TURKS WILL ACKNOWLEDGE NEUTRAL ZONE

FORMER PREMIER OF GREECE IS ACCLAIMED; REBELS ARE IN FULL CONTROL

Near East Situation Seems to be Somewhat Relieved but is Still Regarded as Serious by Britain

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 28.—The Turkish Nationalists will in principle acknowledge the neutrality of the Dardanelles pending an armistice conference to be participated in by British and Kemalists generals.

Possible war between Britain and Turkey was at least temporarily averted by the declaration of the Kemalists. The declaration relieves the situation which even the British admitted was critical.

LONDON, Sept. 28.—The British Government today takes a grave view of the situation in the Dardanelles. It is regarded so critical as to overshadow developments in Greece. The opinion is generally taken that there is now a greater prospect of fighting between the Turks and British than at any previous time.

Mustapha Kemal's reply to the warning against violation of the neutral zone is being considered by the cabinet. It is regarded as unsatisfactory.

The Greek revolution has added an ever deepening force to the near eastern difficulties and the allies face a more complicated situation than ever. People are asking how the disappearance of King Constantine and the new internal situation in Greece will affect the question of Greek evacuation of Eastern Thrace required by the allies and insisted upon by the Kemalists as a preliminary to any peace conference.

Turks Still Advance

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 28.—The Turk cavalry from Erzurum is advancing from the northeast upon Asmaltepe apparently in an endeavor to cut off the British advance posts at Asheme. The British column, supported by artillery, has left Chanak to counter-thrust. The Kemalists occupied without opposition positions in the region of Dundrek Lamusaki in the neutral zone. This is their fifth violation of the neutrality zone. The remonstrances of the British officers failed to stay the Turkish advance.

The Turkish Nationalists have notified the allies that they will not tolerate the fortification of certain points in the neutral zone of the Dardanelles. The continuance of the work of fortifying will be looked upon by the Kemalists as warranting military action. Hamid Bey informed General Harrington.

SIKI'S PRICE IS GOING UP

United States Will Have to Guarantee 1,000,000 Francs Clear or he Stays in Europe

PARIS, Sept. 28.—American promoters are still angling for battling Siki to fight in the United States. The colored man's manager has announced that the final condition of acceptance to meet either Harry Greb or Harry Mills will be a purse of 1,000,000 francs exclusive of income tax. If these demands are not suitable for the United States contest Siki will remain in Europe and fight England's best glove man. Siki is considering an offer from England to meet the winner of the forthcoming fight between Beckwith and Frank Moran.

CHANGES IN TIME TABLE

Passenger Trains Will Arrive at 5:30 and Leave at 8 After October 1.

A new time table for the daily passenger train service over the Canadian National Railway between Prince Rupert and the East will go into effect next Sunday, Oct. 1. The westbound train will arrive here at 5:30 p.m. instead of 7:15 as at present and the eastbound will leave at 8 o'clock in the evening instead of 7:15. Otherwise the service will be the same as at present with westbound trains daily except Tuesday and eastbound daily except Sunday. Equipment and other details will be practically unchanged.

The new times will be even more acceptable in Prince Rupert for they will allow for longer visits of tourists both coming from the south and bound east and vice versa.

Local officials of the railway are expecting the tourist traffic to continue throughout the winter. Many prairie farmers are planning trips to the coast and one way at least will likely travel via Prince Rupert. There may also be some special excursions although none have yet been definitely announced.

METHODISM HAS SHOWN PROGRESS

Figures Indicate Increases in Membership, Income and Expenditures.

DR. CHOWN GIVES REPORT.
General Conference at Toronto Gets Encouraging News in Regard to Work.

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 28.—(By Canadian Press)—I hesitate not to say that the General Conference will feel that when the full reports of the Church's activities, educational, spiritual and socially redemptive, are presented to it, that the last quadrennium has been in many respects the greatest period that the Methodist Church in Canada has ever known.

This was the statement of Rev. S. D. Chown, general superintendent of the Methodist Church in Canada, at the General Conference of the Methodist Church in Canada, which opened for its quadrennial session here today.

"We shall dispose of the statistics for the quadrennium as briefly as possible," said the General Superintendent. "We do not prize them except as witnesses to the intellectual and spiritual life of the Church. They will at least begel confidence in any interested person who might be induced by misrepresentation to fear that the Church is declining in strength, or, so far as statistics can reveal, is lacking in any essential element of success.

F. A. PAULINE TO BE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE

Selected by Liberals at Nelson to Succeed Hon. A. M. Manson in Chair.

F. A. Pauline, M.L.A. of Saanich, has been selected by the Liberals assembled for the provincial convention which opened today to be speaker of the Legislature in succession to Hon. A. M. Manson, M.M.

The new speaker designate lives at Oak Bay close to the city of Victoria. He won the seat by defeating D. M. Eberts, now Justice Eberts, and was re-elected at the last election. He was formerly a partner of John Piercy in the wholesale dry goods business prior to Mr. Piercy setting up business in Prince Rupert.

Greek Revolutionaries May Set up Republic; Venizelos President

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 28.—Former King Constantine of Greece who abdicated yesterday is reported to have been imprisoned by the revolutionaries in Athens.

A section of the revolutionary army is imbued with the idea of a republic and the accession of King George may be accompanied with difficulties.

An impressive pro-Venizelos demonstration occurred at Athens last night. Thousands of people, including troops, paraded the streets singing and acclaiming Venizelos, waving portraits of the former premier. They marched to the French legation crying "Viva La France."

The revolutionaries have occupied all strategic points and ministries.

BIG CLEAN-UP CEDAR CREEK

Two Rockers Take Out \$6,000 Worth of Gold in Six Days

VANCOUVER, Sept. 28.—Confirmation of reported large returns in a rocker clean-up in the Cedar Creek gold-placer area is brought here by Dan J. Johnston, of the Dominion geological survey, who declares that in the claims of the Cedar Creek Mining Co. six thousand dollars worth of gold was taken out in six days with two rockers.

FIRST MOVE TROOPS FOR WAR SCENE

Machine Gun Corps Passes Through Vancouver — Scenes at Victoria

(Special to Daily News).

VANCOUVER, Sept. 28.—Silent as clams but under "mobilization orders" a party of non-commissioned officers and men of the Canadian machine gun corps stationed at Esquimalt, passed through here last night in full marching order. It was gathered that the troops had been summoned to Winnipeg under secret orders, but it is believed they are destined for the near east.

Family leave taking scenes at Victoria when they embarked were similar to those of 1914, the men promising to bring home a Turk for Christmas.

DE VALERA QUILTS; LIAM LYNCH IS NEW HEAD REPUBLICANS

DUBLIN, Sept. 28.—Eamonn de Valera and his friends have abdicated according to the Freeman's Journal, and Liam Lynch, chief of staff of the Republicans, and his colleagues are in power. The newspaper declares that the hopes of national peace are dashed by this new event and that the Republican leaders are foreing their followers to continue to the bitter end.

ROB BANK BUT MET WITH HAIL OF LEAD AFTER

Three Bandits Killed and Two Jailed at Eureka Springs, Arkansas.

EUREKA SPRINGS, Sept. 28.—Three bandits were killed and two have been jailed following the robbery of the First National Bank. The men, who were heavily armed, entered the town and looted the vaults of the bank taking \$5,000 in bonds and \$25,000 in cash. A bank clerk stepped on a button sounding an alarm in five of the city's principal business houses. When the robbers emerged they were met with a hail of lead. The booty was all recovered.

GEORGE IS NOW KING OF GREECE

Crown Prince Succeeds His Father Following Pressure From Army and Navy

ATRENS, Sept. 28.—Greece has a new king, Crown Prince George, who married Princess Elizabeth of Rumania, succeeds his father Constantine on the throne. Pressure brought to bear by the army and navy made the abdication of Constantine necessary.

Prince Rupert Man on Train That Left the Track on C.P.R.; Rails Spread Going to Nelson

(Special to the Daily News).

NELSON, Sept. 28.—The special train carrying delegates from the coast to Nelson ran off the track when 118 miles out of Vancouver, causing a delay of eleven hours. There was no damage to the train and the passengers were unhurt, although they were somewhat shaken up. Seven cars left the track.

On the train were practically all the Vancouver and Victoria delegates as well as many from the surrounding districts. Among the latter was Ben Self, the theatre manager from Prince Rupert. In all there were 200 on board. The train arrived here this morning and the delegates are taking part in the work of the convention which has been slightly delayed.

There are present here about one hundred delegates from Victoria and Vancouver Island alone besides those from Vancouver and smaller places on the coast. Members of the provincial cabinet with the exception of Hon. William Sloan and Hon. T. D. Pattullo are also present.

Representation for each constituency at the convention is given on the basis of ten delegates for each member in the Provincial House. Rural constituencies, however, are allowed extra representation on a basis of one delegate for every 250 voters on the list, with a minimum of ten delegates.

To accommodate the crowd in Nelson this week the special train of C.P.R. sleepers has been parked in the railway yards, and delegates not able to get into hotels sleep there.

To Pick New President
A position of unofficial but almost equal importance is actually to be filled by the convention.

That is president of the Liberal Association of British Columbia. M. A. Macdonald, K.C., has held that position for the past seven years, but there has been much criticism of his failure to call a convention in that time, and it is hardly likely that he will be re-elected.

Two names are prominently mentioned as his successor. They are J. A. Campbell, president of the Vancouver City Liberal Association, and Brig.-Gen. V. W. Odium. Mr. Campbell is a young man who, in his one year as president of the city association has established a high reputation for energy and ability.

Brig.-Gen. Odium's fine record as a soldier and a business man is his greatest asset in political strength, but as he is already of parliamentary calibre, it is believed that he will be held in reserve for the next Dominion election, when his friends believe he can retrieve the laurels lost in Vancouver South.

Henry C. Hall, of Victoria, a former member of the Legislature, is also mentioned as a possibility, and the Interior people are said to have a desire to bring out K. C. McDonald, M.P.P. of Vernon.

VICE-PRESIDENT OF C.N.R. HERE

M. H. McLeod, of Toronto, is Accompanied by party of Construction Officials.

M. H. McLeod, vice president of the Canadian National Railway in charge of construction; C. S. Gzowsky, assistant to the vice-president in charge of construction, D. B. Campbell, general superintendent of construction, and W. Burns, engineer of construction, all of Toronto, form a party of railroad officials who arrived from the East on last night's train in their private car No. 52 and who are spending the day in the city prior to returning East tonight to Lucerne from which point they will branch off to visit the lines in the southern part of the province.

Mr. McLeod stated this morning that his trip was merely one of general inspection and there was nothing of special significance in connection with it. This is his first visit to Prince Rupert for seven or eight years since before the taking over of the line by the government. He was formerly general manager of western lines for the Canadian Northern.

THREE HUNDRED AT OPENING OF BIG CONVENTION

Caucus Went Fully into P. G. E. Matters Yesterday — Abandonment Does Not Seem Favored.

BUCKHAM, COLUMBIA, CHOSEN CHIEF WHIP

NELSON, Sept. 28.—Three hundred delegates were present when the provincial Liberal convention opened here this morning. The conventionists were formally welcomed to Nelson by Mayor C. F. McHardy.

The Pacific Great Eastern situation was fully discussed in caucus yesterday but no announcement on the subject was formally made. From opinions gathered, however, it is evident that there is little or no sentiment in favor of the abandoning of the railway though the Ashcroft-Clinton cut-off may be recommended. The question of completion into Prince George occupied the attention of the ministers.

In addition to endorsing F. A. Pauline, member for Saanich, as speaker, the caucus chose J. A. Buckham, member for Columbia, as chief whip.

Turk Interprets Indefinite Saying in Koran as Blessing on War

In the shades of the crossing scimitars there is paradise, says the Koran, and the Ottoman Turk has always been ready to take this promise as a direct command to war on the unbeliever.

It is a strange turn of the wheel that would put Kemal Pasha at the head of an army fighting a Jihad or holy war.

The Young Turks and the Nationalists broke violently away from the traditions of their forefathers and openly flouted the tenets of Mahomet. They have warred on the Sultan himself and borne arms against the Commander of the Faithful, even although he was supported with all the authority of the spiritual arm as wielded by the Sheik ul Islam.

Since the first shot was fired across the Danube in 1914 the world has grown accustomed to strange alliances and changes in orientation, but there have been a few stranger than the spectacle presented by the head of the Young Turks being hailed by Islam as the champion of the faith of the Prophet.

The only parallel will be presented by British statesmanship lending every effort to keep the Turks from Constantinople—a reversal of policy that will make Melbourne and Palmerston turn in their graves.



MCARTHUR TO BUILD MILL PRINCE GEORGE

Said to Have Tied Up with Pulp and Paper People.

Word was received at Prince George on Tuesday that J. D. McArthur the railway man was prepared to go ahead with the construction of the mill on the property recently acquired by him on the banks of the Fraser River, according to F. G. Dawson, who returned last night from a business visit to that town.

Mr. Dawson says it is understood at Prince George that Mr. McArthur has joined forces with the Pulp and Paper Company that has been proposing to operate at that point and that the sawmill is the beginning of the larger industry.

Mr. McArthur has been disposing of some of his interests in the east and is turning his attention to the west. His railway, the Edmonton, Dunvegan and British Columbia was recently leased to the C. P. R. with an option to purchase and it is understood they will take up the option. If the deal goes through Mr. McArthur gets about six million dollars as his share.

Naturally the people of the interior centre are enthused over the outlook and there is prospect of increased interest being taken in that district.

MONTREAL BOARD OF TRADE EXCURSIONIST DIED IN VANCOUVER

One sad event marred the Western tour of the Montreal Board of Trade, it being the death of Bernard McNally, of Montreal, one of the party, who died in Vancouver on Saturday afternoon. The deceased had been taken sick while enroute from Victoria to Vancouver and was removed to the hospital at the latter place before the party left for Prince Rupert. It was found that death was due to

uraemia. Mrs. McNally was with her husband to the end and is now accompanying the remains to Montreal. Deceased was one of the most popular members of the party.

WALTER JAYNES WAS AFTER BIRDS WHEN HE FELL OVER HIS GUN

Terrace People Extend Sympathy to Bereaved Wife and Son.

TERRACE, Sept. 28.—The death of Walter Jaynes, the barber, which took place here yesterday as the result of an accident, his gun going off accidentally, has caused a flutter of excitement in the district and a general feeling of regret at the loss of a good citizen and of sympathy with Mrs. Jaynes and son.

Mr. Jaynes owns a small ranch on the bench just above the town and when down to the creek for water yesterday morning noticed some grouse. He returned to the house for his gun and, accompanied by his wife, set out to get a shot at the birds. He was walking ahead of his wife when he stumbled and fell, discharging the gun as he did so, the contents of the barrel piercing his breast.

Mrs. Jaynes ran to their nearest neighbor, Mr. Vigor, who immediately called in other neighbors.

Mr. and Mrs. Jaynes came to Terrace about two years ago and had started a chicken and fruit ranch and were doing well. They had made a number of friends since they arrived. The son Bruce is employed by the railway on construction work. He is 29 years of age and was overseas for four years and was badly wounded, having only recently completely recovered. The family originally came from Nova Scotia.

In the Letter Box

FOUNDER OF METHODISM IN CANADA.

Editor Daily News:—
As today marks the opening of the Quadrennial Session of the General Conference of the Methodist church, a few incidents relating to the life of the first Methodist preacher in Ontario may be of interest to your readers.

At the time of the American Revolutionary War, Lord Randon raised a regiment of Irish volunteers. Among the soldiers of that regiment was one George Neill who subsequently became major of a cavalry regiment. In one engagement it is said every member of his company, except himself, was either killed or taken prisoner. On another occasion Neill was cooking his meal in the open when a cannon ball struck the ground near the place where he was standing. One of his comrades said to him, "you had better move as they have our range." Neill replied he was not born to be shot and still held his ground. Soon another cannon ball shattered earth over his food and he then moved from his position and in a short time a third cannon ball struck the spot, where he had just previously been standing.

Discovered by Dream.
After the close of the war he engaged in school teaching in Georgia but whilst thus employed in the course of a dream, in which he thought he was giving orders to his men, his loud speaking attracted the attention of the occupants of the home where he was staying to the fact that he had been a British soldier, and as a result he found it prudent to leave the neighborhood.

About that time he heard Rev. Hope Hull, a zealous Methodist preacher and was converted. Very soon he too began to preach and was sent to a charge along the Pee Dee River in Georgia where he gained some converts. Hearing of a party of Loyalists who were starting for Canada he desired to join them. They were going to Nova Scotia or New Brunswick. From some cause he missed connection and then travelled in the direction of the Niagara River which he crossed at Queenston in October 1786. He began preaching along the frontier and one of his converts was Christian Warner from whose family name, one of the first Methodist chapels—the old Warner chapel received its designation. Christian Warner was the ancestor of Rev. Dr. Warner, who until a short time

Tricks by Telephone.
Both the City firm and private house-holders are warned against victimization by telephone. Telephone frauds are admitted by the police to be most difficult to trace. One trick is to ring up a house after the mistress has been seen to leave, announce that she has met with an accident, and so induce the servants to go to a hospital with articles that she is supposed to want. The thief then knows to a minute how much time he has in which to ransack the house. The police have had several cases of this kind lately. Telephone users should be wary too, of men representing that they have come to overhaul the instrument—an old dodge of the daylight thief to secure admittance to a house and pick up anything he can lay his hands on.

"The Son of an American."
Another trick has been practised on commercial travellers or their friends. The firm for whom the traveller is working, his wife, or possibly an acquaintance receives a wire asking for £10 to be telegraphed to the particular town where he is known to be. Of course, the traveller himself has not sent the wire, and the first he knows of the fraud is when he returns to London. This trick was worked boldly and successfully by a man claiming to be the son of an American who had exclusive dealings with London business houses. By some means which have never been discovered he ascertained the American connections of a score or more of London firms, and for months he rang up these firms in turn from some place in the Home Counties, asking for a ten pound note to be telegraphed to the local postoffice, as he had unexpectedly run short of money. He answered personal questions so readily and accurately over the telephone that hardly a firm doubted him. The money was wired without hesitation and not until over £100 had gone were the police able to get on his track.

The Tombstone.
In memory of the Rev. George Neal, a Major in the B. S. in the American Revolutionary War, who died Feb. 28, 1810, aged 90 years.—Nearby was the headstone marking the grave of his wife. We brought the condition of the grave and surroundings to the attention of the next session of the Hamilton Conference and action was subsequently taken by the Conference and also by the Toronto and London Conferences which resulted in the erection of the Neal Memorial Church in the village of Port Rowan in graves beneath which the remains of the pioneer Methodist preacher of Ontario and his wife have been reinterred.

AGED LADY REMEMBERS.
On an occasion many years previous my interest had been awakened in reading the same statement and now I was living in the immediate neighborhood. One Sunday soon after reading the above, I was in the home of one of the aged residents and I asked the lady of the home if she had ever known or heard of Major Neill. Her reply was that she had both known him and heard him preach. And it is a very remarkable circumstance that the lady, Mrs. Frederick Gope, now 91 years of age is still living. I inquired of her concerning the burial place of Major Neill and found that it was not more than two miles from my home. So one afternoon we went back to search for the grave—the fence of the burial ground was broken down and saplings were growing up among the graves. After a prolonged search I found the headstone with the following inscription:

BAD EXPLOSION ON GULF OF GENOA IS CAUSED BY LIGHTNING
SPEZIA, Sept. 28.—The entire naval garrison at Falconara fort on the Gulf of Genoa are believed to have been killed in an explosion caused by lightning which destroyed within a radius of ten miles. Many hundreds of persons were wounded.
