## PRONOUNCED STEP FORWARD IMMIGRATION

### VANCOUVER CASES BEING WATCHED IN CONNECTION LOCAL PROSECUTIONS

#### Scheme for Bringing in of Colonists Announced by Minister at Ottawa

OTTAWA, Nov. 27.—A pronounced forward step in immigration activities of the Canadian Government was announced today by the acting minister of immigration and colonization, Hon. Chas. Stewart. Aggressive publicity in Great Britain and the United States, gradually widened to the Scandinavian countries, and Holland, Belgium and France, supported by an effective agency following up, is indicated. Special efforts will also be made toward the repatriation of ex-Canadians in the States, the securing of female domestic workers and the encouragement of immigration of children from Great Britain.

Free homesteads will no longer be the chief magnet but the efforts of the department will be directed toward settling up and banking productive the vacant lands close to the railways. Efforts will be largely centralized upon settlers in a position to buy land but a new departure will be taken in creating machinery through the immigration department for bringing the renters into direct contact with the owners desiring to rent lands. In this way it is hoped to place the tenant farmer in a position where he will eventually become a landowner in Canada.

The minister was unable to consider favorably the schemes for assisted lands settlement but hopes to work out a plan of close co-operation with the organizations interested in immigration. Child immigration is looked upon with great favor. Orphan children from Great Britain, many of them the families of ex-soldiers, may be obtained, perhaps from five to six thousand annually. The department hopes to co-operate in bearing the cost of their transportation with the British Land Settlement board.

#### QUEEN'S BEAT ARGONAUTS IN RUGBY MATCH

University and Edmonton Eskimos Will Now Play For Canadian Title

TORONTO, Nov. 27.—Queen's University defeated the Argonauts at Toronto 12 to 44 in the final Eastern Rugby Championship game before the largest number of spectators ever assembled together for a rugby game in Canada. Queens will meet the Edmonton Eskimos for the Canadian title.

#### THORNTON TAKES OFFICE FRIDAY

Temporary Headquarters of C. N. R. Will be at Ottawa

OTTAWA, Nov. 27.—Sir Henry Thornton, president and general manager of the Canadian National Railways, will take over his duties on December 1. The temporary offices will be at Ottawa until the executive decides where the head office will be permanently located.

#### ROWBOAT WAS CAPSIZED IN SUNDAY GALE

Jack Sutherland and Jack Stevens Fortunately, Suffered Nothing More Than Ducking

Jack Sutherland and Jack Stevens, of Westview, had a narrow escape from drowning on the harbor in yesterday afternoon's gale when the rowboat, in which they were out for a ride, capsized. They were rescued by the good offices of George Frizzell, in the Laura F., and Capt. A. Swanson, in the "25." It was about 2:30 when the frail craft in which the lads were out, was picked up and overturned by a sudden gust. Neither could swim but, fortunately, Mr. Frizzell and Mr. Swanson were watching from the shore and, when they saw the youths' predicament, they immediately went to their rescue. The boys held onto the capsized craft and were in the water about five minutes. They suffered nothing more than a chilly ducking.

#### IRELAND HAS MANY IN JAIL

Free Staters Holding 10,000 Political Prisoners

LIMERICK, Nov. 27.—Four hundred political prisoners were removed from the county jail today under a heavy escort and placed on a steamship bound for an unknown destination. The jails are overcrowded everywhere in Ireland and the transportation of prisoners is increasingly difficult. It is estimated that ten thousand political prisoners are in hands of the Free Staters.

#### PRINCE JOHN LEFT FOR QUEEN CHARLOTTE

The G.L.P. steamer Prince John left shortly after midnight Sunday for the Islands with a number of passengers together with a shipment of freight including settlers' effects and livestock consisting of four horses and six cattle.

The passengers included Mrs. D. Kutton and A. W. Burnip for Massett; John Shamos for Port Clements; L. Kirkham, Buckley Bay; P. Sharkey, Thurston Harbor; J. Anderson, Gushawa; H. Ellis, Gushawa; Chas. Wesley and W. A. Young, Port Clements. From the Islands the John will take the following people to Vancouver: Mrs. MacKinnon, Queen Charlotte City; Miss McKinnon, Gushawa; J. McCullough, Queen Charlotte City.

The vessel was posted to sail on Saturday night but was held over till 8 o'clock Sunday night to carry the carload of settlers' effects which arrived yesterday by train. The heavy wind kept the John in port till midnight.

#### C.G.M.M. VESSEL HAD ROUGH TRIP

Canadian Seineur Towed into St. John's by Sapper

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 27.—The Canadian government merchant marine steamer Canadian Seineur reached port today after being buffeted about by storms. The vessel left Liverpool on October 25 and was towed in here by the Canadian Sapper.

The Union steamer Venture arrived here at 10:30 last night from the south with a small general cargo. She left again early this morning for Alice Arm and Anxox and the canneries on the Skeena river to pick up canned salmon. The boat will be back here to sail for the south again on Tuesday at 6 p.m.

#### LIQUOR PROBE IN VICTORIA

Activities in Northern British Columbia by Secret Service Agents

**DAWSON EXONERATED**  
W. J. Bowser Failed to Prove Irregularities on Part of Board

VICTORIA, Nov. 27.—The probe in the public accounts committee in regard to the administration of the Liquor Act in northern and central British Columbia, which exonerated the firm of F. G. Dawson, Ltd. failed to establish that the Stevens speech was responsible for liquor board activity or that Liberals were favored over others in any of the communities. It showed however that the attorney-general had given instructions to prevent bootlegging.

Examined by Mr. Bowser, James Miller, inspector under the Liquor Board, said the country from Prince George to Prince Rupert had been covered several times. Alleged bootlegging activities had been investigated but it was found difficult to secure evidence sufficient to lay charges. There were many beer agencies at various points in compliance with the regulations but these beer agencies had been withdrawn. A number of prosecutions were carried out by the provincial police. The liquor board men only stepped in when the provincial police or municipal police were not doing their work well. Most of the men under him were employed in connection with the beer distribution but about ten were engaged in work connected with prosecutions.

**Dawson Case**  
In connection with the case of F. G. Dawson, Ltd. at Prince Rupert it had seemed at first as if there was a shortage and this was reported to the secretary of the board. When he recently visited Prince Rupert he found that the beer all checked up. There was a consignment of 800 barrels which had been transferred to an exporting company. He had examined the books of each concern and correspondence in connection with this beer and found everything was perfectly in order.

#### YESTERDAY'S GALE 75 MILES AN HOUR

The wind on Sunday did not blow continuously but, when it did, it was as high as 75 miles an hour according to H. O. Geewe, the local weather recorder. The gale broke a few windows around town and blew down some 50 telephone lines which were repaired by noon. Telegraph lines were all down this morning.

#### MUCH FISH IN SPITE WEATHER

Dominion Fisheries Show Slight Increase This Year Over Last

OTTAWA, Nov. 27.—Despite the unfavorable weather conditions which prevailed on the Atlantic coast in October, the landings of sea fish in Canada during the month amount to 679,579 hundredweights against 490,396 hundredweights in October 1921. The value of the catch of the fishermen last month was \$1,492,307 against \$1,167,221 in October 1921.

The Pacific Coast catches came to: Halibut, 23,835 hundredweights; herring, 111,181 hundredweights; salmon, 98,176 hundredweights. A large catch of pilchards amounting to 13,714 hundredweights was taken off Vancouver Island.

#### FORTNIGHT ON MASSETT INLET

Archbishop Du Vernet and Rev. James Gillett Visited Villages and Logging Camps

Archbishop F. H. Du Vernet, who returned to the city on the Prince John from Massett on Friday, spent a fortnight visiting various points on the Graham Island with Rev. James Gillett and his wife and little daughter on the missionary launch "Western Hope," which is really a floating paragon. Graham Island is almost cut in two by Massett Inlet which, though quite narrow for twenty miles, opens into an inland sea. On the shores of this inlet there are scattered settlers and a few villages as well as the logging camps which are beginning to spring up again with the prospects of sawmills, which were closed after the war, opening again on a more permanent basis. These places were visited by Archbishop Du Vernet and Rev. Mr. Gillett, among them being Massett Reserve, New Massett, Woden River, Nadu, Buckley Bay, Shanton Bay, Mayer's Landing and Port Clements. At most of these places moving pictures were shown and services held, thirteen people being confirmed at Massett Reserve and three at New Massett.

#### Magistrates in South Decide Convictions May be Made from Evidence by Liquor Detectives

According to information received from the south this morning, Magistrate J. Stuart Jamieson, of Burnaby, has ruled against the defence offered by Gordon S. Wismer in one of his liquor cases in which he stated that, under Section 47 of the Liquor Act, liquor purchased by constables from an alleged bootlegger for use as evidence at the trial, is the property of the government and therefore the vendor is not breaking the law. Magistrate Shaw of the Vancouver Police Court has also decided against a similar defence. Lawyers here have been watching with keen interest, the result of this defence.

#### ROBBERY AT CHASE RIVER POST OFFICE

Second Theft of Similar Nature in Kamloops District Took Place Yesterday Morning

KAMLOOPS, Nov. 27.—For the second time within a week in this district thieves have blown a post office safe. This time robbers entered the store and post office at Chase and robbed it of \$600. The theft took place on Sunday morning. Noise of dynamiting attracted the townspeople and the robbers fled overlooking a larger sum in the safe. One arrest has been made. Chase is located east of here on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway. The first robbery took place at Mount Olie north of here on the C. N. R.

Two other bouts with Wills and Beckett or some other heavyweight boxer will complete the contract under which Dempsey will get \$1,000,000 from Al. Woods, the promoter.

### Public Service And What It Means.

Public service is an abstract quantity often difficult to discern. It is generally considered in individuals as successful effort towards the bringing about of conditions which tend to improve the life and welfare of the community or the nation as the case may be. The best service is usually brought about without reward to the person or group which gives it. If a person is paid for work he does for the benefit of the public his services cannot be called public service. If, however, he works just for the purpose of improving the lot of his neighbors or countrymen without recompense in sight his work comes in the district of public service. That is where public service and civil service differ. A man may be called a public servant but that does not mean that his work is what is generally known as public service. There is an element of philanthropy in public service and one is never paid for philanthropy.

### City Government Can Render Service.

In a city such as Prince Rupert public service can be rendered by its mayor, its city councillors, its school board and its police commissioners or other civic executives. In fact if an honest person holds any of these offices, his service is strictly public service.

The mayor gets a small remuneration, the aldermen smaller still and other elected administrators of the city receive nothing at all. No matter how efficient or inefficient the mayor or the aldermen may be, they earn the annual pay they receive. An ill-paid man receives as much as the mayor receives and a boy will earn as much as the aldermen.

There is, however, vast difference in the services that may be rendered by some civic administrators and others. While the mayor of Prince Rupert may receive little more than \$1,000 per year, he may be worth a hundred thousand to the city in a year. The same applies to the aldermen, school trustees and police commissioners.

### Real Service And Unreal.

While civic office may present so much opportunity for the rendering of public service, it is a reasonably safe statement to make that very few of the men who go into civic politics are actuated solely by motives of service. There are also very few men who go into the field considering the salary they may receive. The attraction to the man who has some personal object in view may come in the honor that he may suppose attaches itself to civic office; it may come in the prospect of conferring some advantage upon the estate or property of himself or his friends, or in various other ways.

While the attractions are legion for the selfish or dishonest man in the realm of civic politics, there is only one recompense for the unselfish and dishonest man and that is the satisfaction of having given service which will, nine times out of ten, be discounted by unjust criticism. Perhaps in this may be explained why many cities nowadays find themselves with civic governments that can be termed little else than a "bunch of dubs" or "grafters."

### Prince Rupert Soon To Choose Again.

Prince Rupert will soon be having another municipal election. As usual there will be candidates going in from selfish and unselfish motives, personal and impersonal ones. It is to be hoped that this city will be more fortunate than many others in the kind of men or women who present themselves. There may not be many selfish candidates but it is a certain thing that there will be some personal ones—men going in with some axe to grind or obsessed with some personal opinion or grudge. Civic politics in a small town gives them undue scope and their chances are good. However, sectionalism is to be avoided as much in Prince Rupert as anywhere else.

It will be up to the electors to choose the dross from the good grain and eliminate it. It may not be an easy matter to do so but a little careful thought will assist. A man's record should be his credential—a good one can be generally chosen from a bad one and the man without a record is not wanted.

The selection of civic executives is a more important matter than many think. It is worthy of careful consideration.

## Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

Today marks another milestone in the history of the G.T.P. connection. The first through train from this city to South Hazelton left this morning. Chief Justice Hunter and J. W. Stewart were passengers.

Chief Justice Hunter, at the close of the assizes yesterday, declared that he would suggest to the government that the sale of liquor to Indians be made an indictable offense.

Mayor Newton is quoted in the papers today as making a very strong objection to the manner in which the clergy criticized him in regard to the morals of the city.

E. Parkinson, collector of Inland Revenue for the province who is now in the city, is very pleased with the place. He is here in connection with the appointment of J. Jephson as local collector.

## PRINCE GEORGE

## TAXATION OF THE PROVINCE

"The Taxation Department has been run on a strictly business basis, and every effort is being put forward to equitably apportion the tax levies," said Hon. John Hart in his budget speech. "The audit system is a great factor in securing more accurate returns, and the effect of this system is so far reaching that it is impossible to figure the results accomplished by it."

"It has been the intention to arrange for a conference with the Minister of Finance at Ottawa to discuss the question of the dual income tax collected in this province, while in view of the fact that since Parliament rose, Hon. Mr. Fielding has been over-seas practically all the time, it has been impossible to make the necessary arrangements. At an early opportunity we will endeavor to have an interview and press for some changes which will to some extent relieve the strain and inconvenience of the double system."

"The municipalities have been representing to the government that they should be given power to impose an income tax to be applied toward the cost of education, and the suggestion has been made that all personal incomes should be taxed without any exemption, the rate on the first \$2,000 to be one half of one per cent. The Government, before coming to a conclusion, is anxious to see the result of a conference with the Dominion Government, as it would be much more satisfactory to the taxpayers of the Province if there was only one collecting body with all the consequent saving in cost, labor in connection with making returns, and annoyance.

### Timber Limits

"Since 1906 recommendations have been made annually by the Taxation department for the adjustment and equalization of values of Crown granted timber limits. In 1911 the Royal Commission on Taxation recommended that the assessment of timber lands should be made by experts and expressed the opinion that the cost could legitimately be regarded as a capital expenditure. The Commission also pointed out that the cost of the increased machinery would be more than repaid in the increased valuation.

"Until 1921 no system or basis for values existed in the Department, the work being done in a most inequitable and haphazard manner, the assessed values being only a small percentage of the actual values. The Department commenced the work by employing a superintendent and authorizing him to arrange the necessary organization. After a trial the method adopted was found not to be satisfactory and a contract was let to Ryan-McIntosh-Hiberson Company for the completion of the work. Several conferences were held with timber holders, and a copy of the proposed contract submitted to them was generally approved. The owners are now co-operating with the Government by supplying us with their cruises, which is a considerable saving in cost as the cruisers in such cases need only make a check cruise instead of a complete one. In a number of cases, where owners did not have a cruise of their own, they are paying 50 per cent of the cost in consideration of being supplied with copies of maps and details as filed with the Department. The owners admitted that they had not been reasonably or equitably assessed, and, in view of the cost of the new assessment, they agreed to pay a general increase in their taxes of 25 per cent for this year. It was the intention of the Department to have the work done gradually but after consultation with the interested parties, it was suggested that it would be

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or reduction of this or that tax. Nothing would give myself or my colleagues greater pleasure than to be able to announce a substantial cut in taxation, but in the circumstances I think we are deserving of commendation for declining to increase it. What I have always tried to work for is such an equalization of taxation that the whole community shall contribute in just proportions the cost of the services which are provided for all.

### Credit Better

"The credit of the province is better now than at any time since Confederation, and this is demonstrated by the ready sale of our bonds, the prices we have received, and the number of financial houses bidding for the issues.

"This province is fortunate in owning great natural resources within its bounds, timber, mines, agricultural lands and fisheries. The return of normal conditions and the influx of population that we may anticipate in the next few years, combined with the sound, sane policy of development of our natural resources, must assure us of a bright and prosperous future."

### FAIR BOARD STARTING MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN

In Order to Give New Directorate Good Start in January for 1923 Work

### PREMIER GIVES OPPOSITION A THRUST

Scores Them For Their Futile Criticism and Lack of Constructive Work

(By H. F. Pullen.)  
VICTORIA, Nov. 27. — Turnst after thrust was given the opposition in the Legislature by Premier Oliver in a speech in answer to criticisms of the budget. The premier was in a pleasant humor and as he chided the Conservatives for their distortion of facts and efforts to make political capital at the expense of good government, he taunted them with their evident appreciation of his efforts, claiming that their appearance showed that they did not like what was being said and he did not wonder at it.

The Premier further said that in all the long debate on the address and since that on the budget there was not one suggestion which might lead to improved conditions.

Taking up first the suggestion that the roads had been neglected the Premier told of a trip he made through the interior where the driver went so fast that if he told it he would fear being prosecuted for exceeding the speed limit. This was not possible on poor roads yet these roads had been made since the present government came into power. The old fowser trails had been turned into magnificent highways.

**Civil Service Dismissals**  
Mentioning another charge that civil servants were dismissed without giving any reason the Premier said this was often done for the sake of the man dismissed. Usually it would injure him if the reason were made public. The dismissals, when they occurred were according to law.

Taking up the matter of alleged deficits in the budgets, Mr. Oliver pointed to the last five years of the former government when there were deficits aggregating \$3,300,000 in addition to the expenditure of \$5,000,000 a year received from land and timber sales.

The question of borrowings came in for some attention. Mr. Bowser had no overdraft at the bank today. He had on one occasion borrowed as high as \$8,000,000 at the bank and had never been refused anything asked. Their methods of disposing of securities saved thousands of dollars to the province. One reason for the high taxes was seen when it was shown that the personal property tax, land tax and poll tax put together would not pay the interest on the P.G.E. debt which Bowser had foisted on the people.

At one time the leader of the opposition had suggested borrowing more money in order to avoid raising the tax rate and now he was condemning borrowings.

### Sport Chat

Flat racing in England for 1922 closed officially with the running of the last race on Saturday's program at Lingfield Park. While the season has been a most brilliant and successful one, it carries into history with it the not altogether desirable distinction of having provided an unusually large number of reversals in racing form, particularly in the classics and the more important cup and stake events. Taken in their entirety, racing conditions this year have been most favorable. While the early spring meetings experienced cold weather and it was necessary to abandon the Newbury Spring meeting on account of a snow storm, trainers were later on started the ordeal through which they passed a year ago—the long dry spell with its accompanying hard ground that plays such havoc with their charges, particularly the two-year-olds. Throughout the season rain fell at most opportune times and, seeing to keep the ground from becoming too hard, was an important factor in the development of a large number of exceptionally promising juveniles.

has been turned topsy-turvy on many occasions. This is, of course, partly attributable to the unusual conditions of a year ago, conditions that were difficult to get in training form last year, while many of the apparently successful ones turned out to be disappointments this season.

This year's classics have been a series of surprises. The first, the Two Thousand Guineas, went to Lord Queensborough's St. Louis, who defeated the favorite Lord Woolavington's Captain Cuttle. Two days later, in the One Thousand Guineas, Marshal Field's Billy Golden Horn, a hot favorite, finished third to W. H. Parr's Silver Fern, a ten to one shot. In the Epsom Derby St. Louis went to the post a favorite, but the winner proved to be Captain Cuttle, who with Lord Astor's Tamar, in second place, went to the post at 10 to 1 against. The Oaks went to the favorite, Lord Astor's Pogram, with Soubrique in second place, the same position as that in which she finished in the One Thousand. The St. Ledger, the last of the five great races for three-year-olds, was one of the most open and attracted the largest field that ever faced the starter for this event in nearly a century. For weeks previous to the race as soon as a horse was installed favorite something unforeseen came along to cause a withdrawal. Thus Captain Cuttle, St. Louis, Tamar, Pomfroland and Graingrower were installed favorites in turn. Influenced by the open nature of the race, Ratus, the winner of the French Derby kept his engagement and was installed as favorite. He proved fractious at the post however, and was left flat-footed. Lord Louisa's Royal Lancer, a 43 to 1 shot, was an easy winner, beating Lord Derby's Silurian by two lengths. In the Newmarket Jockey Club six weeks later Royal Lancer started favorite in a field of five, and finished second to Sir Abe Bailey's Bucks Hussar, who had finished absolutely last in the St. Ledger.

### Returned Soldiers

The Premier scored the opposition for trying to stir up trouble among the returned soldiers at the settlements and for their action in connection with the irrigation districts. He showed the large sums that had been advanced to the men who went to Merville after the Dominion government had refused to do anything for them. They had picked out the land for themselves and had been aided in every possible way. He gave a number of instances of men who had drawn large sums up to nearly nine thousand dollars, and then Mr. Bowser went among them and tried to stir up trouble. He challenged any member of the House to show where any government had given as good treatment to any returned soldiers as this government had to the people of Merville. Now, according to the Colonist newspaper, the people accused the leader of the opposition of breaking faith with them.

Taking up the criticism of the department of industries, the premier spoke of the success of such companies as the Western Cordage Company which was supplying binder twine to the people of Canada and the Sidney Rubber Company which was exporting its product to Australia and other countries.

**Could Lick Them All**  
After referring to the Court House at Prince Rupert and trying to answer half a dozen questions at once, Richard Burde of Port Alberni came to the rescue of the Premier declaring Mr. Oliver could lick the lot of them but they might take him one at a time.

Before closing the Premier dealt with a number of matters brought up by opposition members. He read from a confidential letter written by Mr. Bowser to Premier Brewster in which the former had promised not to attack the government if construction of the P.G.E. were continued. Now he had broken that promise, that was why the letter was read now.

In regard to Otter Besner who he was informed owned the Fishermen's Club, the Northern Liquor Co., the Knox Hotel and a bonded warehouse.

Mr. Miller said his men had checked Besner up and as a result a fine of \$1000 had been imposed. The evidence was secured prior to the Stevens' speech.

Asked why he did not prosecute earlier, Miller said if he had he could not have secured any more evidence. Once the identity of a witness was disclosed his usefulness in the community was ended. There were 25 prosecutions in Prince Rupert, some fines were imposed and some men were sent to jail. He had sent a wire to Besner to meet him as he wanted to check up his warehouse and he had been informed he was out of town.

Mr. Bowser: "Did you mean Ben Self?"

ed if they had been caught purchasing whiskey. He wanted to know why these cases were not prosecuted.

**Chooses Own Men**

Mr. Miller said the Crown prosecutor was a Conservative, he understood, and the prosecutions had been carried out through Chief Vickers. He knew little about politics but was engaged in the secret service. Men who were taken on were chosen by himself. One of the most abused of these was a fine young man with a university training. The ones who could not be bought got the most abuse. He had not yet received reports on the Prince Rupert clubs. That was why there had not yet been any prosecutions. P. Black's club had been fined \$1,000 and there would be other prosecutions yet. The men had wired him when they were ready to proceed with the prosecutions.

Mr. Bowser then read an editorial from the Prince Rupert Daily News which condemned spectacular raids and stated that beer selling was carried on openly. He asked why if this was the condition action had not been taken.

**City Is Lax**  
Mr. Miller said if there was laxity, as there undoubtedly was, it was on the part of the civic authorities. They were the ones who were charged with the carrying out of the law. It was only when they failed, as in this case, that the liquor board stepped in.

Asked by Mr. Perry in regard to Prince George, Mr. Miller said enforcement had been better there. The police there had shown a good deal of activity.

Returning again to the Dawson incident mentioned by H. H. Stevens in a speech at Vancouver, it was explained that every barrel of the beer had been accounted for. The file of correspondence ordering the beer had been looked through and everything was perfectly regular.

Ian McKenzie: "Stevens was wrong then in his statement."  
Mr. Miller said he knew nothing about politics.

The tug was sent out to pick up the freighter Stuart Dollar which lost a rudder on her trip to the Orient. The vessel was picked up amid a heavy storm and a start was made for port. Tuesday the steamer Bessie Dollar of the same line burst a steampipe and the latest reports are to the effect that the Bessie is hitched to the stern of the Stuart and both are being brought in to Seattle.

The C.P.O.S. Empress of Asia picked up a wireless message on Tuesday from the Bessie asking for aid to one of the firemen injured by the bursting steampipe. Dr. G. R. Moffatt, ship's surgeon on the liner wireless had instructions but it was too late for the man had succumbed to the shock.

The Stuart Dollar has recently been pressed into the service between Vancouver and the Orient but the Bessie is an old hand at the game and is nearly at the end of her tether. Only nine months ago she came back limping to port with one of the crew dead, her captain badly hurt and her masts and funnels broken by the fury of the sea. It was just a bit of luck that she did not founder before reaching port and now she is in grave trouble again.
