending of such money with the result that most of the unimproved property would revert back to the municipalities at every tax sale;

"And whereas any assessment made regardless of the actual cash value of the property would have the result of making it impossible for any property owner to obtain redress against unjust assessment and also render the court of revision useless—

"Be it resolved: that the City Council as well as the property owners of the City of Prince Rupert, wishes to go on record as absolutely opposed to any legislation tending to change the present Municipal Act as regards assessment."

ORGANIZATION OF PROGRESSIVES IN B. C. POSTPONED

VANCOUVER, Nov. 14.—The proposed convention of the British Columbia Progressive party planned for this fall has been postponed. The United Farmers of B.C. will meet about the middle of January for the transaction of their annual business and the organization of the Progressive party will then be discussed.

WATER SALE GETS NEW APPOINTMENTS

Deputy Court Registrar, Judge Small Debts Court, Magistrate and Deputy Coroner

Recent appointments conferred upon Government Agent J. H. McMullin and his assistant, Walter Gale, will relieve confusion and inconvenience that has existed in provincial court circles for some time past.

Mr. McMullin has been appointed registrar of the Supreme and County Court here and Mr. Gale has been appointed deputy registrar. The duties of the court registrar have for some time been in the hands of H. F. McLeod, registrar of titles, who has been acting. Mr. Gale has also been appointed stipendiary magistrate, deputy coroner and judge of the small debts court. He will, therefore, be in a position to act as county court preliminary or summary trials and inquests in case Mr. McMullin is not available.

PRESIDENT TO POSTPONE TRIP TO NEXT SUMMER

Writes Governor Bone Expressing His Regret—Coming Next June

JUNEAU, Nov. 14.—While expressing his deep regret at being unable to go to Alaska this year, in a letter to Gov. Scott C. Bone, President Harding said: it was only a hope deferred and that he is making his plans to visit Alaska in June of next year. "If all goes well" he said, there will be no extraordinary session of Congress next summer, and I can well believe it will be convenient to get away for the trip in June."

While Government Conducts Its Business Arbitrary Opposition Continues Below-Belt Thrusts

VICTORIA, Nov. 14.—While the government has been preparing legislation, watching debates, getting themselves ready and carrying on the business of the country, it has been constantly parrying beneath-belt blows from the opposition. Big things have been seldom attacked but the opposition takes the form of little filibusters.

Yesterday in the public accounts committee on liquor finances, R. H. Pooley, member for Esquimalt, wanted Col. T. Ross Napier, who had made a private general's department, to give evidence. Government members asked that the request be referred to the legislature. Hon. W. J. Bowser, leader of the opposition, then faulted the premier with trying to avoid an inquiry but he got no satisfaction from Mr. Oliver who said all financial matters would be available but not private information regarding other affairs. The premier said that he did not have to be advised as to his responsibilities.

Nineteen bills and seven resolutions were before the House yesterday afternoon, most of them being of a minor character. Some advanced a stage and others were set over.

H. G. Peers, member for Peace River, objected to an amendment in the Supreme Court accounts compelling rich debtors to pay just the same as poor debtors in the County Court.

Kenneth Duncan, member for Gwichean, continued the debate on the Oriental question saying that farmers wanted legislation to prevent Orientals from owning or leasing land. Still, he said, he would not vote for the Bowser amendment because of the clause requiring Dominion consultation with the province. Such would be impracticable.

OWNERSHIP OF MINE LAPSED

Kansas City Syndicate Failed to Pay Principal and Interest on Bullion Mine at Quesnel.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 14.—The Bullion Mine, a valuable placer gold property at Quesnel Forks, yesterday reverted to its former owners, W. T. Ward and associates, when Mr. Justice Morrison sanctioned foreclosure on a Kansas City syndicate represented by Max McGowan which purchased the property several years ago for \$100,000. In 1921 the company spent \$60,000 in improving the property but no work was done this year. The ownership lapsed yesterday under the conditions of sale when the company failed to pay interest.

MILK REFORMS DECIDED UPON

Council Calls for Butter Fat Content of 3.2 per Cent.—Sanitary Stables

The city council last night passed a recommendation that all milk sold in the city should have a butter fat content of not less than 3.2 per cent. This will necessitate the changing of the bylaw as in the past the content has been three per cent. The health committee made the recommendation from a discussion started on October 2.

The same committee also brought in a recommendation which was passed unanimously that the bylaw regulating the sanitation of dairy stables and milk storage be amended to include a standard of the highest sanitary construction. The health officer will draw up the measure.

BIDS ACCEPTED FOR NEW BRIDGE

Total Cost of Structure Will Be \$39,180.58—To Go Before Electors

The total cost of the steel bridge across Hays Creek, upon which the electors will vote in January, will amount to \$39,180.58. The council last night decided to accept the tender of the Atlas Boiler Works for material for the 165-foot steel truss at \$25,028.14 and the \$14,152.44 bid of E. H. Shockey for flooring and approach material. The city engineer's estimate was \$34,185.10.

The council took the view that a steel bridge would be preferable to a wooden structure costing \$18,000 and acted accordingly.

Employment For Those Here; Others Not Wanted.

It is gratifying to hear from official sources that the unemployment question for the coming winter in Prince Rupert and district is not so threatening as it was last November.

Care Should Be Taken In Giving Employment.

It is said that there will be no unemployment in the district but there may be in the city. In that case, it may be expected that no new arrivals will come here looking for work from the immediate neighborhood.

Employment Will Mean Prosperous Winter.

The prediction that there will be employment for all in the district is a sign of prosperous winter. Instead of closing up work, many industries are to carry on with increased numbers of employees which will help to offset the number of men who are always thrown out of employment with the cessation of seasonal work.

Good Winter Means Better Summer.

This district is slowly but steadily coming back and there is good reason to believe that next year will see more in the line of solid development towards permanent industry and population than since 1914 when the Great War came with its depression in certain lines of production and temporary stimulation in others.

HARD GOING FOR SCHOONER THELMA

Lost Cable Chain and Anchor and Drifted for a Day

The Canadian schooner Thelma, Captain Geo. Fritz, made port yesterday morning and reports having suffered from the heavy weather encountered recently off Cape Ommaney and the West-ard waters. The gale was of such severity that the Thelma was compelled to drift for twenty-four hours. During the storm she lost her cable chain and anchor. It was one of the toughest storms that Captain Fritz has seen for some years.

MORE DOING IN DISTRICT NOW

Employment Situation for Winter Does Not Look Bad, Government Office Reports

Although warning is given out against men flocking to Prince Rupert for winter employment, the local office of the Employment Service reports the situation much better in the district than it has been for some time and the outlook for the winter much improved this year over last.

The Buckley mill at Massett Inlet which is to cut rough lumber to ship to Los Angeles and other coast points for remanufacture is now employing a few men but operation there will commence at full blast early in the year it is expected.

There are to be big tie contracts this winter which will keep all the camps up the line of the Canadian National Railway busy. The Lakelse lumber mill will cut ties and it is expected the Northern Lumber Co.'s mill at Smithers will do likewise. The sawmills at Tanall and Esk started cutting lumber last week and will carry on all winter it is expected. The Prince Rupert Logging Co. will also cut ties at Francois Lake.

Activities continue at the Premier Mine, Stewart, and the Granby Smelter and mine at Anyox and many smaller mining properties are doing development work.

In the Letter Box

FISHERIES SITUATION

Editor, Daily News.

I ask a question: Can Prince Rupert retain the fishing industry under present conditions or must it become merely a port for the transshipping of Alaskan fish in bond to the United States?

On the fish market, fish delivered in American bottoms is selling for an average of 2 cents per pound more than the same fish delivered in Canadian bottoms. It costs the Canadian fishing boats 2 1/2 per cent, sales tax on gasoline and distillate more than the American owned boat which gets its supply in Alaska. The Canadian has to pay 35 per cent duty on gas engines and machinery and parts for repairs which the American is not called on to do since the manufacture of these machines is almost exclusively confined to the United States. The cost of supplies is at least 20 per cent, higher for the Canadian boat than for the American.

If these conditions remain how can Prince Rupert's population increase? The economic condition compels Canadian fishermen to change their nationality and registration of their boats and also causes the removal of their families to Alaska from Prince Rupert. This is the actual state of affairs at present.

Our governments are scouring Europe for immigrants for Canada, more especially British Columbia, but the wisdom of such action is questionable. Merchants in town are complaining of dull times. Let us, at least, put up a fight for ourselves.

Captured a Railway

Let us look at what Alaska has done in the past few years. It has almost captured the fishing industry of the north together with a transcontinental railway, for the transportation of fish, which has been built and operated by the foreign country without any expense or worry as to upkeep and deficit to themselves. That is how it appears to me today. Our railway is a greater asset to Alaska than it is to Canada, the nation which built and operates it.

Some people say that this state of affairs has been brought about by the tariff of 2c a pound on fish imported into the United States. That may be so but tariff between two countries is like a game of chess. When one country moves it is up to the other to do the same and annul the other's move. Let Canada

move now. We have a duty of one cent, on fresh fish imported into Canada. Let us make it 2c a pound and apply it to all fish passing through Canada, in bond or otherwise. That will place the Canadian fishermen on an equal footing with the American as we were before the tariff was put in operation. It will remove the discrimination of 2c per pound against Canadian fishermen in a Canadian port for fish similar to that of the Americans.

Prince Rupert Safe

I doubt if a precedent can be found anywhere else in the World to justify the present conditions here. Some people may argue that a proposal like this might compel the American fish boats to return to Seattle with their catches thus losing the business to the Canadian railway. However, the geographical position of Prince Rupert, protects us in that respect as the distance to be covered by the American boats is so great that the amount involved would not justify the action. Even if it had the effect of losing a part of the railway's earnings, I would prefer that to losing the greater part of our fishing industry.

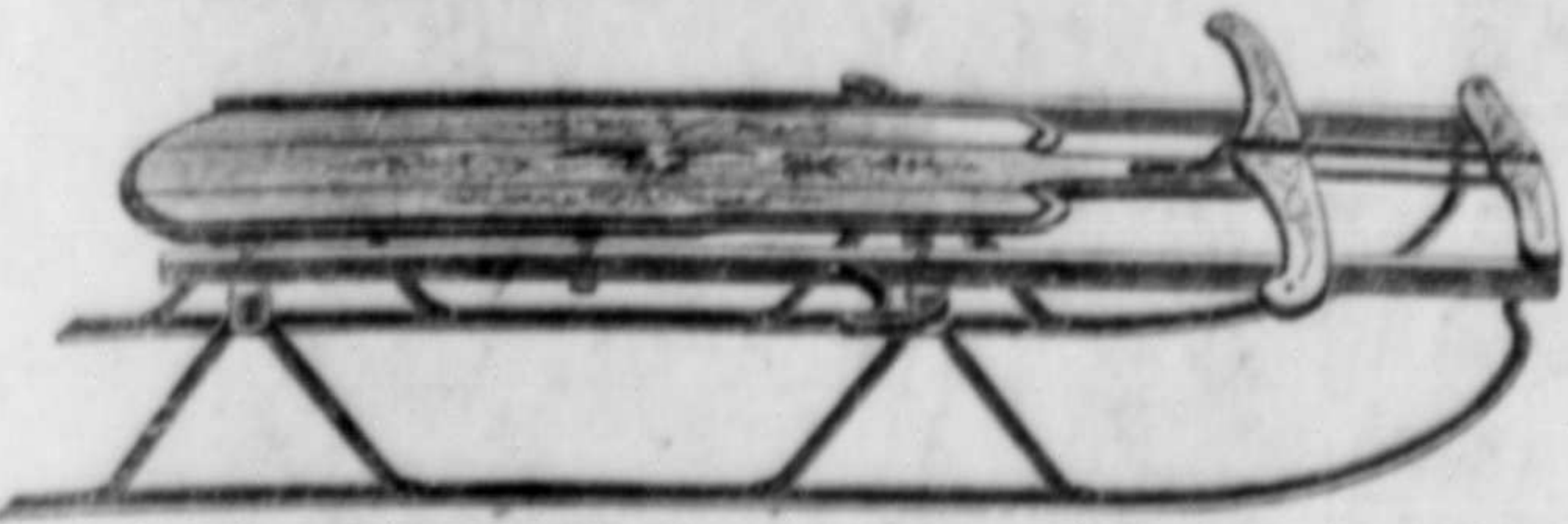

LABOR MEMBER AND MINISTER

Inspector Was Appointee of Wm. Manson and Endorsed by Socialists

VICTORIA, Nov. 9.—The labor member for Newcastle does not make a very good member of the Legislature for he cannot listen. If there is anything with which he disagrees he has to say so and wants to make little speeches here and there. During the debate on the address he challenged Hon. T. D. Pattullo's immigration policy and did it in a loud and very assertive voice. It was almost a bullying voice and the tone indicated that he was open to admit of no opposition to his own pet views, and those views are Red.

During Hon. W. J. Sloan's speech he kept up a running fire, contradicting and objecting until warned by the speaker. Mr. Sloan charged Guthrie with designating Inspector Wilkinson as a "Liberal heeler" yet that official had been appointed by the conservative government on recommendation of William Manson, of Prince Rupert, whose letter Mr. Sloan read. Wilkinson was also the Socialist nominee for the position. He was a coal miner who had reached the position of chief inspector and the minister resented an attack on his integrity. Guthrie denied having used the expression but refused to retract anything he had said.

Had Been Endorsed
 Mr. Sloan also told of the merits of the other inspector and said the staff was loyal to the miners and enforced the regulation against both employers and men. During the present regime the fatalities had been cut down one hundred per cent and he hoped to cut them down another hundred. Also he reminded Guthrie that he, Sloan, had already been endorsed a second time by the miners of Nanaimo and he intimated that he expected to remain in politics long after his friend from Newcastle had disappeared.

Discussing the matter of gas in the Cumberland mine where the explosion had occurred, Mr. Sloan said it had been shown that there was no signs of gas there prior to the explosion and very soon afterwards it had again disappeared. He showed that the statements of Mr. Guthrie that the gas committee was afraid to report, could not be correct because gas had been re-

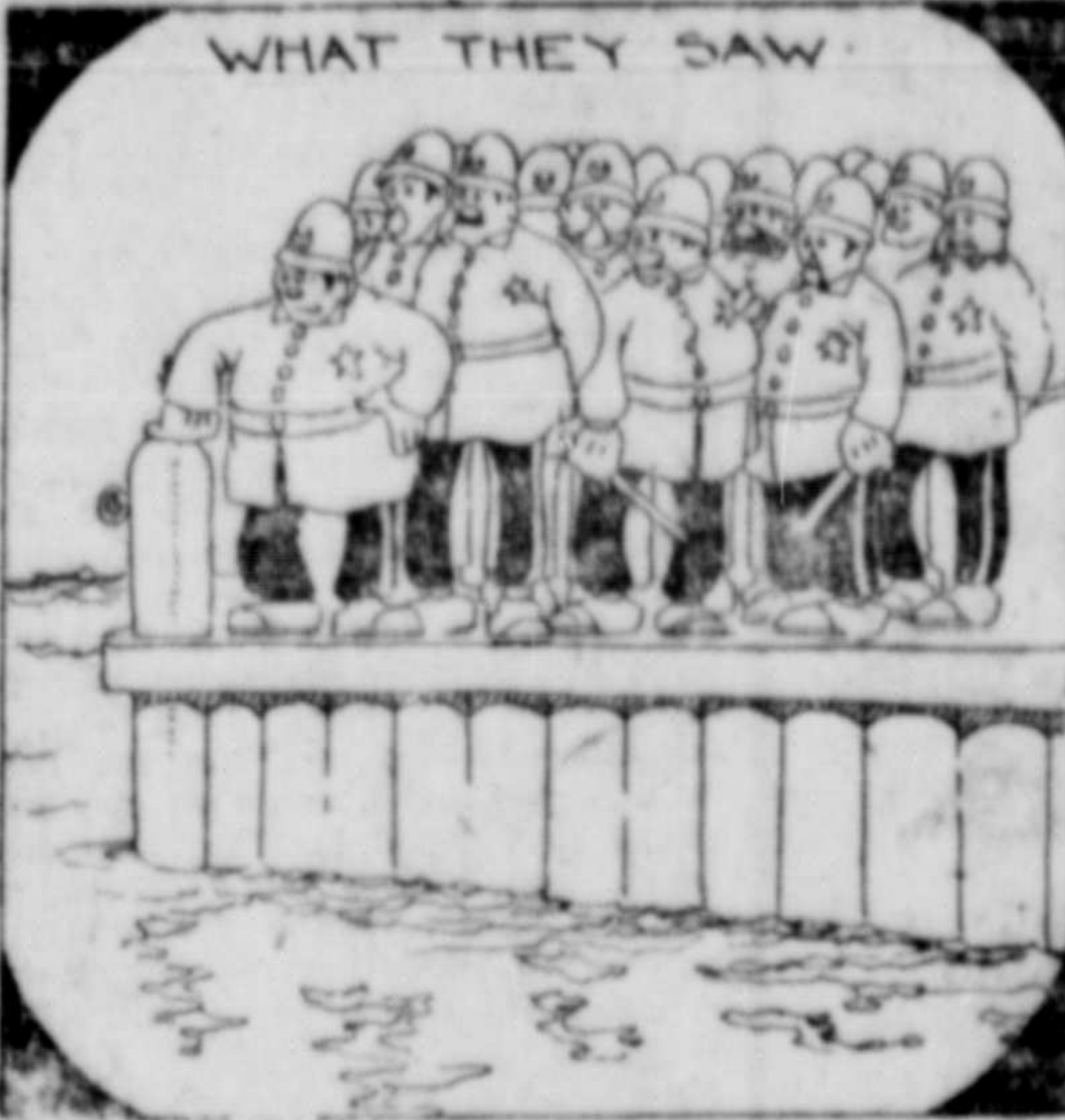

Basketball and How to Play It

By Observer

FORWARDS (Cont'd) Basket Shooting
 No other phase of the game demands the same technique or rigidity of form as basket shooting. Without the proper knowledge or understanding of this fact the player is likely to develop personal peculiarities which are frequently quite detrimental. The proper form in shooting can be readily likened to the swing of a golf club or of a baseball bat. The greatest and most satisfactory results can not be obtained unless rigidity of form is strictly adhered to, although occasionally a player may use some individual characteristics to advantage. A player who possesses a natural eye for shooting but poor form should be carefully coached.

Basket shooting during practice or a game demands concentration which establishes a proper coordination between the mind and the muscles governing the shooting. The objective is to get the desired action comes automatically. I have watched players waste hours in basket shooting practice simply because their actions were the result of physical action only, not the combination of mind and muscle. Deliberate shooting is the only shooting worth while.

Science of Shooting
 Players should be impressed immediately with the relative size of the diameter of the ball and that of the basket. The hoop is eighteen inches in diameter and the ball nine or ten inches, thus having a clearance of four inches for a ball dropping directly to the center from above.

It is a self evident fact, therefore, that the more direct the drop of the ball from above the more chance for the throw to be successful. Good shooting would therefore seem to demand a highly looped ball the downward motion starting at some distance above the basket in order that the drop be direct and straight. A ball thrown in a straight line or at a sharp angle to the basket has little chance of passing through the hoop of the elliptical shape of the basket.

Loop Shot Best
 Though there are many various forms of shooting the "overhand loop shot" is universally recognized as the most scientific. It should be used for long, medium and short distance shots except when right under the basket. It affords players a comparatively safe start as the ball is raised and pushed upward and forward, leaving the hands somewhere above the face. This shot is difficult to block and practically impossible to intercept.

A player in the act of shooting should never look down at the ball or see that it is properly

adjusted; nor should he look up to see the ball leave his hands. The knowledge of these things must be gained by practice through the sense of touch. Loss of time in adjusting the ball may mean a blocked shot and the eyes must be employed in seeking the exact location of the basket.

Ease and Confidence
 Ease and confidence in shooting will come to the player if he but concentrates on the rim of the basket nearest him and loop the ball so that on its downward course it will just clear that rim and fall through the opening, hitting the rim, it will rebound to the back-board and fall again into the basket. If the shot is entirely for the back-board the ball must hit the exact spot at right angles. The back-board should never be used intentionally with the loop shot, however. Its use for the glancing shot will be described in the following article.

There is another shot often used in basketball, especially by the beginner. It is the underhand shot, executed by grasping the ball with the fingers and thumbs and swinging the arms from between bent knees. This is probably the most natural and is certainly the most easily acquired shot but it is practically useless in a game as it is very easily blocked.

Eddie Mulligan, third baseman of the Chicago American League baseball team, has been purchased by the San Francisco Club of the Pacific Coast League, and will report to his new club next season. The purchase is a part of the deal whereby Willie Kamm, San Francisco third baseman, goes to Chicago. The White Sox paid \$100,000 for Kamm.

Sam Fitzpatrick, who died in New York recently at the age of 58, was noted for years as a boxing promoter and a manager of ring champions. He was known in the fight game as "Honest Sam," and himself a lightweight boxer of considerable ability, piloted Jack Johnson to the heavyweight championship of the world, the negro whipping Tommy Burns to capture the title. He also guided the fortunes of Peter Jackson, another famous negro pugilist, and George "Kid" Levings, who was lightweight title holder. Fitzpatrick is reported to have won and lost seven fortunes in his career as fight manager, and race track follower. He was an Australian by birth.

An effort is being made to have the venue of the annual meeting of the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union changed from Montreal to Winnipeg. It is pointed out by Western officials that out of the last five meetings only one has been held in western Canada and that that one was the best meeting in the history of the union.

Council is Assured \$5,488.75 Now Asked Will be Last Required

The city council at last night's meeting, after listening to many arguments furnished by members of the school board and their architect, A. M. Jeffers, in charge of the work on the Booth Memorial School, passed an appropriation of \$5,488.75 to complete work. The money was only voted on the assurance that it would be the last needed to complete the work and that it would be taken out of the school surplus fund.

Kerzian, chairman of the board, drew the council's attention to the many defects in construction which he had remedied. Mr. Jeffers told of places where the water had been leaking through the plaster and stated that the repairs were amounting to double the first estimates.

Alderman Kelly asked for some assurance that this would be the last money asked for. Mr. Jeffers informed him that to the best of his knowledge it would be. Alderman Montgomery pointed out that this was the reply given the council on the last occasion and suggested that the only way out of the trouble would be to shut down when the money had been expended.

Alderman McLeod then made a motion that the money be authorized subject to the above conditions and Alderman Colhart seconded it. The motion carried with Alderman Montgomery registering the only dissenting vote.

Mr. Jeffers definitely informed the council that the work would be completed by next Monday and that the men now working there would be discharged.

PEACE AMONG MOHAMMEDANS

Vice Roy of India Speaks Grati-fyingly in Opening Indian Legislature

SIMLA, India, Nov. 10. — In opening the autumn session of the Indian Legislature here this month, Lord Reading, Viceroy of India, spoke gratifyingly of the pacification of the Mohammedan elements and the establishment of cordial relations with border powers. He also emphasized the need for financial retrenchment, and spoke optimistically of the future of the Reforms.

Referring to the Mohammedan question of the Khalifat, Lord Reading said:
"In the domain of external affairs, the subject uppermost in our minds is the proposed revision of the treaty of Secres. I can now add little to the statement that I made at Peshawar in April last, save to assure you that every stage in the development is followed by my government with a keen and watchful interest, and whatever action we can with propriety adopt to lay before the British government the reasonable aspirations of the Moslems of India regarding these developments we have taken, and shall not fail to take."

Government Acknowledged
"It is gratifying to observe that the activities of my government have not been without effect upon the Moslem population of India, who have readily acknowledged and appreciated that my government has done its utmost to impress the Indian Mohammedan view upon His Majesty's government."

"At this moment negotiations are proceeding with the object of arriving at a solution of this difficult and delicate problem, and it is therefore undesirable for me to discuss the situation. I will only remind you that, as already stated by His Majesty's government, the representations will be fully considered and due weight will be attached to them by His Majesty's government in so far as these are compatible with justice, their obligations to their Allies and the adequate safeguarding of minorities. It is most earnestly to be hoped that these efforts of His Majesty's government and its Allies will shortly result in the complete restoration of peace to the Near East."

The Viceroy's words aroused frequent expressions of approval from various parts of the assembled houses.
