Civic Finances Now Under Discussion

GERMANY BARRED FROM DISCUSSING RUSSIAN AFFAIRS AT GENOA

Genoa Conference to Continue With Russians Barred

GENOA, April 19.—The Genoa conference apparently has been saved. For the past two days it has been tottering on the edge of collapse due to indignation of some of the more important leaders over the action of the Germans and Russians in secretly concluding a treaty covering the principal and most delicate points under consideration by the conference. Now, however, the delegates are to go forward with their work, but the Germans are barred from taking part in the discussions concerning Russian questions.

Dr. Walter Rathenau, German foreign minister, conferred with Lloyd George and Foreign Affairs Minister Tchitcherine of Russia this morning regarding the barring of the Germans from the Russian commission of the conference.

Attack Lloyd George.

LONDON, April 19.—The second day's editorial comment on the Russian-German incident at Genoa shows a modification of some of the views expressed yesterday, although the severest critics of Russia and Germany and Lloyd George, such as the Times and Post and Daily Mail, renew their denunciations without qualifications. They centre their criticism, however, on Lloyd George more than on the negotiators of the new treaty, declaring the Premier allowed himself to be fooled by the Soviet delegates.

Earlier Despatches. GENOA, April 19.—It is rumored that the great powers will decide to take steps to annul the German-Russian treaty. A note has been sent to Germany describing the treaty as a violation of the agreement under which the nations entered the Genoa conference and notifying Germany that she is barred from participating in the discussions on the Russian economic problems. It is understood that this disbarment will be opposed by neutral nations led by Norway.

The Genoa conference has reached a crisis, but the complete breaking up may be avoided. PARIS, April 19.—The reparations commission is to be asked whether the Russo-German treaty signed at Rapallo on Sunday violates the treaty of Versailles with regard to German-owned property in Russia. This property under the Versailles treaty is pledged for payments of reparations.

EXTEND HIGH SCHOOL COURSE

That is Recommendation of Teachers at the Confederation Meeting.

VANCOUVER, April 19.—The Teachers' Federation in session here yesterday adopted a resolution recommending an extension of the High School course to a period of four years and dealing extensively with the regulations as to the marking of examination papers so that the work should be secret and thorough.

Speakers from France, New Zealand and the United States addressed the evening session.

SHOOTING RESUMED

BELFAST, April 19.—Shooting resumed today in Ballymacarrat district of Belfast. John Scott, a youth, was killed and William Johnston was fatally wounded.

INCINERATOR NOT SUITABLE

Ald. Dybbavn, After Visiting Vancouver, Says Would Be Expensive Luxury Here.

RECOMMENDS BITULITHIC FOR STREET SURFACING

That an incinerator in Prince Rupert at the present time would be an expensive luxury is the opinion of Ald. Dybbavn, who investigated the workings of the plants at Vancouver on his recent trip south and reported on the matter to the city council last night.

In his report Ald. Dybbavn said that he had interviewed City Engineer F. L. Fellowes of Vancouver on the question. In Vancouver there were two incinerators, only one of which was operating. This one had a capacity of 100 tons, but was only being used for forty. The City of Vancouver was dumping much of its garbage at the end of streets and utilizing it in street building. That method might be adopted here.

Ald. Gollart thought that the incinerator idea should be given up and that in the meantime experiments with dumping should be made. In any event the city should get rid of the garbage soon.

Ald. Kerr thought that the dumping idea would not be practicable here. City Engineer Whitaker suggested that, since the dumping idea was an economical one, some changes in the system might be made. Possibly a steel tank or scow could be constructed which could be kept under water, thus eliminating the bad odor.

Street Surfacing. Regarding street surfacing, Ald. Dybbavn said that he had covered 100 miles of streets in Vancouver and had seen five different kinds of surfaces: Tarvia B, Tarvia X, bitulithic, asphalt and concrete. Bitulithic, in his opinion, would seem the most suitable here. It would stand up for five or eight years without maintenance.

City Engineer Whitaker concurred with the report of Ald. Dybbavn on street surfacing. The cost of bitulithic would be about 82 a square yard. The mixture was composed of rocks in graded sizes from one inch to sand and about 7 per cent asphalt. A coating of 2 inches of this would make a highly desirable surface. The material would be applied hot and a portable apparatus would be necessary. It had certain elasticity which would make up for depressions. On some of the downtown streets it could be used to good advantage.

After some discussion the report was referred to the board of works and the thanks of the council were extended to Ald. Dybbavn for the splendid report.

EXIT SENATE QUEENSLAND

SYDNEY, April 19.—The Queensland Legislative Council, corresponding with the senates of other countries, the upper house of parliament, has ceased to exist. Premier Theodore announced that Governor Reed, advises the royal assent has been given the bill abolishing the upper house and providing that parliament should consist of His Majesty the King and the Legislative Assembly of Queensland.

CRICKET TEAM FROM CANADA

Will Tour South of England and Play Two Games at Lords.

TORONTO, April 19.—Arrangements have been completed for the English tour of the Canadian cricketers to leave Montreal July 19 to play a series of games in the South of England. Two matches will be played at Lords, one against the M. C. C. and a picked team selected from the House of Lords and House of Commons. All the members of the Canadian team are to be taken from this and other Eastern cities.

GEORGE WILL TAKE OVER RUPERT'S RUN TOMORROW NIGHT

Captain C. H. Nicholson, manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific Coast Steamship Service, arrived from Vancouver on the Prince Rupert this morning. He will be here until tomorrow evening superintending the putting of the Prince Rupert in dry dock for annual overhaul and the resumption of service by the Prince George, which will take the place of the Prince Rupert this trip. The George came out of dry dock yesterday afternoon and will move to No. 1 G. T. P. shed this afternoon. Captain W. S. Moorehouse will take command of the Prince George now and will remain with that vessel this season.

GOVERNMENT WANTS SMITH ISLAND ROCK FOR COW BAY ROAD

A letter from A. L. Carruthers, provincial government engineer, asking that 420 cubic yards of Smith Island rock be sold to the department for the hard surfacing of the Cow Bay road and that the street roller be lent under the previous terms was received by the council last night and referred to the board of works for report. Ald. Kerr suggested that the matter of the proposed pipe line for Cow Bay be impressed on the government at this time.

LITTLE BOY DIES AFTER OPERATION

George Stanley Long, Aged Five, Passed Away in General Hospital Last Evening.

The death occurred last night following an operation of George Stanley Long, aged 5 years, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Long, McMorris Apartments. The deceased lad was also a grandson of Mr. and Mrs. George Frizzell. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

Increase of About Five Mills in Taxes For Year Forecasted by Council

Estimates for 1922 were considered in committee by the city council last night and, after a discussion which lasted till well after the midnight hour, were tabled until tonight, when there will be a special session at which it is expected they will be adopted with possible amendments and the mill rate for the year fixed. On the estimates as presented by the finance committee last night the mill rate for the year will be 35.6008, subdivided as follows: General, 19.4535; schools, 9.3815; special, 6.7628. Expenditure for the year is estimated at \$305,785.27 as compared with \$311,401 last year. The revenue is estimated at \$89,600 which includes \$10,500 from the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Co. under the recently ratified bylaw and \$5,000 estimated as the share of liquor profits.

In presenting the estimates, Ald. Dybbavn, chairman of the finance committee, stated that the mill rate had been reached on the basis of apportionment as given in the G. T. P. collection. The estimates differed very little from those originally presented by the various departments. There might be some savings effected on them. In the public works department there was a capital expenditure of \$43,800 proposed which included extensions, plank road repairs and alterations, lagvia equipment and air compressors and drills for Section 1 rock work.

There was considerable discussion of an informal nature and it appears as if these estimates will be adopted practically as presented. There will possibly be alterations in regard to the status of the light and water utilities both of which are brought down in the estimates as taking care of themselves.

SETTLERS TO ARRIVE HERE NEXT SUNDAY

Party Bound for Massett Will Leave for Islands on Monday.

TWENTY-SIX IN THE PARTY

Seven Families En route Across Continent in Charge of Mr. Dunn

Word has been received here that the party of settlers for Queen Charlotte Islands, 26 in number, will arrive here on Sunday evening in charge of Mr. Dunn and will leave for Massett the following day where they will be met by Dr. Lawson, who was here recently.

The party which includes two doctors, Dr. Dunn and Dr. Palmer, consists of seven families. They embarked on the Scythia at Liverpool on April 8, and came by way of Halifax. They are crossing the continent on the Canadian National Railway. Dr. Lawson who went to the islands nearly two weeks ago is making preparations for the temporary accommodation of the new arrivals. They propose to pre-empt provincial lands and hew out for themselves farms and build homes on Graham Island.

ANYOX VOTES FOR DAYLIGHT SAVING

Net Majority in Favor of Extra Hour in Evening at Smelter Town Was 193.

Well Pleased With Report of Delegates.

Most of the people of Prince Rupert feel well pleased with the report of the delegates to Ottawa, and the more they think about it the more impressed they are with the value of the work done by the delegation and the optimism of the reports received.

Naturally the reports are guarded. There is nothing of that recklessness that sometimes constitutes the reports of delegates. They state the case exactly as it is without any exaggeration. The fact that the delegates themselves are pleased with the outlook is most encouraging. As one man expressed it on the street yesterday, it looks as if a new era was about to open up for this city, an era of progress.

Development of Railway Is Chief Problem.

The development of the G. T. P. is the most important thing that can happen to Prince Rupert, for the development of the railway means the development of the port. If the railway languishes the port will suffer. If we all get behind the railway and aid it all we can we shall be aiding ourselves. Co-operation is as necessary here as elsewhere. The difficulty in the past is that we have not had the co-operation from the railway which we have a right to expect. Now things are changing and we are looking forward to a better condition.

Do Our Utilities Pay Well or Not?

Citizens want to know if the utilities are paying well. If they are they have a right to know it. According to the figures quoted last night by Alderman Perry there is a difference of opinion in the city hall as to what the standing is. In view of this, it looks as if the auditor should be asked to make a public statement showing where the discrepancy occurs so that the citizens, who are the shareholders in the concern, may know what it all means. If there is a profit of \$30,000 a year from light and power, it means that the large users of light and power have been robbed to pay the taxes of the other citizens. They should pay their share with a slight margin of profit for safety, but there is no reason in the world why extortionate rates should be charged in order that the mill rate may be reduced.

We have no information to indicate who is right, but we do know that citizens are uneasy over the situation and want to know whether the rates paid are as much too high as the one set of figures would indicate.

There is often too much of a tendency in the conduct of city affairs to forget that the citizens are the shareholders in the business and that they should be kept informed of all the activities and especially on matters of finance.

Much Interest in Genoa Conference.

Owing to the reports coming through on the telegraph and published, the people everywhere in Canada are intensely interested in the Genoa Conference. Very quick service is given in regard to any of these important movements. News is sent out and reaches the farthest points in a very short time. The signing of the Russo-German treaty is the trouble just now, but what will be the outcome it is impossible to tell.

ANYOX, April 19.—Easter was fittingly celebrated in Anyox amidst glorious weather, many boating and fishing excursions being made.

All the Churches held special services which were very well attended. At Christ Church, Holy Communion was celebrated at 8 a.m. and 9 p.m. and a fully choral evening-song was held at 7:15 p.m. The choir rendered an anthem "The Radiant Morn," and there was also a solo Recit. GO FORWARD WITH COURAGE

That Is the Advice of Attorney-General to People of Prince Rupert.

CO-OPERATION MESSAGE.

At the luncheon of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade yesterday Hon. Alex. Manson gave a really masterful address. The bare matter of the address was published yesterday, but the impressions, the oratorical effects and the emphasis it is impossible to convey to readers. It was a great effort and was much appreciated by the members of the board on behalf of whom it was made. Among other things he told how he had urged upon ministers and members their duty to come west and see for themselves. He had warned them against the Orientalizing of the province and especially he warned the Progressives of the prairies who would be the next to suffer from the invasion.

Mr. Manson urged on Prince Rupert people that they go forward with courage, reason and determination as their watchword. He had addressed several gatherings in the East, one in particular, the gathering of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and he drew attention to the fact that the East did not know the West and vice versa. Their pessimism was utterly inexcusable. It was their duty to take their holidays in their own country and to learn of it. He spoke of the editor of the Globe, the apostle of pessimism. The editor had never been out over the railway and had no right to write critically and pessimistically about it. The railway would soon be the biggest railway asset in the country. He spoke of the splendid construction of the line and its value from a passenger and freight point of view. In studying the trans-Pacific railways with Mr. McGeer, who was preparing the case for British Columbia on freight rates, it would found that no railway could compare with the G. T. P. for grade or curvature.

Instant Response.

When urging the ministers to come west he had met with instant response. Sir Lomer Gouin was the first to say he was coming. Others, Kennedy, Motherwell, Stewart—at least seven or eight ministers would be here he felt sure. He had urged them to leave the railway and see the natural resources of the interior country.

Speaking of the freight rates, Mr. Manson told of the splendid light that had been put up by G. G. McGeer for British Columbia over the freight rates. British Columbia had paid one hundred million dollars more than she should have done in freight rates. In concluding, Mr. Manson said he was leaving Prince Rupert with regret. He came here before there was a town here and to tear up was a great wrench. This however, was the lot of a person who went into public life. He urged that the people here co-operate. So far as he was concerned, as soon as the election was over he forgot it until another election was due. They were all pioneers trying to develop the country and co-operation was essential. All citizens of every shade of politics should get behind the members and work together for the good of the country. While all made mistakes they should get credit for their honest intentions.

In British Columbia they had large problems to face, but nothing was insurmountable. If the people stood solidly for the development of the whole province the results could not be other than satisfactory and happy.

Vote of Thanks.

Mayor Rochester said he had listened with pleasure to the address of the attorney-general and the other delegates from Ottawa. He felt they had done good work. He moved, seconded by E. F. Dury, that a hearty vote of thanks be accorded Mr. Manson for his address.

C. H. Orme declared he had never listened to a better summing up than that just given by Mr. Manson. It was only by co-operation they could get results.

Olof Hansen told of how the delegation, headed by the attorney

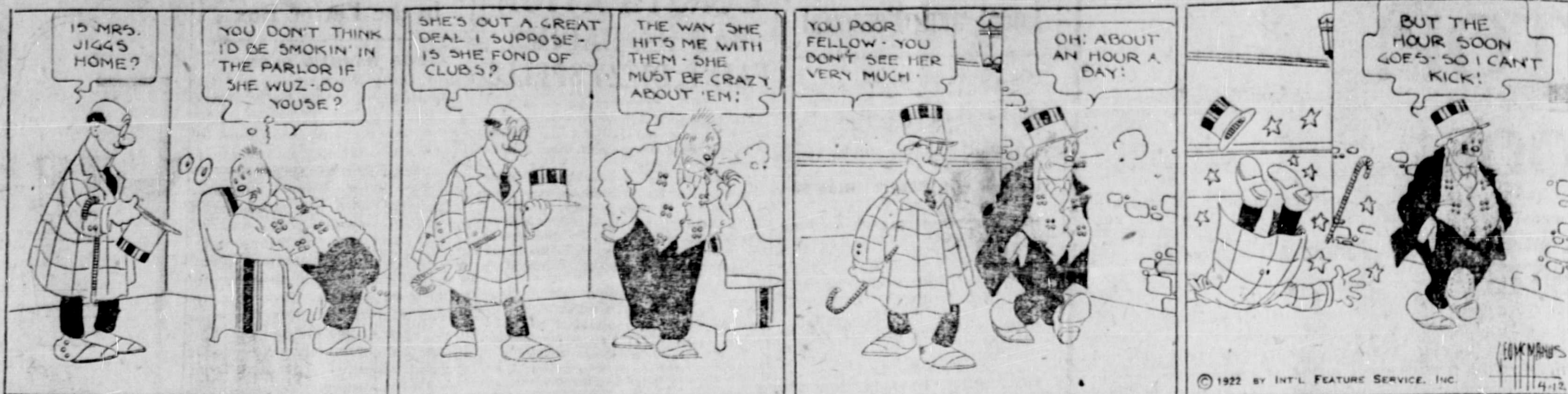

BRINGING UP FATHER



UNDERMINING PUPIL'S FAITH

Inspector and Principal of Victoria High School to Conduct Inquiry.

OBJECTION TO BOOKS.

VICTORIA, April 19.—To find out the truth of assertions that the history taught at the Victoria High School destroys the religious faith of the students, the City School Board ordered a thorough investigation into the history text book used in the matriculation classes. A committee of the board, Municipal Inspector Deane and T. W. Cornett, teacher of matriculation history will conduct the inquiry.

The Board's decision to get to the bottom of the "heresy" question was provoked by a letter from Rev. Norman Smith who said that he knew of High School students who had abandoned their religious beliefs as a result of their history studies.

"Before taking the course the beliefs held were: Man's need of redemption; the incarnation of God to be our Savior; the ascension of Christ," Mr. Smith wrote. "As a result of the course these were given up and the following religious beliefs arrived at:

New Beliefs.

"(1) There was no special revelation of God to the Hebrew Prophets.

"(2) Christ was only an ordinary man. The incarnation, atonement and resurrection unnecessary and untrue.

"(3) Christ was a philosopher only in the same sense as other ancient and modern philosophers.

"(4) Christ's moral and ethical standard not necessarily any more true, final or binding than any other moral code.

"(5) Christ was the founder of a religion only as Zoroaster and Mohammed were and Christianity is not necessarily final.

"(6) A general idea that man is evolving upwards naturally towards perfection, having no need of restoration, forgiveness or grace or salvation."

Mr. Smith emphasized that this letter was in no sense a charge against Mr. Cornett, nor against the High School.

"I am in no position," he adds, "to say whether or not Mr. Cornett is giving interpretations or guiding the thought and study of his pupils along lines that would necessarily lead to the conclusions enumerated above, but the greatest care should be taken as to the interpretation given. While bringing no charge against Mr. Cornett, may I ask for a thorough inquiry into just what he is teaching; along what lines he recommends study, and to what books he refers students for reading?"

"Are Wavering."

"I have heard that in many schools children grounded in the simple faith are now wavering," said Trustee Mrs. Bertha P. Andrews. "College students are handing together to see if they can restore that faith. The study of history in certain ways undermines this faith. We should have this book investigated and act with the Department of Education to see what we can do about this book. It's a very vital matter."

"We can't side-step a definite request for an investigation," Trustee Sivertz asserted. "This is a gradual evolutionary force affecting the relation between religion and advanced science." He quoted an article from a leading Methodist magazine, which declared that modern scientific discoveries necessitated changes in present religious conceptions.



"I rather value the research in science which is disclosing many truths of creation and giving man a broader horizon," he added. "Therefore, I favor the full-scale enquiry into this matter. Of course anything we don't like is 'subversive' of our conceptions, but if there is anything taught in the High School which is subversive of truth I will do everything to see that the course is altered."

According to Text Book.

"I think enquiry will show that Mr. Cornett is adhering to the text book," said Trustee Mrs. Spofford.

"I understand you looked into the matter before and absolved Mr. Cornett of all blame, finding that he taught only what was in the book," observed Trustee Brown. "It seems unfair to ask him to commit himself further. I cannot see that any good would come of it."

"This doesn't bear on Mr. Cornett at all—it merely is an effort to find out what is in this book, and what it is doing to our young people," said Mrs. Andrews.

"When an inquiry is planned into what books Mr. Cornett is recommending to his students it is a reflection upon him," advised Municipal Inspector Deane. "He can only recommend books authorized by the Department of Education, so it is a reflection upon the Department."

"If this is so then I want a full investigation," said Mr. Sivertz. "If the teacher is departing from the simple path of his duty we should know it and if he is not he should be protected." Mr. Sivertz pointed out that a school of geographers in the United States now believed that world was flat while W. J. Bryan was fighting the evolutionary theory.

PRINCE RUPERT DELEGATES ARE NEWSPAPERMEN

For a Too Short Hour They Enjoy the License of the Fourth Estate at Ottawa.

ALSO WERE MEMBERS.

At the Prince Rupert Board of Trade luncheon yesterday, President Orme in the chair, F. G. Dawson, one of the delegates to Ottawa, told how he and his fellow delegates managed to get into the coveted positions at the opening of Parliament and at the reception by the Governor-General and Lady Byng.

For the opening of the House the delegates had tickets for the gallery, but they were late and the gallery was full. They pondered a minute or two and then decided that they had been so long around the Chateau Laurier that they might even qualify as members. They joined the procession of senators and members going into the Senate chamber and were at once recognized as, if not members, at least of such class as that of which members are made. They sat among the favored ones

and saw and heard everything.

Are Pressmen.

The Governor's reception was a different matter. They had pretty good tweeds and also the common or garden swallowtails such as Prince Rupert society requires on the best evening occasions. They had not, however, that precise kind necessary to insure them passing the guard at the door. What were they to do? They wanted to see the reception, although they were not particularly keen to be received. They were out to see everything of an official nature, but here the bars were up and they were on the outside.

However, it takes more than a matter of clothes to deter Hon. Alex. Manson, Fred Dawson and Mike McCafferty when they are anxious to get there. They scratched their heads and looked at each other and then scratched their heads again and made remarks which sounded something like "damp." Then the countenance of one lighted up, though which gave birth to the bright idea was not stated. "I have it, boys. We're journalists."

Signed the Roll.

They made for the press gallery and signed the roll as representatives of various journals. Mr. Dawson represented the Prince Rupert Daily News; Mr. Manson, the Omicron Herald, and Mr. McCafferty, the Orange Sentinel. Wearing that devil-may-care expression, with hats slightly tilted and with a leer they entered the gallery and at their own initiative became members of the great fourth estate. From that vantage point they watched the reception, saw the shaking hands with the Governor, and revelled in the thought that, for one occasion at any rate, they were rakish devils connected with the formation of public opinion in Canada.

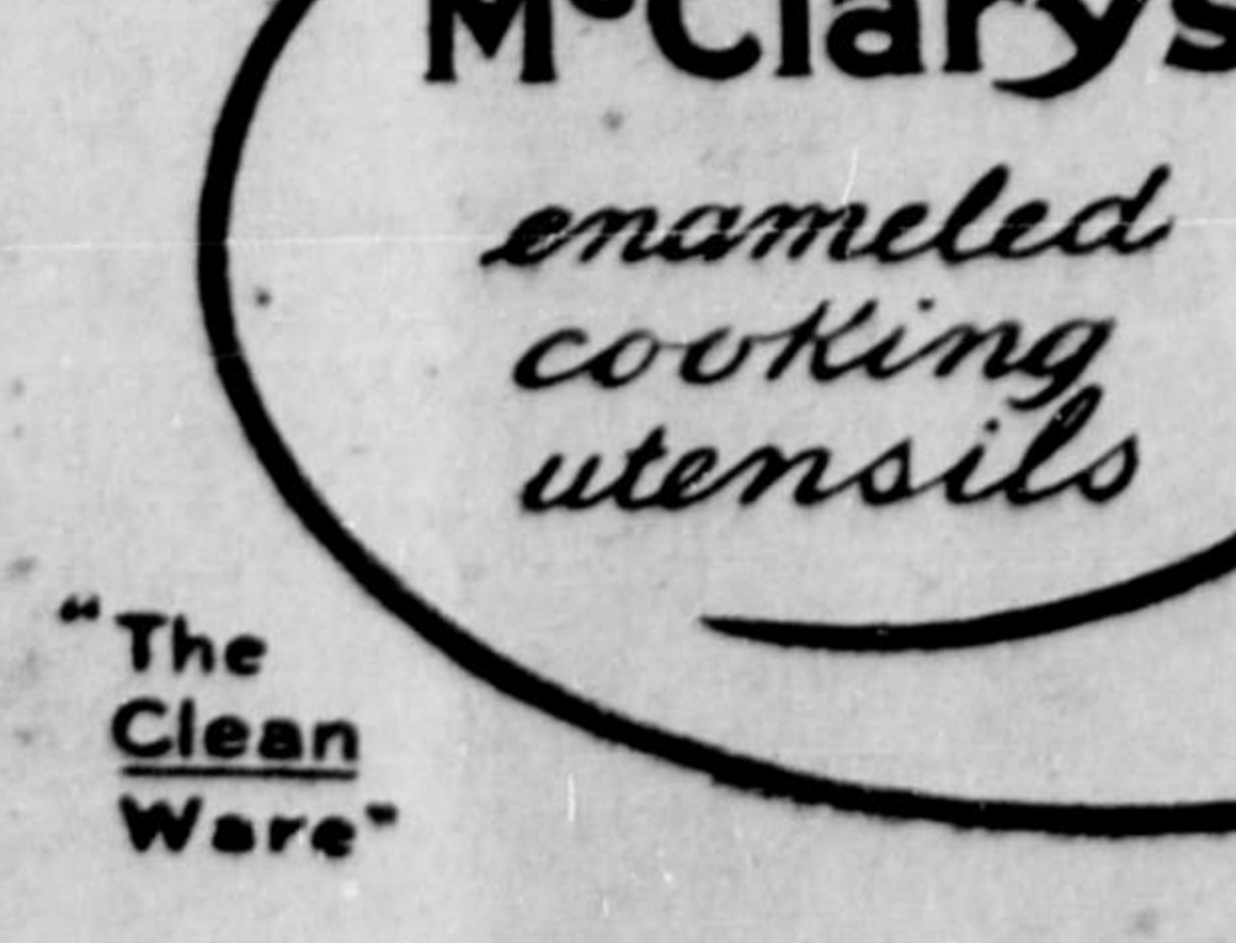

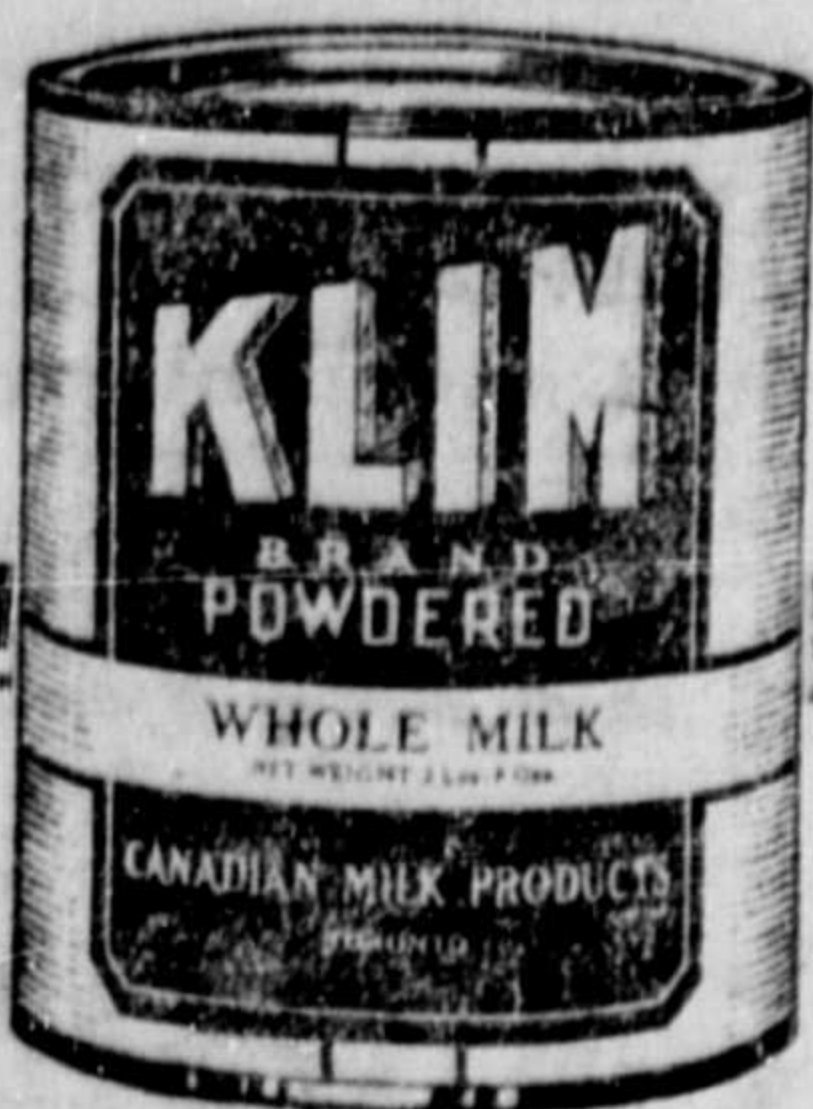

CONFUSION IN FIGURES

Ald. Perry Has Conflicting Reports as to Light and Power Surplus 1921.

Ald. Perry, chairman of the Utilities Committee, reported at last night's council that the by-law embodying reductions in the light and power rates which his committee proposes bringing in is being delayed pending the final settlement of figures showing the standing of the utility last year and a conference between the finance and utilities committee.

Ald. Perry explained that the proposed by-law was based on a surplus last year of \$30,000. This figure is accepted by T. C. Duncan, superintendent of utilities, but, as Ald. Perry explained last night, there seems to be some confusion among the officials of the city as to what the surplus really was last year. When the books were closed in March, Superintendent Duncan showed a surplus of \$30,000 but W. D. Vance, city treasurer, in his figures showed that when all charges of the department had been met there would only be a surplus of \$8,000. G. Rorie, the auditor, had first estimated the surplus at \$8,000 but, after a conference with Mr. Duncan, had brought this up to \$21,375. Today (Tuesday) he had announced that it would be \$33,000.

The auditorman declared that some definite understanding should be reached for it seemed peculiar that there should be such a wide difference between the figures of the treasurer and the auditor.

Ald. Perry has asked the city treasurer for figures regarding the distribution of sale of power and light under the various rates last year. These will take some time to obtain and will entail putting special clerks on the books.

MINER FROM KALUM LAKE

Oscar Olander Tells of His Property, Which Is Under Bond to Seattle Firm.

Returning to Terrace this morning after a brief visit was Oscar Olander, a Terrace mining man, who is one of the partners who discovered the free gold property at Kalsam Lake last summer and two weeks later bonded it to G. H. Hoar of Seattle for the Strand Mining Co. The partners in the mine besides Mr. Olander are Paul Brodin, Oscar Olander and John Gouture. The properties are officially known as the Black Wolf and Gold Needle groups, although more popularly called the Bear group. They are situated three miles east of Kalum Lake, five miles by trail.

Hoar bonded two other properties on the same land and on Matt Allard's claim they have placed the mill, which is to be operated just as soon as weather conditions permit. If this is a success another mill or two will be taken in this summer.

Mr. Olander and his associates have another valuable property in the same neighborhood, the Mother Lode. It is a silver-gold proposition. On it they find high grade native and ruby silver and grey copper, some of them giving enormous returns.

Another property that is being worked in the neighborhood is the Blue Grouse, seven miles from Cedar River bridge. It is a silver-lead ore. It is owned by August Wickstrom, who has two men sinking a shaft on it. There have been good showings there so far.

Many of Them Now Wear Smart Dresses Like Other Europeans

IRAXA, Albania, April 19.—Trousers as the national costume for Albanian women are to disappear within the next generation. The Mohammedan mothers have decreed this after seeing the smart, comfortable and sensible dresses worn by members of the American Red Cross mission here.

Immediately after arriving in Tirana the American nurses turned their attention to the proper clothing of the destitute poor, especially the young girls, whom they supplied with dresses, petticoats and shoes in place of their baggy trousers of calico, coats of sheepskin and crude moccasins.

The girls and their mothers were so delighted with the change that this mode of attire has become general and is now spreading throughout the rest of the country, displacing the Turkish style which has been in vogue five centuries.

CHITCHERIN IS ERRATIC

Russian Delegate to Genoa Sleeps Little and Forgets To Eat.

GENOA, April 19.—The fact that the human machine requires sleep is one of life's tragedies to George V. Chitcherin, Soviet Foreign Affairs minister and Russian delegate to the economic conference. Sleep is also a tragedy to those who have to do business with him.

The best hour to have an interview with Chitcherin is between midnight and 8 a.m. The only hours he devotes to rest are between 8 a.m. and noonday. The remainder he spends in work, with short 15-minute to half-hour rest intervals when he goes to his bachelor room adjoining his offices and lies down possibly for a few minutes.

Chitcherin is always on the job except for the four hours mentioned. He has stated that he grows older he hopes to eliminate these sleeping hours. He looks well, is round-faced, and but for red eyelids shows no signs of his sleeplessness.

Food is also a material difficulty with which Chitcherin battles. He gets so absorbed in his work that he frequently forgets to eat, and when reminded that he must, he takes but a few bits of bread and butter. Sometimes he is indisposed and his doctor invariably finds that it is through lack of eating. When asked if he has eaten anything, Chitcherin is unable to remember.
